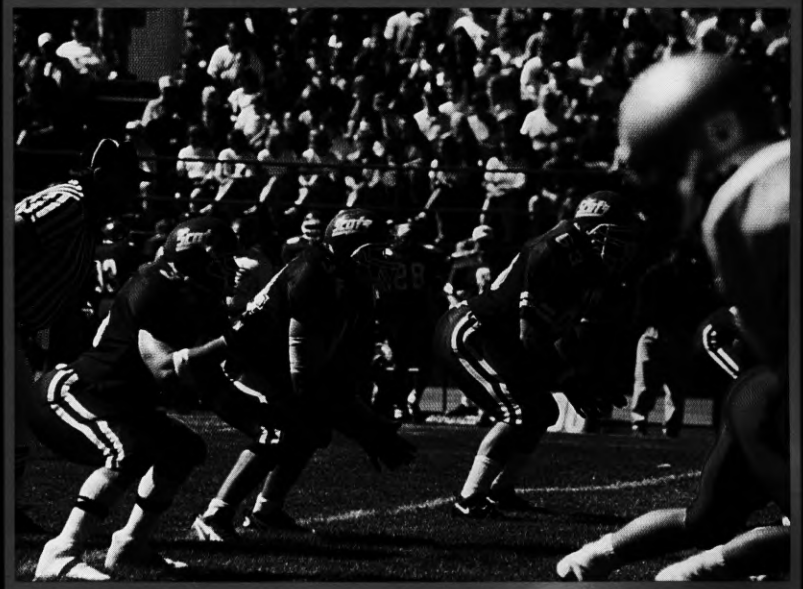
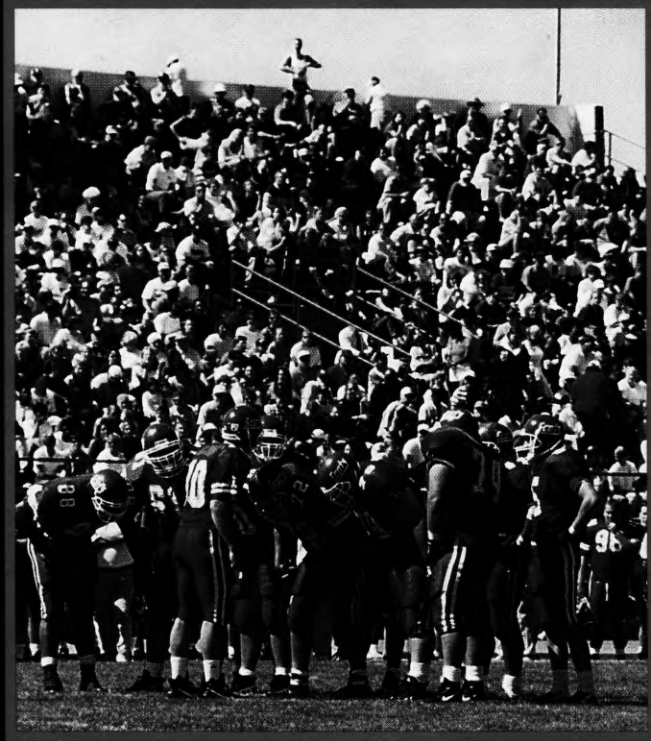
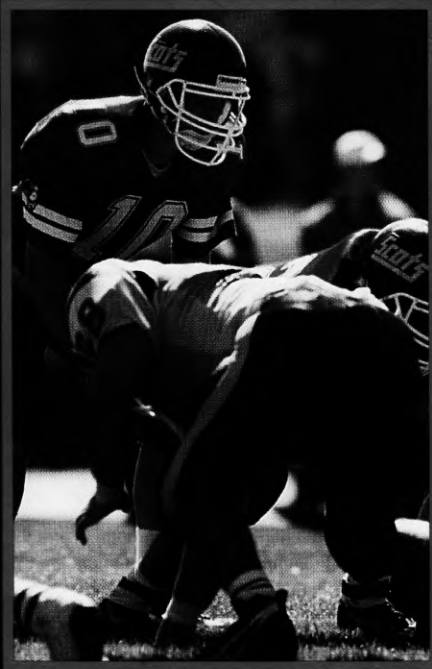

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE HOLLMAN ERA

- **January 1988** -- Edinboro University of Pennsylvania hires Tom Hollman as the 11th head football coach in school history.
- **Sept. 10, 1988** -- Hollman records his first win at Edinboro as the Fighting Scots defeat Saginaw Valley (MI) State University, 37-28.
- **Nov. 10, 1988** -- Edinboro posts a 4-0-1 record in the final five games of coach Hollman's first year, setting the stage for a run at the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference title in '89.
- **Sept. 23, 1989** -- Edinboro defeats rival Indiana University of Pennsylvania, 37-0, to take early control of the PSAC Western Division race.
- **Nov. 4, 1989** -- The Boro clinches its first PSAC West title under Hollman, and first conference championship since 1970, beating Slippery Rock University of Pennsylvania, 62-7.
- **Nov. 18, 1989** -- The Scots advance to NCAA Division II national playoffs, but drop a thrilling 45-32 decision at power North Dakota State University in Fargo, N.D.
- **December 1989** -- Senior running back Elbert Cole finishes third in balloting for Harlon Hill Award, presented annually in Florence, Ala., to the top player in NCAA Division II football.
- **Nov. 3, 1990** -- IUP edges Edinboro, 36-29, in a PSAC West game, giving the Indians the conference title. Despite the loss, the Scots finish the regular season ranked 11th in the Division II poll and the program earns its second straight playoff berth.
- **Nov. 17, 1990** -- The Fighting Scots earn first-ever NCAA Division II playoff win, downing Virginia Union College, 38-14 to advance to an NCAA quarterfinal showdown at IUP.
- **Nov. 24, 1990** -- For the second time in 1990, IUP edges Edinboro by a touchdown, claiming a 14-7 win. The Scots match the school record for victories with a 9-3 mark.
- **December, 1990** -- Edinboro wideout Ernest Priester, the all-time leading receiver in school history, finishes second in the balloting for the Harlon Hill Award behind three-time winner Johnny Bailey of Texas A&I.
- **Nov. 9, 1991** -- The Fighting Scots battle No. 1 ranked IUP to the end, but drop a 20-17 decision at Sox Harrison Stadium.
- **Oct. 24, 1992** -- The Scots beat California University of Pennsylvania, 33-13, to move to 7-0 for the first time since 1982. Boro moves up to No. 3 in national poll, marking the school's highest ranking ever.
- **Oct. 31, 1992** -- Slippery Rock ends Edinboro's hopes of an undefeated season, upsetting the No. 3 Scots 10-7 at Sox Harrison Stadium.
- **Nov. 14, 1992** -- Scots down Millersville University of Pennsylvania, 36-12, to post their best regular-season record (8-1-1) in more than 20 years.
- **Nov. 21, 1992** -- Ferris State (MI) University defeats Edinboro, 19-15, in first round of NCAA playoffs. The Boro's Wrentie



Edinboro added its second PSAC West Championship Trophy under head coach Tom Hollman in 1995.

Martin caught a 43-yard pass on final play of game, but fell a yard short of the end zone as time expired.

- **Oct. 30, 1993** -- Visiting Edinboro scores with 19 seconds left to edge Slippery Rock, 41-38, in a game in which the lead changed hands four times in final quarter.
- **Nov. 20, 1993** -- The Scots once again advance to the NCAA playoffs, but lose a 48-28 decision to the University of New Haven (CT).
- **Oct. 8, 1994** -- Larry Jackson becomes Edinboro's all-time leading rusher in a 31-17 homecoming win over Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania.
- **Oct. 22, 1994** -- Edinboro defeats Slippery Rock, 59-39, at Sox Harrison. The Boro trailed, 39-23, early in final quarter, but scored 36 unanswered points to pull out an amazing win.
- **Sept. 2, 1995** -- Visiting Edinboro upsets No. 12 Portland (OR) State University, 26-7, on the west coast.

- **Oct. 28, 1995** -- Scots beat IUP, 35-18, at home, paving the way for the Boro's second PSAC West title under Hollman.
- **Nov. 11, 1995** -- Edinboro clinches PSAC West title with a 28-6 win in a driving rainstorm at Clarion. The following day, the Scots receive their fifth NCAA playoff berth in seven years.
- **Nov. 18, 1995** -- Edinboro loses at New Haven, 27-12, in first round of national playoffs.
- **Nov. 9, 1996** -- The Scots build a 35-7 lead over seventh-ranked Clarion midway through the first half and go on to an impressive 48-35 victory over the eventual national semifinalist.
- **Nov. 15, 1997** -- Scots win their first-ever overtime game by a 29-23 score after playing two extra sessions versus Lock Haven.

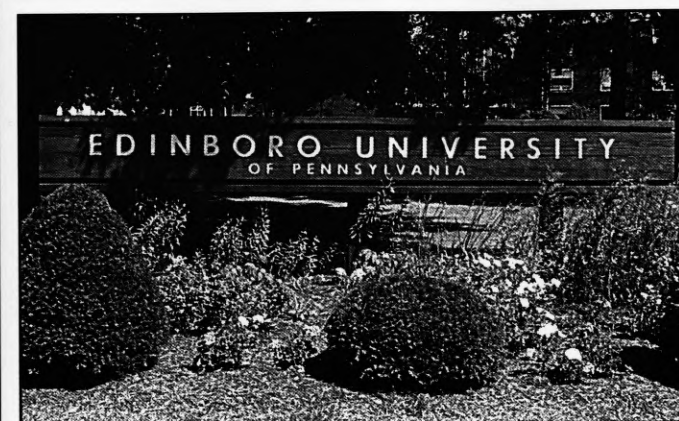

EDINBORO UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA



HISTORY

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania was founded in 1857 as a private academy. Previously named Edinboro Academy, Edinboro Normal School, Edinboro State Teachers College, and Edinboro State College, the University was the second normal school established in Pennsylvania and the 12th in the U.S. On July 1, 1983, it became Edinboro University of Pennsylvania with the formation of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education.

LOCATION

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania is located in the resort community of Edinboro - just 15 miles south of Erie, Pennsylvania's third-largest city. Edinboro is conveniently located approximately 100 miles from Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Buffalo. The University is easily accessible from all directions because of its proximity to Interstates 79 and 90.

There are two lakes nearby. Edinboro Lake is a 250-acre recreational area with three guarded beaches for swimming, boating and other water sports. The Edinboro lakeside community features a large selection of cottages for rent. Lake Erie, one of the Great Lakes, is just 15 miles

north. Edinboro also is close to several ski resorts for both downhill and cross country enthusiasts. The area is a popular hunting and fishing spot for outdoors enthusiasts.

Edinboro University is the largest employer in the area, with approximately 2,000 full and part-time employees, many of them current and former Edinboro University students.

ACADEMICS

Edinboro University offers a diversified and comprehensive selection of more than 100 degree programs, with 52 minors tailored to meet the needs of each student. With a student-faculty ratio of 18:1, Edinboro offers associate's degrees, bachelor's degrees and master's programs in many specialized fields of study.

Edinboro has an undergraduate and graduate enrollment of nearly 7,500 students.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

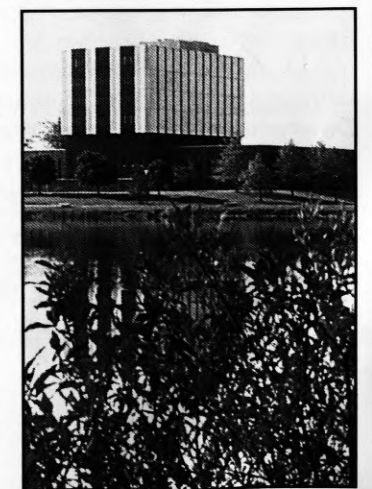
Edinboro is proud to feature the nation's third largest educational program for the physically disabled including services for the hearing impaired, the visually impaired, and the learning disabled. The campus is nearly 100-percent wheelchair accessible.

The University has an outstanding Honors program for academically gifted students and an international education program for the exchange of faculty and students.

Internships and field experiences integrate academic pursuits with on-site "real world" work situations and personal relationships, while numerous cultural, social and recreational activities are available.

CAMPUS FACILITIES

- Edinboro features 42 buildings on a spacious 585-acre wooded campus which includes a five-acre lake, open fields and wooded area. Day, evening and weekend classes are available at the 27-acre Porreco Extension Center in nearby Erie, Pa.
- There are eight on-campus residence halls housing approximately 2,600 students.
- A state-of-the-art seven-story library in the center of campus features more than 440,000 bound volumes and 1,200,000 microform units, an on-line public access catalog, on-line and CD-ROM searching systems, public access catalog for the visually impaired, and inter-library loan services.
- Edinboro University houses a planetarium, modern science labs, solar observatory, robotics laboratory, TV studio, radio station, and center for the performing arts.
- The University also features a reading clinic, speech and hearing clinic, math clinic, parent-child development center, and computer lab for children.
- Five powerful mini-computer systems, more than 725 personal computers, 300 terminals, and 11 computer labs with current hardware and software are available for student use throughout the year.
- Edinboro recently newly-remodeled the University Center with an indoor running track, saunas and whirlpools, weight room, racquetball and handball courts, full-service bookstore and dining areas, and an aerobics room for student use.



FIGHTING SCOT ATHLETICS

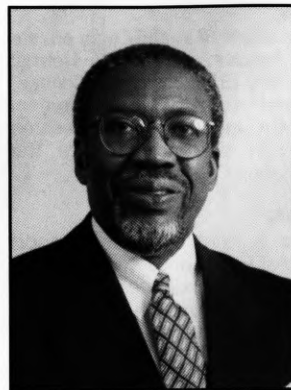
The Fighting Scots compete in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), Division I and II. Edinboro's highly competitive athletic program consists of 19 varsity level sports:

Men: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, swimming, tennis, track (indoor and outdoor), and wrestling;
Women: basketball, cross country, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track (indoor and outdoor), and volleyball.

Several indoor athletic facilities, including basketball courts, a weight room, and an olympic-sized swimming pool with diving tank, are housed at McComb Fieldhouse, home of the Fighting Scots. Outdoor athletics facilities include Sox Harrison Stadium, home of Fighting Scot football, an all-weather track, baseball and softball fields, tennis courts, a cross country course, and 26 soccer fields.



PRESIDENT FRANK G. POGUE, JR.



Frank G. Pogue was appointed the 15th president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania on July 1, 1996.

A sociologist, Dr. Pogue holds a bachelor's degree from Alabama State University, a master's degree from Atlanta University, and a Ph. D. from the University of Pittsburgh.

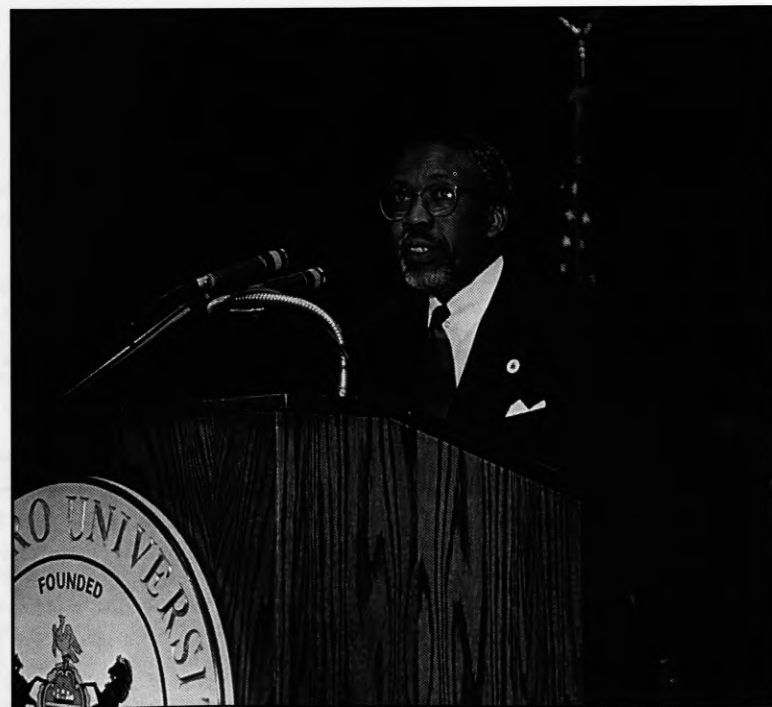
Prior to his presidency at Edinboro University, Dr. Pogue was the vice chancellor for student affairs and special programs at the State University of New York (SUNY) Central Administration in Albany, serving in that position for 10 years. While vice chancellor, he also served for one year as interim president at the SUNY College at Cobleskill. Prior to his assignment in the SUNY Central Administration, President Pogue was vice president for student affairs, associate vice president for research and educational development, dean of undergraduate studies, and a department chairperson, all at SUNY Albany.

Dr. Pogue participates in national, regional and statewide leadership groups. Since 1984, he has served on the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools and is a former vice chair and member of its Executive Committee and currently chair of its Task Force on Equity and Diversity. He was also recently appointed chairperson of their Advisory Committee on Institutional Financial Resources, which will advise the Commission on the relationship of financial resources to institutional accreditation. In addition, Dr. Pogue serves as a member of the American Council on Education Commission on Government and Public Affairs which advises the Division of Governmental Relations on the broad range of issues in which congressional and executive branch actions affect colleges and universities. He is also a member of the College Board National Forum Committee. Last year, Dr. Pogue was appointed to the Executive Committee of the Commission on the Rural Agenda of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

In October 1996, President Pogue was appointed by Pennsylvania Governor Tom Ridge to the Governor's Commission on Academic Standards. The bipartisan panel of legislators, business and corporate leaders and educators was given the task of gathering from citizens across the Commonwealth - particularly parents and community and business leaders - ideas and proposals for new academic standards and then recommending them to the Governor for approval.

Locally, Dr. Pogue serves on the boards of directors for the Erie Conference on Community Development, the United Way of Erie County, Congressman Phil English's High-Tech Advisory Task Force, State Representative Tracy Seyfert's Education Local Advisory Committee, the Erie County Fiscal Management Task Force, the French Creek Council of the Boy Scouts of America, the Martin Luther King Center Scholarship Committee, and the Greater Erie County Chapter of the American Red Cross, for which he served as their 1997 capital campaign chairman. He has also been appointed to the Board of Corporators for both the Hamot Health Foundation and the St. Vincent Health Center.

Since becoming president, Dr. Pogue has created the concept and philosophy of the Edinboro Family, a learner-centered environment where students come first and are an integral part of a caring and supportive campus community.



EDINBORO UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Naomi T. Johnson Vice President Student Affairs and Student Success

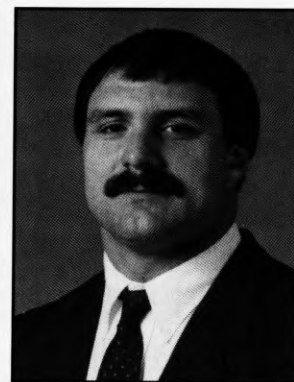
Dr. Naomi T. Johnson begins her second year as Vice President for Student Affairs and Student Success at Edinboro.

Dr. Johnson earned a B.A. in sociology from Moorhead State University, a master's degree in college student personnel from Bowling Green State University, and a Ph.D. in higher education from Arizona State University.

Prior to her appointment at Edinboro University, Dr. Johnson served as the Associate Dean of Students at the University of California-Santa Barbara. Her wide range of experience in service to students includes past positions as peer counseling coordinator, assistant to the president for student affairs, director of the campus activities center, and assistant dean of students.

One of Dr. Johnson's main objectives is to facilitate a creative and innovative campus atmosphere. She also hopes to lead a united effort by the University Community to ensure a well-rounded education for students.

Dr. Johnson and her husband, Earl Jacobs, a Certified Public Accountant, reside in Edinboro.



Bruce Baumgartner Athletic Director

Four-time Olympic medalist Bruce Baumgartner begins his second year as Athletic Director at Edinboro University, after serving as a coach at Edinboro for nearly 14 years.

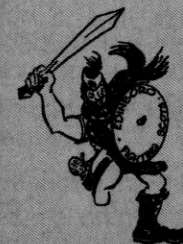
Baumgartner, one of the greatest American wrestlers of all time, led Edinboro to some of the finest mat seasons in school history, including a 14-0 dual meet record in 1996-97, the first undefeated season ever at Edinboro. The Scots also placed sixth at the NCAA Division I National Championships, the program's best showing in 11 years.

Baumgartner affirmed his status as the greatest freestyle heavyweight in American history by winning the bronze medal at the Olympic Games at Atlanta in 1996 to go along with two golds and a silver. It was his fourth Olympic medal and record-setting 13th world-level medal. Baumgartner was honored by his fellow United States Olympic athletes when

he was chosen to carry the American flag for the Opening Ceremonies. He was the winner of the 1995 James E. Sullivan Award as the outstanding amateur athlete in the United States.

Bruce and his wife Linda have three sons.

PHILOSOPHY ON ATHLETICS



As an institution of higher learning, Edinboro University of Pennsylvania is committed to the development of the entire individual. The philosophy of athletics at Edinboro is considered an integral part of the institutional program of education which provides experiences that will help develop the physical, mental, and emotional aspects of the student. '98 FIGHTING SCOT FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

The 1998 Edinboro University Fighting Scots take the field this fall with more confidence and experience, a mixture Edinboro head coach Tom Hollman is optimistic about. With only three losses to graduation, the team will have the luxury of relying on game experience as they embark on what is arguably one of the toughest schedules in school history.

"Last year was a learning experience for our team," Hollman said. "We have built a great tradition here at Edinboro, and we were used to just lining up and beating people. But, we were very young last year, our conference was more balanced than

ever, and when you play a very ambitious non-conference schedule, you can't have any let downs."

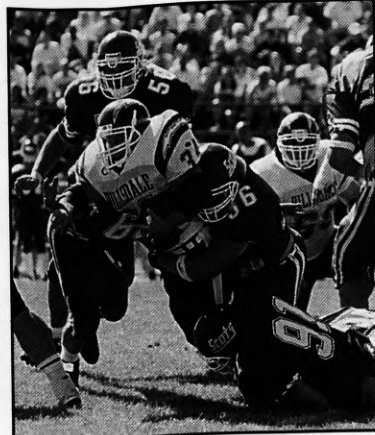
Ambitious may be just the word to describe this year's list of games. The Scots open the campaign on the road at Hillsdale College, and then return home to Sox Harrison Stadium for their only home game in the month of September to face Carson-Newman College, who is among the top three in nearly every pre-season poll. Glensville State and Millersville University will keep the Scots on the road through weeks three and four.

The next six weeks will consist of the always tough Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division schedule. One advantage for the Boro is that they will play three of those first four games in the friendly confines of Sox Harrison. The Shippensburg Red Raiders will roll into town for Edinboro's annual Homecoming contest, and after a short road trip to Clarion, the Scots will return home to host Lock Haven and California (PA). Edinboro hosts Lock Haven in conjunction with the University's Family Weekend.

Week eight will see the Scots travel to Slippery Rock to take on the Rock, who is ranked as high as ninth in the pre-season polls, before heading to always tough Indiana (PA).

EUP will once again play their final regular season game at home as the Bloomsburg Huskies head West for the second cross-over game of the season.

The demands placed on the team due to their unrelenting schedule will certainly be challenging - the Scots will face three teams from last year's playoff field and the two top teams from the PSAC East - but the Scots feel their reward might just be a return trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Scots Defense Looks to Capitalize on Speed and Depth

Defensively, Edinboro has good overall depth and should be strong at every position. With several key returners who understand the Scots system, the defense will once again look to be among the best in the PSAC.

Eight linemen return to the mix, led by Dan Keen, a 6-2, 260-pound junior tackle, and end Matt Stultz, a 6-2, 245-pound junior who earned All-PSAC West second-team honors last year.

The Scots are also deep at linebacker as three of the team's four

leading tacklers return to the position. Dan Caro, the Scots team leader in tackles a year ago (85), was a first-team All-PSAC West pick. The 6-1, 230-pound junior also recorded five sacks (-31 yards) and seven tackles for loss (-25 yards). Ed Mattie, a 5-10, 215-pound senior, was a second-team All-PSAC pick after registering 64 tackles, eight of which went for a loss of 22 yards, and three QB sacks for -33 yards. Nick Oto, a 6-1, 210-pound sophomore, will look to add to his 61 tackles from last season. Tory Hunt, a 5-9, 195-pound senior, has been a starter at outside linebacker the past two seasons, and will also return.

Fifth-year senior David Sadler will be counted on to lead a young, but experienced secondary. Last season Sadler moved to cornerback, but will play his final season back in the free safety position. Sophomores D.K. McDonald and Kevin Johnston return after starting most of last season as true freshmen.

"Our defense has always been a strength," said Hollman. "We were solid last year, but we just gave up too many big plays.

"We will need some guys to really step up and fill some holes for us. Our guys really have the mentality it takes to play defense - we hope to use that to our advantage."

Scots to Feature Balanced Attack on Offense

While depth appears to be an overall team strength, this is especially true for the Boro offense with no losses to graduation.

Once again, the Edinboro offense will be led by Brian Caldwell, a 6-3, 212-pound sophomore quarterback. Last season, Caldwell became the first true

freshman signal caller in 16 seasons at the Boro. Despite having to adjust to the more physical collegiate game, Caldwell responded well and already sits in the 10th spot for career passing yardage (1,579), career pass attempts (250), and career completions (120).

With a year's experience, Caldwell has developed the poise and confidence to run the Boro offense, and has become a leader on and off the playing field.

Senior Quentin Ware-Bey led the team in receptions last year, and was a second-team All-PSAC selection. Ware-Bey caught 32 passes for 673

yards and 5 TDs, an average of 21.0 yards per catch. He now has 85 career receptions (7th all-time at the Boro) for 1,301 yards (sixth at EU). Ware-Bey has had another productive off-season and will be counted on heavily once more in 1998.

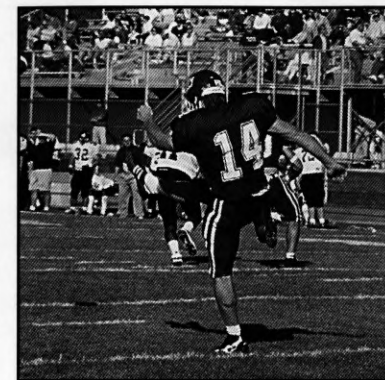
Junior Jeremy Brain led the receivers in 1996 when he caught 27 passes for 354 yards and two touchdowns. He now has 44 career receptions for 530 yards. Brain continues to add size and strength in the off-season and should play an integral role again in '98.

While Ware-Bey and Brain are the top returning receivers, the coaching staff also anticipates that some new players will make an immediate impact.

At tailback, Gerald Thompson, a 5-11, 215-pound senior, will play his final season for the Scots. Thompson has rushed for 2,712 yards and 25 TDs in 30 career games at Edinboro to rank fourth on the Scots all-time career rushing charts. Thompson battled leg injuries through the middle portion of '97 season, but led the team in rushing (813 yards, 4.2 yards per carry) and scoring (48 points). Thompson is also a capable receiver coming out of the backfield. Last season, he hauled in 13 catches for 87 yards.

The battle at fullback may help determine the offensive mind set early in training camp. Juniors Mick Lilley, 6-1, 238-pounds, and Chris Morgan, 5-10, 245-pounds, will compete for playing time. Morgan has exceptional hands and was the Scots' third-best receiver in '97 as he caught 15 passes for 147 yards. Lilley on the other hand is a solid lead-blocker. Both backs provide excellent pass protection for the quarterback. Though the coaching staff feels both players could fill the position more than adequately, they have the luxury of utilizing each player as the play calling dictates.

Edinboro's offensive line features 6-2, 280-pound

senior Todd Rogacki. Named as an Honorable Mention All-American after last season, Rogacki is also a two-time first-team All-PSAC West pick. Junior center Tom Scarpone, 6-2, 272-pounds, earned second-team All-PSAC West honors in his first year playing the position.

Special Teams Once Again Led By Cook

Special teams will once again be led by junior punter/placekicker Tyson Cook. Cook averaged 37.8 yards per punt his first two seasons, while connecting on 14 of 26 field goals and

33 of 34 PATs. Cook made school history early last season when he hit a 52-yard field goal versus Hillsdale to tie a 10-year old school record. Cook has proven he has a strong leg and will focus more on consistency this season.

One key to this year's success on special teams will be the impact of the new players as the coaching staff looks for a speedster for returns and the right combination of blocking to open the holes. The Scots came close to breaking a couple of returns last season and will look for that extra edge this season.

"Whatever It Takes... and Then Some."

Experience and depth - two of the key elements to having a successful season in any sport. The Scots are fortunate to have both in their favor. However, the thing that separates a great team from merely a good team is the drive and hunger to do "Whatever it takes... and then some." The Boro squad has adopted this motto over the past year, and from the high caliber schedule to the pride of the players and coaches in the program, the 1998 season is shaping up to be another exciting chapter in the history of Fighting Scot football.

Henne Selected Winner of Woody Hayes National Scholar-Athlete Award, Selected to Serve on NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Board



Former Edinboro University of Pennsylvania tight end Todd Henne was named a recipient of the prestigious Woody Hayes National Scholar-Athlete Award in December of 1995 after completing a highly successful career as a member of the Fighting Scot football program.

The Woody Hayes Award is presented annually by the Sertoma Club of Columbus, Ohio, to the outstanding man and woman in each of the three NCAA Divisions for "demonstrated excellence in academics, athletics, community service and leadership." Henne received the 1995 award for Division II men.

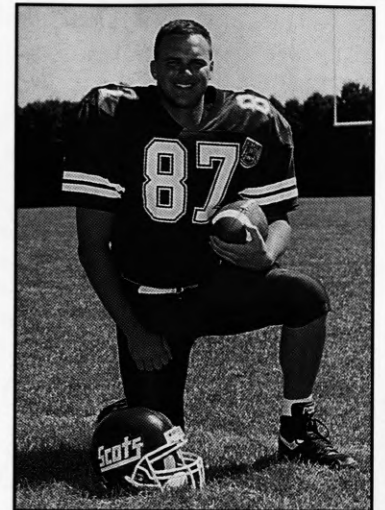
The award is a living memorial to the high standards of excellence - both on and off the field - of the former Ohio State University football coach.

Henne also is in the process of completing a two-year term as a member of the NCAA Division II Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. He recently attended the first-ever NCAA Division II Student-Athlete Summit in Denver, where student-athletes participated in the NCAA's governance process with members of Division II's Management Council.

As a speech communication major at Edinboro, Henne posted a 3.79 cumulative grade point average. He was a GTE Academic All-District selection as a senior and a national finalist for an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship.

On the field, Henne was a first-team All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference pick as a senior after earning second-team recognition as a junior. He caught 37 passes for 361 yards and seven TDs as a two-year starter. He also was a key blocker for a team that averaged 224.2 yards per game rushing and 28.7 points per contest. During the fall of his senior year, Henne was appointed to the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and attended the organization's annual meeting in Dallas. He also was a key member of Edinboro's Student-Athlete Advisory Board and served as the sports director for the campus radio station (WFSE). He was part of a student team that produced an award-winning video on responsible drinking.

"I've often said that Todd is one of those people you know will be successful in life," said Edinboro head coach Tom Hollman. "He truly exemplifies what college athletics is all about, adhering to the same ideals that Coach Hayes stood for. We are very proud to have Todd represent our football program and University in the manner in which he has."

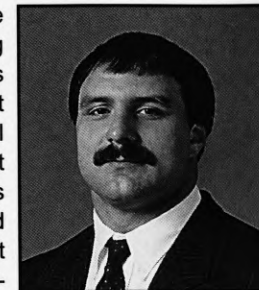

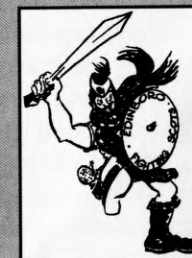

SCOTS IN THE PROS

Several former Edinboro University of Pennsylvania football players have received the opportunity to play professional football.

Four Fighting Scots are currently playing in the professional ranks, including three members of Edinboro's 1996 team. Denorse Mosely was activated by the Miami Dolphins for last year's post-season action while three-time All-American offensive lineman Jeremy O'Day and former teammate Jeff Traversy, a defensive tackle, made the move from collegiate ball to the professional ranks of the Canadian Football League. Cleveland Pratt, who finished his career at Edinboro in 1990, has enjoyed several successful seasons in the Arena Football League.

Mosely spent the majority of last season on the Dolphins practice squad before being signed to help bolster the secondary for the playoffs. At Edinboro, Mosely used his speed to make a name for himself on special teams, returning kick-offs for touchdowns in consecutive games. He also saw action at receiver, catching a 91-yard pass for a touchdown against Cal.

O'Day enters his second season with the two-time defending Grey Cup champion Toronto Argonauts. The 6-3, 295-pound offensive lineman was chosen by the Argos in the 1997 supplemental draft. O'Day's versatility earned him a back-up role at offensive guard and tackle early in his rookie season, but solid fundamentals won him a starting spot as the season progressed. Eventually, O'Day also saw time at tight end where he caught two passes, one a 2-yard TD pass from Doug Flutie.

Traversy was the third pick (15th overall) of the Calgary Stampeders in the 1997 college draft. The 6-5, 280-pound nose tackle's pass rush abilities helped him secure a starting role early in his rookie season and he currently is playing a reserve role at defensive tackle.

O'Day and Traversy both credit the Edinboro coaching staff as the key to their professional success.

"Coach (Scott) Browning taught me exactly what I needed to know to have a chance to play pro ball," said O'Day. "When I arrived at camp, I was amazed at how well my techniques and training stacked up against veterans. I certainly appreciate his guidance and hope people understand what a great coach he is."

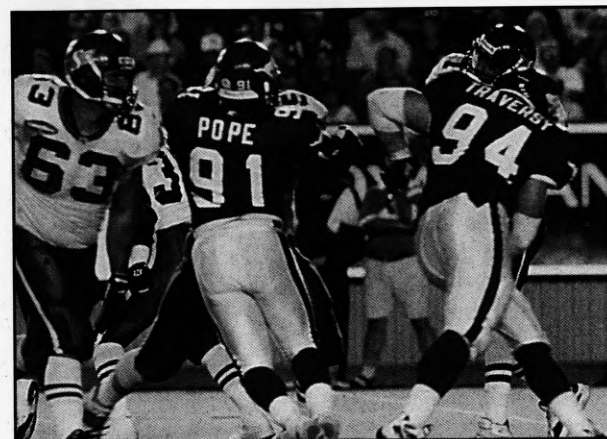
Traversy agreed. "Coach Hollman and Coach Cronk are two of the most knowledgeable men that I've ever been around in football," he said. "They pushed me to the limits and I'm glad they did, because now I'm living a dream and I owe much of my success to them and the Edinboro football program."

Once called "the best kept secret in the league," Pratt has made a name for himself with the Florida Bobcats and the AFL. The 5-7, 171-pound offensive specialist was acquired by the Bobcats in February of 1995, and plays wide receiver and return specialist.

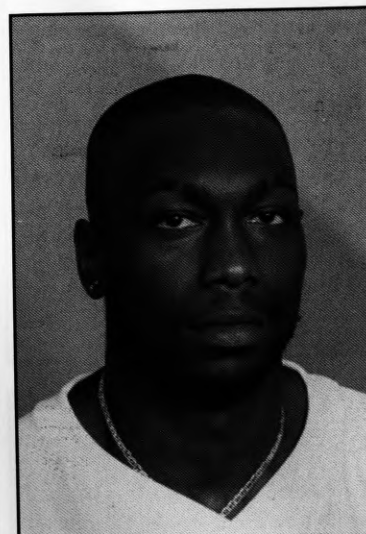
Pratt has scored six touchdowns thus far this season and averages 15.6 yards per catch (312 yards) and leads the team with 20 kick returns for 288 yards. Pratt has also seen time in the backfield where he is averaging 3.3 yards per carry.

Wide receiver/kick returner Gilbert Grantlin, who played for Edinboro during the 1995 season, signed a free-agent contract with the National Football League's Minnesota Vikings in April 1996 and was a member of the team's practice squad. The 6-1, 182-pound Grantlin played only one season at Edinboro, but made a significant impact with his big-play ability. The Florida

native, an honorable-mention All-American, caught 44 passes for 840 yards (19.1 yards per catch) and eight touchdowns. Grantlin also had 372 yards on 17 kickoff returns (21.8 yard average) and 300 yards on 28 punt returns

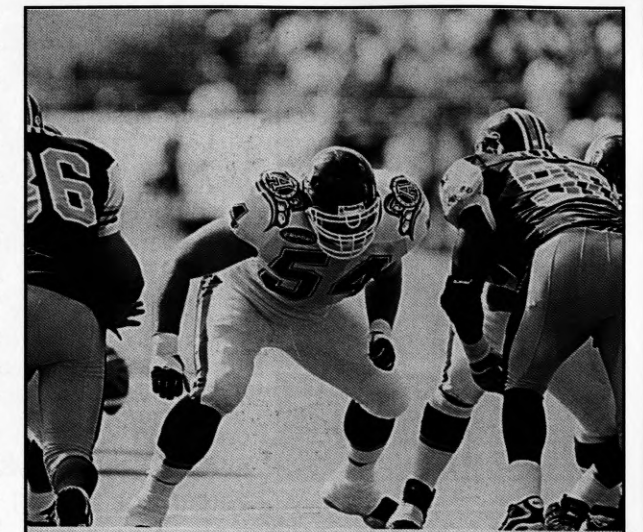
Before Grantlin, Mike Kegarise was the last Fighting Scot to play in the NFL. The 6-6, 310-pound offensive tackle, a two-time All-American, signed a free-agent deal with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks after concluding his Edinboro career in 1993. Kegarise spent the 1994 season on the Seahawks' injured-reserve list with a severe knee injury, but was released the following season when Seattle changed head coaches.

Two other former Scots who played under current head coach Tom Hollman also signed free-agent contracts with NFL teams. Offensive guard Curtis Rose signed with the Miami Dolphins, while wide receiver Ernest Priester inked a deal with the Denver Broncos. Neither Rose nor Priester played a regular-season game in the NFL, although Cleveland native Priester later played for the Cleveland Thunder of the Arena Football League.

Rose and Priester both were two-time All-Americans at Edinboro. The 6-3, 280-pound Rose earned the honors in 1990 and 1991, while the 5-9, 170-pound Priester did so in 1989 and 1990. Priester was the runner-up for the Harlon Hill Award honoring the NCAA Division II Player of the Year and the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Co-Player of the Year in 1990. He is Edinboro's all-time career leader in receptions (148), receiving yards (3,064), yards per reception (20.7) and TD receptions (35).

A pair of Scots who performed during the Edinboro State College days -- David Green and Jim Romaniszyn -- played professional football in the 1970s. Both are members of the Edinboro Athletic Hall of Fame, with Green being inducted in 1988 and Romaniszyn being honored in 1983. Green, a running back, played for the Cleveland Browns and for the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League. An All-American, Green played for Edinboro in 1975 and 1976. He ranks fifth on the school's all-time rushing list with 1,978 career yards in 19 games (104 yards per contest).

Romaniszyn played at Edinboro from 1970-72, earning All-American honors. The 6-2, 225-pound Titusville native was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in 1973 as a running back, but was switched to outside linebacker. A versatile performer, Romaniszyn is the only Edinboro player to finish his career with 1,000-plus yards rushing (1,266) and 1,000-plus yards receiving (1,088). He also played basketball for the Scots.

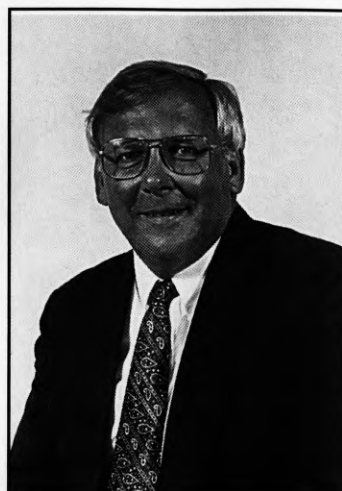

HEAD COACH TOM HOLLMAN



After guiding the Fighting Scot football program to some of the finest seasons in school history, Tom Hollman begins his 11th season as head coach at Edinboro.

Hollman became the all-time winningest coach in Edinboro history three years ago and enters the '98 campaign with a 71-34-2 mark at Edinboro, compiling more victories and a better winning percentage (.673) than

any coach in Fighting Scot history.

Hollman has guided the Edinboro program to NCAA Division II playoff appearances in five of the past nine seasons. The Scots also have captured a pair of Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division titles (1995 and 1989) and have consistently been ranked in the national polls.

Hollman enters the '98 season ranked 12th on the NCAA Division II Winningest Active Coaches List. He has compiled a 95-45-3 overall record (.675) in 14 seasons as a college head coach, including a 24-11-1 mark in four seasons at Wooster College in Ohio.

Under Hollman, Edinboro recorded nine consecutive winning seasons from 1988-96, highlighted in 1996 by an impressive 48-35 victory over PSAC West champion Clarion University of PA, who advanced to the NCAA Division II national semifinals a few weeks later.

Edinboro wrapped up the 1997 season with its first-ever overtime victory, defeating Lock Haven University of PA, 29-23, in two overtime sessions.

Edinboro posted a 9-2 record in 1995 and was the only program in the 14-member PSAC to record a perfect 6-0 league mark, the second time the Scots accomplished the feat under Hollman. Edinboro was ranked eighth in the final NCAA Division II football poll in '95 and the program received its fifth berth to the NCAA playoffs.

Hollman joined the Edinboro staff in January of 1988 as the program's 11th head coach after serving as the defensive coordinator at Ohio University for three years.

Edinboro went 4-0-1 during the final five games of its first season, then in 1989, captured the PSAC West title with a 6-0 record and roared into the NCAA Division II playoffs for the first time in school history.

The Scots lost a thrilling 45-32 decision at perennial Division II power North Dakota State University, but the EU program had clearly arrived as a force in Division II football. Hollman was honored as the top coach in the East Region by the American Football Coaches Association and he also was selected PSAC West "Coach of the Year."

In 1990, Hollman guided the Fighting Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro beat Virginia Union, 38-14, on the road, to advance to the national quarterfinals. The Scots then dropped a tough 14-7 contest to PSAC rival Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

The Scots returned to the NCAA playoffs in 1992 and 1993 after runner-up finishes in the PSAC West.

In addition to team success, Hollman has coached 53 All-Americans at Edinboro, including Elbert Cole and Ernest Priester, who both placed in the top three in the voting for the Harlon Hill Award presented to the NCAA Division II Player of the Year. He also has coached players who have set school records for rushing, passing, receiving, quarterback sacks, and interceptions.

HEAD COACH TOM HOLLMAN

Hollman is a 1968 graduate of Ohio Northern University, where he was a three-year starter for the football team and a two-way performer as a defensive back and end on offense. He holds the school record with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years.

Hollman's coaching career began in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. After earning a master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati in 1971, he became head coach at Greenville High School in Ohio, where he posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark from 1971-73. Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974-75 seasons, where his squads recorded a 15-3-2 mark. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in 1974, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In 1976, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks, where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University. The following year, Hollman accepted the head coaching position at Wooster and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school history (24-11-1). In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the 1984 campaign. Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University from 1985 until accepting the head job at Edinboro in 1988.

Tom resides in Edinboro with his wife, Kandi. They have four children, Mari, Jon, Tim and Denise.

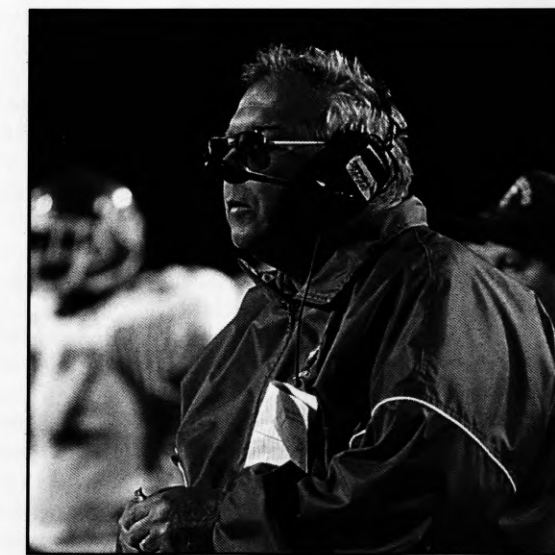

EDINBORO COACHING STAFF



Scott Browning - Offensive Coordinator/Line

Scott Browning begins his fourth season as Edinboro's offensive coordinator and 13th year overall coaching the Fighting Scots.

Browning has coached a variety of positions at the Boro, including the offensive line for the past five years, and running backs and defensive backs in the past. Under his guidance the past three years, the Scots' offense averaged 315.5 yards

of total offense and 23.9 points per game. This season, Browning has returning an experienced offensive line, including Todd Rogacki, who was named Honorable Mention All-American by the *Football Gazette*.

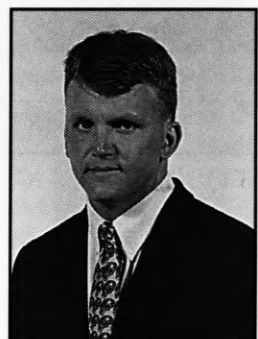
In his many capacities, Browning has coached several All-Americans such as Steve Russell, Michael Willis, Wade Smith, Georj Lewis, Mike Barnes, Elbert Cole, and Jeremy O'Day.

Browning has coached at three NCAA Division I schools.

Before joining the Edinboro staff in 1986, he coached receivers and running backs at Ohio State University for three years. He also coached the defensive secondary at New Mexico State University in 1982, and the following year mentored the receivers at Idaho State University, an NCAA Division I-AA playoff participant.

Prior to his stint at OSU, Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview High Schools in Ohio from 1979-81. Browning earned a master's degree in education administration from New Mexico State in 1983, and a BS in education from Ohio State in 1981. Earlier, before transferring to OSU, Scott attended Capital University, where he played football for one season. Browning was a four-year letterman in four sports at Loudonville High School (OH) prior to his collegiate days.

Nick Cronk - Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

After serving as the Fighting Scots defensive line coach for three years, Nick Cronk was promoted to defensive coordinator last season. Now entering his fifth year at Edinboro, Cronk has made a tremendous impact on the success of the Fighting Scot defense.

Last year's efforts of the defensive front resulted in 33 quarterback sacks and 46 additional tackles behind the line of scrimmage. Cronk loses two key players in 1997 PSAC West Defensive Player of the Year Brian Decker and first-team All-PSAC linebacker Jesse Hannan, but returns All-PSAC picks Dan Caro and Ed Mattie at linebacker, and Matt Stultz, a defensive lineman as well as a host of players who gained valuable experience last season.

Before coming to Edinboro, Cronk coached tight ends at Indiana University. He spent two seasons with the Hoosiers, as a graduate assistant to head coach Bill Mallory. His first season in Bloomington,

Cronk spent time assisting the defensive coordinator with the linebackers, and helped in the recruiting duties.

While at IU, he graduated with a master's degree in physical education administration. Prior to joining the staff at Indiana, Cronk was an assistant coach at Carroll Consolidated High School, handling the special teams and defensive ends.

Cronk spent his playing days at Wabash College, where he was an honorable mention performer in the Indiana College Athletic Conference and captained the 1991 league championship squad. He graduated from Wabash with a bachelor of arts degree in political science.

Dustin Calhoun - Defensive Secondary

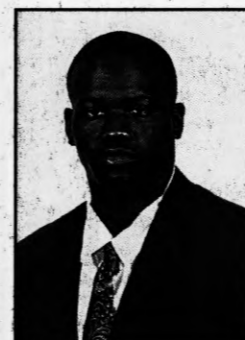
Dustin Calhoun enters his second season with Edinboro University in 1998 and will be responsible for the Scots' defensive secondary.

Houston currently leads the list of career and single season pass deflections with 53 and 16, respectively, is tied for 11th place on the list of single season interceptions (5), and racked up 269 tackles in his four year career as a Fighting Scot.

Houston has a four-year old son, DeAndre Houston. A native of East Cleveland, Houston now resides in Edinboro.



Mike McCoy - Quarterbacks/Running Backs

Mike McCoy enters his third season in 1998 as a full-time assistant responsible for coaching the Fighting Scot running backs.

McCoy's squad rushed for 1,435 yards and averaged 3.4-yds per carry last season. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Marshall, under head coach George Champ. As an undergraduate, McCoy played running back for a Marshall team that finished the 1987 season as the NCAA Division I-AA runner-up.

Jim Henson - Defensive Line

Jim Henson begins his first year as Edinboro University's defensive line coach after serving as a mathematics teacher, football coach and athletic director at Grand Valley High School for 22 years.

At Grand Valley, Henson led the Mustangs to a 150-68-4 overall record, including five Grand River Conference championships, three East-Suburban Conference championships, and three State playoff appearances. In the 1990's, Henson guided the Mustangs to three undefeated seasons and a 23-game, regular season winning streak. Henson has been named the Coach of the Year many times, and was selected the Ohio Division V Coach of the Year in 1997.

Henson graduated from Hiram College in 1968 and earned his master's degree in mathematics education from Youngstown State University.

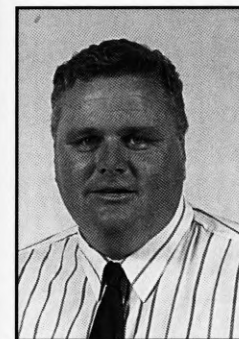
Todd V. Jay, Associate Athletic Director

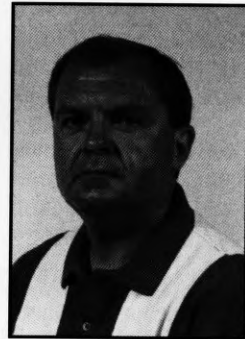
Sue Marshall, Athletic Business Director

George Roberts, A.T., C., Head Athletic Trainer

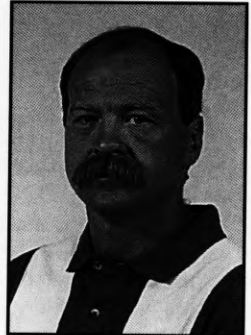

FIGHTING SCOTS HOST SHIPPENSBURG IN 1998 HOMECOMING GAME



THE GAME

The Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Fighting Scot football team will play at home for the second time during the 1998 season when they open play in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division, hosting the Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania Red Raiders on Saturday, October 3, with kickoff set for 2 p.m.

The game will be celebrate Homecoming 1998 and will be broadcast live on Edinboro's campus radio station, WFSE (88.9 FM). The contest will also feature the half-time McKick for Tuition. The pre-game homecoming show is set to begin at 1 p.m.

LAST TIME OUT

Edinboro is now 1-3 after dropping a 42-7 decision to Millersville University of Pennsylvania.

The Scots found themselves down early as the Marauders scored the first 21 points of the ball game. The Edinboro offense seemed to get on track with an aggressive drive in the final minutes of the first half, putting together a 9-play, 69-yard drive capped off by a Gerald Thompson TD with 00:43 showing on the clock. Placekicker Tyson Cook hit the PAT to give the Scots seven points before the close of the half. On the ensuing kickoff, Millersville had an eight-yard return before Millersville quarterback Drew Folmar took a knee to end the half.

With the Scots set to receive the opening kickoff in the second half, the Edinboro faithful were hoping to build on that momentum coming out of the locker room.

Unfortunately for the Scots, Millersville was finally able to shake their third quarter scoring woes and after the Boro drive stalled, Millersville took their first possession all the way in for the touchdown. That drive was highlighted by a 52-yard rush by John Flamish for the score.

Two more fourth quarter touchdowns sealed the win for Marauders.

For the game, the Edinboro offense netted 237 yards, 176 of those yards came in the air as QB Brian Caldwell hit 13 of 28 attempts with no INTs.

SCOTS AMONG PSAC'S TOP OFFENSIVE UNITS

Though Edinboro only gained 237 yards of total offense versus Millersville, the Scots are still among the top six teams in the conference in the category, averaging 361.5 yards per contest. Edinboro's passing game is currently third in the PSAC, netting 221 yards per outing.

Individually, several Scots are ranking among the conference best in key categories. Senior tailback Gerald Thompson is currently the second-best running back in the PSAC. Thompson has 528 yards this season for an average of 132 yards per game. Thompson continues to lead the conference is scoring. To date, Thompson is scoring 12.0 points each time out - three points more than the next closest competitor. Finally, Thompson is also among the top performers in the all-purpose yardage list.

Another top individual for the Fighting Scots has been sophomore QB Brian Caldwell. Currently among the PSAC leaders in passing yards and total offense, the Scots signal

caller is just 34 yards shy of moving into ninth-place on EUP's career passing chart. Caldwell is also just shy of moving into the top seven all-time in career pass attempts and completions.

THE RECEIVING CORPS

Caldwell's favorite target over the past two seasons has been senior wide out Quentin Ware-Bey. The tandem have hooked up for 19 receptions covering 289 yards with three TDs this season alone. While those numbers rank Ware-Bey among the top receivers in the conference, tight end Rob Barney is also developing into another reliable receiver for Caldwell.

Against Millersville, Barney had another solid game for the Scots, catching five passes for 72 yards. Listed at 6-4, Barney has shown both overall speed and leaping abilities to provide Caldwell with a big target at various spots on the field. The majority of Barney's receptions have come on key third down conversions for the Scots, and often at the expense of Barney taking ferocious hits in the middle of the field.

While the duo accounts for the majority of Fighting Scot receptions, all told, 12 different Edinboro players have been on the receiving end of Caldwell strikes.

THOMPSON SETS ONE MARK, EYES ANOTHER

To no one's surprise, the Edinboro running game has been carried on the back on Gerald Thompson this season. This senior phenom has already rolled up 528 yards on the ground for an average of 132 yards per game on an average of nearly 31 carries per game.

Saturday's game against Millersville produced one school record for Thompson. With his 16th carry, he not only scored his seventh touchdown of the season, but he became the all-time rushing attempt leader in Fighting Scot history. Thompson finished with 21 attempts to bring his career mark to 723 with seven games still remaining.

While he is happy with the accomplishment, Thompson has his sights set on another goal - becoming the all-time leader in rushing yardage.

"I didn't even know that the record (for attempts) was that close until early last week," said Thompson. "But getting the carries is the easy part. Right now I still need about a thousand yards, and for me to get that, it is going need a team effort."

"Right now the offense is playing well, the line is opening the holes, and the passing game loosens up the field. Defensively, there have been a lot of positives. I want to be the record holder when I leave, but truthfully winning games is the priority right now. Don't give up on this team yet."

Thompson also ranks among the best in NCAA Division II rushing, all-purpose yards and scoring this season.

EDINBORO DEFENSE

The Edinboro defensive game has been led by Kevin Johnston and Dan Caro. Johnston leads the team and is among the top five in the PSAC in tackles with 33 stops (27 solo) and one tackle for loss. Caro is also among the con-

PENNSYLVANIA STATE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) has established itself as one of the premier NCAA Division II athletic conferences in the nation.

Founded in 1951 for the purpose of promoting and administering the athletic programs at the 14 state teachers' colleges in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the PSAC is divided into seven-team Divisions.

The PSAC crowns Divisional Champions in football, but the "State Game" between the top team in the East and West was eliminated after the 1987 contest.

The PSAC is well-represented each year in the NCAA Division II national polls and post-season Football Championship.

The PSAC has had at least two teams compete in the NCAA Division II playoffs every year from 1988-96 and a national semifinalist in three of the past five seasons. Since 1990, PSAC teams have participated in a total of 27 NCAA Division II playoff games, highlighted by two national championship game appearances by Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1990 and 1993.

From its inception in 1951, each conference member selected its own competitive division within the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). In 1980, however, the presidents of each school, who make up the league's Board of Directors, voted to reclassify to NCAA Division II membership. Nine schools also elect to participate at the NCAA Division I level in select sports.

In 1983, all member institutions were granted University status and the State System of Higher Education (SSHE) was formed. The system currently has an enrollment in excess of 99,000 students with an alumni base of 402,000 including 287,000 who reside in the state. The Chancellor of the SSHE is Dr. James H. McCormick.

The PSAC sponsors championships in 20 men's and women's sports, including baseball, basketball, cross country, field hockey, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

One of the largest NCAA Division II conferences in the nation, the league employs a full-time commissioner and an information director. Steve Murray will serve as Commissioner for the conference after serving as the interim commissioner last year. 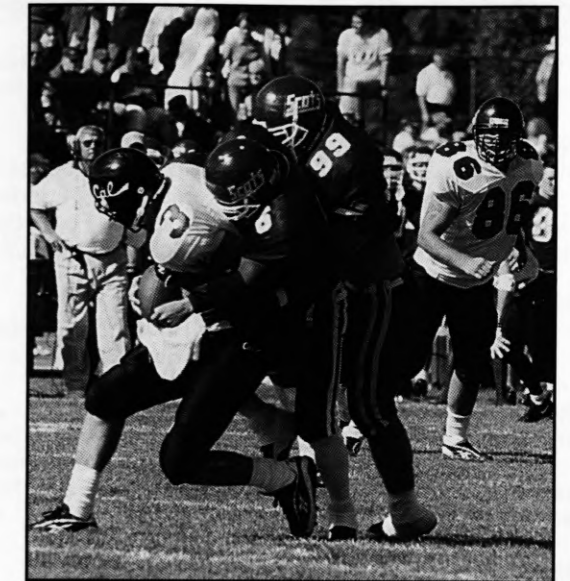

EDINBORO AND THE HARLON HILL AWARD

Two Edinboro University of Pennsylvania football players have been finalists for the Harlon Hill Award, presented annually to the top player in NCAA Division II football.

Former Edinboro running back Elbert Cole was one of three Harlon Hill finalists in 1989, while former Fighting Scot wide receiver Ernest Priester was a finalist for the award in 1990.

Cole placed third in the 1989 balloting, which was won by Texas A&I University running back Johnny Bailey, a three-time recipient. Priester was runner-up to North Dakota State University quarterback Chris Simdorn in 1990 when the Bison claimed the Division II national title.

Cole also was selected an All-American in 1989, receiving first-team honors from Kodak, second-team recognition from *Football Gazette* and third-team status from the Associated Press.

He rushed for 1,507 yards and set Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference records for touchdowns in a season (24) and points in a season (148). Cole led Edinboro to a PSAC West title, an 8-3 overall record, and

a No. 7 ranking in the final NCAA Division II national poll.

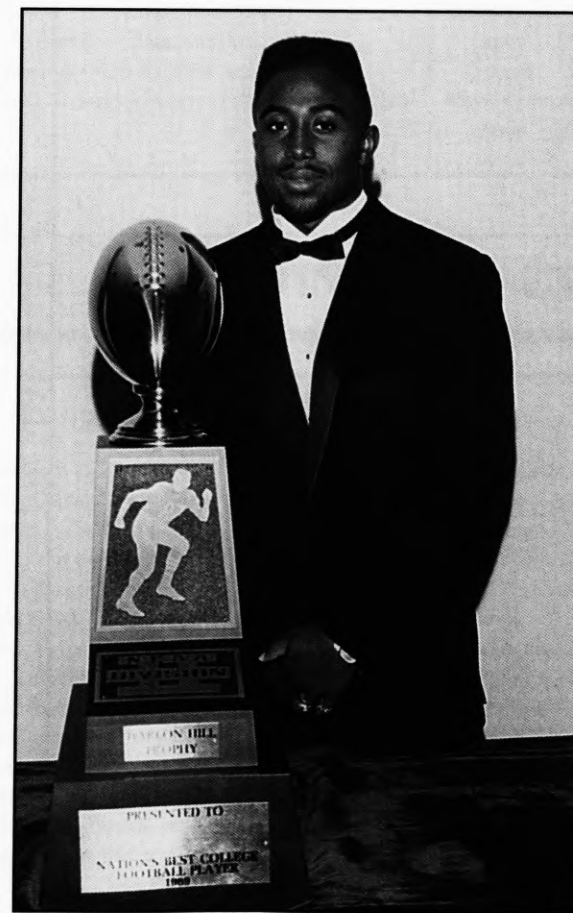
Cole finished his Edinboro career with 3,341 yards rushing and 40 rushing touchdowns, ranking him third and second respectively in school history.

Priester was the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division Co-Player of the Year in 1990. He also was an All-American, receiving first-team honors from Kodak, the Associated Press and *Football Gazette*. Priester caught 47 passes in 1990, totaling 1,102 yards (23.4 yards per catch) and 15 touchdowns. He led Edinboro to the NCAA Division II quarterfinals and a 9-3 overall record.

Priester also had an outstanding season in 1989, catching 49 passes for 1,128 yards (23-yard average) and a school-record 16 touchdown receptions. He is Edinboro's all-time career leader in receptions (148), receiving yards (3,064), yards per reception (20.7) and touchdown receptions (35). Following his career at Edinboro, Priester signed a free-agent contract with the National Football League's Denver Broncos. He later played for his hometown Cleveland Thunder of the Arena Football League.

The Harlon Hill Award is named in honor of legendary Chicago Bears wide receiver Harlon Hill, who was an All-American at the University of North Alabama. Irv Sigler, a tailback from Bloomsburg University of PA, was the 1997 winner, the first-ever from the PSAC.
