

PRESIDENT FOSTER F. DIEBOLD

Since his appointment as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania on August 1, 1979, Foster F. Diebold has initiated a wide variety of policies and programs designed to complement his desire for an increased level of excellence and quality in higher education.

Noted for his extensive experience in the field of education management, President Diebold previously served as president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. His principal fields of professional interests include ethical issues in higher education, higher education management, budget development and fiscal control, legislative affairs, personnel management and collective bargaining, and international education.

A native of Orange, New Jersey, President Diebold served as president of the University of Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Prior to that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of the Division of College Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township Public Schools in New Jersey.

A graduate of Monmouth College, President Diebold holds a bachelor of science in education and a master of arts in educational administration from Seton Hall University. He has met course requirements for his doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently enrolled in the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

As chairman of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities' Committee on Governance, President Diebold has emerged as a national and international figure in the world of higher education. His special fields of interest are ethics in education and international programs. As chairman of the National Committee on Governance, he presented a statement of ethics to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities in November 1988. The statement, "Ethical Practices for College

Presidents," was unanimously adopted at the annual meeting of AASCU and has been published and circulated as a policy statement by that organization. It should be noted that this code of ethics is the first ever to be officially adopted by a professional organization and directed to the performance of college and university presidents.

President Diebold also serves as chairperson of the Advancement Committee of the Chancellor's Executive Council (State System of Higher Education). He is a member of the Western Pennsylvania Education Council and the International Association of University Presidents.

Active in the community, the President, among other activities, serves on the Board of Directors of the United Way of Erie County, the Board of Corporators of the St. Vincent Foundation for Health and Human Services, and the Advisory Board of the McMannis Educational Trust Fund. President Diebold is also a member of the Hamot Medical Center Board of Corporators, the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Corporation Scholarship Review Committee, and the Marine Bank Advisory Board.

President Diebold resides in Edinboro with his wife, Patricia, and daughters, Jessica and Stacey.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR JIM McDONALD

Edinboro University's athletic program was placed under the talented and aggressive leadership of Jim McDonald in July of 1981. Increased emphasis on fund raising to provide a sound scholarship foundation has become his top priority while numerous changes and innovations have also keyed the Scots' athletic program under his direction.

Through his efforts more than \$3.3 million has been raised during the past nine years. The funds generated by the energetic athletic director's efforts will be used to assist Edinboro's men and women athletes who compete in the Scots eighteen intercollegiate sports.

In addition to maintaining Edinboro's respected winning tradition in intercollegiate athletics, the former health and physical education professor has vastly expanded the University's summer activities.

Fifty-two camps were sponsored by the Fighting Scots Booster Club this past summer on the University's campus. Sox Harrison Stadium is the site of the Cleveland Browns vs. the Buffalo Bills annual rookie scrimmage, which has been a yearly mid-summer highlight.

The personable athletic director also introduced Edinboro's Hall of Fame program which has evolved into an annual year-ending event to honor present and past athletes.

McDonald has been at Edinboro since 1962 and for 12 years served as the Fighting Scot basketball coach (1962-1975) and never experienced a losing season while his teams compiled an impressive 181 wins against only 89 losses. During that span, his cagers won four Western Division Pennsylvania Conference crowns, the PC state championship and two District 18 titles that netted trips to the NAIA National Tournament. His teams set 27 University records made 19 post-season appearances while four of his players were named All-Americans.

Prior to accepting his position at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant basketball coach in Erie, PA. He is a 1956 graduate of Bridgeport High School in his home town of Bridgeport, West Virginia.

In 1960 he received a degree in chemistry and physical education from West Virginia Wesleyan College and he also holds a master's degree in health from the University of Buffalo.

As an undergraduate, he set nine school records at Wesleyan and was twice voted both AP and UPI basketball All-American. In 1960, he was the second leading scorer in the United States, averaging slightly over 33 points a game, and led his team to the national basketball tournament in Kansas City, Missouri. He was named to the NAIA's All-Tournament Team in 1959 and 1960.

In 1966, McDonald was selected Area Eight Coach of the Year by the eastern seaboard coaches and that same year was honored as one of the top ten finalists in the Coach of the Year national poll. McDonald's honors also include selection to the West Virginia All-Time College Basketball Team and membership in the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

As a resident of Edinboro, McDonald has a record of extensive community involvement. He was Little League Baseball director for four years and also held a four-year post as a member of the General McLane School Board. He and his wife, Mary Lou, have three sons — Mark, Mike and Matthew.

HEAD COACH STAN SWANK

The Winning Tradition Continues . . .

Edinboro University hired Stan Swank three years ago, giving Swank his first opportunity to head a Division II program. Based on his career marks at Parkland Junior College in Champaign, Illinois, positive results were expected. In his three seasons with the EUP program, the Lady Scots have improved each year. Last season, Swank guided the Lady Scots to their second straight PSAC Western Division crown, their first conference title and a berth in the NCAA Division II national tournament. In just three years, Stan Swank has built a program that can compete on the national level.


Entering into the 1987-88 campaign, Edinboro was trying to halt a skid of three consecutive losing seasons. A new direction was needed and Swank provided the necessary spark. Swank guided the Scots to an impressive 14-11 record in his debut campaign, finishing one game out of the PSAC playoffs with a team comprised mainly of underclassmen.

In '88-89, Edinboro stormed the PSAC and won the PSAC-West title. Swank guided the Lady Scots to their first ever playoff tournament and advanced to the state championship game in Bloomsburg. Compiling a 21-6 overall record (10-2 in the PC-West), the 1988-89 edition of the Lady Scots became EU's most successful women's basketball team to date. All this in two years.

The 1989-90 season saw Edinboro capture its second consecutive PSAC West title with an 11-1 mark. With an overall 27-3 mark and a national ranking, the Lady Scots captured their first-ever conference championship and reached the round of 16 in the Division II playoffs, before bowing out. In both the conference tournament and the opening round of the national playoffs, Edinboro played host. All this after just three years.

Swank began his coaching career at Nova High School in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, where he was an assistant men's coach. He helped guide his squad to an outstanding 30-3 mark and finish eighth in the state. In 1977 he joined the Parkland Junior College staff as an assistant coach with Parkland's men's team. In 1980, he began a two year stint as head coach of the Fisher High School boy's varsity team. He left Fisher with a 39-14 record and two regional championships under his belt. Parkland JC came looking for new leadership for its women's program and Swank fit the bill. 1983 was the first of four stellar seasons for Parkland as Swank led the Cobras to four straight 20-plus winning seasons, culminating with a 30-4 finish in 85-86 and a 30-3 finish in 86-87. 1987's unit finished the year ranked 13th in the NJCAA final rankings and led the NJCAA in scoring average, pouring in 93.8 points per game. That year's unit eclipsed the 100 point mark eleven times, scoring 129 points for a season high. His overall mark as head coach of Parkland's women's team was 104 wins versus just 20 losses.

His accomplishments with the Parkland's women's basketball team are many, and they include four straight sectional championships (83-84 through 86-87), two third place finishes in NJCAA Region XXIV (83-84 and 84-85), and two regional runner-up finishes (85-86 and 86-87).

While at Parkland, Swank was also head of the women's softball program and he guided the Cobra diamonders to a 37-36-1 overall record including two sectional runner-ups and a sectional title.

Coming to Edinboro for the 1987-88 season, Swank's credentials spoke for themselves. No team he had been head coach of had ever had a losing season. But he faced a program that lacked leadership as the roster boasted only one senior. Lacking the asset of experience.

Swank let his energy and charisma take over and as the season progressed it became evident that the Lady Scots were forming the "foundation of a winning tradition" that he saw bare fruit last year. The success of last year's team speaks highly of Swank's ability to turn a program around. The foundation of the Scots is solid and the glue that holds the foundation together is the knowledge, energy, and emotion of Stan Swank.

Swank is a 1976 graduate of Purdue University. He left Purdue with a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education, then returned to receive a Master of Science Degree in Educational Administration four years later. He is a 1972 graduate of Champaign Centennial High School.

Swank and his wife, Gail, have two children; seven-yearold Stanley II, and Benjamin, who is three. The Swank family resides year-round In Edinboro.

motions of special sporting events held at the University. He was in charge of promoting the USA/USSR Olympic style wrestling match held in McComb in April of 1989.




JIM ROSS

While at Messiah, Audra worked for all of the Falcons' men's and women's varsity sports. She is currently working towards her Master's degree in Counseling and Personal



1990-91 EDINBORO UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S BASKETBALL PREVIEW

What lies ahead for fourth-year head coach Stan Swank, and the Edinboro University Lady Scot basketball team is anyone's guess. The task ahead for the veteran mentor is certainly not the envy of any other Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference coach.

Swank and his program must replace a trio of seniors that could be tabbed as the finest threesome to ever play together in EU women's basketball history. Gone through graduation are Montique Wade, Sarah Bishop and Andrea Martre. The three combined for nearly 4,300 points during their respective careers with Wade and Bishop solidly set at 1-2 on the school's all-time scoring list. Wade currently stands at the PSAC's all-time leading rebounder while Bishop set the state single-season free throw mark last year. To top it off, Martre holds the all-time PSAC single season assist mark with 238. Wade and Bishop stand sixth and seventh on the all time PSAC point list.

"You don't replace players of that caliber," Swank commented. "You only hope to field a number of players to pick up the scoring slack. It is time to move on, time for some of the other players to move to the forefront."

It is not likely that Swank will get a whole lot of sympathy from the rest of the division. The Lady Scots have captured the western division title the last two seasons and claimed the PSAC crown a year ago. Edinboro posted a 27-3 slate last winter and were runners up in the East Region.

This year, the roster contains no seniors and the Lady Scots return just two letterwinners and no starters from that 89-90 squad. Only three players have ever dressed for game action for the Lady Scots.

Returning for Swank are forwards Shelly Walker and Dawn Page and guard Brenda Jones. Walker shot 50% from the floor last year averaging just over three points per game. She also grabbed 113 rebounds, fifth most on the squad. The latter two were part-time performers last year for the Lady Scots.

It is obvious that Swank is going to have to rely on a solid recruiting class if Edinboro is going to defend the division title.

Top incoming players include guard Desiree Alexander and forward Tammy Walker. Both junior college transfers, the twosome should have an immediate impact on this year's squad. Alexander led Sullivan County JC in assists last year in helping them to a 30-2 season. Walker, at 6'0", is a product of Lexington, KY, and will anchor the interior for Swank.

Also expected to help right away are guard Tami Kloes and forward DeAnna Martin. Kloes led Mars High School

in scoring (15 ppg), steals (6.0) and assists (5.0) last year while Martin averaged 14 points and 10 rebounds for Field High School in Ohio.

Other top newcomers include Brigitte Owen and Mari Hollman. Owen is from Seton LaSalle where she was named to the WPIAL sectional all-star squad while Hollman was an all conference performer for General McLane High School in Edinboro.

Also looking to contribute will be a trio of forwards in Terri Ayers, Cathlene Criss and Barb Warhold. Ayers is 6'3" while Criss stands at an even six-foot. Ayers helped Steel Valley HS to a 21-3 mark her senior year while Criss was the foundation for Bethel Park's final-four berth in the WPIAL championships. Warhold is a product of Keystone Oaks High, also out of the Pittsburgh area.

Three backcourt players will also look to crack the starting line up for Swank as Dawn Jackson, Angie Little and Ivy Turner give the team quality depth at guard.

Jackson, projected at the point or 2-guard spot, led Patterson HS in New Jersey in scoring while Little was tabbed "Female Athlete of the Year" at Cassadaga HS in New York the past two years. Turner, an all-PSAC member of the Lady Scot softball team, scored over 1,000 points at Schenley High.

"This year poses a great challenge for our program," Swank commented. "The team will have to jell early to try and develop the 'team concept'. Sure we lost a great deal but there is plenty of talent to try and fill the holes. It should prove to be interesting, I am looking forward to the challenge.

"Our schedule is the toughest it has ever been since my appointment here at Edinboro. Playing the likes of UPJ, Millersville, Kutztown, Gannon and Mercyhurst will get us ready for the conference play. I am sure the western division will be shooting at us," Swank continued.

"The west will be very strong. IUP returns everyone, Cal is traditionally tough and Lock Haven has got to be the pre-season favorite because they were the Regional champs," Swank said. "Clarion will be greatly improved as will Slippery Rock and Shippensburg, so there will be no automatic wins in the west."

The Lady Scots begin a "second era" under Swank and the future is still very much in question. Wherever Swank has coached he has produced a winner. Edinboro has benefited greatly from his abilities. 1990-91 may pose the biggest challenge ever for the Champaign, IL native.



EDINBORO REACHES SWEET 16 CONCLUDE FINEST YEAR EVER Lady Scots Finish 27-3; Conclude Regular Season Ranked 11th

Expectations. Every team starts the year with goals in mind. Not every team can accomplish them. That was not the case for the Edinboro University women's basketball team and their third-year head coach Stan Swank in '89-90.

After concluding their season 27-3 on the short end of the NCAA Division II, East Regional championship game, Edinboro was obviously disappointed. But at a glance, the 1989-90 season may be viewed as the finest ever in the history of Edinboro Lady Scot basketball.

A number 11 ranking in the final NCAA II poll, a Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference & Western Division Championship, Coach and Player of the Year honors and the most wins in school history on the Division II level top the accolade list.

"Overall, it was just a tremendous season," Swank said. "The girls may have gone beyond their own expectations. We set goals to win the PSAC and get into the national playoffs and those are two rather big accomplishments. The effort of this team was there all season. With the amount of individual talent, it was of utmost importance to be unselfish. They shared the limelight and their accomplishments were the result of team play," Swank continued.

Right or not, when a team has this type of success the credit has to start with the coaching staff.

When Edinboro hired Stan Swank three years ago, the women's basketball team had not posted a winning season since 1983-84. After earning a 14-12 slate in '87-88, Swank led the Lady Scots to a 21-6 mark last year and a PSAC western crown. This season, he earned PSAC Western Division "Coach of the Year" honors for the second straight year and also copped the PSAC coaching honor for the entire conference.

The task at hand for Swank will be trying to replace seniors Montique Wade (Pittsburgh, PA), Sarah Bishop (Munroe Falls, OH) and Andrea Martre (Memphis, TN). The trio combined for 4,287 points with Wade the all-time leading scorer in 'Boro history with 1,775. Bishop follows in second with 1,673 tallies while Martre netted 839, to rank 11th, in just two seacons.

Wade, a forward from North Catholic High School, has left a hugh mark on the Edinboro and PSAC record books. She is not only the school's top scorer but also its most prolific rebounder. At just 5-foot-9 inches, Wade snared 1,113 rebounds to stand at the top of the EU & PSAC record books. She finished her stellar career earning PSAC West "Player of the Year" honors in 89-90 for her 18.2 points per game and 10.9 rebound per game marks. Wade was tabbed 1st team PSAC West All-Star for three straight years.

This year, Wade also led the team in steals with 80 and was third in assists with 72.

"I have been blessed with two of the finest players that may ever play at Edinboro in Wade and Bishop," Swank said. "They are best of friends and compliment each other so well on the floor. Needless to say, they will be impossible to replace as people first and players second. My greatest compliment to them would be that they were like assistant coaches in the locker room as well as on the court."

"They personify exactly what a student-athlete should be in college athletics. They have excelled in the classroom as well as in their sport," Swank continued.

Bishop, out of Stow High School, epitomized the term "shooting guard" throughout her banner career. She averaged 18.2 ppg over 92 games at the 'Boro and finished as the school's fourth best rebounder with 565. Deadly at the free throw line, Bishop broke the PSAC mark for single season percentage this year, connecting on 105-of-121 freebies for .868%. The total ranks in the top three nationally this season on the Division II level.

This season, Bishop was also tabbed to the Western Division all-star first team for the third straight time. She led the Lady Scots in scoring with 18.6 ppg and shot over 50% from the field (225-446). Over four years, Bishop shot an impressive 46% from the floor (702-1506). This season she also grabbed 183 rebounds (6.1 rpg) and was second on the team in assists (94) and steals (79).

Martre, a transfer two years ago from Shelby State Community College, may have been the main cog in the success of this year's team. She ran Swank's offense from the point and broke an all-time PSAC record for assists in a single season with 238. That shattered the old mark previously held by Lori Young (Lock Haven) by 50. Martre also found time to average 15.1 ppg and was third on the squad with 74 steals. She also led the Lady Scots with 50 three-point goals on 131 attempts (38%). At season's end, Martre was tabbed to the PSAC West second-team all star squad.

FINEST YEAR EVER (continued)

Another senior Swank must replace will be backup guard **Michelle McChesney (Fredonia, PA).** A product from nearby Lakeview High, "Chez" will graduate with 362 career points (4.1 ppg), 47 assists and 65 steals. She was a spot starter at the 'Boro and played 89 games during her career.

The two other top performers for the Lady Scots this season were a pair of juniors in guard **Demetra Adams (Donaldsville, GA)** and center **Toyia Giles (Erie, PA).** Adams, a JUCO transfer last Christmas, finished fourth on the squad in points scored (344) and third in average per game at 15.6. She connected on 73% of her free throw attempts and drilled 34 three-point goals. The quickly made a name for herself in the PSAC, being tabbed to the second team all-star squad along with Martre. Adams will be the key scoring force for Swank next year.

Giles, a product of nearby Erie East High, anchored the middle for the Lady Scots at both ends of the floor. She averaged just under ten points per game (9.5) while shooting 48% from the field. Giles was second to Wade in rebounding, grabbing 276 boards for an average of 9.9 per game. She led the team with 73 blocked shots. Through two years with the Lady Scots, Giles has snared 495 rebounds to rank ninth on the all-time list. She has also blocked 141 (2.9 pbg) shots in her 49-game career.

Also contributing on the inside were back-up forwards Shelly Walker (McKean, PA), Natalie Pascarella (Monongahela, PA) and Tina Odem (Sharon, PA). Walker, from General McLane HS, spelled Giles at center playing in 28 games for the Lady Scots. She scored 93 points (3.3 ppg) on the year and contributed 113 rebounds (4.1). Walker was second to Giles in blocks with 13.

Pascarella (2.2 ppg), played in 24 games for 'Boro and gave Swank quality minutes off the bench while Odem (0.3) played in ten games this semester. Both are likely to play more significant roles for the Lady Scots next season.

Guards Beth Sorber (E. Rochester, NY), Dana Tharp (Perry, OH), Brenda Jones (Saegertown, PA) and Marnie Fiscus (Transfer, PA) round out Swank's "baker's dozen" of thirteen players.

Sorber, used mostly at the point, played in 21 games, scoring 15 points and handing out 15 assists. Tharp saw time in 14 contests and scored six tallies while Jones and Fiscus combined to score five in thirty games of action.

Swank was quick to point out the significant contributions of his bench players.

"They deserve as much credit as any of the starters. They were here everyday and were part of a championship team and that is something that no one can ever take away. I am proud of each and everyone of them," Swank continued.

"I realize the task ahead for the coaching staff. Some people are difficult to replace. It is time to get back on the road and try to find quality individuals to fill some shoes. Some awful big shoes," Swank concluded.

Counting the quad of seniors (Wade, Bishop, Martre, McChesney) over their respective careers, coach Swank and his staff must replace 4,649 points, 2,015 rebounds, 849 assists and 700 steals.

Needless to say, there are some awful BIG shoes to fill.


