The request of Mr. A. A. Culbertson was discussed but, on motion of Mr. Rose, seconded by Mr. Davis, it was laid on the table until the next regular meeting of the Board, as only three members were present.

The following Report of the President was read and discussed.

Status of Legislation

The Holland Bill providing for the change of the Teachers Colleges into vocational schools and thus leaving the entire field of teacher education to the private institutions has attracted a great deal of attention. It is not receiving very much favor, but, nevertheless, it is a bill that is full of danger to the Teachers Colleges. Behind the scenes it is sponsored by the Liberal arts colleges who are anxious ultimately to secure funds from the State Treasury for the operation of their institutions and so replenish their lowering in come from endowments. While the members of the Legislature are not favorable to such a blanket proposal, many of them who are even very friendly to us are not fully aware of the effect of such a bill should it pass. Unfortunately so many members of the Legislature are new and unfamiliar with the educational problem as related to the Teachers Colleges that a great deal of instructional work has to be done to give them adequate information upon which to form opinions.

The significance of Teachers Colleges in Pennsylvania is not fully realized by a large portion of our population. The state of Pennsylvania instead of talking about having too many Teachers Colleges should pride itself on the fact that it has a system of colleges that may well be the envy of other states. The Teachers Colleges are a bulwark against sectarian control of the public schools and they prevent the limitation of the teaching profession to a class of people with incomes above a certain amount.

The establishment of these colleges originally as Normal Schools was because the academies and colleges at that time were failures in preparing teachers for the schools. The Teachers Colleges are today among the very

oldest collegiate institutions in the Commonwealth, far antedating many of the institutions who wish them closed. Today just as seventy-five or more years ago most of these colleges are totally inadequate to do the work of teacher education. It would not be good public policy to abandon the education of teachers to liberal arts colleges. Many of them are not fitted for any type of teacher education at the present time. This does not mean, of course, that several of these colleges are not of a very high type and may, in many respects, serve as models to Teachers Colleges.

There is now a definite shortage of elementary school teachers. There is a shortage in the secondary field created by men being drafted for the army. If the Legislature passes a bill excluding married women teachers, it will be several years before there will be enough adequately prepared elementary teachers. What is needed is not to abolish teacher education, but to add the various fields above mentioned to teacher education.

It would be a great help if the members of the Board of Trustees would see the Legislators in their respective counties and urge them to restore the wording of the School Code prior to 1933 in regard to the State Teachers College. And then urge upon them the necessity of opening our facilities for the training of inductrial arts teachers.

One factor in the growth of the College at Edinbo m is the development of the community of Edinboro. At the present time there is no adequate housing available if anyone should want to move here to educate their children. We need to advertise Edinboro as an ideal community in which to live for those who work in the city of Eric or Meadville. One man remarked the other day as he passed through Edinboro he thought that it had everything to make it an ideal community in which to live and that all it needed was a real estate promoter. I think the Board of Trustees and the people of Edinboro could give careful consideration to the significance of these remarks.
