

Today's Game Welcome to the final regular season game of 2008. It doesn't seem that long ago that the Fighting Scots were opening the campaign on a hot Saturday afternoon at West Liberty State.

It has been a year to remember, with the Fighting Scots seeking to tie the school record for wins with a ninth victory today.

The hope is that a potential tenth win could be in the offing. That would mean a postseason berth. The NCAA will announce the Division II playoff field on Sunday afternoon on ESPN News. Edinboro is definitey on the bubble for a playoff berth. For

win today's game against Millersville. Then it gets very interesting, as games such as American International vs. Southern Connecticut State, Seton Hill vs. West Liberty and even Shaw vs. Elizabeth City State impacts the Scots.

Edinboro's playoff hopes were dealt a serious blow when West Chester upset Bloomsburg last week. A loss would have likely left the Golden Rams on the outside looking in at the playoff picture. Instead, West Chester now meets California(Pa.) in the PSAC Championship Game

This has been a great season whether a playoff bid is forthcoming or not. There's the big win at West Liberty to open the year, the 24-17 triumph over Indiana(Pa.), and unfortunately, the losses to California(Pa.) and Mercyhurst by a total of seven points.

We'd like to leave you with one more memory. That's in regards to the 13 seniors who are likely making their final appearance at Sox Harrison Stadium. They have enjoyed a great deal of success both on the field and off. For more on our seniors, see page 60.

The Coaches

Scott Browning (Ohio State '81) took over as Edinboro's 13th head coach on January 5, 2006. He was certainly no stranger to Fighting Scot football, however, serving as an assistant coach for the previous twenty years. While at Edinboro he has coached the offensive linemen, defensive backs and running backs, along with serving as the offensive coordinator. Browning became the first head coach at Edinboro to debut with a win since Bill McDonald in 1969 when the Fighting Scots opened the 2006 season with a

28-14 win at West Chester. He went on to lead Edinboro to a 6-5 finish, the most wins ever by a first-year coach. A year ago he led the Fighting Scots to a 7-4 record. With 13 wins after two seasons, Browning tied Bill McDonald and Tom Hollman for most wins in their first two seasons. He now own s a 21-11 mark. (For more on Scott Browning, see pages 6-7.)

Greg Colby (Illinois '75) is in his first year in charge of the Millersville program. Colby came to Millersville after spending six years as the defensive coordinator at Northwestern University. During his time there, the Wildcats posted three consecutive six-win seasons for the first time in 70 years and four out of five six-win seasons for the first time since 1905. Northwestern appeared in the Motor City Bowl in 2003 and the Vitalis Sun Bowl in 2005. Colby has coached for 34 years, including 25 years as a collegiate coach and 10 years as a defensive coordinator at the NCAA Division I level. He has been on staff for two Big Ten Championships and 12 collegiate bowl games. He has also served as an assistant coach at Kent State, Michigan State and his alma mater, Illinois

The Edinboro-Millersville Series Millersville leads 5-3

This marks the first meeting between Edinboro and Millersville since the Marauders captured a 20-10 decision over the Fighting Scots in 1999 at Sox Harrison Stadium. Millersville has won the last two meetings.

Scouting Millersville

Millersville opened the season with six straight losses, three to teams currently nationally ranked, before handing first-year head coach Greg Colby his first career win, 48-6 over Cheyney. The Marauders have since gone on to lose three straight game for a 1-9 ledger ... Colby earned his coaching reputation as a defensive coach, but it has been a tough year for the former Northwestern defensive coordinator. His defense has 30-or-more points seven times and ranks 14th in scoring defense (38.3 ppg.) and 16th in total defense (494.7 ypg.) ... the Millersville offense has gained steam of late, with 400-or-more yards in three of the last four games.

Players to Watch



Cardoza Jacks, TB -- the 5'9", 200 lb. sophomore has rushed for 100 yards in the last four games, including 101 yards this past week vs. East Stroudsburg. Jacks gained 242 yards a year ago, and now has 699 yards with 6 TDs. He ranks ninth in the league in rushing. Bill Shirk, QB -- since taking over at quarterback he

has thrown for 200 yards in five of seven games. That includes 290 yards against East Stroudsburg, ten shy of his career high.

Jamal Smith, WR -- a year ago he was the PSAC East Rookie of the Year as a quarterback, passing for 804 yards and rushing for 633 yards. After beginning the year at quarterback he moved to wide receiver and has acught 26 passes for 420 yards.

Andy Tischbein, WR -- the senior has caught seven TD passes in the last four games, and had a career-high 9 catches for 112 yards and a TD vs. East Stroudsburg. Overall, he has 48 catches for 711 yards and 8 TDs.

The Millersville Game

Last Week's Gameboostss Edinboro 35, Clarion 10

Jeremy Burr jumpstarted the Boro with three runs and Trevor Harris threw for three touchdowns. Burr's 16-yard run on a fake field goal led to a touchdown with 12 seconds left in the half, giving Edinboro a 14-3 lead at intermission. He took the second half kickoff and returned it 49 vards. Edinboro scored two plays later for a 21-3 lead. Finaly, Burr's 37-vard run keved Edinboro's 90-vard drive on the next series. Harris threw a nine-yard touchdown pass to Gary Nolen, and one-yarders to Denayne Dixon and Ryan Rybicki. The Edinboro defense limited Clarion to 89 yards rushing and 232 total yards.

East Stroudsburg 45, Millersville 18

Visiting East Stroudsburg pulled away from the Marauders to spoil Millersville's Homecoming festivities. The Warriors piled up 572 yards in offense and forced four Millersville turnovers. Cardoza Jacks scored on a two-yard run, part of a 101-yard effort. Andy Tischbein had 9 catches for 112 yards, including a 27-yard TD pass from Bill Shirk. John Banzhof booted a 46-yard field goal.

24-21 a Score That Will Haunt the Scots

When Edinboro head coach Scott Browning looks back at the 2008 season, he may cringe when you mention the score 24-21. For starters, that is the score that Mercyhurst beat the Fighting Scots by. In addition, that is the score that West Chester defeated Bloomsburg by this past week. That win for the Golden Rams could ultimately knock Edinboro out of the playoff chase.

Welcome Back Ron

Former Fighting Scot Ron Rankin returns to Edinboro today as an assistant coach for Millersville. He serves as the defensive line coach. Rankin has been on the Marauders' staff for ten years serving in several capacities, including six seasons as defensive coordinator. Rankin began his coaching career at Edinboro in the mid 80's. After stops at Allegheny, Defiance and Gannon, he moved on to South Dakota as an assistant coach. He would serve as the head coach of the Coyotes in 1997 and '98 before joining the Millersville staff.

Battles Paces Rejuvenated Ground Game

Michael Battles entered the Clarion game with 134 yards rushing on 45 carries. The redshirt freshman almost matched that against the Golden Eagles with a career-high 113 yards on 15 carries. Edinboro almost had a pair of 100-yard rushers for the second straight week. Ulysee Davis gained 99 yards on 20 carries as Edinboro ran for a season-high 290 yards. In the loss to Mercyhurst, Davis accounted for 107 yards and Houston Brown 106, all part of a 255-yard effort that was the season high until the Clarion game. Brown, who entered the Clarion game as the team's leading rusher, did not play on offense against the Golden Eagles. Instead, he split time at cornerback with Jesse Williams.

Burr Boosts Offense with His Legs

Jeremy Burr caught one pass for four yards at Clarion. Yet the senior wide receiver had three plays that jumpstarted the offense. With Edinboro lineup up for a field goal in the final minute of the half and clinging to a 7-3 lead, Burr, the holder, executed a perfect fake. He sprinted around the right side for 16 yards. Two plays later Edinboro scored for a 14-3 lead. Burr took the second half and returned it 49 yards to the Clarion 46. The Scots need two plays to score for a 21-3 lead. Finally, after a three-and-out for Clarion, Burr took a handoff on a reverse and went 37 yards on the first play. It was the start of a 90-yard scoring drive that boosted the lead to 28-3.

What an exciting time to be on our campus and a part of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania! Continuing to head south on Scotland Road, the recent \$20 million renovation and expansion of the Frank G. Pogue Student Center has quickly become a shining centerpiece and hub of campus activities.

Heading west on Scot Road, you might have noticed the construction just west of the beautiful and serene five-acre Mallory Lake, Within the year, our new Human Services Building will be ready for occupancy there, housing our Nursing programme and our Speech, Language and Hearing Department.

Continuing west along Normal Street, the new \$5 million Dr. William P. Alexander Music Center, our first campus structure built specifically to meet the Music Department's needs, stands next to Academy Hall, the first campus building constructed in 1857 and now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. One of the oldest former Normal School buildings in the nation still used for academic purposes, Academy Hall recently underwent a \$5 million renovation and now houses our Undergraduate Admissions Office. Please stop by on this or your next campus visit.

And if all that isn't enough, a \$23 million construction project will soon be launched on exterior and interior expansion and renovation of Cooper Hall, which houses Edinboro's many science programmes.

So, you can see why we're so excited! Whether in the classrooms, laboratories, libraries or athletic venues, Edinboro University goes far beyond the norm in creating a 21st century higher education experience for the complete college student.

Scott Browning knows a thing or two about the Edinboro football tradition. With twenty years under his belt as an assistant coach, he was all too familiar with the glory days of Edinboro football. So it didn't take him long to restore some lost traditions when he took over as the 13th head football coach of the Fighting Scots on January 5, 2006.

Most prevalent was the return to the "Boro", the common name the football team was referred to during

the 1980's

successful periods in Edinboro football history. One thing Browning didn't mess with was

the tradition of winning. In fact, in his first two seasons Browning has tied the record for most wins by a coach with 13 victories. Only Bill McDonald, who guided the 1969 and 1970 teams to 13 wins, and Tom Hollman, who also totaled 13 wins in 1988 and '89, can match Browning's start.

His first edition finished with a 6-5 record, the most wins ever under a first-year coach. But it didn't end just on the football field. The Fighting Scots excelled in the classroom, including a cumulative team GPA of over 2.8 for the spring semester.

Browning became the first coach at Edinboro since Sox Harrison to win his first two games as head coach. That happened in 1926, the first year of football at the Boro. Thanks to a 28-14 win at West Chester, he became the first coach since Bill McDonald in 1969 to win his first game as head coach.

That victory, on the road at West Chester between a pair of 2005 NCAA playoff teams, also displayed Browning's propensity as a riverboat gambler. The Fighting Scots went for it on fourth down four times, and made it three times.

A year ago the Fighting Scots finished with a 7-4 record while facing one of the most difficult schedules in recent memory. Edinboro faced four nationally-ranked teams, upsetting 25th-ranked Bloomsburg thanks to a memorable comeback, 42-41, while losing to eighth-ranked California(Pa.), 17th-ranked West Chester and 24th-ranked IUP. In fact, Edinboro's four losses came to teams which combined for a 40-9.

The Fighting Scots also continued the strong academic trend, with 15 players earning PSAC Scholar-Athlete honors.

"I am very pleased to announce the promotion of Scott Browning to the position of head football coach at Edinboro University," stated then-President Dr. Frank G. Pogue at the time.

"Scott has been a member of the Edinboro coaching staff for 20 years. He has demonstrated his ability to not only coach athletes on the playing field, but also to lead young men by the example of his character and by his dedication to them as students and as individuals. He will join our other highly successful coaches at Edinboro University."

After serving as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator in Lou Tepper's first season, Browning took over as the offensive coordinator in 2001.

He had previously served as the offensive coordinator for five seasons under Tom Hollman. In all, Browning had served as Edinboro's offensive line coach the previous 12 years.

Browning joined the Edinboro program in 1986 as the running backs coach under Steve Szabo. After two seasons on the offensive side of the ball, the graduate of The Ohio State University moved to the defensive side, serving as the defensive backfield coach under Hollman. In 1994 he moved back to offense as the offensive line coach. He had remained in charge of the linemen since that time, coaching such All-Americans as Jeremy O'Day, Joe Valvoda and Greg Bzorek. The last two years Browning's offensive line led the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference in fewest sacks allowed.

When Tepper came on board in 2000, Browning was appointed the

recruiting coordinator in addition to his duties with the offensive line. A year later he was named the offensive coordinator, and the Fighting Scot offense made great strides over the last five years. Browning emphasized a balanced attack which showcased the combination of a strong ground game and dangerous aerial attack. Over his last three seasons Edinboro averaged 29.9 ppg. in 2003, 33.2 ppg. in '04, and 31.4 ppg. in '05.

All told, Browning has been an assistant coach on all seven of Edinboro's NCAA playoff teams, along with five of the nine PSAC champion squads. He took over a team which has been to the NCAA Division II Playoffs two of the last three years, and during that period has posted a 26-8 record. The 26 wins were the most in a three-year period in Edinboro history.

"It goes without saying that I am extremely excited to have this opportunity," noted an elated Browning. "I was proud to be a part of the teams in the 1990's that ranked among the best in Division II, and over the last few years we have once again elevated the program to one of the best in the country. The University and the community of Edinboro mean a great deal to me. Over the years we have tried to become an integral part of this community. I am thrilled that I can continue that association while taking over a group of players that represent the ideals I believe in.

"I'm sure you will see some changes in the future, but I can tell you this, the ideals remain in place for this program, and always have in the time I've been here. Without question we want to be successful on the field, and that means challenging for the PSAC West title. But we won't compromise integrity. We will continue to bring in young men



Wayne Bradford is in his tenth year as a member of the Edinboro coaching staff. He enters his fourth season as the Fighting Scot defensive coordinator, and had previously held the same title in 1999

under former head coach Tom Hollman. After overseeing the defensive line for seven seasons, Bradford took over as the linbackers coach in 2006.

Bradford orchestrated the top defense in the country three years ago, as Edinboro paced Division II in scoring defense (9.3 ppg.), total defense (211.2 ypg.), and rushing defense (53.7 ypg.). In addition, Edinboro was third in pass efficiency defense and turnover margin. The Fighting Scots recorded three

shutouts, the most since the 1975 team also shut out three opponents. A total of seven opponents were held to seven points or less. He coached four all-conference performers a year ago.

Two years ago his defensive unit recorded two more shutouts while leading the PSAC in rushing defense (70.6 ypg.), good for third in the country.

A year ago Bradford guided a young defense that ended up having five players earn All-PSAC honors.

Under Bradford's tutelage, Edinboro has had thirteen first team All-PSAC West defensive linemen. In fact, he has been responsible for three of the last four PSAC West Defensive Players of the Year, with Ben Stroup earning the honor in 2006, Chris Amico the 2005 recipient, and Seth Fragale the winner in 2004.

Bradford had previously been at Salisbury State since 1990, and was the Sea Gulls' defensive coordinator from 1994-98.

A graduate of Salisbury State, Bradford began his coaching career at his alma mater in 1990, serving as an assistant coach in charge of the linebackers (1990-92) and defensive linemen (1992-94). In 1994, he was promoted to defensive coordinator.

In 1997, Salisbury State ranked 38th in NCAA Division III in total defense, allowing just 268 yards per game. His 1995 defensive unit produced a first team AFCA

Mike Yurcich enters his fourth season as a member of the Edinboro University coaching staff. Yurcich joined the football staff in April 2005 as the guarterbacks coach. He enters his third season as

the offensive coordinator after assuming that role in 2006.

Yurcich has overseen the development of the offense into one of the top units in the country. In particular, the Fighting Scots now rank as one of the top passing teams in Division II. A year ago Edinboro led the PSAC in passing offense (312.8 ypg.), ranked second in total offense (455.7 ypg.), and was fourth in scoring offense at 35.7 ppg., the highest total since 1994 and the fourth-highest in school history. The Fighting Scots ranked eighth in Division II in passing offense, 18th in total offense, and 25th in scoring offense.






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


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Sox Harrison Stadium



Sox Harrison Stadium serves as the home of the Fighting Scots. Dedicated in 1965, the stadium honors the memory of B. Regis "Sox" Harrison, the head football and basketball coach at Edinboro University for 34 years. Sox Harrison was the key figure in the building of Edinboro's athletic program, unselfishly devoting 34 years of service to the University as an athletic director, coach and physical education instructor. Appropriately, he was the first



member inducted into the Edinboro Athletic Hall of Fame in 1982.

Harrison coached the Fighting Scot football team from its inception in 1926 to 1938, the returned to guide the gridders in 1941 and '42. In addition, he coached the men's basketball team for 23 seasons, from 1928-53, winning 175 games.

The stadium received a facelift last summer, giving it a spanking new look. Most noticeable is the installation of an artificial surface, Sportexe, to replace the natural grass. And it is now illuminated, with lights being installed for the first time. Finally, a new scorebaord was installed.

That's the beauty of college football though. Its ability to bring us joy makes living through some of the tough games worth it. But how those tough defeats can stick with you!







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TDI Game Ball Goes To: Penn State University Nittany Lions

Ever heard of kidney cancer?

Many people haven't. But the Penn State University football team and its fans sure have, and they've underscored their awareness about 300,000 times

The Nittany Lions have raised nearly a third of a million dollars over the last six years, all of which has gone to kidney cancer research. And they've done it all through their Lift for Life program.

The program, which is sponsored by Penn State University Uplifting Athletes - a nonprofit organization that works to raise money and awareness for diseases that afflict fewer than 200,000 people each year - invites Nittany Lions football fans to campus to watch the players compete in an 11-station, weight-lifting obstacle course every summer. The players

test their mental and physical strength in events such as the bench press and the fans," Brackett says. the giant tire flip

All fans who attend are urged to donate a suggested minimum dollar amount at the door. Also, in the time leading up to the event, the players use Lions' offense, there's just no stopping 'em.

their Facebook-style home pages on the Uplifting Athletes Web site to reach out to their fans and request donations.

"This is a way to give back to the community," says Brett Brackett, a sophomore wide receiver and president of the organization, who has reached his goal of \$5,000 raised this year. "It's just an opportunity to do something good."

Kidney cancer is diagnosed in approximately 30,000 Americans each year and is therefore relatively rare compared to other forms of the disease - breast cancer affects approximately seven times more people annually.

As a result, "kidney cancer is an underserved disease," Brackett says. But the PSU football team is using Lift for Life to change that.

For former Penn State University wide receiver Scott Shirley, his father's diagnosis of the disease in 2003, coupled with the news that a few of his teammates had family members also struggling with kidney cancer, inspired him to create Lift for Life.

Now the team holds the fundraiser every summer, and it has achieved quite a following.

"At first [Lift for Life] was something I just did because the opportunity was there," says Jordan Norwood, a senior wide receiver. "Personally I didn't know a lot about Lift for Life or kidney cancer in general. But being able to put a face or a name to kidney cancer is what personally makes me continue to do this and write to [the patients] and have a personal relationship with these families."

This year 96 Nittany Lions - the team's greatest participation yet - split into 24 teams of four players each. Beginning at 2 p.m., every 15 minutes a new group started its hour-long lifting challenge. The competition lasted until 7:30 p.m. and was witnessed by a record number of fans.

> "This year was unbelievable," Brackett says. "There were a lot of fans there for a long period of time. People came out to support the team through the cause that we support. I can't put a number on it, but this was our best year."

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

Honored with National Service Award



For the second time in three years, a group of Defiance College (OH) student-athletes has earned a Communitu Service Award from the National Association of Division III Athletic Administrators and Jostens. Eighteen institutions and/or conferences across the country are being recognized for the impressive community service projects performed by their student-athletes during the 2006-07 academic year.

"This was a life-changing event for these young men and Coach Taylor," said Kaiser. "They took it upon themselves to drive 2,400 miles round-trip to try to help out somebody in need. This is the second time in three years that Defiance has been honored by Jostens for an outstanding student-athlete service project.

Craig Rutter, assistant athletic director for student-athlete engagement, noted that the New Orleans project conducted by members of the football team is indicative of the efforts put forth by all of Defiance's student-athletes. "We're changing attitudes, showing people that you can make a difference one person at a time," said Rutter.



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

When University of Chicago running back Jay Berwanger won the first Heisman Trophy in 1935 he started a trend that continues to this day. Out of the 73 college football players who have won the coveted Heisman Trophy, 41 of them have been running backs, by far the most of any position. Of those 41 running backs, three players have been fullbacks, most recently Oklahoma's Steve Owens in 1969. Only one defensive player, Michigan cornerback Charles Woodson in 1997, has won the award. Quarterbacks have the second-most amount of Heisman wins at 27 and last year's winner, Florida's versatile QB Tim Tebow, became the first sophomore ever to win the award. In 1987, Notre Dame's Tim Brown became the first of only two wide receivers to grab the Trophy (Michigan's Desmond Howard in 1991 is the other). Two ends have won the award, the last being Notre Dame's Leon Hart in 1949. A look at the recipients by position...





ra Parseghian was in a full froth. His first team, Notre Dame's 1964 edition, led Southern California at the half, 17-0, but he wanted more. He wanted to close the deal that would bring the Fighting Irish back from nearly a decade of mediocrity. All he needed was another half of great football. Just 30 more minutes.

"Thirty minutes stands between us and the greatest sports comeback in history," he said. "Thirty minutes! You've got to go out there and play this second half, boys — a 60-minute football team."

Suitably inspired, the undefeated, 9-0 and top-ranked Irish, who had outscored opponents to that point by an average of 30-6, went back onto the L.A. Coliseum field and collapsed. USC, which had robbed the Irish of undefeated seasons in 1931 and '38, came to life in the second half, even though the 6-3 Trojans were heavy underdogs. With 1:33 remaining, Craig Fertig hit running back Rod Sherman with a 12-yard pass at the ND three, and Sherman dashed into the end zone to give 'SC a 20-17 triumph and spoil the Irish perfection.


Fortu-four years later, few remember the particulars of the game or how a quartet of second-half penalties played a role in the upset win — at least according to Parseghian. They just know the Trojans won. In 2005, the then-81year old Hall of Fame coach recalled the game vividly and remained outraged at the circumstances he believed decided the contest.

"In that particular game, the national championship was ours to win, but four calls influenced the outcome," he said.


Parseghian's bitter memories are classic reactions from coaches, players and fans who see brilliant regular seasons spoiled by late upsets. College football history is littered with the broken dreams of undefeated teams that couldn't finish the job. Months of perfection are erased in one afternoon, and the echoes of the disappointment can

often be heard decades later. Like Notre Dame, though, the spoiled can also spoil. ND has ruined other programs' magical runs and left opponents with the same desperate memories as Parseghian has from 1964.

And, yes, ND returned the favor to the Trojans. Four years later, undefeated, top-ranked and defending national champion USC hosted the twice-beaten lrish in what was supposed to be a coronation. But the Irish held Heisman Trophy winner 0.J. Simpson to 57 yards rushing and earned a 21-21 tie that knocked the Trojans from the top of the rankings. Twenty years later, in a matchup of the two top-rated teams in the nation, number one Notre Dame completed a perfect regular season with a 27-10 triumph.

The Irish and Trojans have delighted in ruining each other's perfection, but they have made other teams miserable, too. In 1993, undefeated and top-ranked Florida State came to South Bend to face second-rated — and also pristine — ND. The Seminoles, led by eventual Heisman-winning QB Charlie Ward, were expected to roll, but the Irish won a taut, 31-24 victory that wasn't decided until Notre Dame thwarted a late FSU incursion. The excitement of the win was short-lived, however, since seven days later Boston College invaded South Bend and claimed a shocking 41-39 triumph behind swashbuckling quarterback Glenn Foley and the last-second kicking heroics of David Gordon.

A year after dumping 'SC in the 1988 1-vs.-2 battle, Notre Dame suffered

a similar fate — by the same score, no less — against Miami. The top-rated Irish couldn't stop the quicker, seventh-ranked Hurricanes and saw their 11-0 mark spoiled on the Saturday after Thanksgiving.

While USC has a long history of ups and downs with Notre Dame, it is also well-acquainted with triumph and tragedy against cross-town rival UCLA. One of the first such incidents occurred in 1952, when the fourth-ranked, 8-0 Trojans overcame third-ranked and 8-0 UCLA, 14-12. The happiness was fleeting, since ND spoiled the perfect season a week later with a 9-0 triumph.

In 1959, UCLA was a mere 3-3-1 when it met 8-0 USC in the Coliseum, but the underdog Bruins whipped the fourth-ranked Trojans, 10-3. 'SC standout 0.J. Simpson, who would be shackled by Notre Dame in '68, enjoyed plenty of running room in 1967 against the Bruins. In fact, his twisting, winding 64-yard fourth-quarter run was the difference in a 21-20 Trojan win that knocked the top-ranked and undefeated (7-0-1) Bruins from the national title chase. In 1976, USC did it again, beating 9-0-1 UCLA, 24-14, dislodging the Bruins from the second spot in the rankings.

It would be 22 years until UCLA would experience such despair again.

On the 1998 season's last week, in a game rescheduled because of a previous hurricane, the 10-0 and third-rated Bruins had national title hopes dashed by a 7-3 Miami team, 49-45, as Edgerrin James ran for 299 yards and three TDs, the final score coming with 0:50 to play.

The Hurricanes had another chance to ruin team's run at another perfection late in a season in 1991, and it was particularly delicious, because the victim was Florida State, Miami's top rival. The Seminoles were 10-0 and ranked first when they hosted the 8-0 and second-rated 'Canes in mid-November, FSU held a 16-7 lead midway through

the fourth period, but Miami scored 10 unanswered points and then survived a late scare when Gerry Thomas' 34-yard field goal attempt went wide right at the final gun.

Five years later, the Seminoles had the chance to spoil a rival's perfection when FSU met Florida in a battle of the nation's two top-ranked teams. In this one, the secondranked Seminoles earned a 24-21 triumph, knocking the Gators back to fourth in the rankings. In an ironic twist, the teams met again in the Sugar Bowl for the national title, and this time, third-rated Florida dumped number one and undefeated FSU, 52-20.


Those two schools have had a long history of agitating each other, but Nebraska and Oklahoma have been even bigger problems for each other. The teams have ruined each other's perfection late in the regular season seven times since 1964, with Oklahoma dumping the undefeated Cornhuskers on five occasions. Twice ('64 and '66) a three-loss Sooner outfit whipped a 9-0 Nebraska edition. In 1975 and '79, a one-loss Oklahoma squad ruined Cornhusker perfection, preventing a 10-0 NU team from reaching the Orange Bowl and taking a shot at the national title.

Though Nebraska holds the distinction of bumping off an undefeated OU team only twice, it did win the most famous game between the two teams - and one of the most celebrated of all time. That would be the 1971 "Game of the Century" between the number one Cornhuskers and number two Sooners. The 35-31 NU verdict came after a

scintillating afternoon of back-and-forth action that was punctuated by a punt return by Cornhusker wingback Johnny Rodgers, the eventual Heisman winner. Nebraska went on to win the first of two straight national titles.

The teams have delighted in spoiling each other's parties, but both have fallen prey to upset bids by other teams. Three times from 1989-2001 Colorado took out an undefeated Nebraska squad, including a 62-36 triumph in '01 that left the 11-0 Cornhuskers reeling. Oklahoma has been stung by a trio of upstarts, with the most painful a 23-3 defeat at the hands of Kansas in 1975 that snapped a 28-game

winning streak and 37-game unbeaten string. In 2002, a 5-4 Texas A&M squad spanked the 8-0 Sooners, 30-26, and the next year, 12-0 0U was routed, 35-7, by 10-3 Kansas State in the Big 12 title game.

Those losses were crushing, to be sure, but when it comes to the champion of being spoiled, Michigan reigns supreme. Sure, the Wolverines have done their share of messing up others' seasons, most notably four upset wins over Ohio State. But Michigan has had its undefeated hopes dashed on eight occasions, often (five times) by the Buckeyes, but also by Minnesota and Purdue.

The Michigan/OSU rivalry is generally considered college football's finest, and it enjoyed its heyday from 1969-78, when Wolverine boss Bo Schembechler and

Buckeye legend Woody Hayes matched sideline tactics. In '69, a two-loss Michigan team stopped the defending national champs' bid for a repeat with a stunning 24-12 win on the season's last day. But OSU struck back throughout the '70s, spoiling perfect bids by Michigan in 1970 and '72-74. In 2006, undefeated and top-ranked Ohio State overcame perfect, second-rated Michigan, 42-39, just two days after Schembechler died suddenly.



The build-up for that one was enormous, but few expected much on Nov. 6, 1976, when top-ranked and 8-0 Michigan traveled to Ross-Ade Stadium in West Lafayette, IN, to take on a 3-5 Boilermaker squad. Thanks to the hard running of Scott Dierking, Purdue produced a stunning, 16-14 upset that ruined Wolverine perfection. A year later, Minnesota's 16-0 win over topranked Michigan was the sole Wolverine blemish to that point. The Gophers did it again in 1986, dumping second-ranked and 9-0 U-M, ruining Schembechler's bid for his 200th career win.

Not that OSU has been immune to similar problems. In addition to having the Wolverines destroy their undefeated hopes in '69, '93, '95 and '96, the Buckeyes were stunned in 1974 and 1998 by Michigan State, the


second time at home. Last year, Ohio State was 10-0 and looking ahead to its annual season-ender with Michigan when it was upended by Illinois at home, 28-21. The Buckeyes still beat the Wolverines to earn the Big Ten title, but regular season perfection had eluded them.

Not that OSU should have felt too bad. It has had plenty of company over the years.

"He had thrown 10 [scores] and was going to stay in for one more play and deliver the ball to Marcus Grant," Jenkins said. "[Grant] caught the ball with two defenders draped on him, shook them loose and ran it in for the touchdown. It was not intended to be one more strike against those guys. It was just one of those plays that happened."

Most of the touchdowns that day "just happened," in the flow of an offense that averaged a nation's-best 46.5 points per game for the season. Four scores were from at least 29 yards out, and not one of the 11 touchdown drives engineered by the offense took more than 2:38 or required more than seven plays. "It was trained into us that it was our job to score every time we touched the ball," Klingler said, noting Jenkins' unhappiness when the offense didn't run-and-shoot smoothly.

As much as Klingler and the offense get the ink for the team's highest-scoring outburst of the season, the defense did force four interceptions and recovered a fumble allowing for a few short drives down field.

What may come as a shock is Jenkins displeasure with the unit after the 42-point showing before intermission. Perfection doesn't come easy, and Klingler readily admits there were times when even a significant offensive output wasn't met with smiles and high-fives. "At halftime [against Eastern Washington] we got one of those chewings," Klingler said.

Along with the 11 scores, Houston's stickyfingered pass-catchers also helped Klingler establish an NCAA benchmark for the number of receivers with a touchdown in one game. Nine different players found the end zone with seniors Emmanuel Hazard and Chuck Weatherspoon the only receivers to grab more than one. "That was second-teamers and thirdteamers getting in the game and relieving," Jenkins said.

One question lingers from the performance against Eastern Washington—Can the single-game record be broken? According to Klingler it can, and the way he explains it, the reasoning doesn't defy logic. "Back then we didn't have overtime," Klingler said. "In


Trying to choose one game, or moment, from among the lifetime of memories Klingler created in just a few years with the Cougars, it's apparent his effort against the Eagles was merely a tuneup for a bigger test that awaited. Klingler quickly points to a 62-45 victory over Arizona State on Dec. 2, 1990, barely two weeks later, when he threw for an NCAA-record 716 yards and seven touchdowns, torching a defensive backfield boasting four future NFL draft picks.


Jenkins suggests a 73-3 victory over Louisiana Tech on Aug. 31, 1991, as one of Klingler's more impressive performances. He set an NCAA record with six touchdown passes in the second quarter. "Most teams don't get but two or three possessions in a quarter," Jenkins said of the mark that had been previously set by Klingler's former teammate, Andre Ware, in 1989. "It was unbelieveable to see that happen in one quarter."


Klingler was kept out of the end zone to open the game but exploded for the half-dozen scores spread out among four different receivers, and only one came from outside of 16 yards,

moved the ball downfield. "That was just part of [our] game," Jenkins said. "We were a machine that was on a roll and couldn't be stopped. We rolled up 60 points on Texas three years in a row. It didn't matter who the opponent was, we treated them the same way."

NO TASK WAS TOO DAUNTING FOR HOLY CROSS LEGEND GORDIE LOCKBAUM

nder the most normal circumstances, the loss of a starting running back would be a problem, but Gordie Lockbaum showed that some problems can create tremendous opportunities.

Lockbaum was what scouts would call a "tweener," a player who isn't an ideal fit for a particular position. At first glance, that might not seem like a good situation, but Lockbaum made it a strength that catapulted Holy Cross football into the national spotlight in the mid-1980s - largely by playing on offense, defense, and even some special teams, in a style that was reminiscent of the 1940s.

Lockbaum became the first player of note in several decades to start on both offense and defense, playing running back on offense and cornerback on defense. His play set the stage for what Charles Woodson would do in the 1990s.

"I was recruited as an athlete, meaning that there was a chance I could wind up on the offensive side or on the defensive side of the ball depending upon the need and how I adapted to moving up from high school football to the college level,"

Lockbaum said. "At Holy Cross. I settled into a defensive back position. I was a cornerback as a freshman. I played some special teams. As a sophomore, I took the starting position at strong safety and played as a sophomore."

Following a coaching change in the spring of 1986, new coach Mark Duffner brought in Tom Rossley to coach the offense, and Rossley promptly installed the run and shoot offense. Then, an injury provided the opportunity for Lockbaum to step in.

"Somebody was hurt, and we didn't have enough running backs," Lockbaum said. "I ran some routes. I caught some balls and ripped off a couple of decent runs. The coaches were kind of thinking, 'Hmm, he can probably help us on the offensive side.' The problem was that our defensive backfield wasn't the strongest position, either. We were coming off a poor season and we hadn't really played very well. We were a young group, mostly sophomores, and we had taken our lumps that uear, so it wasn't like we had an abundance of personnel in the defensive backfield. We finished the spring with me kind of bopping back and forth and the





Holy Cross went 21-1 and won back-toback Patriot League championships during Lockbaum's last two seasons, but Lockbaum's favorite memory isn't the championships or the accolades, it's the experience.

"Most often, as athletes we come to remember game stuff, but a lot of times, for me, it comes to camps, practices, meetings, just the general day-to-day of being on a team and being closely knit with a large group of guys," Lockbaum said. "I think it was just a great life experience."


After being drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers, Lockbaum played in preseason games over two seasons with the Steelers and the Buffalo Bills in the hope of developing an NFL career. The level of competition in the NFL prevented Lockbaum from making as big an impact on the professional game as he did in the college game, and he moved on to an insurance brokerage firm in Worcester, Mass. with no regrets. Still, Lockbaum brought an excitement to college football that was undeniable. For a few seasons, Lockbaum took the college game back to the era of leather helmets with no facemasks.

"Most of us have a nostalgic bone or two in our body and that's why we like looking at old buildings, old cars, talking about the old baseball players and football players, just looking back in time and reminiscing," Lockbaum said. "It was kind of nice to have a modern day guy take everybody back to an older generation. The old guys used to love coming up to me and telling me how they played every snap and you couldn't substitute and the limited substitution rule and everything else and that's the way it should be played, and that's not always

the case. The old way isn't always the best way, but it's fun when it's reexplored occasionally. I think that was the fun. It was taking a step back in time. Holy Cross has a great athletic and football tradition. We've had some great teams and players come through here, and to be thrown back into that long-gone era was a fun thing to go through."

The Panthers have the win. Now, they need more. And the team looks capable of providing it. The talk, naturally, is about McKillop and McCoy, who set a Big East freshman rushing record with 1,328 yards last year and established new freshman marks at Pitt in rushing TDs [14] and points (90), zipping past Panther legend Tony Dorsett in the process. What makes his performance most impressive was that opponents knew he was the focal point of the Panther offense last year. Once Stull went down with a thumb injury, the Pitt passing attack suffered. Wannstedt, who is nothing if not pragmatic, understands the need for more playmakers on the offensive side of the ball. Stull's expected full-strength return should help, as should the comeback of wideout Derek Kinder, who missed last year with a knee injury after catching 57 passes in '06. That still might not be sufficient to make the Panthers explosive enough to be a part of the Big East race.

They have what's needed defensively. The Panthers allowed a mere





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
297.7 yards per game last year, fifth-best in the country, and welcome back seven starters. One of Wannstedt's priorities since taking over has been the reinforcement of the defensive line. As an old defensive coordinator, he understands the value of that up-front push. "We have given 16 scholarships

in three years to defensive linemen," he says. "We're starting to see the benefit." So is McKillop. With the interior of the front four returning in tact, the senior linebacker won't have to worry so much about enemy blockers, something that should keep that tackle total sky-high.

Predictably, the modest senior doesn't look to his statistics to measure success. He's extremely self-critical - "I'm never happy with my play," he says - yet aware of his role on the team. Not even the best clubs have 22 standouts in the starting lineup. There are big producers, and there are role players. "We know what each person is capable of," he says. McKillop also understands the need for the team to look past the positive publicity, the rosy forecasts and the afterglow of the WVU win and play winning football from the first game on.

"Sometimes, people might get cocky with all of this," he says. "We've got to say to ourselves, 'We were 5-7 last year, and we haven't made it to a bowl game in three years.' We're a good football team, but we want to be a great football team. Just because we beat West Virginia doesn't mean we're there."

True, but the bandwagon is heading in the right directions, and suddenly, McKillop and his Panther teammates have plenty of company. Whether they want it or not.







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

THE LATE BILL FLEMMING REMAINS ONE OF COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S GREATEST BROADCASTERS

he 1973 game between Michigan and Ohio State featured a bitter showdown of undefeated arch-rivals. The game already possessed an air that was almost larger than life, so announcer Bill Flemming simply announced the names of the starting players to the national television audience. Nothing more was necessary.

For several decades, Flemming was one of the voices and faces of college football on television. He possessed a voice as clear as a perfect Saturday afternoon in the fall, and he never tried to overshadow the game, or hype it too much.

Flemming was also one of the original personalities on "Wide World of Sports," and he also covered events like track and field, auto racing and 11 Olympics. Yet, there was something about Flemming that just seemed to mesh perfectly with college football.

Flemming flowed with the sport. He described the action, but he left the excitement to the players and the people involved in the game. He never became too animated, choosing to leave the spotlight to the game itself.

College football was always one of Flemming's preferred assignments, particularly the classic rivalry between Michigan and Ohio State. Nonetheless, Flemming showed his versatility by introducing a generation to sports like cliff diving and hurling on "Wide World of Sports." He also got an exclusive interview with chess legend Bobby Fischer, a reclusive man who seldom

granted interviews.

"I think first of all Bill was one of the most thoroughly prepared broadcasters I ever worked with," said Dave Diles, a former television colleague. "He was versatile. He could do anything from stock car racing to track and field to football or anything. He had a good studio presence. He was just a versatile guy who you could put on any assignment anywhere, and he would do a good job for you."

One of the major differences with Flemming was that he came from radio, and viewed himself as a journalist, not an entertainer. That philosophy enabled him to streamline his presentation, which made following the game easier for viewers

Flemming was of that journalistic ilk," said Bruce Madej, associate athletic director at the University of Michigan. "He was the type of individual who felt the game was more important than anything else. In a lot of ways, he wanted to promote the game because you have to realize that when he started coming up television really did not do much for sports back then. He would do the Big Ten Football Preview Show. He would do cliff diving from Acapulco. He used to do unlimited hydroplane racing. When you take a look at what Bill Flemming did, he was of another era, an era that I think valued sports more than it valued marketing. He let the game tell the story; he just helped explain it. He wasn't a screamer. He made it easy for people to follow the game. He was literally brought up in the days of radio, so he didn't feel like he had to stay on top of the game all the time. He did what I think good playby-play announcers do; stay a little bit behind the game so that they make sure they know what they're calling."



Not only was Flemming's approach different, so was his delivery. His voice was crystal-clear, and he could explain any sporting situation in a way that all viewers could understand what was happening, not just the hard-core sports fans.

Flemming was not the least bit flamboyant, either. He was well-informed, and he passed along the vital information to the viewers. His focus was substance, not flash.

"He made it easy," Madej said. "What was fun was that you had to watch the games back then, so it was more important to have somebody tell you what was going on because you might not have seen it. He was your replay, too. They didn't have replays necessarily, or that many replays back then. In my mind, I wish we could go back to those type of days. Bill was not a yeller. He didn't scream. He just told you what was going on, and if the game was good,

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


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Flemming's straight-ahead style and fact-filled broadcasts endeared him to college football fans across the nation, but moreso to fans of the University of Michigan, his alma mater.

the game was good. If the game wasn't good, the game wasn't good. He still made it entertaining, but he told you what was going on. He was truly a broadcaster who was a journalist, not a pretty face."

"He wasn't colorful," Diles said. "There was nothing distinguishing about him like Keith Jackson or Al Michaels. Bill wasn't the best at anything, but he was very good at everything. He enjoyed his work, that's for sure. He flew himself to most of his assignments in his private plane."

Despite Flemming's versatility, there was no hiding his love for college football and the Big Ten in particular. The game always seemed to bring out the best in Flemming

"His affinity for the University of Michigan and the Big Ten was primary in his professional sports upbringing," Madej said. "I just think that Bill loved sports. He loved it for what it was, from doing the Indianapolis 500 and from doing Michigan football; he knew what he was talking about."

Ultimately, Flemming was synonymous with football in the Big Ten, and football in the heartland. When the weather turned colder, and the games became more important, thoughts automatically turned to chilly games in the Midwest, with Flemming on the sideline or in the booth.

"I think what Bill did was, he was in an era where he helped ABC grow into becoming a predominant sports network," Madej said. "That's what I think his legacy is for television. His legacy also is that supporter of Big Ten sports and Michigan. He truly was a journalist first. He really pushed the entire Big Ten."

Flemming passed away in July of 2007, long after his career ended. With the proliferation of old film clips and games shown on various networks, Flemming's voice and image is still present. Maybe just as important, the memory of his work with college football in the game's first few decades of prominence on national television lives on in the hearts and minds of many college football fans throughout the nation.

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
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
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Spirit of the Scots Marching Band

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



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
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Harlan Hill Trophy



Two Edinboro football players have been finalists for the Harlon Hill Trophy, presented annually to the top player in NCAA Division II football. Running back Elbert Cole was

one of three finalists in 1989. while wide receiver Ernest Priester was a finalist a year later. Cole placed third in the '89 balloting. He earned All-American honors in 1989, receiving first team accolades from Kodak/American Football Coaches Association, second team recognition from Football Gazette, and third team status from Associated Press.

Cole rushed for 1,507 yards and set Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference records for touchdowns (24) and points (148). He led the Fighting Scots to the PSAC West title, a 8-3 record and a number seven ranking in the final Division II poll.

Priester was runnerup to North Dakota State quarterback Chris Simdorn in 1990 when the Bison claimed the Division II national title. Priester was the PSAC Western Division Co-Player of the Year in 1990. He was also recognized by Kodak/American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press and the Football Gazette as a first team All-American.

The wide receiver hauled in 47 passes for 1.102 yards and 15 TDs. Edinboro finished 9-3, reaching the Division II quarterfinals.

Last year sophomore quarterback Trevor Hrris was a Northeast Region semifinalist.

Four years ago Andre Burke (below) made a run at the Harlon Hill Trophy, as the tailback was a Northeast Region semifinalist. Burke ended up with a school-record 1,713 yards and 19 TDs.

Cummings and Hansen Named Pete Nevins Scholar-Athletes of the Year





Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Commissioner Steve Murray is proud to recognize 1,488 student-athletes from the league who will be known as "Scholar-Athletes" for the 2007-08 academic year. The total eclipses last year's figure of 1,420.

Atop the list are the 2007-08 PSAC Pete Nevins Scholar-Athletes of the Year: Mansfield's Chris Cummings and Slipperv Rock's Jennifer Hansen.

The PSAC Pete Nevins Scholar-Athlete of the Year Awards are presented to the top student-athletes who have achieved at least a 3.25 cumulative grade point average while competing at an outstanding athletic level. Student-athletes must have been recognized as a Fall, Winter or Spring Top Ten Award winner to be eligible.

In its 18th year of existence, the awards were renamed in 2007 to honor East Stroudsburg's long-time sports information director Pete Nevins, who passed away earlier that year after a short battle with cancer. Nevins held his position at ESU for 33 years, and it is estimated that he wrote articles on more than 12,000 ESU events that covered more than 5,000 student-athletes.

Cummings, a graduate student at Mansfield, excelled in his final season of eligibility. He was the only PSAC male to garner All-America honors in cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field. His highest national showing came with a secondplace finish in the mile during the indoor championships. At other NCAA Championships, he placed sixth in the 1,500m during the outdoor season, and was 26th at the cross country nationals. During the indoor season, Cummings won the mile and ran a leg of the winning distance medley relay at the PSAC Championships. He was crowned co-MVP of the meet and was later recognized as the 2008 PSAC Indoor Track Athlete of the Year.

Recently named an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipient, Cummings maintained a 4.0 GPA while pursuing his master's degree in education. As an undergraduate, Cummings carried a 3.86 GPA as a physics major. He finishes his storied career at Mansfield as a five-time All-American - twice each in indoor and outdoor track and field, and once in cross country. Between the two track seasons, the Mansfield native owns school records in nine individual and four relay events.

Hansen, a junior elementary education major, has established a 4.0 GPA. The Charleston, W. Va. product continues to set new standards in the pole vault, which includes All-America citations during this year's indoor and outdoor seasons, finishing third at both national events.

Her outdoor season included a vault of 13-3.75 at the league championships. establishing a new meet record. Coupled with her third-place effort in the long jump, Hansen was named the Most Valuable Field Athlete for the meet. Just a few weeks earlier Hansen established a new PSAC overall record in the pole vault, clearing 13-5.25 at Allegheny's Gator Invitational. It marked the fourth time in two weeks that she had broken the conference record. During the indoor season, Hansen registered a meet and overall record by vaulting 13-1.25 at the conference championship and was later honored as the PSAC Field Athlete of the Year.

Hansen was one of only three PSAC student-athlete to earn first-team Academic All-America status from ESPN The Magazine, and the only one to do so in the cross country/track and field category. She is a five-time PSAC Champion and four-time All-American

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


