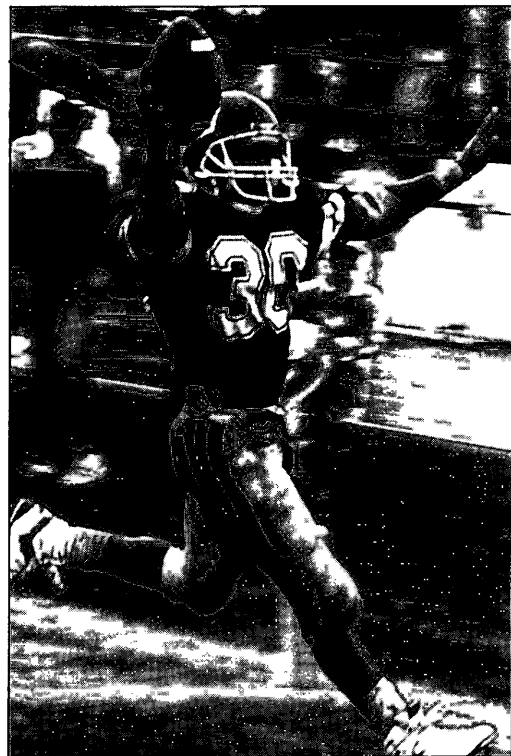

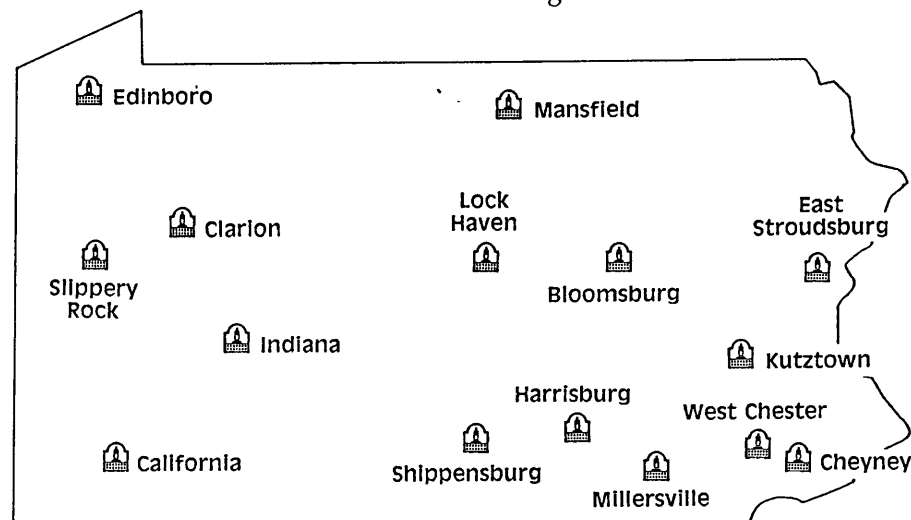

The State System of Higher Education



Chancellor James H. McCormick

- ✓ The state universities spent the first 100 years of existence training teachers for Pennsylvania's schools. The Normal School Act of 1857 established regional teacher training institutions throughout the Commonwealth. The School Code of 1911 called for the state purchase of all normal schools, and by 1921 the present configuration of 14 state-owned universities was established. The 14 normal schools evolved from state normal schools, to state teachers colleges, to state colleges. On November 12, 1982, Act 188 was signed into law establishing on July 1, 1993 the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. Thus, the 13 former state colleges joined with Indiana University of Pennsylvania to achieve university status. The universities have a cumulative history of 1,600 years.
- ✓ There are 14 universities in the State System of Higher Education with three branch campuses and the McKeever Environmental Center.
- ✓ The total student population among the System universities is 99,850. While 86% of students are from Pennsylvania, they represent many other states and foreign countries.



- ✓ The total university campus has over 4,000 acres in 19 Pennsylvania counties. Buildings for classrooms, residences, administration and student support number 719.
- ✓ Collectively the 14 universities offer 225 undergraduate and 98 graduate degree programs, led by 5,500 full-time faculty members.
- ✓ An average 75% of undergraduate students receive some form of financial assistance to help meet costs.
- ✓ Several study abroad programs are available in System universities. System universities are part of the Pennsylvania Council for International Education.
- ✓ All the universities support life-long learning programs throughout the academic year. Many feature Elderhostel.
- ✓ Most universities have honors programs, student counseling and career planning, cooperative education, and internship programs.
- ✓ System library holdings total more than 5.4 million volumes and 3.5 million periodicals, microforms, and audio materials.
- ✓ The universities in the State System of Higher Education are fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and several appropriate national professional organizations.
- ✓ System graduates living in the Commonwealth number over 271,000.

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania

- ✓ Founded in 1857 as a private academy
- ✓ Previously named Edinboro Academy, Edinboro Normal School, Edinboro State Teachers College, and Edinboro State College
- ✓ The second normal school established in Pennsylvania and the twelfth in the U.S.

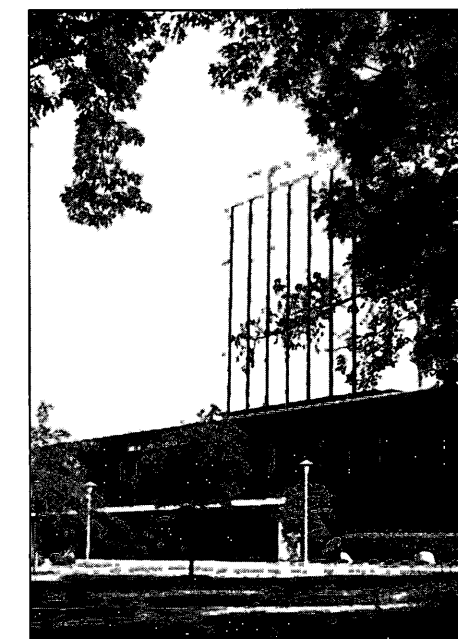

President Foster F. Diebold



Foster F. Diebold

Now in his fourteenth year as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, Foster F. Diebold is the fourteenth chief executive officer of the institution of higher learning that has come to acclaim in the last decade as one of Pennsylvania's and the nation's finest. He has brought a vigorous educational and moral leadership, a strengthening of the spirit of community, a clear sense of direction and purpose, and a dimension of multicultural pluralism and diversity.

Much has been accomplished during President Diebold's tenure. The University has returned to financial health. Significant facilities and grounds improvements have been achieved, with several of the historic structures on campus restored to their original splendor. Academic programs have been emphasized and improved, with more than 100 degree offerings now available. Enrollment gains have been unprecedented in both numbers and academic quality. International linkages have been established with institutions in several other countries, and Edinboro University's program for students with disabilities continues to garner acclaim as one of the finest among all colleges and universities in the United States. Widely recognized as a leader in education both here and abroad, President Diebold has posi-

tioned Edinboro University to meet the challenges of the 1990s, as well as those that will face public higher education in the 21st century.

The Orange, New Jersey, native is a graduate of Monmouth College and also holds a master of arts in educational administration from Seton Hall University. He has met coursework requirements for a doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently completing the dissertation requirement for the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency of Edinboro University, President Diebold was president of the University of Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Before that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey and a member of the graduate faculty at that institution; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township (New Jersey) Public Schools.

Recognized for his extensive experience in the field of education management, President Diebold's scholarly achievements in the discipline of applied ethics in higher education deserve special mention. The model statement he authored for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, "Ethical Practices for College Presidents," was unanimously adopted by that professional organization and published as policy for the chief executives of its nearly 400 member institutions nationwide. It is the first formally adopted ethical practices and policy statement for higher education presidents.

For his leadership on an international scale and for his many contributions to the advancement of higher education and enrichment of an

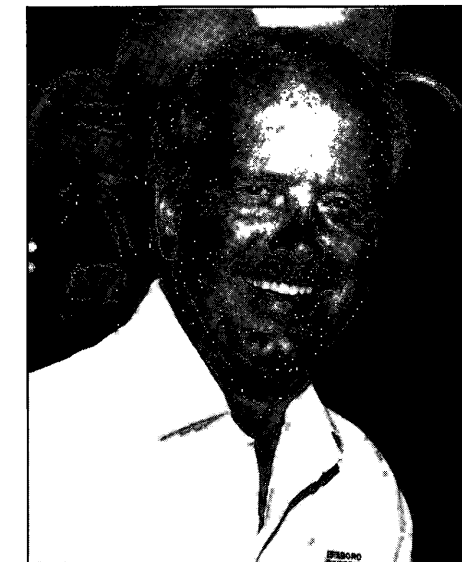
emerging culture in Pakistan, President Diebold was decorated with prestigious gold medals from three Pakistani universities. The awards for educational eminence were presented during visits to the Edinboro campus by official Pakistani delegations.

President Diebold was also honored by the Government of Pakistan with the awarding of the degree of Doctor of Laws (*honoris causa*), presented at the Government House in the City of Karachi. The ceremony was attended by the presidents of the several Pakistani universities holding linkage agreements with Edinboro University, as well as many high-ranking officials of the Government of Pakistan and U.S. diplomatic officials.

A recently bestowed honor was President Diebold's appointment to the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, the leading national, non-partisan, public affairs organization devoted to building constructive and durable relationships between the two countries. The appointment recognized his insight into the Chinese people and his experience with the academic linkage agreement he established with Zibo College in China's Shandong Province. Students and scholars have been at Edinboro University under terms of the formal linkage agreement since the 1986-87 academic year.

A staunch advocate of a statewide system of public universities in Pennsylvania, President Diebold supported the enabling legislation for the State System of Higher Education (Act 188 of 1982) and saw the State System come to existence in 1983 as a member of the transition team. He currently serves on the System's Executive Council of Presidents and on the boards of the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, and the Dixon University Center at Harrisburg.

Athletic Director James K. McDonald

Edinboro University's athletic program was placed under the talented and aggressive leadership of Jim McDonald in July of 1981. Increased emphasis on fund raising to provide a sound scholarship foundation has become his top priority while numerous changes and innovations have also keyed the Scots' athletic program under his direction.

Through his efforts more than \$5 million has been raised during the past twelve years. The funds generated by the energetic athletic director's efforts will be used to assist Edinboro's men and women athletes who compete in the Scots sixteen intercollegiate sports.

In addition to maintaining Edinboro's respected winning tradition in intercollegiate athletics, the former health and physical education professor has vastly expanded the University's summer activities.

Sixty camps were sponsored by the Fighting Scots Booster Club this past summer on the University's campus. Sox Harrison Stadium was the site for the Buffalo Bills-Pittsburgh Steelers first scrimmage, an event the veteran athletic director hopes to bring back to the area each year.

The personable athletic director also introduced Edinboro's Hall of Fame program which has evolved into an annual year-ending event to honor present and past athletes.

McDonald has been at Edinboro since 1962 and for 12 years served as the Fighting Scot basketball coach (1962-1975) and never experienced a losing season while his teams compiled an impressive 181 wins against only 89 losses. During that span, his cagers won four Western Division Pennsylvania Conference crowns, the PC state championship and two Dis-

trict 18 titles that netted trips to the NAIA National Tournament. His teams set 27 University records and made 19 post-season appearances while four of his players were named All-Americans.

Prior to accepting his position at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant basketball coach in Erie, Pa. He is a 1956 graduate of Bridgeport High School in his home town of Bridgeport, West Virginia.

In 1960 he received a degree in chemistry and physical education from West Virginia Wesleyan College and he also holds a master's degree in health from the University of Buffalo.

As an undergraduate, he set nine school records at Wesleyan and was twice voted both AP and UPI basketball All-American. In 1960, he was the second leading scorer in the United States, averaging slightly over 33 points a game, and led his team to the national basketball tournament in Kansas City, Missouri. He was named to the NAIA's All-Tournament Team in 1959 and 1960.

In 1966, McDonald was selected Area Eight Coach of the Year by the eastern seaboard coaches and that same year was honored as one of the top ten finalists in the Coach of the Year national poll. McDonald's honors also include selection to the West Virginia All-Time College Basketball Team and membership in the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

As a resident of Edinboro, McDonald has a record of extensive community involvement. He was Little League Baseball director for four years and also held a four-year post as a member of the General McLane School Board. He and his wife, Mary Lou, have three sons - Mark, Mike and Matthew.

Head Coach Tom Hollman

In January 1988, Edinboro University hired Tom Hollman, Athens, Ohio, as its eleventh head football coach in the school's history. Hollman came to Edinboro from Ohio University, where he was the defensive coordinator.

Hollman, beginning his sixth year, has the Scot program back in the national spotlight. At Edinboro, he has earned 37 wins against just 16 losses and two ties and owns an impressive 22-6-2 slate against the PSAC Western Division. The Scots have advanced to post-season play three of the past five years.

In 1989, he was named the top coach in the East Region by the National Football Coaches Association and also tabbed the top coach in the PSAC West. In 1990, he guided the Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro routed Virginia Union and advanced to the national quarterfinals.

"Edinboro has been a great experience, and I like the direction of the program," Hollman said.

"As a coach, I have been fortunate to coach at many different levels, from high school to Division I. The Division II level here at Edinboro is very appealing to me in relation to my career goals. It is a great feeling to be a head coach at this level."

Hollman's educational background begins with a high school diploma from Memorial High School in St. Mary's, Ohio, followed by his undergraduate degree in education from Ohio Northern University in 1968. Three years later Hollman received his master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio.

While at Ohio Northern, Hollman was a three-year starter for the football team and a two-year performer as a defensive back and offensive end during his junior and senior years. He holds the school record

with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years during his stay at Ohio Northern.

A chronological look at Hollman's coaching career begins in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. From there, Hollman moved on to Greenville High School in Ohio where he became head coach from 1971-73. His Greenville squads posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark during his three-year stay.

Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974 and 1975 seasons, where his squad recorded 15 wins against three setbacks and two ties. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in 1974, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In 1976, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University.

The following year, Hollman accepted the head coach position at Wooster College (OH) and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school history (24-11-1).

In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the 1984 campaign. Then, beginning in 1985 Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University.

"It has been a very comfortable transition for me," Hollman added. "I have found the community to be supportive and the administration is giving me every opportunity to be successful here at Edinboro," he concluded.

Tom resides in Edinboro with his wife, Kandi, and four children, Mari, Jon, Tim and Denise.

Assistant Coaches

Scott Browning – Secondary

Moving to the defensive side of the ball, from the offensive backfield, Scott brings a wealth of coaching experience in his eighth year at the 'Boro. Under his guidance the Scot defense has intercepted 78 passes the past five seasons. He has guided the fortunes of All-Americans Michael Willis, Wade Smith, Georj Lewis, and Mike Barnes, and PSAC Rookie of the Year Mario Houston. Offensively, he coached former greats Floyd Faulkner and Ross Rankin.

Scott came to Edinboro from Ohio State University, where he coached receivers and running backs. Prior to his start at OSU, Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview high schools in Ohio, from 1979-81. Then, as a

graduate assistant, he coached the defensive secondary at New Mexico State in 1982.

In 1983, he mentored the receivers at Idaho State University which advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs.

Browning earned a master's degree in education administration from New Mexico State in 1983, and a BS in education from Ohio State in 1981. Earlier, before transferring to OSU, Scott attended Capital University where he played football for one season. Browning was a four-year letterman in four sports at Loudenville High School (OH) prior to his collegiate days. Scott is married to the former Lynn Hook and resides in Edinboro.



Dan Gierlak – Running Backs

Dan Gierlak enters his seventh season as a full-time coach with his responsibilities concerning the running backs. He is also the head women's softball coach for the Scots and led the squad to the PSAC playoffs in 1990.

Gierlak came to the 'Boro from Thiel College (Pa.) where he coached the defensive secondary for the 1984 season. Dan, a starter and three-year letterwinner for the Plaid in the secondary, moved on to the semi-pro ranks with the Chicago Cowboys. During his short stint with the Cowboys, Gierlak's squad gained national championship honors in 1984 and run-

ner up nationally in the 1985 season. Gierlak brings both playing and coaching experience to the staff, giving the Scot players an added plus on the offensive side of the ball. As backfield coach, he has guided former Harlon Hill finalist Elbert Cole and Boro All-Americans Lester Frye and Larry Jackson.

Originally from Buffalo, New York, Dan graduated from Edinboro with a degree in health and physical education. He and his wife, the former Amy Adams and two-year-old daughter, Alexandria Alicia, reside in Edinboro.



Mark Niswonger – Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

Mark Niswonger, a veteran of the coaching ranks for 20 years, begins his sixth year with the Plaid as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. Former understudy of head coach Tom Hollman at Greenville High School, Mark brings extensive experience both on and off the field to the Scot coaching staff. He has helped mold the Scot defense into one of the most respected squads in the country over the past five years.

His coaching stint began back while attending Findlay when he was the head scout for Arlington High School. His first job after college was as defensive coordinator for Bryan High School (OH) where the team earned a 9-1 record. The next two seasons, Niswonger was the defensive coordinator at West Carrollton High School (OH) where his squad posted an impressive 17-1-2 slate.

After West Carrollton, he then returned to graduate school at Ball State University where he helped coach the tight ends and offensive linemen.

From 1981-84, Niswonger was the head coach at Franklin City schools and was named "coach of the year" in 1982 when his squad won its first league championship in 18 years. He then moved on to the collegiate ranks in 1984 at Manchester College as defensive coordinator and then back to his alma mater from 85-87 as their secondary coach.

Niswonger's education includes an undergraduate degree in physical education and political science from Findlay and a MA in physical education from Ball State. Mark and his wife Patty and two-year-old daughter, Megan Marie, and eight-month-old son, Joushua Jay, reside in Edinboro.

Gene Smith – Defensive Line

Gene Smith will enter his sixth year directing the Scot defensive line. The Scots defensive line has ranked nationally in the NCAA top ten the last five seasons in rushing defense. He aided in the development of Scot All-Americans Jeff Jacobs, John Messura, and Anthony Ross.

Smith also has past association with Coach Hollman as he was a graduate assistant working with the defensive line under Hollman at Ohio University. The following season with the Bobcats, Smith moved to the offensive side of the ball as tight end/tackle coach for OU. He also worked extensively with the weight train-

ing program as a strength coach. Gene is both the coordinator of recruiting and strength and conditioning for the Scot football squad.

As a player, he enjoyed an outstanding career at Heidelberg College. Smith captained Heidelberg his senior season. He obtained his BS degree in education during his undergraduate years and later completed his MS in athletic administration from Ohio University. Smith has completed post-graduate hours.

Smith, originally from Monroeville, Ohio, resides in Edinboro.



Ed Stults – Offensive Line

Ed Stults enters his fifth year directing the Scot offensive line. In his initial year with Edinboro, Stults organized an offensive front that was one of the best in the country. He directed the fortunes of five All-Americans including Scot first-teamer Curtis Rose, Scott Nickel, Mike Kegarise, and Joe Brooks. Rose signed a free agent contract with the Miami Dolphins of the National Football League.

He brings over 11 years of coaching experience to the Scot linemen. He began his coaching career at his alma mater,

Bluffton College, in 1981 directing the linebackers. Later on in his coaching stint he turned his attention to the offensive line. He played linebacker at Bluffton from 1976-79 and he graduated in 1980 with a BA in education.

After his coaching tenure at Bluffton that spanned 1981-87, Stults took the offensive line duties at the University of Cincinnati in 1988.

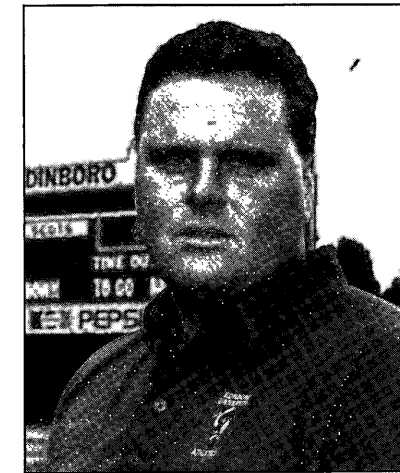
Stults, his wife, Pamela, and one-year-old daughter, Libby, reside in Edinboro.

Edinboro 35 – Buffalo 13 (9/5/92)

Defensive end Devas Simmons forced a Bull fumble and pounced on it in the end zone early in the second quarter to break open a close game and lift the Scots to their first win of the season.

Sophomore tailback Larry Jackson broke onto the scene in a big way, coming off the bench to rush for a season high 207 yards and three touchdowns. Jackson was named PSAC West "Player of the Week" after scoring on runs of 30, 16 and eight yards.

The first quarter was explosive, as the teams traded touchdowns, with the Boro posting a 14-13 lead after one period. The Scots got on the board first when Jody Dickerson sneaked in from two yards out. The Bulls came right back, and when quarterback Cliff Scott found Doc Smith from 37 yards out, the score was tied at seven. That touchdown reception, coincidentally, would be the longest the Scots would relinquish on the season.

Jackson broke off his 30 yarder with just four minutes remaining in the opening frame, but Scott countered with a one-yard plunge to close the quarter.

After Simmons turned in his huge defensive play, the Scots added two third-quarter touchdowns, both coming on Jackson runs. The Boro defense dominated all day, holding the Bulls to just 127 total yards.



Edinboro 37 – Northwood Institute 13 (9/12/92)

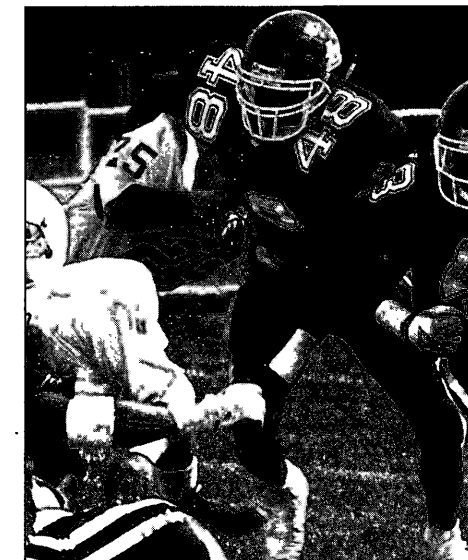
Edinboro posted the first seven scores of the game and Scott Rupert drilled three field goals as the Scots built a 24-0 halftime lead and cruised to the win.

After a quick 3-0 lead, Larry Jackson broke off the first of his three touchdown runs, a 54 yarder, to stake the Scots to a 10-0 lead after the first quarter. At the start of the second, Jackson was at it again, this time hitting paydirt from three yards out. Rupert's PAT gave the Plaid a 17-0 advantage.

Still before intermission, Scot tailback Derrick Russell punched it in from two yards away upping the Boro advantage to a comfortable 24 points at the half.

Any hopes of a Northmen comeback were dashed when quarterback Jim Kurlinski fumbled on Northwood's first play of the third quarter. Bryant Harper jumped on the fumble and on Edinboro's first offensive play of the second half, Jackson broke off the right side for 33 yards and his third touchdown. The run capped a 17 carry, 144-yard performance, once again earning Jackson "Player of the Week" honors.

Rupert added two field goals in the third quarter to stake Edinboro to a 37-0 lead.



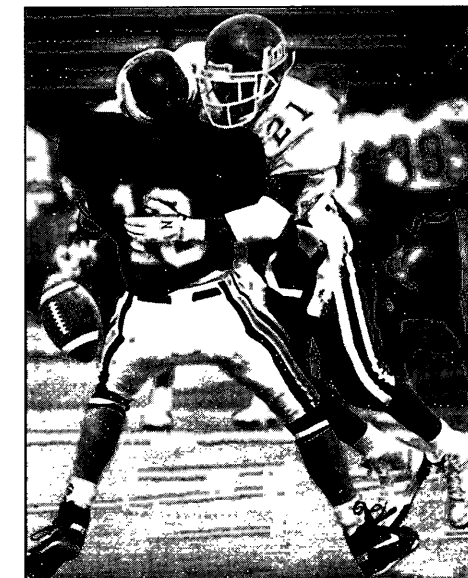
Edinboro 41 – Southern Connecticut 0 (9/19/92)

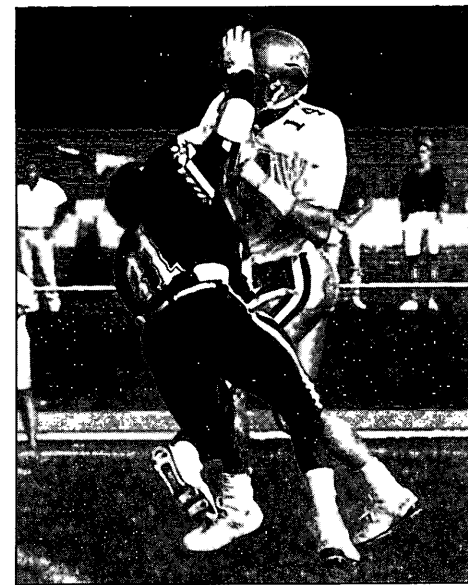
In a truly dominating performance, the Edinboro defense held the Owls to 179 yards of total offense and forced three turnovers. Meanwhile the offense rolled to 446 yards of its own as the Boro posted its first shutout since the 1989 season.

Quarterback Jody Dickerson continued his mastery over the SCSU secondary, completing 10 of 17 passes for 196 yards and two scores, one each to Dave Ashton and Wren-tie Martin. In two career games against the Owls, Dickerson completed 72 percent of his passes (28 of 39) for better than 425 yards and four touchdowns.

Right from the outset, Edinboro dictated the tempo, as Larry Jackson returned the opening kickoff 67 yards to the Owl 23. Four plays later, Jackson was in the end zone and the Scots were off and running. The Plaid added three more touchdowns before the intermission, two coming on short touchdown runs by fullback Tom Tedder.

The defense played perhaps its most impressive game of the season, limiting the Owls to just 52 yards on the ground and forcing five Southern fumbles. All-American linebacker Jason Perkins led the way, recording 11 total tackles, ensuring Edinboro would enter the conference schedule unbeaten for the first time in nearly a decade.





Edinboro 26 – Clarion 17 (10/3/92)

In a furious comeback, the Scots scored three times in the game's final 12 minutes to overcome a 17-7 deficit and post their fourth straight win.

After a Damien Henry four-yard plunge with just seconds remaining in the third quarter gave the Golden Eagles a ten-point advantage, Edinboro came to life offensively. Larry Jackson pulled the Plaid to within 17-13 on a one-yard run with 12 minutes left. The game remained scoreless for the next eight minutes until Wrentie Martin capped an 88-yard, 11-play drive with a 27-yard touchdown reception from Jody Dickerson with just 4:27 remaining. Scott Rupert added the extra point and the Boro led 20-17.

The defense, which held the Eagles scoreless over the final 15 minutes, came up big when cornerback Mario Houston broke up a Tim Myers fourth down attempt from the Clarion 25-yard line.

Derrick Russell burst off the right side two plays later from 23 yards out to ice the game.

Jackson was named "Player of the Week" for the third time in four weeks after rushing for 177 yards on 22 carries, and the Boro moved from #7 to #6 in the NCAA Division II poll.



Edinboro 38 – Lock Haven 10 (10/10/92)

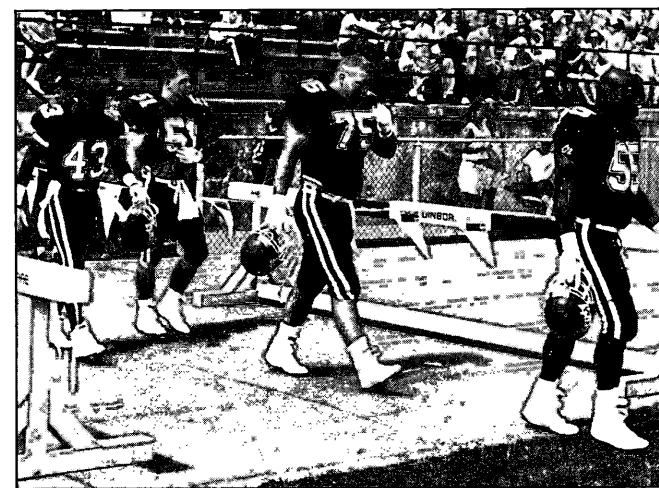
Edinboro jumped out to a 20-0 halftime lead and the defense recorded a pair of fourth quarter safeties to spoil the Bald Eagles' homecoming as the Boro coasted to its fifth win in as many tries.

Larry Jackson initiated the scoring on Edinboro's opening possession, converting an option pitch from Jody Dickerson into a 24-yard touchdown. Scott Rupert's PAT staked the Scots to a 7-0 first quarter lead.

After exchanging several possessions, the Plaid again crossed the goal line in the second quarter, when Dickerson found tight end Brian Heebsh over the middle at the Eagle 25 yard line. Heebsh did the rest, lumbering into the end zone for a two touchdown lead. Both players enjoyed big days, as Dickerson completed 11 of 19 passes for 231 yards and Heebsh hauled in a pair of passes for 72 yards. Before the end of the half, Jackson scored again, this time from two yards out.

To open the second half, the Bald Eagles cut the lead to 20-10 when Kevin Brown ran in from 16 yards away. But two fourth quarter touchdowns, a two-yard run from Jackson and a one yarder by Derrick Rus-

sell, as well as the two safeties pushed the final margin of victory to 38-10.



Edinboro 47 – Shippensburg 3 (10/17/92)

The Scots turned the tables on the Raiders to avenge a 45-7 loss a year earlier by romping past Shippensburg in front of 3,469 spectators at Sox Harrison Stadium.

Edinboro scored early and often, racing to a 27-3 halftime lead on the strength of two Larry Jackson TD runs and an 85-yard interception return by safety Steve Russell. For the afternoon, Jackson finished with 93 yards on 21 carries and the defense held Shipp to just 11 first downs and 35 rushing yards.

Jackson opened the scoring early in the first quarter, punching it in from nine yards out, and later added a one yarder. Sandwiched in between was a one-yard burst by Derrick Russell, who finished with 83 yards on the ground, at the beginning of the second quarter. Derrick's brother, Steve, put the game out of reach before halftime with his first career touchdown.

Derrick would later add another score, on a 15-yard reception

from Jody Dickerson, and fullback Chris Snyder (one-yard run) and tight end Greg Jackson (three-yard reception) each picked up their initial scores of the season, in moving the Scots to 6-0.

Edinboro 33 – California 13 (10/24/92)

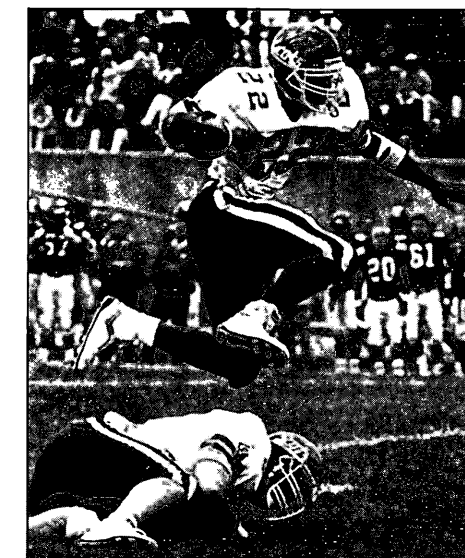
Edinboro continued to roll, moving to 7-0 for the first time since 1982 and achieving its highest-ever national ranking (#3) after whipping host California in a driving wind and rain.

Just before the close of the opening frame, Larry Jackson broke loose on a 61-yard touchdown, capping a four-play, 70-yard drive to give the Boro an early 7-0 lead. California countered, however, tying the score on a four-yard Scott Hoover run midway through the second quarter.

The Scots would rebound by posting the next five scores, the first of those coming just over a minute later when Boro defensive end Russell Cray picked off a Dan Pifer pass and raced 31 yards for the touchdown. Freshman placekicker Mike Joyce added a 30-yard field goal as time expired to give the Plaid a 10-point halftime bulge.

Joyce would add another field goal in the third quarter, this one from 21 yards out, after a Jackson 23-yard scamper. Edinboro completed its scoring when Jackson converted a swing pass from Jody Dickerson into a 40-yard touchdown.

Cal's Hoover added a late touchdown, to make the final score 33-13.



Slippery Rock 10 – Edinboro 7 (10/31/92)

Pete Banaszak's 30-yard field goal with nine minutes remaining provided the margin of victory, as Slippery Rock ended Edinboro's hopes of an undefeated season with the 10-7 win.

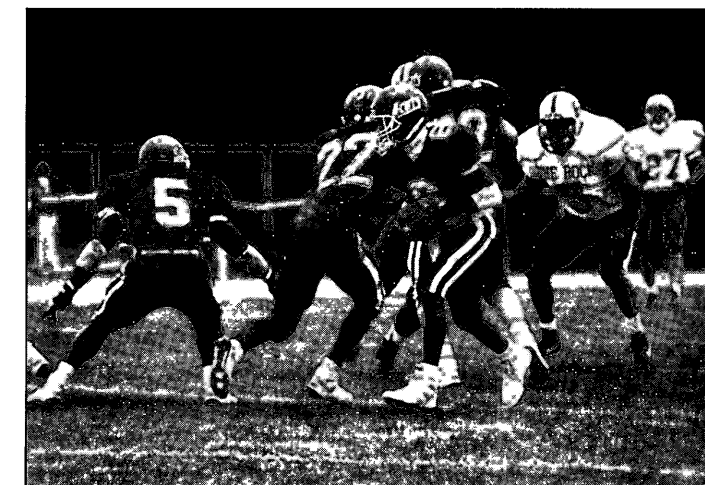
In what truly was a defensive struggle, the Rocket defense was outstanding, holding the Scots to just 269 yards of total offense, including just 72 on the ground, and limiting the conference's top rusher, Larry Jackson, to just 54 yards on 21 carries.

The Rock got on top just before intermission when Greg Hopkins hauled in a nine-yard touchdown pass from John Linhart. Banaszak's PAT gave SRU a 7-0 halftime lead.

The score remained that way until less than a minute remained in the third quarter when Jody Dickerson capped a 96-yard, 17-play drive with a four-yard plunge and Mike Joyce added the extra point to knot the score at seven.

Banaszak's game winner was set up by a Tony Robinson interception deep in Scot territory that he returned to the Boro 19. Robinson's interception was the fifth turnover forced by the Rockets and the second interception of a Jody Dickerson pass.

After the field goal, Edinboro could get no closer than their own 32-yard line, dropping to 7-1 on the year and to #17 in the national poll.



Edinboro 21 – IUP 21 (11/7/92)

In a game that pitted two top 20 teams and another classic in this fierce rivalry, Derrick Smith scored with just 26 seconds remaining on a 16-yard pass from Scott Woods and Mike Geary added the PAT to get the tie for the Indians in front of 7,600 fans at IUP's Miller Stadium.

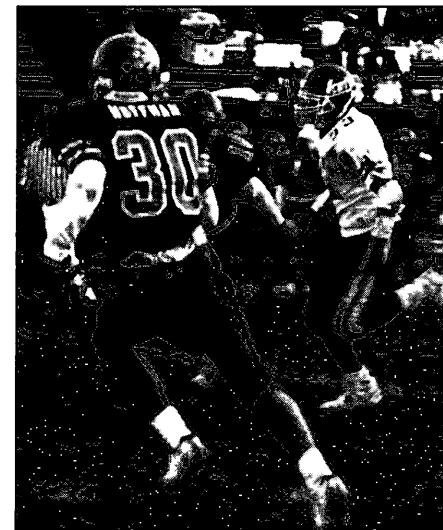
IUP opened the scoring on its first possession, moving 63 yards in 11 plays, capped by a Woods to Scott McClellan four-yard TD reception. Geary added the extra point to give the Indians an early 7-0 lead. From here, though, it was all Edinboro, as the Scots scored three touchdowns before intermission to take a 21-7 lead into the locker room.

After the McClellan touchdown, the Boro took the ensuing kickoff 74 yards in just five plays. The drive was highlighted by a 35-yard completion to Brian Heebsh over the middle and a 10-yard Larry Jackson touchdown run. Mike Joyce's extra point tied the game at seven after one quarter.

Just over five minutes later, Wrentie Martin got open for an 11-yard touchdown reception from Jody Dickerson to give the Scots a 14-7 advantage. Jackson increased the lead with his second touchdown, with 5:59 remaining, this one a 12-yard pass from Dickerson.

IUP responded with two second half touchdown passes, a six-yarder to JeMone Smith in the third quarter, and the game tying 16-yarder to Derrick Smith.





Edinboro 36 – Millersville 12 (11/14/92)

With a playoff berth on the line, the Fighting Scots overcame an early deficit to soundly defeat PSAC East power Millersville and post their best regular season record in better than 20 years.

After Ron Porter scored just over a minute into the game to move MU out to a quick 6-0 lead, Edinboro exploded for three first quarter touchdowns – one on the ground and two through the air. Larry Jackson began the barrage with a one-yard run, followed by two long touchdown passes from Jody Dickerson.

On third down, Dickerson scrambled left, then right, and spotted Derrick Russell behind the defense for a 48-yard bomb and a 13-6 lead. To close the opening quarter, Dickerson again went deep, this time finding Brian Heebsh from 23 yards away. The Scots led 19-6 after one quarter. The score remained that way until the final play of the first half when Dickerson connected on his third scoring strike, a seven yarder to Dave Ashton.

In the third, Russell found the end zone on a two-yard run and Mike Joyce closed the scoring for the Plaid with a 22-yard field goal midway through the fourth. Russell rushed for 148 yards on 19 carries, earning PSAC West "Player of the Week" honors. Dickerson finished with 187 yards passing, completing 11 of 22 passes.



NCAA II Playoffs Ferris State 19 – Edinboro 15 (11/21/92)

In an absolute quagmire, Edinboro's season came up one yard and a few seconds short of advancing to the quarterfinals, when Wrentie Martin pulled in a 43-yard completion from Jody Dickerson as time expired at the Bulldog one-yard line.

The catch gave Martin 50 for the season, establishing a new Edinboro single-season mark. Paul Stone had a career day, pulling in five passes for 110 yards. He also scored the Boro's first touchdown, pouncing on Larry Jackson's fumble in the end zone to put the Scots up 9-6.

Ferris State's Jason Lipke opened the scoring with a 37-yard field goal, then Edinboro's Mike Joyce countered with a 32 yarder, knotting the score at three. In the second quarter, Lipke connected again, from 28 yards out, putting the Bulldogs on top, 6-3.

Stone then jumped on the fumble in the end zone to put the Plaid up with just over two minutes remaining in the half. The Bulldogs, however, regained the lead, 12-9, :08 before intermission on an eight-yard pass to Pat Pettit from Doug Arnold.

The teams exchanged third quarter touchdowns on a pair of one-yard dives by Ferris' Andrew Diggins and Edinboro's Chris Snyder, before the Scots' last second effort.

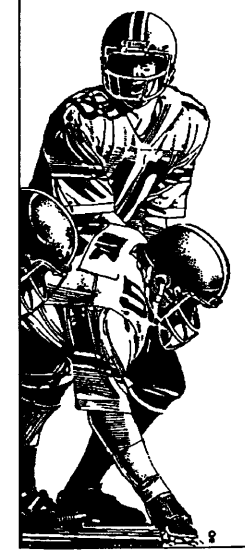

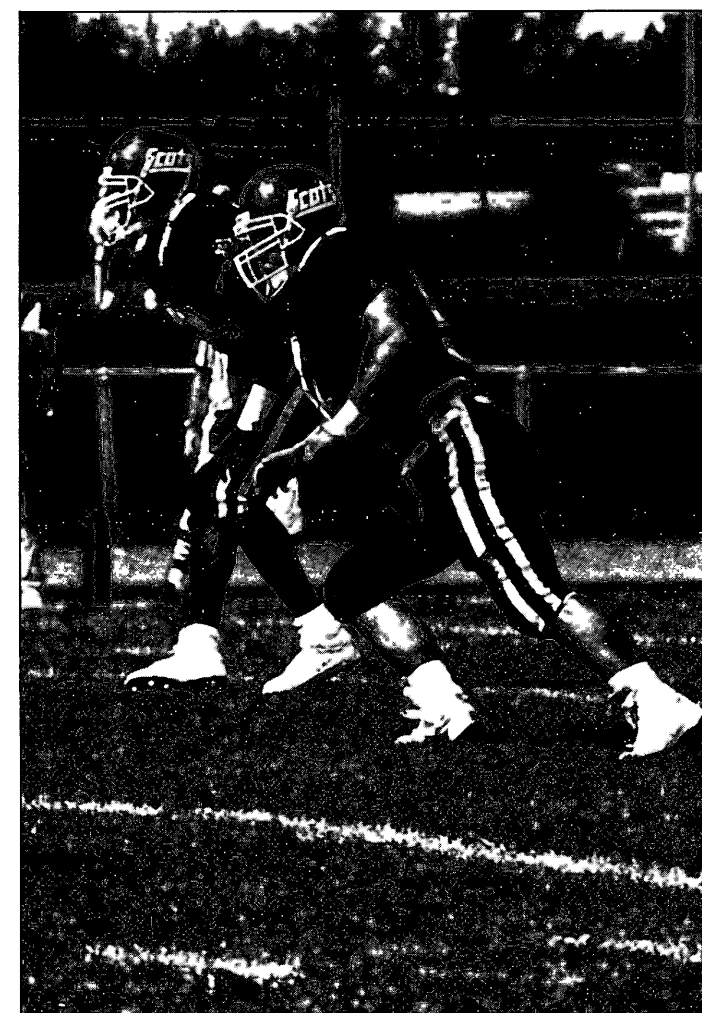

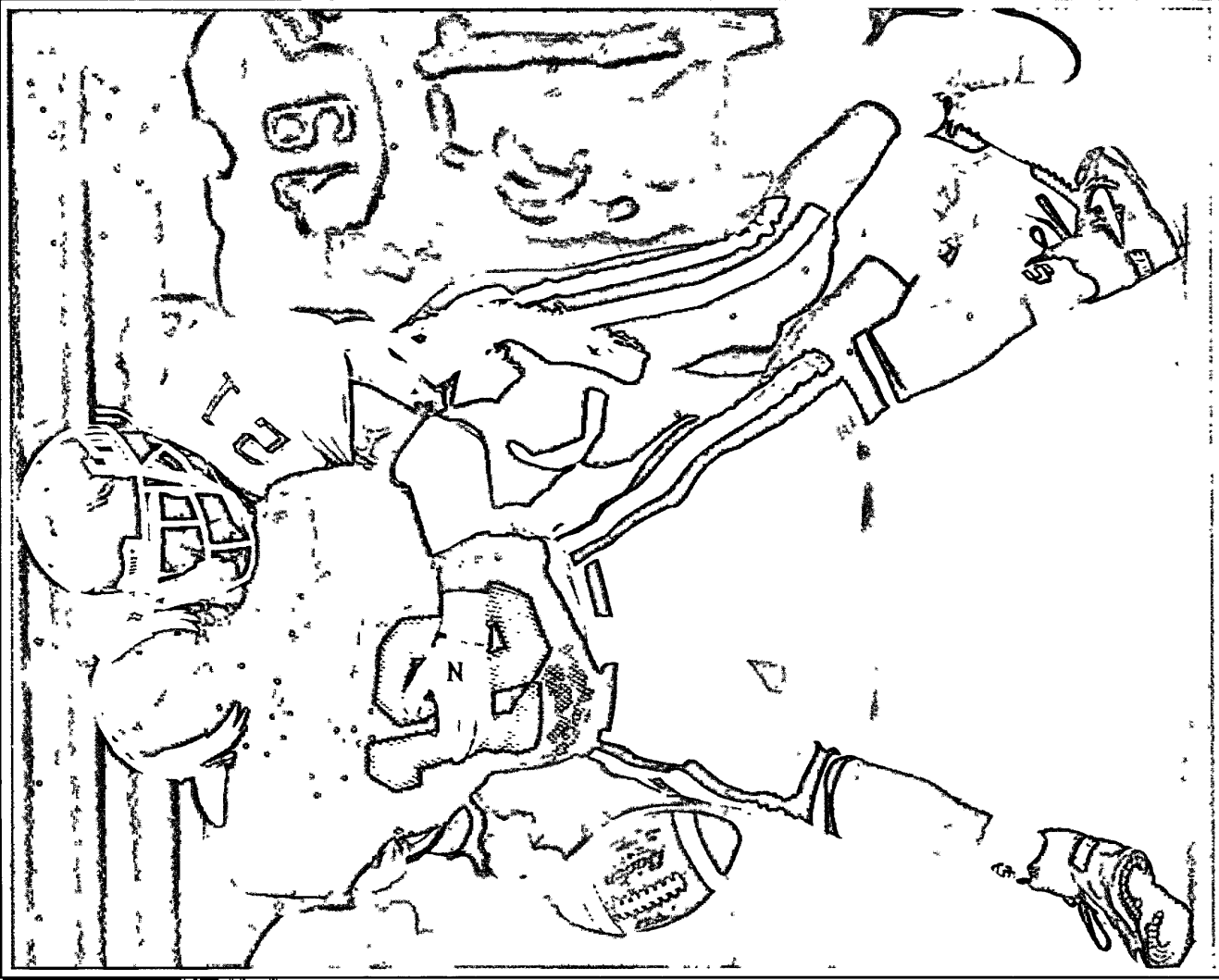
