Boone's Vulcans Prepare for PSAC Final Four Tourney

California University's men's basketball team travels to Millersville this weekend (March 5-6) to compete in the 1993 PSAC Final Four Tournament.

Coached by seventh-year veteran Jim Boone, California will play PSAC-East runner-up Bloomsburg on Friday, March 5, at 6 p.m.

Following the Cal-Bloom game, PSAC-East champion and tourney host Millersville will tipoff against Indiana (PA) University, the PSAC-West runner-up. The winners of Friday's semifinals will meet on Saturday, Mar. 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the 1993 PSAC "State Game."

There will be no consolation game and all the games will be played at Millersville's Pucillo Gymnasium. Tickets can be purchased at the door and the cost is \$10 for reserved seating, \$8 for general admission and \$2 for students of the participating schools. These tickets are good for all three games and there will be no singlegame tickets sold.

California University has been given 100 PSAC tickets and they will be sold on a first-come, firstserve basis at the Cal athletic office (Hamer Hall, Rm. 221). Call (412) 938-4351.

California will attempt to become the first PSAC men's basketball team to win consecutive state championships since Cheyney accomplished this feat back in 1982

"We're very pleased to have ended our regular season with a win at Lock Haven, which we feel has assured us of receiving a bid to the NCAA Tournament," said Boone. "But one of the goals or traditions at California University has always been to win the PSAC tournament title. We are looking forward to this opportunity. It will be a tremendous challenge for our players but I'm sure our guys will be well prepared and ready.'

The 1992-93 Vulcans returned just one starter from the 1991-92 number-one ranked team which went 31-2 overall and advanced all the way to the NCAA II Final Four while winning the PSAC and NCAA II East Regional titles.

Cal overcame a 2-2 start and finished the 1992-93 regular season by winning ten straight games and 15 of its last 16. Cal finished the regular season with a 22-5 overall

record and won a third straight PSAC-West crown and fifth West title in the past seven years by going 11-1 in the division. Cal was ranked 12th nationally in the Feb. 23 NCAA II Top 20 poll, and the 22 wins this year is the third highest single-season win output in the

school's basketball history.

Cal's lone returning starter from 1991-92 is senior guard Raymond Gutierrez.

A District GTE Cosida Academic All-American, Gutierrez has enjoyed a phenomenal senior season and is averaging 27.3 points, 5.0 three-pointers a game while shooting 87% from the foul line.

He has been named the PSAC-West Player of the Week three times and was the Division II's AT & T Long Distance Award winner for December and January.

A 3.75 pre-med student, Gutierrez has been Cal's leading scorer in 23 of 26 games this season. Gutierrez has netted a PSAC record 130 treys this season and is among the national leaders in three-pointers (5.0 pg-first), scoring (third) and foul shooting (sixth).

Joining Gutierrez on Cal's perimeter are junior Darnell White and sophomore Todd McLoughlin.

White is averaging 9.0 points, 8.5 assists and 2.7 steals per game. He leads the PSAC in assists with 221 and is shooting 65 percent from the foul line.

McLoughlin is averaging 8.1 points, 3.9 assists and 5.2 rebounds per game. McLoughlin has converted 20 of 45 three-point shots and is shooting nearly 64 percent from the foul line. He was Cal's first perimeter player off the bench

Spearheading California's inside game are junior post players Chad Scott and Malloyd Brown.

Scott, Cal's first post player off the bench in 1991-92, is averaging 15.2 points and 7.6 rebounds per game as a fulltime player in 1992-93. Scott leads all NCAA II players in fieldgoal percentage (70.5 percent) and has converted 155 of 220 attempts from the floor.

Brown became a starter during the first half of the divisional season and is averaging 12.7 points and 8.4 rebounds a game while shooting 62.6 percent from the floor. He leads the team in blocked shots with 32.

One advantage this year's Cal squad might have from last year's school-best team is more overall depth. Other perimeter players that have played significant roles this season include Brian Fixx, Candice Pickens and Brent Kincaid.

Fixx is a senior co-captain along with Gutierrez and the Vulcans have compiled a 92-23 (.800) cumulative record during Fixx's four

Pickens is a freshman and has effectively subbed for White this season. He has played in all 26 games and is averaging 4.6 points and 1.5 rebounds a game with 72 assists and 28 steals.

Kincaid is a freshman who spells Gutierrez and has made 24 of 46 treys (52.2%) and is averaging four points a game. Both Kincaid and Pickens have performed well in crucial situations late in divisional

Adding depth inside are Chris Callender, Jeremy Golden, Paul Lancaster and John Hesterman.

Callender, a freshman, has been a part-time starter and is averaging 3.6 points and 3.1 rebounds a

Golden is a sophomore who is averaging 4.7 points and 4.4 rebounds a game. He is shooting 52 percent from the floor and has been Cal's leading rebounder four differ-

Lancaster, a sophomore, is averaging 2.5 points and 2.0 rebounds a game, while Hesterman, a redshirt freshman, is averaging two points and one rebound a game. Freshman Robert Jones has redshirted the 1992-93 season.

As a team, Cal is outscoring and outrebounding its opponents by 87.0-75.2 and 40.0-36.8 margins respectively.

The Vulcans will face Bloomsburg for the first time since the 1986-87 season when Cal edged the Huskies 73-70 in the finals of the 1987 Bloomsburg Invitational. Bloom competed in Cal's 1989 Observer-Reporter Invitational but did not play the Vulcans.

The Huskies are coached by 22year veteran Charlie Chronister and Bloom compiled a 17-9 overall record and 8-4 divisional mark.


Bloomsburg is outscoring and outrebounding its opponents by 82.7-77.1 and 35.3-34.5 margins respectively.

Five Huskies are averaging 10 points or more a game: junior guard Wardell Chambers (17.7 ppg), junior forward Ellwood Vines (16.4 ppg), Karl Zachman (14.6 ppg), freshman forward Shawn Crissman (13.5 ppg) and freshman forward Lee Gump (10.4 ppg). Vines (9.0 rpg), Gump (6.3 rpg) and Zachman (6.0 rpg) are Bloom's top rebounders.

Cal and Bloom have played eight common opponents this season— Shippensburg, Lock Haven, Edinboro, Indiana, Mansfield, Pitt-Johnstown and Mercy-

The Vulcans swept two-game series from Clarion, Shipp, Lock
