

PRESIDENT FOSTER F. DIEBOLD



Foster F. Diebold

Since his appointment as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania on August 1, 1979, Foster F. Diebold has initiated a wide variety of policies and programs designed to complement his desire for an increased level of excellence and quality in higher education.

Noted for his extensive experience in the field of education managment, President Diebold previously served as president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. His principal fields of professional interests include ethical issues in higher education, higher education management, budget development and fiscal control, legislative affairs, personnel management and collective bargaining, and international education.

A native of Orange, New Jersey, President Diebold served as president of the University of Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Prior to that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of the Division of College Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township Public Schools in New Jersey.

A graduate of Monmouth College, President Diebold holds a bachelor of science in educational and a master of arts in education administration from Seton Hall University. He has met course requirements for his doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently enrolled in the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

As chairman of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities' Committee on Governance, President Diebold has emerged as a national and international figure in the world of higher education. His special fields of interest are ethics in education and international programs. As chairman of the National Committee on Governance, he presented a statement of ethics to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities in November 1988. The statement, "Ethical Practices for College Presidents," was unanimously adopted at the annual meeting of AASCU and has been published and circulated as a policy statement by that organization. It should be noted that this code of ethics is the first ever to be officially adopted by a professional organization and directed to the performance of college and university presidents.

President Diebold also serves as chairperson of the Advancement Committee of the Chancellor's Executive Council (State System of Higher Education). He is a member of the Western Pennsylvania Education Council and the International Association of University Presidents.

Active in the community, the President, among other activities, serves on the Board of Directors of the United Way of Erie County, the Board of Corporators of the St. Vincent Foundation for Health and Human Services, and the Advisory Board of the McMannis Educational Trust Fund. President Diebold is also a member of the Hamot Medical Center Board of Corporators, the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Corporation Scholarship Review Committee, and the Marine Bank Advisory Board.

President Diebold resides in Edinboro with his wife, Patricia, and daughters, Jessica and Stacey.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR JIM McDONALD

Edinboro University's athletic program was placed under the talented and aggressive leadership of Jim McDonald in July of 1981. Increased emphasis on fund raising to provide a sound scholarship foundation has become his top priority while numerous changes and innovations have also keyed the Scots' athletic program under his direction.

Through his efforts more than \$3 million has been raised during the past seven years. The funds generated by the energetic athletic director's efforts will be used to assist Edinboro's men and women athletes who compete in the Scots fifteen intercollegiate sports.

In addition to maintaining Edinboro's respected winning tradition in intercollegiate athletics, the former health and physical education professor has vastly expanded the University's summer activities.

Fifty-two camps were sponsored by the Fighting Scots Booster Club this past summer on the University's campus. Sox Harrison Stadium is the site of the Cleveland Browns vs. the Buffalo Bills annual rookie scrimmage, which has been a yearly mid-summer highlight.

The personable athletic director also introduced Edinboro's Hall of Fame program which has evolved into an annual year-ending event to honor present and past athletes.

McDonald has been at Edinboro since 1962 and for 12 years served as the Fighting Scot basketball coach (1962-1975) and never experienced a losing season while his teams compiled an impressive 181 wins against only 89 losses. During that span, his cagers won four Western Division Pennsylvania Conference crowns, the PC state championship and two District 18 titles that netted trips to the NAIA National Tournament. His teams set 27 University records made 19 post-season appearances while four of his players were named All-Americans.

Prior to accepting his position at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant basketball coach in Erie, PA. He is a 1956 graduate of Bridgeport High School in his home town of Bridgeport, West Virginia.

In 1960 he received a degree in chemistry and physical education from West Virginia Wesleyan College and and he also holds a master's degree in health from the University of Buffalo.

As an undergraduate, he set nine school records at Wesleyan and was twice voted both AP and UPI basketball All-American. In 1960, he was the second leading scorer in the United States, averaging slightly over 33 points a game, and led his team to the national basketball tournament in Kansas City, Missouri. He was named to the NAIA's All-Tournament Team in 1959 and 1960.

In 1966, McDonald was selected Area Eight Coach of the Year by the eastern seaboard coaches and that same year was honored as one of the top ten finalists in the Coach of the Year national poll. McDonald's honors also include selection to the West Virginia All-Time College Basketball Team and membership in the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

As a resident of Edinboro, McDonald has a record of extensive community involvement. He was Little League Baseball director for four years and also held a four-year post as a member of the General McLane School Board. He and his wife, Mary Lou, have three sons — Mark. Mike and Matthew.

Dr. Kathleen Lipkovich begins her tenth year as Edinboro University's first full-time Associate Athletic Director for men's and women's intercollegiate sports. She is currently a member of the PSAC Executive Committee. She is also a professor in the Health and Physical Education department here at Edinboro.

ber of the Edinboro admissions office in 1962 and was named Director of Admissions in 1967.




TODD V. JAY Director of Sports Information and Promotions

motions of special sporting events held at the University. He was in charge of promoting the USA/USSR Olympic style wrestling match held in McComb in April of 1989.




PATRICK DONGHIA Assistant Sports Information Director

HEAD COACH STAN SWANK

The Winning Tradition Continues . . .

Edinboro University hired Stan Swank three years ago, giving Swank his first opportunity to head a Division II program. Based on his career marks at Parkland Junior College in Champaign, Illinois, positive results were expected. In his first year as head coach of the Lady Scots, positive results were delivered. Last year, Swank guided the Lady Scots to Edinboro's first ever PSAC Western Division title. In two short years, Stan Swank has built a program that can now compete on the national level.

Entering into the 1987-88 campaign, Edinboro was trying to halt a skid of three consecutive losing seasons. A new direction was needed and Swank provided the necessary spark. Swank guided the Scots to an impressive 14-11 record in his debut campaign, finishing one game out of the PSAC playoffs with a team comprised mainly of underclassmen.

Last year, Edinboro stormed the PSAC and won the PSAC-West title. Swank guided the Lady Scots to their first ever playoff tournament and advanced to the state championship game in Bloomsburg. Compiling a 21-6 overall record (10-2 in the PC-West), the 1988-89 edition of the Lady Scots became EU's most successful women's basketball team to date. All this in two years.

Swank began his coaching career at Nova High School in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, where he was an assistant men's coach. He helped guide his squad to an outstanding 30-3 mark and finish eighth in the state. In 1977 he joined the Parkland Junior College staff as an assistant coach with Parkland's men's team. In 1980. he began a two year stint as head coach of the Fisher High School boy's varsity team. He left Fisher with a 39-14 record and two regional championships under his belt. Parkland JC came looking for new leadership for its women's program and Swank fit the bill. 1983 was the first of four stellar seasons for Parkland as Swank led the Cobras to four straight 20-plus winning seasons, culminating with a 30-4 finish in 85-86 and a 30-3 finish in 86-87. 1987's unit finished the year ranked 13th in the NJCAA final rankings and led the NJCAA in scoring average, pouring in 93.8 points per game. That year's unit eclipsed the 100 point mark eleven times. scoring 129 points for a season high. His overall mark as head coach of Parkland's women's team was 104 wins versus just 20 losses.

His accomplishments with the Parkland's women's basketball team are many, and they include four straight sectional championships (83-84 through 86-87), two third place finishes in NJCAA Region XXIV (83-84 and 84-85), and two regional runner-up finishes (85-86 and 86-87).

While at Parkland, Swank was also head of the women's softball program and he guided the Cobra diamonders to a 37-36-1 overall record including two sectional runner-ups and a sectional title.

Coming to Edinboro for the 1987-88 season, Swank's credentials spoke for themselves. No team he had been head coach of had ever had a losing season. But he faced a pro-

gram that lacked leadership as the roster boasted only one senior. Lacking the asset of experience, Swank let his energy and charisma take over and as the season progressed it became evident that the Lady Scots were forming the "foundation of a winning tradition" that he saw bare fruit last year. The success of last year's team speaks highly of Swank's ability to turn a program around. The foundation of the Scots is solid and the glue that holds the foundation together is the knowledge, energy, and emotion of Stan Swank.

Swank is a 1976 graduate of Purdue University. He left Purdue with a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education, then returned to receive a Master of Science Degree in Educational Administration four years later. He is a 1972 graduate of Champaign Centennial High School.

Swank and his wife, Gail, have two children; six-yearold Stanley II, and Benjamin, who is two. The Swank family resides year-round In Edinboro.

He came to Edinboro from the Community College of Allegheny County South Campus where he was head baseball coach for five years, guiding his squads to a 144-63 overall record. Radovich's EUP baseball squad has made a remarkable turnaround since his arrival and finished just one game out of the PSAC playoffs in '89.

Radovich is Swank's "right hand man," a fact that is not lost on Swank. "John is a former basketball standout," says Swank, "and he gives us additional coaching inside." Being 6-7, he has a handle on what it takes to play the inside game. His love for basketball and desire to win is contagious. He is an excellent role model for any athlete and a definite plus for our program.



VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH RAY OVERHOLT

Ray Overholt is also entering his third season with the Lady Scots. Having played for Edinboro, Overholt gives Edinboro a great deal of tradition in its program. "He spends many hours assisting and instructing the girls," says Swank. "His knowledge of the game and low key approach to coaching make him a valuable asset to our team."

Overholt serves as the director of a social service agency/youth group. He has three children, Kristen (20 years old), Meggan (13), and Sam (10).



VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACHES LISA SESTRIC AND KAREN UREY

Two former Edinboro players, Lisa Sestric and Karen Urey both bring knowledge of the system and a wealth of basketball experience to the Edinboro program.

Sestric, who played for Swank during his first year here, was a starting guard for Edinboro while Urey started at point guard for the past two seasons. Both are currently working towards their Master's degrees here at Edinboro.



EDINBORO WOMEN'S BASKETBALL MANAGERS

Karen Beall, Lisa Eismer, and Sue Weaver will serve as managers for Edinboro's Lady Scots this year.

Beall, having had ankle surgery this past summer, will sit out the season as a player and will take on the duties of manager for coach Swank. Weaver will handle managerial duties as well as the responsibility of filming both practices and games. Eismer will be responsible for taking stats at practices as well as doing additional game stats for the basketball team.

1989-90 SEASON PREVIEW: GETTING BACK TO BUSINESS IN THE PSAC

Edinboro University's women's basketball team, the defending Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Champions, will look to take it one step further in 1989-90.

Finishing last year with a 21-6 record and a PC-West best 10-2 conference record, the Lady Scots will look to continue to improve this year. Head Coach Stan Swank has a solid corp of returning players as well as a strong infusion of new talent.

The Lady Scots will be led by the All-Conference tandem of Sarah Bishop (Stow, OH) and Montique Wade (Pittsburgh, PA). Both tabbed All-PSAC for the second consecutive year last year, Swank looks for Wade and Bishop to again be a major factor in the success of his squad this year. "I think you have to look at Sarah and Montique as legitimate pre-season All-American candidates," said Swank. "Both have been All-Conference twice and, coming back for their senior year, have accomplished so much but yet to win the PSAC title. They started in a program under different guidance, and had a poor year their first year. Winning the West in the span of two seasons is a credit to them and to everyone involved in the program."

Bishop and Wade force opponents to reckon with two top notch players, but the supporting cast is what pushes Edinboro into the elite of the PSAC. "We have a cast of players in which all have to be dealt with by opponents," commented Swank. Junior Toyia Giles (Erie, PA), seniors Andrea Martre (Memphis, TN) and Michelle McChesney (Fredonia, PA), and sophomore Tracey Wittgartner (Pittsburgh, PA) complete the cast of returning starters for Swank.

"Toyia looks stronger now than she did last year," said Swank. "She's in great shape and has a year in the system under her belt. I look for her to be a major factor in the PSAC this year. Michell McChesney is in the same mold as Wade and Bishop. She was here under different leadership and has blended into our new system so well that she now exemplifies what it is to be a member of the Edinboro women's basketball team. The ultimate 'role player,' we always know what we will get from Michelle. She understands her role and she revels in it.

"Andrea gives us vast experience and a great scoring threat," continued Swank. "Her outside shooting will be a key to our success this year and she will again see duty as the floor general for us. Tracey Wittgartner had a great freshman year, and with one year of experience behind her, she should be ready to contribute even more."

Swank also has what he refers to as the "intermediate group" returning. Shelly Walker (McKean, PA), Bobbi Wittgartner (Pittsburgh, PA), Dawn Page (North East, PA) and Natalie Pascarella (Monongahela, PA) conclude the list of returning players for Swank.

"This group is comprised of last year's freshmen," noted Swank. "They made solid contributions in '88-89 and are looking to be major factors this year. I look for all four of them to step up and join the other returners, thus elmininating any 'intermediate' group."

What may be the ultimate key to the success of the 1989-90 Lady Scots is the crop of new talent joining the team. Five new faces dot the Edinboro roster, headed by junior college transfer Sandy Johnson (Covington, KY). "Sandy will immediately step in and have an impact," noted Swank. "She will step up the pace of our offense and has the added potential to be a 'big-time' scorer. But more importantly, she has the ability and desire to get other people the ball in scoring position."

Four freshmen complete the Edinboro roster. Marnie Fiscus (Transfer, PA), Dana Tharp (Perry, OH), Beth Sorber (East Rochester, NY), and Tina Odem (Sharon, PA), compose the freshman class of Lady Scot basketball players.

"Marnie, Dana, and Beth give us two very important things," noted Swank. "First, Dana is a great shooter. She averaged over 30 points in high school and will play roles similar to McChesney and Tracey Wittgartner. Marnie and Beth give us unlimited speed. Beth is a member of Edinboro's nationally ranked cross country team and is in top condition. Marnie is ultra-quick with great

basketball sense." Tina Odem will become eligible in December and will join the Lady Scots for the conference title run. "Odem is a six foot leaper with great speed and shooting ability. She will give us added depth up the middle."

Summing up his team, Swank had the highest praise for this squad. "In all my years of coaching, this is the most cohesive team I have been around. They get along well and I enjoy being around them."

Edinboro boasts a very tough schedule. Their non-conference home schedule boasts the likes of Shawnee State (23-7 last year and returning all five starters), Ashland College (one point victors over EU last year), Youngstown State (Division I and winners over EU last year), and the annual Lady Scot tournament which will bring in three class teams in SUNY-Buffalo (going Division I next year), Atlantic Christian (southern NAIA power), and Kutztown (EU's opponent in opening round of state championship tourney last year).

More impressive is Edinboro's away schedule. The Lady Scots will take on the mantle of "Road Warriors" in '89-90 as they play an extremely tough road schedule. One week into the season, the Scots will travel to West Virginia for games with NAIA powers Fairmont State and West Liberty. But it is the first week of January that will be the most grueling for Swank's "Travelling Show." Edinboro will travel to California (PA) for a tournament on January 5 and 6 that includes PSAC rival Cal, Adelphi (perennial MECC power), and Kutztown. Two days later, on the 8th, Edinboro will be in Detroit, Michigan, for a game against Wayne State. The Scots will visit Michigan-Dearborn the next day then return home for the Youngstown State game. The Scots final away non-conference game will be a Sunday matinee at Gannon on February 18.

But January 17 is the day when Edinboro will begin defense of their PSAC-West title and the drive to the State tourney. The always tough West division impresses Swank going into this season. "This will be an incredible fight," noted Swank. "Lock Haven has almost everybody back from their great team; California did not lose a player from a squad that made the playoffs last year; Indiana (PA) has revamped their unit with great recruits and have a solid veteran inside game; Shippensburg apparently got the big people they need to battle for the title; Slippery Rock brought in a whole new team last year who now have a year of experience and, knowing their coach, will be vastly improved; and Clarion has a wealth of experience and knowledge in their new coaching staff that will have an immediate impact on their team."


Swank looks at his schedule as a key ingredient to a run at the title. "With our non-conference schedule, we have set ourselves up to get used to playing back-to-back games. In the state tourney, that is what you do. But first we have to get there, and that will not be easy. The West will be a brawl."

The Lady Scots have set high standards for themselves this year, and their goals reflect that. Swank knows the value of setting high standards and believes his team has the ability to reach the goals they set. "We want to repeat as PC-West Champs," said Swank. "It will be extremely tough, but that is a legitimate goal of ours. We came so close to winning the State Title last year that the kids are hungry to get back to the tourney and win it this time. That will be even tougher. We also want an NCAA bid. We were on the bubble for an 'at-large' bid last year but one did not come in."

Swank is philosophical about his team's potential in '89-90. "The main thing for us is that we have been there and know what it is about," he commented. "As a group we know how hard we have to work to achieve any goal, especially the ones we have set for ourselves. From an attitude standpoint, our girls are hungry to accomplish some great things. Last year we went to the dance but missed the party afterwards. We want very much to be at that party this year, but we need to work hard to get there. We have to get back to business."

Swank's Lady Scots start their trek on November 18, when they will play host to Salem College in Edinboro's McComb Fieldhouse. The road for Edinboro will be a long one, but the Scots have the talent and the desire to battle through an extremely tough schedule and will look to make another appearance at the State Championship dance this year, only time will tell if they will, and only time will tell if they will make it to the party afterwards.

The 21-6 mark is just one in a list of many accomplishments, all of which are school firsts. Head coach Stan Swank, then in his second season, and his Lady Scots made the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference playoffs by virtue of winning their first ever PSAC-West crown. Now only did Edinboro make the playoffs, they also appeared in the NCAA Division II national rankings, topping out as the 15th best team in the nation at one point.

The Lady Scots accomplished many things this year, and coach Swank knows the value of reaching for goals. "When talking about goals, the girls always put the team ahead of the individual. At the beginning of the season, the girls listed 30 goals they wanted to accomplish. I would say that 25 of those were realistic. Well, they achieved 18 of them and I think that speaks for itself."

Losing to Lock Haven (a team the Scots defeated earlier in the season) in the State Championship game cost the 'Boro a shot at the NCAA Division II tournament. "The loss to Lock Haven was a tough one," said Swank, "but the girls kept the proper perspective on the season. From their standpoint, we had a good season because we accomplished so many of the goals we had set."

To Swank, one of the most impressive things his team did last year was winning the PSAC-West. "Winning the West was tremendous," said the coach. "What impresses me so much about getting the title is that I don't think we were the most talented team in our division, but the girls showed perserverance and worked hard. The real impressive thing was the way we won it all (a 76-74 victory at California). We had to win the big one on the road and we did just that."

There were a number of individuals who contributed to the Scots cause this year, Karen Urey and Penny McDonald being the lone seniors on that list.

Urey (Sandy Lake, PA), a graduate of nearby Lakeview High School, had an impressive senior season and compiled some equally impressive career totals. She averaged 7.6 points per game in 88-89 while dishing out a team high 151 assists, which ranks as the 6th highest season total in PSAC history. Her 81% free throw mark also led the Lady Scots. She collected 68 steals, second on the team. For her career, Urey scored 626 points (6.2 ppg) and had 442 assists (4.4 apg). The total of 442, tops the Edinboro all-time list, places her 3rd on the PSAC all-time assist list. Her accomplishments were well noted by Swank. "Karen had a tremendous season," said Swank. "When one realizes that she split time at the point with Andrea Martre, her totals become all that more impressive. She showed a lot of confidence and maturity this year. A lot of people could not have handled the task I gave her of splitting time, but she handled it in a manner that showed me what a great attitude she has.'

McDonald (Olmstead Falls, OH), an Olmstead Falls High School graduate, was the key role player for the Scots this year, and according to Swank, she handled her responsibilities perfectly. "Penny gave us everything she was capable of giving," said Swank. "She was a role player who came through for us very well. She knew what her role was, she accepted it, and she excelled in it." McDonald averaged over three rebounds per game for the Scots in 88-89 and near three points per game. She left Edinboro with 152 career points and 170 career rebounds.



The Brain Trust

In 88-89, Sarah Bishop and Montique Wade (both juniors at the time) were once again the heart of the Lady Scots. Both were named to the All-PC-West squad for the second straight year. The tandem combined for 43% (932 points) of EU's 2,182 total points and 35% (437 rebounds) of 1,253 total rebounds. They also combined to contribute 111 assists and 126 steals. Swank knows that he has a returning commodity when he thinks of the duo. "Sarah and Montique are, right now, the best two women's basketball players in Edinboro history," said Swank. "They have accomplished all that they could ever have hoped to in just three seasons with the exception of one thing. They have never 'grabbed the brass ring'. I suppose that gives them even more reason to shoot for the conference title."

Bishop (Munroe Falls, OH), a graduate of Stow High School, was the scoring leader for the Lady Scots. She pumped in 475 points (17.6 ppg) connecting on 202 of 439 from the field for 46%. She was also an ace from the free throw line, canning 70 of 96 for 73%. Her 143 rebounds gave her a 5.3 average and she dished out a career high 68 assists as well as collecting 59 steals in her team high 944 minutes played. In addition to All-Conference honors, she was named Most Valuable Player at the Lady Scot Invitational Tournament and was named PC-West "Player of the Week" twice. An impressive ongoing statistic has Bishop scoring in double-digits in 52 consecutive games.

Bishop's career totals to date would be impressive for a departing senior, let alone someone who has a year remaining. Her 1,114 career points currently places her 5th in Edinboro history, she would need only 223 points this year to become EU's all-time leader. Bishop's 382 career rebounds is 14th in EU history, and she would need only 182 to finish as high as 4th all-time.

Wade (Pittsburgh, PA) was once again the rebounding leader for the Scots. The North Catholic High School graduate hauled down 294 boards for a 10.9 average. She was also second on

the team in scoring. She scored 457 points (16.9 ppg), knocking in 174 of 371 field goals for 47% and 108 of 157 free throws for 69%. Wade also added 43 assists and 67 steals as well as 12 blocked shots. Wade played 868 total minutes, only Bishop played more and no one else was over 700. In addition to All-Conference laurels, she was named to the Lady Scot Invitational All-Tournament team and received PC-West "Player of the Week" honors twice.

Wade's career totals are also very impressive — particularly for someone with a year remaining. Her 1,228 career points places her 2nd on the all-time scoring list, leaving her only 109 points away from becoming the University's all-time scoring leader. Her 787 career rebounds is also 2nd all-time and she needs just 22 more boards to become the University's all-time leader in that category also.

"Neither Bishop or Wade scored as much or had as many rebounds as they did in 87-88," commented Swank. "That is because that year it was the 'Sarah and Mo' show. This year they had a supporting cast that took much of the pressure off of their shoulders and both of them welcomed the 'team' concept. What the future holds for these two is unknown. Regardless of that, what they have already done is tremendous."

Last year's other juniors, Andrea Martre and Michelle McChesney, were also key performers for the Lady Scots.

Martre (Memphis, TN), a transfer from Shelby State Community College and a graduate of Fairley High School, made an immediate impact for the Scots this year. She finished 3rd on the squad in scoring, knocking in 385 points for a 14.3 average. She also had 102 assists, second only to Urey, and led the Ladies with 74 steals. Martre bombed in a team high 38 three-pointers and hauled down 68 rebounds for a 2.5 average. "Andrea brought in instant experience from the 'Juco' level," said Swank. "Rather than having to train a freshman, she stepped right in and played with the experience necessary to win. Her ability to shoot the three point shot in clutch situations was also very crucial for us."

McChesney (Fredonia, PA), another Lakeview High School grad, started down the stretch and in the playoffs for the Scots. She averaged 3.4 points per game and almost two rebounds per game. She dished out 18 assists and had 19 steals. Most impressively, she had only 8 turnovers in 284 minutes played. "'Chez' had a great year for us," said Swank. "She came alive down the stretch, especially in the state tournament. Her ability to fit into her role and to play with desire was key to our success this season."

Toyia Giles (Erie, PA), a transfer from Gannon University and an Erie East High School grad, came in after the winter break and was an instant success. In just 21 games, the 6-0 sophomore compiled three very impressive statistics for the Lady Scots. She hauled down 219 rebounds for a 10.4 average, second only to Wade. She also pumped in 189 points (9.0 ppg), shooting an impressive 50% from the field (70-140) and 64% from the free throw line (49-77). Possibly the most impressive stat is her team high 68 blocked shots, which she compiled without fouling out of a single game and playing in only 551 minutes. "Toyia has unlimited potential," said Swank. "She came right in and gave us a force underneath that was definitely a key to our season."

The contributions of the freshmen corps were also noticeable, particularly those of Tracey Wittgartner, (Pittsburgh, PA). A 5-11 graduate of Upper St. Clair High School, Tracey had an excellent

first season. "Even though she was slowed by a knee injury and missed seven games," said Swank, "she still scored 171 points in her freshman year, and that is impressive." Her 171 points gave her an 8.6 average. She shot an impressive 79-160 from the field for 49% and hauled down 63 boards for a 3.2 average. Tracey's identical twin sister, Bobbi Wittgartner, also a 5-11 Upper St. Clair grad, left an impression on Swank. "Bobbi has the ability to accomplish everything that Tracey can," said the coach, "and I think she will do it because she is a 'late bloomer.' "Bobbi averaged just under one point per game and over one rebound per game in limited action for Swank.

Other freshmen who contributed to the Lady Scot cause were Shelly Walker (General McLane HS/McKean, PA) 2.1 points per game and 3.8 rebounds per game; Sandy Smith (Chardon HS/Chardon, OH) 2.1 ppg and 0.4 rpg; Tammy Flynn (Damascus HS/Clarksburg, MD), 1.4 ppg and 0.9 rpg; Natalie Pascarella (Elizabeth Forward HS/Monongahela, PA) 0.5 ppg and 1.5 rpg; Karen Beall (Damascus HS/Clarksburg, MD) 0.8 ppg and 0.9 rpg; and Dawn Page (North East HS/North East, PA), 0.5 ppg and 1.2 rpg.

"I know we had a successful season," concluded Swank. "We averaged 80.8 points per game and at one time were second in the nation in total offense. We were 10th in scoring margin, too. We shot almost 70 percent from the free throw line and out rebounded our opponents by almost four boards a game. We were also ranked as high as 15th in the country and I think that validates the turnaround of the program. Combine stats like that with the new winning attitude this program has and you can see that 88-89 was an optimal season for us."

Swank, who was named PSAC-West "Coach of the Year," gives all the credit to his team. "The whole season was 'we'. Everything from my award to Sarah and Montique making all-conference can be attributed to the team as a whole, the way they played together and the way they stuck together all year long. Everything boils down to one thing . . . the team. The team had the desire to win and they did just that."
