
president's message






it would seem, from this picture, that the band played to a very small audience. this was not really true. there were more people on the other side.

those who did gather for the concert were met by the usual cacophony of harmony, chord and dischord rang over the countryside for two hours, students sang out across campus their loud praises of the concert.





despite the tropical heat in california that fine spring evening, the count and his boys made many people realize that music can be enjoyed anywhere. (even in the mon valley.)


the interest displayed during the count's presence made one think that perhaps the c.s.c students had some feeling for the finer things of life.


what amazed the average bystander on this fine spring evening was that many male students actually put on a suit (usually only profs. and student teachers do this), got a date, and went to see count basic perform.







anyone for counting holes? well at three holes a plank, and twenty-three planks...oh well! they serve their purpose, that's more than most of us do.









life somewhat impersonal and lonely.





sigma tau gamma



alpha psi omega helps the members develop their talent and the art of acting, and to develop a taste for good drama, and unites the dramatic groups of many colleges and universities.





college players







spanish club






here we have another of the many scenic views showing the contrast between the muddy mon and the many modern buildings of the campus, well three anyway.

the duffers were alex shufner, tom de rosa, tom tully, mike zappone, john baldigowski, and mike hondronik.








immediate plans include annual cheerleader tryouts for all campus women not on academic probation, participation in winter events, and "spirit-promotion" campaigns on campus.

yes, summer was long at c.s.c., the boys and girls did suffer. the kids that stayed for 16 weeks know summer trimester is tougher.




problems in the summer are similar to the problems of the rest of the year, here we have two "suitcasers" waiting for their ride.










the residents of north hall aren't going to wait around for old science to blow up. they're moving out before anything happens.
