HISTORY

Ninety years have gone by since Edinboro was first chartered as a State Normal School — ninety years of growth and service to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The beginnings of the college were laid in 1857 when a band of Scotch-Irish farmers grouped together and founded a private academy at Edinboro by popular subscription, but it was not until 1861 that it was chartered by the State as Pennsylvania's second Normal School.

A great forward stride was taken in 1914, when the Commonwealth purchased Edinboro Normal School and made it the property of the State. Twelve years later, realizing the need of the schools of Pennsylvania for better educated teachers, the Commonwealth made Edinboro a Teachers College by organizing a four-year curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education.

Although designed primarily to serve the counties of Erie, Crawford, Mercer, Venango, and Warren, Edinboro receives and welcomes students from every section of this state and from other states.

As a result of the building program concluded in 1940 there are four new buildings, — gymnasium, training and demonstra-

tion school, power plant, and spacious auditorium. For these and the older buildings, the campus of thirty-eight acres makes an appropriate setting. Haven Hall, the women's dormitory, was built during the administration of John F. Bigler. Reeder Hall, the men's dormitory, was built in 1907 and named in honor of one of the early donors of the school. Academy Hall, known recently as Music Hall, is the oldest building on the campus, having been built about 1857. Normal Hall was built in 1875 and in 1891 was considerably enlarged. Today it contains the administration offices, the library, several classrooms, and the old auditorium. Recitation Hall, built early in the history of the school, provides class room space. The New Gymnasium, with its excellent athletic facilities, now overshadows the old gymnasium, which is outmoded. Loveland Hall is named for the late Mr. Frank Loveland of Corry, who for many years was a trustee of the College; this building was built in 1930 and houses the Art and Science departments. A temporary science building was erected by the Federal Works Agency in 1947.

We are rightly proud of our campus because of its attractiveness, its accommodations and its traditions. We hope this pride will continue to be shared by all incoming students.

CONTROL OF THE COLLEGE

The control of the College is vested in the Board of Trustees, composed of nine members with John K. Earp, as President, and Will P. Rose as Vice-President. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is an ex-officio member.

INFIRMARY

The College Nurse lives in a suite adjoining the Infirmary which is located on the first floor of Haven Hall. Dr. Harold Ghering, the College Physician, is at the infirmary between 11:00 A.M. and 12:00 Noon.

While the Nurse can be found at the Infirmary at practically any time, students are asked to respect the following office hours:

7:45 A.M. to 9:00 A.M.

11:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon

4:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.

IN CASE OF EMERGENCY, the students may call Doctor Ghering at the Clinic, Edinboro 2182 or at his home, Edinboro 2174.

ILLNESS IN ROOM

The illness of any student in his room must be reported immediately to the College

Nurse. She or the physician will visit him and prescribe treatment. The student will be moved to the Infirmary if necessary.

Off-Campus and day students also have the services of the physician and nurse.

REQUESTS FOR TRAYS

Requests for trays for students ill in their rooms must be made to the nurse before the following hours:

For breakfast 7:00 A.M.

For luncheon 11:30 A.M.

For dinner 5:30 P.M.

DINING ROOM

Meals are served to boarding students in the College dining room located in Haven Hall. The dining room, which seats 400 people, accommodates all the boarding students because the self-service method is used in serving meals. Meal hours are:

Admittance to the dining room is by meal ticket only. These tickets are issued to all boarding students and are **non-transferable**.

A limited number of guests may be accommodated in the dining room, providing individual meal tickets are purchased in advance in the office of the Director of Food Service.

THE LIBRARY

The entering student at Edinboro State Teachers College soon discovers the educational and recreational facilities available in our College Library. Approximately thirty thousand volumes offer a wide range for reference and study. A generous fiction section and 193 magazines and periodicals give the student an opportunity to fill leisure hours with enjoyable reading.

Our library has the distinction of being one of the few in the state which employs open shelves for all books, thus allowing all students easy access to the volumes. Of course, this system must be carefully super-

vised and consequently certain rules must be observed.

1. All books which have been definitely assigned to classes are placed on shelves directly behind the desk and are known as the Reserve Books. Such books may be withdrawn at 5:00 P.M., and returned at 7:00 P. M., or taken at 8:30 P.M. and returned before 9:00 A.M. the following morning. Failure to observe these rules will result in a fine of ten cents per hour.

2. Books not on reserve but in demand are termed "overnight books" and may leave the Library at any time of the day or overnight and must be returned before 9:00 A.M. the following day. Penalty for late return is ten cents a day.

3. All books except those on reserve may be withdrawn for two weeks; a fine of two cents a day will be charged for books kept overtime. Encyclopedia volumes and dictionaries may not be withdrawn.

4. Magazines may be withdrawn from the Library subject to the same rules as Reserve Books.

5. No student will be issued grades or credits until all library obligations have been settled.

6. No books may be removed from the Library except by proper charging at the desk by the Librarian in charge. Anyone

taking books not properly charged from the Library will be subject to a fine of \$5.00 for each book and suspension from all College activities until such fines are paid. Clipping and marking books is prohibited.

The Library is located on the second floor of Normal Hall and throughout the year will observe the following hours:

1:00 P.M. — 4:00 P.M.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

Grading System

Standards indicating the quality of work are:

"A" — grade given to students whose work is clearly of an exceptional nature.

"B" — grade given to students who do distinctly superior work.

"C" — grade representing work of good quality.

"D" — grade indicating unsatisfactory work.

"F" — grade indicating failure. Any course in which an "F" grade has been earned must be repeated.

"X" — not a grade, but a mark indicating that the student, for some justifiable cause, has not been able to complete the required work within the time limit.

The Dean's List

Twice a year there is published, "The Dean's List," a list of students who have made a grade "B" or better in every course taken during the previous semester.

The following number of credits are necessary to become a member of each class:

REGISTRATION

Students are reminded to register and pay fees on the assigned dates. **All fees must be paid in advance.** Permissions must be obtained from the President of the College in advance to avoid penalty for late payment.

Dates of registration and payment of fees may be found in the Calendar.

ABSENCE AND TARDINESS

Students should be familiar with the method of securing excuses for absences from class. The burden of responsibility for absence and tardiness rests at all times upon the individual involved. He must take the initiative in planning for making up work after an absence. Please note that no unexcused absence is without penalty.

The following regulations governing excused and unexcused absences for all students have been approved by the faculty.

1. Excused absence forms may be secured from the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women for one of the following reasons:
 - a. Personal illness or emergency medical or dental appointments.
 - (1) A written statement from the college nurse, the college physician, or the family doctor or dentist.
 - b. Serious illness or death in the immediate family.
 - c. Marriage in the immediate family.
 - d. Absence from the campus for participation in athletic contests (or other college activities) when requested by

the faculty sponsor and approved by the Dean of Instruction.

2. If the student does not secure his excuse from the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women and **present it to the instructor within seven days** after the absence, the absence shall be considered unexcused.
3. There is no cut system at Edinboro State Teachers College.
4. Unexcused absences are regarded as prima facie evidence of neglect and indifference on the part of the student and are so considered in assigning grades.
5. Three tardinesses shall be considered as equal to one unexcused absence.
6. It is the **student's responsibility** to contact his instructors to make up work missed because of an excused absence. If he does not make up this work, he will be penalized in his grade.
7. The student may not make up work because of an unexcused absence. He will be penalized in his grade for all unexcused absences. For example, in a three-credit course three unexcused absences will result in lowering the grade one letter; four unexcused absences will result in expulsion from class with failure.
8. Whenever a student has been absent from any course more than twenty per

cent of its total class hours, the teacher in charge shall report the case to the Chairman of the Absence Committee.

No student whose absences from any course exceed twenty per cent of its total class hours shall receive credit for that course. In individual cases where obvious injustice would result from enforcement of this rule, the Absence Committee of the Faculty may waive it.

9. Reports of absences, both excused and unexcused, will be sent to parents at the end of each quarter.

ASSEMBLY

Each Wednesday morning the entire student body meets in the auditorium for a period of worship and entertainment. The programs are varied and consist of lectures by prominent thinkers, musical recitals, plays, skits, movies, and important announcements. A committee of students meets with the faculty sponsors to plan the programs.

Every student at Edinboro is required to attend. An assembly seating list will be prepared with seats assigned and attendance will be checked. The list of absentees will be filed in the office of the Dean of Instruction. Each unexcused absence automatically lowers by one point the total accumulation of quality points which the student has earned toward graduation.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Student Council

The Student-Faculty Council considers and enacts much legislation in connection with campus problems. Probably its most important function is the budgeting of the Student-Activity Fund. The Council meets regularly and is always ready to listen to and discuss any new proposal for college progress. Council meetings are open to any of the student body who wish to attend.

Council members are elected by the student body and faculty and serve for two semesters. Membership in this group should be considered a very high honor.

CONSTITUTION

Revised 1948

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be the Student-Faculty Co-operative Government of the Edinboro State Teachers College.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

While appreciating deeply the province and functions of the Trustees, College President, Dean of Instruction, the Dean of

Women, Bursar and other officials and faculty committees and members, organized chiefly for administering the business and instruction of the college, we, the students, the faculty, and the President of the College, feel that there still remains unoccupied a large promising field for cooperative service. Accordingly, we do hereby declare that the purpose of the Co-operative Government is to take over increasingly the responsibility for organizing and directing purely student affairs, to co-operate with the proper college authorities in matters of student welfare, and to seek constantly to make the college a better agency for developing effective citizens and teachers.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this Co-operative Government shall consist of all students, all faculty members, and the President of the College.

ARTICLE IV

General Organization

Section 1. The functions of this Co-operative Government shall be distributed as follows:

(a) legislative functions in relation to all student and student-faculty agencies now ex-

isting and to be organized are vested in a Council, and (b) executive functions, including the veto of any measure passed by the Council, are vested in the President of the College.

Section 2. The existing student-faculty agencies and student organizations with faculty sponsors are to continue in their present form and to function as at present until such time as they may be modified either by vote of the Council and approved by the College President or by direction of the College President.

ARTICLE V

Membership, Election, Officers of the Council

Section 1. The Student Faculty-Council shall be composed of seventeen members, eight of whom — four men and four women — shall be students elected by the several classes, a representative from the Reeder Hall Council, a representative from the Haven Hall Council, a representative of off-campus men, a representative of off-campus women, a chairman, elected by popular vote, a faculty member elected by the faculty, a faculty member appointed by the President, the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women.

Section 2. Methods of election:

To be eligible for election to the Council

students should be outstanding in character and ability and have a college record of better than a "C" average.

Each class shall elect annually, at the beginning of the first semester, a woman, and, at the beginning of the second semester, a man, the men and women each to serve for two semesters. During the first quarter of the first semester the freshmen class shall also elect annually a man to represent it for one semester.

The following method shall be used to elect class representatives:

The president of each class shall appoint a nominating committee of three which shall submit at a meeting of the class at least two nominations for each membership on the Council. These names shall be posted on the official bulletin board of the college for one week prior to the election, which must be completed, for the first semester election, by October 1 for the upper three classes and by the end of the first quarter for freshmen, and for the second semester election, by February 15. From this group of nominations, with or without additional nominations that may be made from the floor, the class shall elect by ballot its two representatives on the Council.

Other groups shall elect their representatives by popular vote prior to October 1.

The chairman shall be elected in the fol-

lowing manner: As soon as possible after the opening of the second semester, the president of the junior class shall appoint a nominating committee of three, who shall nominate at least two persons from the junior class as candidates for the office of Chairman of the Council. In addition, any junior may be eligible for this office if a petition signed by twenty-five students, requesting that his name be placed on the ballot, be presented to the secretary of the Council at least forty-eight hours before the election. Names of all candidates shall be posted on the official bulletin board at least twenty-four hours before the election. The election shall take place at an assembly not later than February 15, at which time each candidate will speak about his aims or plans regarding the Student-Faculty Co-operative Government. Following the speeches, the students shall elect the Chairman of the Council by ballot.

Section 3. Any student vacancy on the Council shall be filled for the balance of his term at a special election conducted in the same manner as herein prescribed for the regular election or appointment. Nothing in this Constitution shall prevent the election of any student doing student teaching in Erie, or shall prevent any student from succeeding himself or herself.

Section 4. The other officers of the Coun-

cil, which shall be vice-chairman and a secretary, shall be chosen annually by the Council from its student members immediately after the new president has taken office.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of the Council

Section 1. To initiate, organize, and direct, in co-operation with the faculty, a social program for the entire student body.

Section 2. To integrate, improve, and supervise the organization and activities of all students and student-faculty agencies.

Section 3. To act upon submitted requests for the organization of any new student or student-faculty agency.

Section 4. To provide, as needed, co-operative standing committees such as the following: House Committee, Publicity Committee, Athletic Committee, etc. These committees may co-operate with purely faculty committees for the same purpose. These standing committees should have at least five members (student and faculty) and should be appointed by the Chairman of the Council from the student and faculty bodies with the approval of the Council.

Section 5. To co-operate with the College President, the Trustees, or some properly delegated authority in the assessment, collection, and control of any Student Activity

Fee or other fees, or dues that the students, upon the recommendation of the Council, may agree by majority vote to assess or pay to provide for activities, agencies and welfare not adequately supported by the State; provided that the said fees or dues are approved by the President of the College and Board of Trustees, or other controlling agency.

Section 6. To hold regular meetings once each month, in addition to special meetings as needed when constructive suggestions or criticisms from students of faculty members shall be investigated and acted upon.

Section 7. To recommend to the faculty or the President of the College penalties for specific disciplinary cases which are not sufficiently serious to warrant possible expulsion or other severe punishment.

Section 8. To provide for at least one general study assembly each semester for the purpose of interpreting the work of the Council and for transacting any business of general interest to the Student Body brought before it by the Council, the College President, or a representative of the students or the faculty. At such assembly meetings the Chairman, or, in his absence, the vice-chairman of the Council shall preside; the secretary of the Council shall record the minutes.

ARTICLE VII

Powers of the President of the College

Because of the nature of the office of the President of the College and his responsibilities to the Board of Trustees, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, the State Council of Education, and the Governor, the President is an ex-officio member of all committees and to him is reserved the duty and right of final approval of all acts, rules and regulations that may be devised or offered.

ARTICLE VIII

Finances

Section 1. In order to co-ordinate and control the funds of the several student-faculty activities and organizations either now existing or that may be created, all funds belonging to or collected by the several organizations, shall, when requested by the Council, be deposited in and disbursed through a General Control Fund of which the President of the College and the Bursar or other faculty member or members may be custodians.

Section 2. The Bursar or any delegated member of the faculty of the College, may, upon request of the Council subject to the approval of the President of the College, keep individual and separate accounts of the

several funds and credits of each organization included within the General Control Fund as provided for in Article VIII, Section 1. Disbursements shall be made upon duly authorized requisitions of each organization.

Section 3. There shall be an annual audit of the General Control Fund made by an auditing committee of three, one representing the student body, one the faculty, and one the President of the College. This audit shall be published or posted at the beginning of each college year.

Section 4. To prepare and submit to the Faculty, the President, and any other interested persons by May 1, a tentative budget for the succeeding school year of the disbursement of Student Activity Funds; and to prepare and submit to students, faculty, the President, and other interested persons by October 1, a final budget for the disbursement of Student Activity Funds. This duty is to be performed by a committee, known as the Budget Committee, to consist of at least three students and two faculty members appointed by the Chairman of the Student Council.

ARTICLE IX

Ratification and Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution shall go into effect as soon as ratified by the approval of

the President of the College and by a two-thirds vote of the faculty and student body present when such vote is taken.

Section 2. This Constitution may be amended or revised by a majority vote of the entire student body and the faculty, provided that said amendment or revision first be submitted in writing to the Council and the President of the College, approved by them, and then posted for two weeks.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING CARS ON CAMPUS

Students retaining cars in Edinboro are required to register the cars with the Dean of Men and to obtain a campus license sticker. Car permission may be removed at any time for reckless driving on campus.

RECREATION ROOM

A temporary recreation center operates in the basement of Normal Hall on weekday evenings from 6:30 to 8:00 P.M. except evenings when a major social function or athletic event is scheduled. Ping-pong, dancing, and cards are featured. This is a project of the Student-Faculty Co-operative Council.

REGULATIONS FOR WOMEN

Section One — Women's Hours

I. Regular Permissions:

A. Regular hours shall be observed by women students according to the following schedule. Not only must women students be in the dormitory or other student residence after these hours, but in the private part of the residence.

Monday through Friday —

Freshmen (1st semester) ... 8.30 P.M.
(2nd semester) 9:00 P.M.
One ten o'clock per week.

Sophomores 9.30 P.M.
One ten o'clock per week.

Juniors 10:00 P.M.

Seniors 10:00 P.M.

Saturday 11:00 P.M.

All women students

Sunday 10:00 P.M.

All women students

B. Regulations concerning special late permission will be given students by the Dean of Women.

II. General Provisions

A. Whenever a woman student's name appears on the Dean of Instruction's list of students doing unsatisfactory work, i.e., work below standard, her

permissions are to be curtailed or withdrawn by the Dean of Women in an amount at least to correspond proportionately to the hours of work reported as unsatisfactory.

B. The Dean of Women's Office keeps a record of all permissions for each person. Women will be notified individually when their permissions have all been taken.

C. Permissions for absences from residences are granted as follows:

During the day:

1. In Edinboro.

All students may visit approved women's residences and business places and attend church services and shows at the local theater.

2. For the night.

A student is required to secure the written permission of her parents and of the Dean of Women.

3. Out of town.

Before leaving, except in case of short hikes, a student must secure permission of her parents and of the Dean of Women; except when going to her home over the weekend when a general permission is granted.

4. On the campus, but from one's own room.

A student may spend Saturday nights in a room other than her own, providing she registers her intention in writing with the Dean of Women.

Section Two — Guests

I. Men Students in Women's Residences:

A. Men students must not loiter in women's residences immediately following meals.

1. Men students who are with women residents may stay in the parlor until nine o'clock.

B. After ten o'clock on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday; eleven o'clock on Saturday; and ten o'clock on Sunday, only women students returning from social engagements with out-of-town escorts may entertain their escorts in the music room or parlor of their residence. Women students returning from social engagements may entertain such guests there until their permission ends.

C. Men are not permitted to remain in Haven Hall between the breakfast hour and the lunch hour.

D. Men and women guests must always conduct themselves in accordance with accepted standards of good taste. Violations of such standards will result in loss of privileges.

Section Three — Haven Hall House Council

The Haven Hall House Council acts as the administrative body for the execution of the regulations herein described; it is also an Advisory Council for student problems. The Council is made up of women students elected for one semester by those who reside in Haven Hall.

Section Four — Locking of Doors

All doors are locked at ten o'clock by the night watchman. Women students having late permissions will be admitted at the time for which their admission has been granted.

Section Five — Parents' Permissions

Women students' permissions for:

- (1) going home weekends
- (2) swimming

- (3) canoeing and boating
- (4) skating
- (5) riding in automobiles
- (6) visiting away from home or college

depend upon the action of the Dean of Women as determined by individual requests from parents. Forms will be sent to parents for recording their requests.

Because of the danger of accidents, permissions of parents must be granted before students may ride in automobiles. During the day all students may ride within the borough limits if their parents' permission is in the Dean's office, but after 6:00 P.M. students must have the additional permission of the Dean of Women. Special permission from the Dean of Women must be obtained for all trips outside the borough of Edinboro.

Women students are not permitted to leave for home after an evening college function of any kind, except by special written permission from her parents, which must be in the Dean of Women's office two days before the event.

Permission to maintain automobiles in Edinboro must be filed on blanks provided for that purpose by the Dean of Women. No women under twenty-one years of age will be permitted to maintain automobiles in Edinboro.

The use of or the possession of alcoholic beverages by women students is strictly forbidden. Failure to comply with this regulation may cause suspension or dismissal from the college.

Section Six

Dormitory Maintenance Problems

1. Rooms

Assignment to rooms is made by the Dean of Women or her agent. Keys are procured from the Office of the Bursar. Rooms must be kept clean and ready for inspection at all times. Tacks, scotch tape or nails in walls are not permitted. The electric wiring is not the type for heating appliances; therefore, electric irons and hot plates are not permitted.

Damage to furnishings or walls will result in a fine being charged against the offender. The minimum charge will be one dollar, to be paid to the College Bursar.

2. Smoking

Fire regulations and the protection of life and property require that students do not smoke in their rooms or elsewhere in the college buildings except where special provisions are made by the College.

3. Telephone

All residents of Haven Hall must become familiar with the campus telephone system and be ready, willing and able to answer the Haven Hall desk phone at all times.

4. Absence from Campus

Before leaving the campus for an absence of more than one hour, and after 5:30 P.M., a student is required to register her name, destination, and expected time of return on the forms provided at the Haven Hall desk, and upon returning, the time of her return.

5. Quiet

Evening quiet hours are desirable and arranged by House action. Night quiet hours, except Saturday, are from 8:00 P.M. to 10:30 P.M.; 11:00 P.M. to 7:00 A.M. Saturday; midnight to 9:00 A.M. Sunday. Pianos must not be played during these hours. Radios may be played at any time except during the night quiet hours, provided that they are tuned so they cannot be heard outside the room.

Typewriters may not be used after 11:00 P.M. excepting by special permission of the Dormitory Council.

6. Callers and Guests

(a) Guests for overnight or for the dining room should be introduced upon arrival to

the Dean of Women. Students may have overnight guests in the dormitory Saturday nights only. Arrangements for linen must be made before the guest arrives. Every guest must be registered with the Dean of Women. Registration forms are to be obtained at the Dean of Women's Office.

It is understood that guests will follow the regulations governing their hostess, and that the responsibility for acquainting guests with these regulations rests with the hostess.

Overnight guests must register on cards provided by the Dean of Women. Charge for overnight lodging is fifty cents per person.

(b) Fathers and other masculine guests of women students must be entertained in the dormitory lobby, unless by special permission they accompany a woman student to her room. This does not apply to the first day of the college year.

(c) The hall is closed to guests at 10:00 P.M. daily and 11:00 P.M. Saturday.

(d) On the evenings of all college functions, such as lectures, games, movies, etc., which last beyond the hours listed in A, all students must report in not later than one hour after the close of the function.

7. The Recreation Room

This room, located in the basement of

Haven Hall, is a project of the College Student Council.

8. Off-Campus Regulations

All students living outside the dormitories must have the approval of the President unless such students are living in their own homes.

The Housing Committee has a list of the residences which have been officially designated as Approved Houses. Permission to live in these homes is not automatically granted, however. As in the case of any other off-campus arrangement, individual arrangements are only temporary until the application blanks are received, approved, and filed by the Housing Committee.

Women students living in Edinboro in homes other than their own are expected to follow, in general, the rules applying to residents on campus. Permission ordinarily granted by the women's dormitory councils may be granted by the house mother.

9. Fire Regulations

A. Fire Signals:

Fire drills are held at least once a month. All girls must participate, and greatest care must be taken to see that everyone follows orders implicitly. The object is to get all girls out of the hall safely. Speed is imperative. Silence is necessary.

B. Fire Drill Procedure:

I. When fire alarm rings:

1. Close the windows.
2. Turn on the lights.
3. Put on a long heavy coat.
4. Put on shoes.
5. Have a towel in one hand.
6. Stand outside closed door of room until captain gives signal to start.

II. When Captain gives signal to start, observe the following rules:

1. Walk down corridor on own side to the nearest fire escape or exit (as ordered by fire captain).
2. Residents of each floor will wait until residents of floor above have vacated. This prevents congestion on the stairway.

III. Miscellaneous:

1. Fire escapes are to be used only for fire drills or in case of actual fire.
2. No clothing other than that specified must be put on or taken from room.
3. If leaving for the night, students must notify the floor captain.
4. The fire chief or Dean of Women will sound the alarm for fire drills. In case of real fire, the person nearest the alarm box should give the signal.

REGULATIONS FOR THE USE OF THE WOMEN'S DAY STUDENTS' ROOM

All women who are not living in the dormitory may study or relax in the Day Student Room, located in the basement at the end of Normal Hall, whenever they do not have a class during the day. This room is open daily from 7:30 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. and Saturdays from 7:30 A.M. to 12:00 noon.

The parlors of Haven Hall are open to all women students. Also available for use is the Social Room in the basement of Haven Hall, which is open during the regular dormitory hours.

REGULATIONS FOR MEN STUDENTS

Men's regulations for Reeder Hall are controlled by the Reeder Hall House Council and the Dean of Men. The House Council is elected by the men students and consists of one representative of each class.

The main insistence is that behavior be in accordance with the accepted standards of good taste. All men are expected to cooperate in respect to the matter of all women's regulations. No man is permitted to be in Haven Hall Lobby until after 6:40 in the evening, at which time he is to be in

the company of a woman student. All men are expected to enter and leave Haven Hall by the north entrance at mealtimes. Men must appear in jacket sweaters, sports jackets, or suit coats, all with collared shirts at each evening meal Monday through Friday. At the Saturday evening meal and Sunday noon meal shirts with ties must be worn with sport jackets or suit coats.

Men students are asked to use the Meadville Street walk when returning to the dormitories after 7:00 P.M., except when they are escorting women to the campus residences.

No intoxicating drinks may be brought into the dormitory. No men students are permitted the use of alcoholic beverages, anywhere, at any time, while they are matriculated at Edinboro State Teachers College. Any misconduct resulting from the use of alcoholic beverages in Edinboro or elsewhere is subject to disciplinary action.

All men who smoke will use metal ash trays. For safety reasons, use of any electrical appliances is not permitted in the dormitory or rooming houses.

All men maintaining a grade less than "C" in any subject will be expected to be in their rooms studying by 9:00 P.M., Monday through Friday.

REGULATIONS FOR OFF-CAMPUS MEN

Men living off-campus are not segregated in any way from those living on campus. They have a representative in the Student Council who helps advise and settle problems pertaining to the off-campus group. Rules applying to men living in the college dormitory apply to those outside the dormitory.

SCHEDULING SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

To avoid conflict it has been necessary to have one central office where all social events can be scheduled. This scheduling duty has been delegated to the Director of Student Personnel. No social event in which women are involved may be scheduled until all the necessary requirements for chaperones, hours, etc. have been met and the approval of the Dean of Women has been given. Before advertising any evening activity, it is necessary to have the activity recorded on the Social Calendar in the office of the Director of Student Personnel.

The Director of Student Personnel, acting in this scheduling capacity, represents the College Social Committee and, under its instruction, seeks to maintain a well-balanced and satisfactory social program. Permission for scheduling an event may be denied when

the general Social Calendar or the Calendar for a particular organization seems overcrowded, or when the maintenance of high academic standards in the college would seem to discourage the activity in question.

A form, **Student Social Function and Trips**, is to be obtained at either the office of the Director of Student Personnel or the office of the Dean of Women, by any organization planning a major social event. The form is to be completed and approved by the organization advisor and returned to the Director of Student Personnel Office at least **one week** before the date of the activity. Failure to comply with this regulation may result in cancellation of the date.

Assignment of rooms for meeting and activity purposes is administered through the Dean of Instruction's Office. Evening use of any room must be approved by the President of the College.

FRATERNITY AND CLUB INITIATIONS

No physical punishment shall be administered at any time.

Any public initiation program shall be submitted in writing for approval to the sponsor, the Director of Student Personnel, and the Dean of Men or the Dean of

Women at least **one week** before the initiation begins.

The initiation program shall include no activities on campus during class hours and no activities at any time which disturb the public in general.

The initiation program shall be conducted in such a manner that classroom work may proceed as usual. Any mode of dress or any actions which attract undue attention are undesirable.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR PROGRAM

Every person who graduates from Edinboro and becomes a teacher will be expected to assume leadership in community life and school activities. In a large percentage of cases the teacher will be expected to sponsor clubs and other student groups. Therefore, it is very important that every student in college becomes accustomed to certain activities and familiar with the techniques of discussion, parliamentary law, record keeping, and the general promotion of student activities. Even if a teacher never becomes a club sponsor, the educational value of participation in these activities in college is perhaps as great as that of some course of study. Therefore, it seems advisable that each student becomes a member of some club or other activity aside from athletics.

In the College year of 1951-52, the following plan of extra-curricular activities will be in effect:

1. At the beginning of the semester each student will be given the opportunity to choose any club or activity in which he is interested.

2. A club or activity may be set up on petition of not fewer than fifteen students with the approval of the Committee on Student Activities.

3. All organizations will provide for regular meetings.

4. No meeting shall be held without at least one faculty advisor present.

5. Each club or activity is to choose its own Faculty Advisor subject to the consent of the faculty member concerned and the approval of the Committee on Student Activities and of the President of the College. The Faculty Advisor is not to be responsible for planning the program of the activity since his relationship is only advisory.

6. Each activity is to have a Secretary, whose duty it shall be to record and report its membership and program as follows:

(a) A membership report to be turned over to the Chairman of the Committee on Student Activities early each semester.

(b) Participation report of each individual member, of the office holders, attend-

ance at meetings, and contribution to the program. This report is to go to the Dean of Instruction at the end of the semester.

(c) A monthly report of the activities of the club to be given the Chairman of the Committee on Student Activities.

Blanks for all these reports may be secured from the office of the Dean of Instruction.

FRESHMAN CUSTOMS

In an effort to help orient the freshmen to college life at Edinboro, the Student Council has established freshman regulations. The rules will be in effect between Tuesday, September 11, and the evening of Homecoming Day, October 13.

By observing freshman customs in the proper spirit, each student can acquire the qualities which will make him a worthy member of his college: an attitude of friendliness towards all other college students, a respect for the standards of his school, and a familiarity with its special "trade marks" — its Alma Mater, its cheers, and its own songs. In addition, the new student will learn that he belongs to the freshman class in particular, to the college as a whole.

The following rules shall apply to all members of the freshman class except veterans.

1. The wearing of dinks is required.

These should be purchased on Registration Day and are to be worn from that time until the conclusion of the Homecoming Day Activities on October 13. Dinks should not be worn in classrooms, in the College Dining Room, or on Sundays.

2. All freshmen shall wear a 10 x 10 inch card bearing their names and addresses in letters not less than two inches high. These shall be suspended by a string on the back of the wearer.

3. No high school awards, such as letters or sweaters, shall be worn.

4. All freshmen must be prepared to sing the "Alma Mater" one week after classes begin.

5. Freshmen will open doors for all faculty and upperclassmen.

6. Freshmen must carry a copy of the Student Handbook at all times and be prepared to answer any questions which upperclassmen may ask concerning customs or regulations as stated in it.

7. All freshmen will parade to the first home football game, and also the Homecoming game, and sit in a group.

8. Freshmen will gather suitable material for the Homecoming Bonfire to be held Friday night before Homecoming Day.

9. Enforcement of these regulations lies

with the Student Council or whomever that body designates.

10. Infractions of these regulations by freshmen will be penalized by the Student Council's Tribunal.

11. All students are forbidden to impose any type of hazing upon freshmen. Any student or group violating this regulation will be penalized by the Tribunal.

12. Any additional regulations will be added only by the Student Council or its designated Tribunal.

TIPS TO FRESHMEN

1. Always be ready with a cheery, courteous greeting when you meet a faculty member, an upperclassman or a fellow classmate.

2. Develop good school spirit. Make your school the best school.

3. Be courteous and well behaved, observing the best rules of etiquette at all times.

4. Always present a well-groomed appearance.

5. Attend classes and assembly regularly.

6. Go to church on Sunday.

7. Try to get eight hours sleep every night.

8. Put your name on all your personal property.

CAMPUS ACTIVITIES

Alpha Delta Sorority

The Iota Chapter of the Alpha Delta Sorority is one of the seven chapters in the State Teachers Colleges of Pennsylvania and New York. Its membership is limited to one-third of the total enrollment of women students.

The requirements are based on scholastic rating with no member being admitted with a grade average lower than 1.3; active members must maintain an average of 1.0. Character, abilities, and social attainments are also taken into consideration. The purpose of the sorority is to foster the development of all

Winter and Spring concerts. The spirit of the Band strives for the entertainment of its members, as well as the entire student body. The college owns many instruments which are available for student use.

College Choir

The college choir is a choral group whose repertoire includes sacred and secular numbers. It presents a Christmas Vesper Service and a Spring Musicale annually, and in addition sponsors each year the appearance of some fine choral groups. For the past two years the group has been presenting a television program in the early spring, and has been sending delegations to the Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Chorus Festival. New robes have been purchased recently to make this group outstanding in appearance as well as performance. Members are selected by tryouts early in each semester and all students who like to sing are urged to try out.

The Conneautteean

The Conneautteean, the college yearbook, published by the Junior Class, is a student enterprise in which the whole college takes an active part.

The name "Conneautteean" is derived from the original name of Edinboro Lake — Lake Conneauttee.

The book is put out by a staff of students and faculty advisors.

Delta Phi Delta

Membership in Delta Phi Delta, national professional and honorary art fraternity, is limited to those Junior and Senior art students who have maintained an average of "superior" in art subjects and "good" in academic work. The purpose of the fraternity is to further a genuine interest in art, to recognize scholarship, and to promote professional fellowship. Pledges are chosen by members with the approval of the art faculty sponsors.

Dramatics Club

All students interested in participating in dramatic activities are eligible for membership.

The club presents for the public a tournament of four one-act plays, a three-act production, and a television program.

The meetings are held every Tuesday night in the auditorium with one night a month a social time.

The Forum Club

The Forum Club is an organization which provides both social and educational growth for its members. Its activities include inter-

collegiate debating; panel discussions given in the college assembly, before community groups, over television station WICU in Erie, and in club meetings. The panel discussions are devoted to current local, national, and international problems.

The club meets two evenings a month between 7:00 and 8:00 P.M. Programs for these meetings are arranged so that preparation by the students who are presenting the program will not be too time consuming. Membership is open to the entire student body.

Future Teachers of America

The Future Teachers of America movement grew from the Horace Mann Centennial (1937), as a project of the N.E.A. Assembly. Since then, over three hundred and sixty local chapters have been established in forty-six states.

The purposes of the F.T.A. are: to cultivate personality, character and leadership; to foster interest in the role free public education has played in the development of our democratic way of life; to provide future teachers with specific information about opportunities in various fields of education.

Since receiving its charter last spring, the F.T.A. has established committees for such functions as substitute teaching and tutoring, a campus-tour service, cooperation with local

scout and church organizations, and vocational guidance.

This organization is open to all students. The dues, two dollars a year per member, are sent to the N.E.A. and P.S.E.A. In return, each member receives literature from these organizations, including monthly journals from both.

Kappa Delta Phi

Kappa Delta Phi, one of the nation's leading professional and social fraternities, was formed when the Beta Xi Fraternity received a national charter. The members of this group are selected by the current members in conformity with college rules for rushing.

Kappa Delta Pi

Eta Iota Chapter of Kappa Delta Pi is an honorary society in education whose motive is contained in the by-laws of this national organization: "The purpose of Kappa Delta Pi shall be to encourage high professional, intellectual, and personal standards and to recognize outstanding contributions to education. To this end it shall invite to membership such persons as exhibit commendable personal qualities, worthy educational ideals, and sound scholarship. It shall endeavor to maintain a high degree of professional fellowship among its members and to

quicken professional growth by honoring achievement in educational work."

Mu Kappa Gamma

Mu Kappa Gamma, the honorary music fraternity, takes into its membership those students who contribute in an outstanding way to the musical life of the college. Scholarship, leadership, musical ability, cooperation, length of service and participation in one or more musical organizations are points upon which membership is based.

Newman Club

The Newman Club, an established institution of American colleges and universities, is an organization planned to help fill the spiritual, intellectual, and social needs of the Catholic students on the campus. The club's meetings, held on alternate Monday evenings, are at Our Lady of the Lake Chapel.

The Pep Club

The Pep Club, a cheerleaders' organization, is one which strives to promote school spirit and foster student participation in all athletic activities.

Awards are presented each year to its members on the basis of service to the club. The Pep Club is open to any individual, male or female, who has any cheerleading ability.

Phi Sigma Pi

Scholarship, leadership, and social aptitude are a few of the basic requirements for membership in Phi Sigma Pi, a national professional educational fraternity. The Upsilon Chapter holds an unofficial rating of second of the sixteen chapters for activity and organization. Phi Sigma Pi is a member of the National Interfraternity Council, and emphasizes the professional development of teachers.

The Photography Club

Students interested in camera work will find interesting activity in the Photography Club. This group meets once each week and makes use of excellent darkroom facilities provided by the college in the basement of Normal Hall. Membership in the club is limited to twelve by selecting those who attend meetings regularly. Darkroom space and privileges are extended to students who participate. Special help is given to beginners as well as those more advanced.

The Spectator

The Spectator, campus newspaper, has had a traditional reputation for good journalism at Edinboro. Published bi-weekly by a staff of students, The Spectator covers all phases of college life. It offers an excellent oppor-

tunity for freshmen as well as upperclassmen to gain experience in newspaper work. Cost of publication is covered by the Student Activity Fund and advertising. The Spectator is distributed without extra charge.

Student Christian Movement

The Student Christian Movement is an organization open to all men and women on campus. The group follows the plan set up by the National Student Christian Movement, with regular meetings for worship, discussion, and fellowship.

ATHLETICS

Men's Athletics

The men's intercollegiate athletic program includes intercollegiate competition in football, basketball, soccer, swimming, golf, wrestling, track, and tennis.

Intramural Sports

The college has expanded the intramural programs so that every student will have the opportunity of participating in his favorite sport. Besides the above-mentioned sports,

the college is equipped for badminton, ping-pong, volleyball, softball, and many others.

The "E" Club

The aim and purpose of the "E" Club, made up of the athletes who have won a varsity "E" in intercollegiate competition, is to maintain a high standard of athletics at Edinboro. It functions chiefly, therefore, in connection with athletic events.

Other important events of the year for this club are the "E" Club dance and the annual intramural basketball games.

W.A.A.

The Women's Athletic Association is a member of the Athletic Federation of College Women. It also is a member of the United States Field Hockey Association. The types of recreation are carefully chosen for the complete development of each student.

Every woman student, upon entering college, is invited to membership in either the Phis or the Deltas, who make up the national health recreational sorority, Phi Delta Lambda. Throughout the year there is regular intramural competition between the two groups.

Fall sports, outdoors, consist of field hockey, tennis and hiking; winter activities include skating, basketball, swimming, life

saving, badminton, and bowling; spring sports, outdoors, are archery, tennis, golf, hiking, softball, and horseback riding.

The W.A.A. is governed by a student council which meets every week to plan and guide all activities. The program of the Association is based on a point system. Awards are presented at the Recognition Day ceremonies in May.

The Young Peoples' groups hold weekly meetings, discussion groups, suppers, etc. Many students sing in the church choirs or serve as ushers throughout the school year. GENERAL INFORMATION

Rooms For Men

Men students will be housed in Reeder Hall or in any private home that has been approved by the Housing Committee.

Rooms For Women

Women students will be housed in Haven Hall, White Hall, or any private home that has been approved by the Housing Committee.

Boarding Facilities

All students will be expected to eat in the College Dining Room. However, other arrangements may be made if approved by the College President.

Bus Service

Edinboro is situated on the main bus line between Pittsburgh and Erie. During the day and evening the buses run approximately every two hours. Because of the fact that the schedules are constantly changing, we shall not attempt to print them. The schedule may be obtained by calling 2481.

Book Store

Books and other supplies are obtainable at Cooper's Stationery Store. It is advisable to order your books as soon as possible after they have been designated by your

instructors. Each student is expected to own the text books required in his classes.

Mail Service

The College receives two mail deliveries each day. Dormitory mail will be delivered directly to the students' mail boxes there. The College offers no service for the purchasing of stamps; such matters should be handled by the individual students at the local post office. Lock boxes at the Edinboro post office may be secured at the rate of \$.60 a quarter.

General Fire Regulations

Fire drills are required by the laws of the Commonwealth. Signal for drills will not be announced and will be given always by some particular person designated for this duty. The first fire alarm is always a call to the persons to participate.

The following drill procedure should be observed:

1. When the alarm is given, close all windows to prevent draft.
2. Empty first floors and basements first.
3. Order: students to leave first, followed by faculty.
4. Keep to the right. Avoid running and rushing.

Responsibility for the observance of fire drills and other fire regulations falls to all persons — students, faculty, and employees. Custodians of the various buildings will see that instructions are given to meet the particular needs in each building.

Laundry Service

Students are permitted the use of tubs, ironing boards and electric irons in the basement of Haven Hall.

As a part of dormitory service students living in dormitories are permitted to have limited laundry privileges. Articles to be washed must be color-fast and tied securely in a laundry bag made especially for steam laundry. All bags and articles to be washed should be clearly marked with the name of the owner. Students are advised not to send fine pieces to the college laundry.

Women's laundry bags are to be at the foot of the basement stairs by nine o'clock on Wednesday mornings. These are to be called for on Wednesday after lunch.

Men's laundry bags are to be at the back entrance to Reeder Hall by nine o'clock on Monday morning. This service includes no more than twelve pieces, including two shirts. Laundry is to be called for Friday.

Laundry bags may be purchased at any of several stores in Edinboro.

All students living on the campus are entitled to seventy-five cents worth of laundry based on price list. For additional laundry the schedule of charge should be consulted. Payment will be made when laundry work is completed.

Telephone Service

Telephones on a private College branch (Edinboro 3301) are located in various places on the campus. Outside calls in Edinboro may only be made by students through station "78," and there it will be necessary to dial "O," before dialing the number listed in the directory.

Long distance calls may only be made over the pay telephones found in each dormitory.

Student Self-Help

There are a limited number of part-time positions available at the college, and it is anticipated that there will be a few jobs available in the community.

To be eligible for employment a student must:

1. Be matriculated as a student either in a four-year Edinboro course or the Commercial Art Curriculum.
2. Be boarding at the College Dining Room.

3. Be rooming on the campus unless existing facilities do not permit.
4. If a freshman, have scored not below the twenty-fifth percentile on the American Council On Education Psychology Examination which is administered to all Edinboro Freshmen.
5. At the end of the freshman year and every semester thereafter have earned an all-college average not less than "C."
