



SCOTS FACE CONFERENCE'S BEST DEFENSE AGAINST INDIANA

The Western Division foes are beginning to heed the smoke signals coming from Indian country where Coach Bill Neal appears to have finally banded his club together.

Saturday's win over Shippensburg gave the Indians added incentive as they grabbed first place in the PC's Western Division race. Edinboro and Slippery Rock are log-jammed for second place honors in the Conference, after their 7-7 tie against one another this past week.

Indiana will count on the passing arm of Lynn Hieber (6-2, 195) who is hitting on over 50 percent of his tosses to lead the Tribe past the upstart Scots. Hieber has amassed 372 aerial yards while connecting for two scoring strikes.

On the ground, the Scots will have to stop both fullback Rick Johnson (5-10, 195) and halfback Brian Hart (5-11, 185) who are the Indians' turf-tearing specialists. Johnson's 209 yards leads the rushing stats, while he also averages 4.6 yards per try through the line. Hart sports the team's best per carry mark with his 5.9 yards every time he touches the football.

"They'll give us a lot of problems defensively," projects Edinboro mentor Bill McDonald, who came to the Scots via Indiana. "They're not as big as Slippery Rock, but they're just as aggressive. changed their entire offense and are certainly adjusting to it quite well," continued the coach.

McDonald's concerns are reflected in the Indiana statistics which show a complete about-face from last year. The Indians have moved from next-to-last place in pass defense to lead the league this year by allowing opponents only 77.7 yards per game through the air. Indiana also leads the division in total defense.

Offensively, the Tribe is averaging almost 100 yards more per game than last season with an output of 318 yards per outing.

Defensively, Indiana's top gridders are end Dave Thompson (6-0, 215), linebacker Chuck Wonsettler (6-0, 195) and middle guard George Aggen (6-0, 195).

Edinboro will counter with one of the league's best passing attacks spearheaded by quarterback Jude Basile.

The Edinboro coaching staff named both offensive tackle Rick Vornadore (6-2, 219) and middle guard Ron Gooden (6-4, 250) as the players of the week for their performances against Slippery Rock. Vornadore led the line charge in the second half that helped spring tailback Melvin Morrisette (3 games, 58 att., 206 yds.) while Gooden plugged the middle of the defensive line.

Running Scots Hope to Stretch Perfect Mark

Edinboro State cross country coach Doug Watts boils over with optimism when quizzed about his 1974 running Scots.

'I'm always optimistic, and this year certainly is not the year to change the tune. We have quality and quantity. We have four of our top five men returning from last year," says Watts, "and we're hoping to repeat our championship performances. I think we have one of the best small college cross country teams in the country."

Last year, the traditionally tough Scots romped through their dual match season with a perfect 10-0 record, captured the Pennsylvania Conference championship, sped to the NAIA District 18 title and then continued with a third place national finish at the NAIA meet. The Scots also came up with top notch performances at the Canisius, the Malone and the Notre Dame invitationals.

Veterans setting the lead pace are Kevin Foley, Mark Roche, Joe Come and John Foreman. The quartet has already posted a long list of successes for the Scots and should prove to be the nucleus of the 1974 campaign. The only question mark here is Roche's recovery from numerous cuts he received during the summer in a fall through glass windows.

Challenging the front runners are talented lettermen Mark Linder, Pat Logue Dennis Packard and Brad Starkey. Offering help after outstanding track seasons are middle distance runners Mark Ladika and Bruce Rapose, who missed last year due to an injury. Both could be in the thick of things at the finish line.

If that isn't enough, Watts can turn to freshmen Jeff Foster, Pennsylvania state champion in Class A, third place finisher Henry Winger, the number six runner in the state of Ohio, Dalvin Baehler, or the second place finisher in the Pa. mile run, Steve Hair.

Ironically, the veteran team's top runners could be sophomores in Kevin Foley and Joe Come. Watts feels Foley is destined to be an All-American in just his second year of varsity competition. He is equally high on Joe Come, whose mental toughness makes him a top performer.


Under Watts, the Scots have racked up a five-year total of 36 wins against only 8 losses in dual meet competition. Both his 1970 and 1973 teams captured the Pennsylvania cross country title. His track teams have nailed down two straight PC crowns as well as District 18 titles while Watts has been named Area VIII Track Coach of the Year for two consecutive seasons.

Few will forget his top performer ever in the likes of Dave Antognoli, who was a six-time First Team All-American and completed his ESC career unbeaten with a 56-0 dual meet record.

McDonald Leads Scots to Gridiron Respect

Bill McDonald carries an impressive 29-15-3 record into the 1974 season after five years of leading the Fighting Scots' gridiron program. Under his direction, ESC gridders posted identical 9-1 slates in both 1970 and 1971 while piling up a winning streak of 21 straight regular season games. His 29-15-3 mark puts him at the top of the winning percentage list among Edinboro State football coaches with a 68 per cent reading.

After an initial 4-4-1 season in 1969, his Fighting Scots became the greatest in ESC history when they went 8-0 in regular season play, captured the Lambert Bowl, won the Pennsylvania Conference championship and earned a berth in the NAIA national playoffs. His 1971 team followed up with an undefeated regular season (9-0) and a second straight PC Western Division title. Over 55 individual and team records have been established during his first four years at the reigns.

Upon completion of 1970's successful venture, numerous post-season laurels were bestowed upon the Scot's mentor. The Football Writers Association of New York named McDonald Coach of the Year in the East while the NAIA Area VIII and District 18 coaches as well as the Pennsylvania Collegiate Press Association also rewarded him with Coach of the Year honors.

Prior to his assignment at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant football coach at Indiana Univ. of Pa. for three years and head coach at Hopewell High School from 1958-1965. While he directed Indiana University's offense, the Big Indians registered 24 regular season victories against only three defeats. In his final season at Indiana, the Tribe finished unbeaten in nine outings and proved to be the greatest offensive unit in the school's history with a 40 points-per-game average.

The Wall, Pa., native guided Hopewell High School to a 46-25-1 slate during his seven-year tenure as head coach. His 1960 ball club defeated Braddock High 7-6 and broke their WPIAL 58-game winning streak while his 1963 team captured the Midwest Class A Championship.

The Fighting Scots' grid pilot served as an assistant coach at Braddock High School through two undefeated seasons and also at Latrobe High.

McDonald holds both a B.S. degree in education and a M.Ed. from the Univ. of Cincinnati where he played linebacker under Sid Gillman and his assistant coach Paul Dietzel. This team was the original "Chinese Bandits," a defensive unit which later became famous at Louisiana State University. Gillman was head coach of the San Diego Chargers for 12 years and became general manager for the Houston Oilers after the 1972 season.

After graduation from Cincinnati in 1952, the Scots' mentor continued his education in post graduate work at Penn State, Pitt and Indiana (Pa.) Universities.







ROMANISZYN . . . "KING OF THE ROAD"

In Cleveland, Ohio he's known as ''King of the Road,'' his friends call him ''Klondike,'' while back at Edinboro State and the Titusville area he's known as Jim Romaniszyn.

Fighting Scot fans are quick to remember the adventuresome Romaniszyn and his dazzling gridiron performances which resulted in nine Edinboro State football records. Now the past Scot great has turned his talents to the defensive side of the ledger as a linebacker for the Cleveland Browns.

The Ohio-based NFL team feels that Romaniszyn was one of the most pleasant surprises to come out of the Browns' 1973 draft as he came on strong to help the linebacking situation and played an important factor on specialty teams.

"He's quick, smart and a good hitter," says Nick Skorich. "We definitely feel he's a player with a future in pro football."


Cleveland sports writers have tagged him the Browns' "foremost free spirit" and continually feature his past adventures.


Before turning pro, he had done such things as motorcycling to Alaska for a summer job and hitchhiking back by way of New Mexico and Florida.

"Romaniszyn's latest adventures the last seven months," says Cleveland Press writer Bill Scholl, "included skiing, becoming an instant bartender, traveling to the West Coast by truck with side trips on a trail bike he took along, and fishing in eastern Canada.

"I took a lot of side trips on the trail bike and kept in shape by stopping off at colleges along the way to keep up on my weightlifting program," said Romaniszyn. He also kept a set of dumbbells in the truck for extra exercise.

Romaniszyn can play either middle or outside linebacker for the Browns and hopes to get a starting shot this season.





HACKLEY RECEIVES FIRST ANNUAL DAVID LAYO AWARD

Prior to today's game, sophomore split end Howard Hackley will receive the First Annual David Layo Outstanding Freshman Award.

The award perpetuates the memory of David Layo, a young Edinboro athlete who lost his life in an untimely accident during the summer of 1973.

Fighting Scot fans remember his feats as a most promising runner when the freshman fullback became a varsity starter midway through the 1972 season. He responded with 372 yards and a sparkling five-yardper-carry average while finishing as the Scots' second leading rusher.

A graduate of Portage Area High School where he was a three year letterman and team captain in football, Dave received the Rotary Club's Outstanding High School Athlete Award. Along with his football honors at Portage, he also earned three varsity letters in basketball and baseball. Dave was the 1971 winner of the Tribune–Democrat Newspaper's Player–Scholarship Award.

In announcing the establishment of the David Layo Outstanding Freshman Award, Edinboro coach Bill McDonald stated, "This will be the highest honor that a freshman football player can receive. Emblematic of this honor is the remembrance of a determined athlete, a fine student and, most importantly, an outstanding person." The award is presented annually to a sophomore football player who excelled during his freshman year.

"This certainly is one of the most meaningful honors which I have ever received," related Hackley when he learned of the award. "All of us on the football team personally understand what it represents."

Hackley finished as Edinboro State's leading receiver in his freshman year last fall when he caught 26 passes for 424 yards. He has already upped his total to 518 after his first three games this season and is well on his way to topping the ESC record of 1,088 held by Jim Romaniszyn. He also led the team in kickoff returns with 250 yards in 10 tries, among which was an 80-yard TD romp. His 24 points placed him as the second leading scorer on the team.

The state colleges recognized his outstanding freshman efforts by rewarding him with a second team All-Conference berth. Hackley is a graduate of Canonsburg's Canon-McMillan High School and is majoring in criminology.

Scots Boast Talented Starters, But Lack Depth

Edinboro Coach Bill McDonald must feel like a Hollywood film director when he checks his company of 1974 Fighting Scot gridders. Plenty of talented stars are on hand for the leading roles, but the supporting cast is lined with unknown performers.

Although the ESC mentor has 26 lettermen returning, McDonald is not anxious to tackle the Scots' challenging nine-game schedule.

"We're still a young team and we don't have enough athletes on hand to solve our depth problem," summarized the Scot pilot who enters his sixth season. "We should, of course, be better, but so will everybody else in our conference," McDonald continued.

A glance at the Edinboro roster supports Coach McDonald's concern. Only four seniors can be found on the list which includes 13 junior letter winners and 10 players who earned varsity awards as freshmen last year.

Most of the top returnees bolster the Scots' offensive alignment. Edinboro's entire backfield returns intact paced by passing leader Jude Basile. Basile pitched for a record 838 yards and seven scoring strikes last year to augment the Scots' traditionally ground-oriented attack.

Junior tailback Melvin Morrisette is expected to provide the speed in the ESC backfield along with sophomore jet Bob Glaser. Morrisette piled up 484 yards last fall and tallied five TD's to lead the team in both rushing and scoring. The shifty-footed Glaser totaled 322 yards to finish second best among the ground gainers and sported the highest per carry average (4.9).

Awaiting Basile's aerials is Edinboro's most talented group of receivers ever in split ends Howard Hackley and Wes Bain, as well as tight ends Steve Larson $(6-3 \frac{1}{2}, 210, \text{ so.})$ and Ron Nietupski (6-0, 192, jr.). Veterans Rod Jones (6-2, 185, jr.) and Paul Snell give the Scots additional threats in the receiving ranks.

Top faces along the offensive line are juniors Andre Wachenheimer (6-2, 225, G), Rick Vornadore (6-2, 219, T), and sophomores Doug Goodman (6-1, 205, C) and Lou Provenzano (6-0, 220, G).

Co-captains Jim McClure (6-0, 220, sr.) and John Bayer (6-2, 215, sr.) lead a Scots' defensive unit that lost only four starters. McClure operates at linebacker, while Bayer holds down the left defensive end slot.

Complementing Bayer at the other terminal position is junior Jim Barto (6-2, 195) with Don Dlugos (6-3, 240, jr.) and Jeff Shaw (6-2, 220, so.) manning the inside tackles.

Battling the two interior linemen for a starting role is 6-4, 255-pound transfer, Rich Radzavich, who could move into one of the tackle posts. Also in tap up front is end Jan Gefert (6-1, 205, jr.).

Although two starters are gone from the secondary, both Dave Seigh (5-11, 185, jr.) and George Miller (5-11, 170, so.) should provide leadership to a crop of talented newcomers that could prove to be just as capable as the missing vets. Two of the top faces here are Jim Terry (6-0, 183, so.), who logged enough varsity time as a frosh last year to garner an ESC letter, and junior Dan Smith.

Adding strength to the second line of defense is senior Mike Schnirel (6-0, 200), the second leading tackler on the squad with 92 stops to his credit. McClure led the list as he piled up 104 hits through the campaign.

A major cure could be in the offing with the addition of linebacker Kevin Erickson, (6-1, 210, so) and freshman middle guard Ron Gooden, (6-4, 250).

SCOTS' SHATTER VICTORY RECORD WIN 3 OUT OF EVERY 4 CONTESTS ...

Not even the nation's fast rising inflationary forces can seem to keep pace with Edinboro State's rapidly rising winning percentage mark in athletics. Fighting Scot athletes in twelve varsity sports shattered the school's winning percentage mark for the fifth straight year as they produced 112 wins against only 34 losses and 4 ties to claim a recordbreaking .752 percentage for the 1973-74 year.

While Edinboro State athletes were winning 3 out of every 4 intercollegiate contests in which they competed, they also set an ESC record for the most wins in a single season with their 112 successes.

Highlighting the assault with perfect season cards were Coach Doug Watts' cross country and track teams. Watts' distance men completed their season unbeaten, 10-0, while running to a third place national finish and claiming both the Pennsylvania Conference and the NAIA District championships enroute to their best finish ever. His tracksters went through their dual meet schedule unscathed at 5-0 and, likewise, annexed the Pennsylvania Conference and District crowns. Hank Mariotti's netmen just missed an unblemished mark with a 10-1 ledger and kept championship form by winning their first ever Pennsylvania Conference crown.

Coach Jim McDonald's divot-diggers fired their way to Edinboro's best golf record in history when they went through the spring with a 16-3 card to register an impressive .842 percentage.

Hitting an even .800 mark were Vern Vogel's keglers who bowled their way to a 12-3-1 finish.

With the top five Scot varsity sports hitting at an .800 or better clip, another quintet of ESC varsity teams continued the hot pace with .700 or better season records. Included in the group were Gus Miller's judo squad, 7-2-0 (.778); Jim McDonald's cagers, 18-6-0 (.750); Coach Ed Erdos' swimmers, 9-3-0 (.750); John Furcron's soccer team, 8-3-1 (.727); and Fred Caro's grapplers, 10-4-1 (.714).

The soccer team's first ever District championship headlined the laurels reaped by the five different sports while the basketball team garnered additional honors with its runner-up spot in the District finals.



HOME OF THE FIGHTING SCOTS -- SOX HARRISON STADIUM

Serving as home for ESC athletes and fans is Sox Harrison Stadium. The edifice was dedicated in the fall of 1965 in honor of "Sox" Harrison who served as head football and basketball coach at the College for 35 years. His 1931-32 cage record of 11 wins and 1 loss still stands as one of the best marks ever posted by an Edinboro basketball team. Sox still enjoys watching the Fighting Scots on Saturday afternoons as one of their most ardent fans.

Complete facilities are located beneath the grandstand area, which seats 3,000 people. Locker space for both the home and visiting teams, the coaching staff offices and locker room, the officials' dressing room, the training room, showers, the weight room and a laundry room are utilized within this space. Also included are restrooms, janitors' facilities, equipment rooms, a large concession stand and a glass enclosed press box.

In addition to the football field, the stadium also contains complete track facilities. A quarter-mile oval, a 220 straight-away and asphalt approaches for the field events highlight the home of the cinder sport.

Bleacher seats on the visitors side of the stadium bring the total seating capacity to 5,500.

A new scoreboard, one of the largest in the Conference, was added at the south end of the field last year.



Lindsey Nelson Plugs College Football

I've been a college football fan all my life.

I like the fact that the product is an original, and it's stamped "Made in America." It started, like our country did, in the East, spread westward, then all over the U.S.A.

First radio and then television enlarged the popularity of college football; and, as a broadcaster, it's been my good fortune to witness a lot of it.

I got to know the Galloping Ghost of the Illini, the Four Horsemen of Notre Dame, Little Boy Blue, and Mr. Inside and Mr. Outside.

I have done games witnessed by Harry Truman, Lyndon Johnson, and Jack Kennedy. In fact, I once recreated a football broadcast on tape for Jack Kennedy before he was President (there were no blank spots in our tapes).

He's Been There

I've done 11 seasons of NCAA games on network television, and the Notre Dame telecasts for six seasons. I've done 11 Army-Navy games, 14 Cotton Bowls, five Sugar Bowls and four Rose Bowls.

Red Grange, the Galloping Ghost of the Illini, and I once did a game at his Alma Mater. As we toured the campus, Red pointed to a great open space and said, "That's where I took

ROTC instruction. At least I was along for the ride. I was in the cavalry and I had an old horse that wasn't very fast but knew more military than MacArthur."

I once spoke to the New Haven Gridiron Club, and afterwards, someone wanted to know if I'd like to visit the legendary Mory's, "the dear old Temple bar we loved so well." I went with Albie Booth, Yale's "Little Boy Blue."

For me, it's all been one delightful experience, starting when I listened to broadcasts in my home town of Columbia, Tennessee. Later, at the University of Tennessee I was signed on by Coach Bob Neyland as a tutor for scholarship athletes who were deficient in freshman English. That put me in close touch with Neyland over a long stretch. He was probably the greatest defensive coach the game ever knew. It also put me in touch with a lot of great football players, many of whom later became great coaches all across the land.

Tipped Off

Coaches have usually been cooperative in revealing unusual tactics they anticipated using. Navy Coach Eddie Erdelatz tipped me off to a Joe Bellino running pass he'd open the game with. (It didn't work.) Bear Bryant told me about a flea-flicker he'd use. (It was completed.) Miami's Andy Gustafson told me how to recognize his quick-kick formation.


Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech told me about an unbalanced line he'd use against Kentucky to try to spring George Volkert for a long gain. (It worked, and, incidentally, the Kentucky Coach was Blanton Collier assisted by Don Shula.)

Darrell Royal told me about an unbalanced line he'd use against Ole Miss in the Sugar Bowl. (It didn't work.) Red Blaik *didn't* tell me that just before kickoff he'd switch his Army team to new grey and gold jerseys. You couldn't read a number with a telescope.

Terry Brennan didn't tell me he'd open against Oklahoma with a single wing formation. He may not have told Tailback Paul Hornung either, judging from the speed with which Oklahoma linebacker Jerry Tubbs got Hornung on his shoulder.

It might sound as though I've been doing college football for a long time. But it doesn't *seem* long. I continue to find in college football the excitement and purpose that are, to me, consistent with the need of ambitious and restless youth to have excitement and purpose.

I've been a college football fan all my life.

Scot Booters Must Depend on Newcomers



Goalie Mike Radakovich anchors ESC defense

Returning from a sabbatical leave and finding nine of eleven starters missing via the diploma route certainly doesn't paint a very bright picture for a returning coach. Nonetheless, Edinboro State soccer mentor George Shimpeno is not one to bear on the gloomy side of what appear seemingly impossible situations.

"There's no doubt that we lost a lot of important people," reflects Shimpeno, "but we have the foundation for a very competitive team."

Shimpeno will have to build his squad around a pair of seniors in Mike Radakovich and Mike Zafirovski. The pair proved to be standout performers as the Scots posted their best ever soccer season last year with an 8-3-1 record and brought home the school's first NAIA District 18 soccer championship.

Radakovich piled up a record 131 saves to be listed as the second leading shot-blocker in the Western Division of the Pennsylvania Conference. Zafirovski provided the offensive punch as he followed the Scots' Jim Kirk in the scoring department with nine goals. Both received post season honors in the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Soccer Conference.

"Of course, we'll have to build our defense around Radakovich," says Shimpeno, "and we can put two fairly experience people in front of him in Doug Boyer and Mike Pandurevic." Boyer was a consistent freshman performer at left fullback, while Pandurevic helped out at center fullback.

After a year's absence from the sport, Gene Valicenti returns to add depth to the defense and support to the scoring. His experience from summer competition, along with that of Francis Bonk, could prove to be just what Shimpeno needs in the way of veteran players.

Also adding defensive strength as a returnee is sophomore left winger Jack Swope who proved to be a


smooth performer throughout his frosh campaign. However, the key to the entire season will be the play of a crop of talented freshmen who will fill starting varsity positions.

Shimpeno is depending heavily on Amilcar Flores and Roberto Serrano, a pair of promising newcomers from Honduras, along with Ron Skalski. Both Flores and Serrano will have to provide scoring punch and help with the ball handling, while Skalski, an All-WPIAL selection, should help fill some of the holes in the defense.

"Overall, we're not too concerned about the defense," claims Shimpeno, "our problem will be one of adjustment with new people playing together and trying to score goals."

Also staring Shimpeno's youngsters in the face is a rugged schedule which pits the Scots against such Conference standouts as Lock Haven and Slippery Rock, along with the University of Pittsburgh.


