Highlights of the Hollman Era

- **January 1988** -- Edinboro University of Pennsylvania hires Tom Hollman as the 11th head football coach in school history.
- **Sept. 10, 1988** -- Hollman records his first win at Edinboro as the Fighting Scots defeat Saginaw Valley (MI) State University, 37-28.
- **Nov. 10, 1988** -- Edinboro posts a 4-0-1 record in the final five games of Coach Hollman's first year, setting the stage for a run at the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference title in '89.
- **Sept. 23, 1989** -- Edinboro defeats rival Indiana University of Pennsylvania, 37-0, to take early control of the PSAC Western Division race.
- **Nov. 4, 1989** -- The Boro clinches its first PSAC West title under Hollman, and first conference championship since 1970, beating Slippery Rock University of Pennsylvania, 62-7.
- **Nov. 18, 1989** -- The Scots advance to NCAA Division II national playoffs, but drop a thrilling 45-32 decision at power North Dakota State University at Fargo, N.D.
- **December 1989** -- Senior running back Elbert Cole finishes third in balloting for Harlon Hill Award, presented annually in Florence, Ala., to the top player in NCAA Division II football.
- **Nov. 3, 1990** -- IUP edges Edinboro, 36-29, in a PSAC West game, giving the Indians the conference title. Despite the loss, the Scots finish the regular season ranked 11th in the Division II poll and the program earns its second straight playoff berth.
- **Nov. 17, 1990** -- The Fighting Scots earn first-ever NCAA Division II playoff win, downing Virginia Union College, 38-14 to advance to an NCAA quarterfinal showdown at IUP.
- **Nov. 24, 1990** -- For the second time in 1990, IUP edges Edinboro by a touchdown, claiming a 14-7 win. The Scots match the school record for victories with a 9-3 mark.
- **December, 1990** -- Edinboro wideout Ernest Priester, the all-time leading receiver in Edinboro history, finishes second in the balloting for the Harlon Hill Award behind three-time winner Johnny Bailey of Texas A&I.
- **Nov. 9, 1991** -- The Fighting Scots battle No. 1 ranked IUP to the end, but drop a 20-17 decision at Sox Harrison Stadium.
- **Oct. 24, 1992** -- The Scots beat California University of Pennsylvania, 33-13, to move to 7-0 for the first time since 1982. Boro moves up to No. 3 in national poll, marking the school's highest ranking ever.
- **Oct. 31, 1992** -- Slippery Rock ends Edinboro's hopes of an undefeated season, upsetting the No. 3 Scots 10-7 at Sox Harrison Stadium.
- **Nov. 14, 1992** -- Scots down Millersville University of Pennsylvania, 36-12, to post their best regular-season record (8-1-1) in more than 20 years.



Edinboro added its second PSAC West Championship Trophy under head coach Tom Hollman in 1995.

- **Nov. 21, 1992** -- Ferris State (MI) University defeats Edinboro, 19-15, in first round of NCAA playoffs. The Boro's Wrentie Martin caught a 43-yard pass on final play of game, but fell a yard short of the end zone as time expired.
- **Oct. 30, 1993** -- Visiting Edinboro scores with 19 seconds left to edge Slippery Rock, 41-38, in a game in which the lead changed hands four times in final quarter.
- **Nov. 20, 1993** -- The Scots once again advance to the NCAA playoffs, but lose a 48-28 decision to the University of New Haven (CT).
- **Oct. 8, 1994** -- Larry Jackson becomes Edinboro's all-time leading rusher in a 31-17 homecoming win over Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania.
- **Oct. 22, 1994** -- Edinboro defeats Slippery Rock, 59-39, at Sox Harrison. The Boro trailed, 39-23, early in final quarter, but scored 36 unanswered points to pull out an amazing win.
- **Sept. 2, 1995** -- Visiting Edinboro upsets No. 12 Portland (OR) State University, 26-7, on the West Coast.
- **Oct. 28, 1995** -- Scots beat IUP, 35-18, at home, paving the way for the Boro's second PSAC West title under Hollman.
- **Nov. 11, 1995** -- Edinboro clinches PSAC West title with a 28-6 win in a driving rainstorm at Clarion. The following day, the Scots receive their fifth NCAA playoff berth in seven years.
- **Nov. 18, 1995** -- Edinboro loses at New Haven, 27-12, in first round of national playoffs.
- **Nov. 9, 1996** -- The Scots build a 35-7 lead over seventh-ranked Clarion midway through the first half and go on to an impressive 48-35 victory over the eventual national semifinalist.

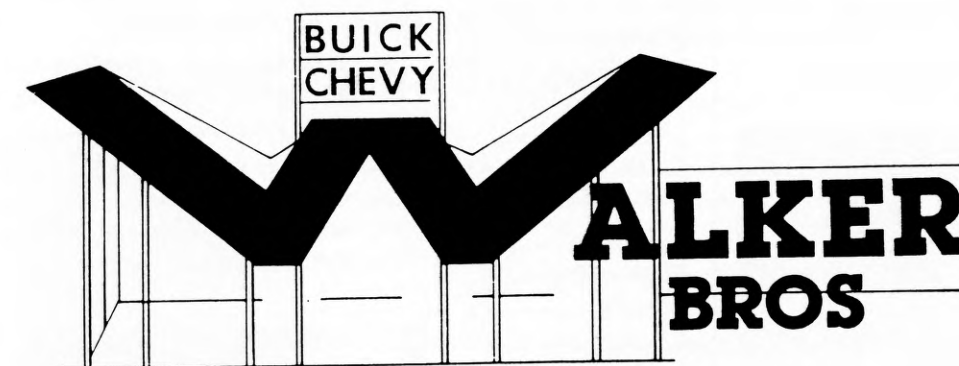

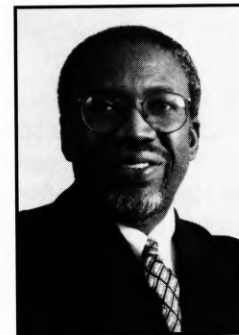

President Frank G. Pogue, Jr.



Dr. Frank G. Pogue, the 15th president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, began the first year of his presidency on July 1, 1996.

President Pogue's administration has brought to Edinboro University a renewed sense and spirit of community, a reaffirmation of institutional purpose, and a commitment to protect the accessibility which Edinboro University and the State System of Higher Education offer to affordable, exceptional, high quality education.

A sociologist, President Pogue holds a bachelor's degree from Alabama State University, a master's degree from Atlanta University, and a Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency at Edinboro, President Pogue was the vice chancellor for Student Affairs and special programs at the State University of New York (SUNY) System Central Administration, in Albany, serving in that position for 10 years. There he was responsible for, among many other programs, system-wide student educational services and programming, access and financial aid services, school and college relations, the New York City Office for Student Recruitment, undergraduate scholarship programs, the Graduate Fellowship Program for Underrepresented Students, diversity and affirmative action initiatives, university public safety, the Office for the Disadvantaged, the Office of Hispanic Affairs, the New York African American Research Foundation, the university-wide Native American Program, and educational opportunity programs and centers for the disadvantaged. While vice chancellor, Dr. Pogue served for one year as interim president at the SUNY College at Cobleskill.

Prior to his assignment in the SUNY System Central Administration, President Pogue served as vice president for student affairs, associate vice president for research and educational development, dean of undergraduate studies, and a department chairman, all at SUNY Albany.

In October of this year, Dr. Pogue was appointed by Pennsylvania Governor Tom Ridge to a statewide panel on academic standards. The bipartisan commission is made up of legislators, business leaders and educators. Pogue represents higher education on the commission and is the only member from northwestern Pennsylvania. The commission has been given the task of developing a new set of standards for Pennsylvania schools in math, science, reading, and writing.

Pogue is no stranger to academic standards. Since 1984, he has served on the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools and is currently a member of its executive board. He was a consultant to the commission which reviewed education standards in the state of New York several years ago. His experience in higher education spans three decades.

Naomi T. Johnson VP Student Affairs/Success



Dr. Naomi T. Johnson began her duties as Vice President for Student Affairs and Student Success at Edinboro University in June of 1997.

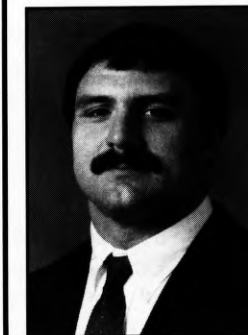
Dr. Johnson earned a B.A. in sociology from Moorhead State University, a master's degree in college student personnel from Bowling Green State University, and a Ph.D. in higher education from Arizona State University.

Prior to her appointment at Edinboro University, Dr. Johnson served as the Associate Dean of Students at the University of California-Santa Barbara. Her wide range of experience in service to students includes past positions as peer counseling coordinator, assistant to the president for student affairs, director of the campus activities center, and assistant dean of students.

One of Dr. Johnson's main objectives is to facilitate a creative and innovative campus atmosphere. She also hopes to lead a united effort by the University Community to ensure a well-rounded education for students.

Dr. Johnson and her husband, Earl Jacobs, a Certified Public Accountant, reside in Edinboro.

Bruce Baumgartner Acting Athletic Director



Four-time Olympic medalist Bruce Baumgartner was named Acting Athletic Director at Edinboro University in August of 1997 after serving as a coach at Edinboro for nearly 14 years.

Baumgartner, one of the greatest American wrestlers of all time, has led Edinboro to some of the finest seasons in school history, including a 14-0 dual meet record this past year, the first undefeated season ever at Edinboro. The Scots also placed

sixth at the NCAA Division I National Championships, the program's best showing in 11 years.

Baumgartner became just the sixth athlete in U.S. history to medal in four Olympiads, winning the bronze medal at the Olympic Games in Atlanta in '96 to go along with two golds (1984 and '92) and a silver ('88).

It not only was his fourth Olympic medal, but a record-setting 13th world-level medal. Baumgartner was honored by his fellow United States Olympic athletes when he was chosen to carry the American flag for the Opening Ceremonies. He also was the winner of the 1995 James E. Sullivan Award as the outstanding amateur athlete in the United States.

Bruce and his wife Linda have three sons, Bryan, 7, Zachary, 4, and Dylan, 1.

'97 Season Outlook

Fighting Scots Look to Battle for PSAC West Title, NCAA Playoff Berth

Edinboro head football coach Tom Hollman begins his 10th season at the Fighting Scot helm on a mission to lead the program to another Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division championship and back into contention for the NCAA Division II national title.

The Fighting Scots, who have qualified for the NCAA playoffs five times since 1989, posted a 6-4 record last season, playing perhaps the toughest schedule in school history. While the schedule in 1997 is similar ~ three Division II playoff teams from a year ago, including the national runner-up and another national semifinalist ~ Edinboro's attitude toward success is not.

"Our off-season workouts have been as good as I've ever seen," said Hollman, the winningest coach in Edinboro history with a 67-28-2 record in nine years. "Our players are very unified and driven this year. We play a tough schedule again, but I think we'll be ready."

DEFENSE LED BY TALENTED SECONDARY

"Our secondary should be very solid," said Hollman. "We have a first-team All-Conference player returning in safety Brian Decker. David Sadler also has been in our program for a couple of years now and he is capable of having a great season. We also have a few new players who should make immediate impacts."

Decker appeared on several All-America teams after an outstanding junior season, including a first-team selection by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Decker, a 6-0, 200-pound senior, led the Scots with six interceptions and 11 pass break-ups last season, and was second on the team in tackles (92 total, 45 solo) behind All-American linebacker Michael Sims. Sadler ranked fifth on the team with 65 tackles (second with 46 unassisted stops), picked off two passes and broke up seven others.



All-American safety Brian Decker led Edinboro with 6 interceptions last year.

"We lose two good tackles, but we have some solid depth up front," said Hollman. "Jesse Hannan is a fifth-year senior who was really starting to play well at defensive end last year before he got hurt (knee). Dan Keen played quite a bit inside, and we have some red-shirts we expect to step up."

"At linebacker, we have to replace an All-American (Sims) and two additional starters. But, we have some good players like Nick Oto, Ed Mattie, and Dan Caro who got some great experience last season and continued to show progress during Spring drills."

"Overall, we should have good team speed on defense and be very sound," Hollman continued. "What I am most excited about is the fact that we have a disciplined, coachable group of guys. We take great pride in our defense and I'm very optimistic we'll continue our tradition of having one of the top defenses in the nation."

OFFENSE TO FEATURE EXPERIENCED LINE, NEW QB & REDEDICATED THOMPSON

Edinboro's offense will feature an experienced offensive line and a new quarterback this season, now that two-year starter Chris Hart has graduated.

Junior Bryan Smetanka (6-0, 185), who begins his third season in the Edinboro program, was the Scots No. 1 signal-caller during Spring practice, but he will be pushed for playing time by true-freshman Brian Caldwell (6-3, 220) of Erie's McDowell High School.

"The fact of the matter is we don't know who our starting quarterback will be yet," said Hollman. "What we do know is that we have three or four quality QBs in our program and it's a good situation. There will be quality competition for the job and we'll see who emerges as the most consistent leader. They're all hard-working guys and will all have a chance."

With sophomore Joe Peraino moving to wide receiver during spring ball, red-shirt freshmen Rick Gates (6-4, 210) and Adam Yamal (6-3, 215) also look to challenge for action under center.

"All of our quarterbacks have strengths," said Hollman. "One may have a stronger arm than the next, or one may read defenses a little better or be more agile. We'll just work with them all and see who we're most comfortable with in any given situation."

One thing is for sure on offense: Edinboro's line will be more experienced than last year's unit, which featured only one veteran starter, three-time All-American Jeremy O'Day (who is now starting for the Toronto Argonauts of

the Canadian Football League).

"We will be strong up front without a doubt," said Hollman. "We have good experience now, and the guys have worked awful hard in the weight room to get stronger. We also have some quality red-shirts and new guys who we think will get the job done. For the most part, we'll have good competition and depth, but our tight ends will be a little thin and inexperienced."

Leading the Edinboro line will be Todd Rogacki, a 6-3, 285-pound junior who was a first-team All-PSAC West pick as a sophomore. He played both guard and tackle last spring. In addition, sophomore guard Pat Baughman (6-2, 290) returns after starting most of the season as a true-freshman at tackle a year ago. Senior tackle Chris Johnson (6-2, 270), also is back after battling a knee injury most of last year, along with junior center Tom Scarpone. Ryan Saupee, a 6-4, 215-pound senior, and Donald Haines a 6-2, 240-

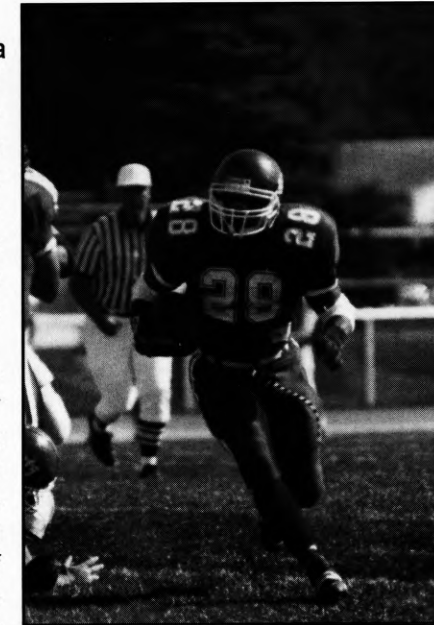
pound junior, both converted to tight end from linebacker last year and will challenge for the starting spot along with Rob Barney, a 6-3, 250-pound transfer from Central (OH) State University.

"Our running backs should be solid again," said Hollman. "Gerald Thompson struggled a little bit last season, but I'm confident he'll return to the form that made him the PSAC Rookie of the Year in 1995. He should carry more of the burden like he did as a freshman."

Thompson gained 1,281 yards on 228 carries (5.6 ypc) to lead the PSAC in rushing two years ago. Last season, sharing backfield duties with 1,000-yard rusher Tony Brinson behind a young offensive line, Thompson gained just 618 yards on 178 attempts (3.5 ypc). However, his 1,899 rushing yards and 17 TDs in his first two collegiate seasons may give him a shot at Edinboro's career rushing record of 4,237 yards (set by Larry Jackson from 1991-94)."

In addition to Thompson, Edinboro returns fullback Mick Lilley, a 6-2, 230-pound sophomore, Eric Quinn, and Mark Cook, while newcomers Chris Morgan (5-11, 240) and Lamar Wilson (6-0, 190) look to make an impact. "Mick Lilley did a nice job in his first season at fullback," said Hollman. "He's a strong lead-blocker."

"And we have another powerful back in Chris Morgan, and a speedster in Lamar Wilson. Plus Eric Quinn and Mark Cook also return with some playing experience."



Gerald Thompson, the PSAC Rookie of the Year in '95, has rushed for 1,899 yards and 17 TDs in two years at Edinboro.

Hollman admits his receiving corps is "a little thin," but he still feels confident that whoever is on the perimeter will be successful. "Nobody really knew who Jeremy Brain was before last season, and he showed he can compete at this level. 'Q' also returns and we're hoping he can elevate his play. We have some questions here, but I'm confident we'll get the job done."

Brain made 27 catches for 354 yards with two scores as a red-shirt freshman last season, while 'Q' - that's junior Quentin Ware-Bey, has made 53 catches for 628 yards the past two seasons.

COOK LEADS SPECIAL TEAMS

Sophomore punter/placekicker, Tyson Cook made a very positive impact in his first collegiate season, earning PSAC West Rookie of the Year honors after averaging 39.1 yards per punt, with seven boots 50

yards or longer and 17 of 50 placed inside the opponents 20-yard line. Cook also connected on 5 of 8 field goal attempts.

"Tyson came in and did a super job handling our punting duties and our kickoffs," said Hollman. "He really helped us win the field position battle in many games. This year, now that he is used to place-kicking without a tee, I'm sure he will become more consistent putting the ball through the uprights."

SUMMARY

"I like our team this year," said Hollman. "We have a nice combination of talent and experience at just about every position on both sides of the ball. "Our offense should be sound, better than last year because we are stronger up front. Defensively, we have an All-American leading a very talented secondary and some young, hungry players up front that we are very confident in."

"Our goal will be to play mistake-free football and not put too much pressure on the defense," Hollman continued. "If we can do that, and win the special teams battle, we could be very good."

Perhaps good enough to improve upon the team's 41-11-2 mark against PSAC West foes during the Hollman Era. Perhaps good enough to add another PSAC West trophy to the case and compete in the NCAA Division II National Championship playoffs once again.

Henne Selected Winner of Woody Hayes National Scholar-Athlete Award, Selected to Serve on NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Board



Former Edinboro University of Pennsylvania tight end Todd Henne was named a recipient of the prestigious Woody Hayes National Scholar-Athlete Award in December of 1995 after completing a highly successful career as a member of the Fighting Scot football program.

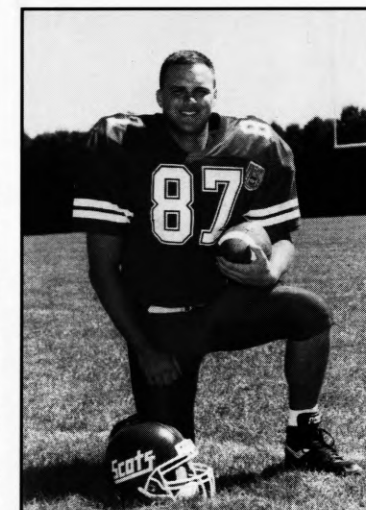
The award is a living memorial to the high standards of excellence - both on and off the field - of the former Ohio State University football coach.

Henne also is in the process of completing a two-year term as a member of the NCAA Division II Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. He recently attended the first-ever NCAA Division II Student-Athlete Summit in Denver, where student-athletes participated in the NCAA's governance process with members of Division II's Management Council.

As a speech communication major at Edinboro, Henne posted a 3.79 cumulative grade point average. He was a GTE Academic All-District selection as a senior and a national finalist for an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship.

On the field, Henne was a first-team All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference pick as a senior after earning second-team recognition as a junior. He caught 37 passes for 361 yards and seven TDs as a two-year starter. He also was a key blocker for a team that averaged 224.2 yards per game rushing and 28.7 points per contest. During the fall of his senior year, Henne was appointed to the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and attended the organization's annual meeting in Dallas. He also was a key member of Edinboro's Student-Athlete Advisory Board and served as the sports director for the campus radio station (WFSE). He was part of a student team that produced an award-winning video on responsible drinking.

"I've often said that Todd is one of those people you know will be successful in life," said Edinboro head coach Tom Hollman. "He truly exemplifies what college athletics is all about, adhering to the same ideals that Coach Hayes stood for. We are very proud to have Todd represent our football program and University in the manner in which he has."



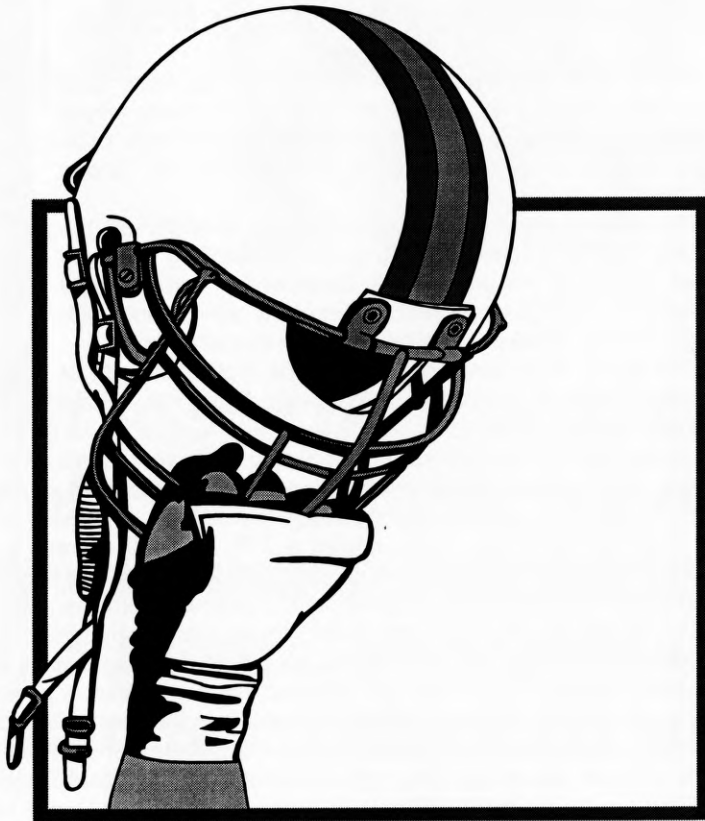

Scots in the Pros

Several former Edinboro University of Pennsylvania football players have received the opportunity to play professional football.

Three Fighting Scots are currently playing in the professional ranks, including two members of last year's Edinboro team. Three-time All-American offensive lineman Jeremy O'Day and former teammate Jeff Traversy, a defensive tackle, made the move from collegiate ball to the professional ranks of the Canadian Football League this past spring while Cleveland Pratt, who finished his career at Edinboro in 1990, has enjoyed several successful seasons in the Arena Football League.

O'Day is enjoying a productive rookie season in the CFL. The 6-3, 295-pound offensive lineman was chosen by the defending Grey Cup Champion Toronto Argonauts last May. O'Day's versatility earned him a back-up role at offensive guard and tackle early in the season, but solid fundamentals have won him a starting spot as the season progresses.

Traversy was the third pick (15th overall) of the Calgary Stampeders in the college draft held in April. The 6-5, 280-pound nose tackle's pass rush abilities helped him earn a starting role as well early in the season.

O'Day and Traversy both credit the Edinboro coaching staff as keys to their professional success.

"Coach (Scott) Browning taught me exactly what I needed to know to have a chance to play pro ball," said O'Day. "When I arrived at camp, I was amazed at how well my techniques and training stacked up against veterans. I certainly appreciate his guidance and hope people understand what a great coach he is."

Traversy agreed. "Coach Hollman and Coach Cronk are two of the most knowledgeable men that I've ever been around in football," he said. "They pushed me to the limits and I'm glad they did, because now I'm living a dream and I owe much of my success to them and the Edinboro football program."

Once called "the best kept secret in the league," Pratt has made a name for himself with the Florida Bobcats and the AFL. The 5-7, 171-pound offensive specialist was acquired by the Bobcats in February of 1995, and plays wide receiver and return specialist.

Over the past three seasons, Pratt has been given many opportunities to dazzle crowds with his blazing speed. It was that speed which helped him accumulate more than 2,600 all-purpose yards and 24 touchdowns during the 1996 season. Pratt got off to a quick start this year as he caught 3 touchdown passes and rushed for another in Florida's 55-27 season-opening victory over the Connecticut Coyotes. His performance in '96 propelled him into the league's top 10 in 11 statistical categories (including six top 5's).

Wide receiver/kick returner Gilbert Grantlin, who played for Edinboro during the 1995 season, signed a free-agent contract with the National Football League's Minnesota Vikings in April 1996 and was a member of the team's practice squad. The 6-1, 182-pound Grantlin played only one season at Edinboro, but made a significant impact with his big-play ability. The Florida native, an honorable-mention All-American, caught 44 passes for 840 yards (19.1 yards per catch) and eight touchdowns. Grantlin also had 372 yards on 17 kickoff returns (21.8 yard average) and 300 yards on 28 punt returns (10.7 yard average).

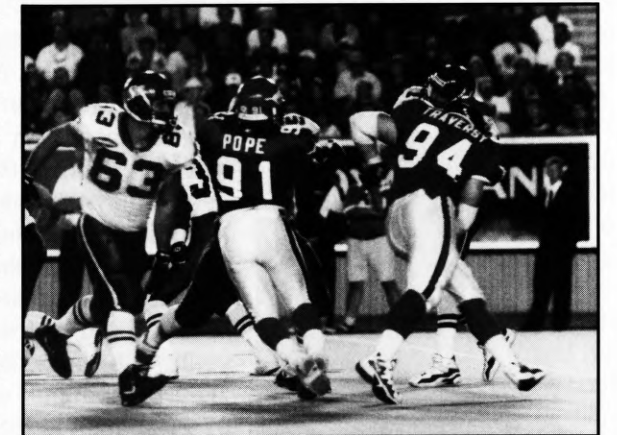
Before Grantlin, Mike Kegarise was the last Fighting Scot to play in the NFL. The 6-6, 310-pound offensive tackle, a two-time All-American, signed a free-agent deal with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks after concluding his Edinboro career in 1993. Kegarise spent the 1994 season on the Seahawks' injured-reserve list with a severe knee injury, but was released the following season when Seattle changed head coaches.

Two other former Scots who played under current head coach Tom Hollman also signed free-agent contracts with NFL teams. Offensive guard Curtis Rose signed with the Miami Dolphins, while wide receiver Ernest Priester inked a deal with the Denver Broncos. Neither Rose nor Priester played a regular-season game in the NFL, although Cleveland native Priester later played for the Cleveland Thunder of the Arena Football League.

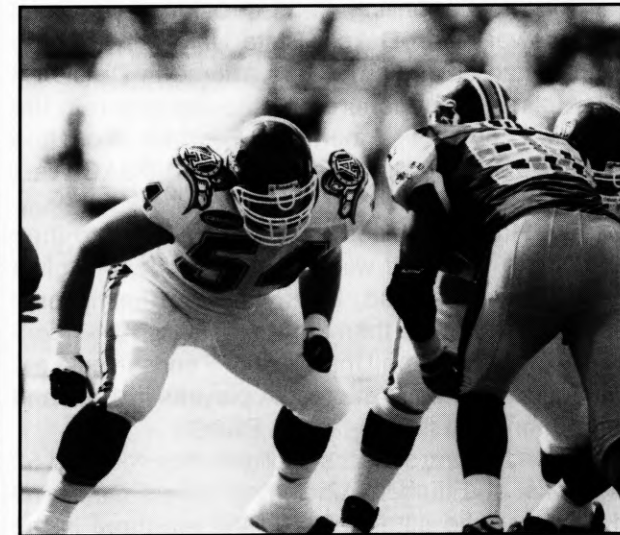
Rose and Priester both were two-time All-Americans at Edinboro. The 6-3, 280-pound Rose earned the honors in 1990 and 1991, while the 5-9, 170-pound Priester did so in 1989 and 1990. Priester was the runner-up for the Harlon Hill Award honoring the NCAA Division II Player of the Year and the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Co-Player of the Year in 1990. He is Edinboro's all-time career leader in receptions (148), receiving yards (3,064), yards per reception (20.7) and TD receptions (35).

A pair of Scots who performed during the Edinboro State College days -- David Green and Jim Romaniszyn -- played professional football in the 1970s. Both are members of the Edinboro Athletic Hall of Fame, with Green being inducted in 1988 and Romaniszyn being honored in 1983. Green, a running back, played for the Cleveland Browns and for the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League. An All-American, Green played for Edinboro in 1975 and 1976. He ranks fifth on the school's all-time rushing list with 1,978 career yards in 19 games (104 yards per contest).

Romaniszyn played at Edinboro from 1970-72, earning All-American honors. The 6-2, 225-pound Titusville native was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in 1973 as a running back, but was switched to outside linebacker. A versatile performer, Romaniszyn is the only Edinboro player to finish his career with 1,000-plus yards rushing (1,266) and 1,000-plus yards receiving (1,088). He also played basketball for the Scots.

Head Coach Tom Hollman



After guiding the Fighting Scot football program to some of the finest seasons in school history, Tom Hollman begins his 10th season as head coach at Edinboro.

Hollman became the all-time winningest coach in Edinboro history two years ago and enters the '97 campaign with a 67-28-2 mark at Edinboro, compiling more victories and a better winning percentage (.701) than any

coach in Fighting Scot history.

Hollman has guided the Edinboro program to NCAA Division II playoff appearances in five of the past eight seasons. The Scots also have captured a pair of Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division titles (1995 and 1989) and have consistently been ranked in the national polls.

Hollman enters the '97 season ranked 10th on the NCAA Division II Winningest Active Coaches List. He has compiled a 91-39-3 overall record (.695) in 13 seasons as a college head coach, including a 24-11-1 mark in four seasons at Wooster College in Ohio.

Last year, Edinboro recorded its ninth consecutive winning season, all under Hollman, highlighted by an impressive 48-35 victory over PSAC West champion Clarion, who advanced to the NCAA Division II national semifinals a few weeks later.

Edinboro will take a three-game winning streak into the '97 campaign. The Scots have won five of their past

seven games, with both of the losses coming in the final minute against Indiana (Pa.) and Slippery Rock.

Edinboro posted a 9-2 record in 1995 and was the only program in the 14-member PSAC to record a perfect 6-0 league mark, the second time the Scots accomplished the feat under Hollman. Edinboro was ranked eighth in the final NCAA Division II football poll in '95 and the program received its fifth berth to the NCAA playoffs.

Hollman joined the Edinboro staff in January of 1988 as the program's 11th head coach after serving as the defensive coordinator at Ohio University for three years.

Edinboro went 4-0-1 during the final five games of his first season, then in 1989, captured the PSAC West title with a 6-0 record and roared into the NCAA Division II playoffs for the first time in school history.

The Scots lost a thrilling 45-32 decision at perennial Division II power North Dakota State University, but the EU program had clearly arrived as a force in Division II football. Hollman was honored as the top coach in the East Region by the American Football Coaches Association and he also was selected PSAC West "Coach of the Year."

In 1990, Hollman guided the Fighting Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro beat Virginia Union, 38-14, on the road, to advance to the national quarterfinals. The Scots then dropped a tough 14-7 contest to PSAC rival Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

The Scots returned to the NCAA playoffs in 1992 and 1993 after runner-up finishes in the PSAC.

In addition to team success, Hollman has coached 52 All-Americans at Edinboro, including Elbert Cole and Ernest Priester, who both placed in the top three in the voting for the Harlon Hill Award presented to the NCAA Division II Player of the Year. He also has coached play-

ers who have set school records for rushing, passing, receiving, quarterback sacks, and interceptions.

Hollman is a 1968 graduate of Ohio Northern University, where he was a three-year starter for the football team and a two-way performer as a defensive back and end on offense. He holds the school record with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966-67 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years.

Hollman's coaching career began in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. After earning a master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati in 1971, he became head coach at Greenville High School in Ohio, where he posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark from 1971-73. Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974-75 seasons, where his squads recorded a 15-3-2 mark. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in 1974, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In 1976, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks, where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University. The following year, Hollman accepted the head coaching position at Wooster and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school history (24-11-1). In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the 1984 campaign. Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University from 1985 until accepting the head job at Edinboro in 1988.

Tom resides in Edinboro with his wife, Kandi. They have four children, Mari, Jon, Tim and Denise.

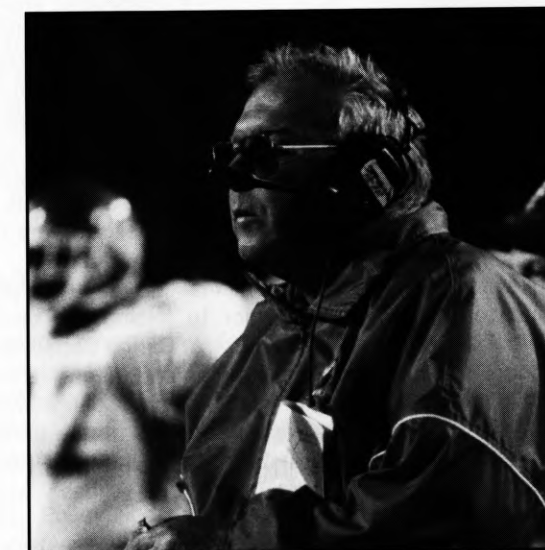

Scott Browning – Offensive Coordinator/Line

Scott Browning begins his third season as Edinboro's offensive coordinator and 12th year overall coaching the Fighting Scots.

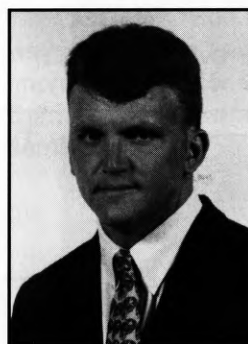
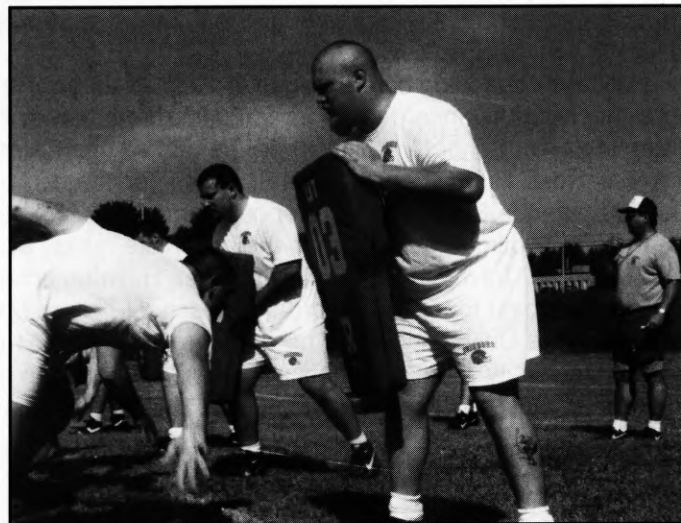
Browning has coached a variety of positions at the Boro, including the offensive line for the past four years, and running backs and defensive backs in the past. Under his guidance the past two years, the Scots' offense averaged 358.8 yards of total offense and 27.9 points per game. This season, Browning has an experienced offensive line returning, with one exception, three-time All-American Jeremy O'Day, who has earned a starting position with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League.

In his many capacities, Browning has coached several All-Americans including Steve Russell, Michael Willis, Wade Smith, Georj Lewis, Mike Barnes, Elbert Cole, and O'Day.

Browning has coached at three NCAA Division I schools. Before joining the Edinboro staff in 1986, he coached receivers and running backs at Ohio State University for three years. He also coached the defensive secondary at New Mexico State University in 1982, and the following year mentored the receivers at Idaho State University, an NCAA Division I-AA playoff participant.

Prior to his stint at OSU, Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview High Schools in Ohio from 1979-81. Browning earned a master's degree in education administration from New Mexico State in 1983, and a BS in education from Ohio State in 1981. Earlier, before transferring to OSU, Browning attended Capital University, where he played football for one season. Browning was a four-year letterman in four sports at Loudonville High School (OH) prior to his collegiate days.

Scott is married to the former Lynn Hook, and has a son, Andrew Scott, 4.



Nick Cronk – Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

After serving as the Fighting Scots defensive line coach for three years, Nick Cronk was promoted to defensive coordinator prior to Spring practice. He will also coach the Edinboro linebackers.

Last year's efforts of the defensive front resulted in 20 quarterback sacks and 36 additional tackles behind the line of scrimmage. In 1995, three of Edinboro front four players earned All-Conference honors. This year, Cronk will have two pre-season All-Americans to work with, senior defensive back Brian Decker and senior linebacker Jesse Hannan, in addition to a number of players who showed improvement in Spring drills.

Before coming to Edinboro, Cronk coached tight ends at Indiana University. He spent two seasons with the Hoosiers as a graduate assistant to head coach Bill Mallory. His first season in Bloomington, Cronk spent time assisting the defensive coordinator with the linebackers, and he also helped in the recruiting duties.

While at IU, he graduated with a master's degree in physical education administration. Prior to joining the staff at Indiana, Cronk was an assistant coach at Carroll Consolidated High School, handling the special teams and defensive ends.

Cronk spent his playing days at Wabash College, where he was an honorable mention performer in the Indiana College Athletic Conference and captained the 1991 league championship squad. He graduated from Wabash with a bachelor of arts degree in political science.

Nick and his wife, Karla, reside in Edinboro with their 1-year-old son, Hayes Woodrow.

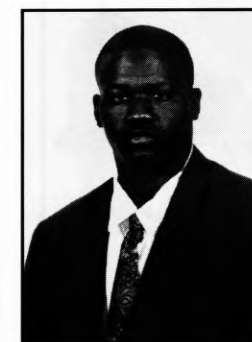
Dustin Calhoun – Defensive Secondary

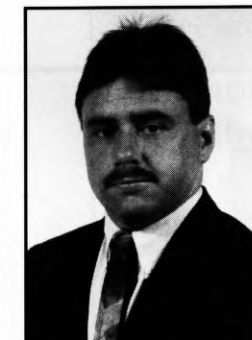


Mario Houston – Wide Receivers

A familiar face to the Edinboro community, Houston played defensive back at Edinboro University from 1990-94. He earned PSAC Rookie of the Year honors in 1990 and was a two-time All-PSAC pick. Additionally, he earned Scholar-Athlete recognition three times during his playing career.

Houston currently leads Edinboro's list of career and single season pass deflections with 53 and 16, respectively, and is tied for 11th place on the list of single season interceptions (5). He registered 269 tackles in his four year career as a Fighting Scot.

Houston has a four-year old son, DeAndre Houston. A native of East Cleveland, Houston now resides in Edinboro.



Mike McCoy – Quarterbacks/Running Backs

Mike McCoy enters his second season as a full-time assistant with the Fighting Scots responsible for coaching the Edinboro running backs.

Under the guidance of McCoy, the Boro has continued its tradition of fielding one of the top rushing attacks in the PSAC. For the second straight season, Edinboro produced a 1,000-yard rusher, as Tony Brinson topped the mark in 1996 after Gerald Thompson ran for the fifth-highest single-season total in 1995. With Thompson, and a strong supporting cast featuring several talented fullbacks and a few new speedsters, the Boro backfield should be one of the team's strengths once again.

McCoy came to Edinboro from West Virginia State College, where he served as the offensive coordinator during the 1995 season. McCoy also coached both tight ends and running backs at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1991-94. A 1987 graduate of Marshall University in West Virginia, McCoy coached wide receivers at Rutgers University for one season (1990). He began his coaching career

as a graduate assistant at Marshall under head coach George Chaump. As an undergraduate, McCoy played running back for a Marshall team that finished the 1987 season as the NCAA Division I-AA runner-up.

Butch Posey – Defensive Line

Butch Posey begins his first year as Edinboro University's defensive line coach after playing in the PSAC and serving as an assistant football coach at two PSAC schools.

Posey joins the Fighting Scots from East Stroudsburg University where he coached the defensive line and special teams. With Posey's assistance, the 1996 Warriors went 6-4 and tied for second place in the PSAC East. Posey also has a year of coaching experience from his alma mater, Slippery Rock University, in the 1995-96 season.

In addition to his regular season duties, Posey has handled the responsibilities of operating numerous instructional football camps, including ones held at Notre Dame University, Northwestern University, and Pennsylvania State University.

Posey received his bachelor's degree in Political Science from Slippery Rock University in 1992.

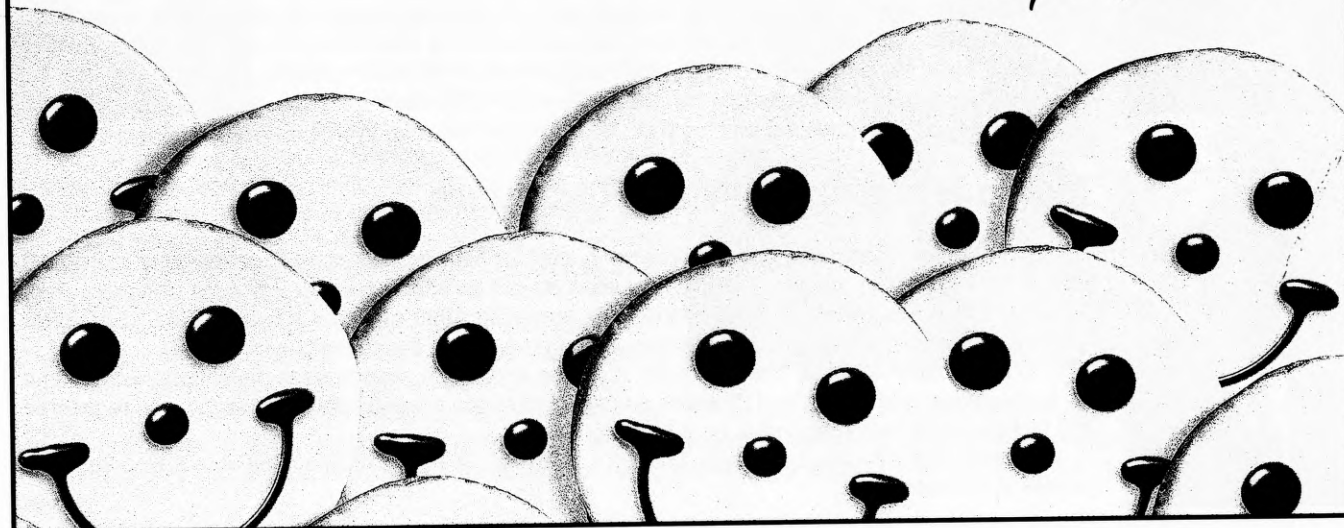

George Roberts, A.T., C., Head Athletic Trainer

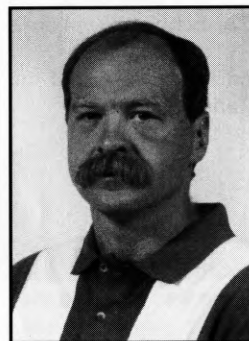

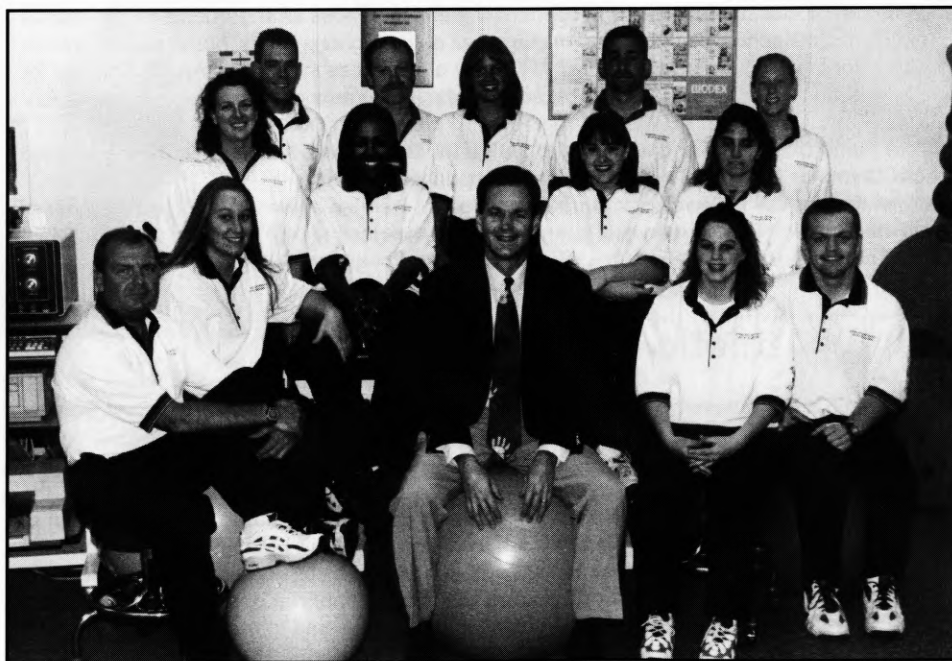

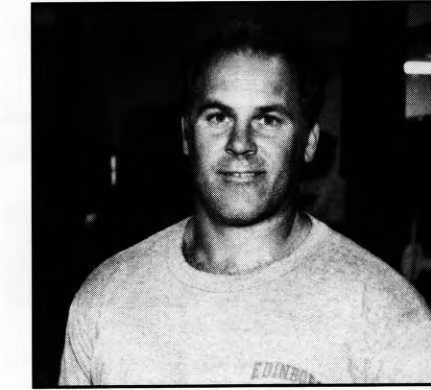

Edinboro Hosts California in Homecoming Game



THE GAME

The Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Fighting Scots will host the California University of Pennsylvania Vulcans Saturday (Oct. 11) in a Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division football game.

Kickoff is set for 2 p.m. at Edinboro's Sox Harrison Stadium as the Scots celebrate Homecoming.

RECORDS

Both teams enter the game with 1-3 overall records.

The Fighting Scots opened the season with a 21-17 win over Hillsdale College at home, but have dropped three straight games since, a 33-10 contest at Carson-Newman, the top-ranked team in NCAA Division II football, a 35-27 home setback to Glenville (WV) State College, and a 17-3 decision to PSAC West rival Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania last Saturday.

California opened with a 16-14 home loss to Fairmont (WV) State College, then defeated West Virginia Wesleyan College, 21-16 to even its record. The Vulcans were beaten 42-21 by St. Joseph's (IN) and 20-10 at Indiana University of Pennsylvania in the team's PSAC West opener last weekend.

THE SERIES

California leads the overall series, 32-29-2, however, Edinboro has enjoyed most of the success in recent years. The Scots have defeated Cal nine consecutive seasons -- every year under head coach Tom Hollman -- and the Boro has gone 22-5 against Cal since 1970.

Last year, Edinboro jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and had to stop Cal on its final possession to secure a 14-13 victory.

THE COACHES

Tom Hollman is in his 10th year directing the Edinboro program, and he is in his 14th year overall as a collegiate head coach. Hollman has

guided the Scots to a 68-31-2 overall mark (.683), with two PSAC West titles (1989 and 1995) and five NCAA playoff berths (1995-93-92-90-89) highlighting his list of accomplishments. Edinboro is 41-12-2 against PSAC foes (.764) since Hollman took over in 1988.

Hollman, who is now 92-42-3 overall as a college head coach, was ranked 10th on the NCAA Division II Winningest Active Coaches list entering the season.

California is led by first-year head coach Mike Kowalski, who was named to the post in November after serving as the defensive coordinator and special teams coach at Cal for seasons. Prior to joining the Vulcan staff, Kowalski coached at Ohio University for five years.

YOUNG SCOTS

Edinboro features a very young team this year, with just three seniors in the starting lineup, all on defense. In fact, only four seniors are listed on Edinboro's two-deep.

Leading the youth movement is freshman quarterback Brian Caldwell, who has completed 50 of 104 passes for 577 yards with 2 TDs and 4 interceptions. Caldwell is the first true-freshman to start at QB at the Boro in 16 years as Blair Hrovat last got the call in 1981.

Junior tailback Gerald Thompson has averaged 93.8 yards per game rushing (fifth in the PSAC), gaining 375 yards on 97 carries (3.9 ypc). In 24 career games, Thompson has rushed for 2,274 yards and 19 TDs. He ranks fifth on the Boro's all-time career rushing list, 352 yards behind Lester Frye (2,626 yards from 1989-91).

Junior wideout Quentin Ware-Bey and Thompson lead the Scots with 11 receptions each. Ware-Bey has averaged 22.5 yards per catch to rank among the conference leaders. Ware-Bey now has 64 catches for 876 yards the past three seasons. He ranks ninth on Edinboro's career receptions list and 11th in career receiving yardage.

The Edinboro defense, ranked second in the PSAC in yards allowed per game (318.0) is led by senior All-American safety Brian Decker who is tied for third on the team in tackles (27 total, 22 solo), despite missing more than three quarters of the Carson-Newman game with a concussion.

Red-shirt freshman linebacker Nick Oto leads the Scots with 36 tackles, with sophomore linebacker Dan Caro next (30 tackles). Senior linebacker Ed Mattie shares third with Decker with 27 tackles.

Senior defensive end Jesse Hannan has 24 stops this year and has batted down four passes. Freshman cornerback D.K. McDonald also has four pass break-ups. Tackles Jim Strohl and Dan Keen have three sacks each to pace the team.

A LOOK AT CAL

Cal's defense is ranked third in the league (right behind Edinboro) in yards allowed per game (337.0), and like the Scots, the Vulcans feature several young players on offense.

Senior quarterback Jason Bennett has connected on 60 of 105 passes (.571) for 814 yards with 5 TDs and 2 INTs. His quarterback rating of 134.2 ranks third in the conference.

Two freshmen backs pace the Cal ground game. Mason Murray has gained 279 yards on 63 carries (4.4 ypa), while Greg Hinton has accumulated 231 yards on 76 attempts with three TDs. Murray did not play last week against IUP, but Hinton gained 53 yards on 23 carries in his absence. Both should play against Edinboro.

Four receivers have caught eight passes or more, led by sophomore Jim Kubina (12 rec., 157 yards, 1 TD) and 6-4 freshman Clinton Alexander (14 rec., 152 yards, 2 TDs).

Senior strong safety Aaron Hutter leads the team in tackles with 30, including 24 unassisted, followed by junior nose guard Jon Bolen (29 tackles).

PSAC UPDATE

Slippery Rock has enjoyed the most success in non-conference action this year among PSAC schools, posting a 4-1 overall mark with its only loss coming in the season opener at Division I-AA Youngstown State.

The Rock entered the NCAA Division II poll this week at No. 16. SRU plays its first PSAC West game this Saturday at Indiana, followed by an Oct. 18 game against Edinboro at Slippery Rock, and an Oct. 25 contest at Clarion.

IUP, Edinboro, and Clarion, the pre-season 1-2-3 picks in the league coach's pre-season polls, have a combined record of 3-9 thus far.

In the East, Bloomsburg and Millersville appear to be the front runners for the league title. They are both 3-1 and will play each other on Oct. 18 at Bloom.

UP NEXT

Edinboro plays at No. 16 Slippery rock next Saturday in a 1 p.m. contest, then returns to Sox Harrison Stadium Oct. 25 for a showdown with IUP at 1 p.m. Cal will host Clarion next Saturday.

Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) has established itself as one of the premier NCAA Division II athletic conferences in the nation.

Founded in 1951 for the purpose of promoting and administering the athletic programs at the 14 state teachers' colleges in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the PSAC is divided into seven-team Divisions.

The PSAC crowns Divisional Champions in football, but the "State Game" between the top team in the East and West was eliminated after the 1987 contest.

The PSAC is well-represented each year in the NCAA Division II national polls and post-season Football Championship.

The PSAC has had at least two teams compete in the NCAA Division II playoffs every year since 1988 and a national semifinalist in three of the past four seasons. Since 1990, PSAC teams have participated in a total of 26 NCAA Division II playoff games, highlighted by two national championship game appearances by Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1990 and 1993.

From its inception in 1951, each conference member selected its own competitive division within the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). In 1980, however, the presidents of each school, who make up the league's Board of Directors, voted to reclassify to NCAA Division II membership. Nine schools also elect to participate at the NCAA Division I level in select sports.

In 1983, all member institutions were granted University status and the State System of Higher Education (SSHE) was formed. The system currently has an enrollment in excess of 99,000 students with an alumni base of 402,000 including 287,000 who reside in the state. The Chancellor of the SSHE is Dr. James H. McCormick.

The PSAC sponsors championships in 20 men's and women's sports, including baseball, basketball, cross country, field hockey, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

One of the largest NCAA Division II conferences in the nation, the league employs a full-time commissioner and an information director. Steve Murray has served as the conference SID for five years, and added the commissioner duties on an interim basis this past summer as the conference conducts a national search to fill the position. 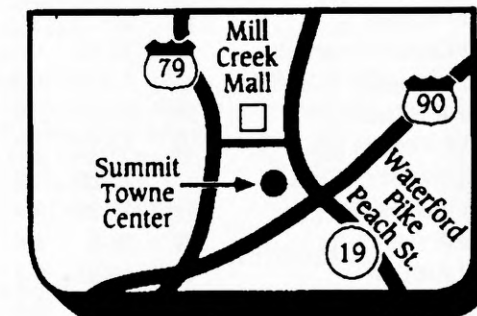

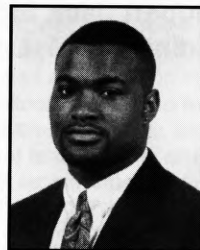

Edinboro and the Harlon Hill Award

Two Edinboro University of Pennsylvania football players have been finalists for the Harlon Hill Award, presented annually to the top player in NCAA Division II football.

Former Edinboro running back Elbert Cole was one of three Harlon Hill finalists in 1989, while former Fighting Scot wide receiver Ernest Priester was a finalist for the award in 1990.

Cole placed third in the 1989 balloting, which was won by Texas A&I University running back Johnny Bailey, a three-time recipient. Priester was runner-up to North Dakota State University quarterback Chris Simdom in 1990 when the Bison claimed the Division II national title.

Cole also was selected an All-American in 1989, receiving first-team honors from Kodak, second-team recognition from *Football Gazette* and third-team status from the Associated Press.

He rushed for 1,507 yards and set Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference records for touchdowns in a season (24) and points in a season (148). Cole led

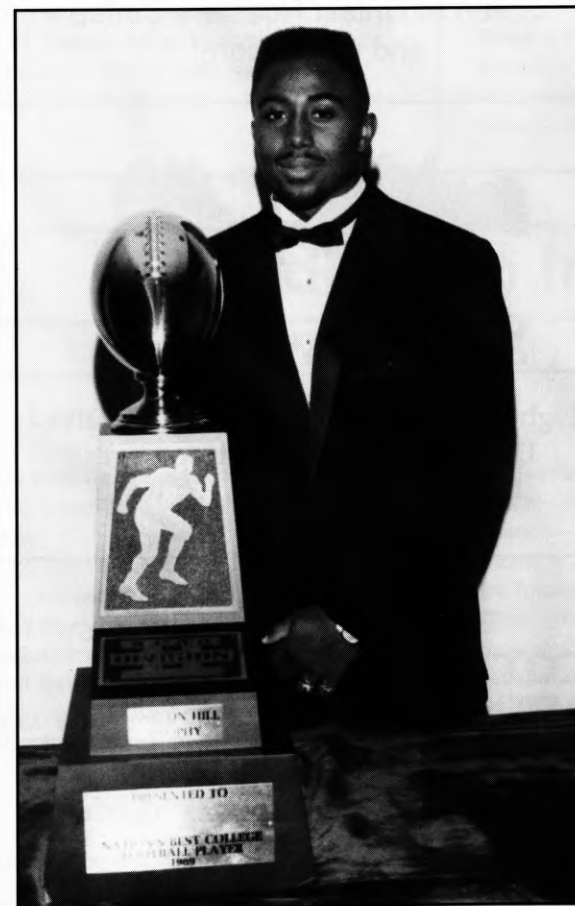
Edinboro to a PSAC West title, an 8-3 overall record and a No. 7 ranking in the final NCAA Division II national poll.

Cole finished his Edinboro career with 3,341 yards rushing and 40 rushing touchdowns, ranking him third and second respectively in school history.

Priester was the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Co-Player of the Year in 1990. He also was an All-American, receiving first-team honors from Kodak, the Associated Press and *Football Gazette*. Priester caught 47 passes in 1990, totaling 1,102 yards (23.4 yards per catch) and 15 touchdowns. He led Edinboro to the NCAA Division II quarterfinals and a 9-3 overall record.

Priester also had an outstanding season in 1989, catching 49 passes for 1,128 yards (23-yard average) and a school-record 16 touchdown receptions. He is Edinboro's all-time career leader in receptions (148), receiving yards (3,064), yards per reception (20.7) and touchdown receptions (35). Following his career at Edinboro, Priester signed a free-agent contract with the National Football League's Denver Broncos. He later played for his hometown Cleveland Thunder of the Arena Football League.

The Harlon Hill Award is named in honor of legendary Chicago Bears wide receiver Harlon Hill, who was an All-American at the University of North Alabama. The award is selected each year by NCAA Division II sports information directors.

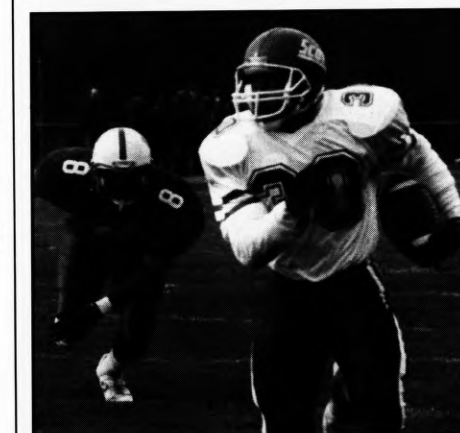

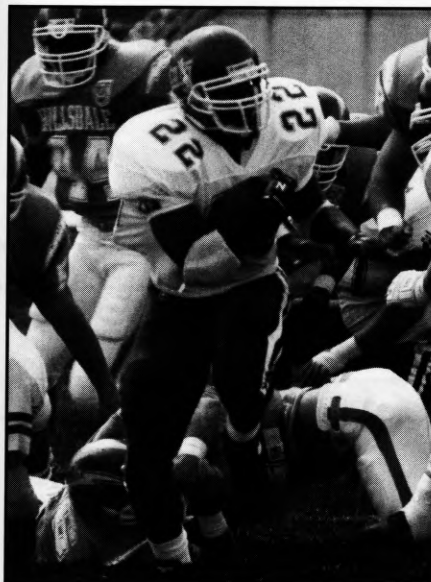

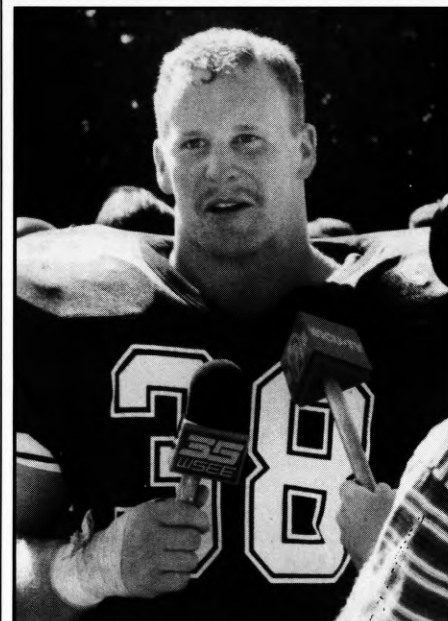
