Constitutional Revisions

On December 16 and December 17 a referendum will be conducted on the following changes in the Constitution of the Community Government Association. These articles are being printed to allow the students sufficient time to make a decision on the change.

ARTICLE III

All full-time students in the undergraduate school shall be members of the Association.

Full time faculty members who have payed the activities fee shall also be members of the Community Government Association.

ARTICLE VIII

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Parlimentarian (NON-VOTING), and a Historian (NON-VOTING). Section 2. Duties

(f) It shall be the duty of the Parlimentarian to rule on all

(g) It shall be the duty of the Historian to keep a topical file of the actions and policies established by College Council.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The Vice-President, Recording Secretary, corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Parlimentarian, and Historian shall be members of the sophomore, junior or senior classes for the duration of their terms.

Section 3. The Men's Resident

Resident Women shall be respon-

sible for holding elections for dormitory representatives before the first regular Community Government Association meeting in October. Freshman officers shall be elected at the end of the first nine weeks period.

Change: Deletion of the underlined words.

The BSC Bloodmobile Committee is helping the Ladies Auxiliary of the Bloomsburg Hospital to sponsor a bloodmobile at the hospital on Tuesday. December 16, 1969, from 10:45 to 4:45. Although the committee feels as though it has been slighted in the last visit of a bloodmobile to our campus, we feel that it is our duty to aid this worthy cause rather than ignore it. Upperclassmen may remember the last March 13, the date of the last visit. over 600 students, faculty and personnel were signed as donors. Because of the inadequate refrigeration facilities on the part of the Red Cross, more than 100 prospective donors were turned away at the doors of Centennial. Others who had been waiting for more than an hour with blood bags in hand were also informed that

their blood could not be taken.

We of the Bloodmobile Committee feel that this is our "thing" in keeping in step with the mid-month activities of December, and that this is the only way in which we may be of help to any projects set for December. Though the committee itself takes no stand on either side, we feel that we may in some way be aiding those who need what we have—blood.

Any person who wishes to donate a pint of his blood may report to the rear entrance of the hospital between 10:45 a.m. and 4:45 p.m. on Tuesday. For those students who have not yet reached the age of 21, parental permission slips must be filled out before their blood is accepted. The following questions and answers concerning Selective Service random selection sequence procedures relate to the areas in which it is believed there is the greatest public interest:

Q.: My birth date was drawn number 216 in the lottery. I am in school and will be until June 1973, Will the 216 number apply when I enter the pool in 1973 or will that year's number control?


A.: The random sequence number you acquired in the Dec. 1969 drawing will apply so long as you remain subject to induction for military service.

Q.: Presently I am in Class II-A but this deferment will expire on Feb. 28, 1970. I have number 306 from the lottery. I will become 26 on May 1, 1970. If the local board does not reach my number before

"TAX 1138"

Young Film-maker has key to Bald Pate in "THX 1138"

The future looks bald. At least, that's the way it appears in "THX 1138," the American Zoetrope motion picture production for Warner Bros. release that recently completed filming in San Francisco.

You see, "THX 1138" is a science-fiction drama about an advanced subterranean society which disapproves of individuality. All the citizens, male and female alike, shave their heads right down to the skin. Viewed from above, it's difficult to tell the sexes apart, especially since everyone wears an identical white jumpsuit.

Among those whose pates actually were shaved for their roles in the Technicolor film were its three stars - Robert Duvall. Donald Pleasence and Maggi Mc-Omie - and 50 members of the Synanon House in Oakland, Calif., who agreed to work as "extras" to raise some badly-needed cash for their establishment. Synanon received \$60 a head, which pleased the organization's founder, Chuck Dederich, no end. Said a bald director.

Chuck: "Nobody's hair is worth \$30."

This hairless vision of the future emerges from the imagination of a 25-year-old filmmaker named George Lucas. Two years ago, while a film student at the University of Southern California, Lucas won the Grand Prize at the National Student Film Festival for his short film. "THX 11384EB." He subsequently worked as an assistant to director Francis Ford Coppola on "Finian's Rainbow" and as Coppola's production associate on "The Rain People."

Meantime, Lucas was expanding the script of his original film to full feature length, while shortening the title to its present THX 1138," When Coppola set up his American Zoetrope Production in San Francisco, the Lucas film became its first production to go before the cameras for Warner Bros, release. Coppola himself is executive producer, with Lucas directing from his own screenplay. Lawrence Sturnhahn is the producer.

THE MASTER ANDMARGARITA BY MIKHAIL BULGAKOV GROVE PRESS-PAPER

THE MASTER ANDMARGARI. TA, masterpiece of the late Russian author, M. Bulgakov, has become and "in" book on college campuses across the country since its appearance in paperback covers.

Of the two paperback editions now available, the Grove Press, Myra Ginzbury translation is by far the better; its smooth clear sentences "capture the style and poetry of the orginal," as another reviewer put it.

Whether or not you care about being "in," The Master and Margarita has many qualities to recommend it. It is fascinating fantasy, barbed but pleasant satire, an exquisite love story, and both profoundly moving, and at times profoundly disturbing.

GREATEST STRENGTH

This last quality, the book's ability to "get you," bother you, and invite you back to its pages. is the MASTER AND MARGA-RITA'S greatest strength. Read it once, allowing yourself to be captured by its interlacing web of philosophy and entertainment and you may find, as I did, that the strands enveloping you are sticky, and do not let go when the last page has been turned.

What is the MASTER AND MARGARITA about? It is prefaced by a quotation from Goethe's FAUST.

"So who are you?" 'I am that which forever wills evil, and forever does good."

These lines from FAUST provide a key to one of the major themes in the MASTER AND MARGARITA— the tenuous-questionable division that lies between the forces of good and evil. This in turn leads to another major theme in the novel-the power of love.

Stated abstractly, these themes may not excite you, but Bulgaexamines them through characters that live, breathe and are real-even when flying naked over the skies of Moscow on the back of a pig.

THERE IS MORE

Good and Evil? Consider, charlatans exposed through the work or the devil, love requitted and saved through witchcraft-or perhaps witchcraft doesn't matter, only the strength of love does.

And there is more. A novel within a novel that offers intriquing parallels with the story proper and that retells the Easter story from a strange, detached viewpoint, hardly religious, yet

I've read it twice and plan to go back to it again, but I'm not sure I could explain it or analyze it deeply. even after several more readings. What I am sure of is that like Joyce's ULYSSES, Homer's ILIAD, and Blake's poetry, THE MASTER AND MARGARITA calls you back to its pages and grows fuller, closer to you, with each reading.

Survey Released

In a sweeping survey in its Dec. 12th issue, LIFE magazine presents the views of undergraduate writers and photographers on campuses across the country.

The LIFE survey states that "no one voice can sum up the mood of the nation's eight million college students, but this comment by a University of Colorado student comes closest:

"The radicals are suffering from a case of the blahs, the liberals are frustrated and there seems to be no movement in any direction except back toward oneself."

"The stillness is hardly serenity," LIFE comments. "The hard issues - the draft, Vietnam, drugs - are still deeply felt." Concern is too ingrained for a return to the cool detachment of the 1950s...And if most students are pulling back to reexamine their commitments and tactics, at a few campuses the fire is still dangerously close to the surface...the strategy of head-on dissent, however successful, proved to be too painful to sustain."

The Husky team opened its 1969-70 schedule in a quadrangular meet this past weekend at Appalachian State University by downing the host 22-13, Old

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Dominion College 33-3 and Milligan College, 34-0. Coach Russ Houk expects the competition to be much stronger in the quadrangular meet this weekend.

This will be the eighth meeting between Indiana State University and Bloomsburg, with the Huskies winning five out of seven previous engagements. Last year Bloomsburg defeated Indiana 24-12 but the two previous years were defeated soundly 25-5 and 22-9. The Sycamores are coached by Chuck Sanders and last year posted a 10-4-0 record; only one wrestler has been lost from the squad.


Bloomsburg will be meeting Ohio University and the University of Massachusetts for the first time in dual competition. Ohio U. is coached by Harry Kouska, a former NCAA champion and Pan American Gold Medal Winner, and is assisted by Stan Abel, a two-time NCAA champion from Oklahoma. The Bobcats won their Mid-American Conference last year with a 7-3 record. Chio U. will spend Friday, Saturday, and Sunday in Bloomsburg and then travel to Lock Haven S.C. to wrestle the Baid Eagles Monday evening. In a similar situation during the 1970-71 season Bloomsburg, following its quadrangular meet at Terre Haute, will travel on to Athens to wrestle the Bobcats.

The University of Massachusetts have been steadily moving up in the Yankee Conference which was once dominated by Springfield College. Last year the Redmen posted a 9-6 record and also had an undefeated freshmen team; many of the latter will appear on the varsity squad this year. The U. of Mass. is coached by Homer Barr, one of the all-time great heavyweights to graduate from Penn State, who also coached for a number of years at State College High School (Pa.). Coach Barr expects to have the best wrestling aggregation in the history of the sport at the University of Massachusetts.

Following the domination of the quadrangular meet at Appalachian, Coach Houk indicated there will be some elimination matches held this week which will probably result in lineup changes for the meet on Saturday; their changes will be announced at a later date.

Ground and First floors ELwell rolled over the Eighth St. Seniors 12-0 last Wednesday afternoon to become champions of the Resident Men's touch football league. The victors had previously beaten the Eighth St. team 18-6 on Monday afternoon to force the double elimination tournament into another showdown between the two teams.

On their way to the championship, Ground and First compiled an 8-1 record, losing only to Al's Lounge (3rd place winners) by a score of 10-8. In their 8 victories, they permitted a total of only 20 points to be scored against them.

Individual standouts for the champions in Wednesdays game were quarterback Ron Woodring, halfback Ralph Antenori, and ends Jim Cavallero and Rich Bastinelli on offense. Outstanding on the defense were Bob Massaker, Bill Fonner, and Dennis Sharkazy their pass rushing, and safety man Mike Deveraux, who intercepted 3 passes.

Ground and First wasted little time in scoring, as they went to work early in the first quarter

with a pass from Woodring to Antenori, setting up the touchdown. The initial 6 points were scored when Ron Woodring dripped back to pass from inside the 10-yard line and finding all of his receivers covered, he ran around the right end for the score. The conversion attempt failed.

Early in the second quarter Ground and First scored again when Bob Massaker batted Dave Homa's pass into the air, picked it off, and ran untouched to the end zone. The point after touchdown attempt was again blocked. An excellent pass rush defense and good punting by Mike Deveraux held the seniors in check for the remainder of the game. 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NCAA Changes Weights

One of the major rule changes that area wrestling fans will observe this weekend at Bloomsburg State College when the Huskies host their quarrangular meet, is the change in the majority of the weight classifications. The meet is scheduled to begin at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, December 13 and, in addition to BSC, the other participants will be Indiana State University, University of Massachusetts and Ohio University.

The new weights to be wrestled according to pounds stated in the National Collegiate Athletic Association rules are as follows: 118, 126, 134, 142, 150, 158, 167, 177, 199 and unlimited. This will be a mandatory 10 weight classification for every meet. In the past, 11 weights had been established by the NCAA and through agreement between teams or conferences, two of those weights, 115 and 191 pounds could be eliminated, thus making a 9 match engagement. The new 10 weight mandatory is more or less a compromise of the above.

Weight changes, of course, are not new to collegiate wrestling. as this is the second time in the last five years that there have been changes in the NCAA rules and also recent weight changes have occured in international competition.

In addition to NCAA, Bloomsburg is also a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and the Pennsylvania Conference of thirteen state colleges. NAIA does not have its own book on wrestling rules and,

more or less, adheres to the NCAA rules as it is felt by the NAIA Coaches Association that these rules are very applicable to the sport of wrestling. Both the NAIA and the Pennsylvania Conference do, on occasion, make a few variations of the NCAA rules on agreement with the colleges involved in the meet. For example, NCAA rules call for tights to be worn by the wrestlers in the meets, but, through agreement, many NAIA and Pennsylvania Conference members wrestle in shorts providing the shorts meet certain specifications. Another major change instituted by NCAA this year is the requirement of all wrestlers to wear protective head gear. Here again, an agreement between two teams can eliminate the head gear.

The third change in NCAA rules pertains to the out-ofbounds circle on the mat which states "If either wrestler has supporting parts inside boundary lines, wrestling is to be continued." This same rule was in affect last year, but only pertained to takedowns, escapes or reverses; now it pertains to all

situations.

The BSC Varsity Club will be selling programs at the meet on Saturday which will contain a supplement stating the major points on scoring so fans can keep abreast of the various matches in progress.



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more men have the same birthday within a local board, their sequence of induction will be determined by the first letter of their names (last name and, if necessary, first name) which have been arranged in a random sequence of the alphabet established during the drawing that was conducted on Dec. 1, 1969.

Q.: I am 19 years old, have no basis for deferment, and have sequence number 300. If I am not inducted in 1970, can I be inducted in 1971 or in subsequent years?

A.: You are liable for induction to age 26 or to age 35 if you are or have been deferred. In 1971 you will have a decreased vulnerability. However, if the calls for manpower in 1971 are so high that they cannot be met by the 1971 selection group the local boards will then select from the supply of manpower that might be left over from 1970. As each year goes by without your induction taking place you will have a decreasing vulnerability.

Q.: Next February I will turn 19. Do I enter the lottery poll on that date?

A.: No. You won't be included in the random selection sequence until 1971. The 1970 pool is limited to those born on or after January 1, 1944 and on or before Dec. 31, 1950.

Q.: Will there be any more drawings?

A.: Yes. A new random sequence will be made for each calendar year for those registrants attaining the age of 19.

Q.: My birthday in the lottery gave me sequence number 325 and I will be in Class I-A next year. Can I count on not being inducted in 1970?

A.: No, because the total manpower requirements are not known and cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

Bloomsburg's Peace Committee will sponsor an open forum concerning Vietnam and the implications of the Mi Lai incident in Hartline 134 - Kuster lecture Hall today at 2:00. Anyone wishing to speak should be ready at this time — all sides will hopefully be represented. A rally is planned afterwards.

Q.: I have random sequence number 75. When my local board inducts me will other local boards be inducting registrants with this same sequence number?

A.: Not necessarily. It is expected that all local boards will be proceeding at about the same pace, but because local boards have varying percentages of their registrants with the same birthdays, they may not be inducting at any one time all available registrants with a particular random sequence number.

Q.: I have sequence number 250. If I want to volunteer for induction, will my local draft board wait until they reach sequence number 250 before they will accept me as a volunteer?

A.: No. They may accept you as a volunteer prior to reaching your random sequence number in the induction processing. Q.: I am 19 years old and now deferred as a student. My random sequence number is 300. Which sequence number will I be home free when my deferment ends in 1973?

A.: No. If at the time you are classified I-A in 1973 your local board has not reached sequence number 300 in their induction processing, you will simply be placed in that sequence and you may or may not be reached for induction in 1973. You will still have sequence number 300. If at the time you are classified I-A your local board has reached random sequence number 300 in 1973 you will be subject to induction at the head of the 1973 selection group.

The Gadfly will make future announcements concerning dates and locations where the candidates will be presented.


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
