




SCOTS' 1969-70 OUTLOOK

Edinboro basketball coach, Jim McDonald, maintained his traditional pessimism while predicting his 1969-70 Fighting Scots' chances on the hard woods. "We lack height, experience, and depth," declared the head mentor who will commence his eight season guiding Edinboro's basketball fortunes.

Of course, the Scots' opponents will quickly scoff at McDonald's prognostications, but his cautious attitude seems more accurate than in the past.

Only three lettermen return to cage action for the Scots this year while the slim 11-man roster lists a single senior along with a contingent of seven sophomores and three juniors. Only three of McDonald's men measure better than 6-2 on the tape which will showcase a far shorter Edinboro team than the squads that have performed for the Scots in recent years.

The odds also seem heavily stacked against any duplication of the identical 8-0 marks the Clan has posted in conference action the last two campaigns. The Scots hold a 17-game conference winning streak which stretches over the past three seasons. Both California and Lock Haven have the material to halt Edinboro's bid for their third consecutive conference crown and to stop the Scots' successful win skein.

Edinboro's first victory, however, will set off a big celebration in Crawford Gymnasium. The first time that the Scots finish in the victory column will mark Coach Jim McDonald's 100th win as Edinboro's head mentor. To date, McDonald's teams have recorded a 99-50 slate during his seven years at the Highlander helm. His ball clubs have been averaging a highly respectable 14 wins per season.

Running the offense for the Clan this year will be guards Dave Knowlton (6-1, junior, Mercer), Fred Riley (5-10, sophomore, Clearfield) and Ray Overholt (5-11, junior, Brookfield, Ill.). Adding some back up power to the front line are Tom Carr (6-0, senior, Pittsburgh), Jim Stranko (6-1, sophomore, Pittsburgh) and Dick Wildauer (5-8, sophomore, Reynoldsville).

Knowlton gives the Clan some excellent speed at the guard spot where he is most effective as a playmaker. He established a new assist record last year in his first try at varsity action with a total of 133. Dave could really make the Scots' offense go, if he starts to hit from the outside.

Freshman sensation Fred Riley could give the Scots the quickest pair of guards in the conference. While leading the Clan's frosh to a 14-2 slate last year, the Clearfield ace led in the assist column with 91 and topped all scorers with 329 points for a 20.5 points a game average. The speedy soph is undoubtedly one of the best outside shooters in the squad.

Also on hand is letterman Ray Overholt who adds some shooting power to the guard contingent. Seeing only limited action throughout the 68'-'69 campaign, Ray still proved he was a contender for a guard slot.


The Men of McDonald have the shortest front wall that they've had in many years. Expected to carry most of the load is forward Bob Burlingame (6-9, sophomore, Russell), who will be depended on for both board strength and shooting accuracy. His 203 grabs led the frosh five in rebounding as he finished with 12.7 average in that department.

Art Dickinson (6-10, junior, Crystal Lake, III.) could work his way into the center spot to add some much needed height up front. Art lettered last year, but saw only spotty action throughout the schedule.

A real battle is shaping up for the other forward spot where top newcomers including Sid Booker (6-2, sophomore, Erie), and Jim Prokell (6-0, sophomore, Pittsburgh), and Bob Koger (6-5, sophomore, Pittsburgh).

McDonald's men fought their way to a 14-8 record and the state championship last year only to fall to a powerful Chevney State. The Clan faces even a sterner challenge to finish with a comparable season slate in '69-'70.

SID BOOKER (14-15) G-F 6-2, 165, SO., ERIE

One of the Clan's best leapers . . . Could easily find him starting at one of the forward spots . . . Possesses a fine outside shot and is quick on defense . . . Third leading scorer on last year's frosh team with 206 markers and a 12.4 points a game average Grabbed 126 rebounds during 68-69 ... Led Erie's East High Warriors to the District 10 basketball championship Owns the Erie city record in the high jump Placed second in the state in both the high jump and high hurdles.

BOB BURLINGAME (42-43) F-C 6-9, 210, SO., RUSSELL

Bob will be heavily counted on to give the Scots some greatly needed board strength ... Was the leading rebounder on the frosh five with 203 grabs for a 12.7 average per game . . . Shot a highly respectable 56% from the floor last year and averaged 9.9 points a game Was a standout performer at Eisenhower High School where he averaged 29.3 points a game during his senior year and 20.9 rebounds an outing.

TOM CARR (20-21) G 6-0, 160, SR., PITTSBURGH


Back after a year's absence and will add depth to an already strong guard contingent ... Accurate from the outside Has one year of varsity experience under his belt As a frosh regular, he poured 148 points through the hoop to maintain an impressive 10.6 average ... Holds the single game freshman record of 47 points in one contest ... Performed at North Allegheny where he was an All-Section winner.

ART DICKINSON (54-55) C 6-10, 230, JR., CRYSTAL LAKE, ILL.

Art saw much varsity action as a sophomore and will help the Scots once again this year underneath . . . Had his best night last year against California when he led the Scots to victory in the final seconds . . . Fine shooter for a big man . . . Shot 54 % from the field as a Scot frosh Was the fourth highest scorer in Chicago's North Suburban Conference while averaging close to 19 points a game.

DAVE KNOWLTON (22-23) G 6-1, 158, SO., MERCER

Gives the Scots more than adequate speed at the guard slot ... His guickness and shooting make him a continual offensive threat . . . An all-conference prospect . . . Set two Edinboro assist records last year as a soph starter with the most assists in one game (12) and the most assists in a single season (133) . . . Will run the Clan's offense ... Playmaker for the Mercer Mustang team that captured the Class B State Championship in '66 and '67... Received an Honorable Mention All-State rating and played in the "Dapper Dan" Roundball Classic in Pittsburgh.

BOB KOGER (34-35) F 6-5, 210, SO., PITTSBURGH


Finished the season strong as a freshman performer and shows continual improvement ... A good jumper and an accurate shooter ... Could be called on to fill in at one of the forward positions. ... Hit on 52 % of his field goal attempts as a freshman and cleared the glass 65 times ... Performed on the hardwoods for Montour High School ... Still recovering from a knee injury received during the summer . . . A hard worker.

RAY OVERHOLT (12-13) G 5-11, 165, JR., BROOKFIELD, ILL.

Could see plenty of action this year as a guard . . . A valuable asset to last year's club, especially during the playoffs . . . Did an outstanding job as a freshman when he clicked for 212 points . . . Scores well from the outside and can run the fast break ... Also a standout baseball player for the Scots ... Named All-State Honorable Mention and All-Suburban Conference while playing at Riverside-Brookfield High School where he averaged 16.5 points a game.

JIM PROKELL (30-31) F 6-0, 180, SO., PITTSBURGH

Jim undoubtedly is short as far as collegiate forwards are listed, but his aggressiveness and leaping ability make him an adept competitor . . . Performed underneath for Pittsburgh Canevin High School and did a sound job at forward for last year's freshman team . . . Collected 143 stray shots to rank second in the rebounding department and averaged 9.5 points a game for the frosh yearlings ... Moves well to the inside where he is a proficient scorer . . . Will be fighting for a chance to become one of the starting forwards.

FRED RILEY (4-5) G 5-10, 150, SO., CLEARFIELD

Completes probably the best pair of guards in Edinboro's cage history along with Dave Knowlton . . . Blistered the nets for 329 points to average 20.5 points a contest as a frosh frontliner . . . Was high scorer in 9 of 16 frosh contests and added 91 assists to his offensive endeavors . . . A tremendous outside shooter who has excellent speed and ball handling ability . . . Shattered all existing scoring and assists records at Clearfield High where he also scored 59 points in a single game effort . . . Averaged 25.8 points a game at Clearfield and was selected Outstanding Player in District 9, unanimously named to the Coaches and Sportswriters District 9 All-Star Team, named Fourth Team All-State by UPI and made the AP's Honorable Mention All-State list.

JIM STRANKO (24-25) G 6-1, 175, SO., PITTSBURGH

Another sophomore up from the frosh ranks who proved to be a top scorer . . . While appearing in all 16 freshman contests, he meshed 234 points to earn second place honors in the scoring race ... Also second in assists with 56 ... Was game high scorer on two occasions with respective 23 and 22-point outputs . . . Will add depth to an already solid set of varsity guards . . . Most effective in a 1 on 1 situation.

DICK WILDAUER (10-11) G 5-8, 145, SO., REYNOLDSVILLE

Saw only spotty action as a first-year man until second semester when he was a regular performer . . . Has a real challenge facing him to break into the action this year, but will provide needed depth to the guard corps . . . Was voted Most Valuable Player in the Erie Diocesan League where he played for DuBois Central Catholic ... Averaged 24.6 points a game in the Diocesan League and was named to the loop's first team.

DON RHULE, VARSITY MANAGER, SO., PENN HILLS

A liberal arts major, Don starts his first year as a varsity manager for the Fighting Scots . . . Edinboro Coach Jim McDonald praised his work in pre-season practice saving, "The role that Don plays in our athletic program fulfills a vital team need" ... He is a graduate of Penn Hills High School.

SCOT FROSH TRADITIONALLY TOUGH

The 1969-70 edition of Edinboro frosh cagers upholds the Scot tradition of all-around strength. Head Coach Jim McDonald hands over to assistant Dave Rooney another outstanding crop of basketball prospects. The 12-man roster lists such size up front as 6-7, 6-7, 6-6 and 6-3, 6-1, 6-1 guards who won't give away much height to their opponents this season.

Rich Sulka (Pittsburgh Central Catholic) highlights the squad's defense as the finest rebounder. Sulka is an aggressive ball player who asserts himself quite well underneath. He's one of the biggest men on the team, standing 6-6 and weighing 210 pounds. While at Central Catholic he averaged 25 points and 17 rebounds a game which earned him a berth on the All-Catholic team. He also showcased his wears in the Dapper Dan Roundball Classic.

Headlining the offense is Jim Booros (Allentown Dieruff). Booros is a tremendous outside shooter and makes long corner shots his specialty. He received honorable mention all-state honors while at Dieruff with his game average of 19.3 points and 14.5 rebounds per contest. The Allentown ace has good size at 6-1, 180 pounds.

Charles Frazier (Cedar Knolls, N. J.), a 6-7, 190 pound forward, strengthens the Scot offense with his ability to hit well from the outside. He has a fine jump shot which makes him even more effective with his height. A graduate of Whippany Park High School, Frazier highlighted a brilliant sports career this past season with his second team all-state berth in New Jersey's basketball selections. In spearheading the Wildcats to a 20-2 overall record, Frazier averaged 21.3 points a game and grabbed 14 stray shots a contest.

Jim Romaniszyn (Titusville) will most likely nail down a guard slot as the team's playmaker. Romaniszyn has the leadership qualities that such a spot demands. The 6-1, 190-pound forward from Titusville High, averaged 19 points a game while leading the Rockets to the district playoffs and a 19-3 record. His hardcourt performances earned him district honors as well as an all-state honorable mention listing.

Gary Rausch (Lake City) and Tom Cryan (Oxford, N. J.) are two of the top defensive men on the Scot squad. Rausch, who is 6-4, 185 pounds is a strong rebounder and has quite an assortment of shots underneath. While at

Union High in Girard, he averaged 21 points and 17 rebounds per game. Cryan is also a strong defensive player with "hustle" being the key to his success. Standing 5-10 and weighing 160 pounds he also exhibits fairly accurate outside shooting. He's a graduate of Warren Hills High where he averaged 15 points a game during his senior year.

Tom Albright (Richmond, Virginia) will probably start at the other guard slot. The 6-3, 175-pound guard played his scholastic ball at George Wythe High School where he blistered the nets for a 19.5 points a game average and found time to haul down 12.3 rebounds a contest. The Virginian climaxed a great high school career when he was selected to the All American team.

Renny Betris (Pittsburgh Keystone Oaks) has been tagged as the quickest guard on the club. A 5-9 performer, Betris' quickness makes him a top notch defensive prospect.

Fairfield, Ohio's Doug Craig will be vying for either a center or forward spot. Craig, a 6-7 pivot ace, led Fairfield's Indians as he grabbed 17 rebounds and hit the nets for a 15 points a game average.


Bernie Jubeck (Altoona), Gary Overholt (Brookfield, III.) and Chuck Braden (Kingsville, O.) round out the ESC frosh contingent. Jubeck (6-0, 160 pounds), a graduate of Bishop Guilfoyle High, is rated as one of the best ball handlers and can run the fast break. Overholt (5-11, 165 pounds) is looking for a guard spot while teammate Braden (5-9, 140 pounds) also eyes one of the two starting assignments.

The frosh season includes an 18 game slate highlighted by an exchange contest with the Gannon Golden Knight freshmen.

Edinboro's freshmen teams have upheld the winning tradition established by their varsity counterparts. The 1966-67 team posted a 12-4 season slate while the 1967-68 squad romped to a 17-4 mark. Last year's Fighting Scot frosh maintained the pace with a 14-2 season record to give the first year men a 43-10 reading over the past three campaigns.

ROMANISZYN MAKES MARK

Titusville's Jim Romaniszyn who was both a standout basketball and football performer for the Rockets, marks a feat at Edinboro that hasn't been attempted since 1962. It was in that year that Edinboro basketball All-American, Dan Petchel, demonstrated his talents both on the football gridiron and the basketball hardwoods. Petchel was seventh in the national rushing rankings as the Scots' quarterback before a knee injury forced him to the sidelines. In this age of specialization in athletics, seldom is such a dual attempt made. Yet, Jim Romaniszyn, who is both an outstanding student and athlete, has accepted the challenge. Whether or not he continues as a two-sport athlete when he reaches varsity status is of no consequence. He is one of few who has tried.



HEAD BASKETBALL COACH



Since his appointment as head coach in 1962, Jim McDonald has guided Edinboro State College to 4 Western Division PC Basketball Championship titles, the PC State Championship, and the NAIA District 18 Championship which earned Edinboro a trip to the NAIA Championship Playoffs in Kansas City, Missouri. In 1966 Mr. McDonald was selected by the coaches of the Eastern Seaboard States to be the Area 8 Basketball Coach of the Year and was honored as one of the top ten finalists in the NAIA's Coach of the Year poll for his outstanding accomplishments. This season marks his eighth year at the Highlander helm.

Prior to accepting his current position at Edin-

boro in 1961, McDonald served as assistant basketball coach at Harborcreek High School in Erie, Pa. He is a 1956 graduate of Bridgeport High School, Bridgeport, West Virginia.

As a player, McDonald attended West Virginia Wesleyan College, where he participated as a varsity "Bobcat" for four seasons. During his collegiate basketball career McDonald was selected as an All-American two years by the UPI and the NAIA as a result of his outstanding abilities on the hardwoods. McDonald reached the climax of his athletic career with the Bobcats in his senior year, 1960, when he ranked as the second leading scorer in the nation with his average slightly over 33 points a game in regular season competition. In that same year, he was chosen to try out for the United States Olympic Basketball Team at Denver, Colorado. In addition, McDonald's performance in the National NAIA Post-Season Basketball Tournament, held annually in Kansas City, Mo., earned him the honor of being named to the NAIA's All-Tournament Team for two consecutive years, 1959 and 1960.

Under McDonald's tutorship, the Scots have won 94 of 137 regular season encounters or slightly more than 68% of their games. He posted his best mark as a coach two years ago as his cagers rang up a regular season record of 17-4 and finished with a 19-5 ledger after tournament play. In all games the *Men of McDonald* have posted 99 wins and only 50 losses.

His '67-'68 team cracked 10 existing Edinboro State College basketball records and captured the PSCAC State Championship by defeating annual powerhouse Cheyney State. The 1967-68 squad ranked as high as eleventh among the nation's small colleges and finished fifth in the nation in the team rebounding department. The Scots won their first 10 games while averaging 100 points a contest.

Under McDonald's tutelage Edinboro State College is rapidly earning respect in the small college circuits of the East. The Scots have never experienced a losing season under his guidance. In addition, three Edinboro cagers have garnered All-American honors since 1965. Winning has become a tradition in the McDonald camp. This season could prove to be the most challenging of his career.

ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH



Recently joining the Edinboro State athletic staff is Dave Rooney, an Allentown, Pa. native. Rooney has been appointed head freshman basketball coach and will also serve as an assistant on the varsity squad. Along with his coaching duties, the new mentor will assist in the physical education department of the College.

Rooney is a 1959 graduate of William Allen High School in Allentown, Pa. and also holds both B.S. and M.S. degrees from West Chester State College where he majored in health and physical education.

The Scots' new coach was a standout basketball player throughout both his high school and collegiate campaigns.

He led the 1958-59 William Allen team to the

East Penn League championship and earned an all-state honorable mention berth for his performances on the hardwoods. In his freshman year at West Chester, Rooney piloted the frosh to an undefeated season with a sterling 17-0 record.

After two years of varsity competition his cage career was interrupted by service in the Armed Forces and he later returned to West Chester State to serve in a coaching capacity while he completed his B.S. requirements and pursued his M.S. degree.

Before joining the Edinboro coaching staff, Rooney served as head basketball coach for one year at Spring Ford High School in Royersford, Pa.

He and his wife, Sue, now reside in Edinboro.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Mr. Allan W. Hall was appointed a year ago as Edinboro's first full-time Director of Athletics.

Hall, a graduate of Baldwin-Wallace College, served as Assistant Director of Athletics at Akron University for two years prior to coming to Edinboro.

While at Akron, Hall was quite active in the University's athletic program. He piloted Akron's cross country teams for 12 years and guided his harriers to three Ohio Conferences and three All-Ohio championships. His 1963 squad held the distinction of being runnerup to national champion Emporia State in the NCAA meet. Along with his cross country duties he also served as assistant track coach at A. U. for 12 years.

Hall's keen interest in all phases of sports is

reflected by his past accomplishments in the field of athletics. In 1962 he was selected Meet Director of the National AAU Swimming Championships. He was highly instrumental in making Akron University the site of the Mideast Regional NCAA Basketball Tournaments in 1964, 1965, and 1966. Hall is also credited with the inception of the Junior Olympics program in the City of Akron. He served as the University's Sports Information Director during 1958 and 1959.

He and his wife, Pam, reside in Edinboro.

CHALLENGING THE SCOTS

TEAM TRAINER



Bob Klingler is commencing his third year on the Scots' staff as team trainer. His valuable background of medical knowledge is also utilized in the instruction of anatomy and physiology at the College.

Klingler graduated from Lock Haven State College in 1952 with a B.S. degree and then ventured to Hermann School of Physical Therapy in Houston, Texas, where he became a registered physical therapist in 1954.

He received his M.S. from Bucknell University in Lewisburg, Pa., where he also acted as the Bisons' assistant athletic trainer.

He taught at Milton Hershey, a private boys' school in Hershey, Pa., prior to accepting his post at Edinboro. While at Milton Hershey School,

Klingler served as the Spartans' head football mentor, head track coach, and assistant basketball coach. Both his cinder and cage teams never experienced a losing season under his leadership, while his grid teams posted continuous successful campaigns in the powerful Capitol Area Conference.

During the off season the Scots' medical man has been enrolled in graduate work at Springfield College in Massachusetts and serves as a physical therapist at St. Vincent Hospital in Erie where he administers treatment to rehabilitation patients.

Mr. Klingler, his wife, Jill, and daughter, Julie, make their home in Edinboro.

SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR

Paul Newman began his duties two years ago as Edinboro's first Sports Information Director.

Mr. Newman is a 1964 graduate of Edinboro where he earned both his B.S. degree and M.Ed. while majoring in English.

Prior to his appointment at the College, he held a teaching position with the Buckeye Local Schools in Ashtabula, Ohio for three years. He served as a cross country coach and assistant track coach at Edgewood Senior High School in Ashtabula, Ohio.

In connection with his duties, he is also the District 18 Publicity Chairman for the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics and is currently serving as Area 8 District Chairman for the NAIA.

He serves as the adviser for the Tartan, Edinboro's college yearbook.

Mr. Newman, his wife, Connie, and their children, Paul, Jr. and Michele, make their home in Edinboro.



'68-'69 IN REVIEW

Despite losing final games to national powerhouses Cheyney, Indiana University (Pa.) and Gannon, Edinboro State's band of Fighting Scots finished with a respectable card of 14 wins against 8 losses.

The Clan's record continued to be highly impressive under the McDonald Management. Since his appointment as head coach in 1962, the *Men of McDonald* have never experienced a losing season. Under his tutorship for the past 7 years the Scots have won 94 of 136 regular season contests (70% of their games), nailed down their first state crown, captured the District 18 title along with a trip to Kansas City, and won 4 Western Division Championships.

For the second consecutive year, the Scots finished undefeated in loop play and sport a 17-game conference winning streak which stretches over the past 3 seasons. This is a Western Division record.

Highlighting season play last year was a trip to sunny California where the Highlanders finished a very respectable third among an 8 team field entered in the Irvine Tournament. The Scots shot their way past Cal State at Fullerton, 85-63, and defending tourney champion Los Angeles State, 78-73, before they were halted by tournament champion Long Beach State, 84-58. Senior forward Frank Smith from Bentleyville was selected to the All-Tournament Team at the closing ceremonies.

Frank Smith closed out a brilliant career at Edinboro by averaging 21.2 points a game and 11.4 rebounds a contest. During his past 4 years on the hardwoods he has amassed 1,225 points to become the third highest career scorer in Edinboro's basketball history. He also moved into fourth place in the rebounding list as he collected 637 stray shots off the glass.

Smith's 466 points are second only to Walt Askins' 496 total during the 1956-57 season. Frank holds Edinboro records for the most points in one game (54 against Fredonia and 52 last year against Kenyon), the highest scoring average (30.1 points a game during 1966-67), and the most field goals in one game (21 against both Waynesburg and Kenyon).

Also rounding out play in Scot uniforms were seniors Ron Weaver (Montour), Tim Ziner (Bethel Park), Larry Smith (Brookville), Harry Jenkins (Bridgeport, W. Va.) and Rod Herron (Jackson Center).


Jenkins, a 6-4 forward, ranks eleventh on the list of all-time scorers at Edinboro with a career total of 728 points. He averaged 9.4 as a sophomore. 12.9 as a junior and 11.8 during his senior year.

Dave Knowlton, 6-1 sophomore guard from Mercer, established a new record in the assist column with 133 scoring passes. He slipped past the old mark of 132 set by Ron Weaver during the 1967-68 cage season. Weaver and Knowlton now share the single game assist record of 12.

Rod Herron proved to be the most accurate from the floor throughout the season as he clicked on 54.5 % of his shots in 21 games. Frank Smith followed by netting 189 of 388 attempts during 22 games for a very respectable 48.7 % effort.

The only category in which the Scots were outpointed by their opponents was in the free throw department. The Clan netted only 365 shots in 575 attempts from the foul stripe for a dediocre 65.2%. Edinboro's opponents hit 68% of their tosses from the charity line.

Last year's 14 victories by the Fighting Scot cagers brought Coach Jim McDonald's total to 99 successful outings over the past 7 years. That's an impressive average of 14 wins a season. It's hopeful that a fine nucleus of experienced sophomores and the influx of an outstanding freshman team can maintain the Scots' success on the hardwood.



MEN OF McDONALD GAIN HONORS

Three of Coach Jim McDonald's basketball products have been named NAIA All-Americans for their outstanding roundball abilities.

Sheffield's Dan Petchel (1964-65 All-American selectee) ranks as Edinboro State's second all-time high scorer with 1,344 points. Bentleyville's Frank Smith (1967-68 and 1968-69 All-American) holds down the third place slot with 1,225 markers while Aliquippa's Darryl Meachem (1965-66 All-America) ranks fifth with 881 tallies.

In the rebounding department, Meachem and Petchel are two of the college's top three career rebounders with 897 and 744, respectively. Meachem pulled down 393 rebounds for a school record established during the 1965-66 season.

Smith owns two individual scoring records. His 54-point output against Fredonia in the 1966-67 season earned him the most points scored in a single game record. The 6-1, 198-Ib. forward compiled the most field goals scored in a single game record with 21 twopoint markers against Waynesburg in the same season and 21 against Kenyon in 1969.

PENNSYLVANIA CONFERENCE

The Pennsylvania State Colleges Athletic Conference, organized in 1951, this year changed its name to the Pennsylvania Conference.

Its membership originally consisted of the 14 state colleges: Bloomsburg, California, Cheyney, Clarion, East Stroudsburg, Edinboro, Indiana, Kutztown, Lock Haven, Mansfield, Millersville, Shippensburg, Slipperv Rock, and West Chester. In 1966 Indiana no longer was eligible for conference laurels as it acquired university status.

The conference is divided into a Western Division and an Eastern Division. Members of the Eastern Division include Bloomsburg, Cheyney, East Stroudsburg, Mansfield, Kutztown, Millersville, Shippensburg, and West Chester, while Edinboro, California, Clarion, Lock Haven, and Slippery Rock comprise the Western Division. 



THE COLLEGE'S HISTORY

The beginnings of the college were laid in 1857, over one hundred years ago, when a band of Scotch-Irish farmers grouped together and founded a private normal school at Edinboro by popular subscription to train teachers. In 1861 it was chartered by the Commonwealth as Pennsylvania's second Normal School and developed and grew through service to the Commonwealth.

A great forward stride was taken in 1914, when the Commonwealth purchased Edinboro Normal School. In 1926, alerted to the need for better educated teachers for its schools, Pennsylvania made Edinboro a Teachers College offering a four-year curriculum leading to degrees of Bachelor of Science in Secondary, Elementary, and Art Education, and Library Science.

In 1960 the name of the college was changed to Edinboro State College.

Beginning in September of 1957, the college was empowered to grant degrees of Master of Education in Elementary Education. In September 1961, graduate study in secondary education was added to the graduate program.

In 1962 the liberal arts degree program was begun. Students may prepare for various vocations as an arts and science major in Humanities, Social Sciences or Natural Sciences and may receive a Bachelor of Arts degree.

The control of the College is vested in the Board of Trustees, composed of nine members appointed by the Governor of Pennsylvania. The Board of Trustees in turn elects the President of the College who is responsible for its administration. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees.

The College is accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the American Medical Association. In addition, its curriculums are registered by the New York State Department of Education.

Graduates of Edinboro have distinguished themselves in all professional fields: education, law, medicine, and religion as well as business and politics.

The College stresses friendly relations among students and faculty and informal student counseling and guidance. The faculty is keenly aware of professional interests and self growth. High qualitative and quantitative standards distinguish the graduates of this college. The preparation of better educated citizens has been an Edinboro tradition for over a century.

PRESIDENT

Dr. Chester T. McNerney became president of Edinboro State College in September, 1966. His formal inauguration, honoring him as Edinboro's thirteenth president, followed on April 22, 1967.

Dr. McNerney came to Edinboro from the University of Akron, where he was the Dean of the College of Education and was highly instrumental in the development of numerous educational innovations. He was cited as the motivating force behind the University of Akron Classrooms Around the World, and recognized for his scholarly studies of comparative education abroad.

Dr. McNerney's primary areas of interest deal with the improvement of the curriculm, the program for educational supervision and administration, and the improvement of inter-personal re-

lationships among the various members of working groups. His concern in this area has led to his writing of several books, lecturing and conducting various workshops.

Under Dr. McNerney's guidance, the College has witnessed the growth of administrative operations, broader forms of student government, and the development of the future growth of Edinboro State College.

He is a man dedicated to the academic life, a tireless advocate of personal involvement in the religious and civic affairs of one's community, and an educator who visibly believes in and practices total individual professional commitment.

EDINBORO STATE COLLEGE'S ATHLETIC PROGRAM

Intercollegiate athletics play an important role in the total educational program of Edinboro State College. The program is so conducted as to assure wholesome use of leisure time, a healthy focal point for the experience and the expression of group spirit, and a laboratory experience for prospective coaches.


Edinboro's athletic program includes intercollegiate competition in football, basketball, wrestling, golf, track, tennis, baseball, soccer and cross country. The finest of facilities are readily being made available to accommodate these sports.


Scheduled for completion next year is the Scots' new fieldhouse. The continuing growth of Edinboro's athletic program is rapidly establishing the College as a respected collegiate competitor.




