300 certified crisis response teams in seven US regions and Canada

Team Leader

A trained and certified manager who supervises and coordinates the response of up to four canine/handler teams. Typically, the team leader works without a canine.

Team

An AACR team is a canine/handler team with specialized AACR training and certification which provides animal-assisted comfort, stress relief, emotional support and crisis intervention services for people affected by crisis and disaster.

New Wilmington Schools



December 12, 2021: Student Death

- HOPE teams responded to New Wilmington School District following an accidental student death.
- Delanee Ann Schiek was only 15 when she passed.
- HOPE teams were stationed in the Resource Room & were available throughout the day for students & faculty to visit with the dogs for any comfort/support needed.
- 7 Dog teams were present, representing both HOPE-AACR and Lawrence County Comfort Canines: Bear, Emma, Murray, Chevy, Mily, Ziggy, and Leo.
- HOPE responded twice to this school district following the crisis, seeing over 700+ students and faculty.
- HOPE team leaders Ryleigh King & Sherry Rigel were informed that the dogs really had a great impact on the students & were grateful that we were able to bring some comfort to those affected.

Sherry acted as Team Leader for three canine/handler teams, together they provided 1500 interactions with students and staff at the high school.

HOPE responded back to Seneca Valley just two weeks later for a second student suicide and a third time as well to provide continuing support, where Ryleigh led four canine/handler teams at the middle school bringing comfort to 700 students.
