AT

This is one of the three Institutions recognized under the Act of Assembly of 1857. Its object is to prepare Teachers for the Public Schools in Pennsylvania.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The purpose of the Institution being to prepare Teachers for the Public Schools of the State, the course of study has been arranged with the design of educating teachers for two classes of schools, and arranged into two courses; for each of which a corresponding certificate, degree and diploma is given.

I. THE NORMAL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.

This course embraces two years, and the studies are as follows:

JUNIOR YEAR.

First Term—Arithmetic, Geography, Grammar, Reading, Spelling.

Second Term—Arithmetic, Physical Geography, Grammar, Etymology.

Third Term—Algebra, Book-keeping, Physiology, Theory of Teaching.

SENIOR YEAR.

First Term—Natural Philosophy, Geometry, Algebra, Theory of Teaching.

Second Term—Natural Philosophy, Geology, History and Constitution of the United States, Theory and Practice of Teaching.

Third Term—Botany, Rhetoric, Etymology, Theory and Practice of Teaching.

Exercises in Penmanship, Elocution, Drawing and Vocal Music, extend over the whole course, and students are allowed to attend to these branches when most convenient. On completing this course stu-

dents receive a Diploma with the Degree of Bachelor of Elementary Didactics, (B. E. D.) which diploma entitles them to the privilege of exercising their profession in any part of the State.

Graduates who have taught successfully for two years can receive the second degree of Master of Elementary Didactics, (M. E. D.)

II. THE NORMAL SCIENTIFIC COURSE.

The object of this course is to prepare teachers for English High Schools, and the studies are as follows :

JUNIOR YEAR.

First Term—Algebra completed, Chemistry, Natural Philosophy.

Second Term—Zoology, Geology, General History.

Third Term—Trigonometry, Plain and Spherical ; Surveying, Natural Philosophy.

SENIOR YEAR.

First Term—English Literature, Analytical Geometry, Astronomy, Logic.

Second Term—Astronomy, Differential Calculus, Mental Philosophy.

Third Term—Integral Calculus, Analytical Mechanics, Moral Philosophy.

Students having completed both of the above courses in a satisfactory manner receive a Diploma, with the Degree of Bachelor of Scientific Didactics, (B. S. D.) After two years of successful teaching, they can receive a second degree of M. S. D.

PREPARATORY CLASSICAL COURSE--FIRST YEAR.

First Term—Begin Latin, Harkness' Introductory Latin Book.

Begin Greek, Harkness' First Greek Book.

Second Term—Harkness' Latin Grammar and Latin Reader.

Harkness' First Greek Book, continued.

Third Term—Harkness' Latin Reader, completed.

Harkness' First Greek Book, completed.

Physical Geography.

SECOND YEAR.

First Term—Latin Smith's Principia Latina.

Greek Anabasis.

History of the United States.

Second Term—Cæsar ; Anabasis ; Geology.

Third Term—Cæsar, Herodotus, Botany.

Preparatory Elementary Course.—The design of this course of study is to accommodate those who are not prepared to enter the Elementary course. The studies are Orthography and Etymology, Reading and Elocution, Writing and Drawing, Mental and Written Arithmetic, Physical and Political Geography, Grammar, Vocal Music, Composition.

Model School.—The objects of the Model School are: 1. To maintain a school which shall be in all respects a model, and whose course of studies shall be suited to the ordinary wants of the community. 2. To afford to the pupils of the Normal School enlarged opportunities for observation and practice in teaching.

Studies.—Special pains are taken to have the pupils thoroughly grounded in the common English branches, such as Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, and Grammar. Children from five to fifteen years of age are admitted to the Model School. The School is under the charge of the Principal of the Normal School and a Superintendent of the School Room. The teaching is partly done by the Students of the Normal School. Practice for six months in the Model School is essential to graduation in the Normal Course.

Miscellaneous and Optional Studies.—Many students do not wish to follow strictly any one course of study. Such are permitted to join any class for which they are prepared in either or several of the courses of study. Some branches are taught every term. We always have classes in Mental or Written Arithmetic, Reading, Vocal Music, Penmanship, Book-keeping, Grammar, Geography, Spelling, Algebra, Drawing, Natural Philosophy, Instrumental Music.

Methods of Teaching.—Pupils are allowed to take up any studies for which they are prepared. Studies which require long and laborious preparation, as Grammar, Algebra and Geography, are termed whole studies; those requiring less preparation, as Penmanship, Vocal Music and Drawing, are termed half studies. A review class is sometimes called a half study. Students are restricted to three and one-half, and are required to take three studies. Six hours of study per day are enough. Lessons are assigned of sufficient length to employ the class two hours in learning them. It is believed that students will acquire more strength of mind by studying one lesson two hours, than by studying two hours on two or three lessons. It is thought that a student can recite as much in three-fourths of an hour as he can learn in two hours. Students are expected to study the subject matter of the lesson and recite it without assistance from the teacher. The teacher explains the points not made clear in the book, directs the pupil to the source of information and shows him how to use his time and faculties to the best advantage. Books are helps, teachers are helps, and the best thing a teacher can do for a pupil is to teach him to think for himself, to act for himself, and to rely upon himself. Mental growth, an increase of intellectual power is what we wish our pupils to acquire; and when they feel an increase of mental strength, they take pride and pleasure in study.

Moral and Religious Influence.—Instead of two daily chapel exercises, which all students are required to attend, there is substituted one chapel exercise at 8 A. M., and a half-hour prayer meeting at 6 P. M. The students as well as teachers take part in the prayer meeting, and its influence has been very salutary. On Sundays at 9 A. M., is a Sunday School, open to all members of the school. The Reading Room is open on Sunday afternoons, and in it are found religious periodicals.

Habits.—It is the design of the Faculty to aid the students in forming correct habits and in giving up bad ones. All students should acquire the habits of close attention to study during the hours of study, of learning every lesson thoroughly, of expressing his thoughts in a clear and forcible manner, of reviewing often, of keeping a memorandum, of thinking over the events of each day at its close, of having a written programme for each day, of writing home often and regularly.

Physical Culture.—Classes are formed in gymnastics and meet daily for practice. This exercise has a very salutary influence upon the health of the pupils. All who join these classes are able to study more and more successfully than they otherwise could.

Apparatus.—The school is provided with a superior set of Apparatus, from the best Boston and Philadelphia Manufacturers. The expense of the Apparatus was about \$1,400.

The Natural History Cabinet.—At the beginning of 1865, Prof. Thompson began the collection of a cabinet of Geological and Mineralogical specimens for the use of students in the Natural Sciences. Very fair progress has been made thus far, and the collection now contains hand specimens of all the kinds of rock named in the ordinary text-books on Geology, a fine lot of lead ores from Illinois and Iowa, a set of silver and gold ores from California, Idaho and Colorado, with various miscellaneous specimens from Pennsylvania and New York. We desire to increase this collection as rapidly as possible. Donations of anything in the way of Natural History specimens will be thankfully received. We are pleased to acknowledge the receipt of valuable specimens from the following gentlemen :

Libraries.—There are the foundation of four Libraries: 1st, A general circulating library, containing about 1,000 volumes of the best Works of English writers, embracing history, poetry, art, science, literature, biography, travel, &c., &c. This library is open every Friday. 2d, A Reference Library, containing Dictionaries in English, French, German, Greek and Latin, Cyclopædias and Books of Reference. This is open daily. 3d, A Sunday School Library of well selected books for Sunday reading. These books have been selected with great care from the publications of Randolph, Carters, Dodd, Hoyt and the Religious Publication Societies. This library is open at 9 o'clock on Sunday morning. 4th, A Text-book Library, containing over 100 volumes of text-books, embracing full sets of the school books published by Ivison, Phinney, Blakeman & Co., New York; a full set of the school books published by J. B. Lippincott & Co., Philadelphia; a full set published by Sheldon & Co., New York, and a full set of the school books published by Sargent, Hinkle & Wilson, Cincinnati, besides parts of sets published by other houses. This library is designed for consultation by the students whenever they desire to compare the views of various authors, or authors' methods of treating a given subject.

Literary Societies.—There are two well sustained literary societies, which hold weekly meetings.

Text-books.—Students should bring all their old text-books. If not used here, they are convenient for reference. All Text-books, Educational works and Stationery can be procured at the Institution at 10 per cent. less than the publishers' retail price. The following are some of the books now in use: National Spellers, Raub's Speller, M'Guffy's Readers, McNally's Geography, Guyot's Geographies, Warren's Physical Geography, Robinson's Mathematical Series, Brooks' Mathematics, Kerl's Grammar, Wells' Philosophy, Porter's Chemistry, Geology, Cutter's Physiology, Baine's Rhetoric, Kidd's Elocution, Gray's Botany, Wickersham's School Economy, Woodbury's German Series, Harkness' Latin and Greek Series.

Conditions of Admission and Membership.—Any young person of either sex may be admitted to the privileges of the school, on paying our advertised charges for one term in advance.

To graduate, it is necessary to spend at least six months in the institution, and to pass a thorough examination in all the studies laid down in the course in which one wishes to graduate. The diploma of the institution is a valid certificate in all parts of Pennsylvania, and exempts the holder from examination by county superintendents.

French and German are taught by an educated German Clergyman, and for lessons in these languages there is no extra charge. Board in the Hall is \$50 per term. Boarders find their own fuel, lights, towels, sheets and pillow slips and care for their own rooms. If desired, everything is found, including carpet and wardrobe, for a moderate compensation. Board can be had in private families for \$4 per week.

Many of the students board themselves for about \$20 per term. Rooms for self boarders are provided with cook stoves, bedstead and tables, and rented for \$3 to \$4 per term. Fuel costs about \$3 for Spring or Fall Term, and \$6 for Winter Term.

State Aid.—The Legislature, at its last session, appropriated \$10,000 for the education of teachers in the Normal Schools, during the year beginning June 1st, 1867. To receive this aid, pupils must be over seventeen years of age, and sign a declaration that they attend the school for the purpose of fitting themselves to teach in the public schools of Pennsylvania. They must attend the school twelve successive weeks, or more. All such receive fifty cents per week for the whole time during which they attend; and those who have been disabled, or whose father lost his life in the military or naval service of the State or the United States receive one dollar per week. Graduates who sign a written agreement to teach for two years in the state receive fifty dollars at graduation.

District Aid.—Every township and every independent district in the State, outside of the 2nd and 5th Normal Districts, has a right to send and keep two pupils in the school, and pay the tuition of the same from the district treasury.

Location and Access.—Edinboro is eighteen miles south of Erie and six miles from Cambridge, on the Atlantic & Great Western Railway. Daily stages run to Erie and Cambridge and meet all the mail trains at Cambridge. Persons coming over the Philadelphia & Erie R. R., will strike the A. & G. W. R. R. at Corry; those on the line of, or south of the Penn'a Central R. R., will come to Pittsburgh and take the Erie & Pittsburgh R. R. at the Union depot, and meet the A. & G. W. R. R. at Transfer. Trains on the A. & G. W. connect with the E. & P. at Transfer, and with the P. & E. at Corry, bringing passengers to Cambridge without loss of time. Students starting from home on Monday of our opening week can reach here in time for entering the classes they desire. We organize our classes, assign the lessons and commence the recitations on Wednesday of the opening week.

Calendar.—The year is divided into three terms, as follows:

1st term opens August 14, 1867; closes November 14, 1867.

2d term opens December 4, 1867; closes March 5, 1868.

3d term opens April 14, 1868; closes July 16, 1868.

Rooms should be secured before the opening of the term. Engaged rooms will not be reserved longer than until the day of opening, unless by special agreement. Parents should write to their children often, but not permit them to visit home during the term.
