Bloomsburg in Spain

The sixth annual "Bloomsburg in Spain summer program is now accepting applications for six credit hours of undergraduate and graduate studies in Madrid, Spain.

Four week undergraduate courses are being offered from June 28 to August 10 and six week graduate courses from June 28 - August 10 at Madrid University. Undergraduate in state student's fees are \$785.00 and \$875.00 for out of state students. Graduate in state fees are \$915.00 and \$939.00 for out of state students.

Cost includes air fare from New York to Madrid and back, tuition, room and board, transportation from the airport, free entrance to museums and side trips to local points of interest.

Reservation applications must be returned by March, 1974 with a deposit of \$150.00. The balance of the payment may be paid in full or with payment ending by May 10, 1974. A \$35.00 cancellation fee will be assessed against participants who cancel at any time.

Approval of the budget for the newly formed Soccer Club 1 Team was the reason behind a major discussion of the meeting. The team was organized by Dr. Mingrone who worked out a \$1650 budget for the spring semester. This figure does not include the cost of uniforms or transportation.

A massive effort has been completed at Bloomsburg State College which could well have an effect on the political scene across the nation. Father Bernard Petrina, Catholic Campus Minister, and Mr. Martin Gildea, Associate. Professor of Political Science have gathered and compiled a comprehensive survey concerning "the response of Christian people confronted by the political situation of the world and the local com-munity."

At BSC and at Bucknell University on two Sundays during November, 1973 a questionnaire was completed by those attending Sunday Mass. The data was compiled and a legitimate sample drawn up of responses to statements such as "President Nixon should be impeached." Room was reserved on the back of the questionnaire for any comments people might like to contribute. The most unusual ones were printed in the six page leaflet which Father Petrina hopes to distribute to state and federal legislaotrs, the President and national

Some remarks disagreed with this type of survey being taken in church but most were favorable. "Could I use the data for a Ph.D?" just seems to sum up the massiveness of such an endeavor. Let us hope that the comments of BSC and BU students will be taken seriously by our leaders and that the 1973 Feedback effort does not go to waste. This survey might just put BSC on the map!





Old teachers may get jobs

The following did not appear in volume 16, number six of Guidepost which is the newsletter for the American Personnel and Guidance Association.

OPENINGS FOR TEACHERS?
If present trends continue, one million old teachers will flood the market in 1975.
Because of budget cutbacks in school systems and decreased birthrates, there may be job openings for them.

Latest government figures show that old teachers will be hired to fill vacancies caused by death, retirement and normal attrition. This probably will lead to decreased professional standards. Currently, all states require at least a bachelor's degree for certification. Many systems now demand that the people they hire have a high school degree or earn one within a specified period of time.


Based on these trends, many degree holders will be forced to turn down jobs for which a college degree was a prerequisite in 1960's. This may lead to problems

By 1980 an additional 300,000 to 400,000 old teachers will be looking for jobs. Jobs in their traditional fields, such as teaching and research, will not be available except at the junior college level. They will have to find employment in areas where once only a bachelor's degree was sought.

Persons with high school degrees will push out those with bachelör's degrees. The latter will have to seek jobs that once requird a college education. Most jobs will be down graded but job seekers may find the intellectual satisfaction they feel they have earned.

BSC to Travel to Liberty Bowl

Bloomsburg State College football coach Bill Sproule announced today that his team will face Delaware University in the Boardwalk Bowl on December 15. The Huskies were undefeated in their nine games this year as they had three wins and six ties. They tied for the division championship with the perennial powerhouse, Kutztown.

The Huskeis were led offensively by quarterback Stan Guereki. Guereki's faverite receiver was the incomparable John Willis. Willis caught all of Gurecki's four completions for




