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

## THE PENNSYLVANIA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE AT SHIPPENSBURG

HIPPENSBURG is a town of five thousand population, forty-one miles south of Harrisburg, on the Pennsylvania Railroad. The Reading and the Western Maryland Railroads also serve the town.

It is in the center of the beautiful Cumberland Valley, a region famed in the history of the nation. Chambersburg, rich in historic interest, is 11 miles distant; while Carlisle is only twice as far away. Gettysburg, with its famous battlefield, is only thirty-five miles distant.

The Cumberland Valley is famous not only for its beauty and its historic associations, but it is one of the richest agricultural communities in the nation.

Shippensburg is an excellent school town. Its people are progressive, intelligent and devoted to the cause of education. The moral tone of the town is indicated by the fact that for more than twenty years prior to the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution there was not a licensed saloon in the town or within six miles of it. Twelve churches within the borough limits give spiritual instruction and inspiration to its people.

## THE COLLEGE

Formerly known as the Cumberland Valley State Normal School this institution first opened its doors to students April 15, 1873. The first class was graduated in 1874. For more than fifty years it continued to serve as a State Normal School, graduating students in both the two and three year courses, established during that period. In 1926, by authorization of the State Council of Education, four year courses based upon high school graduation were offered in the field of Junior High School and of supervision. In August, 1927, under the provision of legislative enactment, this institution became a college and its name was changed to the State Teachers College at Shippensburg.

The plant consists of the Administration Building, the Women's Dormitory, the Gymnasium, the Training School, the President's House, the Infirmary, the Laundry, the Carpenter Shop, the Disposal Plant and the Power Plant. A new Library Building has just been completed and a new Power Plant will be completed in a more appropriate location in the immediate future. A second athletic field

has been added to the facilities for Physical Education.

The Administration Building, recently renovated and remodeled, contains the President's, Bursar's, Dean's, and Registrar's Offices, Chapel, Recitation Rooms, Biological Laboratory, and the Dining Room. The second and third floors are used as Dormitories.

The Women's Dormitory is a beautiful homelike building, equipped with all modern conveniences. Its open court is the assembly

and lounging place for the boarding women students. The Basement contains the newly built Chemical and Biological Laboratories and a large Music Room. A recently erected addition provides more rooms, modern lavatories, rest rooms, fire towers, etc. The Men's Dormitory has been thoroughly renovated and is modern in its equipment. A new and thoroughly modern system of heating has been introduced. The lavatories, newly equipped with shower baths, are provided with everything needed for the comfort and convenience of the students.

## **EXPLANATORY REMARKS ON CURRICULA**

This publication will be sent to many high school graduates. Not all will be interested in its contents but among those who receive it there will be a large number who are anxious to choose a profession that gives opportunity for service with a fair emolument.

It is to these that this catalogue should make a special appeal. Pennsylvania needs new teachers every year. There are about five thousand one room schools in rural communities that need young men and women with a vision who have prepared themselves for the needs of our farm and mining folk. The demand for teachers who are qualified for these places is still far in advance of the supply.

The primary kindergarten course offers a splendid opportunity to young women who are fond of little children. The intermediate course will appeal to those who like to work with older children who must be trained in the subject matter of the elementary branches and taught how to make their knowledge effective.

The four year courses in Elementary Education carry with them the collegiate degree and fit for teaching, for supervision and for administration in the elementary schools. Two year courses in these fields are still available but steps are already begun to require four years of post high school preparation for any teaching position. But the two year certificate will continue to entitle its holder to teach in the elementary grades. The ambitious wide awake teacher will, however, push on to the completion of the four year course with its baccalaureate degree.

The four year courses will appeal to the young men and women who wish to prepare for teaching positions in the junior and senior high schools. The growth and development of high schools have been one of the outstanding educational marvels of the present time.

One community after another has fallen in line adopting the 3-3 high school plan. The qualifications for teaching in both junior and senior high schools are practically the same, demanding graduation from a four year college course with equal salaries.

There is no competition between the Teachers College and the Liberal Arts College. The former is a technical school training for teaching. It makes no appeal to students who desire a general course that will fit eventually for banking, law, medicine, dentistry, etc. Those who wish to take courses of that kind are advised to enter a liberal arts college and secure the preliminary training required for the professions indicated.

The State recognizes the need for trained teachers For this reason it offers free tuition (a state scholarship) to students who enter a State Teachers College.

## FEES, DEPOSITS, REPAYMENTS

#### A. FEES

## I. ENROLLMENT AND SERVICE FEE:

- (a) Regular term, \$20 each semester
- (b) Summer Session, \$15
- (c) A registration fee of \$5 per semester hour for off-campus instruction.

Except for (c) above, this fee covers registration and keeping record of students, library, athletics, lectures, entertainments, student welfare, health service, (other than extra nurse and quarantine), non-instructional personal service (as in gymnasium), laboratory, and the college paper.

#### II. DAMAGE FEE:

Students shall be responsible for damages, or breakage or loss, or delayed return of college property.

#### III. INFIRMARY FEE:

After three days in the college infirmary, the college shall charge an additional \$1.00 for each day.

Day students who may be admitted to the infirmary shall pay board at the rate of \$2.00 a day. This charge includes the regular nurse and regular medical service, but does not include special nurse or special medical service.

\*IV.

#### V. HOUSING FEE:

The housing rate for students shall be \$72 per one-half semester and \$48 for the Summer Session. This includes room, meals and limited laundry.

- (a) No reduction in the rate is to be made for laundry done at home nor for students who go home for a few days at a time.
- (b) A student may, at the discretion of the President of the college, occupy a double room alone by paying an additional \$36.00 a semester or \$12.00 for the Summer Session.

- 2. Housing rate for employes other than those included in the State Classification schedule (Faculty, clerks, etc.) shall be \$10.00 per week.
- 3. The rate for transient meals shall be: Breakfast \$.40; Lunch \$.40; Dinner \$.50. (The charge for room and board includes furniture, bedding, light and heat. Each room accommodates two students. All rooms are provided with single beds for each student.)

#### VI. TUITION FEE:

Students whose residence is out of the State shall be charged a fee of \$105 per semester; \$35 per summer session. (It is understood that this fee has been operative since June 1, 1929, for entering students only.)

4. The charge for private lessons in music in the State Teachers College not maintaining the special music curriculum shall be fixed as follows: The Board of Trustees of a State Teachers College not offering the special curriculum in music may, subject to the approval of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, enter into contract with individuals to give private lessons in music in order to afford an opportunity for students to continue their musical education. Such agreement shall provide reasonable reimbursement to the institution for any services or overhead supplied by the institution.

#### VIII. DEGREE FEE:

A fee of \$5.00 shall be paid by each candidate for a degree.

## IX. RECORD TRANSCRIPT FEE:

One dollar (\$1.00) shall be charged for the second and each subsequent transcript of records.

#### X. DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS:

No student shall be enrolled, graduated, or receive a transcript of his record until all previous charges have been paid.

## B. DEPOSITS

## I. ADVANCE ROOM RESERVATION DEPOSIT

(Dormitory Students):

A deposit of \$10 shall be made by prospective dormitory students when they request room reservations. This is a guarantee of the intention of a student to enter college for the term or semester designated. It is deposited with the Revenue Department, to the credit of the student's housing fee. If, however, the student notifies the college three weeks before the opening of college that he is unable to enter, the repayment will be made through the Department of Revenue, on application from the student through the college authorities. If notice is not thus given the deposit cannot be returned.

Check or money order for this account must be drawn to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

## II. ADVANCE ENROLLMENT DEPOSIT (Day Students):

Day students desiring to reserve advance enrollment shall deposit \$10. This is a guarantee of the intention of the student to enter college for the term or semester designated. It is deposited with the Revenue Department, to the credit of the student's Enrollment and Service fee. If, however, the student notifies the college three weeks before the opening of college that he is unable to enter, the repayment will be made through the Department of Revenue, on application from the student through the college authorities. If notice is not thus given the deposit cannot be returned.

Check or money order for this account must be drawn to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

## C. NO OTHER FEES OR DEPOSITS PERMITTED

No fees or deposits, other than as specified in the preceding sections may be charged by a State Teachers College.

## D. REPAYMENTS

## I. REPAYMENTS WILL NOT BE MADE:

. To students who are temporarily suspended, indefinitely suspended, dismissed, or who voluntarily withdraw from College.

2. For any part of the enrollment or service fee for any

cause whatsoever.

II. A repayment will be made for personal illness, the same being certified to by an attending physician, or for such other reasons as may be approved by the Board of Trustees for the amount of the fees paid by the student for the part of the semester which the student does not spend in College.

III. The Advance Room Reservation Deposit or the Advance Enrollment Deposit will be returned to students provided they notify the college not less than three weeks before the opening of the semester or term of their intention not to attend. (No deductions will be made on account of absence during the last weeks of a term or during the first two weeks.)

(Day students will pay only enrollment and service fee).

The State of Pennsylvania furnishes free tuition to all students residing in Pennsylvania, who sign an agreement binding themselves to teach in the public schools of the State for at least two years.

In addition to the expenses especially listed in this catalogue the average student will require, for books, gymnasium costume, any incidental expense including personal toilet articles, student organization dues and insignia, not less than \$50 a semester.

## TEACHERS COLLEGE AND NORMAL SCHOOL CERTIFICATES FOR TEACHERS IN SERVICE

The following conditions apply only to those persons who have taught in Pennsylvania public schools prior to July 1, 1922. (No Credit will be given toward the completion of the entrance requirements or of the regular normal school course for teaching done after July 1, 1922.)

The sixteen units of high school work required for entrance to the State Teacher Colleges may be earned in approved high schools, summer schools, extension classes, correspondence study in institutions approved by the Department of Public Instruction, and by tutoring under approved conditions.

Whenever a teacher has earned the credits necessary for entrance to a State Teachers College in any of the above ways or by any combination of them, four semester hours of credit on a regular State Teachers College curriculum may be granted for each year of teaching experience in Pennsylvania with a rating of "middle or better" subsequent to meeting the entrance conditions up to a maximum of thirty-two semester hours, provided, however, that all credits thus given shall be conditional until the teacher shall have proved his ability to do the work of the State Teachers College curriculum in a creditable manner.

In all cases in which College credit is given for teaching experience, the work remaining to be done shall be selected by the authorities of the College to secure the best development of the student in teaching power.

A minimum of one-half year of resident study shall be required of all candidates for graduation who are credited for teaching experience as outlined above.

Entrance and normal school credits based on teaching experience as outlined above will not be granted after September 1, 1927.

Credit for student teaching other than that done under the direction of the College shall not be approved.

Credit toward entrance or toward graduation with a degree will not be allowed for experience in teaching.

Credit for correspondence courses will be given in the two-year courses provided such courses were completed prior to September 1, 1927.

A maximum of twenty semester hours credit for extension and correspondence courses completed prior to September 1, 1927 may be allowed in the two-year courses.

Not more than twenty semester hours of extension work will be credited toward the requirements of any one of the four-year curricula.

## REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Admission to a State Teachers College will be made on the basis of the following controlling principles:

1. General scholarship as evidenced by graduation from an approved four-year high school or institution of equivalent grade or equivalent preparation as determined by the Credentials Division of the Department of Public Instruction and ranking in the upper half

2nn Ind of the class at graduation. Candidates for admission who lack this rank at graduation will be required to present further evidence of fitness.

- a. Applicants ranking in the upper half of their graduating class in high school will be admitted on certificate withcut further evidence of general scholarship.
- b. Applicants who do not rank in the upper half of the graduating class may be admitted on probation, provided:
  - They are recommended by their high school principal as being able to do creditable college work, and
  - 2. Appraisal of the detailed high school record indicates to admission authorities of the college that the candidate can do satisfactory college work, and
  - A rating satisfactory to the institution is made on a scholastic aptitude test administered at the college.

Applicants satisfactorily meeting requirements 1, 2, and 3 above will be admitted for one semester on probation. At the end of the probationary period such students will be required to withdraw from the college unless they meet the required standard of scholarship in at least nine (9) semester hours of work.

- 2. Integrity and appropriate personality as shown by an estimate by secondary school officials of the candidate's trustworthiness, initiative, industry, social adaptability, personal appearance and sympathy.
- 3. Health, physical vigor, emotional stability, absence of physical defects that would interfere with the successful performance of the duties of a teacher and absence of predisposition toward ill health as determined by a medical examination at the college.
  - a. All applicants for admission shall present a certificate of examination signed by a physician legally qualified to practice medicine in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Forms for this examination will be furnished by the college. This medical examination will be checked by the examining physician at the college and students may be required to undergo a complete reexamination.
  - b. Applicants may be rejected for the following reasons:
    - 1. Incurable defects or diseases as of the heart, lungs, kidneys, digestive system, nervous system including hysteria, epilepsy, nervous instability, skin organs of the special senses, thyroid.
    - 2. Defective vision of marked degree.
    - 3. Permanently impaired hearing.
    - 4. Marked speech defects.

5. Unsightly deformities.

6. Marked obesity.

Students with remedial defects will be accepted on condition that immediate treatment be undertaken for the removal of these defects.

- 4. A personal interview with particular attention to personality, speech habits, social presence, expressed interests of the applicant and promise of professional development.
  - a. The personal interview is to serve two purposes:
    - It is to give the examining committee of the college an opportunity to select from the applicants for admission those persons who give promise of becoming desirable teachers.
    - It is to take an inventory of the personal characteristics of the applicants who are admitted, making this inventory available to instructors and officers concerned with personnel work in the college.
  - b. The interview will be conducted at the college or at other places and at times designated by the President of the college.

## CURRICULA

## REQUIREMENTS RELATING TO STUDENTS IN ALL CURRICULA


- 1. All students are required to take part, without credit, in one extra-curricular activity for one semester each year.
- 2. No candidate for a teachers college diploma shall receive more than twenty semester hours of credit toward graduation for work done in extension classes. No credit will be given for correspondence work or extension work taken after September 1, 1927, for a normal school certificate.

## CREDENTIALS RECEIVED UPON GRADUATION

The completion of the 68 required semester hours in a two-year curriculum entitles the students who meet all other legal requirements to the Normal Certificate which is a valid state license to teach in the elementary schools for two years. On the completion of two years of successful teaching, the Normal Certificate is made into the Normal Diploma which is a valid life license to teach in the elementary schools of Pennsylvania.

The completion of a four-year curricula for the preparation of elementary teachers entitles the student to the degree of B. S. in Education and a Provisional College Certificate, which after three years of successful teaching and the earning of six additional semes-

ter hours of prescribed credit, becomes a life license to teach, super-

vise or serve as principal in the elementary field.

Upon the completion of the four-year curriculum for the preparation of secondary teachers the student is entitled to the degree of B. S. in Education, and a Provisional College Certificate, which authorizes the holder to teach in any public Junior or Senior High School any subject in which he has earned 18 or more semester hours of credit and the subjects of the Elementary Curriculum in the seventh and eighth grades. After three years of successful teaching and the earning of six additional semester hours of prescribed credit, a life license in the foregoing field is awarded.

#### TWO-YEAR CURRICULA

Two-year students must select one of the following curricula. Each curriculum prepares for a specific type of teaching position.

GROUP I. Kindergarten-Primary—for teachers of Kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and 3.

GROUP II. Intermediate grades—for teachers of grades 4, 5 and 6.

GROUP III. Rural-for teachers of rural schools.

The work of the first semester is the same for all students in the two year curricula. A large purpose of the work of the first semester is to acquaint students with the requirements for successful teaching in the different grades so that they may be able to decide intelligently in what grade or grades they prefer to teach. The course entitled "Introduction to Teaching" which includes observation and participation in the training school is especially designed to aid students in a wise selection of a curriculum.

At the end of the first semester students who expect to remain only two years in the Teachers College are asked to select one of the first three curricula for the purpose of specializing in a specific field of teaching. The work of each curriculum must be completed in its entirety. Students may be granted the privilege of changing from one curriculum to another only on condition that the prescribed courses of any curriculum so selected must be completed before a certificate of graduation is granted.

## DEGREE CURRICULA IN THE ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY FIELDS

Adopted by the Board of Teachers College Presidents and Approved April 29, 1931

- 1. During the past year the Board of Teachers College Presidents adopted new four-year curricula for the preparation of teachers in the fields of Kindergarten-Primary, Intermediate, Rural, and Secondary Education. These lead to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education and the College Provisional Certificate in the appropriate field.
- 2. Graduates of the two-year Primary or Intermediate curriculum who return to complete requirements for the degree will have their former credits evaluated for the field in which each wishes to secure his degree.

3. All persons who have completed the work of the two-year Kindergarten-Primary or Intermediate curriculum are admitted to junior standing for a degree, provided they are graduates of an approved, four-year high school. The exact number of hours credit granted will depend upon the curriculum which the student has completed and the one in which he wishes to secure his degree. Those who became candicates for the degree in the elementary field will secure two full years' credit but those who transfer to the secondary field will lose some credit, usually from four to ten hours.

4. All credits for work less than that required at a State Normal School for graduation between September, 1920, and September, 1926, shall be evaluated by multiplying the number of semester hours al-

ready earned by .85.

5. All persons who were graduated from a State Normal School prior to September, 1920, and who have had a four-year high school preparation, cannot be awarded more than 68 semester hours of credit

for their normal school work prior to graduation.

6. Students who were graduated from the State Normal Schools before four years of high school preparation was required, and who still lack this requirement, may apply to the Credentials Bureau, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, for a high school equivalent certificate, which, when issued by the Credentials Bureau, will be accepted by the State Teachers Colleges as equivalent to graduation from a four-year high school and all credits earned at a State Normal School prior to September, 1926, will be evaluated as indicated above.

7. Former graduates of a two or three-year curriculum at the State Teachers College, Shippensburg, and who became candidates for a degree from this school, must do at least one-half the work required beyond previous graduation at Shippensburg. An amount up to one-half the required work may be transferred from other accredited schools provided the courses pursued are the same or equivalent

to the required courses here.

## FOUR-YEAR ELEMENTARY CURRICULA

For those students who desire to teach after two years of residence on a "limited certificate" 6 semester hours of student teaching will be substituted in place of American Government and Literature I.

## SUMMER SESSION

## June 20, 1932 to July 30, 1932

A six weeks' Summer term will open June 20. This session will give opportunity to teachers in service to prepare for the State Standard Certificate. The courses offered will be those approved by the Department of Public Instruction for the renewal of the Partial or for the Standard Certificate. Courses will be offered also in the advanced two year curriculum and the four year courses.

Advanced courses in English, Social Studies, Mathematics, Science, Foreign Languages, School Measurements and School Administration will be offered to graduates of the two and the three year courses and the holders of Standard or State Permanent Certificates.

A bulletin is available giving a detailed description of the summer school.

## COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

#### ART

ART 1. Elementary Industrial Art. The handling of the various media such as paper, cardboard, clay, weaving, basketry materials, thin wood, and develops an appreciation of art in every day life. 2 semester hours. Miss I. Huber.

ART II. Elementary Drawing, Design, and Color. Gives experience and develops skill in handling media used in public schools (such as pencil, crayon, watercolors, ink, cut paper, blackboard); gives opportunity for creative expression, establishes principles. 2 semester hours. Miss I. Huber, Miss Marston.

ART III. Theory and Practice. Emphasizes the presentation of the various subjects in the field of Art Education, including adaptation of problems to various grades, discussions of courses of study, sources of reference material and supplies. 1½ semester hours. Miss I. Huber, Mis Marston.

HISTORY AND APPRECIATION OF ART. Develops sensitiveness to art by cultivating aesthetic appreciation. Chief periods in history and development of art are studied and traced in the life and art of today. 2 semester hours. Miss I. Huber.

#### BIOLOGY

SCIENCE I (BIOLOGY.) This course is intended to equip the student with certain biological concepts. The study of the cells, both plant and animal, and their combinations as represented in organs, together with their development and reproduction as well as their irritability makes up a large part of the course. 3 semester hours. Mr. Shearer, Mr. Dibert.

BOTANY I. This course mainly emphasizes the structure and physiology of seed-bearing plants. Economic values of plants, weeds, some aspects of forestry, taxonomy and local ecology are briefly considered. 3 semester hours. Mr. Shearer.

BOTANY II. This course presents a survey of the plant kingdom by studying typical representatives of all the subdivisions of all groups—phyla. The course stresses largely the development and reproduction side of the work. 3 semester hours. Mr. Shearer.

ZOOLOGY I. This course provides for a general study of the animal kingdom. Typical representatives from the most varied phyla are considered. A number of the invertebrate types are chosen and work is terminated by a careful study of the frog. The morphological aspect is emphasized. 3 semester hours. Mr. Shearer.

ZOOLOGY II. The invertebrate phyla omitted in the first course are studied and then efforts are centered upon the Chordata. Anatomy, physiology and ecology are taken into account. 3 semester hours. Mr. Shearer.

SCIENCE III (NATURE STUDY.) A study is made of the common trees, flowers, insects, birds, and animals. The course aims to give not only subject matter but appreciations, habits of observation, and an understanding of how the work may be presented to the children. 2 semester hours. Mr. Krebs.

#### CHEMISTRY

GENERAL COLLEGE CHEMISTRY. This course is intended to give the student a thorough knowledge of the fundamental principles, laws and theories of chemical action. A detailed study will be made of the chief non-metals and their more important compounds. Special attention will be given to equations, calculations, and the theory of precipitation. 6 semester hours. Mr. Wright.

QUALITATIVE ANALYSIS. This course is designed to acquaint the student with the theory and principles by which the common metals and acids are identified. A detailed study will be made of ionization, mass action and other fundamental theories. Sufficient mixtures will be analyzed to make the student familiar with the characteristics of the ions. 3 semester hours. Mr. Wright.

### **EDUCATION**

KINDERGARTEN-PRIMARY THEORY. The fundamental purpose of this course is to increase the understanding of child development during the pre-school age through directed observation of Kindergarten age children. Special attention is given to the educational principles and aims of the earlier Kindergarten educators in comparison with the present day theories and practices. 2 semester hours. Mis Oyer.

TEACHING OF PRIMARY SUBJECTS. This is a composite course including the best modern primary methods in the teaching of spelling, language and social studies in grades 1, 2 and 3. 3 semester hours. Miss Nora Kieffer.

TECHNIQUE OF TEACHING. This course accompanies student teaching and must reinforce it at every point. It includes lesson planning; types of teaching with their respective techniques; the trend toward individual instruction; socialized school activities; marking systems, records and reports. 2 semester hours. Miss A. Huber, Miss H. Kieffer, Miss Cunningham, Miss Willoughby.

PROBLEMS OF JUNIOR AND SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL. A study of the aims, purposes and development of secondary education; the program of studies and the methods best suited to the needs of these pupils; the qualification of teachers; the high school buildings; and the cost of maintaining secondary schools. 3 semester hours. Miss A. Huber.

HISTORY AND PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION. In this course the historical development of our generally accepted educa-

tional concepts and practices are traced, with the major emphasis upon recent developments. 4 semester hours. Mr. Burkholder.

INTRODUCTION TO TEACHING. (2 year curricula.) Essentially an orientation course, and includes a non-technical study of the problems and topics confronting the beginning student of education and teaching. 3 semester hours. Mr. Burkholder.

INTRODUCTION TO TEACHING (4 year curriculum). This is essentially an orientation course in education. Attention is given to (1) how to study with diagnosis of special problem cases, (2) the general field of education with special study of various fields open to teachers and the requirements of same. 3 semester hours. Miss N. Kieffer, M. Gardelder.

PSYCHOLOGY I. This course consists of a basic course in general psychology, a clear idea of the developmental periods from birth to maturity with emphasis upon child psychology or adolescent phychology depending upon the field in which the student is to teach. 3 semester hours. Mr. Burkholder, Miss N. Kieffer.

PSYCHOLOGY II. An advanced course for all four year students. Its purpose is to familiarize the student with the knowledges, methods, and techniques of applying the laws and principles of psychology to educational situations. 3 semester hours. Miss Leutsker.

EDUCATIONAL TESTS AND MEASUREMENTS. This is a practical course in which the student gains knowledge, attitudes, habits, and skill for the purpose of carrying on all of the steps in a balanced testing program in the field in which he intends to teach. 2 semester hours. Miss Leutsker.

VISUAL EDUCATION. This is a course on the background for, and the use of, Visual and other Sensory aids in the school room. These aids include the School Journey, Objects-Specimens-Models, Pictorial Materials, Projection Machinery of still and motion type, Blackboard and Bulletin Board, and Radio. 1 semester hour. Mr. Krebs.

#### **ENGLISH**

ENGLISH 1. A course in the rudiments of English grammar and in the use of correct English. The work is based upon the needs of the students as discovered in their written composition and in their speech. 3 semester hours. Miss Blood, Miss Lipscomb, Mr. Mark, Mr. Harlan.

ENGLISH II. A more advanced course in composition writing designed for students who have completed English I. 3 semester hours. Miss Blood, Miss Lipscomb, Mr. Mark, Mr. Harlan.

ENGLISH III. This involves the journalistic approach to composition. The class studies the commoner types of newspaper and magazine writing. Abundant practice is given in the composition of articles of considerable length. The content of the course is related to procedures in school journalism. 3 semester hours. Mr. Harlan.

ENGLISH ACTIVITIES. The purpose of this course is (1) to acquaint students with intelligent and efficient methods of using library tools; (2) to develop pleasing, well-modulated voices and the ability to meet adequately the usual demands for informal speaking; (3) to develop skill in parliamentary practice; (4) to acquaint students with good plays for children and methods of producing them that will be both simple and practicable. 3 semester hours. Mrs. Lipscomb.

INTRODUCTION TO ENGLISH LITERATURE. A study of the major types of prose and poetry by means of discussion, reports, and analysis. 3 semester hours. Mr. Mark.

INTRODUCTION TO AMERICAN LITERATURE. A study of types from Colonial times to the present by means of discussion, reports, and analysis. 3 semester hours. Mr. Mark.

PHILOLOGY AND ENGLISH GRAMMAR. An outline of the history and development of the English language with a brief survey of historical grammar and review of the principles and methods involved in the study of grammar. 3 semester hours. Dr. Beardwood.

SPEECH PROBLEMS. A course designed to equip prospective teachers with the knowledge and technique necessary to recognize and correct speech defects. 2 semester hours. Mrs. Lipscomb.

TEACHING OF ENGLISH (2 year curricula). This is a course in which the students are given: (1) a review of English fundamentals with a view to teaching them in the elementary grades; (2) a systematic survey of courses of study in English with a careful study of the Pennsylvania course of study; (3) a presentation and discussion of the various modern methods of teaching English; (4) an opportunity to observe demonstration lessons in the Training School. 3 semester hours. Mrs. Lipscomb.

SHORT STORY. This course gives students a wide acquaintance with stories, an understanding of short story technique, the ability to select worth-while stories, and an appreciation of the short story for cultural and recreational reading. It also gives the student the opportunity of trying his own skill in writing short stories. 3 semester hours. Miss Lipscomb.

MODERN NOVEL. A study of the modern novel in England. This course begins with the work of Meredith and Hardy, and includes the writing of the younger novelists of the present time. 3 semester hours. Miss Blood.

CONTEMPORARY POETRY. A study of British and American poetry of the Twentieth Century. 3 semester hours. Miss Blood.

SHAKESPEARE. Plays typical of the author's various dramatic periods are studied. There is a core of intensive reading in class, with extensive reading for report. Initial consideration is given to the social and dramatic background of the author. Information derived from the course is related to the consideration of high school Shakespearean plays. 3 semester hours. Mr. Harlan.

PRE-SHAKESPEAREAN LITERATURE. This course stresses the reading of Beowulf in modern English translation; the reading of Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales" and "Troylus and Criseyde"; the reading of portions of Spencer's "The Faerie Queene." 3 semester hours. Mr. Mark.

VICTORIAN PROSE AND POETRY. This course deals with the writings of the greater Victorian poets and essayists; it stresses the trends of Victorian thought as found in the literature of the age. 3 semester hours. Miss Blood.

FOREIGN CLASSICS. A reading course designed to acquaint the students with great writings by foreign masters. 3 semester hours. Mr. Harlan.

### FRENCH

FRENCH I, A & B. A study of late nineteenth century and contemporary French literature with a thorough review of the fundamentals of French grammar and pronunciation. Methods and problems involved in the teaching of French are discussed. 6 semester hours. Dr. Beardwood.

FRENCH II, A. French literature to the end of the Classical Age. An outline of the origin and development of the French language and literature through the Rennaissance as an introduction to a detailed study of the Seventeenth Century. Development of the student's working knowledge of the French language. 3 semester hours. Dr. Beardwood.

FRENCH II, B. Eighteenth Century Literature. The Literature of the Eighteenth Century and practice in writing and speaking French with discussion of the problems involved in the teaching of French. 3 semester hours. Dr. Beardwood.

FRENCH III, A. The Romantic Movement in French Literature. A study of French Romanticism and continued work in speaking and writing French with discussion of problems involved in the teaching of French. 3 semester hours. Dr. Beardwood.

FRENCH III, B. The Realistic Movement in French Literature. A study of French Realism and continued work in speaking and writing French with discussion of problems involved in the teaching of French. 3 semester hours.

## **GEOGRAPHY**

PRINCIPLES OF GEOGRAPHY. Emphasis is laid on the interrelations between the physical and cultural landscape. The important geographic factors, such as, climate, soil, minerals, water bodies, topography, and natural vegetation are discussed in detail. This course also includes the fundamental principles of mathematical geography. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

WORLD PROBLEMS IN GEOGRAPHY. This course deals with

the geographic, economic, and historical factors affecting the political relations of the world since the World War. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

ECONOMIC GEOGRAPHY. Economic Geography is a course dealing with economic and commercial activities of man from the geographic standpoint. It includes a systematic study of the agricultural, industrial and commercial relations of the world with special stress upon the United States. 3 semester hours. Mr. Krebs, Mr. Allan.

GEOGRAPHY OF UNITED STATES AND CANADA. This course is a regional treatment of the continent of North America based on the natural geographic regions with a study of man's varied adjustments to the conditions in each region. Emphasis is also placed on the problem of conservation of our natural resources. 3 semester hours. Mr. Krebs.

GEOGRAPHY OF LATIN AMERICA. The course on Latin America is a regional study stressing the inter-relationship between the physical and cultural landscape. Each geographic region is studied to complete the understandings of the economic relations between the countries of North and South America. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

GEOGRAPHY OF EUROPE. A general picture showing the inter-relationship between the physical and cultural background is stressed in the first part of the course on Europe. The second part deals with the economic and political problems of each country in the light of their geographic environment. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

GEOGRAPHY OF THE PACIFIC REALM. The course deals with the geography of the countries of the Pacific Basin. Special emphasis is laid on Australia, the Islands of the Pacific, and the countries of Asia bordering the Pacific. The economic and political relations of the Orient and Occident are stressed continually. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

PHYSIOGRAPHY. This course has been designed to give the student an appreciation of the Earth's modifying agents. The major topics discussed are as follows: Weathering, Wind, Ground Water, Running Water, Ice, Vulcanism, Diastrophism, Wave Action, and Currents. The course includes a brief study of Meteorology and Climatology. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

CLIMATOLOGY. This course is divided into Elementary Meterology and Climatology. The important classifications of climate are studied with their bases for classification. Plant and animal responses are studied in the light of their climatic environment. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

GEOGRAPHIC INFLUENCES IN AMERICAN HISTORY. A geographic interpretation of the economic, social and political development of the United States is emphasized. 3 semester hours. Mr. Allan.

TEACHING OF GEOGRAPHY (Two-year curricula). This course presents material and methods for teaching Geography. In it are developed representative units from the State Course of Study to show the relation between life activities and natural environmental conditions, the essential facts and principles involved, states of development and forms of expression work. 3 semester hours. Mr. Krebs.

## HISTORY

HISTORY OF CIVILIZATION. An orientation course surveying ancient and medieval cultures in their relation to the present. The course attempts to give the student an understanding of present-day civilization and his relation to it through a study of its origins in early times. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

EARLY EUROPEAN HISTORY. This course, following the one in History of Civilization traces the history of Europe from 1500 to 1815. It is intended to provide an European background for the study of American History and for recent European and World History. 3 semester hours. Mrs. Stewart.

MODERN EUROPEAN HISTORY. European History since 1815. Emphasis is laid upon events and conditions that show the development of European peoples and their institutions during the past century. It attempts to give a world viewpoint and a basis for the understanding and interpretation of contemporary events of world importance. 3 semester hours. Mrs. Stewart.

UNITED STATES HISTORY I. A survey course in American History to 1865 designed for elementary teachers. Social, cultural and biographical materials will receive special emphasis. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

UNITED STATES HISTORY II. A continuation of U.S. History I covering the period from 1865 to the present. The work will be professionalized with special reference to the needs of elementary teachers. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

AMERICAN HISTORY TO 1865 (Secondary Curriculum.) After a brief introduction to the Colonial Period treated as a phase of European History, the course will stress the important economic, social and political movements from 1763 to 1865. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

SOCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL HISTORY OF THE U.S. After a brief review of the Agricultural Era, the emphasis of this course will be upon the Industrialization of American life after the Civil War to the present, and its effects upon our cultural and political life and upon our relations with foreign powers. An advanced course for Junior and Senior H.S. teachers. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

TEACHING OF THE SOCIAL STUDIES. This course, for twoyear students, presents a detailed study of important events in U. S. History, and some of the problems that arise in teaching history, civics and current events. Discussion and practice teaching are given as each important phase of the subject matter is completed. 3 semester hours. Mrs. Stewart.

### LATIN

LIVY—BOOKS XXI and XXII. The chief object is to stimulate students and aid them in forming the habit of reading Latin as Latin, of apprehending thought in its Latin form and sequence, and of entering with intelligent sympathy into the workings of Livy's mind and his conception of his country's history and destiny. 3 semester hours. Mr. Stewart.

HORACE. The Odes, Epodes and Epistles. Special attention is paid to the lyric metres used by Horace, to the mythological references contained in his works. 3 semester hours. Mr. Stewart.

TERENCE—THE ROMAN COMEDY PHORMIO. Attention is given to the development of Roman Comedy, the relation of Terence's play to their Greek prototypes and the influence of the Roman comedy upon the drama of Italy, France, Germany and England. 3 semester hours. Mr. Stewart.

TEACHING OF LATIN. This course considers special problems of the teacher of Latin. It embraces discussion of methods of teaching, preparation of the teacher, textbooks and works of reference. 3 semester hours. Mr. Stewart.

CICERO, DE SENECTUTE, with a critical analysis of the essay; attention is paid to the philosophical discussion presented by Cicero. 3 semester hours. Mr. Stewart.

### **MATHEMATICS**

ARITHMETIC I. The purpose of this course is (1) to professionalize the subject matter of Arithmetic (2) to enlarge the student's concepts, appreciations and understanding of the various important topics in grades 1 to 4 inclusive. 3 semester hours. Mr. Grove, Miss N. Kieffer.

ARITHMETIC II. This course is a continuation of Arithmetic I with special emphasis on the work of grades 5 to 8 inclusive. Some work in intuitive geometry, the graph and the formula is included. 3 semester hours. Mr. Grove, Miss N. Kieffer.

MATHEMATICS I, II, III, IV, V. Mathematical Analysis. A practical unified course in Algebra, Trigonometry, Analytic Geometry, Differential and Integral Calculus. Though the courses are spiral in nature, Mathematics I and II stress algebra and trigonometry; Mathematics III gives emphasis to analytic geometry; Mathematics IV, to differential calculus, and Mathematics V, to integral calculus. 3 semester hours. Prof. Grove.

MATHEMATICS VI. Mathematics in the Junior and Senior High School. It is devoted to the setting up of the mathematical topics that are to be studied in the Junior and Senior high schools and the development of the procedures for teaching the same. The particular difficulties encountered by students in these grades and suitable types of remedial teaching are stressed. 3 semester hours. Prof. Grove.

MATHEMATICS VII. The function concept is the central notion of the course. The following topics are included: History of Algebra, number system of Algebra, constant variables, graphs, theory of equations, mathematical induction, progressions, infinite series, logarithms, compound interest, and determinants. Elementary algebra is reviewed as found advisable throughout the course. 3 semester hours. Prof. Grove.

MATHEMATICS VIII. Introduction to the Theory of Statistics. The purpose of the course is to give the student a general survey of the field of elementary statistics and a mastery in using the same in the fields of psychology, education, and social studies. It includes: Tabulation and classification of data, graphs, measures of central tendency, quartiles and percentiles, dispersion, the normal curve, reliability and correlation. 3 semester hours. Prof. Grove.

### MUSIC

MUSIC I. This course provides musical experience through the study of rote songs, sight singing by syllables, elementary theory and dictation. The material is applicable to grades one, two and three. 2 semester hours. Miss Randall, Mr. Avery.

MUSIC II. Pre-requisite, Music I. This course is differentiated to meet the school needs of prospective primary, intermediate and rural teachers. A study of the materials and methods suited to each group forms the basis of the course. 1½ semester hours. Miss Randall, Mr. Avery.

HISTORY AND APPRECIATION OF MUSIC. Emphasis is laid on the hearing of much music. A limited number of compositions representing the outstanding forms of music and their special periods are studied. Music history and biographies of composers supplement the course instead of forming its basis. 2 semester hours. Miss Randall.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION

PERSONAL HYGIENE AND NUTRITION. This course will acquaint the prospective teacher with the fundamental health habits, attitudes and knowledge supporting his own health practices and those of the children he will teach; also the various methods and principles of teaching health. 3 semester hours. Miss Robb.

SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY HYGIENE. This course will acquaint the prospective teacher with the modern conception of public health as applied to the school and community and with the various agencies assisting in maintaining high standards of healthful living. 3 semester hours. Miss Robb, Mr. Dresser.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION I & II (Elementary.) This course will acquaint the prospective teacher with the modern conception of Physical Education, with the methods and principles of teaching and give adequate time for orientation followed by a program of various activities suitable for all grades. 2 semester hours. Miss Henderson, Mr. Dresser.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION III & IV (Elementary). This course will be a continuation of Physical Education I & II with guidance in planning and actual teaching of lessons. 2 semester hours. Miss Robb, Mr. Dresser.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION I (Secondary). This course is to familiarize the student with the popular games of schools and to encourage participation in games through the acquisition of ability, proper attitudes, and appreciation of play. 1 semester hour. Miss Henderson, Mr. Dresser.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION II (Secondary). This course is to develop skill in teaching; games for the playground and the gymnasium, mass athletics, athletic competitive games, and the state course of study. Instruction in preparing a school program with varying facilities, age grouping, and physical needs and limitations. 1 semester hour. Miss Robb, Mr. Dresser.

### PHYSICAL SCIENCES

SCIENCE II. This is an orientation course. The work is largely confined to geology, astronomy, physics and chemistry, giving the student an appreciative and understanding background of the scientific world. 3 semester hours. Mr. Shearer.

PHYSICS I. Detailed study of the subject matter taught in high school Physics including mechanics and heat. Demonstrations, discussions and laboratory experiments. 3 semester hours. Mr. Dibert.

PHYSICS II. Electricity, magnetism, sound and light. Recent developments in the field of Physics. 3 semester hours. Mr. Dibert.

### POLITICAL SCIENCE

CIVIC EDUCATION. This course deals with the program of character education and civic education being introduced in the elementary grades. The last weeks of the course are devoted to instruction in state and local government as a background for the teaching of civics. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT. A brief study of the general concepts and principles of government, followed by a detailed study of the structure, organization and working of the American National Government, with emphasis upon the actual functioning of the present-day government organisms. 3 semester hours. Dr. Valentine.

PRINCIPLES AND PROBLEMS OF POLITICAL SCIENCE. A study of principles of government to understand the nature of the problems of modern government. A number of problems and proposed solutions are studied, such as judicial reform, public finance, public ownership and international relations. 3 semester hours. Dr. Valentine.

### READING

THE TEACHING OF PRIMARY READING. This course covers the aims, principles, materials and methods of teaching reading in the first three grades. Theory is supplemented with demonstrations by teacher, training teachers, and students. 3 semester hours. Miss York.

THE TEACHING OF READING. This course covers the aims, principles, materials and methods of teaching reading throughout the first eight grades. Much emphasis is placed on beginning reading. 3 semester hours. Miss York.

CHILDREN'S LITERATURE. This course covers a study of children's interests, literary materials, and methods of presenting literature in the primary grades. Plenty of opportunity for story telling and dramatization is given. 3 semester hours. Miss York.

JUVENILE LITERATURE. This course covers a study of children's interests, the chief types of juvenile literature, and the methods of presentation. In a general way, this covers the work of all grades, but special emphasis is placed on intermediate grade materials. 2 semester hours. Miss York.

### SOCIOLOGY

EDUCATIONAL SOCIOLOGY FOR ELEMENTARY TEACH-ERS. Objectives in education, the evolution of the family and home, religion, maladjustments, poverty and the race question. Several problems, such as crime and punishment, are discussed. A survey, a book report and a thesis are required of each student. 3 semester hours. Mrs. Stewart.

EDUCATIONAL SOCIOLOGY FOR SECONDARY TEACHERS. An introductory course in Sociology stressing the principles of Sociology and their applications in the class-room, school system and community. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

RURAL SOCIOLOGY. The purpose of this course is to make a scientific study of the problems in rural communities both local and national with specific reference to rural problems in other parts of the world. Population, psychological attitudes, taxation, wealth and

income, standards of living, rural credit co-operative organizations, and community organization are among the units developed. 3 semester hours. Miss H. Kieffer.

ORIGINS OF SOCIAL INSTITUTIONS. An advanced course in Sociology in which the principles of Sociology are applied to our social institutions and the problems that arise out of them. Marriage and the family, recreational institutions like the theatre, problems growing out of urban life and out of the association of diverse racial groups will be discussed and evaluated, along with other social institutions and problems. 3 semester hours. Dr. Valentine.

GUIDANCE. In this course consideration will be given to the place of guidance in education; the field of personal analysis; cooperation with other educational agencies; type studies in vocational guidance; the responsibility of the individual teacher and school administrators for educational and curriculum guidance; and guidance through instruction. 2 semester hours. Miss A. Huber.

ELEMENTS OF ECONOMICS. A course designed to give the Social Science teacher some understanding of the economic forces in modern American life. It is a descriptive course, approached from the institutional side as far as possible. 3 semester hours. Mr. Loucks.

#### WRITING

WRITING. The purpose of this course is to guide students (1) in the execution of good handwriting, by giving attention to correct position, movement, speed, slant, and letter formation; (2) by supervised practice at their desks and on the blackboard; (3) in learning a technique for teaching handwriting in all the grades; (4) in learning the uses and values of standardized tests and scales. Miss Dilks.

### **AWARDS AND PRIZES**

#### SCHOLARSHIP PRIZE

The class of 1908 offers a yearly prize of ten dollars in gold to the four year student having highest average at graduation. This prize was awarded on Commencement day, 1931, to Donald W. Shaffer, Mercersburg, Pa.

The class of 1916 offers a yearly prize of five dollars in gold for excellence in Public Speaking. The prize for 1931 was awarded to Norman R. Calhoun, Milroy, Pa., with Honorable Mention of Mildred Palmer, Halifax, Pa.

#### DISTINGUISHED SERVICE PRIZE

A gold medal presented by Mrs. Eleanor Kyner Boots, class of '89, suitably inscribed will be awarded the student who in the judgment of the student body and the faculty has done most for the school during the year. Character, scholarship, initiative, community service, skill in athletics, debating and other school activities will be given due consideration. This prize was awarded on Commencement Day, 1931, to Martin G. Brandt, Shippensburg, Pa.

#### SHORT STORY PRIZE

The Myrtle Mayberry prizes of books ranging in value from ten to fifteen dollars will be awarded annually on Commencement Day to the students who submit the best short stories written in competition for this prize. Clarence Glessner, West Fairview, Pa.; second prize to Edna Spangler, York Springs, Pa., with Honorable Mention of Donald Barkley, Shippensburg, Pa.

#### PRIZE FOR EXCELLENCE IN STUDENT TEACHING

Mrs. Mary Long Fairley, class of '89, offers an annual prize of ten dollars in gold to the student in the graduating class who makes the highest record in student teaching. This prize was awarded to D. Louis Knohr, Gratz, Pa., with Honorable Mention of Joseph M. Joseph, Glenolden, Pa.

#### PRIZE FOR EXCELLENCE IN AMERICAN HISTORY

Reverend S. S. Wylie, D. D., offers an annual prize of twenty-five dollars in gold to the student whose work in American History was most outstanding during the year. This prize was awarded in 1931 to Paul Cauffman, Newport, Pa.

### THE ALUMNI LOAN FUND

Boarding students who need financial aid during their senior year may borrow a sum not exceeding \$100 from the Alumni Loan Fund for one year from the time of their graduation without interest. Students in need of such assistance must file their request for aid with the president not later than August 15 of the year preceding their graduation.

### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

Our standard of conduct for those who are preparing to teach under the tuition of the College is so high that it would preclude anyone from looking to the profession of teaching for a life calling whose habits and conduct are not worthy of the imitation of the children who may be placed under his instruction.

The authorities believe that the College should reproduce the social life of the home as far as possible. College life should, therefore, be a preparation for living. Young men and women should be taught self-control, for without this ability any scheme of education will be a failure. The great majority of our pupils come to us with a very definite purpose in view and wish to make the best possible use of their opportunities, hence the tone of the college is remarkably earnest.

It is a further aim and object of the college to prepare our pupils for social efficiency. We realize that young men and women must be able to take an active part in the affairs of the various communities into which they are expected to go after leaving the institution; hence the college does not neglect the social side of the student's life, and opportunities for social intercourse under proper direction are afforded the students from time to time. The student who goes forth from a college lacking the ability to associate with cultured men and women is bound to be more or less a failure in life. Our pupils are therefore trained in the conventions expected of them by society so that they may take their place in the affairs of their respective communities. The ideal of any school should be to reproduce as nearly as possibly the family life. As young men and women associate in the family, so should they associate in a properly regulated school.

In carrying out this policy this Teachers College allows the greatest possible freedom to the young men and women compatible with good taste and sound morality. In short, everything is done by the faculty to co-operate with the students in maintaining a bright and refined home life and to help them to the cultivation of that grace and dignity that marks the real lady or gentleman.

Since the administrative officers believe that participation in college life will not only make for growth of students in character and power, but will promote the best interests of the college, there have been formed on the campus, student government organizations of both men and women, the work of which has been very satisfactory.

Some of the aims of these student government associations are to increase the sense of individual responsibility among students, to help them train themselves to be ideal members of a community, and to maintain high standards of scholarship and conduct. Since the purpose of the College is to train leaders, the governing bodies hold that all students must be helped to form conduct patterns worthy of imitation.

Each student is expected to read carefully the handbook prepared by his association and to familiarize himself with the rules and regulations of the College.

- 6. Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. meetings on Sunday at 6:00 p. m. Sunday School at 8:45 a. m.
  - 7. Study hour from 7:30 to 10:00 p.m.

### GENERAL REGULATIONS

- 1. All clothing is required to be marked with woven numbers which are purchased by each student upon entering College.
- 2. (a) A uniform one-piece washable costume for Physical Education is prescribed for all women students.

(b) A uniform costume for Physical Education is prescribed for all men students.

These costumes should be obtained after enrollment at the College.

Both men and women must wear the regular gymnasium shoes for gymnasium exercises.

- 3. Students should bring the following articles with them or purchase them on arrival at the college: A pair of blankets or heavy quilt, washstand cover and bureau cover, pair window curtains, towels, table napkins and toilet articles. They should also bring a knife, fork, spoon and glass tumbler for use in their rooms, as these articles may not be taken from the dining-room. Rooms are supplied with bed, bedding, bureau, study table, chairs and light fixtures.
- 4. No change or alterations must be made in the permanent parts or fixtures of the rooms, nor nails driven into the walls.
- 5. Damage done to furniture and other school property is charged against the students responsible for it.
- 6. Sabbath Regulation—3:00 to 5:00 p. m., will be observed as a quiet period. During this time no singing, loud talking, or other unnecessary noise will be allowed in the building.
- 7. Day students will not call at the rooms of boarders, nor stay in their rooms over night, unless by permission of the Dean of Women or Dean of Men. Boarding students will be held responsible to the Dean of Women or Dean of Men for the observance of this rule.
- 8. Boarding students will not be permitted to visit in town on Sundays, nor remain in town over night, excepting with near relatives with special permission from the Dean of Women or the Dean of Men.
- 9. Students will receive calls from relatives or friends in the reception rooms only. No one except parents will be permitted to visit the students' rooms.
- 10. Women students wishing to visit their homes or other places during the term must present written permits from parents to the Dean of Women. Freshmen men students must present similar request to the Dean of Men. Parents are urged not to ask their children to be absent from the school except between the hours of noon Saturday and 8 a. m. Monday. The students cannot make up the work missed through absence from class. Absence from the college is a positive loss to students. Students return to school after being absent over week-ends with work unprepared. The best work is done by students who are absent from college only in case of absolute necessity. The faculty will not hold themselves responsible for the progress of students who visit their homes or other places frequently during the term. Students who are failing in their work will not be allowed to be away from school for the week-end.

11. The authorities of the college will not, except in case of absolute necessity, call a student to the telephone during school hours or study hours. Such calls should be made before 8:15 a. m., between 12:15 noon and 1:15 o'clock p. m., and 4:15 and 7:30 p. m.

### **ATHLETICS**

It is the duty of the College to see to the physical well-being of every young man and woman in attendance. The day is gone by when the pale, delicate, bookish student is regarded as the ideal to be sought. Young men and women must be just as strong and robust as possible. For this reason we encourage all our students to take part in some type of athletics.

In addition to out-of-door exercises and the regular training in the gymnasium, the College encourages the following athletic sports:

### GIRLS' ATHLETICS

- HIKING-Open to women students all year.
- HOCKEY—Class teams are organized early in the fall and a series of inter-class games is played.
- SOCCER-Played during the fall season.
- BASKETBALL—Not only are class games played but group teams are organized, and a regular schedule of games arranged. Nearly all the boarding women take part in these games.
- VOLLEY BALL-Played in the Spring.
- BASEBALL—In the Spring and Summer Terms this game occupies the place held by the hockey in the fall term.
- TRACK AND FIELD SPORTS-Class meet held in Spring.
- PLAY DAY-Sponsored by the College girls.
- TENNIS-Under the control of the Students' Tennis Association.

#### MEN'S ATHLETICS

- FOOTBALL is open to all the men: A series of inter-college games will be played. Class teams will also be organized.
- BASKETBALL—The same method is followed as in football. Nearly all the men take part in this game.
- BASEBALL—Teams are organized from each class. From these organizations the college team is organized.
- TRACK AND FIELD SPORTS—A meet will be held each spring, at which the class championship will be decided.
- TENNIS-Under the control of the Students' Tennis Association.

#### **ENTERTAINMENTS**

MOTION PICTURES—The College owns a motion picture projector and entertainments are given from time to time. Plays of Shakespeare, and productions from modern dramatists are presented, and films dealing with the work of various important industries, life in foreign countries, interesting experiments in chemistry and physics, etc., are shown.

LECTURES AND CONCERTS—During the past year a remarkably strong series of concerts and entertainments was presented. These included the following: The play, "Shavings"; Tom Skeyhill "The Last of the Long Hunters" and "With Mussolini and the Black Shirts;" Phidelah Rice; Count von Luckner; The Welsh Imperial Singers; Dr. A. W. Evans, Humorist; Sidney Landon, Impersonator; Roxy Male Quartet.

An equally interesting and instructive course will be given during 1932-33.

### **RELIGIOUS WORK**

Our students are furnished excellent opportunities for spiritual growth and development. We have a prayer and lecture service every Wednesday evening.

A service of the Sabbath School, organized among the students, is held every Sunday morning. The school is divided into classes, each class being taught by a member of the faculty. The International Lesson is used.

Students are expected to attend the church service of their choice every Sabbath morning. The church attendance in connection with the religious services at the school offers them all the spiritual advantages that they would receive at their own homes. In all proper ways religious influences are thrown around the student.

The Young Men's Christian and the Young Women's Christian Association have a large membership among the students. These societies have been doing a great work for the growth of religious sentiment in the college. These associations are non-denominational in character.

### COLLEGE PUBLICATIONS

"The Teachers College Herald" is the official college publication. It is furnished free to students and Alumni.

"The Campus Reflector" is the weekly publication issued by students. It contains all the news of the College including athletics, literary society notes, class room activities, and data concerning the work of the music department. The editorials are usually of a constructive nature and deal largely with problems of the College. The paper also contains an extensive Alumni column.

The paper is furnished free to students and the price to others is one dollar and seventy-five cents for the college year.

### SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

#### LITERARY SOCIETIES

The Normal and the Philomathean Literary Societies are strong, vigorous associations. They meet in separate halls every Friday evening for the rendering of carefully prepared programs which are highly entertaining and instructive.

### STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Society Glee Clubs. Each literary society maintains a glee club under students' direction but supervised by the director of music. Opportunity is given to those of marked ability to join one of these glee clubs. Application must be made to the director of music.

Girls' Choral Society. The girls' choral society meets once a week to study standard choral selections which they give at the various school entertainments throughout the college year. Those desiring to become members will make application to the director of music.

Men's Glee Club. The men's glee club gives the young men opportunity for the development of their musical ability under skilled direction.

Orchestra. The college orchestra meets once a week for rehearsal. It plays for the various college functions throughout the year. Students who play any orchestral instruments are urged to bring their instruments to college and apply to the director of music for admission to the orchestra.

College Concert Band. The organized college band numbers about thirty members. This organization is conducted by Mr. Avery. Students who wish to learn to play on a band instrument will be given assistance.

Arts and Crafts Club. The Arts and Crafts Club is an organization which has for its object the growth of Art appreciation and the development of talent beyond that which the class room offers. It also gives the members an opportunity to develop talent and technique along such lines of Art as are not included in the regular courses of study as well as craft work not possible otherwise. The work of the club is under the direction of the Art Department.

College Choir. The college choir is a junior choral organization of mixed voices. It meets once a week.

Young Men's Christian Association. Membership in this organization is entirely voluntary, but a large majority of the men of the faculty and student body are connected with the organization. It holds weekly meetings.

Young Women's Christian Association. A large majority of the young women of the college are associated with this organization and are much interested in its work. Its weekly meetings are well attended.

The Varsity Club. The Varsity Club is an organization of students that have earned their Varsity letter in some one of the major sports of the college which consists of football, baseball, basketball and track. The purpose of the organization is to encourage sportsmanlike conduct, not only among themselves but in the student body. They also encourage organized cheering in athletic contests and help entertain visiting teams.

The organization strives to make life pleasant as possible for the new students as well as help to guide each new student into some college activity.

Women's Athletic Association. Membership in this organization is earned by point system in major sports. Over half of the girls in school belong to this organization, the purpose being to encourage pocooperation and sportsmanship among ourselves.

Debating. Gamma Delta Gamma the debating club meets once every two weeks for practice in debating. The club usually has a membership of about thirty, all students being eligible. The work is so arranged as to give as many as possible an opportunity to debate with teams from other colleges. The schedule for 1931-32 included Millersville, West Chester, East Stroudsburg, Slippery Rock, Clarion, Bloomsburg, and Shepherdstown.

Readers' Club. This organization came into being in 1924. Membership is voluntary and has steadily increased every year. It is designed to furnish recreational reading to those who desire it, the books being purchased from the small yearly fee paid by each member. Popular fiction and non-fiction are both included in the collection, which at present numbers over 150 volumes. The club is sponsored by the library department, the librarian acting as faculty adviser.

Mathematics Club. The Mathematics Club aims to create and promote a greater interest in mathematics among its members and in the college. The work of the club includes special studies of practical and historical topics, dramatization of mathematical subjects, mathematical recreations, and other activities of a mathematical nature.

Country Life Club. All students majoring in rural education through this club find an opportunity to study rural life problems; to conduct surveys; to assist with community programs; to meet and hear rural leaders from the field.

The Geography Club is an organization open to all students who are interested in the field of geography. It is made up of active and an associate membership. The work of the club includes illustrated travel talk, helpful geographical contests, and slides of various places of the world. The main object of the club is to probe deeper into the subject of geography than can be done in the ordinary class.

The Cramatic Club is an organization which has for its object the growth of an appreciation of the drama, and the development of the histrionic talent of its members. It also gives its members an opportunity to study the directing of simple plays and to gain some knowledge of stage make up and costuming.

The Junior Thespians is a dramatic organization which aims to provide for underclassmen some of the opportunities for development that the Dramatic Club offers upperclassmen.

"The Crafty Freshmen" or Freshmen Arts and Crafts Club is an organization for the purpose of training those freshmen who later wish to join the senior organization. Simple objects are attempted preliminary to the senior work.

The Nature Camera Club was organized in 1929 and is open to all students of the college. Its purpose is to arouse an interest in nature study by the use of camera. Practice in handling the camera, developing and printing of the pictures taken are a part of the work of the club. Each member must earn the right to wear the pin of the organization.

Phi Sigma Pi. A national honorary fraternity was installed at Shippensburg in 1931. Membership is conferred on sophomores, juniors and seniors who foster interest in scholastic attainment and campus activities; who maintain a high standard of school citizenship.

Women's Student Council. The boarding women are organized into the Women's Association, which elects a president, vice-president, treasurer and secretary. These officers with representatives elected from the four classes and the Dean of Women, constitute the Women's Student Council, which has charge of the standards of conduct for the boarding women.

There is a similar organization for day student women.

Men's Student Council. The boarding men of the College are organized into the Men's Student Council. The association elects a president, treasurer and secretary. These officers with representatives elected from the four classes, and certain other men's organizations, together with the Dean of Men, constitute the Council. This board is responsible for standards of conduct for the boarding men.
