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EDINBORO STATE COLLEGE

From its beginning as a private academy in 1856, Edinboro State College has surged to the forefront as one of the leading educational institutions in western Pennsylvania. Located just 15 miles south of Erie, Pa., the college's setting offers a contrast of seasons. Enhanced by the beauty of Edinboro Lake, the community serves as a resort center during the summer while numerous nearby ski slopes offer a variety of recreation in the picturesque winter months. The college's location enables it to readily serve the tristate area with its proximity to Pittsburgh, Pa. (125 miles), Cleveland, Ohio (100 miles) and Buffalo, New York (120 miles). Moreover, it is easily accessible from the north and south by Interstate 79 and east and west by Interstate 90.

Until recently the chief objective of the college was the education and preparation of classroom teachers for the schools of the Commonwealth. With the implementation of programs in arts, sciences and humanities, Edinboro has now become a multi-purpose

institution of higher learning serving the educational needs of a tri-state area.

The College has experienced a rapid growth rate in students, faculty and physical plant. Forty buildings cover the 585-acre campus which now services more than 7,000 students.

In its university oriented role, the College makes contributions in the fields of education, government, conservation, environmental improvement, urban and rural problems, crime prevention, and service to business and industry. Edinboro seeks to offer educational programs which will afford maximum opportunities to its potential students and to meet the educational needs of its region from a professional and a cultural standpoint.

With the addition of the liberal arts degree program in 1962, the College's curriculum has expanded to include numerous course selections. Curricula range from elementary and secondary education, special



fields in art, library science, music and special education to medical technology.

Student activities are designed to develop the personality, poise, self-confidence and professional awareness that will fit graduates for significant participation in American society.




With the appointment of Dr. Chester T. McNerney as Edinboro State's President in 1966, the College witnessed the addition of a prominent leader who is dedicated to the academic life, a tireless advocate of personal involvement in the religious and civic affairs of one's community, and an educator who visibly believes in and practices total individual professional commitment.

Under Dr. McNerney's leadership Edinboro State has undergone innovations and reorganization that has enabled the College to keep in step with the times and maintain its academic excellence.

Edinboro State College is at the brink of a new era and has taken the initiative for a new direction among the state colleges of Pennsylvania. The College plans to offer programs in such diverse fields as international education, business administration and engineering to meet its leadership responsibilities in the years ahead.

1972 Sports Year Tops in ESC Athletic History



SCOTS SET TORRID VICTORY PACE ATHLETE'S WIN 7 OUT OF EVERY 10

Edinboro State's 1972-73 sports season proved to be the most successful campaign in Fighting Scot athletic history as ESC athletes in 12 varsity sports shattered the school's winning percentage mark for the fourth straight year. The Scots produced a final slate of 92 wins, 42 losses and 4 ties to claim an all-time high .687 percentage.

Six of Edinboro State's 12 varsity sports finished among the top 25 schools in the nation while three First Team All-America awards were claimed by Scots. In addition to the national rankings were NAIA district championships in tennis, track and golf while the Scot cindermen also registered their first ever Pennsylvania Conference crown.

Highlighting the individual awards were Dave Antognoli's First Team All-America plaques in both track and cross country along with grappler Tom Herr's NAIA national title in wrestling. Antognoli, who shared the Scot Senior Athlete of the Year honors with gridder Jim Romaniszyn, completed his athletic career at ESC with an unprecedented six First Team All-America citations and an unblemished 52-0 career record in cross country.

Hank Mariotti's netmen led the record-breaking assault with a perfect 10-0 card that was climaxed by an 18th place national finish at the NAIA meet in Kansas City, Mo. The ESC tennis men also claimed the NAIA District 18 crown and were runners-up in the PC.

Thundering right behind with an 11-1 slate were the swimming Scots of Coach Ed Erdos. In only their second year as a varsity sport, the tankers grabbed 22nd place in the nation, a conference runner-up spot and a third place finish at the powerful Penn-Ohio Meet.

After sprinting to the most wins in ESC's track history with a 6-1 ledger, the Scot cindermen claimed still another first by winning the Pennsylvania Conference crown. The Doug Watts-coached squad earned enough points for 14th place national honors at the NAIA meet in Arkansas. Included in their prestigious climb to the PC toga were the NAIA District 18 crown and the Buffalo State Relay Championship.

The highest national acclaim came from Coach Jim McDonald's golfers who fired their way to 12th place in the country at the NAIA match in Spartansburg, South Carolina. Enroute the ESC linksters had their best regular season record ever with a 10-3 showing and surprised a strong field of competitors by annexing the NAIA district title and runner-up honors in the Pennsylvania Conference.

Under Fred Caro's watchful eye, the Scot wrestlers battled their way to an 11-4 card, the most wins ever in a single season. Climaxing the ESC grapplers 20th place national standing was their first ever national champion in unlimited division performer, Tom Herr.

Led by six time All-American Dave Antognoli, the running Scots finished their fall schedule at 5-2 and then registered a national standing of 17th. Along the way the Watts-coached crew copped 2nd place at the Pennsylvania Conference meet, 3rd at the Malone Invitational, 5th at the Canisus Invitational and 22nd at one of the most impressive meets in the country, the Notre Dame Invitational.

Ten of Edinboro's 11 dual match varsity sports completed their schedules with .500 or better season records. Following the six sports that racked up national rankings were Coach Bill LaRosa's baseball team with an 11-7 slate, Jim McDonald's cagers at 13-9 for the year, George Shimpeno's 4-3-3 soccer squad and Vern Vogel's keglers who rounded out the winning trail with 8 victories against 7 setbacks.

Bill McDonald's Fighting Scot gridders were only nine points short of repeating as Western Division champions in the Pennsylvania Conference. Although the Scots managed to place 12 new marks in the ESC record book, the Clansmen became victims of close finishes and ended with a 3-5-1 reading.


While Coach Gus Millers' judo team did not compete on a dual match basis, the newly acquired varsity sport managed 7th place honors at the Eastern Regional Collegiate Tournament.

Trapshooting, a club sport at the College, also chipped in with national fame. The Scot marksmen zeroed in on second place at the United States Intercollegiate Trap Championships. The Scots were defending national champions.





McDonald's 25-11-2 Record Is Best Scot Mark



Bill McDonald carries an impressive 25-11-2 record into the 1973 season after four years of leading the Fighting Scots' gridiron program. Under his direction, ESC gridders posted identical 9-1 slates in both 1970 and 1971 while piling up a winning streak of 21 straight regular season games. His 25-11-2 mark puts him at the top of the winning percentage list among Edinboro State football coaches with a 70 per cent reading.

After an initial 4-4-1 season in 1969, his Fighting Scots became the greatest in ESC history when they went 8-0 in regular season play, captured the Lambert Bowl, won the Pennsylvania Conference championship and earned a berth in the NAIA national playoffs. His 1970 team followed up with an undefeated regular season (9-0) and a second straight PC Western Division title. Over 55 individual and team records have been established during his first four years at the reigns.

Upon completion of 1971's successful venture, numerous post-season laurels were bestowed upon the Scot's mentor. The Football Writers Association of New York named McDonald Coach of the Year in the East while the NAIA Area VIII and District 18 coaches as well as the Pennsylvania Collegiate Press Association also rewarded him with Coach of the Year honors.

Prior to his assignment at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant football coach at Indiana Univ. of Pa. for three years and head coach at Hopewell High School from 1958-1965.

While he directed Indiana University's offense, the Big Indians registered 24 regular season victories against only three defeats. In his final season at Indiana, the Tribe finished unbeaten in nine outings and proved to be the greatest offensive unit in the school's history with a 40 points-per-game average.

The Wilmerding, Pa., native guided Hopewell High School to a 46-25-1 slate during his seven-year tenure as head coach. His 1960 ball club defeated Braddock High 7-6 and broke their WPIAL 58-game winning streak while his 1963 team captured the Midwest Class A Championship.

The Fighting Scots' grid pilot served as an assistant coach at Braddock High School through two undefeated seasons and also at Latrobe High.

McDonald holds both a B.S. degree in education and a M.Ed. from the Univ. of Cincinnati where he played fullback under Sid Gillman and his assistant coach Paul Dietzel. This team was the original "Chinese Bandits," a defensive unit which later became famous at Louisiana State University. Gillman was head coach of the San Diego Chargers for 12 years and became general manager for the Houston Oilers after the 1972 season.

After graduation from Cincinnati in 1952, the Scots' mentor continued his education in post graduate work at Penn State, Pitt and Indiana (Pa.) Universities.





TONY ZVONAR - Linebackers

The Scots traditionally tough defensive front wall has been tutored by Tony Zvonar who this year will direct his efforts to Edinboro State's linebacking corps. Many of his well drilled defensive products have annually been the recipients of all-conference honors.

Tony, who is a 1963 Shippensburg State grad, spent a five-year span in the grid ranks at Hopewell High School, his alma mater, and also was a member of the Aliquippa High staff in 1968 before joining the Scots. While capturing three varsity letters as an offensive tackle at Shippensburg, Zvonar received numerous grid awards. He was named as one of the Red Raiders' co-captains, selected to the all-conference team, the NAIA District 30 squad, and earned a berth on the all-state selections. The Scots' defensive specialist, his one-year-old son, Michael, and his wife, Anne, reside in Edinboro.

FRED REMMY - Defensive Secondary

Fred Remmy, former head football recruiter and freshmen coach at the University of Miami, will take over the defensive line chores after grooming the Scots secondary in his first year at Edinboro.

The Verona, Pa., native graduated from Miami in 1959 where his grid play landed him a berth in the annual North-South All-Star Game. Fred began his coaching career in 1960 as an assistant at his hometown high school of Verona and he then spent a two-year stint as head coach and athletic director at the United States Coast Guard Receiving Center. Prior to returning to Miami in 1970, Remmy was named head football coach at the Florida high schools of Dunedin (1965-67) and Lakeland (1968-70). Dunedin posted its first winning season in history while Lakeland finished with its first successful schedule in six years. Fred, his wife, Pat, and their two children, Rick and Stacy, now make Edinboro their northern home.

JIM BOWEN - Defensive Line

Veteran coach Jim Bowen takes his years of gridiron experience to the defensive side of the ledger this season as he instructs the Scots defensive front four. While helping in the Clan's offensive backfield in the past, Bowen's offensive charges rang up recordbreaking performances at Edinboro State.

Bowen coached the once-beaten 1968 ESC freshman team and was the varsity's offensive backfield coach in 1967. Jim was head football coach at Fairview High School for 10 years and compiled an outstanding record of 76 wins and 12 losses. His grid teams captured 4 league championships while riding 25 and 19 game winning streaks. The knowledgeable Scot coach graduated from Slippery Rock State College in 1957 and earned his master's degree from Buffalo University. Jim and his wife, Joyce, along with their 7 children, two of which are twin girls, reside in Girard.

GUY CONTI - Offensive Backfield

Guy Conti, a Freeport, Pa., native was added to the Fighting Scots gridiron staff 2 years ago to take the reigns of the junior varsity program. This year he will guide the Clan's offensive forces. The Clarion grad served as head football coach at Northwestern High in 1971 and baseball mentor at Edinboro State during the springs of 1970 and 1971 where his diamond teams posted record breaking seasons. Conti spent a professional baseball stint with the Houston Astros organization as a catcher. The versatile athlete was an outstanding football player at Freeport High and Clarion State where he led the offensive attacks from his quarterback slot. He has also served as a teacher, viceprincipal, head baseball mentor and assistant basketball coach at Northwestern High School. Conti, his wife, Janet, and their children, Kim, Curt, Craig and Kelly, recently moved to Edinboro.

ANDY ROBERTSON - Receivers

Southern Colorado State's Andy Robertson joined the ESC staff last fall as a junior varsity mentor and will tutor the Scots pass receivers this season. Andy was an All-WPIAL quarterback at Hopewell High School while playing under Bill McDonald. After graduation in 1964 he traveled to Southern Colorado State where he played halfback for three years. The Indians enjoyed three straight winning seasons, and earned the opportunity to play in the NAIA national playoffs in 1965. After receiving a B.A. degree in 1968, he served as an assistant grid coach at Florence (Colo.) before returning to the Keystone State in 1969 as a grid aide at Derry Area High. An assistantship at the University of North Carolina during 1970 was interrupted by a 1 ½ year 'call to duty" with the U. S. Armed Forces in Germany. The second year mentor teaches in the College's Health and Physical Education program.

JOHN "JACK" HENRY - Offensive Line

Joining the Scot staff to direct the Edinboro offensive line prospects is Houston, Pennsylvania's John "Jack" Henry. Henry was an all-conference and all-state gridder at Chartiers-Houston High School before he continued his football career at both Penn State University and Indiana University of Pa. An offensive guard and linebacker, John played initially under "Rip" Engle and then under Joe Paterno while at Penn State from 1964 through 1966. He then spent two years at Indiana University of Pa. where he was all-district and all-state as an offensive guard. He was a member of Indiana's undefeated 1968 team that played in the Boardwalk Bowl. Henry has held coaching positions at Blairsville-Saltsburg High School, Wheeling Central Catholic H. S., Canon-McMillan H. S., Indiana University of Pa. and West Virginia University. John will also serve as assistant wrestling coach at ESC.


MIKE PECK - JV and Linebackers

A new face on the Fighting Scot grid staff but a familiar one to Duke University's defensive unit is that of Mike Peck. A 1969 product of McDowell High School, Mike starred on a Trojan team that went undefeated while claiming both the Lake Shore League and Erie City Championships. Operating from his linebacking position, the Trojan ace grabbed All-League, All-City, All-State and All-American Honorable Mention awards for his performances at McDowell. He continued his athletic and academic careers at Duke University where he received a BA degree in business this past spring. Mike earned three varsity letters while logging time in the Blue Devils' defensive unit as a linebacker. The newly acquired Scot coach will use his talents to tutor the varsity linebackers and to direct the junior varsity defense.

JOE SANFORD - JV and Quarterbacks

Heralded as the greatest quarterback in ESC's football history, Joe Sanford recently joined the Edinboro State staff as a graduate assistant coach. The former All-America grid star will coordinate the junior varsity offense while also serving as a quarterback coach in the varsity program. Sanford led ESC to its two best seasons ever and owns Scot records in passing with the most yards in a game (247), most TD passes in a season (8) and most TD passes—career (15). A First Team All-Conference winner for two years he was equally effective as a rusher while directing the Scots triple option attack. A graduate of Conneaut (Ohio) High School, Sanford also starred as a quarterback for the Youngstown Hardhats and is currently the field general of another semi-pro team, the Panthers of Erie, Pa. Joe, his wife, Cindy, and their young son, Derek, now reside near the College.

TEAM TRAINER: Bob Klingler begins his seventh year of giving Fighting Scot athletes the tops in professional medical care. The 1952 Lock Haven grad ventured to Hermann School of Physical Therapy in Houston, Texas and became a registered physical therapist in 1954. He later received his M. S. from Bucknell. Prior to accepting his ESC post, Klingler taught at Milton Hershey, a private boys' school in Hershey, Pa., where he served as the Spartans' head football mentor, head track coach and assistant basketball coach. Both his cinder and cage teams never experienced a losing season, while his grid teams

continually posted successful campaigns in the power-

ful Capitol Area Conference. Bob, his wife, Jill, and

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR AL HALL

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR: Since AI Hall's appointment as Athletic Director in 1968, Edinboro State has enjoyed one of the most respected and most successful collegiate athletic programs in the East. Through his efforts Edinboro State College has become a focal point for athletics in northwestern Pennsylvania and has hosted numerous championship events. Typical of this was the designation of ESC as the site for the 1972 National YMCA Diving and Swimming Championships, the largest swimming meet in the world. Under his leadership ESC has expanded to twelve varsity sports and attained new memberships in the ECAC and NCAA while building a coaching staff that has compiled the College's best record in history. Al's selection to numerous sports committees in the Erie area along with posts in both the ECAC and Pennsylvania Conference bear out his dedication to the world of athletics. A graduate of Baldwin Wallace College, he served as Assistant Director of Athletics at Akron University for two years and piloted Akron's cross country teams to championship finishes for 12 seasons. SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR: Paul Newman began his duties six years ago as ESC's first Sports Information Director and now also serves as Assistant to the President. Prior to joining the Scots, he held a teaching position in Ashtabula, Ohio, for three years. In connection with his duties, he is also the District 18 Publicity Chairman for the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics and recently completed a two-year term as President of the NAIA's Sports Information Director's Association. 1973 As Bill McDonald Sees It . . .







ON QUARTERBACKS

"No one has outrightly won the position but we have three people who looked pretty good in the spring. Kenny Widel is the best runner of the three while Bill Wachob throws extremely well and Jude Basile does a pretty good job both throwing and running. Unfortunately Bill Wachob will report late since he has mononucleosis. If we had to go tomorrow I'm sure we would start off with Basile."

ON OFFENSE

"Our strong point with the offense is definitely the line. As I mentioned our quarterback situation is not really settled but we will have to make a decision quickly. We'll probably be as good in the backfield as last year and it looks as if we're faster. The biggest question mark seems to be with our receivers. We do have a couple of bright spots at tight end with Ron Nietupski and Bob Hoskins."

ON DEFENSE

"We're strongest in the defensive secondary with John Walker, Jim Mastroianni and Dave Seigh. We will really be looking to find some defensive ends and backup tackles. We feel John Bayer can do it at one of the end spots while Tom Herr and Don Dlugos give us some fairly big and aggressive people inside. Some late position changes could help us at the end spots along with some incoming freshmen."

ON THE FRESHMEN

"I think the coaching staff worked harder recruiting this year than we ever did in our lives. If time and effort are any indication, we should have some real good freshmen. Speed will be the key word with this group . . . We invited 35 freshmen to varsity camp and many of them will probably end up as our second liners, or, because our team is really so young, some of them could start."

ON THE SCHEDULE

"This is probably one of the finest schedules we have ever played. I would suspect that Ashland will be one of our toughest opponents. As far as the conference is concerned I don't think there is any one team rated as favorite on their returnees. Most of the names are gone and I think most of the schools will be depending on their younger people. I think it is really a whole new ball game for everyone and that description best fits us, too."

ON STARTERS

"Defensively we only have three starters coming back in Tom Herr, Jim Mastroianni and John Walker. All the rest are sophomores and freshmen except for John Bayer. Of course, Kevin Harris saw a lot of playing time at linebacker last year and he should help. Offensively our strength comes from the offensive line with Bobby Miseyka, Dean Pikoulas and John Kuster returning. I am sure that everyone is aware of the tragic loss of Dave Layo and not enough can be said about what an outstanding young person he was."

ON NEWCOMERS

"We think we've really found an exciting running back in Melvin Morrisette. He could become one of the best runners in the conference. We're also pleased with the performances of Rick Vornadore and Andre Wachenheimer. Both played tackles in the spring and did a fine job along the offensive line. They both have exceptional quickness and can stick to people. Dave McGartland, Jim McClure and Dave Chobany are all newcomers who we have high hopes for as linebackers. There is no question that Dave Seigh is going to give us a big boost in our secondary. He was a heckuva pleasant surprise in the spring."

"We Have No Real Nucleus, But a Lot of Ability"

Edinboro State's 1973 football candidates were somewhat stunned when they reported to Head Coach Bill McDonald for their annual pre-season drills. Instead of the traditional donning of pads and grueling practice sessions, the Scot prospects were welcomed with a pizza party. Why the quick time out away from the field? "Since only 18 of 90 people on our squad are familiar faces, we figured that we'd better get everybody together and make some introductions," lamented fifth-year coach Bill McDonald. "This is really a whole new team and we just don't know each other."

McDonald is rightfully concerned. Among the 90 candidates on hand, 72 are either sophomores just up from the frosh ranks or incoming freshmen who recently graduated from high school. Only six starters come from the 12 lettermen who thinly dot the Scots team list.

"Our veterans are the sophomores who joined us in spring ball," claims the Scot mentor. A crop of some 33 sophs will form the nucleus of the Scots total restructing program while most of the ink on the ESC roster will be used on freshmen. Many of the youngsters should find themselves playing major roles throughout the Scots 9-game schedule that stacks up to be the toughest ever.

Veteran help is sparse on the defensive unit where only three starters are ready for action. Both Jim Mastroianni (5–8, 170) and John Walker (6–1, 165) will be looking to pick off enemy passes in the secondary while tackle Tom Herr (6–3, 230) is the lone vet up front.

Lettermen joining the trio on defense are converted defensive end John Bayer (6–0, 205) and linebacker Kevin Harris (6–1, 180).

The remaining three starters help form what should be one of the team's few 1973 strong points, the offensive line. Putting Fighting Scot uniforms on for the final time are guards Bob Miseyka (6–0, 200) and Dean Pikoulas (6–0, 195) along with tackle John Kuster (6–1, 225).

Centers Mike Gordon (6–1, 210) and Tom Marsilio (6–0, 205) also return along the offensive line as letter winners. Questionable Mark Crump completes the list of award winners.

Linebacker Craig Angelo and flanker Paul Snell are the only other returnees who have logged any considerable playing time.

"It feels much like we're in the same kind of situation as when I first came to Edinboro," commented McDonald. "We have no real nucleus coming back but we think we have some great ability. Our success depends on just how quickly we stop making mistakes that inexperienced ball players will make that cost us ball games. We're just hopeful that we mature quickly as a group."

Although the offensive line appears set, just who the vets will be blocking for is still not definitely decided upon.

Three quarterbacks are in the running for the opening day nod but it appears as if Notre Dame transfer Jude Basile could have a slight edge. The other two are sophomores Ken Widel and Bill Wachob. Wachob is know for his accurate passing arm while Widel is stronger in the running department. Unfortunately Wachob will probably miss the first half of the season as he is recovering from mononucleosis.

Among the running backs newcomer Melvin Morrisette could be destined to be the Scots next running star while receiving supporting roles from sophomores Ed Best and Tom Mealy.

The tragic loss of fullback Dave Layo, who lost his life during a summer accident, and Mark Crump's badly injured knee left the Scots with no returning running backs. Crump might still see action as a wide receiver but his return in the backfield this year is extremely doubtful.

The remaining bright spots on the offensive unit include tight ends Ron Nietupski (6-0, 187) and Bob Hoskins (6-2, 200) along with offensive tackles Rick



Vornadore (6-2, 210) and Andre Wachenheimer (6-1, 221).

Battling for the split end assignment are Paul Snell and Rod Jones. Jones is a converted running back who might have finally found a home at the wide receiver slot while Snell worked behind Mike Romeo last season.

Inexperience continues at the flanker post where Wes Bain and Bernie Whitman are vying. Bain came away with a fine showing in the spring with some clutch catchers. Whitman is coming off a knee injury that kept him sidelined during his junior year.

On the defensive side of the ledger, the Scots secondary will be traditionally tough but new faces

abound in the rest of the lineup.

Jim Mastroianni and John Walker, who combined their talents to intercept seven aerials last year, will be joined by promising newcomer Dave Seigh at the Scots deep spots. A fourth member of the Clan's four-deep secondary will come from the quartet of Dave Byers.

Don Hawkins, Duffy Sample and Matt Jones. Tom Herr (6–3, 225) will be plugging the middle of the defensive line at left tackle along with transfer Don Dlugos (6-3, 235). Herr, who knocked down opposing running backs 71 times last year is the lone returning vet along the line. Expected to join Dlugos and Herr up front are Jan Gefert (6-0, 190) and John Bayer (6-0, 205) at the terminals. Bayer has logged some playing time as a linebacker but spent the majority of last season working as a running back. Rob Johnson (6–2, 225) is the only other upperclassman on hand to help at the tackle slots.

Anchoring the linebackers is Kevin Harris (6-1, 180), the only experienced holdover from the 1972 campaign. Expected to come up with solid performances are untested sophomores Dave McGartland (6-1, 215), Craig Angelo (5-11, 190), Dave Chobany

(6-0, 215) and Jim McClure (6-0, 215).

Fighting Scot fans are becoming more optimistic about Jim Romaniszyn's chances of making it in the pro ranks—a lot of people are suddenly learning how to pronounce his name.

Romaniszyn, a 6–2, 225 pounder who spent most of his college career setting Edinboro State records, got the chance at the pros when he was drafted in the 13th round by the NFL's Cleveland Browns. Although he was tabbed as a running back, the Titusville, Pa., product has been switched by the Browns to outside linebacker.

Comments from the news media and the Cleveland coaching staff best reflect the chances of the Browns newcomer:

"He does everything pretty well. There are many new things to learn at linebacker but he is picking them up fast. He has natural athletic ability and is strong physically. He is going to be a factor in this linebacking."—Nick Skorich, Cleveland Browns' Head Coach.

"He's developing very well for a fellow who never played the defense. Jim is a real student of the game. Out on the field he's alert and keeps after it. He makes mistakes, as you would expect, but he usually gets back into the play."—Howard Brinker, Browns' Defensive Co-Ordinator.

". . . just might beat the big odds and make the team."—Chuck Heaton, Cleveland Plain Dealer.

"... no challenge seems too big, which is why he doesn't mind sticking his nose into the Browns' line-backing corps here despite the presence of six veterans."—Bill Scholl, Cleveland Press.

Asked if he minded the switch from the glamor job of ball carrying to the tough, rugged assignment as a linebacker, Romaniszyn replied, "With some other team I might have been disappointed but not here. I think my chances are better at linebacker. Now I'm beginning to get used to the position. The biggest thing is the mental aspect. As a runner I knew exactly what I was going to do. Linebacking is a position of reacting."

No matter what the outcome the past-Scot great has made a fine accounting of himself and certainly has added some luster to Edinboro State's athletic program. He was the first ESC gridder to ever be drafted by a professional team.





The David Layo Outstanding Freshman Award will perpetuate the memory of a young Edinboro athlete who lost his life in an untimely accident this past summer. Fighting Scot fans remember his feats as a most promising runner when the freshman fullback became a varsity starter midway through the 1972 season. He responded with 372 yards and a sparkling five-yardper-carry average while finishing as the Scots second leading rusher. A graduate of Portage Area High School where he was a three year letterman and team captain in football, Dave received the Rotary Club's Outstanding High School Athlete Award. Along with his football honors at Portage, he also earned three varsity letters in basketball and baseball. Dave was the 1971 winner of the Tribune-Democrat Newspaper's Player-Scholarship Award. In announcing the establishment of the David Layo Outstanding Freshman Award, Edinboro coach Bill McDonald stated, "This will be the highest honor that a freshman football player can receive. Emblematic of this honor is the remembrance of a determined athlete, a fine student and, most importantly, an outstanding person." The award will annually be presented at the first home game to a sophomore football player who excelled during his freshman year.

FALCONS' OUTLOOK

Although the Falcons have had some rebuilding problems as of late, football fame has been a strong tradition at Fairmont State. The West Virginians were NAIA national champions in 1967 and the Falcons are battling to recapture their winning form.

A more effective defensive secondary and the addition of more punch to the rushing offense will be the two main goals for Fairmont State's Falcons this season.

Coach Bill Kerr points out that it was the passing defense that got Fairmont into trouble, especially in the final three games, during the 1972 season.

Kerr feels the defensive line should be strong, but points out the Falcons must develop some defensive backs and linebackers to be sound. The toughest schedule in the school's history will make things doubly difficult this fall.

Offensively, the Falcons must replace tight end Bill Swope, running back Ted Jackson and tackle Stan Laughlin.

Quarterbacks Harold Bailey (6-1, 195) and Terry Galambus (6-0, 184) return as do running back Mike Maximin (5-10, 196), top receiver Chris Perkins and several linemen headed by Ted (5-11, 207) and Bill Stewart (5-11, 191), Lambert Echols (5-11, 242), Jim Zeh (5-11, 222) and Marvin Hart.

Forming the nucleus of the defensive line will be All-Conference tackle Bob Smith (6-3, 213). Outside linebacker Gerry White (6-1, 190) also returns.

Kerr hopes for improvement in 1973 but he will admit that the rebuilding of FSC football will take time.

EAGLES OUTLOOK

College-division's best defense, the unit at Ashland College which allowed only 5.6 points per game last season, lost only two starters so things are looking bright once again for the Eagles.

Ashland returns 30 lettermen from last season's team which finished 11-0, ranked in the top seven in three national college-division polls and set 45 school records. Five All-Americans were graduated from the squad, however.

The defensive forward wall should again be awesome with the likes of senior Jim Yockey (6-3, 245), sophomore Ben Henderson (6-2, 225) and junior Pete Vasilakos (6-0, 235). Other standouts returning are ends Dana Wilson (6-3, 210) and Rob Keller (6-4, 215), linebacker Dick Miller (6-2, 220) and cornerback Craig Schaefer (5-11, 185). Miller could be the fiercest of the Eagles; as a sophomore in 1972 he had


four interceptions and 144 tackles. Schaefer grabbed seven of the team's 30 interceptions.

The offense has several holes to fill but a flock of good lookers could do the job at quarterback while 215-pound tailback Bob Mahl returns after averaging 92 yards per game last year. Jeff Groza, the son of NFL great Lou, kicked for 66 points last year, including nine field goals, and finished sixth in the nation for kickers in 1972.

Five starters are gone from the offense which averaged 32.2 points per game last year. Solid recruits and outstanding sophomores are hopeful of filling out the offense. Top line returnees are 235-pound tackle Steve Stoler (6-0, 235), guard Kim Watkins (5-10, 190) and tight end Randy Fierbaugh (6-3, 215). "We have some fine men returning but we have to come up with a good quarterback to have another great season," said Ashland Head Coach Fred Martinelli.

THE ROCK WILL BE BACK

So says Slippery Rock State College head football coach Bob DiSpirito as he looks toward the 1973 season. DiSpirito, who guided the Big Green Machine to the Pennsylvania Conference championship in '72 and a berth in the Knute Rockne Bowl game, remains optimistic despite the loss of 19 seniors, including 14 starters.

"As long as we are the state champions, we are the team to beat," says the Rocket grid tutor.

We have some talented young players, but they are inexperienced and untested," DiSpirito continues.

Especially hard hit by graduation were the offensive backfield, the defensive front line, and the secondary. Diploma fever claimed many two and three year veterans including quarterback Tim Nunes, fullback Mike Kish, tight end Dan Toomey, defensive tackle Pat Risha, defensive end Tom Jenkins, and cornerback Ron Hunt.

All four regulars in the secondary graduated as did all five offensive backs. The defensive front five lost three starters.

"I think that we will emerge as a contender," predicts DiSpirito despite the loss of such top-quality performers.

The strong point this fall should be the offensive interior line, where only one tackle was lost. The big men there are 6-4, 250-pound center Ed Seiwell, 6-1, 240-pound guard Tom Yaksick, and 6-3, 230-pound tackle Stan Stanchek.

George Mihalik (6-1, 190) should take over for Nunes at QB.

Linebacker Terry Factor (5-11, 200) anchors the defense once again with help from defensive end Curt Kral (6-1, 215) and middle guard Jeff Siemianowski (5-11, 210).

Slippery Rock finished 8-2-1 a year ago in the school's first 11-game season in history, and shattered some 17 team and individual school records. The 8-2-1 mark was the best seasonal report since the state championship team of 1962, which was 9-1. In the last two seasons, Coach DiSpirito has led his Big Green Machine to 15 wins and one tie in 20 starts.

BIG INDIAN'S OUTLOOK

It's rather difficult not to dwell, at least momentarily, on the very recent past—1972—when the Indians 'defensed' their way to an 8-1 record. Captained by third team College Division All-American safety Dave Balmert, that first-unit defense in effect blanked six of the nine opponents.

Eight starters on that defense have graduated leaving a unit that must be rebuilt from top to bottom, from middle guard to safety.

Offensively, the situation is not much better since just five regulars will once again take their positions.

But coach Bill Neal and his staff, never ones to be pessimistic, will work with the 17 returning lettermen, several squad members, one or two transfers and a battalion of freshmen to ready a representative team for a challenging '73 schedule.

One certain starter is two-year regular tight end Mark Jevicky (6-3, 215). As a sophomore, he caught touchdown bombs of 72 and 78 yards, the latter an IUP record. Last year, even though his number of receptions decreased, his overall play progressed and his value to the team increased because of tremendously improved blocking. Jevicky, the Pennsylvania Con-

ference all-star tight end, will also be tried at linebacker, the only player who might be a two-way performer.

Nov. 17

As Jevicky lends strength to the end of the offensive line, so does center Ed Paradis in the middle. At 6-2, 230, Paradis is the rock on which assistant coach Rich Hornfeck will construct an offensive forward wall where just Paradis and guard John Palchak return. Paradis made the Associated Press's All-Pennsylvania third unit and Palchak the second.


Behind them, and in contrast to a year ago when the position was up for grabs, is quarterback George Yokitis (6-2, 190). After transferring from Louisville, Yokitis started slowly but showed steady progress throughout the 8-1 season. He completed nearly 50 per cent of his passes for 1144 yards and 11.1 yards per catch. He also rushed for 140 yards.

Record-setting place kicker Ron Orenak is also back. Orenak set a school distance mark with a successful 44-yard kick against Clarion.

The IUP Indians will be striving to secure the school's 12th straight winning season (and also prolong the nation's second longest consecutive game scoring streak which now stands at 102).

Last year coach Al Jacks was searching for a pair of running backs and a couple of receivers. This season the shoe is on the other foot.

Now, the Eagle mentor is in search of a quarterback and an entire offensive line.

Five quarterbacks are on hand to battle for the opening day assignment. Of the five, only one has any actual experience in a varsity contest and that experience was only a brief two minutes of playing time.

The offensive line was also depleted by graduation. What is worse yet is that only one letterman returns to the front wall. Some heavy rebuilding will have to be done upfront on offense to keep the Eagles in contention.

Just as there was some top personel lost, there are some top players back from last year's squad which posted a 6-3 record.

Heading that list of returning vets is Scott Peters (6-0, 184). One of the most versatile players on the team, Peters was the leading scorer and third leading rusher on the team last year. Also, Tom West, who lead the team in pass receiving with 17 grabs, returns along with scatback Steve Nolan.

On defense, nine starters are waiting in the wings to form the nucleus of what should prove to be a strong defensive alignment. This unit kept Clarion State in the thick of the battle for the conference crown last fall. Slippery Rock edged by Clarion 26-24 in the final game of the '72 campaign as the Golden ones finished as runners-up in the PC Western Division.

If Penn State grad Al Jacks can find a signal caller to make his club go and a front wall to protect his quarterback, the Golden Eagles should be off and flying in '73.

BALD EAGLES' OUTLOOK

If head coach Bob Weller can come up with a tough defensive unit for the 1973 football season Lock Haven State College could post that first winning season in eight years.

Offensively the Bald Eagles "are loaded on paper" with 17 of the 25 returning lettermen slated for the offense unit. Coach Weller could start eight two-year lettermen, a three-year letter winner and two others who lettered for the first time last year. This unit would be backed by five more returning lettermen.

Last year the Eagles had a big season on offense scoring 198 points (22 per-game) and recorded a total offense of 2,746 yards for a fine 305.1 per-game.

But the defense seemed to suffer an off-year giving up 310 points and 3,400 yards for a 377.7 yards per-game for nine opponents and a losing 4-5 season record.

An all-veteran offensive backfield could be the Eagles strong point for '73. However last year's outstanding junior quarterback Ed McGill of Salona, who ranked second in the nation with a 59.1 per cent pass completion average on 120-for-203 and 1,608 yards missed spring drills due to illness. If McGill should be

unable to play this season the LHSC mentor could call on sophomore Dave Bower (Montoursville) who earned a letter in his freshman year going 13-for-37 and 212 yards. Also at this position is another sophomore Craig Weaver of Mill Hall.

At wingback will be All-American candidate Chuck Vennie, a 165-pound speedster who has been selected for the ECAC Division III season All-Star team for the past two years. Vennie led the Pennsylvania Conference Western Division pass receivers with 39 receptions for 592 yards last season and rushed for 247 yards and a 4.5 average per-carry. Another letterman at wingback is rugged Dan Wood. At fullback Bob Kline, the Eagles top rusher in seven years, returns. The 200-pounder has a fine 4.8 yard average with 634 yards on the ground and 12 touchdowns.

Returning defensive vets are end Mel Abel, tackle Bob Seal, 270-pound middle guard Harry Sherman (Wellsboro), and halfback Chuck Glass from Harrisburg.

Heading a fine group of incoming freshmen gridders is Mike McCabe, an All-State First Team two-way performer from Berwick. Quarterback McCabe played offensive guard and linebacker on defense.

RED RAIDERS' OUTLOOK

Second year coach Gene Epley began the big push to turn around Shippensburg's football program last fall and came away with some promising results. The Raiders finished with a 3-6-1 ledger but were in the running in almost every contest. Holding Epley from a winning debut were a three-point loss to Brockport and a five-point decision to Lock Haven.

Sixteen starters return, including second team All-Pennsylvania Conference performers George Allen (6-1, 195) and Brad Shover (6-1, 185). Allen, a defensive end, will anchor the Raider line along with tackle Don Epley (5-11, 215). Shover heads the defensive backfield which held opposition to 83.7 yards per game

VULCANS' OUTLOOK

California State will begin the '73 season under new head coach Elmo Natali, who assumed the reigns at the end of 1972 season. A former Vulcan standout and assistant coach, Natali will be pulling the stoppers this year in an effort to rekindle the Fire Gods.

Gigantic problems need to be overcome before the Vulcans can be considered a threat in the upcoming season. The largest problem will be replacing an empty backfield.

The only returning quarterback is Joe Seymour (6-2, 205), but Tom Sukel (5-10, 185), a regular in '71, who did not play in '72, plans to return for this season. Dan Kordich (5-10, 185), Steve Toth (5-8, 180) and Paul Kovacs (6-0, 210) saw limited action as running backs last season.

Veteran receivers Paul Smarslok (6-0, 175) and Mike DeMichela (6-1, 185) will greet Natali this fall, making life easier for the new coach.

The biggest smile comes, however, when looking at the defensive and offensive lines. Both are very much intact for the '73 season.

Twenty-five lettermen are expected to return for the '73 campaign. Of these, eighteen are starters guarding their positions again.

Most of the blockers up front opening the holes are back headed by Steve Guzy (6-0, 220). Veteran offensive linemen returning include Bob Galardini (6-3, 195), Guzy's backup center, tackles Al Boyle (6-3, 250), Jerry Klamerus (6-2, 235), Lou Nagy (6-2, 230) and Bernie Cikovic (6-2, 250) and guards Dan Evans (6-0, 195) and Bill Pillar (5-11, 210).

A strong defensive nucleus returns for California headed by Alan Natali (6-0, 205), and Ed Oakley (5-10, 185), Natali's counterpart. A fine linebacking trio of Derek Jones (6-0, 225), Gary Tretter (5-11, 210) and Vic Munson (5-11, 195) returns. The defensive middlemen include Sheldon Ames (6-1, 210), Terry Zinger (5-10, 220), Verge DalBon (5-10, 210), Pat Arnold (5-9, 190) and Tom Duplinsky (6-0, 190).

Look for an improved season and possibly a return to winners row.







EXPERIENCE AT ALL POSITIONS

The Fighting Scots are looking forward to fielding their best crop of booters ever as ESC enters its fifth year on the soccer field. Last year the Clansmen finished with a 4-4-3 season and grabbed fourth place honors in the tough Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Soccer Conference.

"We have experienced veterans at almost every position," claims coach George Shimpeno, who will hand the reigns over to John Furcron for the 1974 schedule. Shimpeno has taken a leave of absence to complete his doctrate residency work at the University of Buffalo and will be available only on a limited basis. "Although we are all looking forward to a successful season," continued Shimpeno, "our chances could be hampered by injuries since we do have a definite depth problem."

Leading the offensive attack is senior Jim Kirk who has been a First Team Pennsylvania Conference and WPISA selectee for the past two years. Kirk hammered in six goals to pace the Scots scoring last fall. Adding strong support up front is junior Mike Zafirovski along with newcomer Joe Marsico. Zafirovski has proved to be a constant scoring threat while Marsico brings years of valuable experience to the ESC front line. Marsico, a senior, is a transfer from Alliance College where he has played for three years. Rounding out the Scots attacking wall is Dennis Habib, potentially one of the most outstanding players on the team.

Anchoring the Scots veteran defense is goalie Mike Radakovich, a Second Team All-Conference winner. Radakovich, a junior, knocked down 133 op-

ponent shots and registered two shutouts in 1972. He allowed only 13 goals in 11 appearances to sport a 1.4 defensive average.

Playing in front of Radakovich are experienced defenders Joe Podufal and Bob Maradei, a pair of seniors who should make the going tough for opposing players.

Terry Orbin, an All-Pennsylvania High School selection, is the top freshman prospect who should provide needed depth at the goalie position.

TALENTED FROSH JOIN TOUGH VETS

Dave Antognoli, a six time First Team All-American and heralded as one of the greatest athletes in Edinboro State's history, is gone but the traditionally tough Scots should be powerful once again. An Olympic Trials finalist in the 10,000-meter run, Antognoli completed his ESC career unbeaten with an outstanding 52-0 dual meet record. Eight of last year's top ten runners are returning along with an outstanding group of freshmen recruits and the Scots should continue their winning ways.

'I couldn't even guess who will be in the top seven," ponders coach Doug Watts, who enters his fifth year of bringing national distinction to ESC's track and cross country teams. "There are ten to twelve runners who have a chance to be there but it will all depend on who develops the most and who really wants it. Although we have several outstanding upperclassmen our freshmen recruits will probably make or break this team."

Pacing the returning veterans are senior Roland Champ, the number two man last year, senior Gary Gotsch and junior Mark Roche. Challenging for berths among the sophomore runners are John Foreman, Bill Herman, Pat Logue, Bob Stonecipher and Steve Turk.

This crop of returnees along with Antognoli led the running Scots to a 17th place nationally in the NAIA and runner-up honors in the Pennsylvania Conference last year.

Adding to the Scots' chances for an unbeaten season and both a district and Pennsylvania Conference title is probably one of the most talent-laden group of freshmen ever recruited. Top challengers for varsity positions include Lou Champney (9:27--2-mile), Kevin Foley (9:21—2-mile), Bruce Rapose (9:22—2-

SOX HARRISON STADIUM--HOME OF THE FIGHTING SCOTS

Featured on the back cover is Edinboro State's Sox Harrison Stadium. The edifice was dedicated in the fall of 1965 in honor of "Sox" Harrison who served as head football and basketball coach at the College for 35 years. His 1931-32 cage record of 11 wins and 1 loss still stands as one of the best marks ever posted by an Edinboro basketball team. Sox still enjoys watching the Fighting Scots on Saturday afternoons as one of their most ardent fans.

Complete facilities are located beneath the grandstand area, which seats 3,000 people. Locker space for both the home and visiting teams, the coaching staff offices and locker room, the officials' dressing room, the training room, showers, the weight room and a laundry room are utilized within this space. Also included are restrooms, janitors' facilities, equipment rooms, a large concession stand and a glass enclosed press box.

In addition to the football field, the stadium also contains complete track facilities. A quarter-mile oval, a 220 straight-away and asphalt approaches for the field events highlight the home of the cinder sport.

Bleacher seats on the visitors side of the stadium bring the total seating capacity to 5,500.

A new scoreboard was added at the south end of the field last year which is one of the largest in the conference.
