REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Admission is limited to graduates of approved four year high schools in Pennsylvania and those who have had equivalent education. Equivalent education is determined by the Credentials Bureau of the Department of Public Instruction. Exceptions are made in the cases of teachers of experience who have been previously enrolled in teacher training institutions. Recent high school graduates are advised to enter the regular session in September.

An admission blank, secured from the college, must be properly filled out before a student is legally enrolled.

RENEWAL OF PARLIAL ELEMENTARY CERTIFICATES

Partial elementary certificates issued before September 1, 1927 may be renewed by presenting six semester hours of additional professional training. Care should be exercised in choosing courses that will also count toward the Normal Certificate.

STANDARD CERTIFICATE

Teachers desiring information as to the remaining courses required for the Standard Certificate should write to the Teacher Bureau, Department of Public Instruction, Harrisburg. To avoid disappointment, no other advice should be taken.

A transcript of credit will not be sent to Harrisburg unless a written request has been made by the student. This request must be given to the Registrar.

TWO-YEAR NORMAL CERTIFICATE

Persons desiring to complete any of the two year curricula should consult the Dean of Instruction for evaluation of work already taken and for information as to required courses. Courses should be taken in the order in which they are outlined in the different curricula.

Evaluations of credit cannot be made during the week immediately before or immediately following registration day. Information needed should be secured from the Registrar at least several weeks before the session opens.

FAILURES

Regular students who fail in one or two courses during the year are advised to return for the summer session to repeat the work and thus be able to pursue a regular third semester schedule.

STUDENT TEACHING

The demonstration school will be in operation during the summer and provision will be made for a limited number to do student teaching. All candidates who expect to complete the two year curricula by attending summer sessions must satisfy the student teaching requirement. Arrangements for student teaching must be made before May 15.

DEGREES

The Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education is for those persons who wish to improve themselves in the elementary field either as teachers or supervisors. The Bachelor of Science degree in Secondary Education is for those who desire to teach in junior or senior high schools. In the latter curriculum, it is necessary to choose two major fields. California offers superior work in the following fields: Social Studies and History, English, Geography, Natural and Physical Science, Mathematics, and Foreign Languages.

Evaluations toward a degree can be made in the college office for graduates of approved four-year high schools. Evaluations for others must be made by the Department of Public Instruction through this office. It is necessary to submit official transcripts of all post high school work done elsewhere than at California.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION IN ALL CURRICULA

- 1. All entering students are required to take, without credit, ten lessons on "Using the Library."
- 2. All students are required to take part in the extracurricular activities. Participation is under the direction of the Director of Student Activities.
- 3. All students, before receiving a final grade in English or Arithmetic, must equal eighth grade standards of achievement in these subjects.

ELECTIVE FIELDS FOR PROSPECTIVE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS

The person who is to teach in the junior high school must have, in addition to what has been prescribed, a special preparation in at least two fields. A minimum of eighteen semester hours in both is required for certification in a special field.

Prerequisites for the Election of Fields in the Junior High School Curriculum.

- 1. To elect Science, a student must present a unit in high school Chemistry and a unit in high school Physics.
- 2. To elect Social Studies, a student must present two units in high school Social Studies.
- 3. To elect Mathematics, a student must present one unit in high school Algebra, and one unit in high school Plane Geometry, or two units in Composite Mathematics, at least one of which must have been taken in the senior high school.
- 4. To elect French, a student must present two units in high school French.

5. To elect Latin, a student must present three units in high school Latin.

When a student has chosen his elective fields, his curriculum becomes a closed series of courses not subject to change without loss of credit.

A graduate in this curriculum is entitled to teach in any high school the subjects in which eighteen semester hours of credit have been attained as electives.

ROOMS

Rooms are furnished with beds, chairs, tables, dressers, and wardrobes. The beds are supplied with sheets, pillow cases, blankets, and bedspreads. Students should bring their own towels, table napkins, and such personal effects as they may desire. Laundry should not be marked until rooms have been reserved.

A room may be reserved in advance by sending the registration deposit of \$10.00 with your first, second, and third choice of room. The deposit will not be returned unless application for return is received at least three weeks preceding the opening of the college. A room will not be reserved without a deposit. The reservation will be held until 3 o'clock on the regular Registration Day. At that time, the reservation will be withdrawn unless students notify the college by wire or phone of their intention to arrive at the college later.

LIVING OUTSIDE DORMITORIES

Women will not be permitted to room or board outside of the dormitories except in the home of parents, grand-parents, brother or sister, uncle or aunt, unless special permission has been granted by the President. Arrangements must be made with the President before the rooms are engaged. No student will be permitted to room in houses not approved by the Housing Committee. Any change of address must be approved by the Dean of Women prior to the change.
