

Grad Test schedules

November 4, 1972 and on February 3, April 7, June 30, and August 11 in 1973.

The Admission Test for Graduate Study in Business is an aptitude test designed to measure abilities and skills important in the study of management at the graduate level. It is not a measure of achievement or knowledge in specific subject matter. Those who take the test are neither required or expected to have had undergraduate preparation in business subjects.

Registration for the ATGSB does not constitute application for admission to any business school. Candidates should request information on admissions procedures and requirements directly from the graduate schools to which they wish to apply. Since many business schools select their firstyear classes during the spring preceding entry, applicants for admission to the 1973 classes are advised to take the test no later than the February 3, 1973 date. Scholarship applicants are urged to register for either the November or the February administration.

While casual repetition of of the ttest is discouraged, individuals who have reason to believe that their original scores are atypical may register in the usual manner and repeat the test. In such cases the two most recent scores will be

The Admission Test for reported to designated in-Graduate Study in Business stitutions. In addition to the score (ATGSB), required by more than report received by the candidate. 320 graduate business schools or scores are sent to graduate divisions, will be offered on business schools designated by the candidate and to the candidate's undergraduate placement office if approval for this action is given.

> The Bulletin of Information for ineludes Candidates registration form, the names of graduate schools that require the ATGSB, sample questions, and detailed information about examination dates, testing locations, fees, and score reporting. For candidates planning to take the test in the United States, Canada, Canal Zone, or West Indies, the registration deadline (the day by which the test registration form and fee must be received by Educational Testing Service) is three weeks before a test date; elsewhere the deadline is five and one-half weeks before the test. Bulletins, as well as order forms for the bulletin are available from Dr. Merritt W. Sanders, Director of Institutional Research, in Carver Hall, at Bloomsburg State College (none by mail, please.)

Interview

V.P. comments on new post

Dr. William Pickett, recently appointed Vice-President of Academic Affairs, spoke with M&G reporters, commenting on registration. The pass-fail system and the Middle States evaluation.

Concerning registration, Dr. Pickett stated that he was disturbed with the overall operation of registration, and will set up meetings with Mr. Bunge, the Registrar, and Dr. Griffis, Vice-Pres. for Student Life, to discuss the present situation. Dr. observed Pickett "registration is a nuts-and-bolts type operation and it should be run as simply as possible." He would like to eliminate the duplication of forms, which had already been recorded at previous registration.

One of the most alarming problems that occurred during registration in Dr. Pickett's opinion, is the close to 2,000 schedule changes during registration. Dr. Pickett noted that "although we may not have the electronic equipment to allow scheduling for individual professors and times, there should be other means to decrease this number of schedule changes."

When asked to comment on the pass-fail option, Dr. Pickett noted that he had reservations about the entire pass-fail issue. He stated the reason for grades is "to appropriately assess the amount of knowledge acquired" but fears that "grades may no longer do this." With only a grade of Pass or Fail, the student's

knowledge may not be assessed properly, and may affect his entrance into graduate schools, noted Dr. Pickett.

He further observed that the pass-fail system, when limited to subjects in the general education program, works well.

Although Dr. Pickett is not as aware of the Middle States evaluation as he would like to be, he did discuss the major findings of the report, which is being handled for the large part by Dr. vertise them." Hobart Heller.

The first concern of Middle States was the lack of continuity in filling administrative posts, especially that of President and Vice-President of Academic Affairs. Dr. Pickett expressed confidence now that both offices are functioning smoothly and that a search and screen committee is working to find a full-

time president.

Dr. Pickett is also very concerned with faculty morale, which, according to M.S. evaluators, was low. Dr. Pickett feels, despite the evaluation of M.S., the faculty morale is high and his office should work to uncover real issues, such as overcrowding of faculty offices. Dr. Pickett said "the faculty should identify with the positive aspects of the college, and ad-

The final aspect of Middle States Evaluation is the area of government, particularly the Board of Trustees. Dr. Pickett noted that this is a delicate situation to negotiate, but feels "the Board has pulled itself together and is ready to collectively and positively do the job." Nixon Agonistes

Nixon Agonistes The Crisis of the Self - Made Man by Gary Wills

> A paradox? Indeed he is. And if you're at all intrigued by paradoxes, and at all interested in America and this man whom we hail as its ruler, you'd do well to pick up on "Nixon Agonistes — The Crisis of the Self-Made Man by Gary Wills (Signet paperback **— \$1.50**.)

Me? Deserve him?

Author Wills explains that his book grew out of his reportorial coverage of the 1968 Presidential campaign during which he observed the relationship between Richard Nixon and the American people who elected him. "To say the two deserve each other," he observes, "will, I suppose" be taken as an insult (to one or the other). . .'

He's right. Having someone tell you that you deserve Richard Nixon is extremely insulting. unless there's Unless. something about Richard Nixon that we don't know. Or, something about ourselves that we're not aware of.

And it's these two unknowns that Wills sets out to find: the real Richard Nixon and the real America. Whether or not he ever

really succeeds in finding them can only be determined by the reader's personal opinion and political philosophy. In addition to being extremely interesting, Wills' conclusions about Richard Nixon, his policies and their place in the mainstream of 20th century American history are extremely debatable.

But the real strength of this book lies not in the end results of the search, but in the clues Wills uncovers along the way. His highly impressionistic explanations of the drives that make RMN run (and run and run), his finely detailed and very witty sketches of Nixon's Whittier California background. and his critical history of Nixon's political escapades are the things that make "Nixon Agonistes" a classic.

"...the crazy proof..."

We first meet our hero doing what he does best and hates most, slapping backs and ingratiating himself to the winter-bound voters of 1968 Wisconsin. How can he do it? How can he continue to sell himself to unwilling voters after all these years? Wills explains that "the guacheness of a man lingering on when he is no longer wanted becomes, at a certain point, the crazy proof of his importance." Nixon runs because he has always run, because he has always strived to achieve, because the longing after the ultimate success is the essence of his existence.

As a shy young boy living in the Quaker meetinghouse drabness of Whittier California, little Dick Nixon used to lie in bed at night listening to the sounds of trains pounding their way eastward on the nearby tracks. Wills captures the image, toys with it and suddenly the giant diesel engine is Richard Milhous Nixon, pounding his way down the hard rails of American success, his pistons lubricated with honest sweat, his boiler stoked with Protestant Ethic, and his throttle wide open driving ever onward down his single-minded path. . .

Toward what? Toward success, any kind — being the best poker player in the US Navy, doggedly playing football despite his natural physical awkwardness, becoming the best college debater in Southern California. And then, pounding on into the real world - lawyer, unsuccessful entrepreuner of Citra -Frost ("the frozen orange drink!"), commie-slaying congressman, headline


several times.

Truck Stop Blues

There's a truckstop along Rt. 115 near Stroudsburg. Its got a formica counter an inch thick real formica. The coffee urns look like they been there since 1947. Of the waitresses, there's one college-kid girl and two women who also look like they've been there since 1947. In the corner is a manufact of a inhabit. corner is a monster of a jukebox, neon, plastic and glass, with yellowed slips of paper indicating a selection of songs at least ten years old.

paralyzed elephants, sit the semitrucks. They're big rigs, stamped with plates and company names from every state in the Union.

And I don't care what the liner notes say, this is where the new Commander Cody album was recorded. Well, not really, but the album smells so much of fuel oil. home fries and bennies that it might have been.

Ever since the release of Lost in the Ozone, the Lost Planet Airmen have been producing some fine 1940's country western music tempered with early fifties rock n' roll. This album carries the theme a step further, incorporating five truck-drivin' songs. And just for fun there's some cajun, some country western and some out and out jitterbug.

The truckers favorites reflect a life style that most of us have chosen to ignore. The trucker indeed looks at "The World Through A Windshield." His life is a hobo-like string of incidents, he longs for those "Kentucky Hills of Tennessee." And more likely than not, he never makes

Yeah, a hard life that straddles something between wild, asskicking glee and tragedy. Perhaps the tragedy is best exemplified by "Mama Hated Deisel". Slow and mournful, like "Seeds and Stems" from Ozone, it tells the story of a trucker's sit in a greasy truck stop.

wife who loses everything (her husband and son) to the asphalt. It's good, honest emotion; simple and unrefined, the kind of working class stuff most of us have forgotten or intend to forget.

stop, pestering the waitresses and waiting for his buddies to show up with their hot cars. "Truck Drivin' Man" and "Semi-Truck" are road songs, part of the cycle of coffee and dead In the parking lot, like a herd of batteries, sputtering pony aralyzed elephants, sit the semi-engines and flat tires. Simply, they are driving songs. After all, what do you do when you've "...taken three bennies and my semi-truck won't start"?

> Of the other stuff, the very best songs are "Watch My .38" and "Diggy Liggy Lo." Doug Kershaw step aside, because "Diggy Liggy Lo" is the best piece of cajun see-saw fiddling since "Louisiana Man." "Watch My .38" is early blues influenced soul, with a super infectuous beat.



And then, real fame and fortune — the hard way. Speeding engine becomes lackluster caboose on the Eisenhower 1950's Good Time Excursion. And Richard Milhous Caboose must go on nationwide TV, swallow his Quaker parents' pride and tell the world about how he got his money and his kids got their dog. But he does it, because even from the caboose he can see where the Eisenhower express is headed. .success.

Eight years of success in fact. Eight years during which he is exploited, ridiculed and finally abandoned by generous general Ike. But through it all he grins and bears it, hangs on to the Republican train because he can see more success up ahead.

1960, his big chance, he almost reaches the end of the tracks and o'clock shadow. Jack Kennedy passes him by and he heads back to California where he can run somemore. But Pat Brown trips him this time, and for a second he stops, says he'll never get kicked around again, and then quietly resumes his race. On he pounds for six years, lawyering, moneying, backslapping, boot licking until 1968 when the promised land once again appears on the horizon. And this time the last lap looks like it will hell."

be a lot easier.

He's the hero this time; no more Checkers, no more Shadow, the "New Nixon" is the champion of all those success - seeking middle class types who like himself have been running down those hard American tracks since the war. "Kids burning campuses, niggers burning cities what we need is a man like Dick Nixon. He came up the hard way, he's had the tough breaks, but he believes in everything that's good in America, and he'll set it right." King of the Silent Majority, finally arrived at the

ultimate success.

high speed pictures It's a wild ride and Wills captures every second of it. From his window in the day coach he takes high-speed pictures, freezing the silent majority, the "new Republican coalition", in their everyday tracks.

And where do their tracks then gets derailed by his five lead? To a million production line jobs and Chevys and Levittown houses; to a million TV sets where they can sit back with a can of beer and watch Richard and his cohorts derail the ambitions and lives of millions of blacks, chicanos, Vietnamese and young people. From a million dollar - lined aeries they can look down and say, "We came up the hard way, why can't they?" and "He's doing a good job, bombing those little slant eyed bastards to Kind of Deep

"Nixon Agonistes" contains a lot more, if you're interested. The last two sections of the book contain a philosophical and intellectual history of the United States and its foreign policy since 1912 (the year Nixon's hero, Woodrow Wilson, took office and tried to impose his brand of American democratic philanthropy on a number of unwilling nations).

There are excellent and stinging portraits of men like Daniel Moynihan and Arthur Schlesinger, but the whole section gets kind of deep in places, and it is so unlike his fast moving portrait of Nixon's America that it tends to bore. There are however, a number of interesting ideas mired in the almost textbook narative (like what is a national will? and does Nixon really speak for the people of America when he orders the mass murder of the people of Vietnam?)

The real strength of "Nixon Agonistes" lies in the train ride; the stop motion pictures of America driving. Driving where? Backward...to the polls in 1972...to reelect Richard Milhous Nixon, the self-made man...to bestow on him the final success toward which he has driven all his life...to reaffirm their faith in America...in Nixon's America...even as it crumbles about their ears.

Book Review

Test Pattern for Living

Nicholas Johnson, the man without dropping out. who John Kenneth Galbraith called "the citizen's least frightened friend Washington," has written a book called Test Pattern for Living (\$1.25, Bantam, non-fiction, 176 pp.) that is all about how to live in twentieth century America; how to cope with life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness without dropping out. Mr. Johnson offers first a condemnation of this society as he sees it based on his experiences as FCC Commissioner, from his dealings with what he calls Big Business, Big Broadcasting, and Big Government. Mr. Johnson feels that our lives are too influenced by factors that are not of our manufacture (who doesn't know that), and proceeds to offer suggestions on how to get around the entire mess

At the college stage of the game of American life, a person is just beginning to see what the system that Johnson speaks of is all about. This book may in part help

those who are going into the system to prepare for it.

Film Workshop



There is a film workshop in the planning for a small group of students and faculty members who are seriously interested in film making.


Ralph Hughs, a musician and amateur film producer, will be the director of this program which will occupy three to four weekends. In this time an idea will be discussed and a film produced.

A view of the Old Campus from the new. Columbia is the large building on the right.




A BADMITTON CLASS IN SESSION. No strenuous classes

New Gym Opens; Everything But Water

The new Health and Physical Education Complex, located on the Upper Campus, is well underway, with the gymnasium and offices completed. Work on the structure was a year behind due to labor and more recently, flood-related problems. Yet to be completed are football and baseball fields, which in turn will provide parking for 900 cars. (At present, there is only room for 300)

Inside the gym is a basketball court surrounded by a Tartan floor, which will be used for indoor track, badminton, volleyball, shuffleboard, and indoor baseball and football

practice during inclimate weather.

The bleachers, retract against the walls, and will hold about 2600 spectators. There is enough additional space at the ends of the gym to sit an additional 3000, and with supplemental chairs on the floor, the gym will be able to hold over 6000 for upcoming wrestling matches, cultural events, BNE, and commencement exercises.




this month.



The combination of a fine offense and a stubborn defense led Bloomsburg to a 62-0 victory against Scranton.

Joe Geiger's passing and running stole the show as the Huskie quarterback passed for three touchdowns (13, 35 and 84 yards and ran for two more (9 and 24 yards). Bloom's offensive Scranton defense enabling George Gruber and his backfield companions to total an amazing 527 yards on the ground.

On the other side of the line the Husky defense made sure that the game was never close by stealing six passes and recovering two fumbles. They also made an impressive showing

as they held Scranton to a mere 57 yards rushing.

Bloomsburg set the tone of the game early in the first quarter by scoring the first two times they got the ball. The only chance Scranton had to score came with three minutes remaining in the first half but the threat ended quickly with an interception.






The Husky defense surrounds the Scranton offense.
