A open meeting on Scheduling was held Tuesday night in the Bookstore Lounge, on rather short notice. Dean Hoch, Mr. Bunge, and Mr. Davis from the ad hoc Committee on Scheduling discussed the new system in some detail with interested stu-

It was pointed out that the purpose of the meetings on Wednesday and Thursday was to determine the number of students who wish to take each course that could conceivably be offered by the faculty present in the Spring Semester. The list of courses in each major, usually similar to the out-dated College Catalog listings, is a reflection of the capabilities of each department at this

The information gained by each student listing the courses he wants, will be used by the department chairmen to determine the actual courses that will be offered. This system is preferable to the past system of rotating course offerings or relying on limited student opinion.

Obviously, there are not enough instructors to teach every course that was requested in the 11rst tally. Therefore, decisions will have to be made by the department chairmen as to which of the requested courses will be offered and how many can be offered after the general, multi-section courses are satisfied. It should be pointed out that there will be a better utilization of instructors and more courses offered since the exact number of sections of the general courses can be determined and no more instruc-



The Art Department is constructing a new kiln and an outside sculpture area behind the Bakeless Center for the Humani. ties, according to Mr. Ronald F. Bower, Assistant Professor of Art. The kiln, a device for firing pottery, reaches temperatures as high as 2600 degrees Fahrenheit.

Larger than any that they have had in the past (20 cubic feet), the kiln allows for high-fire stoneware and porcelain to be made. The new kiln uses natural gas instead of electricity as a heat source, allowing for a reduction type atmosphere, which makes it possible to create colors that could not be achieved under normal conditions.

The new kiln was originally planned to go inside Bakeless, but since venting and chimneys created a problem, it was decided to put it outside. It will be in operation as soon as the gas and electricity connections are made.

tors allocated to these than are necessary, leaving more time for upper level courses.

At this time, all students will have to again request the courses they wish to take from the realistic list of choices that can be offered simultaneously. Most students will merely repeat what they listed on the first tally, provided all the courses they requested reappear on the second list (the list of courses that will be offered). Those who asked for courses that could not be offered must then choose from the list of ALL the courses' to be offered a replacement for the course or courses that didn't appear. On the old system, if a student didn't get a course he selected there were only a limited number of courses that were open and fit in the student's schedule. On the new system, the courses are chosen first and fit into a pattern by a computer matrix that eliminated conflicts for over 94 per cent of the freshman class that used it to schedule for this semester.

Once this final tally of all stucents who will be taking courses that were offered basically by student demand is made, then and only then can individual sections and processors be assigned for each course. Since the number and selection of sections cannot be made accurately earlier, it is impossible to choose the exact section for an individual student with the equipment available.

Investigation into systems that can simultaneously schedule courses and instructors is being made. At this time, nothing that can be used here is available, but hopes are high for the future. (Ed. note: it doesn't seem logical that everyone can get all the profs he wants, somebody has to get the duds! Perhaps a system of preference by credits earned can be instituted when the equipment becomes available.)

Under the present system, schedules will be made out seniors - first and so on in such a manner that conflicts in courses (after the second tally) will probably only occur in the sophomore and freshman schedules. The program matrix will trythousands of possible combinations before rejecting a schedule as irresolvable. These schedules will be reentered using the additional choice that students will provided on the "mark

Fin. Aid Review

Over \$2 million in financial aid will be extended to Blooms. burg State College students before the end of the current college year, according to Robert L. Duncan, Director of Financial Aid. Approximately 3,000 or 75 per cent of all undergraduate students will be receiving some form of aid.

The three major loan programs include the State Guaranteed Loan, the National Defense Student Loan, and the BSC Alumni Loan. Over \$1 million is to be provided by banks for BSC students through the State Guaranty Loan program.

The final determination of the Master Schedule will not be made until several weeks before the Spring Semester begins. Many changes occur between the time that the Master Schedule is made up and the beginning of the semester. The result last year was that almost 30 per cent of the Master Schedule had to be changed during the first week :1 classes.

A machine can do the difficult, time consuming parts of preparing a Master Schedule in a very short time. Although the overall schedule is still to be done manually, it can be done more accurately and in a much shorter time than on the old system. This will hopefully enable administrators to spend the first few days of class adjusting individual schedules to suit individual needs rather than trying to re-work a Master Schedule with many changes not caused by individual adjustments, but by course and instructor changes is in the past.

A committee is being extablished to re-work the "drop-ad" procedure so that the maximum number of students with reasons to change will be able to do so. CGA President, Mike Pilligalli, will choose students to serve on the committee.

Special consideration will be made for athletes, band members, and others who must have certain periods of the day free. These names will be provided by the advisors of each organization (ex: Russ Houck for Wrestling).

Consideration will also be given to students who work during the day and have schedules that conflict. Employers must certify in writing that the student in question must have certain times free. The validity of reasons for this situation, commuters in car pools, and other problems that will arise is to be determined by the committee.

It is obvious that no system, past or present, will give everyone the exact schedule desired. As always, you have to take your



So you want to get us out of Vietnam? You hate this war, this war in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Well, a lot of people hate war, but they are not confused by the intellectual lies and foul reports that pass as "news."

The people who hate war as much as you, also hate what will happen to the South Vietnamese when the sweet "nationalists," communists as you call them, take over. And take over they will, because the word is out now about what the peacenik solution to the war will be if you have your way. Patented Peace Symbol?

The U. S. Patent Office has given the go-ahead to a competition for commercial trademark rights to the peace symbol. Two companies, the Intercontinent Shoe Corp. of New York and LUV, Inc. are bidding for exclusive rights to the internationally used symbol, the upside down 'Y' in a circle with a bar extending through the fork of the "Y". The sign originated from the semaphore code for Nuclear Disarmament-ND- and was first used in Britain during the ban-the-bomb demonstrations in the late fifties.

The sign is now widely used as an anti-war protest here and abroad, and has been attacked as

Have you ever looked around to see who is with you in this? Well, those merry-makers in the Kremlin, who captured a third of the world's population since 1917, by starvation, imprisoning of at least 40 million souls, and mere murder, are with you. They are 'nationalists' too. They have sent tanks into Hungary and Czechoslovakia to snuff out the sparks of freedom. And you say we are 'imperialists.'
