

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## ADVANTAGES OFFERED BY THE CUMBERLAND VALLEY STATE NORMAL SCHOOL

In addition to the many advantages offered by all the State Normal Schools, the Cumberland Valley Normal offers the following distinctive opportunities:

- 1. Location.—All who have visited our school will frankly concede that in beauty of location it is unsurpassed by any school in Pennsylvania. The north and south mountains are in plain view from the dormitories.
- 2. The Community.—The Cumberland Valley is the home of the Scotch-Irish, devoted to the cause of education, and the Pennsylvania Germans noted for their hospitality and thrift. The union of these two races has produced an admirable type of citizenship. A high tone of morality characterizes the community. There has not been a licensed saloon in Shippensburg or within a radius of six miles from the town for more than twenty years.
- 3. The Buildings.—Our buildings are equipped with all modern conveniences. The ladies' dormitory is a beauti-

ful, homelike building much admired by all who have inspected it, and the newly painted and refurnished rooms in the Administration Building are attractive and homelike.

The gymnasium has been justly praised for its beautiful architectural design and its admirable equipment. The new model school building, recently completed, combines all the best features of modern school architecture. The other buildings are adapted to the needs of the students and present a fine appearance.

- 4. The Home Life of the School.—The authorities of the school recognize that school life should be a preparation for liiving and should reproduce as nearly as possible the social life of the home. Under the oversight and direction of the faculty our students associate with one another and are given that social training that is expected of every lady and gentleman.
- 5. Size of the School.—The Principal and Faculty of the school believe that a school should not number more than six hundred pupils. Schools exceeding this number are apt to be unwieldly; it is not possible for the faculty to know the students personally in larger schools, nor for the students to know one another intimately. As a result many of the conditions that should prevail in a large Home School are absent in such schools. A school ranging from five to six hundred in number is large enough to combine the best features to be found in a student body but is not so large as to destroy the individuality of the students.
- 6. Small Classes.—We believe in small classes, not exceeding thirty-five or forty students. When the classes are larger than this it is impossible for the teacher to come into that close personal contact with the students so necessary to their progress. Very often the lecture method with its glaring faults is used by teachers in large classes. Experience shows that really good work is impossible in classes numbering more than thirty-five or forty students.
- 7. The Expense.—Notwithstanding the increased cost of living this institution has not raised its rates for board-

ing. In the few cases where fees are charged they are made so low that they barely cover the cost of materials used.

8. Help to Graduates.—The school has a regularly organized system by means of which its graduates are helped, and help one another to secure good positions in the public schools.

#### THE SCHOOL YEAR

The school year of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School consists of forty weeks. There are three terms:—the fall term of sixteen weeks, which begins Monday, September 6, 1915, and ends Thursday, December 23, 1915; the Winter term of eleven weeks, which begins Monday, January 10, 1916, and ends Thursday, March 23, 1916; the Spring term of thirteen weeks which begins Monday, April 3, 1916, and ends Wednesday, June 28, 1916.

Students may enter at any time, but all who can do so are urged to enter at the beginning of the Fall term and remain throughout the year. Such students invariably make the most satisfactory progress as the work of the various terms is very closely co-ordinated.

During the Spring term special classes are organized to meet the needs of those students who have taught in or attended the public schools during the Fall and Winter, and who wish to prepare for a higher grade of certificate, or for advanced standing in the Normal School. These classes will also meet the needs of those who wish to prepare themselves for the County Superintendent's examination. Students who have been attending the public schools will be permitted to enter the teachers' training class in the Spring term without examination. Teachers of experience who wish to take the examination for professional or permanent certificate will also find that the work given during the Spring term is exactly suited to their needs.

#### LOCATION

The Cumberland Valley State Normal School is beautifully located on rising ground just outside the borough of Shippensburg. All who have ever seen the school agree that

its location is unsurpassed. To the west rise the beautiful North Mountains, while still nearer on the east rise the South Mountains, both part of the Blue Ridge System. The Cumberland Valley is widely famed for its beautiful water courses, its rich farming land and its hospitable and intelligent people. The town of Shippensburg is an ideal community for a school. It is a wide-awake, progressive borough with a population of about thirty-five hundred. There are twelve flourishing churches in the town, but not a single licensed saloon. Parents and prospective students will at once realize the advantages of an environment of this character.

Shippensburg is located along the line of the Cumberland Valley Railroad, a branch of the Pennsylvania system. It is forty-one miles south of Harrisburg. The Philadelphia and Reading and the Western Maryland Railroads also pass through the town, thus making it very easy of access.

#### THE FACULTY

The authorities of the school recognize that valuable and necessary as a material equipment is to a school, its faculty is of even greater importance. Special care has been exercised in selecting men and women of high standard intellectually and morally. The effective teacher must not only know the subject matter to be taught, but he must be thoroughly conversant with the best methods of instructing others. The teachers of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School are themselves products of the public schools. Practically all of them have taught for a considerable time in the public schools and have had experience in supervisory capacity. They are thus enabled to understand and appreciate the needs of the young men and women who form the student body of the school. One of the striking features of the school is the close relation that exists between teacher and pupil. Visitors have not failed to remark that the school resembles a very large family, in which the teachers act as counselors and advisors.

#### AIM OF THE SCHOOL

The aim of our school is to teach our pupils self control, for without this quality any scheme of education will be a failure. The great majority of our pupils come to us with a very definite purpose in view and wish to make the best possible use of their opportunities hence the tone of the school is remarkably earnest.

It is a further aim and object of the school to prepare our pupils for social efficiency. We realize that young men and women must be able to take an active part in the affairs of the various communities into which they are expected to go after leaving the school; hence the school does not neglect the social side of the student's life, and opportunities for social intercourse under proper direction are afforded the students from time to time. The student who goes from a school lacking the ability to associate with cultured men and women is bound to be more or less of a failure in life. Our pupils are therefore trained in the conventions expected of them by society so that they may take their place in the affairs of their respective communities. ideal of any school should be to reproduce as nearly as possible the family life. As these associate in the family, so should they associate in a properly regulated school.

In carrying out this policy this Normal School allows the greatest possible freedom to the young men and women compatible with good taste and sound morality. In short everything is done by the faculty to co-operate with the students in maintaining a bright and refined home life and to help them to the cultivation of that grace and dignity that marks the real lady or gentleman.

## **EQUIPMENT**

The school is well provided with chemical and physical apparatus necessary to effective class room work. The class-rooms, library, chapel, gymnasium and studios are thoroughly good and well fitted for their respective purposes. A new biological laboratory is being built. It will be equipped with everything necessary to effective work.

The school maintains a large and well equipped laundry in which the work of the school including that of the students and faculty is done.

The gymnasium is a beautiful, well furnished building equipped with suitable apparatus for the work of physical

training.

The ladies' dormitory is one of the most beautiful and convenient buildings to be found anywhere in the State. It is well heated and lighted and presents a very homelike appearance. The men's dormitory is in the main building and is adequately provided with everything that is necessary for the comfort and welfare of our students.

A large stable is provided for the accommodation of day students who wish to secure accommodations for their

horses used in driving to the school.

The infirmary is a bright and well equipped building, ready to be used at a moment's notice by students or teachers without additional charge. Good physicians and nurses are within easy reach.

#### **EXPENSES**

COPY OF CLAUSE IN THE GENERAL APPROPRIATION BILL RE-LATING TO FREE TUITION IN STATE NORMAL SCHOOLS

For the support of the public schools and Normai Schools of this Commonwealth for the two years commencing on the first day of June, one thousand nine hundred and five, the sum of eleven million dollars. . · And provided further, That out of the amount hereby appropriated there shall be paid for the education of teachers in the State Normal Schools the sum of four hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be applied as follows: For each student over seventeen years of age who shall sign the agreement binding said student to teach in the common schools of this State two full annual terms, there shall be paid the sum of one dollar and fifty cents a week in full payment of the expenses for tuition of said student, provided that each student in a State Normal School drawing an allowance from the State must receive regular instruction in the science and art of teaching in a special class devoted to that subject for the whole time for which such allowance is drawn which amount shall be paid upon the warrants of the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Students not receiving State aid pay a tuition fee of \$1.50 per week, hence the total expense to such students for the year is \$225.

The above prices include everything in the regular course except in the case of students taking certain of the sciences, in which subjects small fees are charged to cover the cost of materials actually used. These fees are as follows:

#### SPECIAL SUBJECTS

As noted on page 15 of the Catalogue, Commercial Branches have been introduced in the school. Special commercial branches are charged at the rate of fifty cents a week for each branch taken.

The fees for other special studies are as follows:

Instruction on piano (including practice period) 75 cents per lesson.

Instruction in Vocal Music, 50 cents per lesson. Instruction in Elocution, 50 cents per lesson. Instruction in Fine Art, 50 cents per lesson.

Use of piano, \$5.00 per term.

Students will be charged for the full time they agree to take lessons and no rebate will be made on account of lessons missed by the student's failure to attend.

## GENERAL REMARKS

No deduction will be made on account of absence during the last two weeks of a term or during the first two weeks except as heretofore indicated.

The charge for board and room includes furniture, bedding, light and heat. Each room accommodates two students. During the Fall and Winter terms students may have a whole room by paying fifty cents a week extra.

The charge for laundry is for twelve plain pieces per week. Hand laundered pieces, such as shirt waists, dresses, men's shirts, collars and cuffs are not included, but such articles will be laundered by the school laundry at very moderate rates.

No charge is made for the use of the infirmary, but doctor's and nurses fees and medicine are paid by the student.

"Students will not be allowed to board outside the building except with parents or near relatives."

For boarding students not receiving State aid:

Students who are unable to enter at the beginning of a term, will be charged only from the time of entrance. During the Spring term teachers are expected to enter as soon as the schools in which they have been teaching are closed.

In case the amount appropriated by the State should not cover the entire cost of tuition, students in all State Normal Schools will receive a pro rata share. There has been no deficit in recent years.

## CONDITION OF ADMISSION AND GRADUATION

1. Properly certified graduates of approved Pennsylvania high schools of the first grade and city high schools as listed by the Department of Public Instruction, shall be admitted to the third year of the Fourth Year Course of the

State Normal without examination, and be conditioned in the branches that have not been satisfactorily completed by such student.

- 2. Properly certified graduates of approved Pennsylvania high schools of the second grade shall be admitted to the second year of the Four Year Course of the State Normal Schools without examination, and be conditioned in the branches that have not been satisfactorily completed by such students.
- 3. Properly certified graduates of approved Pennsylvania high schools of the third grade shall be admitted to the first year of the Four Year Course of the State Normal Schools without examination, and be conditioned in the branches that have not been satisfactorily completed by such students.
- 4. A person who desires to be admitted to the second or the third year without having previously attended an accredited high school, must have a certificate of a commissioned Superintendent of Schools, showing that he has pursued the branches of the first year or the first and second years, with his standing in those branches, or must pass a satisfactory examination by the Faculty in said branches, or be conditioned in them. But the studies in which any one is conditioned under this rule or any one of the rules above, shall not foot up more than 320 hours.
- 5. If the Faculty of any State Normal School or the State Board of Examiners decide that a person is not prepared to pass an examination by the State Board, he shall not be admitted to the same examination at any other State Normal School during the same school year.
- 6. If a person who has completed the State Board examinations required for admission to the classes of any year at any State Normal School desires to enter another Normal School, the Principal of the Normal School at which the examination was held shall send the proper certificate to the Principal of the school which the person desires to attend. Except for the reason here stated, no certificate set-

ting forth the passing of any studies at a State Normal School shall be issued.

- 7. Candidates for graduation shall have the opportunity of being examined in any higher branches, including vocal and instrumental music and double-entry bookkeeping; and all studies completed by them shall be named in their certificate. Persons who have been graduated may be examined at any State examination in any higher branches, and the Secretary of the Board of Examiners shall certify on the back of their diplomas as to the passing of the branches completed at said examination. No certificate or diploma valid for teaching except the one regularly issued by the State Board of Examiners, to regular graduates shall be issued by any State Normal School or any person connected with any such school.
- 8. A certificate setting forth the proficiency of all applicants in all the studies in which they desire to be examined by the State Board of Examiners shall be prepared and signed by the Faculty and presented to the Board. Studies that have been completed at a high school shall be distinguished by the words "high school" or the initials "H. S." A separate list of each class shall be prepared for the use of each examiner together with a separate list of students conditioned in any branch, with the branches in which they were conditioned, and the grades shall be indicated in every list where substitution is made or extra branches are taken. These lists shall be ready for the State Board before the examination begins.
- 9. No State examinations shall be given to any student on part of a year's work unless the study is completed, but (except in the last year's examination) a student may be conditioned by the State Board of Examiners in not more than two subjects covering not more than one period of work for a year. Accurate records of these conditions shall be promptly sent to the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the fact that the students thus conditioned have taken up such subjects and passed them by the faculty shall be certified to in writing to the State Board of Examiners

before such students are admitted to another State Examination.

- 10. Within fifteen days after the examination by the State Board at any Normal School, the Principal of the School shall send to the Department of Public Instruction a complete list of all who have taken advanced branches, together with a list of these branches, also a list of those to whom diplomas and certificates were granted, and a list of those who passed the State Examination in any year, naming the year.
- 1. Graduates of State Normal Schools in the regular course, and graduates of colleges approved by the College and University Council, who shall satisfactorily pass the Faculty and State examinations in the course required therefore, shall receive the degree of Bachelor of Pedagogics. And Bachelors of Pedagogics who have, after receiving such degrees, taught successfully for two years, and passed the Faculty and State examinations in the course required therefore, shall receive the degree of Master of Pedagogics.
- 12. Residence for the last two years shall be required of all students except in the case of students who have completed the Freshman year or more in colleges approved by the College and University Council who may be graduated after one year's residence.

## COURSE OF STUDY FOR PENNSYLVANIA STATE NORMAL SCHOOLS

This course is based on the "unit" plan as proposed by The Carnegie Foundation.

A "unit" represents a year's study in any subject in a secondary school, constituting approximately a quarter of a full year's work.

(This statement is designed to afford a standard of measurement for the work done in a secondary school. It takes the four-year high school course as a basis and assumes that the length of the school year is from thirty-six

to forty weeks, that a period is forty-five minutes in length and that the study is pursued for four or five periods a week; but, under ordinary circumstances, a satisfactory year's work in any subject cannot be accomplished in less than one hundred and sixty forty-five minute periods or their equivalent).

Students admitted to the First Year shall have a fair knowledge of Arithmetic, Reading, Orthography, Penmanship, United States History, Geography, Grammar, Physiology, Civics and the Elements of Algebra to Quadrates. Test by Faculty.

## CERTIFICATES AND DIPLOMAS

Graduates in the four years' course are awarded a certificate in which are named the branches in which the student has been found qualified. This certificate entitles the holder to teach two years in the public schools of Pennsylvania without examination.

A graduate in the Normal Course who has continued his studies for two years and has taught successfully for two full annual terms in the common-schools of the State, will receive, upon presenting to the Faculty and the State Board of Examiners, a certificate of good moral character and skill in the Art of Teaching, endorsed by the Board, or Boards of Directors by whom he was employed, and countersigned by the proper Superintendent, or Superintendents of Schools, a permanent diploma, which will entitle the holder to teach in any of the public schools of the State without further examination. The proper blanks may be obtained from the principal at any time. They should be filled out and filed with the principal not later than June 1.

#### DEGREES

The degree of Bachelor of Pedagogics will be conferred upon graduates in the Regular Normal Course and graduates of colleges approved by the College and University Council who have completed the work of the first year in the supplementary course and passed a satisfactory examination under the faculty and State Board in the studies of such years.

The degree of Master of Pedagogics will be conferred on those who, since graduation from Normal School or College, have taught three years successfully in the public schools of the State (or two years in the case of candidates who taught in the Model School) and have passed an examination in the Supplementary Course leading to such degree before the Faculty and State Board of Examiners.



## Government and Discipline


All school government should have for its end the development of character in the individual student. Any method of government which does not secure this important end is wrong in principle.

In a Normal School, where the student is being trained to govern other students, there can be no excuse for loose government. No person is qualified to teach in the public schools until he has attained a complete mastery over himself. The individual who has been trained in school to habits of self-control and a wise self-direction has received the best training which any school can give him.

We rely largely upon honor and self-respect of our stu-

dents in our efforts to control. A Normal School is not a reformatory, and parents and guardians are requested not to send vicious or immoral students to our institution to be educated. A few such students, if retained in a boarding school, vitiate the entire moral atmosphere of the school, and make it an unsafe place for even the well-behaved student to undertake his education.

We notify the parents when we find their children are not attentive to their studies, and if this course does not remedy the matter, the parents will be asked to withdraw them from school. Students who are not making good use of their opportunities to receive an education, will not be retained in school.

Obedience on the part of the students to the following rules and regulations is necessary to the successful management and control of a Normal School, and is also for the best interests of the students themselves. No regulations are made which we do not regard as important.

## Time Regulations

1. Students will rise at 6:45 a.m. and retire at 10 p.m.

2. Recitation hours from 8:15 to 12:00 a.m. and 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

3. Breakfast at 7:15 a.m. Lunch at 12:10 p.m. and Dinner at 5:30 p.m.

4. Chapel services at 9:00 a.m.

5. Prayer meeting on Wednesday, 7:00 p.m. Attendance voluntary.

6. "Normal" and "Philomathean" Literary Societies meet Friday evenings at 7:00.

7. Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. meetings on Sunday at 6:00 p.m. Sunday School at 8:45 a.m.

8. Study hour from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m.

## Class Regulations

1. No student will be allowed to take more studies than he can pursue profitably nor fewer than are necessary to keep him sufficiently employed. 2. Students must attend classes up to the time of their leaving school.

3. All students must be present at the daily chapel

exercises, unless excused.

4. Ladies are expected, when exercising in the gymnasium, to wear the adopted suit of two pieces, blouse and divided skirt of dark blue flannel.

5. Both ladies and gentlemen must wear the regular

gymnasium shoes for gymnasium exercises.

## **Building and Room Regulations**

1. Each student will be held responsible for the condition of his room and its furniture, and he will be charged with any loss or unnecessary damage.

2. No changes or alterations must be made in the permanent parts or fixtures of the room; nor nails driven into the walls without permission of the preceptor or matron.

3. Students are requested to provide themselves with

slippers for the building.

4. Students furnish their own towels, napkins, rings, soap and brushes. All articles of clothing sent to the laundry must be distinctly marked with the student's full name.

5. Students may be required to change their rooms or to board out of the building if deemed best by the Principal of the school.

## Social Regulations

1. Day students may not call at the rooms of boarders, nor stay in their rooms over night, unless by permission of the Principal. Boarding students will be held responsible to the Principal for the observance of this rule.

2. Boarding students will not be permitted to visit in town on Sunday, nor remain in town over night, excepting

with near relatives.

3. Visitors to the building will be regarded as under

the same regulations as the students.

4. Lady students will not be permitted to leave the campus unless by permission of the Principal or a member of the Faculty.

- 5. Visiting the buildings or grounds on Sunday will not be permitted, nor will students be allowed to make or receive calls during study or school hours.
- 6. Ladies and gentlemen will not be permitted to hold prolonged conversations with one another, either in the building or upon the grounds, unless in connection with school duties, and then only by permission of the Principal or member of the Faculty.
- 7. Students will receive visits from relatives or friends in the reception room only; an exception will be made in the case of parents, who will be permitted to visit in their children's rooms.
- 8. Students are under the regulations of the school going to and coming from their homes.
- 9. Students will select their own physician without recommendation from any member of the Faculty.
- 10. Students wishing to visit their homes or other places during the term must present written permits from the parents to the Principal, or a member of the Faculty designated by him. Parents are urged not to ask that their children be absent from school except between the hours of 4 p.m. Friday and 8 a.m. Monday. The student cannot make up the work missed through absence from class.

## **Health Regulations**

- 1. Students upon entering the school must present physician's certificates showing that they have been successfully vaccinated.
- 2. Students during vacation, or at any time when they are absent from school, must avoid exposure to contagion or infectious diseases.
- 3. Students will be expected to observe proper hygienic rules during the time they are enrolled as members of the school.

## Sabbath Regulations

1. Students are required to be present at the Sunday morning services of one of the churches in the town, unless

excused by the Principal. The selection of the church is left to the parent.

2. Students are required to attend the Sunday School held in the Normal Chapel every Sunday morning, unless properly excused.

3. From 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. will be observed as a quiet period. During this time no singing, loud talking, or other unnecessary noise will be allowed in the building.

It must not be understood that the foregoing regulations embrace all the duties and obligations devolving upon the individual student. No list of rules can be made which would cover every duty of the student under all the possible contigencies of Normal School life. And, on the other hand, there are many habits and forms of conduct so obviously out of harmony with the obligations of the person who is preparing to teach that it is not deemed necessary to prohibit them by formal rule.

Our standard of conduct for those who are preparing to teach under the tuition of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School is so high that it would preclude anyone from looking to the profession of teaching for a life calling whose habits and conduct are not worthy the imitation of the children who may be placed under his instruction.

# DEPARTMENTS OF INSTRUCTION PSYCHOLOGY

#### DR. LEHMAN

A knowledge of Psychology is necessary to the successful teacher. Educators have come to recognize the child as the center around which the entire educational system revolves. The teacher must understand the child's physical nature with special reference to the structure of the brain and the entire nervous system; he must understand the close relation that the physical bears to the mental state. Hence considerable time is given to the study of the physiology of the brain and nervous system. The laws underlying the growth and development of the various mental activities are studied, not only from the text book, but by actual observation of children. Similarly laws of memory, habit, etc., are tested or derived by a course of experiments. Students are encouraged to work out problems for themselves. In short, the aim of the course is to make psychology of practical value to every student.

#### **PEDAGOGY**

#### PROF. HEIGES

## School Management

School Management treats of the school as a definite agency of society, organized for the express purpose of training boys and girls for social efficiency.

Problems dealing with the organization and management of the schol are considered; the principles underlying the selection and arrangement of the course of study are discussed as are questions relating to the location, structure, heating, lighting and ventilation of school buildings. During the Spring term, special attention is given to problems connected with ungraded country schools. Model lessons are given in teaching classes in the various common school branches, after which the students take charge of the class and teach a lesson which is afterward subjected to class criticism.

#### **METHODS**

During the Sophomore year, General Methods are studied. The object here is to supplement the work of the Freshman year with a study of the best methods of securing results in the school room. The purpose of education is emphasized together with its general aim. The methods of realizing that aim through different types of lessons are considered and students are required to construct lesson plans illustrating these types.

During the Junior and Senior years, courses in special methods are given. In the former year methods in History and Geography are considered; in the latter, methods in Arithmetic and Grammar. Not only are the best methods of teaching these subjects discussed but the aims that have dominated, as well as those that now dominate the teaching of these branches are considered. The correlation of these subjects with one another and with other subjects of the course is given careful attention. The use of apparatus, mechanical devices, maps, etc., is made the subject of careful study and the various pedagogical problems connected with the subjects are thoroughly discussed.

#### HISTORY OF EDUCATION

A system of education represents a nation's or community's effort to realize a social ideal. If a teacher wishes to understand the significance of the modern trend in education, he must be able to trace modern idelas and ideals to their origin. He must understand how the ancient people sought self-realization through various systems of training. Some of these systems failed to secure the ends sought, in others the end sought was not worth while. But we are debtors to the past for all that we find in modern civilization. The teacher must understand what elements of Greek and Roman education survive in modern education. He must also understand the radical defects of ancient oriental systems of education. He must know the contributions made by the educators of the past so that he may the better understand the work of modern leaders in educational thought.

While the course is based on a text book, students are required to read widely and present reports of their reading from time to time.

#### MODEL SCHOOL

#### MISS HARRIS.

#### MRS. HERR

The school law of Pennsylvania requires as part of the equipment of a Normal School, a well organized training department where students may have an opportunity to teach under guidance, supervision and observation as a part of their necessary training before being graduated as teachers.

The Model School of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School numbers one hundred and ninety pupils divided into nine grades, corresponding to the grades in the public schools. The subjects taught are: reading, spelling, oral and written arithmetic, history, civil government, geography, (political and physical), language, grammar and nature study, physiology and hygiene, Latin, algebra, and the reading of Classics.

The course of study in the Model School is planned with a view to prepare pupils to enter the Freshman year of the Normal School. The work to be accomplished in the different subjects is carefully planned according to the needs and ability of the individual pupils. These printed plans which are put into the hands of each Senior teacher contain an outline of the work in every grade and subject. Seniors are assigned to teach according to scholarship, fitness, general ability and personal preference.

The supervisors in the Model School correct the daily plans of the Seniors. These plans are written in time for suggestion and revision before being used in the classes of the day. During the teaching of lessons the supervisors visit the class-room to observe the poise, personality and method of the teacher, for helpful suggestion later, as well as to safeguard the development and education of the children.

The supervisors teach observation lessons, which show how to present a new subject, give an idea of the relation of one subject to others of the curriculum, as well as an insight into the tactful handling of children of different temperaments.

Persons preferring to do primary work are given opportunity to elect and secure practice in the following:

Primary reading, including spelling, story-telling, phonics, handwork suitable to the season, dramatization and penmanship.

Language and nature, including the study of plants and animal life according to the season, related stories and poems, dramatization, oral and written reproduction;

Number work, games, rhymes and playing store;

History and geography, celebration of national and historical events in their proper geographical setting;

Kindergarten work, including paper cutting, sewing, pasting, weaving, modeling, raffia and handwork related to subjects taught.

The industrial work of the grades gives practice in working out the details of an historical period; making a miniature representation illustrating an historical or geographical fact concerning their native town, making pulp, salt and product maps, representing land and water forms by means of sand and plasticene. In domestic science the children are taught to do plain sewing, to hemstitch, embroider and crochet, to set a table and make a bed.

Persons preferring higher grade work are encouraged to develop ability in handling adolescent boys and girls, in understanding proper light, heat, ventilation and sanitary conditions, in the use of correct methods for acquiring interest and achievement, and in creating an atmosphere of industry and self-confidence that will form character in the pupils as well as develop ability to teach Grammar and High School subjects.

The Normal School teachers of drawing, music, penmanship, manual training, and physical culture supervise the teaching of their subjects, and students having preference for these subjects are encouraged to specialize in their Model School work.

The Model School teaching gives opportunity for child study; it presents the school problems met in every day

teaching; it is a discipline, experience and test which proves the necessary qualifications of a teacher and provides splendid opportunity for development in character and teaching ability.

#### **ENGLISH**

#### DR. COLLINS

#### MISS STROH

The course in English, from Freshman work in Grammar to Senior review of this subject, is definite in purpose; to have pupils learn to spell correctly, to speak and write English as it is used by speakers and writers of authority, and to inspire a love for good literature.

Special drills are given in spelling in connection with the work in English; but our pupils are taught spelling in every class, in every subject, every day. We emphasize the observation of new words until the habit is fixed; we teach that a poor speller is without excuse; that those who spell poorly are careless in their habits of observation and study.

## Freshman Year

Throughout the Freshman Year all pupils study and recite English Grammar daily. The text is about as advanced as that used in the first year of first grade high schools; but we teach the subjects from two points of view: First, as a foundation for correct speaking and writing, and second, as a subject that our students will teach later to others.

As a foundation for correct use of English we emphasize the sentence, words in their relation to each other, inflection, analysis, parsing, diagraming, and daily practice in oral and written sentence and paragraph composition. We believe that the best way to learn to do is by doing; therefore we emphasize the importance of speaking and writing grammatically constructed sentences and paragraphs. We encourage pupils to cultivate the habit of reading good books. Lists from which to choose are furnished the class, and during the latter part of the year they are required to make oral and written reports on some books they have read.

# Sophomore Year

Four recitations a week during the year are given to

the study of Rhetoric and Classics. Daily practice is had in speaking and writing. Emphasis is placed on the composition of clear English sentences and their arrangement into

paragraphs that have unity and coherence.

In our selection of Classics we include those required by colleges for admission to their Freshman classes. These, with others, are read and studied along with our work in Rhetoric. By this arrangement of the course we offer great masterpieces as models for our improvement. Lists of books are given to pupils from which they make selection for out-of-class reading. After they have read these they make oral and written reports to their teacher.

Students are not only urged to read good books, but they are encouraged to commit to memory from their reading. We treat Rhetoric and Literature as subjects that will improve us and add to our culture; and we consider by what methods we may get the best results in training others when we become teachers.

## JUNIOR YEAR

The first two terms of this year are devoted to a careful study of the History of England's and America's Literature. Juniors recite four times a week from a formal text on the origin and development of literature. The subject is made broad and comprehensive by having students do assigned work in the Libray. Each student gives Oral Readings before the class. These are selected from the best writings of the authors we study in our History of Literature. The purpose of these Oral Readings is two-fold; by them we get practice in reading aloud before an audience; and from them we learn to enjoy and appreciate literature as we study its development.

In addition to the work of the class room, students do reading out of class. The teacher directs the choice of books that students shall read; and each student makes Oral and Written Reports to his teacher on fiction, essays and sketches, and on poems and plays. Memorizing selections from every book read is a part of the required course.

Throughout the year pupils are taught to consider good

methods of teaching literature. Students are constantly reminded that they can not become strong teachers nor inspire others with a love for literature unless they have read widely and are themselves inspired.

#### Senior Year

In the third term of their Senior Year students review English Grammar. For this work we use an advanced text, and at the same time that we review Grammar we recall the principles of Rhetoric. Oral Themes are a part of the review work. These include Descriptions, Narrations, Expositions, and Arguments on subjects that are of interest because they touch our daily lives. Current numbers of the best magazines and the daily newspapers are closely watched for items of importance and interest.

In this last work in English pupils may study methods of teaching Grammar. In addition to the teaching they do in our Model School, students are given practice in conducting recitations under supervision of their English teacher. Teachers in our English course keep in touch with the best methods of teaching. They visit other schools and observe work that is done by teachers of recognized ability.

# READING AND PUBLIC SPEAKING

#### MISS STROH

It is the purpose of this department to cultivate the powers of thought and imagination as a basis of expression and to develop the voice as a fit **medium** of expression. Effort is made to train mind, body and voice so that the student may read intelligently and beautifully. Special attention is paid to

- 1. Correct Breathing.
- 2. Tone Production.
- 3. Articulation.
- 4. Phrasing.
- 5. Emphasis-placing.
- 6. Thought Analysis.
- 7. Inflection.

- 8. Defective habits of speech—their cause and cure.
- 9. Phonetics.
- 10. Pronunciation.

The course in Public Speaking is required of all Seniors. This includes class work for two periods a week during the Fall and Winter terms.

Special training is given in the fundamentals of public speaking, in extemporaneous speaking, reading, recitation and dramatic interpretations. In addition to the required class work each Senior is required to speak twice during the year at the regular chapel exercises.

#### **MATHEMATICS**

# DR. ELDON MR. BURKHOLDER

#### Arithmetic

A teacher in the public schools should be a master of arithmetic. It will be his duty to qualify his pupils in a subject vital to their business interests.

In the preparation of the teacher we insist upon a thorough knowledge of numeration and notation and upon the relations which ordinary numbers bear to each other with

respect to their magnitude.

We aim also to make the student skilful and correct in the operations of the fundamental rules, for these are the essential tools of all arithmetic. In the solving of the higher problems bungling work in the fundamentals distracts attention and makes the solution tedious and laborious.

In the same way, common and decimal fractions are involved in the majority of problems and for the same reason

must be thoroughly understood.

After we have secured proper preparation in the essentials, problems in denominate numbers, ratio and proportion, percentage and mensuration, are made interesting and practical by relating them to trades and occupations and to the affairs of every day life.

#### **ALGEBRA**

Some one has defined Algebra as "Arithmeitc generalized."

This definition gives in few words a good reason for including Algebra in a course of study.

By means of Algebra we are enabled to derive formulas which may be used individually in solving all problems involving the same conditions.

These formulas are used in all Sciences and are invaluable. But in addition to its use in the Sciences, Algebra by its peculiar method of procedure often throws light on abstruse arithmetical problems and makes their solution easier.

In teaching Algebra, we proceed as in Arithmetic, mastering the first principles and such subjects as factoring, highest common factor, least common multiple, involution, evolution, theory of exponents and radicals.

But the crown of all Algebraic subjects is the equation. We aim to make the student ready in the solution of the various kinds of equations and expert in constructing equations from conditions named in problems.

# **GEOMETRY**

Geometry is that branch of mathematics which treats of position, form and magnitude.

Some knowledge of the forms and the rules of Geometry is needed by everybody, and the teachers of the public schools must be relied upon to give this necessary instruction to the people at large through the children who from time to time come under their tuition.

The principal elements of the study of Geometry are axioms, definitions, lines, angles, and triangles.

Great care is taken to have the student well grounded in a knowledge of these essentials.

The circle, parallelogram, polygon, polyhedron, cone, cylinder and sphere are considered in order and their characteristics and measurements are carefully and logically determined.

In these demonstrations the rules of mensuration are verified.

For this reason a teacher who has mastered Geometry will enter upon the subject of mensuration in arithmetic,

and upon kindred topics in other branches, with greater confidence and will handle them more effectively than one who has never had instruction in Geometry and who, like his pupils, merely follows the rules.

#### TRIGONOMETRY

In pursuing the study of Trigonometry care is taken to have the student thoroughly understand the nature and use of the functions of angles and of their application to the solution of problems; also, the nature and use of logarithms in performing the various arithmetical operations required.

#### HISTORY

#### MISS WYLIE

The History Course of our Normal School is complete. It extends through three years of the students training. It embraces Ancient, Mediaeval, Modern, English, American and Pennsylvania History, Civil Givernment, including elementary and advanced work. An advanced study of Geography and its relation to history is also included. History is taught to the student first, to impart a knowledge of events and the causes which have produced them. The relation of cause and effect is carefully traced. It is also taught that the students may be more broadly cultured men and women, that they have a deeper love for their country and appreciate the blessings of the republican form of government.

Freshman Year—Lectures on Ireland, Scotland, England. Sophomore—Julius Caesar, Alexander the Great. Beginning Rome and Athens, Charlemagne, Savonarola, Napoleon. Junior—Wm. Penn, George Washington, Booker T. Washington, History of the Cumberland Valley. A course prepared especially for teachers is given during the Spring term. It embraces History of the U. S., Pennsylvania History and Stories, and a series of Lectures.

#### Freshman Year

A review of U. S. History is given the students during the Fall term of their Freshman year. In the Winter term they begin the study of English History and complete the work in the Spring term. They also study Pennsylvania History in the Spring term with supplementary stories from Pennsylvania history.

Text books—Thwaite's and Kendall's History, Larned's English History, Shimmel's Pennsylvania History.

# Sophomore Year

During the Sophomore year the work is more advanced than students study in the Fall term; Ancient History with supplementary work, Mediaeval History, during the Winter term, and Modern History in the Spring term.

Text books—Myers' Ancient, Mediaeval and Modern Histories. Supplementary work from Daves' History of Greece.

#### Junior Year

The Advanced American History is taught during the Fall Term. With this work, the students are given the history of the Cumberland Valley from its settlement up to the Civil War. Much of the Indian history is included in this course. During the Winter term advanced Geography is taught. This work embraces a review of the text book, map drawing, field work, Methods of Instruction, Relation of Geography to History, etc.

Text Books—Gordy's Advanced U. S. History, McMurry's System of Map Drawing, Tarr and McMurry's Geography, Morris' Geography.

#### CIVIL GOVERNMENT

The instruction of the student in Civil Government includes a clear exposition of the great principles laid down by our Constitution. Legislative, Executive, and Judicial, Local Country and State Government. In the advanced work given during the Sophomore year the details of government, its agencies, its machinery, are explained. Practical lessons in Law are given.

Text Books—Shimmel's U. S. Civics and Constitution, Smull's Legislative Hand Book.

#### **GEOGRAPHY**

#### MISS HORTON

## MISS WYLIE

Physical and Political Geography are included in this course. Less attention is given to insignificant natural and political divisions than they have received heretofore, and more time applied to the study of the manufactures, commerce and farming and mine products.

Comparative Geography is made prominent in dealing with this important subject. By comparison the pupils get clearer ideas of geographical divisions and places, and they are able to retain their impressions longer. The railways and commercial routes are definitely traced, and numerous imaginary trips are made to different parts of the globe. The geographical information of the pupils is often drawn upon to furnish material for composition writing.

The home geography of the pupil is carefully and accurately given as the first step in teaching this interesting subject. The primary concepts of position, direction, distance, soil, climate and natural productions are learned by the pupil as part of his first geographical knowledge.

# BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES

## MISS MACY

#### **PHYSIOLOGY**

#### Freshman Year

This course deals with the anatomy, physiology and hygiene of the human body. It aims to acquaint students with the body and the best way to keep it healthy. Special attention is given to the circulatory, respiratory, excretory, osseous, and nervous systems. The course includes textbook and lecture work and oral and written quizzes.

# Hygiene and School Sanitation

1st term of Junior Year-

As there is a course in elementary Physiology preparatory to the Junior course only such work in anatomy and physiology is given as is necessary to understand the

science of Hygiene in relation to the human organism. The subject of Hygiene is viewed from its personal, municipal, occupational, and educational aspects. A study is made of the mode of transmission of the common infectious diseases and the means of prevention by isolation and disinfection, with special attention to tuberculosis, wound infections, venereal diseases, and milk-water and insect borne maladies.

The principles that underlie vaccination, serum therapy, Pasteur treatment, etc., are carefully considered as well as the subject of patent medicines, alcoholic beverages, and

food adulterations.

One aim of this course is to arouse the student to the tremendous significance of the modern Health Crusade, and to his opportunity and responsibility, as a teacher of the young, to help to promote physical efficiency and consequent happiness.

## **BOTANY**

# Sophomore Year

This course gives a thorough, general course in Botany, and consists of recitation work, oral and written quizzes, illustrated lectures, field and laboratory work. It covers work on the four great groups of plants, and the various subdivisions of each group. The laboratory work includes the study of representative plants from each group with special emphasis upon the Bacteria and parasite Fungi, and their place in human economy. During the Spring term a large part of the work is conducted in the field in studying the plant in its habit and ecological adaptations. Among the special work that is done with the flowering plants is a study, in the field, of the trees and of the most common weeds of this vicinity.

The students are required to keep neat and accurate note books, and to make an herbarium including at least twenty families of plants.

## ZOOLOGY-Junior Year

This course consists of recitation work from the text, lectures, oral and written quizzes and laboratory work. The

fundamental laws that govern the organic world are emphasized especially as their operations relate to man in his everyday existence. The animal kingdom is studied both as a whole and by considering each Phylum separately. A laboratory study of one or more representative types of each Phylum is made, and special attention is paid to the parasitic animals and their effect upon man. Important biological problems are considered and each student is given opportunity to learn how to do research work on any phase of Zoology. A written report requiring a certain amount of library work is required of each student.

Practical work is done in the field and students are required to make a collection and classification of at least

twenty-five animal forms

#### PHYSIOGRAPHY

## Freshman Year-

As this is the first science studied in the Normal, special effort is made to teach students the manner of approaching a scientific subject and to train them in the power of observation. A standard text is studied, supplemented by some lecture work. The earth is studied in connection with other bodies in space, especially in regard to the occurrence of day and night and change of seasons. Special attention is given to the study of the physiographical processes which have made the surface of the earth what it is. This is made effective by work in the field and by the study of the government topographic maps. Laboratory work includes the study of these maps, the making of maps, drawing graphs and sections, study of rocks and minerals and the atmospheric changes which cause weather, aided by the United States Weather Maps, which are received daily at the school.

# **GEOLOGY**

Beginning in the Fall of 1915 an elective course in Geology will be offered. This course will include text book, laboratory and field work. It will include study of the composition and structure of the earth, and physical changes of the crust of the earth, such as unconformaties and vul-

canism, and work of agencies acting at the surface, as atmosphere, water and ice. Some time will be given to Historical Geology studying the different geological periods and the rocks and life of each. A large part of the laboratory work will be spent on the study of rocks and the rock formation of different areas.

#### PHYSICAL SCIENCES

#### PROF. LEVAN

## Chemistry

The course in Chemistry has been so revised as to meet the needs of students either in their daily occupations or as teachers of Chemistry.

The first part of the year is devoted to the study of the more important elements and their compounds, together with such chemical laws and theories as are necessary for a basic knowledge of the subject. Later the more practical phases are taken up as they are used in the industrial processes. Applied Chemistry is made use of in the elementary analysis of soils, the detection of adulterants in food, milk, baking-powders, etc.

Students from high schools who desire credit for their Chemistry must have performed at least forty individual experiments acceptable to colleges for entrance. Their note books must be written in ink, in full clear language, approved and certified to by their instructor, and submitted to the teacher of Chemistry for approval.

# **Physics**

The plan of work in this department is so arranged as to give the most complete training in interpreting the underlying principles in the natural phenomena of daily occurrence. This is done in part by class room demonstration by the instructor but to a greater degree by individual laboratory work by the student with simple apparatus under the direction of the teacher in charge.

Such topics as mechanics, including mechanics of fluids and gases, heat, as a motive power, principles of heating

and ventilating, the elementary principles of electricity and its simpler uses as embodied in electromagnets, telephone, telegraph, electric door bell, etc., the incandescent lamp, motor and dynamo are thoroughly treated. Supplementary readings along the lines of recent scientific investigation such as nature of X-Rays, radium, and principles of wireless telegraphy are assigned.

The laboratory work meets the requirements for college entrance and at the same time teaches the student to make and assemble the apparatus necessary to reproduce the demonstrations in a high school not supplied with much

material.

A complete record of all observations systematically arranged is made and by the aid of a standard text proper conclusions are drawn. Visits are made to the various industrial plants of the vicinity to see the actual application of the principles learned.

# AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT MISS CORWIN

Our course in Agriculture is designed to interest students in the lift and work of the farm and to teach the fundamental, scientific and economic principles of agriculture—so that, when they—as teachers—are located in a rural school or rural community, a bond of sympathy will exist between teacher and pupil By this training in agriculture they will be able to adapt themselves to their environment; will be able to make the work of the school serviceable to the pupils; will be better fitted to lead and direct not only the thoughts and ambitions of the children but to lead in the work of the community.

The agricultural work will be given throughout the Senior year, except Course I, which will be given in the


Spring term of the Junior year.

# Course I-Nature Study.

This course is designed to make the student lovers of nature, to acquaint them with some of the elementary facts of all the sciences in the phases that appeal to children and

to discuss the spirit, aims and methods of Nature Study in the schools. The immediate aims are, to become familiar with the common farm crops and animals, the common wild flowers, weeds, birds and insects of the farm and to learn how plants grow and to help them to grow. This work will form a basis for the study of agriculture.

This work will be given in the form of lectures, field trips and laboratory work.

# Course II—Agriculture.

A course in the elements of Agriculture as applied to the farming conditions in Pennsylvania. This course will embrace the following topics:

Soil—Dealing with its origin, types and properties, with particular reference to soil management so as to maintain its fertility; the building up of worn down soils by manure, cover-crops, legumes and fertilizers.

Plant Life and Seeds-The uses that the plant makes of the soil and the air; the identification, growth and propagation of seeds.

Farm Crops—A study and cultivation of the commoner types.

Weeds-Identification and methods of eradication.

Fruits-A study of the commoner ones with reference to the planting, care and marketing.

Farm Animals—A study of the more common breeds; the types, their characteristics and uses. Special attention will be given to the dairy industry dealing with the principles in breeding for building up a graded herd; the care and feeding of cows for milk production; producing and marketing sanitary milk and milk products: dairy records: Babcock Test, etc.

Farm Birds-Special attention will be paid to Farm Poultry as a bi-industry for the farm woman and girl; the essentials of a poultry house; the care, feeding and methods of incubation.

Home and School Garden-The selection of simple but useful garden seeds and plants and the sowing, planting and cultivating and harvesting of same.

Home and School Grounds' Decoration-The principles of making the home and school grounds truly attractive by simple trees, shrubs, vines and flowers will also be considered.

The above topics will be considered in the class room, theoretically and then the theories will be put into actual practice in the Agricultural Laboratory, on the School Farm and Garden. Observation Trips will also be taken to nearby farms.

Each student will have a garden in which he will plant and care

for the commoner farm crops, vegetables and flowers.

A study will be made of the methods of study, organization and presentation of the subject matter. This will be adapted to the differ-

ent grades with special emphasis on developing in the child an interest in plant and animal life.

Discussion of methods of correlating Nature Study and Element-

ary Agriculture with other school work.

A study of Literature on Nature Study and Elementary Agriculture.

A number of lectures will be given in connection with this work. Public and farmers meetings will also be held.

Main Text Book-Warren.

Supplementary reference books in the Library will be used.

#### Latin

# PROF. STEWART MISS CORWIN

The Latin course is thorough and complete. It fits the student to teach the subject effectively anl also furnishes him with sufficient preparation to enter the best colleges and universities.

From the very beginning a comprehensive outline of the Grammar is required, as it is recognized that this is the rock foundation upon which to build in the study of the language. Particular attention is also given to the rendering of the Latin into good idiomatic English.

Throughout the entire course there is a careful drill in Orthography, Etymology, Syntax and Prosody. Roman History, Literature, and Mythology are also taught in connection with the regular required subjects and Latin prose composition is given in the Junior and Senior years. Indiviual instruction is given to each student and every effort made to render the course practical and helpful.

# Freshman Year

During this year there is a constant drill in the essentials of Latin. The declensions, conjugations, and the general rules of syntax are memorized and short sentences are translated from Latin into English and from English into Latin. Stories from Roman History and selected passages from Caesar are also read. The aim of the year is to prepare the student to read Caesar intelligently. "Pearson's Essentials of Latin" is the text book used.

# Sophomore Year

In the Sophomore year the first four books of Caesar are read; the text being "Caesar's Gallic War" by Harkness and Forbes. The aim is to enable the pupil to follow the narrative understandingly as well as to give him a systematic drill in all the common syntactical principles. Every move in Caesar's plan is carefully explained by means of maps and charts and thus interest is secured in this fascinating history and it is not regarded simply as a dull elementary drill book in Latin. Twenty lessons in writing Latin by Barss are also given.

#### Junior Year

The four Orations of Cicero against Catiline, The Defense of the Poet Archias, and the Manilian Law are read in the Junior year. The text is the New Cicero by Allen and Greenough. The course embraces not only the reading of the subjects assigned with a painstaking study of the Grammar; but also a study of Latin Oratory, Law, and Customs, without which an intelligent knowledge of Cicero cannot be secured. Twenty lessons in Writing Latin by Barss are also given.

#### Senior Year

The first six books of Virgil is the required work for this year. This is supplemented by a study of Mythology and Prosody. The text is the Aeneid of Greenough and Kittredge.

#### German

## MISS ALICE HUBER

The object of this department is to give the student an introduction to German. Special attention is given to the salient points in Grammar and the practical use of the spoken and written language.

In the first year, particular emphasis is laid on pronunciation, declension of nouns, conjugation of verbs, and on the essential principles of syntax.. The pupil is always encouraged to speak in German upon topics introduced in the translation and composition exercises. He is always obliged to answer in German, questions developed naturally from the subject matter of his daily lesson; he is led to frame such questions, that so far as possible and as early as possible, German may be spoken in the classroom.

The reading of the first year includes Joynes and Wesselhoeft's German Grammar, parts I and II; Gluck Auf; Bacon's Im Vaterland. Poems by the best writers are committed and some time is devoted to exercises in dictation.

The second year's work consists of composition, advanced grammar, Joynes and Wesselhoeft's Grammar, part III, and the reading of the following texts: Storm's Immensee, Ernstes und Heiteres, Tales of Modern German writers: Arnold's Fritz auf Ferien; Schiller's Wilhelm Tell.

# **Commercial Education**

#### PROF. LANTZ

During the coming year special work will be offered in Commercial branches. Considerable attention will be given to penmanship. All students will be required to write a legible hand before being graduated from the school.

# Physical Training PROF. SNYDER

The purpose of the Normal School is to prepare teachers. The Department of Physical Training atms in its field, to carry out this purpose, by offering a practical, systematic, graded course in corrective calisthenics, instruction in the use of apparatus, school room gymnastics and playground games.

The school maintains a well equipped gymnasium with all the necessary apparatus. The work of the first year is elementary in character and consists of Tactics, Calisthenics and simple exercises with wand and dumb bells. The second and third year students are instructed in advanced tactics, fancy marching, general calisthenics, advanced work with wands and instruction in exercises with the bar bells, Indian clubs and other apparatus.

The Seniors are given a course in graded games and school room gymnastics for use in the public schools. Note books are necessary for the work of this year.

Gymnasium costume for girls consists of a one-piece suit, black shoes and stockings. Boys' uniforms must be secured at the school and consist of Jersey, long trousers and white shoes. The department controls also the various forms of athletic activities—tennis, baseball, basketball and track. A splendid athletic field and four tennis courts are at the disposal of the students and everyone is urged to take part actively in one or other of the different branches of sport.

Every effort is made to provide diversion and recreation exercises for the girls. With that purpose in mind, lawn hockey has been added to the list of sports and a portion of the campus set apart for the playing of the game.

Constant efforts are being made to reach and maintain higher standards of excellence in the Pianoforte department.

The facilities for practice have been immensely improved during the past few years, by the addition of new pianos of standard make, and the gradual exchange of the old instruments for new, until now twelve pianos, all in good condition, are available.

The German method in technique as taught by Dr. Theo. Kullak, of the Royal Conservatory of Music, Berlin, is followed. As pianist, teacher and composer, Dr. Kullak is well known. Among some of his pupils were Melig, Adele Ous Der Ohe and William H. Sherwood.

# Vocal Music Department

#### MISS JONES

# Freshman Music—Required.

This is an elementary course. The requirements for completion include the ability to read at sight (using the Latin syllables) simple music of ordinary hymn tune difficulty; part singing; a thorough knowledge of the major scales and of the most common problems in tune and rhythm.

# Special Course—Elective.

The object of this course is to prepare students to teach music in the public schools. It includes the following courses:

# Advanced Sight Singing-

This course requires reading at sight (by syllable and words) music taught in the upper grades of the public schools. Knowledge of the suitability and use of material for the grades is also required.

# Methods-

This course is devoted to the study of material and methods for the first five years in music. The work of each year is taken up in detail, and the problems which confront the public school teacher are carefully discussed.

# Practice Teaching—

Students are required in the Methods class to demonstrate before the class their ability to teach. In addition opportunity will be given to do regular class room work in the Model School under the supervision of the Director of Music.

# Melody and Harmony-

This course includes melody writing in both major and minor keys; connection of triads in four voice writing; resolution of the dominant seventh.

In addition to the regular courses, an opportunity is given to those of marked musical ability to become members of one of the two Glee Clubs. The song singing in chapel twice a week also offers an opportunity to all for drill in sight singing and musical interpretation.

## Art

# MISS M. IRENE HUBER

The art course aims to develop an appreciation for the beautiful; to cultivate habits of observation, good judgment, good taste, neatness and originality of thought; to train the hand to delicacy, grace, and skill in execution.

Our main purpose, however, is to emphasize the professional side of this subject and train teachers to teach drawing intelligently in the grades under the guidance of a supervisor of drawing.

# Domestic Art and Science

## M. IRENE HUBER

It is the aim of this department to be practical. The subject is begun with a study of The Home—(a) Making a Home. (b) What Constitutes a Home? (c) Atmosphere

of the Home. (d) Life in the Home. (e) The Woman in the Home.

The House.—(a) Selection of the site, drainage and surroundings.

(b) Styles, plans and materials.

(c) Construction of Foundation, Cellar, Walls and Roof.

(d) Heating, lighting and plumbing.

(e) Furnishing and decorating with regard to sanitation, artistic value, utility and cost.

(f) Care of the house.

# Cooking

The aim is to teach the relation of food to the body; to give the principles of selection and preparation of food with a study of the composition of food, food values and combinations of kinds of food, including the making of menus with a view to attractive, wholesome and nourishing meals at moderate cost.

In the laboratory or kitchen of this department experience is given the students in ways of preparing food and in the common processes of cookery, as well as in the serving of meals. Careful attention is given to personal habits in the kitchen.

# Sewing

In this department the aim is to give a practical knowledge of the various stitches and seams used in articles made by hand, and includes at least one well made, nicely executed piece of hand work. Articles such as dainty aprons, combing jackets, and dainty waists are usually selected; these show plain hemming, hemstitching, rolled hems, and sewing on of lace as well as insertion of lace.

Following the hand work the use of the machine is taught in the making of simple garments. Cutting and fitting of simple garments are taught in this connection and such articles as under-garments, shirt waist and skirt or a simple one-piece dress are made. Lectures are given on dress as to economy, appropriate dressing, good taste and judgment in selection of materials, color and cut; on styles suited to figures and on the care of the wardrobe.

# **Manual Training**

# MR. VAN WHY

The course in this department offers a thorough drill in the working of different kinds of woods, a study of their structure and the necessity of applying their peculiarities of grain and texture to the advantage of the work in hand.

The school has provided a well-lighted and attractive shop, equipped with the best benches and tools, so that the students may perform their work with the utmost accuracy.

The first year work consists of joinery, elementary exercises and shop problems. A thorough study of the tools, their construction and application and how to charpen, adjust, and care for them is taken up. The reading and understanding of simple drawings and sketches is fully covered. A knowledge of mechanical drawing is not necessary to do

this work, but is very helpful.

In the Senior year the work is more difficult. The student is encouraged to design a good deal so that he may stimulate his creative faculties. He is required to make a drawing of an article of commercial value, then construct and finish it in the proper way. Students are given practice in estimating the quantity of material necessary for a piece of work; they are also taught how to economize in its use. Staining and finishing of woods are fully covered. Lectures on woodworking, finishing, and teaching are also given. The work is so arranged that the Seniors get experience in teaching manual training under the supervision of the teacher. Students are taken to visit the manufacturing plants in the town so they may see the use of pattern-making and woodworking.

Religious Societies

Our students are furnished excellent opportunities for spiritual growth and development. We have a prayer and lecture service every Wednesday evening, conducted by a member of the Faculty, to which all the students are invited. The service is attended by a large number of students and is full of interest and profit.

We have a Sabbath School organized among the stu-

dents. This service is held every Sabbath morning, and the exercises are highly appreciated and greatly enjoyed by the school. The school is divided into classes, each class being taught by a member of the Faculty. The International Lesson is used.

Students, unless excused by the Principal, are required to attend the church of their choice every Sabbath morning. The church attendance in connection with the religious services at the school, offers to them all the spiritual advantages that they would receive at their own homes. In all proper ways Christian influences are thrown around the pupil, making his school life to conform as nearly as possible to home life in a Christian family.

A Young Men's Christian Association and a Young Women's Christian Association have been formed among the students. These societies have been doing a great work for the growth of religious sentiment in the school. These associations are non-denominational in character.

# Literary Societies

Among the most valuable auxiliaries to a Normal School or College are its literary societies. The Normal and Philo mathean societies are strong, vigorous associations, and in their growth are keeping equal pace with the growth of the school. They meet in separate halls every Friday evening for the rendering of carefully prepared programs. These programs are highly entertaining and instructive, and those who take part in rendering them bestow ample labor and care on their preparation.

The Clio Society is a Spring term organization for new students. Its work is very helpful to the newly entered students.

# Reading Room

The Reading Room of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School is one of its most important features. All the prominent magazines, periodicals and many newspapers, daily and weekly, are found upon the shelves and on the files in the handsome room fitted up for library and reading-room purposes.

The students are encouraged to make good use of its privileges, and the results are most gratifying. A librarian is always in charge of the room when it is open, in order that perfect quiet may reign, and that the students may get the largest profit possible from their hours spent in the reading room. The student who has graduated from a Normal School without having acquired a taste for good literature, and a knowledge of how to read with the greatest profit, is but poorly equipped for the work of teaching.

## Library

A good library is absolutely essential to a modern upto-date school. The library of the Cumberland Valley State Normal School is in charge of skilled librarians who may be consulted by the students in the preparation of their class work, essays, orations, etc. The different departments are represented by a large number of carefully selected volumes covering every department from modern fiction to the most abtruse sciences. A book may be taken from the library and retained for two weeks. It may be renewed for an additional two weeks in case it is not sought for by another member of the school. One of the finest features of the library is its reference department.

#### General Remarks

Parents are earnestly requested not to have their sons or daughters absent themselves from school during term time more frequently than is absolutely necessary. Where it is necessary for students to visit their homes, the parents should see to it that the students do not miss classes in making such visits.

The school kitchen is in charge of a matron who is a skilled dietician. Food specially adapted to the needs of the student is provided and parents are requested not to send boxes of cooked eatables to students. Many cases of ill health are directly traceable to over-indulgence in food sent from home.

The authorities of the school will not, except in the case

of absolute necessity, call a student to the telephone during school or study hours. Such calls should be made before 8:15 a.m., between 12 noon and 1 o'clock p.m. and 3:15 and 7 p.m.

Parents some times complain that the expenses incurred by students are considerably in excess of those listed in the catalogue. There is no reason for such complaint, as every legitimate expense is plainly listed in the catalogue. Students, however, frequently persuade their parents to supply them with more money than should be given them. Bills for books, fees, and other legitimate expenses will always be furnished by the school when requested by parents.

'The Normal School Herald' is the official school publication. It is furnished free to students while they are in attendance at the school. The price to others is 25 cents a year. Alumni and former students are earnestly urged to subscribe and keep themselves in touch with the affairs at the school.

Students should provide themselves with towels, table napkins, an umbrella, overshoes, and bed room slippers. A costume suitable for use in the gymnasium and gymnasium slippers must be worn in the physical training classes. It is suggested that the gymnasium costume be secured after students have entered the school and have ascertained just what is needed.

Damage done to furniture and other school property is charged against the students responsible for it. Male students, both boarding and day, must make a deposit of \$2.50 to cover possible damages. This deposit will be returned when the student leaves school after deducting any charges against him.

The Cumberland Valley State Normal School is not a reformatory. Students who enter this school are supposed to come for the purpose of preparing themselves for their life work, and to be capable of self control. The disciplinary regulations are therefore, few and simple. Students who cannot abide by these regulations will be required to leave the institution.
