



The State System of Higher Education



Chancellor James H. McCormick

- ❖ The state universities spent the first 100 years of existence training teachers for Pennsylvania's schools. The Normal School Act of 1857 established regional teacher training institutions throughout the Commonwealth. The School Code of 1911 called for the state purchase of all normal schools, and by 1921 the present configuration of 14 state-owned universities was established. The 14 normal schools evolved from state normal schools, to state teachers colleges, to state colleges. On November 12, 1982, Act 188 was signed into law establishing on July 1, 1983 the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. Thus, the 13 former state colleges joined with Indiana University of Pennsylvania to achieve university status. The universities have a cumulative history of 1,600 years.
- ❖ There are 14 universities in the State System of Higher Education with three branch campuses and the McKeever Environmental Center.
- ❖ The total student population among the System universities is 99,850. While 86% of students are from Pennsylvania, they represent many other states and foreign countries.
- ❖ The total university campus has over 4,000 acres in 19 Pennsylvania counties. Buildings for classrooms, residences, administration and student support number 719.
- ❖ Collectively the 14 universities offer 225 undergraduate and 98 graduate degree programs, led by 5,500 full-time faculty members.
- ❖ An average 75% of undergraduate students receive some form of financial assistance to help meet costs.
- ❖ Several study abroad programs are available in System universities. System universities are part of the Pennsylvania Council for International Education.
- ❖ All the universities support life-long learning programs throughout the academic year. Many feature Elderhostel.
- ❖ Most universities have honors programs, student counseling and career planning, cooperative education, and internship programs.
- ❖ System library holdings total more than 5.4 million volumes and 3.5 million periodicals, microforms, and audio materials.
- ❖ The universities in the State System of Higher Education are fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and several appropriate national professional organizations.
- ❖ System graduates living in the Commonwealth number over 271,000.



Foster F. Diebold

Now in his thirteenth year as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, Foster F. Diebold is the fourteenth chief executive officer of the institution of higher learning that has come to acclaim in the last decade as one of Pennsylvania's and the nation's finest. He has brought a vigorous educational and moral leadership, a strengthening of the spirit of community, a clear sense of direction and purpose, and a dimension of multicultural pluralism and diversity.

Much has been accomplished during President Diebold's tenure. The University has returned to financial health. Significant facilities and grounds improvements have been achieved, with several of the historic structures on campus restored to their original splendor. Academic programs have been emphasized and improved, with more than 100 degree offerings now available. Enrollment gains have been unprecedented in both numbers and academic quality. International linkages have been established with institutions in several other countries, and Edinboro University's disabled student services program continues to garner acclaim as one of the finest among all colleges and universities in the United States. Widely recognized as a leader in education both here and abroad, Presi-

dent Diebold has positioned Edinboro University to meet the challenges of the 1990s, as well as those that will face public higher education in the 21st century.

The Orange, New Jersey, native is a graduate of Monmouth College and also holds a master of arts in educational administration from Seton Hall University. He has met coursework requirements for a doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently completing the dissertation requirement for the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency of Edinboro University, President Diebold was president of the University of Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Before that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey and a member of the graduate faculty at that institution; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township (New Jersey) Public Schools.

Recognized for his extensive experience in the field of education management, President Diebold's scholarly achievements in the discipline of applied ethics in higher education deserve special mention. The model statement he authored for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, "Ethical Practices for College Presidents," was unanimously adopted by that professional organization and published as policy for the chief executives of its nearly 400 member institutions nationwide. It is the first formally adopted ethical practices and policy statement for higher education presidents.

For his leadership on an international scale and for his many contri-


butions to the advancement of higher education and enrichment of an emerging culture in Pakistan, President Diebold was decorated with prestigious gold medals from three Pakistani universities. The awards for educational eminence were presented during visits to the Edinboro campus by official Pakistani delegations.

Most recently, President Diebold was honored by the Government of Pakistan with the presentation of the degree of Doctor of Laws (honoris causa) presented at the Government House in the City of Karachi. The ceremony was attended by the presidents of the various universities holding linkage agreements together with Edinboro University, and many high-ranking officials of the Government of Pakistan.

A staunch advocate of a statewide system of public universities in Pennsylvania, President Diebold supported the enabling legislation for the State System of Higher Education (Act 188 of 1982) and saw the State System come to existence in 1983 as a member of the transition team. He currently serves on the System's Executive Council of Presidents and on the boards of the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, and the University Center at Harrisburg.

Active in community affairs, he serves on the Board of Directors of the Erie Conference on Community Development and the United Way of Erie County, the Board of Corporators of both St. Vincent Health Center and Hamot Medical Center, and on the Executive Committee of the French Creek Council, Boy Scouts of America. He is also a member of the Marine Bank Advisory Board, the Advisory Board of the McMannis Educational Trust Fund, and the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Corporation Scholarship Review Committee.

Athletic Director James K. McDonald

Edinboro University's athletic program was placed under the talented and aggressive leadership of Jim McDonald in July of 1981. Increased emphasis on fund raising to provide a sound scholarship foundation has become his top priority while numerous changes and innovations have also keyed the Scots' athletic program under his direction.

Through his efforts more than \$4 million has been raised during the past eleven years. The funds generated by the energetic athletic director's efforts will be used to assist Edinboro's men and women athletes who compete in the Scots sixteen intercollegiate sports.

In addition to maintaining Edinboro's respected winning tradition in intercollegiate athletics, the former health and physical education professor has vastly expanded the University's summer activities.

Sixty camps were sponsored by the Fighting Scots Booster Club this past summer on the University's campus. Sox Harrison Stadium was the site for the Buffalo Bills-Pittsburgh Steelers first scrimmage, an event the veteran athletic director hopes to bring back to the area each year.

The personable athletic director also introduced Edinboro's Hall of Fame program which has evolved into an annual year-ending event to honor present and past athletes.

McDonald has been at Edinboro since 1962 and for 12 years served as the Fighting Scot basketball coach (1962-1975) and never experienced a losing season while his teams compiled an impressive 181 wins against only 89 losses. During that span, his cagers won four Western Division Pennsylvania Conference crowns, the PC state championship and two District 18 titles that netted trips to the NAIA National Tournament. His teams set 27 University records and made 19 post-season appearances while four of his players were named All-Americans.

Prior to accepting his position at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant basketball coach in Erie, Pa. He is a 1956 graduate of Bridgeport High School in his home town of Bridgeport, West Virginia.

In 1960 he received a degree in chemistry and physical education from West Virginia Wesleyan College and he also holds a master's degree in health from the University of Buffalo.


As an undergraduate, he set nine school records at Wesleyan and was twice voted both AP and UPI basketball All-American. In 1960, he was the second leading scorer in the United States, averaging slightly over 33 points a game, and led his team to the national basketball tournament in Kansas City, Missouri. He was named to the NAIA's All-Tournament Team in 1959 and 1960.

In 1966, McDonald was selected Area Eight Coach of the Year by the eastern seaboard coaches and that same year was honored as one of the top ten finalists in the Coach of the Year national poll. McDonald's honors also include selection to the West Virginia All-Time College Basketball Team and membership in the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

As a resident of Edinboro, McDonald has a record of extensive community involvement. He was Little League Baseball director for four years and also held a four-year post as a member of the General McLane School Board. He and his wife, Mary Lou, have three sons - Mark, Mike and Matthew.

Head Coach Tom Hollman

In January 1988, Edinboro University hired Tom Hollman, Athens, Ohio, as its eleventh head football coach in the school's history. Hollman came to Edinboro from Ohio University, where he was the defensive coordinator.

Hollman, beginning his fifth year, has the Scot program back in the national spotlight. At Edinboro, he has earned 29 wins against just 14 losses and one tie and owns an impressive 18-5-1 slate against the PSAC Western Division.

In 1989, he was named the top coach in the East Region by the National Football Coaches Association and also tabbed the top coach in the PSAC West. In 1990, he guided the Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro routed Virginia Union and advanced to the national quarterfinals.

"Edinboro has been a great experience, and I like the direction of the program," Hollman said.

"As a coach, I have been fortunate to coach at many different levels, from high school to Division I. The Division II level here at Edinboro is very appealing to me in relation to my career goals. It is a great feeling to be a head coach at this level."

Hollman's educational background begins with a high school diploma from Memorial High School in St. Mary's, Ohio, followed by his undergraduate degree in education from Ohio Northern University in 1968. Three years later Hollman received his master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio.

While at Ohio Northern, Hollman was a three-year starter for the football team and a two-way performer as a defensive back and offensive end during his junior and senior years. He holds the school record with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years during his stay at Ohio Northern.

A chronological look at Hollman's coaching career begins in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. From there, Hollman moved on to Greenville High School in Ohio where he became head coach from 1971-73. His Greenville squads posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark during his three-year stay.

Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974 and 1975 seasons, where his squad recorded 15 wins against three setbacks and two ties. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in '74, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In '76, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University.

The following year, Hollman accepted the head coach position at Wooster College (OH) and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school's history (24-11-1).

In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the '84 campaign. Then, beginning in 1985 Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University.

"It has been a very comfortable transition for me," Hollman added. "I have found the community to be supportive and the administration is giving me every opportunity to be successful here at Edinboro," he concluded.

Tom resides in Edinboro with his wife, Kandi, and four children, Mari, Jon, Tim and Denise.

Assistant Coaches

Scott Browning - Secondary

Moving to the defensive side of the ball, from the offensive backfield, Scott brings a wealth of coaching experience in his seventh year at the 'Boro. Under his guidance the Scot defense has intercepted 63 passes the past four seasons. He has guided the fortunes of All-Americans Wade Smith and Georj Lewis, and PSAC Rookie of the Year Mario Houston.

Scott came to Edinboro from Ohio State University, where he coached receivers and runningbacks including Keith Byers. Prior to his start at OSU, Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview High Schools in Ohio, from 1979-81. Then, as a graduate assistant, he coached the defensive secondary at New Mexico State in 1982.

In 1983, he mentored the receivers at Idaho State University which advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs.

Browning earned a master's degree in education administration from New Mexico State in 1983, and a BS in education from Ohio State in 1981. Earlier, before transferring to OSU, Scott attended Capital University where he played football for one season. Browning was a four-year letterman in four sports at Loudenville High School (OH) prior to his collegiate days. Scott is married to the former Lynn Hook and resides in Edinboro.



Dan Gierlak - Running Backs

Dan Gierlak enters his sixth season as a full-time coach with his responsibilities concerning the running backs. He is also the head women's softball coach for the Scots and led the squad to the PSAC playoffs in 1990.

Gierlak came to the 'Boro from Thiel College (Pa.) where he coached the defensive secondary for the 1984 season. Dan, a starter and three-year letterwinner for the Plaid in the secondary, moved on to the semi-pro ranks with the Chicago Cowboys. During his short stint with the Cowboys, Gierlak's squad gained national championship honors in 1984 and runner up nationally in the 1985 season. Gierlak brings both playing and coaching experience to the staff, giving the Scot players an added plus on the offensive side of the ball. As backfield coach, he has guided former Harlon Hill finalist Elbert Cole and Boro All-American Lester Frye.

Originally from Buffalo, New York, Dan graduated from Edinboro with a degree in health and physical education. He and his wife, the former Amy Adams and one-year-old daughter, Alexandria Alicia, reside in Edinboro.



Mark Niswonger - Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

Mark Niswonger, a veteran of the coaching ranks for 19 years, begins his fifth year with the Plaid as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. Former understudy of head coach Tom Hollman at Greenville High School, Mark brings extensive experience both on and off the field to the Scot coaching staff. He has helped mold the Scot defense into one of the most respected squads in the country over the past four years.


His coaching stint began back while attending Findlay when he was the head scout for Arlington High School. His first job after college was as defensive coordinator for Bryan High School (OH) where the team earned a 9-1 record. The next two seasons, Niswonger was the defensive coordinator at West Carrollton High School (OH) where his squad posted an impressive 17-1-2 slate.

After West Carrollton, he then returned to graduate school at Ball State University where he helped coach the tight ends and offensive linemen.

From 1981-84, Niswonger was the head coach at Franklin City Schools and was named "coach of the year" in 1982 when his squad won its first league championship in 18 years. He then moved on to the collegiate ranks in 1984 at Manchester College as defensive coordinator and then back to his alma mater from 85-87 as their secondary coach.

Niswonger's education includes an undergraduate degree in physical education and political science from Findlay and a MA in physical education from Ball State. Mark and his wife Patty and one-year-old daughter, Megan Marie, reside in Edinboro.






Gene Smith - Defensive Line

Gene Smith will enter his fifth year directing the Scot defensive line. The Scots defensive line was ranked first in the PSAC and in the NCAA top ten nationally last season in rushing defense. He aided in the development of Scot All-Americans Jeff Jacobs and John Messura.

Smith also has past association with Coach Hollman as he was a graduate assistant working with the defensive line under Hollman at Ohio University. The following season with the Bobcats, Smith moved to the offensive side of the ball as tight end/tackle coach for OU. He also worked extensively with the weight training program as a strength coach. Gene is the coordinator of strength and conditioning for the Scot football squad.

As a player, he enjoyed an outstanding career at Heidelberg College. Smith captained Heidelberg his senior season. He obtained his B.S. degree in education during his undergraduate years and later completed his M.S. in athletic administration from Ohio University. Smith has also completed post-graduate hours.

Smith, originally from Monroeville, Ohio, resides in Edinboro.



Ed Stults - Offensive Line

Ed Stults enters his fourth year directing the Scot offensive line. In his initial year with Edinboro, Stults organized an offensive front that was one of the best in the country. He directed the fortunes of three All-Americans including Scot first-teamer Curtis Rose and numerous All-Conference players. Rose recently signed a free agent contract with the Miami Dolphins of the National Football League.

He brings over ten years of coaching experience to the Scot linemen. He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Bluffton College, in 1981 directing the linebackers. Later on in his coaching stint he turned his attention to the offensive line. He played linebacker at Bluffton from 1976-79 and he graduated in 1980 with a BA in education.

After his coaching tenure at Bluffton that spanned 1981-87, Stults took the offensive line duties at the University of Cincinnati in 1988.

Stults is married to the former Pamela Lewis and resides in Edinboro.

Scots Look to Rebound; Eye Trip to the NCAA IIs

It's hard to say that a 7-4 season was disappointing. But when expectations were to advance to the NCAA II playoffs for the third consecutive year, the 1991 won-lost mark was not what the Scots had envisioned.

Anticipating that the 1992 pre-season polls will have Edinboro back in the national picture, *Football Gazette* will rank the Scots number eight. It appears the pressure will be on once again. Expectations yes, but the Fighting Scots' recent success has created them.

The Hollman Era of 1988-92 has Edinboro posting a 29-14-1 slate, including 18 of 24 wins in the rugged Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division. Two trips to the national playoffs, co-championship of the PSAC, forty school records, two Division II Player of the Year finalists and 17 All-Americans are among the accomplishments. All in the last four years.

Tom Hollman begins his fifth season with the Scots and boasts a 53-25-2 record in eight years on the Division II level. His winning percentage of .663 is among the nation's best in small-college football.

Edinboro returns 33 lettermen and 17 starters (including specialties) in 1992 and should once again battle for the PSAC West title. Home encounters include the University of Buffalo and Northwood (MI), as well as PSAC western division rivals Clarion (Homecoming), Slippery Rock and Shippensburg.

The Scots travel to Southern Connecticut, Lock Haven, California, IUP and Millersville with hopes of extending their season beyond November 14.

In 1991, Edinboro played five of their first seven games on the road, and ultimately it cost them a trip to the national playoffs. This season shows more of a balance, with the Plaid hosting three of the first four games at Sox Harrison Stadium. With a 19-2-1 home record under Hollman, look for the Scots to come out of the blocks quickly in '92.

A LOOK AT THE SCOTS

Skill Positions

PSAC West Rookie of the Year Jody Dickerson returns at quarterback with veteran Sean Seibert ready to step in if needed. Dickerson connected on 53 percent of his passes last year, covering 1,382 yards and eight scores, while rushing for another 240 yards and three touchdowns.

Seibert can still lay claim to Edinboro's lone NCAA II playoff win when he engineered a convincing 38-14 margin at Virginia Union in 1990.

A veteran crew of receivers returns, led by Wrentie Martin (39-607-3 TDs), Paul Stone (9-117) and tight end Brian Heebsh (13-162-2 TDs). Martin and Heebsh were PSAC West second team selections in '91 and all three bring a wealth of game experience to the offense.

The running back position is solid with Derrick Russell (68-403-3 TDs), Larry Jackson (29-188-2 TDs), Corey Hill and Vidal Farr. Someone will have to carry the bulk with the departure of All-American Lester Frye. Three-year starter Tom Tedder (41-173-1 TD) returns at full-back and could be the PSAC West's best at this spot. Tedder will get plenty of backup support from sophomore Chris Snyder.

Offensive Line

With the graduation of All-American Curtis Rose and All-PSAC pick Wally Spisak, the Scots must fill two rather large pairs of shoes. PSAC West second team choice Mike Kegaris has pro potential with his 6-7, 300 pound frame. Starters Scott Nickel, Tony Tighe and Gordy Hitchcock also return, as will Chad Walllick, Det Betti and Dave Nowacki. Quality depth is key, so Hollman will most likely call on a pair of top recruits to help anchor the offensive front.

Defensive Line

Gone is All-American tackle John Messura, so the interior will highlight some new faces. Experience does return in Otha Davidson (22 tackles) and Russell Cray (42) while LB Devas Simmons (36) is likely to convert to a down lineman spot. End Anthony Mariani (48 tackles, 8 for loss) also returns and had a solid '91 in his initial year. Messura's spot must be filled if the Scots are to improve on their 150-yard per game rushing yield of last year.

Linebackers

All-American and All-PSAC West choice Jason Perkins (135 tackles) returns to solidify a very good corps of linebackers. Perkins was sensational in '91, picking off two passes, recording nine tackles for

losses and adding four sacks to his team high tackle mark. Perkins has been chosen as a 1992 pre-season first team All-American by the *Sporting News*. Returning sophomore Steve Russell will give help after recording 41 tackles in '91 and tying Perkins for the team lead in interceptions with two.

Veteran Steve Nagy and newcomer Mike Edwards both looked good in spring workouts and will make heavy contributions. Simmons can play both the down position and linebacker and should be an impact player in 1992.

Secondary

With the return of All-American Georj Lewis and PSAC West second team pick Mike Barnes, the Scots' defensive backfield returns plenty of experience. 1990 PSAC West Rookie of the Year Mario Houston will be at the other corner spot. Houston was in on 75 stops last year and led the team with 12 pass deflections.

Lewis was a third team choice by *Football Gazette* last year and has started 34 consecutive games at the corner. His 50 tackles also earned him a first-team spot on the PSAC West All-Star squad. Barnes, a free safety/linebacker with outstanding speed and toughness, was third on the squad in '91 with 83 tackles. Only linebackers Perkins and Joel Marratta (88) were in on more tackles than Barnes.

Backup quarterback Sean Seibert has the inside track at the vacant free safety spot, vacated by four-year starter Wade Smith. Mike White and a host of top caliber freshmen give Edinboro a great secondary in 1992.

Specialties

A pair of starters return in punter Gary Lhotsky and place-kicker Scott Rupert. Lhotsky earned second team PSAC West honors a year ago with his 38.1 yards per punt. His average was second best in the division and fifth overall in the state. Lhotsky has averaged just under 37 ypp over his two-year career.


Rupert, just a sophomore, had a solid freshman year in '91, finishing second on the team with 36 points. He was true on 5-of-7 field goal tries and converted 21 extra point attempts. A great all-around athlete, Rupert led the Scot baseball team last spring with a .398 batting average.

1991 Season in Review



Youngstown State 24 - Edinboro 0 (9/7/91)

A 12-play, 65-yard scoring drive capped by a Leo Hawkins 2-yard dive proved to be the added momentum to lift Youngstown State to a 24-0 shutout over the Scots before 13,556 fans at Stambaugh Stadium. This was YSU's first win on their way to the NCAA I-AA national title.

The Penguins' opening score came on a Jeff Wilkins 42-yard field goal with 10:56 to play in the first quarter. The 8-play, 18-yard drive was set up following an Edinboro fumble on the Scots' first possession.

Youngstown State's late second quarter score was fueled by an Edinboro personal foul on third down. Five plays later, Hawkins ran it in from the 2 to give the hosts a 10-0 halftime edge.

The Penguins took control of the game in the third quarter when they controlled the ball for nearly eleven minutes. The Scots could manage just 9 yards in 2 offensive series while YSU rushed for 90 yards on 18 carries in the third.

Following an exchange, QB Ray Isaac went in the end zone on a 3-yard keeper to cap a 9-play, 42-yard drive to make it 17-0. The final score of the game came in the fourth quarter when fullback Tamron Smith raced up the middle for an 8-yard score.

The contest marked the first shutout suffered by an Edinboro team since 1981, when the Scots were handed a 17-0 setback by Shipensburg.



Edinboro 25 - Northwood 14 (9/14/91)

Both teams battled the elements as Edinboro gained their first victory of the season downing first-time opponent Northwood Institute (MI) 25-14. Rain hampered the contest and downpours were common, causing a slick surface.

With a quick 7-0 lead, the Boro took advantage of a Northwood fumble on the ensuing kickoff and drove 34 yards for their second score, a 7-yard pass from Jody Dickerson to tight end Brian Heebsh. The extra point failed and the Plaid led 13-0.

After an exchange, Northwood used an interception to set up their first score. Three plays later Larry Williams ran 32 yards for a touchdown but the Scots countered with a 1-yard plunge from Derek Lewis for a 19-7 margin in the first quarter.

Then just before intermission Northmen QB Bobby Hicks found Williams for a 9-yard TD and the Plaid led by 5, 19-14, at the half.

After a scoreless third, Scot LB Jason Perkins came up with a big fumble recovery to set up another score. Edinboro then drove 37 yards, clinching the victory with Steve Clare's 1-yard run for the 25-14 margin.

Edinboro 35 - Southern Connecticut 16 (9/21/91)

On a day when area war veterans were saluted, the teams combined for 900 yards of total offense.

Freshman QB Jody Dickerson had a career day as Edinboro raced to an early 21-3 lead enroute to a 35-16 win. Dickerson completed 18 of 22 (82%) passes for 227 yards and 2 touchdowns and earned conference Player of the Week honors in the western division.

Lester Frye started the scoring parade with a 24-yard scamper then added a second score just three minutes later from the 4 to give the Fighting Scots a 14-0 advantage.

SCSU got on the board at the 5:45 mark of the first period with a 20-yard field goal by Paul Bolanger. Edinboro closed out the first quarter with an 8-yard TD scamper around the right side by Derek Lewis to give the Plaid a 21-3 first quarter margin.

The Scots then found the end zone late in the first half when Dickerson connected with Wrentie Martin for a 15-yard scoring strike to send the Boro into intermission with a 28-3 halftime lead.

After a third quarter dominated by the respective defenses, the Owls put together an early fourth quarter comeback run with 2 touchdowns to put a scare into the big crowd. Owl QB Joe Stochmal hit Adrian Webber for a 42-yard TD and 2 minutes later took a keeper up the middle for a 6-yard touchdown. The Owl scores cut the Boro lead to 28-16.

The Scots put the game away at the 5:52 mark when Martin caught his second touchdown pass, a 24-yard toss from Dickerson.

Edinboro 23 - Bloomsburg 21 (9/28/91 - Homecoming)


If last week was a scare to the Boro fans then week #4 against the Huskies was nearly a disaster. After building a commanding 23-9 lead over Bloomsburg in the Homecoming clash, the Boro held on at the end when linebacker Joel Marratta sacked Huskie QB Rod Becker on a 2-point conversion try late in the fourth quarter to preserve a 23-21 victory. Bloomsburg has pulled within 2 points with just under 2 minutes to play on a 1-yard quarterback sneak by Becker. The potential game tying score came after Dominic DePiano blocked a Gary Lhotsky punt, giving Bloomsburg possession at the Edinboro 30-yard line.

The Huskies opened the scoring, in front of 8,000+ fans, on their first possession when Becker connected with Tom Pajic from 3 yards out. A 61-yard connection to Jerry Marks keyed the 80-yard march. After an exchange, a Joel Marratta interception set up the Scots first score. Two plays later, a 42-yard bomb from Jody Dickerson to Lateef Walters tied the score at 7 apiece.

After a safety gave Bloomsburg a 9-7 edge, Edinboro's Scott Rupert booted a 26 yarder for a 10-9 advantage. Lester Frye then added 2 short second quarter touchdown runs to give the Scots a 23-9 halftime lead. Frye scored on runs of 1 and 3 yards.

The Huskies made their move in the fourth when Becker hit Pajic for his second TD reception of the game. The point conversion attempt failed as Edinboro held on to a 23-15 lead.

Bloomsburg's final score, which cut the Scot lead to 2, came on a Becker quarterback sneak with just 1:46 to play. But Marratta turned in the conference's Play of the Week to secure the Scots hard fought win.



Edinboro 17 - Clarion 9 (10/5/91)

Edinboro's defense, once again led by linebackers Joel Marratta and Jason Perkins, put forth a stellar performance as the Scots won their fourth game in a row.

Jody Dickerson got the Plaid on the board early with a 2-yard TD run for a 7-0 advantage. The rest of the first half was dominated by the defenses of both teams as there was only 6 more points scored.

Scott Rupert connected on a 30-yard field goal with 7:07 to play in the half to put the Scots up by 10. Clarion's first points of the game came on the final play of the half. Paul Cramer drilled a 27 yarder with no time showing to cut the Boro margin to 10-7 at intermission.

In the third quarter, the Boro's Derrick Russell busted through the line for a 2-yard TD with 6:15 left to put the Boro ahead 17-9. The Plaid defense continued to halt the Clarion offense pressuring the Golden Eagles into a 15-for-44 passing day.

Clarion found the end zone at the 5:59 mark of the final period when Tim Smith took in a 32-yard strike from quarterback Tim Myers. The extra point kick failed leaving the Boro with an 8 point advantage. The Golden Eagles had one final shot after forcing the Boro to punt with just over 4 minutes to play but had to start in the hole as punter Gary Lhotsky placed his 33-yard boot out of bounds at Clarion's 12-yard line. Clarion fell short as Myers' fourth down pass fell incomplete. Edinboro upped its record to 4-1.



Edinboro 28 - Lock Haven 12 (10/12/91)

Lester Frye scored 4 touchdowns, 1 in each quarter, to lead the Scots to their fifth consecutive victory and second in the western division with a 28-12 win over the Bald Eagles. The junior tailback scored on runs of 11, 3, 27, and 17 along with a 2-point conversion accounting for 26 of the Boro's 28 points.


Frye capped an 80-yard drive with his first score but Lock Haven answered with a 63-yard drive resulting in a Rich Marriot 23-yard field goal. The Bald Eagles struck once more on their next possession with another Marriot field goal to cut the Boro lead to 7-6.


Edinboro closed out the first half at the 5:29 mark with Frye going untouched up the middle for a 3-yard score to give the Plaid a 14-6 edge. QB Sean Seibert keyed the drive with first down completions to Lateef Walters and Wrentie Martin.

The third period marked the fifth straight game in which an Edinboro opponent did not score. The only points scored on the Scots in the third quarter to date came at Youngstown State.

The Scots iced the game with 11:36 to play on Frye's fourth TD. The play saw Frye hit immediately in the backfield, but he spun away and scampered 17 yards for the game clincher.

Lock Haven's lone touchdown came with a 1-yard plunge by running back Afiba Fairnot with 8:09 left in the game. The 2-point conversion try failed making the final score 28-12. The Plaid now stood at 5-1 and 2-0.





Shippensburg 45 - Edinboro 7 (10/19/91)

In a battle of 2 of the top teams in the NCAA East Region, Shippensburg's Winston Horshaw took the game's opening kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown and the Raiders never looked back in a 45-7 rout over Edinboro.

After the quick score it appeared to be a great game as Edinboro struck back just 43 seconds later on a 7-yard scamper up the middle by Lester Frye to knot the score.

Shippensburg's second score of the game was set up after EUs Frye couldn't handle a toss from quarterback Jody Dickerson. Five plays later, Shippensburg quarterback Brian Gilbert connected with Ted Pribula for a 15-yard scoring strike to give SU a 14-7 lead.

The Scots continued to be plagued by special team miscues as the ensuing kickoff was never fielded and Shippensburg recovered deep in Scot territory. The Red Raiders capitalized on fourth and goal at the 1 when Bill Pettyjohn plunged over to give SU a 21-7 lead with 3:12 remaining in the

first quarter. The final score of the half was a Howie Guarini field goal of 37 yards to give the Red Raiders a 24-7 halftime lead.

Edinboro looked to make their move in the third as Larry Jackson took the second half kickoff 38 yards but the Fighting Scots' drive stalled when Frye was stopped on fourth down.

Shippensburg's QB Gilbert then found Pribula open for a 15-yard scoring toss and the rout was on. It was the third time where the Red Raiders would turn Edinboro turnovers into touchdowns.

SU added two more late scores, including a TD with just 11 seconds remaining, to make the final 45-7.



Edinboro 45 - California 10 (10/26/91)

The Fighting Scots raced out to an early lead and Lester Frye rushed for 148 yards, including a school record 99-yard touchdown, to get the Scots back on the winning track.

Edinboro found the end zone twice in the game's opening 3 minutes as Jody Dickerson hit Wrentie Martin for a 27-yard touchdown after a Larry Jackson 62-yard kickoff return. After a Cal fumble, Dickerson found Frye open for a 14-yard scoring toss.

After an exchange of field goals made the score 17-3 early in the second period, the Vulcans scored their lone TD of the game on one of the wildest plays of the year. A Scott Rupert 25-yard field goal was blocked by Tracey Latham and an unidentified Cal player picked it up and was hit immediately. The ball was jarred loose right into the hands of a streaking Vince DeVino who took the ball up the sideline 68 yards for the score.

Frye's record breaking run was next on the agenda. He took a Jody

Dickerson pitch deep in the Scot end zone, got a nice block from WR Martin, and broke to the near sideline for the 99-yard scoring run. Dickerson then gave the Plaid a 31-10 halftime advantage after he took in a 10-yard keeper around the right side.

The Scots put the game away in the third, adding 2 more scores, a 15-yard toss from Dickerson to tight end Brian Heebsh and a 6-yard run by Larry Jackson.

Slippery Rock 7 - Edinboro 0 (11/2/91)

The Boro's national playoff hopes were drastically decreased in a 7-0 loss at Slippery Rock. The only score of the game came on a John Linhaut pass to Rob Henne of 9 yards with 2:29 to play in the first half.

The story of the game was turnovers as Edinboro had 4, including 2 lost fumbles and 2 interceptions, while the Rock had no miscues. The most crucial turnover came with just 4:40 to play with Edinboro driving in Slippery Rock territory. On a third and 8 at the SRU 22, Edinboro quarterback Jody Dickerson attempted a quick slant pass to Wrentie Martin but the attempt was picked off by SRs All-American defensive back Terry Robinson and the Boro's shot at a third consecutive trip to the national playoffs was lost for good.

Robinson not only had the game saving interception but he also added another late interception with just over a minute to play. On a third and 10 from the EU 33 Dickerson's desperation attempt was intercepted and ended

any comeback hopes for the Boro. The Scots were just out gained in total yards by 241-260. Several key penalties along with 4 turnovers slowed the Scots throughout the afternoon. The Plaid was penalized 7 times for 65 yards.

IUP 20 - Edinboro 17 (11/9/91)

IUP quarterback Tony Alucci threw 2 second quarter touchdown passes and tailback Michael Mann rushed for 214 yards to lead the top ranked Indians to a 20-17 victory over the Scots at Sox Harrison Stadium. Indiana scored on the game's opening drive when Jay Murray went in over the top from 1 yard out to give the visitors a 6-0 lead.

The Fighting Scots charged back as Derrick Russell went untouched from 9 yards out and Scott Rupert added the PAT to give the Plaid a 7-6 lead. Edinboro's next scoring drive came after defensive back Georj Lewis recovered a Michael Mann fumble. The Plaid answered with an impressive drive covering 90 yards. Russell capped it off from the 1 to give the Scots a 14-6 lead.

The Indians stormed back with 2 scores, one a 3-yard pass from Alucci to Johnny White to cut the Scot lead to 14-12. Then Alucci found Theo Turner from 14 out to give the Indians a 20-14 lead.

The Scots threatened but the drive ended at Indiana's 11-yard line. Scott Rupert's 28-yard field goal split the uprights cutting the Indiana lead to 20-17 with just over 11 minutes left but the Indians controlled the clock with Mann on the ground to remain unbeaten and number one in the country.



Edinboro 31 - Fairmont State 21 (11/16/91)


Jody Dickerson scored on an 18-yard scramble to give the Scots a 7-0 lead at the 9:11 mark of the first period for the only score of the initial period. Dickerson then hit Lateef Walters from 7 yards out and the Fighting Scots took advantage of a fumble to add another score, a 7-yard run by Larry Jackson, to take a commanding 20-0 second quarter lead.

FSC got on the board late in the first half when Figueroa hit Ed Hodgkiss on third and goal for a 6-yard TD but the Boro took a 20-7 lead into the half.

The Boro seemingly put the game away early in the third when Tom Tedder went in from 1 yard out making it 28-7, but the Falcons would rally for 2 straight scores to narrow the Boro margin to 7.

FSC's Bryan Wilson then made a spectacular catch with just 13 seconds to play in the third for a 16-yard TD reception that cut the lead to 14. After an Edinboro punt, the Falcons came storming right back on a 37-yard bomb from Figueroa to Eric Ritz. The extra point put the game at 28-21 with 12 minutes to play.

Edinboro then mounted a drive that led to a Scott Rupert 35-yard field goal giving the Scots breathing room with a 31-21 lead with just over 7 minutes to play.


