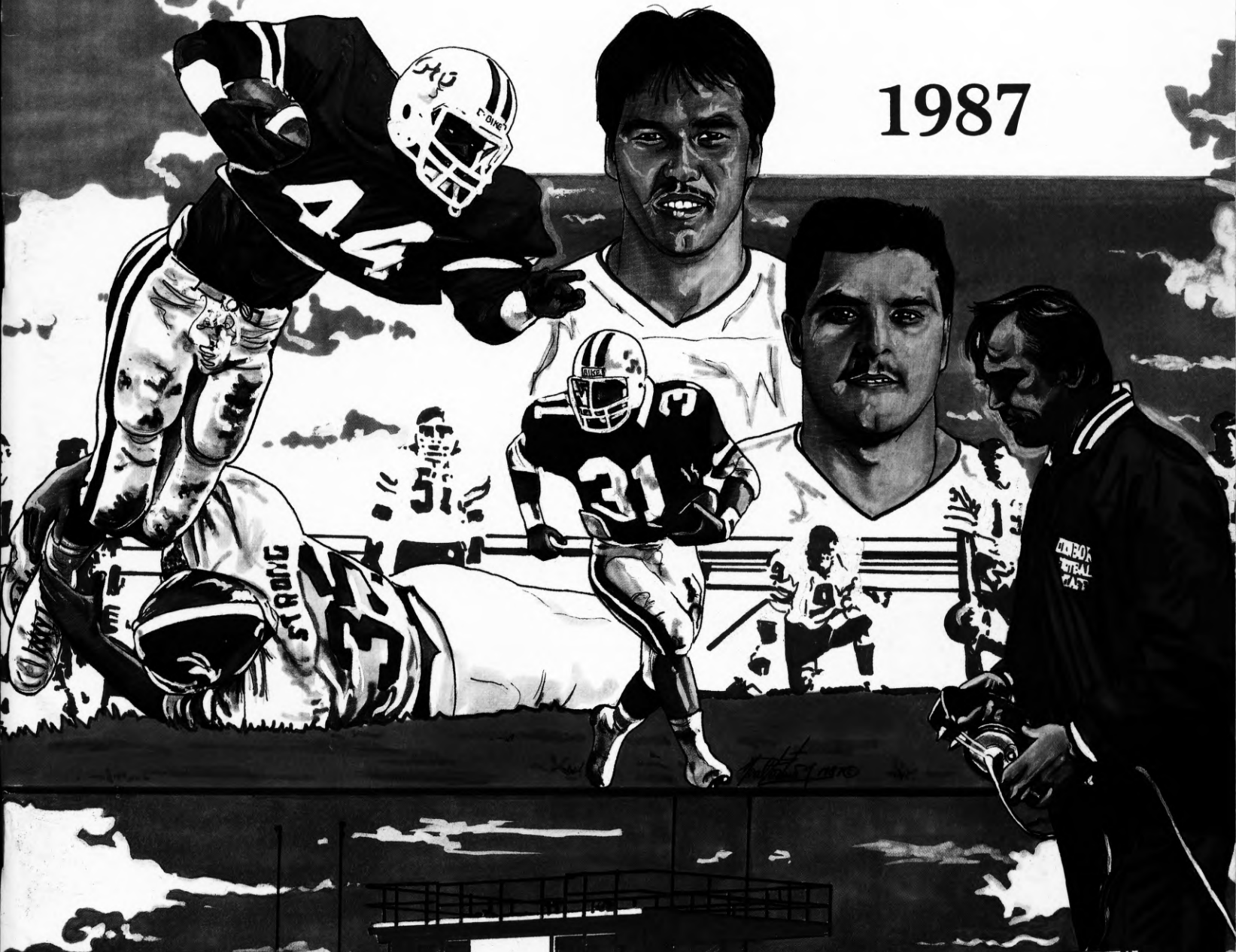

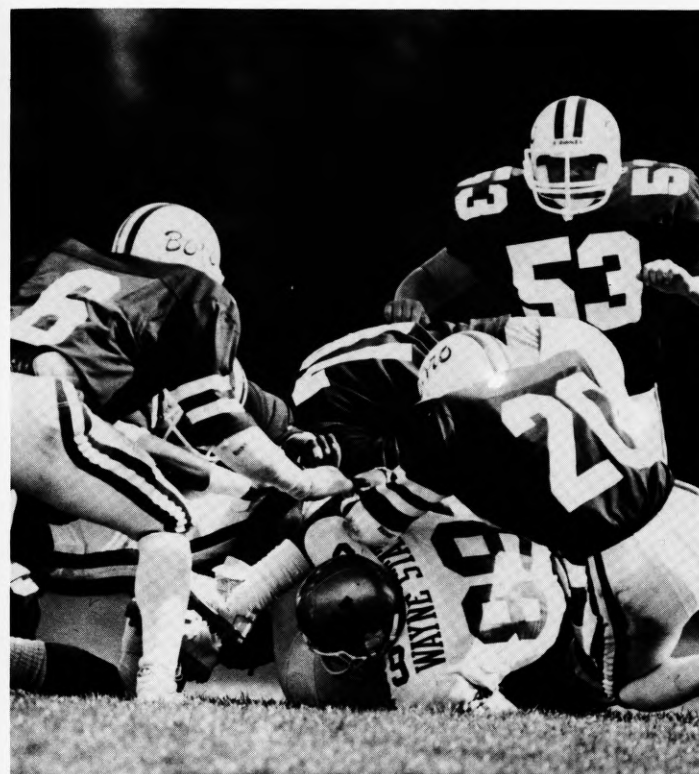

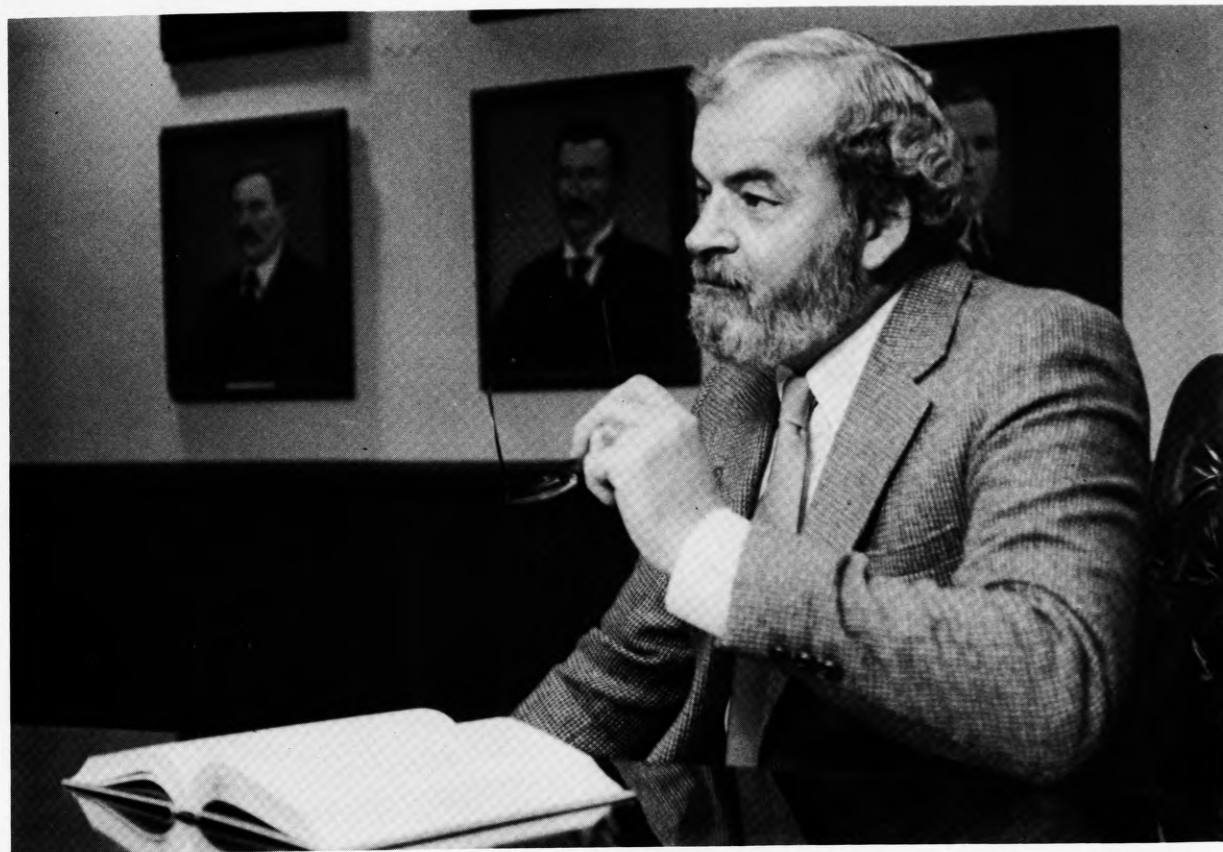

PRESIDENT — FOSTER F. DIEBOLD



President Foster F. Diebold is a recognized leader in higher education. Prior to assuming the presidency at Edinboro University in 1979, he was president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. These leadership positions involved successfully overcoming a variety of serious problems which faced both the University of Alaska Statewide System and Edinboro University.

President Diebold played an active role in the development of the State System of Higher Education in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by supporting the legislation which created it and serving on the transition team. In addition, he served on search committees for the Chancellor's senior staff.

President Diebold also chaired the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference from 1983 to 1985. He now serves on the Capital Facilities and Appropriations Sub-Committee of the Chancellor's Executive Council and on the Commission of the Universities Ad Hoc Committee on Public Higher Education in Pennsylvania. President Diebold also serves on the Committee on Governance of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU).

At Edinboro University, the president has undertaken new initiatives to promote excellence in education. During his presidency, the Honors Program has expanded both in course offerings and in scholarships made available to high achieving students. In 1985, Edinboro University received a grant from the Exxon Education Foundation to sponsor a special Summer Honors Program for students and faculty drawn from the

fourteen universities of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. President Diebold has initiated and encouraged the expansion of the program which serves disabled students, and, under his leadership, the University is now 99% wheelchair accessible. The President's commitment to disabled students led the University to host the 29th Annual National Wheelchair Games in the summer of 1985. Also, he initiated an athletic study table designed to help improve the academic progress of student athletes.

President Diebold is committed to strengthening current academic programs at Edinboro, and to developing new academic programs which respond to student needs. As a charter member of the World Future Society, he believes that the study of the future should be an important element in the undergraduate curriculum. In various ways, President Diebold has encouraged open dialogue and collegiality within the University community through various groups, such as the University Senate, the Faculty Advisory Group, and the Department Chairpersons Group.

President Diebold supports and encourages international education programming. Greater diversity in the representation of students from other nations has been achieved, and, currently, there are nearly 100 international students representing over 25 countries. Also included in the University community are visiting scholars from abroad.

President Diebold resides in Edinboro with his wife, Patricia, daughters, Jessica and Stacey, and son, Wesley.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR — JIM McDONALD

Edinboro University's athletic program was placed under the talented and aggressive leadership of Jim McDonald in July of 1981. Increased emphasis on fund raising to provide a sound scholarship foundation has become his top priority while numerous changes and innovations have also keyed the Scots' athletic program under his direction.

Through his efforts more than 2.1 million dollars has been raised during the past five years. The funds generated by the energetic athletic director's efforts will be used to assist Edinboro's men and women athletes who compete in the Scots sixteen intercollegiate sports.

In addition to maintaining Edinboro's respected winning tradition in intercollegiate athletics, the former health and physical education professor has vastly expanded the University's summer activities.

Forty-four camps were sponsored by the Fighting Scots Booster Club this past summer on the University's campus

which also was the sight once again of pre-season drills for the Pitt Panthers football team. Sox Harrison Stadium is the site of the Cleveland Browns vs. the Buffalo Bills annual rookie scrimmage, which has been a yearly mid-summer highlight.

The personable athletic director also introduced Edinboro's Hall of Fame program which has evolved into an annual year-ending event to honor present and past athletes.

McDonald has been at Edinboro since 1962 and for 12 years served as the Fighting Scot basketball coach (1962-1975) and never experienced a losing season while his teams compiled an impressive 181 wins against only 89 losses. During that span, his cagers won four Western Division Pennsylvania Conference crowns, the PC state championship and two District 18 titles that netted trips to the NAIA National Tournament. His teams set 27 University records and made 19 post-season appearances while four of his players were named All-Americans.

Prior to accepting his position at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant basketball coach in Erie, Pa. He is a 1956 graduate of Bridgeport High School in his home town of Bridgeport, West Virginia.

In 1960 he received a degree in chemistry and physical education from West Virginia Wesleyan College and he also holds a master's degree in health from the University of Buffalo.

As an undergraduate, he set nine school records at Wesleyan and was twice voted both AP and UPI basketball All-American. In 1960, he was the second leading scorer in the United States, averaging slightly over 33 points a game, and led his team to the national basketball tournament in Kansas City, Missouri. He was named to the NAIA's All-Tournament Team in 1959 and 1960.

In 1966, McDonald was selected Area Eight Coach of the Year by the eastern seaboard coaches and that same year was honored as one of the top ten finalists in the Coach of the Year national poll. McDonald's honors also include selection to the West Virginia All-Time College Basketball Team and membership in the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame. He served four years on the NAIA's All-American selection committee and was chosen by the NAIA to coach an All-American team of NBA-bound cagers who won the Gold Medal in Israel's Hapoel Games.

In addition to his classroom and basketball coaching duties, McDonald was Edinboro's golf coach for 17 years during which his teams won over 40 tournaments and finished as high as 3rd place at the NCAA Division II National Tournament.

As a resident of Edinboro, McDonald has a record of extensive community involvement. He was Little League Baseball Director for four years and also held a four-year post as a member of the General McLane School Board. He and his wife, Mary Lou, have three sons - Mark, Mike, and Matthew.

STEVE SZABO — DIRECTION FOR THE FUTURE

In 1985, Steve Szabo became the tenth head football coach in Edinboro University's 55-year gridiron history, and has led the Fighting Scots to a 12-7-1 mark his first two years. Last season, Szabo was tabbed small college "Coach of the Year" by the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette for leading the Scots to a 7-3 mark and a second place finish in the Pennsylvania Conference.

A native of Chicago, Illinois, Szabo graduated with honors from the United States Naval Academy in 1965 with a B.S. degree in physics and a minor in mathematics and electrical engineering. In addition, Szabo completed graduate work in aerospace engineering and pursued doctoral work on a fellowship at John Hopkins University.

From 1979 to 1981, the Fighting Scot head coach served as a defensive line coach at Ohio State under Earl Bruce, during which time the Buckeyes ranked in the top 20 and played in bowl games all three years. In 1979, he directed a standout defensive unit that ranked third in the nation in total defense.

"Steve is very disciplined, hard working and responsible," offered Buckeye coach Earl Bruce. "I wouldn't hesitate to rehire him on my staff," added the Ohio State mentor.

In addition to his three years at Ohio State, Szabo spent 1977 and 1978 as a defensive line coach at Iowa State. From 1974 through 1976 he was a defensive line coach at Syracuse

University, and the three previous seasons he coached the offensive line, defensive line and linebackers respectively at the University of Iowa. He was also an assistant at the University of Toledo and John Hopkins University. Before joining the Edinboro staff, Szabo was offensive coordinator and quarterback/wide receiver coach at Western Michigan University.

As a player Szabo was an offensive and defensive halfback at the Naval Academy. He also earned All-America honors in lacrosse and was named to the All-Time Middle team. Following graduation from the Academy, Szabo served a 13-month tour of duty in Vietnam and was named to the All-Service football team with the Quantico Marines.

Szabo, who describes himself as a "very goal-oriented person," has set some goals for the future of Edinboro football. First, he said he wants to produce a winning team starting with the PSAC title, with long range hopes of a national championship at the Division II level. Second, Szabo hopes to establish a program which is meaningful to his players, and ensure that above all they get an education. Third, Szabo hopes to create a positive football atmosphere at Edinboro which will involve the faculty, student body and the community. Finally, Szabo said he would like to instill an attitude of pride and togetherness within the team unit stressing, "a team program will transcend any individual greatness."

The Scot coach has two children, Christine and Michael. Szabo resides in Edinboro with his wife, Patti.

RICK BROWNING - Defensive Linemen

Tutoring the defensive linemen this fall will be Loudonville, Ohio, native Rick Browning. Joining his brother Scott on the Boro staff, Rick is known as a great communicator with players. Before coming to Edinboro in 1986, Browning served as a graduate assistant defensive line coach at three Division I schools including Michigan State University, Oregon State University and New Mexico State University. Browning began his coaching career at Worthington (OH) High School where he handled the offensive and defensive line from 1980-83. Browning is a 1973 graduate of Loudonville High School where he lettered in both football and track for four years. He was enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1976-80, then enrolled at Ohio State University where he received his B.S. in physical education in 1983. Browning plans to complete his masters work in athletic administration, and is also planning to continue his studies towards a B.S. degree in computer science. He is single and resides in Edinboro.

SCOTT BROWNING - Running Game

Taking over the responsibility for the Scots running game last season was Loudonville, Ohio, native Scott Browning. Browning brings a host of experience to the Boro, coaching last at Ohio State University, where he tutored receivers and running backs, including Keith Byars. Prior to his stint at O.S.U., Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview High Schools in Ohio from 1979-81, then was a graduate assistant coach of the defensive secondary at New Mexico State in 1982. In 1983, he coached the receivers on the Idaho State University team that advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs. Browning earned a masters in education administration from New Mexico State University in 1983 and a B.S. in education from Ohio State in 1981. Browning attended Capital University for

one year and played football for one year before transferring to Ohio State. Browning lettered in four sports at Loudonville Ohio High School before beginning his collegiate career. He is single and resides in Edinboro.

PAUL DUNN - Offensive Line

Named new offensive line coach at EUP in 1986 was Paul Dunn, an assistant at both Pitt and Penn State the past three years. Dunn brings a great knowledge of how the game is played in the interior, having been a three-year starter at Pitt for offensive line coach Joe Moore, considered one of the best in his trade. After graduating from Pitt in 1983 with a B.S. in administration of justice, Dunn served as a graduate assistant line coach at Pitt (1983-84) and Penn State (1984-86). Dunn's experience with the linemen should help the Scots build a steady offensive line this year. The Prospect, Pennsylvania, native is married to the former Melody Eckels. They reside in Edinboro with their one-year-old daughter, Katie.

DAN GIERLAK - Linebackers

Dan joins the Fighting Scot coaching staff on a full-time basis in 1987, with his main responsibilities geared to the linebackers. He served on the Scot staff last season on a part-time basis. Coming back to his alma mater from Thiel College two years ago, Dan has established his defensive reputation with the players. Gierlak's knowledge of the game and athletic background solidified his coaching spot with the Plaid. He is coming off an outstanding career on the gridiron which began in Edinboro in 1979. A starter and three-year letterwinner during his collegiate days, Dan moved on to the Chicago Cowboys, a semi-pro team in the Midwest where he was a very successful defensive back and linebacker. During his stay with the

semi-pro club, the Cowboys were tabbed national champions in 1984 and national runners-up the following season. Dan recently completed his bachelors degree in education. He is single and resides in Edinboro.

GREG QUICK - Defensive Coordinator

Greg Quick begins his coaching career at EUP this year taking over the defensive coordinator spot after the departure of Tom Herman to New Hampshire. Quick comes to the Boro from New Mexico State University where he coached linebackers during the 1985 season. A rundown of Quick's coaching career started at Emporia State University, where from 1979-83, Greg coached the offensive line, defensive secondary, and was tabbed as defensive coordinator for his final two seasons. Quick returned to the high school ranks for the 1983-84 season, coaching football, basketball and track at St. Edwards High School in Cleveland. Following his season in the scholastic ranks, Quick moved on to Heidelberg College for the 1984 campaign where he was offensive line coach, as well as offensive coordinator. Quick also brings to the Boro some impressive playing credentials, as he was the starting center on a national championship club at Baldwin-Wallace in 1978. A brief look at Quick's educational and personal background is as follows: 1979-B.A. degree in health and physical education from Baldwin Wallace, and a master's of science degree from Emporia State University in 1980, majoring in athletic administration. Greg comes to Edinboro with his wife Jeannie and four children, Phillip (7), Nathan (4), Bonnie (3), and 18-month old Benjamin.

MARK MERRITT

After serving as a student assistant coach last season, Mark was recently hired to coach the tight ends and assist with the offensive line on a full-time basis. His contributions to the squad last year, earned the spot on the coaching staff according to coach Szabo. Merritt, a four-year letterman at the Boro, was a mainstay on the offensive line

during his career and gained second-team all Pennsylvania Conference all-star honors his senior year. A product of Western Beaver High School in Pennsylvania, "Bear" recently completed his requirements for his health and physical education degree here at Edinboro. Mark is single and resides in Edinboro.

JOE MANCUSO, ROSS RANKIN AND MARTELLE BETTERS Student Coaches

Joe Mancuso will begin his second year as a student assistant coach for the Fighting Scots in '87 with extended responsibilities directed to the wide receivers and the special teams. Joe was a solid performer for the Plaid two years ago at the fullback and special teams positions, but a severe shoulder injury has forced him to the coaching ranks. A two-year letterman on the EUP squad, Mancuso came to the Boro from Connellsville High School where he lettered in two sports. He is working toward his degree in speech communications.

Ross Rankin and Martelle Betters, two standout performers for the Scots last season, join the coaching staff as student assistants this fall. Rankin, from McKinley High School in Canton, Ohio, will help with the offensive backs and be in charge of scouting for the Plaid this season. Rankin, a second team pick in the western division of the conference last season, rushed for 681 yards on just 125 carries during his Boro career. He also caught 26 passes for 287 more and 1 touchdown out of the backfield.

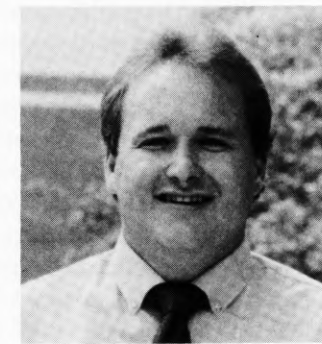
Bettters, a starter for the Fighting Scots for three years in the defensive secondary, comes to the Boro as a student assistant in his initial year out of school. A strong, hard hitter from his safety position during his career, Bettters will give guidance to a young Scot defensive secondary. Bettters will also aid Rankin in the scouting department. An all-conference player for the Scots, he finished his career with 118 tackles and collected 7 interceptions. Bettters also was a steady force on the special teams and blocked numerous kicks throughout his playing days. Coach Szabo feels that his two student assistants bring extensive knowledge to the staff and will be great additions.

ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR DR. KATHLEEN LIPKOVICH

Dr. Kathleen Lipkovich was named Edinboro's first associate athletic director at the outset of the 1981 school year to help administer both the men's and women's athletic program.

Originally from Youngstown, Ohio, Dr. Lipkovich has had teaching and coaching experience at West Virginia University, Central Connecticut State College, and Trinity College. The Ohio native, who graduated from Chaney High School, began her teaching and coaching career in 1972 with the Howland Local School District in Howland, Ohio, and then held a similar position from 1972 through 1975 at McDonald High School in McDonald, Ohio.

The 1972 Youngstown State graduate received her M.S. degree in 1975 from West Virginia University and was awarded a doctorate from that same institution in 1977 after majoring in educational administration and physical education. She completed a post-doctoral fellowship at Harvard in educational administration prior to her arrival at Edinboro.

SPORTS INFORMATION AND PROMOTIONS DIRECTOR TODD V. JAY

Todd Jay begins his third year of publicizing Edinboro University's athletic program and assisting in sports promotion for the Fighting Scots. A graduate of Clarion University of Pennsylvania, Todd received a bachelor of science in education in 1982 and a master of science in communications in May of 1985. The New Castle native served as assistant to the sports information director at Clarion.

During the past two years, Jay has written releases for 15 inter-collegiate sports, edited and produced athletic programs and brochures, and compiled statistics at all events. In addition, Todd hosted a weekly television show on local cable, featuring Fighting Scot football and basketball. He also did the promotion for numerous EUP all americans and received an award from the Amateur Wrestling News for his publication on the USA-Cuban meet held last March.

A three-year letterwinner in baseball at Clarion, Jay served as news-sports correspondent for the New Castle News, while also serving as assistant basketball coach for Neshannock High School during his teaching stay in New Castle.

On radio, Jay has hosted weekly shows in Clarion and Edinboro featuring intercollegiate athletics and assisting in overall sports promotion. The voice of the Fighting Scots for home football games, Todd is single and resides in Edinboro.

ASSISTANT TO THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR HAROLD "HAL" UMBARGER

Harold "Hal" Umbarger joined Edinboro University's athletic staff four years ago as assistant to the athletic director. He brings a wealth of talent and experience to the administrative level of the athletic program and plays a vital role in overseeing the academic progress of student athletes as well as coordinating the on-going functions of the athletic director's office and the summer programs which involve the department. The West Newton, Pa., native is a 1954 Slippery Rock University graduate and also owns his masters degree from Penn State. After a three-year stint with the U.S. Army Security Agency in Europe, he coached basketball and baseball at Moshannon Valley (Pa.) High School before accepting a guidance position in the West York Area School District in 1961. He became a member of Edinboro's admissions office a year later and in 1967 was named director of admissions. During his tenure more than 40,000 students were admitted to Edinboro University.

TEAM TRAINER - GEORGE ROBERTS

George M. Roberts of Titusville, Pa., is beginning his third year as athletic trainer at Edinboro University.

A 1972 graduate of Titusville High School, Roberts received a bachelor of science from Edinboro in 1976. He completed the NATA (National Athletic Trainers Association) curriculum at West Chester University and earned a master of education degree from Slippery Rock University.

In his most recent position, the newest addition to the Fighting Scot athletic staff was employed as athletic trainer at Hamot Medical Center in Erie, Pa. He served as student trainer during his college career and from 1976 to 1984, Roberts was a teacher, trainer, and assistant football coach at Titusville High School.

Since 1980, Roberts has spent much of his time as a trainer for the National Sports Festivals (III, IV, and V), for the World University Games in Edmonton, Alberta, and for the United States Olympic Team during the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles.

Roberts is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, the Eastern Athletic Trainers Association, the Pennsylvania Athletic Trainers Society, the National Education Association, and the Pennsylvania State Education Association.

George and his wife, Penny, have a five-year-old daughter, Kristin.

1987 FIGHTING SCOTS CO-CAPTAINS

This past spring, the Edinboro University football squad announced its captains for the 1987 season. Seniors John Georgiana and Mike Wetherholt were honored in voting done strictly by the players.

The pair of seniors, Georgiana a fullback and Wetherholt a strong safety, were awarded for their outstanding dedication to Edinboro football. "I want to emphasize again that it is very important that the voting be done by the players," Steve Szabo stated. "The team made excellent selections in picking these two fine young men. They are very deserving of the honor."

Georgiana, likely to start at fullback in '87, is currently recovering from knee surgery but is expected to be 100 percent for the season opener at Liberty University (VA) on September 5. "John is the typical fullback. Hardnosed and very unselfish," Szabo stated. "He has been patient during his career at the Boro and he is finally getting his just due. He has run the ball hard over the last two years and blocked extremely well and has truly earned his title of co-captain. His attitude and playing style embodies what a captain is all about. John has always put the team first," added Szabo.

Georgiana, who rushed for 125 yards on 40 tough carries last season, was very surprised by his selection. "It is a great honor to be selected by your teammates to be co-captain of the squad," Georgiana stated. "My role will basically stay the same, with more responsibility to hold the offense together. I have a great deal of confidence in our offense and quarterback Jim Ross. I plan on keeping a close eye on Jim (Ross) and try to help him with game situations. I have been there in the past, in pressure situations, and I feel that I can help keep things together on the offensive side of the ball," Georgiana concluded.

Jim Pisano, the Scots starting fullback last season, toted the ball 83 times for 341 yards, so Georgiana is likely to up his numbers for his senior year. Said Georgiana, "The stats do not matter to me. Winning the Pennsylvania Conference title is the only thing I am concerned with. IUP will likely be the front runner again, but I feel with the experience we gained last season we can really make a run at this thing."

Wetherholt, to start as strong safety for the Scots, is coming off a solid performance last season and is excited about the '87 season. "We, the defense, have had a year to learn the new system that the coaches have brought to Edinboro and the time spent is really beginning to pay off. We seem to be getting the different defensive concepts down," Wetherholt stated. "The defense had a very good spring and it has helped our confidence. I am sure the feeling will carry over to the fall season."

Wetherholt turned out to be the most versatile player in the defensive secondary last season, playing as many as three different positions. For the '86 campaign, Wetherholt collected 56 tackles, including 37 solo stops to rank fourth on the squad. Also added to his '86 totals were one tackle for loss, one fumble caused, one interception and a team high eight passes broken up.

Szabo has nothing but high praise for his other co-captain, as well. "Mike has developed himself into a leader by example," Szabo said. "Through hard work, and mental toughness, Wetherholt has molded himself into a fine football player and person. He is very deserving of this honor. The defensive secondary has rallied around him and he has responded very well. He has the respect of the players and that is of utmost importance," Szabo concluded.

Wetherholt also feels the added responsibility of his captainship. "When you know that your teammates have done the voting, it is an added responsibility for you. I will do my best to hold the defensive squad together and give them the proper direction," Wetherholt added. "We have some new faces on the defensive side of the ball, so we need someone to oversee them. I am truly honored to be that person."



ALL-AMERICAN CANDIDATE FLOYD FAULKNER

Edinboro University has a rich tradition of outstanding running backs.

Names like Jim Romaniszyn, David Green, and Al Raines fill the Fighting Scots' record books with some staggering numbers.

In 1987, Edinboro is likely to unleash a plethora of talent at halfback, but one of those candidates could emerge as a star for Fighting Scots fans to long remember.

Floyd Faulkner will probably never touch Raines' 1,358 yards for a season, or Green's 217 carries in a year. Not that he is not capable of those numbers. The recent success of the Boro offense has been due to its versatility and variety of talent, thus Faulkner's stats are sometimes overlooked.

In '86, the 5-9 scatback out of Cornell High School in Coraopolis, Pa., blossomed into one of the top running backs around. Faulkner led the entire Pennsylvania Conference in touchdowns with 14 and finished the season with 84 points scored. On the ground, he led the Plaid with 824 yards on just 127 carries for a 6.5 yard per carry mark and 11 TD's. His YPC stat ranks as the third best in Scot history.

At times during the offensive explosion of '86, Faulkner would go on "big play streaks." On November 1 at home against Shippensburg, Faulkner carried the ball just 8 times but for 206 yards and 3 touchdowns. His efforts were awarded with "Player of the Week" honors in the conference. He burned the Red Raiders on touchdown runs of 79 and 76 yards enroute to leading the Scots to their bizarre 66-53 win. The following Saturday, on the road in California, Faulkner kept the Vulcans at bay - returning three punts for 165 yards and a touchdown. His TD return covered 80 yards, while his final runback went for 75 and set up another score.

For the upcoming campaign, head coach Steve Szabo has a very pleasant problem to deal with. "With backs like Floyd, Elbert Cole, and Chris Conway, who had an excellent spring, we feel we have three players capable of breaking a game wide open," Szabo said. "We are fortunate to have such quality depth at this position. We keep our halfback fresh, so it is difficult for one player to put up the big numbers. It makes us a better offensive unit and centers more around the team concept, and that is what is most important."

When he does get his hands on the ball, Faulkner has been a model of consistency for the Fighting Scots. His freshman season, he carried the ball 18 times for 87 yards and 3 touchdowns, while grabbing 3 passes for 40 more yards. In '85, while still playing backup, he toted the pigskin 89 times for 429 yards and 3 more scores, while upping his reception total to 14 with 1 touchdown.

It is unlikely that Faulkner will dent the EUP record book this fall, but if the offensive line can stay healthy and perform up to last season's effort, watch for him to make the Fighting Scots a contender for the divisional title.

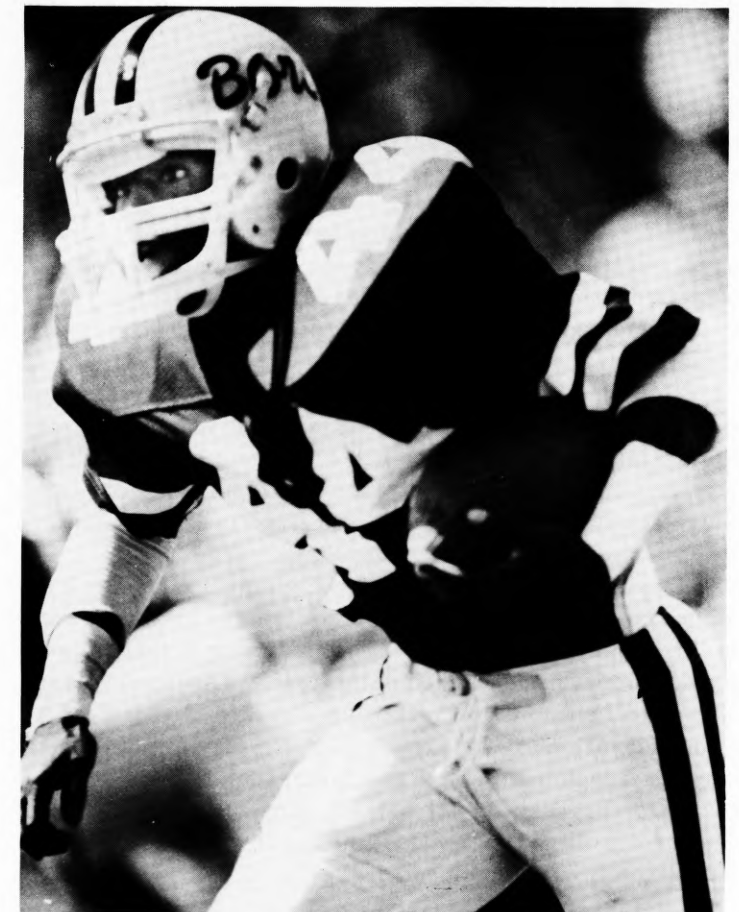

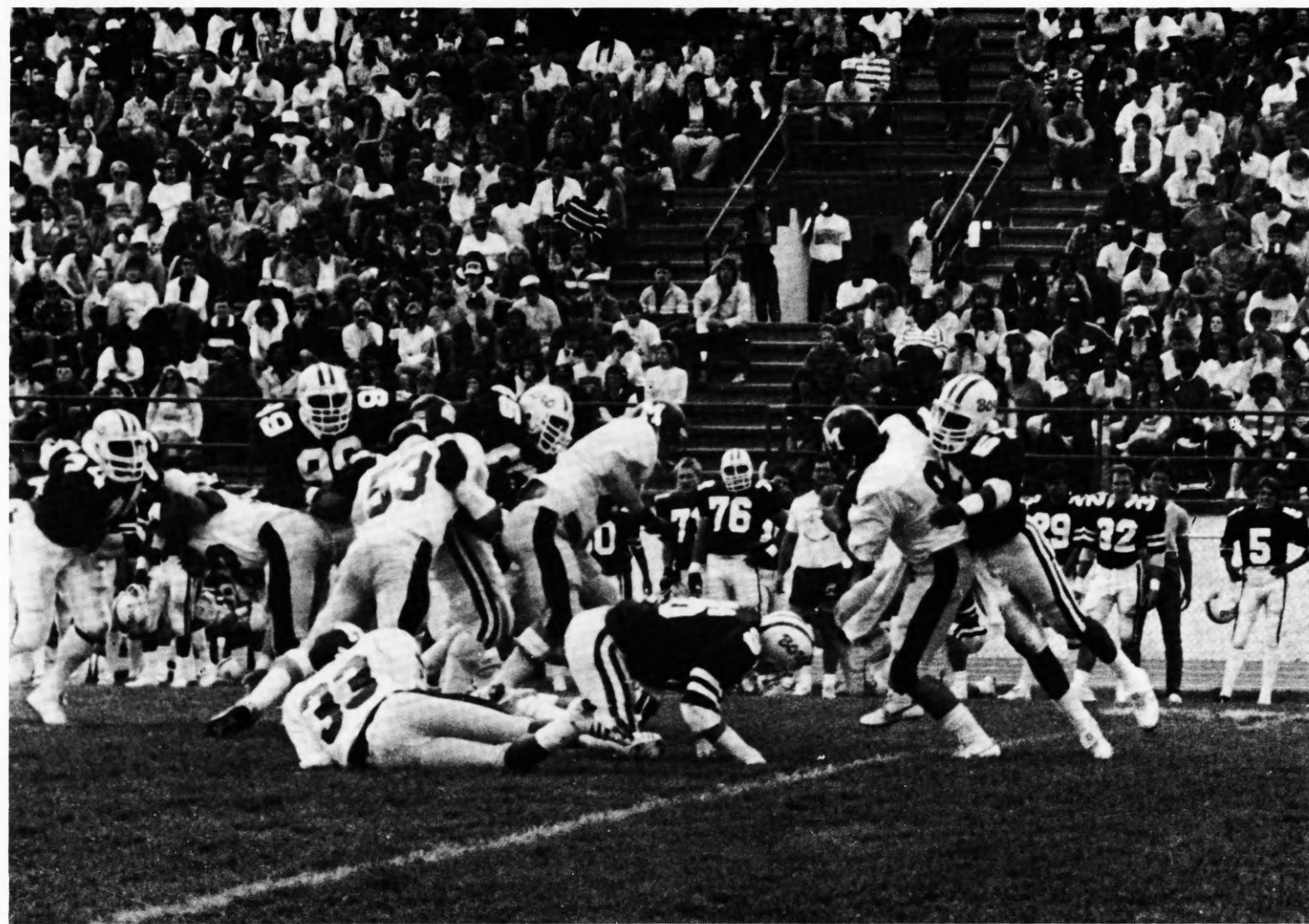

SCOTS SET SIGHTS ON PA. CONFERENCE TITLE



The Edinboro University football team will carry a five-game win streak into the 1987 season with sights geared to a western division title. The Fighting Scots are well aware that the task at hand is dethroning IUP in order to travel to the state championship game this November.

"In order to accomplish our long range goals, we have to start right here in the western division," third-year head coach Steve Szabo stated. "Indiana will once again be the team to beat on our side of the state. It is nice to know that our two toughest opponents (IUP and West Chester) will be played in Sox Harrison Stadium," he added.

Since Szabo started in 1985, the Fighting Scot mentor has made a conscious effort to improve the Edinboro schedule and in '87 he has done just that. "The first thing is that we are playing an eleven game schedule this year. We dropped Wayne State and Fairmont and picked up a rugged Division I-AA opponent in Liberty University. We also play Central Connecticut, which hired a new coach that took Salisbury State (MD) to the Division III national finals a year ago; and Shepherd College (WV) which finished in the NAIA top ten last season," Szabo commented.

Coming into the '87 campaign Szabo calls it "guarded optimism" as he approaches the Scots' initial test on the road September 5. "Taking into consideration the ability and physical size of our athletes this could be the best football team Edinboro has had since I came here three years ago. But I am a bit cautious due to the fact that we are so young," Szabo added. "We have only seven seniors on the entire squad so once again we are going to be relying on young talent in the big games."

Szabo feels that the center of any good football team must start with the quarterback. "It is a very sensitive position. In order to be successful a team must have a solid foundation at quarterback," he added. It is obvious that the Scot mentor is concerned.

The Plaid is likely to start sophomore signal caller Jim Ross, a Euclid, Ohio, product with only one collegiate start under his young belt. "Physically there is no question that he has the ability to lead this team," the head coach said. "But like I said, there is far more to it than just the raw ability to throw the ball. Once Ross learns the system and becomes more comfortable with it I feel he can develop into as good a quarterback that Edinboro has ever had."

Indeed, Ross is a bit green but he has shown the leadership qualities and ability to lead the Fighting Scot squad. In his lone start last season, Ross completed 8 of 16 passes for 118 yards and 2 touchdowns in leading the Plaid to a 24-14 win over Slippery Rock. The remainder of the season Ross threw just 4 more passes but gained valuable game experience in 4 other contests and feels he got his feet wet. "I was pleased with my performance against the Rock," Ross said. "But I was not happy with my overall performance for the year. The experience helped. I just hope I can carry over the knowledge I gained last year and help us win some football games this fall," he added.

If any one position can take the heat off of Ross in '87 it will be the wealth of talent the Scots possess at halfback. Returning for his senior season will be scat-back Floyd Faulkner. Coming off an all-conference season Faulkner will be relied on to carry the bulk of the offensive load for the Scots this year. He rushed for a team-high 824 yards on just 127 carries and 11 touchdowns last season and ended the year with 84 points scored. Out of the backfield Faulkner grabbed 17 passes for 142 yards and a pair of scores while he also returned 22 punts for 302 yards for a 13.7 yards per return mark. One of his runbacks covered 80 yards and a touchdown against California on the road.

Joining Faulkner in the backfield will likely be Elbert Cole and fullback John Georgiana. Cole, just a sophomore, gained 290 yards on 52 attempts last season for a 5.6 YPC mark and a pair of touchdowns. He also caught 11 passes for 170 yards and 3 scores out of the backfield. One of his grabs was a game winner with two seconds left against Wayne State. "We have three people at the halfback spot that can break a game open," commented Szabo. "Floyd, Elbert and Chris Conway give us a solid foundation in the backfield." Anchoring the fullback spot will be co-captain John Georgiana. "Georgy" carried the pigskin 40 times for 125 yards in '86 while helping clear the way for Scot backs to run for over 200 yards per game. "We are a bit slim at fullback as far as depth is concerned, but with someone as solid as Georgiana back there we should be all right," Szabo said. One concern of the Scots is that Georgiana is coming off knee surgery in the off season and whether he will be able to go at full strength for an entire season.

No matter how good the skill people are in the backfield, a solid offensive line is a must for a successful offense. In '87, Szabo feels the squad could be as good as ever. "Physically we will be a much bigger line than in years past," said the head mentor. "We should average around 240 pounds up front with players who have game experience."

In the middle of the line will likely be sophomore center Joe Brooks (6-1, 235) and guards Andy Cline (6-4, 240) and Dean Gallagher (6-3, 225). Sophomore Brad Powell (6-2, 260) and freshman Jeff Jacobs (6-4, 240) will give the Scots depth at guard. Looking to start at tackle will be a pair of returnees in Ron Hainsey (6-4, 260) and Mark Courtney (6-3, 225) who were not in the starting lineup on opening day last season. "Both Courtney and Hainsey developed into solid offensive tackles last season," Szabo commented. "They worked hard to earn their spots and performed well to keep them. I hope there will be more pleasant surprises like those two this season." Anchoring the interior this season will be a trio of tight ends

which Szabo feels can all help the squad. Brian Ferguson, Randy McIlwain, and John Tintzman all bring game experience into the '87 season with equal talents. Ferguson caught 4 passes for 37 yards and a score last season, while Tintzman's lone reception went for 10 yards and a score. McIlwain was used strictly on special teams a year ago but had an outstanding spring and is expected to battle for the spot.

At wideout the Scots are very solid. Ernest Priester (36 catches, 507 yards), Cleveland Pratt (18, 225, 3TD), John Toomer (11, 103) and Daryl Cameron (8, 91, 1TD) return for the Plaid and all offer deep threats when called upon. Priester, in just his freshman year last season, was the squad's top possession receiver and will likely play the same role in '87. Pratt and Toomer both have sprinter speed, while Cameron will be used in the shorter passing game.

If the Fighting Scots are going to contend with the western division heavies this fall, the defense is going to have to make great strides from last season. Coach Szabo feels that coming off a successful spring, the defensive side of the ball has come a long way. "Coach Greg Quick (defensive coordinator) has his feet on the ground and has done a great job of pulling the defense together," Szabo stated. "With the influx of new personnel and the development of our veterans the defense should be a much better squad this season. We must minimize the mistakes and play as a unit. The personnel will not be my concern, it will be the ability to make the proper adjustments."

The secondary should be the Scots' stronghold in '87, led by all-conference performer Michael Willis and co-captain Mike Wetherholt. Willis returns with 77 tackles to his credit last season including 2 fumble recoveries, 1 fumble caused, 3 passes broken up and 1 interception. Wetherholt led the squad with 8 deflections in '86 and was the fourth leading tackler with 56 stops. Rounding out the secondary will likely be returnee Mikel Green (35 tackles, 1 INT) and Michael Churn (47 stops and 2 INT). Also expected to see time in the defensive backfield will be vet Claude Webb (21 stops and team-high 3 INT) and first-year players James Anderson, Mark Ferguson, Joe Thomas, Rod Thompson, Cornell Barber and Bill McNally.

Linebacking seems to be the biggest question mark for coach Quick's defense in '87, but with the addition of middle linebacker Scott Brown who moved from offense, and the experienced pass rush of John Williams the Plaid should have the talent to compete. The problem is the depth. Williams returns from a freshman season where he recorded 51 tackles and 2 quarterback sacks. He also was credited with 3 stops behind the line of scrimmage, while Brown is adjusting to the inside spot. "Brown was the pleasant surprise of the spring session," Szabo stated. "He has the ability to play the position as well as anyone has since I have been here. He is a former tight end with a good nose for the football."

At the other outside spot is likely to be a pair of sophomores battling in Jose Regus and Tony Simpson. A variety of freshmen are going to have to produce for the Plaid in '87 led by newcomers Brian Keaton, Al Donahue, Cary Braxton, John Constantino, Mike Cunningham and John Holmes. Returnee Dave Meholick, the squad's most valuable special teams player in '86, gives the squad the proven depth but he's likely to play the middle behind Brown.

Up front the squad has some proven players but depth

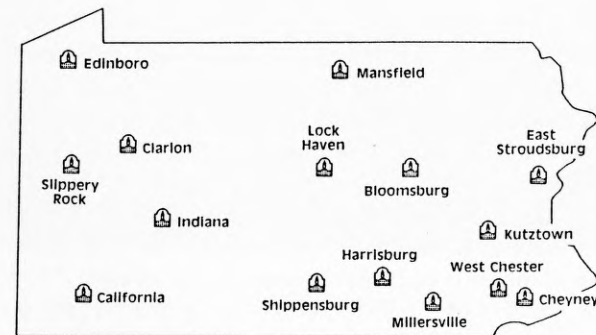

could be the problem here again. Coaches Rick Browning and Quick have made some adjustments and feel that the defensive interior is ready to go. Starting at defensive end will likely be veterans Bill Clark (14 stops, 2 sacks) and Rob Lewis (24 tackles, 2 sacks), while the tackle spots are anchored by Chip Conrad and Mark Jozefov. Returnee Scott Pierce (28 stops and 2 sacks) gives the Plaid depth at end but that is the extent of the proven players. Freshmen Kurt Schmidhamer, Andy Fulton, Al Caldwell, Ray Haley, and John LaRocca are going to be looked at for help.

The kicking game also has its share of question marks, having to replace the school's all-time leading scorer Jim Trueman. A realm of freshmen will battle for the placekicking spot as Jason Benham and Terry Buckley seem to have the inside track. The punting chores will be solid with the return of second team all-conference player sophomore Mike Raynard. He finished his freshman campaign with 38 kicks covering 1,456 yards for a solid 38.3 mark, best in the western division of the Pennsylvania Conference.



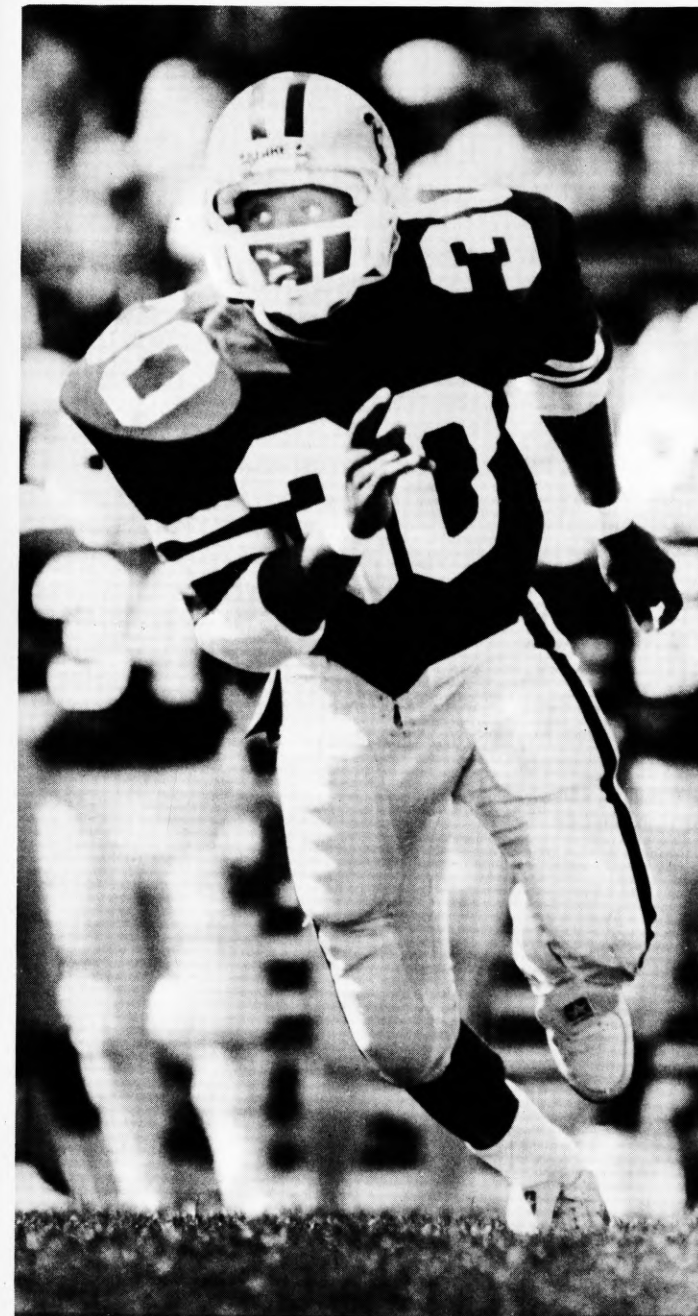

FLAMES OUTLOOK

The Flames return a wealth of experience from last year's team which posted a 1-9 record against some rugged competition. Liberty University's 1986 roster included only 7 seniors and 11 juniors, but coach Morgan Hout has the 11-year program on the rise after several fine recruiting years, with big things planned for the near future as Dr. Jerry Falwell's Christian school makes a move into the Division I-AA ranks.

"Liberty is a great addition to our schedule," said Edinboro University head coach Steve Szabo. "Physically, they may be the toughest team we face all season."

Rugged linebacker Mickey Paige anchors the Flames' defense. The 6-0, 210-pound junior All-American candidate finished the 1986 season with a team-high 125 tackles.

"Mickey is the type of middle linebacker you build solid defenses around," says Hout. "He has shown the type of leadership, aggressiveness and toughness that will make him one of the nation's best linebackers the next two years."

Liberty's other top returnees are defensive back Richard Shelton (5-11, 171, jr.), tailback Willie Larkins (5-9, 190, sr.) and quarterback Paul Johnson (6-2, 170, so.). As a freshman, Johnson completed 181 of 360 passes for 1,976 yards and 6 scores. Larkins rushed for 458 yards on 117 carries and caught 35 passes for 218 yards, both team highs. Shelton, who missed four games last season is also the top kick and punt returner.

Also returning on offense are junior running back Charles Dorsey, sophomore tight end Kevin James (18 catches, 266 yards), junior running back Charles McCray (217 yards rushing, 25 catches for 319 yards), sophomore wide receiver Scott Queen (28 catches, 319 yards), sophomore lineman Barry Rice, junior tight end Doug Thompson (22 catches for 262 yards), senior tackle Richie Wilson, senior fullback Ken Lockard, freshman placekicker Scott Mullis and nationally-ranked punter Kenny Smith.

Defensive returnees include senior strong safety Jim Hampton (98 tackles), junior linebacker Dwight Jones (98 tackles, 3 interceptions), senior tackle Mark Landis, senior end Merle Laswell, sophomore end Reggie Little (54 tackles), senior down lineman Perry Helton (95 tackles) and sophomore linebacker Alan Miller (82 tackles).

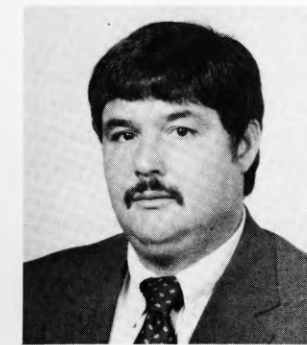

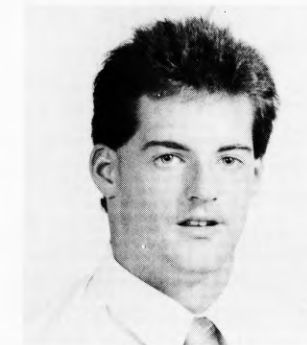

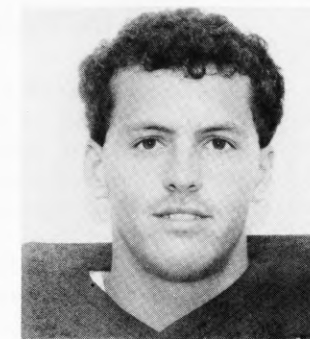

ROCKETS OUTLOOK

Following last fall's periods of ups and downs (when the Rockets lost the opening four games, won the next three only to fall in the final three contests) interim head coach Bob Di Spirito's gridders aim to get off last season's roller coaster ride in favor of a steadier run in 1987 led by a sturdy rushing corps and stingy defense.

Hoping to get the Rockets back on the winning track is Di Spirito, who guided Slippery Rock to three straight state championships in the 1970s. Di Spirito posted a 75-54-3 record from 1967-1980 at the Rock, which included a 60-33-3 record during the 1970s.

Offensively, the Rock loses graduated quarterback Eric Denton, but fifth-year senior Steve Statnick, who missed most of last season with a shoulder injury, takes over the field general duties after passing for 565 yards and 5 touchdowns as a reserve.

While Slippery Rock faces the quarterback "changing of the guard," the even greater story deals with the return of All-PC West tailback Greg Pattera. The junior churned out runs at 5.7 yards per clip last season to pace all Rock runners with 693 yards and 5 touchdowns. Rejoining Pattera in the backfield are seniors Jim Carr and Ryan Hanson, who offer consistent support as does sophomore Alvan Thompson. Pattera and Carr again pose as a double threat to defenders, returning as the Rock's top pass receivers.

In order for Pattera and Company to raid opponents, the offensive line, led by All-America tackle Tim Grove, needs to open the holes. Grove and center Todd Massack are the only returning linemen who started all 10 games last fall.

Defensively, sophomore Jerome Curtis (95 tackles, 5 sacks) moves from end to linebacker to team with Rich Moskal (74 tackles). Returning to the front wall are nose guard Tom Kerr, tackle Billy Ray Perkins and promising Virginia Tech transfer Nate Gay. Bolstering the secondary are cornerback Donovan Wright and free safety Andy Major.

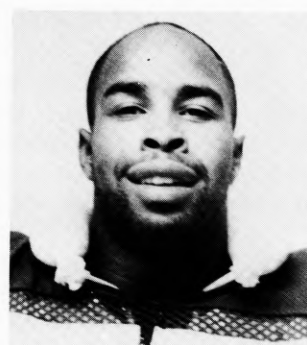

BIG INDIANS OUTLOOK

The Big Indians' goal of defending their conference crown poses a serious challenge as many key performers have graduated from the 1986 championship team. While 24 players who lettered last fall return, 19 are not, and second-year coach Frank Cignetti emphasizes, "We really will be a much younger team this coming season than we were last fall."

The good news is that IUP's defense, which ranked among the best in the nation in 1986, returns seven starters. The leader is senior outside linebacker Troy Jackson, an AP All-American honorable mention and the only unanimous choice to the PC West first team. Other defensive returnees are All-Conference first team picks Dean Cottrill at outside linebacker and nose guard Paul Thompson; a pair of defensive backs who both made second team, strong safety Frank Cignetti and free safety Tom Fedkoe; plus outside linebacker Kevin McMullan, who recorded 120 tackles (71 solo) last year.

Offensive standouts returning are fullback Paul Palamara, the PC Rookie of the Year; PC first-team fullback Steve Girting; wide receiver Tony Trave; kicker John Sandstrom and punter Bob Fulton. Key transfers include tailback Raphael "Pudgy" Abercrombie and quarterback Chris Filipkowski. Junior quarterback Jim Pehanick played in six games last fall. The only returning starter on the offensive line is guard John Robinson.

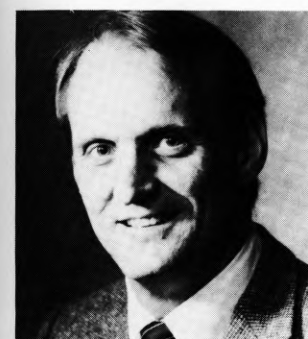

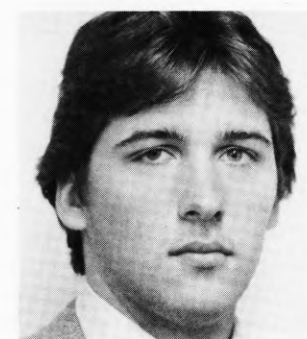

GOLDEN RAMS OUTLOOK

The PSAC-East champions return enough starters that fourth-year coach Danny Hale feels the team will be a contender again for the eastern crown. Late in the 1986 season, the team was ranked as high as seventh in the nation in Division II.

The offensive backfield returns AP honorable mention All-American junior quarterback Al Niemela, who also was named the PSAC-East player for the year and voted to the ECAC first team. Niemela set a season record for touchdown passes with 22. He also set records for passes attempted (53) and passes completed (33) against Delaware; and passing attempts for a season (339) and passes completed (199).

Returning at wide receiver are senior Jim Sheehan, an honorable mention All-American, as well as PSAC-East first team and ECAC All-Star; and first-team all-conference pick Bill Hess. Sheehan set records for most passes caught in a season (71) and tied the record of 12 passes caught in a game. Hess was also the team's main kickoff and punt returner.

Also returning is leading rusher Jason Sims, who chalked up 1,151 yards in 1986. Joining center Wayne McFarland on the offensive line will be Bob "Bubba" Phillips, Mike Orris and Ralph Tamm, who is a lot stronger and faster and is being watched closely by pro scouts.

Defensively, the Golden Rams return quite a few players: linemen Mike Carnesale, Mike Testa, Joe Rudderow, Pat Ellis, Matt Jamison and Dean Dispasquale; linebackers Pat Tryson (team leader in tackles) and Mike Tkach; and Dominic Kurtyan, Andre McFadden and Larry Stephenson in the secondary.

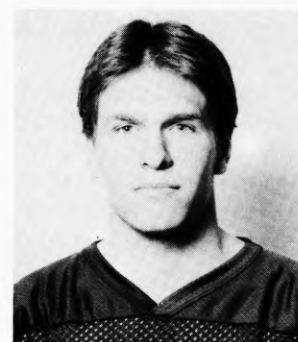

GOLDEN EAGLES OUTLOOK

In 1986 Clarion won its last 4 games of the year to finish with a 5-5 record, while continuing its NCAA Division II leading mark of 26 consecutive non-losing seasons.

The 1987 Golden Eagles have 17 starters returning from that team hoping to make a serious challenge for the PSAC-West crown it has won seven times since 1960. Three Associated Press All-Americans return including third team defensive lineman Lou Weiers (6-2, 240), honorable mention center Jerry Fedell (6-2, 268) and two-time honorable mention placekicker John Desmond (5-11, 175). Weier, a senior, had 94 tackles and 7 quarterback sacks in 1986. Fedell, also a senior, is a 3-year starter on the offensive line and Desmond, only a junior, has 101 points and owns the Clarion longest field goal record of 49 yards.

On offense Clarion returns senior quarterback Doug Emminger (5-11, 175) who clicked on 148 of 269 passes last year for 1,926 yards (second most in Clarion history) and 11 touchdowns. He also ran for 102 yards and 1 score. Split end Mike Brestensky (5-9, 162) who caught 19 passes for 224 yards and 3 touchdown returns for his junior year. The offensive line is led by All-Conference picks Fedell, guard John Seaman (6-1, 240) and tackle Pat Prenatt (6-4, 250), all seniors. Clarion averaged 21.1 points per game last season.

The Clarion defense will be led by Weiers up front, veteran and all-conference linebacker Ken Raabe (5-11, 177) and all-conference defensive backs John Besic (6-0, 195) and Bob Kelly (6-1, 200), all seniors. Raabe tied Weiers for the team lead in tackles last year with 94, plus was a top pass rusher with 7 sacks. Besic collected 80 tackles and 1 interception despite missing the last 2 games with a broken hand. Kelly likewise had 80 tackles and snared 2 interceptions.

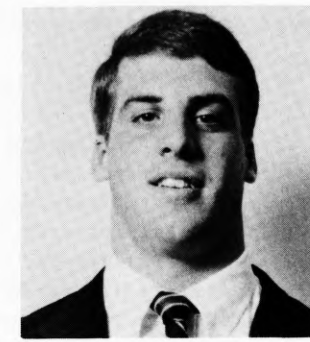

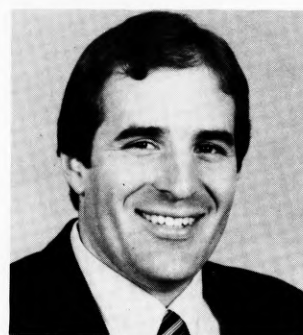

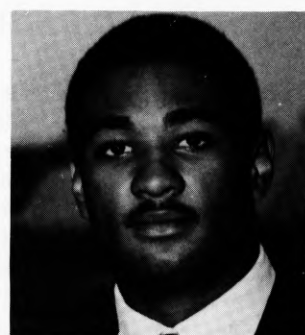

RED RAIDERS OUTLOOK

The Red Raiders will be trying to rebound from last year's 3-7 record with a young team they hope can mature and become a factor in the conference race. Shippensburg has a talented backfield, particularly if two-time All-Conference star Frank Van Buren can return from an injury to play tailback. 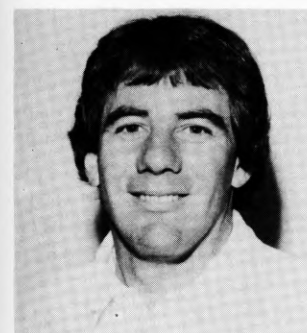

VULCANS OUTLOOK

The Vulcans must find replacements at several skilled positions if they are to produce a winning season in 1987. California won its first five games and finished the 1986 campaign with a 6-4 overall record, the school's third winning season in the past four years.

Offensively, Cal's biggest challenge will be to replace graduated honorable mention All-American quarterback Brendan Folmar. Whoever emerges as the new starting quarterback will have an abundance of talented receivers to throw to. Terry O'Shea, a 6-5, 220-pound junior tight end, recorded 35 receptions for 363 yards last year. Ed Alford, a fleet 5-9, 170-pound senior wideout, caught 35 passes for 616 yards and 6 touchdowns. Also returning is junior Bryan Greer, who averaged 19.5 yards per catch.

The Vulcans also feature a talented running game with depth, led by sophomore tailback Steve Brown and senior fullback Jim Cassandro. Veterans Bill Crowell, Joe Cerro, Bill Kremer, Mark Keefe and Roger Ruperto return to solidify the offensive line.

Defensively, the Vulcans return only four starters. The lone returnee on the defensive front is tackle Glenn Richards, a 6-1, 235-pound senior. Other top defensive candidates are: former quarterback Chris Devivo at either tackle or tight end, end Craig May, linebackers Mike Stephany and Tom Cawoski, cornerback Mark Martin and cornerback-punter Mike Grashion.

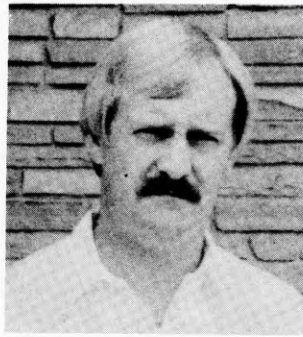

RAMS OUTLOOK

A new coach and 12 returning starters are the nucleus for the 1987 Shepherd football team, which won the 1986 West Virginia Conference title and made a trip to the NAIA playoffs for the second time in the history of the program.

Monte Cater is a new face to the program. Cater comes to Shepherd from Lakeland Community College in Sheboygan, Wisconsin, where he compiled a 30-23-1 record over 6 years and won 3 Illini-Badger conference titles over the last 4 years.

Cater hopes to run, as well as pass from an option oriented attack this year. He has quarterback John Fleming returning to run the attack. Fleming completed 99 of 228 passes for 13 touchdowns and 1,805 yards a year ago. Joining Fleming in the backfield is the leading ground gainer from last year's team in Bobby Williams. Williams finished with 573 yards and 5 touchdowns during the 1986 campaign. The fullback position is wide open with Bobby Carroll and Barry Kramer vying for the spot.

Steve Campbell and John Alexander are the two returning players from Shepherd's receiving corps. Campbell, a wide receiver, caught 15 passes for 274 yards and 2 touchdowns. Alexander, a tight end, finished the 1986 campaign with 7 receptions for 92 yards and 1 score.

Cater must replace three offensive linemen from last year's West Virginia conference championship team. Back from a year ago are seniors Ryan Bush (6-4, 280, tackle) and Marty Gregan (6-0, 249, guard). Candidates for the opening tackle position are junior Joe Kitts (6-3, 250) and sophomore Thad Sulkowski (6-5, 230).

Sophomore Jay Burke (6-3, 240) and redshirt freshman Todd Taylor (6-3, 265) are both battling for the starting guard spot. Freshman Don Hoff (6-0, 240) and sophomore Rob Suesse (6-3, 245) are contending for the center position. Suesse missed all of last year because of an injury, while Hoff is a redshirt freshman.

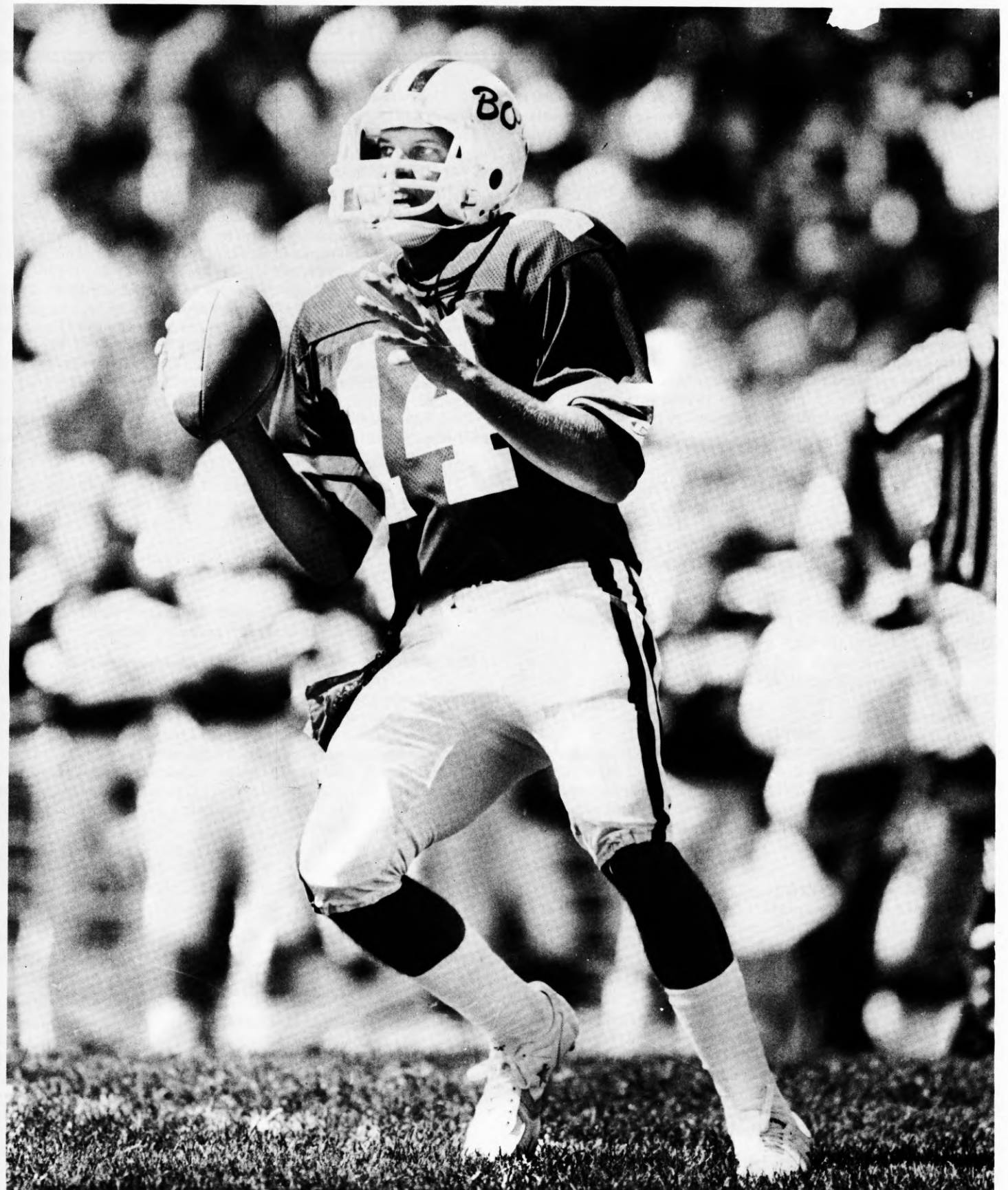
Defensively, Shepherd should be strong with the return of second team NAIA All-American and first team All-Conference defensive tackle Bob Palmer (6-4, 265), and first team All-Conference free safety Chris Mack (5-10, 185). Second team All-Conference performer Tom Korbini and Palmer give Shepherd one of the best defensive tackle combinations at the NAIA level in the country.

Joining Palmer and Korbini on the defensive line at end are returning starters Charlie Hunt (6-1, 215) and Rob Orndorff (6-2, 200). Vying for the nose guard position are sophomore Mike Ladrigan (6-4, 260), junior Mark Hadley (6-2, 215) and sophomore Rich Bafford (6-2, 230).

The linebacking corps are solid with the return of junior Melvin Adams (6-1, 235) and sophomore Steve Borlie (6-1, 200). Joining Mack in the defensive backfield are junior Jace Harris (6-0, 190) and senior Jac Costello (6-1, 205). All three were instrumental in the defensive backfield setting a school record for most interceptions in a season with 34.

The kicking game finds Richard Poole replacing school record holder John Treadway on placements. The punting duties are being handled by Mike Sipe who averaged 33 yards a punt last year.

This year's schedule should be one of the toughest in Shepherd history. Shepherd faces three NCAA Division II schools in Millersville, American International and Edinboro.



THE PAST...

1986 SEASON IN REVIEW

EDINBORO 27 — WAYNE STATE 24

Quarterback Scott Dodds lofted a 3-yard pass to freshman walk-on Elbert Cole in the corner of the endzone to lift the Fighting Scots to a thrilling come-from-behind victory in their season opener.

The Scots scored 20 points in the fourth quarter, including 2 touchdowns in the final 4 minutes to the delight of the near capacity crowd of 5,500 at Sox Harrison Stadium.

Floyd Faulkner led Edinboro's potent running attack with 2 touchdowns and 123 yards on 26 carries. Fullback Jim Pisano rushed for 138 yards on 21 carries. The Scots ran the ball 57 times for 260 net yards.

MANSFIELD 28 — EDINBORO 21

Senior halfback Robert Funderburk scored 3 touchdowns, including the winning touchdown with 3 minutes left in the game, to lead Mansfield to a shocking victory over the Fighting Scots.

The Scots appeared ready to dominate Mansfield at the outset, marching 80 yards in 17 plays for a touchdown on their first possession. But underdog Mansfield refused to fold and led 14-7 at halftime.

The Mountaineers took a 20-14 lead with 8:06 left in the game on a 3-yard touchdown run by Funderburk, but Cleveland Pratt electrified the home crowd of 5,800 by taking the ensuing kickoff and dashing 88 yards for a score to give Edinboro a 21-20 lead. But the kickoff return failed to rattle Mansfield as it marched downfield and 5 minutes later scored the winning touchdown on a 13-yard pass from backup quarterback Chris Fusco to Funderburk.

Floyd Faulkner scored 2 touchdowns and was Edinboro's leading ball carrier with 56 yards rushing. Quarterback Scott Dodds completed a school record 20 passes in the disappointing loss.

EDINBORO 24 — SLIPPERY ROCK 14

Four freshmen helped lead the Scots to a Pennsylvania Conference win over rival Slippery Rock before a Parents Day crowd of 6,500.

Freshman walk-on Elbert Cole scored on touchdowns of 47 and 31 yards. The speedy halfback finished with 134 yards on 11 carries to help rally the Scots from a 7-0 deficit after the first 25 minutes of play.

Freshman quarterback Jim Ross filled in capably for the injured Scott Dodds, as he completed 8 of 16 passes for 118 yards. Ross threw a pair of scoring strikes in the fourth quarter to break the game open. Other freshmen standouts included Ernest Priester, who caught 4 passes for 53 yards, and punter Mike Raynard, who averaged 40.5 yards.

INDIANA 28 — EDINBORO 10

INDIANA, PA — Quarterback Bobby Kiel completed 19 of 23 passes for 242 yards and freshman Paul Palamara ran for 4 touchdowns to lead the nationally-ranked Big Indians to a rain-soaked homecoming victory over the Scots.

Palamara scored three of his touchdowns on the muddy turf in the second quarter to give IUP a 21-0 halftime lead. The Edinboro defense stiffened in the second half and Scott Dodds led the Scots to 10 third-period points before Palamara tacked on his fourth touchdown with 2:58 left in the game.

The stingy IUP defense limited Edinboro to 106 yards rushing and 95 passing. Penalties once again stalled the Boro attack, as the Scots were flagged 9 times for 81 yards.

Michael Willis and Terrell Clifford led the defense with 12 and 10 tackles, respectively.

WEST CHESTER 37 — EDINBORO 9

WEST CHESTER, PA — The Scots suffered their second straight loss to a Pennsylvania Conference power as the West Chester Rams rolled to a 37-9 victory.

The Rams' potent running attack accounted for 258 yards on 42 carries, with Jason Sims leading the way with 184 yards on 18 carries and 2 touchdowns. Standout quarterback Al Niemela completed 10 of 23 passes for 68 yards.

Quarterback Scott Dodds set another school record for completions in a game (21 of 32). The Scots passed for 212 yards and ran for 122, but were hit with 12 penalties totaling 78 yards.

Michael Willis and Tom Calton were dominating on defense with 19 and 14 tackles, respectively.

EDINBORO 48 — CLARION 21

Edinboro struck for 27 first-quarter points, including a 94-yard touchdown on the opening kickoff by Ross Rankin, in rolling to a big victory over Pennsylvania Conference foe Clarion to the delight of a homecoming crowd of 8,250.

The Scots tore through the Golden Eagle defense, ripping off 367 yards rushing on 57 carries. Floyd Faulkner was the leading ground gainer with 146 yards on 15 carries and a touchdown. Freshman Elbert Cole ran for 84 yards and a score.

Quarterback Scott Dodds also had a fine day, completing 18 of 25 passes for 215 yards and 2 TDs. Ernie Priester caught 6 passes for 88 yards.

Freshman linebacker Tom Calton (10 tackles) led a fired-up Edinboro defense which held the Golden Eagles to 59 yards rushing.

EDINBORO 30 — LOCK HAVEN 21

LOCK HAVEN, PA — Quarterback Scott Dodds completed 25 of 31 passes for 271 yards and 4 touchdowns to power Edinboro to its third PC West victory in four starts.

Dodds established two new school records with his accurate arm, completing 25 passes that included 16 consecutive completions after a 1-for-5 start. Tying a school record was senior tight end Bob Suren with 3 touchdown receptions.

Ernest Priester was on the receiving end of 7 of Dodds' aerials, covering 81 yards. Suren snagged 5 passes for 68 yards.

EDINBORO 66 — SHIPPENSBURG 53

In an incredible display of offense, the Scots held on for a 66-53 triumph over Shippensburg in a game which drew national attention.

The Scots needed all 9 of the touchdowns they scored as Shippensburg also kept the statisticians busy with its 53 points, the most ever in a losing effort in NCAA Division II history.

Edinboro's offensive fireworks included a school record 606 yards in total offense, 456 rushing and 150 passing. Quarterback Scott Dodds continued to display an accurate arm, completing 17 of 22 passes for a pair of scores.

Leading the potent ground game was Floyd Faulkner, who rushed for 206 yards on 8 carries. His 3 touchdown runs covered 79, 26 and 76 yards. Faulkner's 79-yard run gave the Scots 59-33 with 8:37 left in the game.

Edinboro trailed 21-14 when it proceeded to score 24 unanswered points in the middle periods. Shippensburg was held to 158 yards rushing but completed 21 of 38 passes for 353 yards against a porous Edinboro defense. Sophomore quarterback Rob Klock threw a school record 5 touchdown passes.

EDINBORO 29 — CALIFORNIA 24

CALIFORNIA, PA — Two long punt returns by Floyd Faulkner powered Edinboro to a come-from-behind victory over California in its final Pennsylvania Conference clash.

Faulkner gave the Scots an early 7-3 lead, using his blazing speed to return a punt 80 yards for a score. A 79-yard punt return by the speedy junior to the 5 yard line set up an Edinboro touchdown early in the fourth quarter.

Faulkner also scored on a 38-yard run to give Edinboro a 15-10 third period lead. The lead changed hands 3 more times before Edinboro scored the game-winning points on a 1-yard touchdown run by Jim Pisano with 6:47 left. The key play in the winning drive was a 41-yard reception by Ernest Priester which gave Edinboro a first-and-goal at the 1.

BOB SUREN - 6-5, 215, tight end

Arguably one of the best tight ends in the country last year, Suren was not nationally recognized due to his limited number of receptions. FLOYD FAULKNER - 5-9, 180, running back

A slashing-type runner, Faulkner led the Fighting Scots with 824 yards rushing on just 127 carries for a 6.5 yard per carry average. His YPC mark ranks as the third best in Edinboro history. Named All-PC, Faulkner led the conference in touchdowns with 14, picking up 11 on the ground, 2 through the air and returned a punt 80 yards for a score at California. Faulkner also caught 17 passes out of the backfield for 142 yards and a pair of scores. A real game breaker, Faulkner will be a major key for the Plaid this fall.

MICHAEL WILLIS - 6-0, 170, free safety

First team Pennsylvania Conference Western Division
Second team Pittsburgh Post-Gazette

A red-shirt freshman starter in '86, Willis turned in an outstanding first season with the Plaid. Willis completed his initial year with a total of 77 tackles to rank second on the squad. He collected 38 solo stops and 39 assisted tackles. Also added to his total last year were: 1 tackle for loss, a fumble caused, a fumble recovery, 3 passes broken up and 1 interception. Willis will lead the EUP secondary in 1987.

JOHN CARDONE - 5-11, 200, linebacker

Adjusting to the outside linebacking position last season, Cardone was the team's most valuable defensive player a year ago. The rugged senior led the Plaid with 78 tackles, including 46 solo stops. Credited with 2 quarterback sacks and 4 tackles behind the line of scrimmage, Cardone also collected two fumble recoveries, 1 fumble caused and 1 pass broken up.

ROSS RANKIN - 5-11, 185, running back

Splitting time with Faulkner, Rankin was very quietly one of the top running backs in the western division. Rushed for 430 yards on just 79 carries for a fine 5.4 YPC average. Scored 3 touchdowns on the ground and 1 on a 94 yard kickoff return to open the game against Clarion. Caught 16 passes for 145 yards and returned 14 kicks for 363 more for a 25.9 yard per return mark.

ERNEST PRIESTER - 5-9, 174, wide receiver

Second team Pennsylvania Conference Western Division
Just a freshman in '86, Priester led the Fighting Scots in receptions with 36. The Plaid's #1 possession receiver, Priester covered a team-high 507 yards without a touchdown. Knee injury late in the season but is at full strength for '87. Has the ability to run the deep route and has great hands.

DAVE NYE - 5-11, 205, offensive line

Second team Pennsylvania Conference Western Division
An undersized offensive guard, Nye utilized his strength and quickness to stand out for the Plaid last year. Started all 10 games for the Fighting Scots at guard and helped lead the way for EUP running backs to run for over 213 yards per game. Edinboro scored 20 touchdowns on the ground a year ago largely due to Nye's solid contributions.

MIKE RAYNARD - 6-2, 200, punter

Second team Pennsylvania Conference Western Division
Just a freshman last season, Raynard led the western division of the PC with a 38.3 yard per punt average. Total for the year, 38 punts for 1,456 yards and a long kick of 65 yards.

JIM TRUEMAN - 5-7, 180, placekicker

Second team Pittsburgh Post-Gazette
Finished his Edinboro career with five school records. A two-time All-American, Trueman tallied 53 points in his senior year on 5 of 10 field goals and 38 of 39 points after touchdown. A very solid performer during his 4-year stay, Trueman will be tough to replace in '87.

FAIRMONT, WV - Trailing 33-21, the high-powered Edinboro offense exploded for 36 points in the fourth quarter to finish the season with a 7-3 record and 5 straight victories.

THE PENNSYLVANIA CONFERENCE

HISTORY OF PSAC FOOTBALL

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference is one of the few leagues in the nation to sponsor a championship game in football. The East vs. West conference championship game, known as the "State Game," has been in existence since 1960. Mythical champions were picked by sportswriters from 1934 until 1950 with the champion determined by the Saylor system from 1951 until 1959.

All members of the conference (with individual sports exceptions) compete at the NCAA Division II level and have since 1980. Athletes and teams have won numerous honors in national competitions over the years and have helped the PSAC become one of the most respected "small college" conferences in the nation.
