At 10 a.m. the event begins with a well-illustrated look at the Todd Goodell farm, Waterford Street Extension, Edinboro. The only example locally of a late Victorian farm, it preserves the look as well as many of the artifacts associated with farming in the golden age of American agriculture. As such, the farm helps to define the way of life in and about Edinboro was 75 years ago.

The second phase of the program looks at farming today in the area. Featured are farms owned and operated by the George Fellows, Jim Skelton and Vere Woods families. These individuals will be on hand to articulate the farmers' point of view and to envision agricultural land use in the years immediately ahead. One of the highlights of this session will be a slide presentation that follows: activity on the farms in question since spring planting began.

Following lunch at Van Houton Dining Hall, a session is devoted to the farm of tomorrow, a presentation especially prepared by Milt Simpson of the Agriculture Council of America.
