


## ***THE SUMMER TRIMESTER . . .***



## FOOTBALL '64



On Sept. 12 the Vulcans battled highly favored East Tennessee State, taking a 6-0 lead in the opening period. However, East Tennessee bounced back to emerge victorious (12-6).

Taking to the air for all three touchdowns, the Vulcans opened the home campaign with a 21-10 triumph over Marietta on September 19.

CSC opened competition in the State College Conference by downing Lock Haven 27-18 on Sept. 26.

On October 3, our team again emerged victorious over Glassboro State College (N.J.). However, Slippery Rock shattered our hopes of a State College Conference title with their 20-13 victory. Then Shippensburg triumphed over our Vulcans with a 28-19 score.


A Homecoming throng of 4500 witnessed the deadlock between Clarion and California. The Vulcans opened a 7-0 lead in the first quarter, scoring again before halftime, but settling for a 14-14 tie at the end of the fourth quarter.



With a loss of 26-13 to Indiana State and a win over Edinboro 14-0, our Vulcans ended with a 4-4-1 record last season.

Eugene O'Neill's masterpiece, *Desire Under the Elms*, was performed by the widely-known Circle-in-the-Square Theatre Group, in Steele.




## STUDENT CONGRESS

The duties of the Student Congress are to consider matters of student interest which can be presented by either recognized organizations, or by the student body through petition.



Our students really appreciated the tremendous effort made by everyone concerned.







A professor of mine said that if you read every assignment throughout college you will still not know much: you must do more than what is required. The success of CSC's basketball team can be attributed to its willingness to do more than is required. If you go over to the gym in mid-March, you'll see four or five freshmen and varsity players working out; some will be working out in July; some, staying late to push the chairs aside during fall registration.

Coach Myles Witchey and Coach Connie Mack Ra must have questioned the theory that doing more than is required in any 3:30 practice would win just one game at 8:00 on Saturday. At mid-season the Vulcans were having the same success with basketball that you would have with calculus if you ignored the brackets: 5 wins and 9 losses.


Then late in January the believers proved the theory: a record 124 against Lock Haven; unsuspecting Edinboro losing 82-70 with Vandermer getting 24; W&J losing at home, 88-69—Hobart scores his season high of 22; nationally ranked Fairmont wins 73-93; Coach Witchey sees his Vulcans beat his alma mater for the second time in two tries, 69-66—Hobart gets 19, Kughn 18; non-believing Indiana takes an unscheduled loss, 87-84—Hayward hits 15 his first chance to start; Clarion took the bus, but left the driving to us, 87-80—sure dribbling Kughn hits his season high of 21; Waynesburg, welcome as a dividend check everywhere in the conference, faces Kotarsky's 26 to lose 95-88.

California has won seven of its last eight games, and has for the first time a chance to represent the district in the NAIA playoff. Beat Edinboro and Slippery Rock and they're in. Edinboro, the 5th ranked rebounding team in the nation, comes to town acting meaner than a giant: Giant 95, David, 108; Jim (The Frail Rail) Vandermer drops in 25 of 27 free throws and a total of 35 for the night. Slippery Rock steals the win and the Vulcan's chance for Kansas City. Marietts's win is anti-climactic.

Returning lettermen Skip Kughn and Jim Vandermer were honorable mention on the All-District 18 team; big Frank Pilsitz (5th in conference rebounds, 13 per game, and 9th in scoring, 17 per game) and Vandermer (5th high conference scorer, 19 per game) were honorable mention on the State College Athletic team.

Most points scored: 124 against Lock Haven






No attempt was made to include everyone in every picture or to identify students, for this is the purpose of a student directory or old-fashioned "annual" rather than a modern yearbook.


Being editor has been a lot of fun as well as work, and I only hope you will enjoy this *Monocal* as a sort of scrap-book in the future as well as now.







## ***SIGMA TAU GAMMA CONTINUES SUCCESS***

CSC's ZTA chapter has certainly displayed sisterhood through their many activities this year, and the sisters are looking forward to many more years as a close, active sorority.









The brothers take great pride in their annual Founder's Day Banquet.






## *GAMMA BETA PSI*




# BASEBALL TEAM HAS UNLUCKY SEASON


Tennis Coach Allen Welsh's team won three of five conference matches and five of the twelve matches scheduled.

CSC had won 17 straight conference matches until the loss to Edinboro this season.



