

Harrison Stadium for Homecoming 2001. Two year's ago Edinboro and Clarion hooked up in a Homecoming affair at Edinboro, and the game turned into a classic won by the Fighting Scots in the waning moments. This actually marks the third straight year that the two have met in a Homecoming game.

Welcome to Sox

The Fighting Scots were Clarion's Homecoming a year ago, and the Golden Eagles held on for a narrow 7-0 win.

More importantly, this contest could have great bearing on the PSAC West race. Edinboro improved to 2-1 with last Saturday's 23-3 win over Lock Haven. The Golden Eagles are 1-1 after knocking California(Pa.) from the unbeaten ranks

with a 29-22 triumph. After last year's 7-4 finish, Clarion was picked second in the Western Division preseason poll.

THE COACHES

Edinboro head coach Lou Tepper (Rutgers '67) is in his second season in charge of the Fighting Scots. A year ago he matched the school record for most wins by a first-year head coach as the Scots finished 5-6. Renowned as a defensive genius, Tepper has worked on the staffs of some of the top programs in the country, including Virginia Tech, Colorado and LSU. But his greatest notoriety came at Illinois, where he coached from 1989-96. The defensive coordinator and later assistant head coach from 1988-91, Tepper was appointed the Fighting Illini head coach on December 13, 1991, just prior to the team's appearance in the John Hancock Sun Bowl. He would go on to guide the Illini to two more bowl games while posting a 25-31-2 ledger. He owns an overall mark of 33-39-2. Malen Luke (Westminster 76) is a former Edinboro assistant coach who now has served as the Clarion head coach for eight years. He owns a 40-42 mark in charge of the Golden Eagles, including a brilliant 11-3 record in 1996. Clarion won its second PSAC West crown under Luke that year, and advanced to the NCAA Division II semifinals. He previously served six seasons as the head coach at Defiance, going 37-21. He has a 77-63 career record in 14 years.

LAST YEAR'S GAME Clarion 7. Edinboro O

The Golden Eagles posted a narrow Homecoming victory in front of 7,000 fans. Neither team managed many scoring opportunities, as Edinboro totaled just 152 yards and Clarion 235. Clarion's lone scoring drive came following a short punt. Taking over at the Boro 46, the Golden Eagles needed 11 plays before Tab Musser bulled in from two yards out. Edinboro mustered its best scoring opportunity midway through the fourth quarter, driving from its own 32 to the Clarion 16. The Scots came up empty on a pair of plays with a yard needed to continue the march. Jack Davis completed 12 of 23 passes for 102 yards, while Clarion signalcaller Adam Almashy was 6 of 22 for 67 yards.

FIGHTING SCOTS TO WATCH

John Williams, TB -- the senior has turned into a workhorse the last two weeks, carrying 24 times vs. California(Pa.) and a career-high 29 times against Lock Haven. He gained a career-best 128 yards last week with a touchdown. It marked his second 100-yard game this year and the third in his career. Earlier in the year he gained 114 yards against Ashland. He also stands second in receiving. Brandon Munson, TB -- it's tough being the third tailback, but the 6'0", 220 lb. freshman has made the most of his chances. With Alonzo Roebuck sitting out last week's game, Munson responded with a season-high 112 yards and 2 TDs on just 10 carries. He's rushed with the ball 22 times and scored three TDs. Steve Tryon, QB -- the senior had a career night in defeat at California(Pa.), although he was guilty of three interceptions. Tryon completed 20 of 40 passes for 255 yards and 3 TDs, adding a

career-best 35 yards on 9 carries. Earlier in the year he completed 12 of 22 passes for 200 yards against Gannon. The Scots dis-played a conservative approach against Lock Haven, with Tryon attempting 9 passes and completing 5 for 44 yards.

Michael Lowe, TE -- the redshirt freshman has emerged as the leading receiver with 11 grabs for 146 yards. He had 4 catches for 49 vards at California(Pa.).

Lincoln Bufalino, WR -- the sophomore's true value rests as a return man. He is averaging 12.5 yards on 6 punt returns and 36.5 yards on 4 kickoff returns. He set up Edinboro's first score vs. Lock Haven with a 72-yard kickoff return to open the game.


Foster Johnson, ILB -- the team leader in tackles with 41 tackles, he has made big play after big play. The junior has 8 tackles for losses, with 3 sacks and an interception.

Jeff Richardson, SS -- the junior turned in a career-high 11 tackles, with 3 for losses, against Cal, then came back and had 6 tackles and a pair of interceptions vs. Lock Haven.

GOLDEN EAGLES TO WATCH

Adam Almashy, QB -- the junior is in his third year in charge of the Wing T attack. While his passing numbers are down, he led the upset of 17th-ranked California(Pa.) with 120 yards rushing on 21 carries. That included two TD runs of six yards.

Rohert Walker, RB -- two weeks ago Walker was crowned the PSAC West Offensive Player of the Week after rushing for 80 yards and 4 TDs against Kutztown. Cal held Walker to 32 yards, but he has already scored 9 TDs and is averaging an amazing 7.3 yards per





Demetric Gardner, RB -- another of Clarion's talented ballcarriers, averaging 5.5 yards per carry. He had 78 yards on 15 rushes last

Mike McCullum, WR -- the Florida speedster leads the Golden eag in receptions (13), and also owns a 65-yard kickoff return. Andy Pore, TE -- the big tight end was a first team All-PSAC West performer last year, but has caught just 6 passes. However, he averaging 22.3 yards per catch, owns 2 TDs, and always seems come up with a big play against the Scots.

Chris Janson, OLB -- senior who leads the team with 50 tackles, including 7 behind the line and 3 sacks.

Doug Diegelman, NG -- a second team All-PSAC West choice last ye he leads the Eagles with 4 sacks among his 29 tackles. Dennis Yu, LB -- comes off a team-high 11 tackle effort last week.

OH THOSE TURNOVERS

Edinboro committed four costly second half turnovers in the loss California(Pa.). The Fighting Scots had trouble hanging on to the ball against Lock Haven, as well, turning the ball over four more times. Five Bald Eagle turnovers negated the Boro bobbles, how ever, in the 23-3 win.

100-YARD DUO

Senior John Williams and freshman Brandon Munson each accourt ed for 100 yards rushing last week. Oddly enough, it marked the second straight year a pair of Edinboro backs gained 100 yards ve Lock Haven. Williams picked up 128 yards, while Munson finished with 112. A year earlier, Williams had a then-career high 109 yards, with Bernard Henry contributing 104.

AIR TEPPER OR GROUND BROWN(ING)

Which Edinboro offensive unit will show up against Clarion. The Fighting Scots took to the air against California, throwing 40 pass while gaining 255 yards passing. Whether it was the questionable weather conditions or a Lock Haven defense that was susceptible to the run, Edinboro threw just 10 passes but gained a season-hid 263 yards on the ground. Ask Lou Tepper, and he'll tell you the latter contest was his favorite -- not for his preference to the running game, but because the Scots won!

TWO WAY THREAT

Sean McNicholas' sophomore season was filled with inconsistency but that has not followed through to his junior year. McNicholas ranks among the top punters in Division II, averaging 41.6 vards. He has also had six punts inside the 20. As a field goal kicker, he moved into third place in career field goals with 22 after making one of two three-pointers vs. Lock Haven. He has made 4 of 8 field goals.

LOU'S LOVE

Edinboro head coach Lou Tepper places a great deal of emphasis on special teams. That was clearly evident in the Lock Haven game. The game opened with a 72-yard kickoff return by Lincoln Bufalino, paving the way for Edinboro's first score. Later came a 27-yard punt return by Josh Geis. Then late in the game Paul Amico blocked a Bald Eagle punt, with Keldrick Walker picking it u and returning it for a touchdown. The score was called back due to an illegal block.

HEAD COACH LOU TEPPER



Veteran Division I mentor Lou Tepper was appointed the 12th head football coach at Edinboro University, officially taking charge of the Fighting Scot program on January 5, 2000.

Tepper inherited an Edinboro program which had won just eleven games in the previous three seasons. His five-win season in 2000 matched the Edinboro record for most victories by a first-year head coach.

The season-ending three game winning streak propelled the Fighting Scots into an enthusiastic

BACKGROUND

Tepper, a native of Keystone, PA, returned to the Division II level after coaching at Division I institutions for almost thirty years. He is renowned as a defensive coaching genius, with a resume that includes three Butkus Award honorees and an Outland Trophy winner. Tepper's list of defensive standouts include Bruce Smith, John Holecek, Simeon Rice, Kevin Hardy, and Henry Jones, all current NFL standouts. In addition, he has worked with some of the top head coaches in the country, including Bill Dooley at Virginia Tech, Bill McCartney at Colorado, John Mackovic at Illinois and Gerry DiNardo at LSU.

as the defensive coordinator at Louisiana State University last year. He began his tenure with the Tigers on December 15, 1997, helping LSU to a 27-9 Independence Bowl win over Notre Dame. All told, he has served as a defensive coordinator for 19 of his 33 years in the coaching profession.

BIG TEN HEAD COACH

The 55-year-old Tepper was appointed the head coach at the University of Illinois on December 13, 1991, just prior to the team's appearance in the John Hancock Sun Bowl. He replaced Mackovic, who left for the head coaching position at the University of Texas. During his five year stint as the Fighting

Illini head coach, Tepper compiled a record of 25-31-2, including two more bowl appearances. He guided Illinois to a pair of wins over Ohio State, including one at Columbus; the school's first victory in Ann Arbor against Michigan in 27 years; and three consecutive wins over rival Iowa by a combined score of 122-17. Just as impressive, Tepper graduated 91 percent of his seniors.

Tepper joined the Illinois program in 1988, serving as the defensive coordinator for four seasons and assistant head coach for two years. In his nine seasons at Illinois, he helped the program to six bowl invitations, one Big Ten title and top ten rankings in the AP and UPI polls.

He was honored as the Big Ten's top defensive assistant coach in 1990 by The Sporting News. His defensive units annually ranked among the best in the country, finishing 10th in 1989, 14th in 1993, ninth in 1994, and 21st in 1995.

Tepper's 1992 Illini squad finished 6-5-1, suffering a 27-17 defeat to Hawaii in the Holiday Bowl. Illinois went in to Columbus and upset Ohio State, 18-16, and posted a 22-22 tie against Michigan in Ann Arbor.

While his '93 edition finished 5-6, that included a 24-21 win in Ann Arbor against the Wolverines. The Illini made it back to postseason play in 1994, handing East Carolina a 30-0 whitewashing in the Liberty Bowl. The '94 squad finished 7-5, again upsetting one of the elite in the Big Ten. And once again it was on the road, as Illinois shocked Ohio State, 24-10, in Columbus behind Butkus Award winner Dana Howard.

LINEBACKERS

While Penn State has gained the reputation as "Linebacker U", Illinois could make a good case for that designation as well during Tepper's tenure. He produced

consecutive Butkus Award winners in Dana Howard (1994) and Kevin Hardy (1995). Along the way, he also produced Big Ten Defensive Players of the Year in Moe Gardner and Darrick Brownlow (1990), Howard (1993 and '94) and Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year Simeon Rice in 1994. For the only time in Big Ten history, Tepper had four first team All-Big Ten linebackers at his disposal. In all, he has coached over 25 professional linebackers, and recently wrote the book, "Complete Linebacking", a 312-page comprehensive book on linebacker play.

Hardy and Rice became the highest defensive draft duo in the history of the NFL draft in 1996 when Hardy went second to Jacksonville and Rice third to Arizona. That stood until the 2000 NFL Draft when Penn State's Courtney Brown and Lavar Arrington went one-two.

PITTSBURGH

Tepper began his coaching career as a graduate assis-

HEAD COACH

tant at Pittsburgh in 1967, then moved on to the University of New Hampshire from 1968-71, coaching the running backs and linebackers before becoming the defensive coordinator. His next stop was the College of William & Mary, where he joined former New Hampshire head coach Jim Root as the defensive coordinator from 1972-77. The 1976 William & Mary squad posted the school's best record in thirty years. He was the assistant head coach his final year at William & Mary.

VIRGINIA TECH

In 1978, Virginia Tech head coach Bill Dooley hired Tepper as his linebackers coach. Tepper helped build the Hokies into a consistent bowl contender with a defense that annually ranked among the nation's top ten. He stayed at Virginia Tech from 1978-82, working with Outland Trophy winner and Buffalo Bills great Bruce Smith, among others. The 1980 Hokie edition played Miami(FL) in the Peach Bowl.

COLORADO

Tepper joined Bill McCartney's staff at Colorado in 1983, serving as the defensive coordinator and assistant head coach until departing for Illinois in 1988. Tepper helped turn around a Buffalo defense which ranked No. 100 nationally in yards allowed prior to his arrival, to one which was as high as 11th in Division I in total defense. He earned the title of assistant head coach to McCartney his final two seasons, and helped the Buffaloes to the 1985 Freedom Bowl and the 1986 Blue Bonnet Bowl. Among the assistant coaches at Colorado was Gerry DiNardo, who would later bring Tepper in to direct his LSU defense.


PERSONAL BACKGROUND

Tepper, born September 7, 1945, graduated from Rutgers University in 1967. He enjoyed a standout career as a defensive back at Rutgers from 1965-67. As a player, Tepper led the Scarlet Knights in interceptions as a junior and tackles as a senior. He won the George Cronin Trophy as the Most Improved Player in 1965

Tepper is an active member of the American Football Coaches Association and has served on the NCAA Ethics Committee. He is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and has spoken for Promise-Keepers, founded by former Colorado coach Bill McCartney. Tepper and his wife, Karen, have two children. Matthew, a graduate assistant on the Edinboro staff, and Stacy Ann, a recent LSU graduate.

Boykin played collegiately at the University of Illinois under Lou Tepper.


A four-year letterwinner at Illinois, Boykin was twice named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week as a defensive back, and was named the Fighting Illini Defensive Champion of the Year. He played in a total of 44 games for the Illini, playing in three bowl games. The Dayton, OH native enjoyed his best season as a senior, recording 25 tackles with 2 passes broken up. As a junior, he had 21 stops, along with a fumble recovery in the end zone for a touchdown against Arizona.

Boykin graduated in 1995 with a Bachelor's Degree in Kinesiology and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Tepper that same year. He worked with the Fighting Illini from 1995-97, picking up a Master's Degree in Higher Education and Administration.

Game: Colorado State at UNLV; September 14 at Sam Boyd Stadium Last Meeting: Colorado State 20, UNLV 19 (10/14/2000, at Colorado State) Inside Scoop: With only one year of seasoning as a starter, UNLV junior quarterback Jason Thomas is already hearing Heisman murmurs. Colorado State relies on its passing attack featuring a similar cast of starters from last year's Liberty Bowl winners.

Game: Tennessee at Florida; September 15 at Florida Field Last Meeting: Florida 27, Tennessee 23 (9/16/2000, at Tennessee) Inside Scoop: Tennessee defensive tackle, and last year's Outland Trophy winner, John Henderson, will look to throw a wrench into Florida's sophomore tandem of quarterback Rex Grossman and wide receiver Jabar Gaffney. It was Gaffney's TD reception in last year's game against Tennessee with 14 seconds in regulation that won the game for Florida.

Game: Youngstown State at Toledo; September 15 at the Glass Bowl Last Meeting: Youngstown State 14, Toledo 12 (9/30/61, at Youngstown State) Inside Scoop: Perrennial Division I-AA contender Youngstown State tries to play the role of Davey in a matchup with Goliath (DI-A Toledo). The Rockets are coming off an impressive season in the MAC and are looking to exact revenge on a loss to the Penguins the last time the teams met 40 years ago.

On the road, which stadium presents the toughest conditions (fans, weather, field conditions) to play in?

Dave Ragone (Louisville QB): I'd have to say Southern Mississippi [M. M. Roberts Stadium]. Their fans are really into the game. It always seems to be very hot and humid even in November. They are in the process of rebuilding their football facilities and the visiting team has to dress in an old gymnasium and we had to walk through the band to get to the playing field.

Division I-A Preview New Sheriff in Town

Oregon State is poised to take charge and stand atop the pack of traditional powerhouse programs BY PETER HAYES

1. Oregon State Beavers

2000: 11-1, 7-1 Pac-10, Final BCS Rank: 6

Head Coach: Dennis Erickson (3rd year: 18-6, career: 131-46-1)

Breakdown: They have been playing organized football at Oregon State University since 1893, and last year marked the first time in the school's 108-year gridiron history that it won 11 games in a single season.

Also, this year marks the first time that the Beavers have been selected to win the National Championship, as Touchdown Illustrated picks head coach Dennis Erickson's

club to walk away next January with the Sears Trophy as the nation's best football team. "Our expectations are the same as when I came here three years ago," said head coach Erickson. "Our goals are to win the Pac-10 championship and go to a bowl

game. That is what are goals are every year and that is what they will always be here." Last year, the Beavers (11-1, 7-1 Pac-10) did just that and culminated the season with a 41-9 thrashing of Notre Dame (9-3) in the Fiesta Bowl.

Even though only five starters return on defense, it's stocked with senior letterwinners who have all played. This group was largely overlooked due to the headline-grabbing play of the offense. Overall, the unit was one of the better groups in the nation, allowing only 18.5 points, 93.1 rushing yards per game and 22 interceptions.

While the Beavers' soft non-conference schedule will hurt them in the early RPI rankings, by the end of the year being the last undefeated team in the country will silence any critics. Springboard: Of the 10 total starters returning, the offensive combination of quarterback Jonathan Smith and tailback Ken Simonton is the most lethal. Smith capped his sensational season, in which he passed for 2,773 yards and 20 touchdowns, with an MVP performance versus the Irish, completing 16 of 24 pass attempts for 305 yards and three touchdowns. Simonton, an explosive and durable back, is the perfect complement. The 5-8, 191-pound tailback became the first player in conference history to rush for over a 1,000 yards as a freshman, sophomore and junior. There's little doubt that he will eclipse the mark again in 2001.

Stumbling Block: The one major drawback for this club offensively is the lack of a go-to receiver, with three leading pass-catchers having departed, but Erickson expects someone to step forward and take charge.

"It is a group that is inexperienced in some ways, but isn't in other ways," he said. "Shawn Kintner and Seth Thimmer have both played a lot. Those are two guys who now must step up and play." Key Dates: September 29 vs. UCLA; December 1 at Oregon

2. Miami Hurricanes

2000: 11-1, 7-0 Big East, Final BCS Rank: 3 Head Coach: Larry Coker (1st year: 0-0, career: 0-0) Breakdown: First-year head coach Larry Coker, who was promoted from his assistant's position when Butch Davis left for the NFL's Cleveland Browns, inherits an enviable situation. The Hurricanes enter the season highly ranked on the strength of their outstanding offensive line, widely considered the Big East's best. Also, eight starters return on defense, a unit that ranked fifth nationally in points allowed (15.5 per game). A favorable schedule, which includes a b rebuilding Penn State team and Troy State, also works in the club's favor. Springboard: It's understandable why quarter-

back Ken Dorsey was overshadowed, considering the other three quarterbacks playing in the state of Florida last season. While Chris Weinke won

3. Florida Gators

2000: 10-3, 8-1 SEC, Final BCS Rank: 10 Head Coach: Steve Spurrier (12th year: 112-25-1, career: 132-38-2) Breakdown: Only at Florida, where the highly successful head coach is a former Heisman Trophywinning quarterback, can you have a quarterback controversy when one of the participants is the SEC Championship Game MVP, the first freshman ever to win the honor. Rex Grossman, who supplanted Jesse Palmer toward the end of the 2000 season, is competing with Brock Berlin for the No. 1 spot. "I don't know if we can have a No. 1 quarterback coming out of the spring," said Spurrier, "maybe we will have one coming out of the preseason." Whichever signal-caller gets the nod, he will once again have a plethora of talent to work with returning from the SEC's second-ranked offense (308.2 yards per game). Springboard: One of the chief beneficiaries of Florida's high-octane offensive attack is sophomore Jabar Gaffney. In his freshman season, the 6-1, 191-pound Gaffney was named National Freshman of the Year and consensus Freshman All-American after totaling 71 receptions for 1,184 yards and 14 touchdowns. A dangerous receiver after the catch, Gaffney averaged 16.7 yards per grab. Stumbling Block: Overall, Florida's defense was fairly tame, failing to rank in the top four of the conference in three out of five defensive categories. Making matters worse is the loss of interior lineman Gerard Warren, an unstoppable force at the point of attack who registered 76 tackles, 4.5

sacks, 11 tackles for loss and 23 quarterback hurries. The losses of tackles Derrick Chambers and Buck Gurley will cut further into the team's depth, however, the return of All-America candidate Alex Brown will shed some light. Key Dates: September 15 vs. Tennessee; November 17 vs. Florida State

4. Tennessee Volunteers

2000: 8-4, 5-3 SEC, Final BCS Rank: N/A Head Coach: Phillip Fulmer (10th year: 54-12, career: 54-12) Breakdown: Tennessee failed to appear on either the BCS or Associated Press radar screens at season's end, mainly due to two losses by a total of 11 points. However, the Volunteers return 17 starters, including defensive lineman John Henderson, winner of the Outland Trophy last season.

After a 21-10 loss at Georgia, a relatively young Volunteer squad ripped off five consecutive victories by an average margin of 17.8 points per game. Despite losing to Kansas State in the Cotton Bowl, head coach Phil Fulmer's team should parlay that positive experience into a winning season.

Springboard: Wide receiver/quarterback Kelley Washington could be secret weapon of the offense. The 6-3, 215-pound freshman is listed as the No. 3 quarterback, but

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the Heisman at Florida State and Jesse Palmer and Rex Grossman were sharing duties in Gainesville, the 6-5, 210-pound Dorsey was quietly putting together his best season. The prototypical passer completed 188 of 322 attempts for 2,737 yards with a scintillating touchdown-to-interception differential of 25-to-5.

Stumbling Block: The weakest link is at wide receiver, where Coker and company must replace both Santana Moss and Reggie Wayne, who combined to make 88 catches for 1.503 yards and 15 touchdowns. Don't be surprised to see tight end Jeremy Shockey play a larger role in the offense. "I'm not concerned about our talent," said Coker, "but I am concerned about molding those guys into our offense." Key Dates: September 15 vs. Washington: October 13 at Florida State

if Casey Clausen should falter or get injured, Washington could step in. The 21-year-old has been out of football for the past four years as a member of the Florida Marlins organization. A gifted athlete, Washington will probably see action at wide receiver, where he's been compared to former Vol Carl Pickens. Stumbling Block: The running game has lost over 75 percent of its production when it averaged 162.7 yards per game and 4.1 yards per carry. Travis Henry has moved on, leaving Travis Stephens as the likely replacement. While Henry led the team and placed second in the SEC with 1,314 rushing yards, the 5-9, 190-pound Stephens carried the ball 81 times for 359 yards but scored seven touchdowns.

Key Dates: September 15 at Florida; September 29 vs. LSU

6. Texas Longhorns

2000: 9-3, 7-1 Big 12, Final BCS Rank: 12 Head Coach: Mack Brown (4th year: 27-11, career: 113-85-1)

Breakdown: After posting three consecutive nine-win seasons, it's easy to understand why the Longhorns, with 17 starters returning, are ranked in this spot. Helping matters considerably is the wealth Texas possesses at quarterback where two bona fide starters reside. Chris Simms, coming off an impressive sophomore season, will once again compete for playing time against 1999 Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year, Major Applewhite.

"We are obviously very solid at quarterback with two guys coming back that have helped us win in Chris and Major," said offensive coordinator Greg Davis. "Both of these guys have proven themselves and are among the best in the nation at their position."

So far Brown and his staff have handled this potential quarterback controversy well, but the job could become difficult, as Simms

7. Florida State Seminoles

2000: 11-2, 8-0 ACC, Final BCS Rank: 2

Head Coach: Bobby Bowden (26th year: 242-55-4, career: 315-87-4) Breakdown: Can time and graduation finally be catching up to the Florida State Seminoles, who are rarely, if ever, seen this far down in any preseason poll? With only eight starters back from last year's national championship runner-up team, Bowden and his veteran coaching staff have their work cut out for them, especially on offense, with both Heisman Trophy quarterback Chris Weinke and team-rushing leader Travis Minor having moved on.

With solid recruiting classes stretching back to the Reagan Administration, Florida State always has the talent on hand to develop and reload, whereas others restock.

Springboard: He could have been playing on Sunday's in the NFL, but free safety Chris Hope decided to return to Tallahassee for his senior season. Lucky for Florida State he did. Hope, the only returning starter in the defensive backfield, posted career highs in tackles (83),

5. Oklahoma Sooners

2000: 13-0, 9-0 Big 12, Final BCS Rank: 1 Head Coach: Bob Stoops (3rd year: 20-5, career: 20-5) Breakdown: Now the pressure is really on head coach Bob Stoops. In only his second year at the helm of the floundering program, Stoops led the Sooners to a perfect season (13-0) and their first national championship since 1985 when they knocked off Florida State, 13-2, in the Orange Bowl. The Sooner faithful are as demanding as they are grateful, and now Stoops will have to contend annually for the BCS title.

While record-setting quarterback Josh Heupel will not be back to run one of the most potent offenses in the country, Stoops does return a total of 16 starters (8 offense/ 8 defense). Heupel, who led the conference with 294.7 yards per game, will be sorely missed. However, with an improving receiving corps, veteran offensive line and reliable ground game, the Sooners should be favored to win the Big 12. Springboard: While the club has lost several solid

contributors on defense from the Big 12's stingiest

unit, which allowed only 16.0 points per game, the Sooners still have "The Rock" to build upon. Team tackle-leader and consensus All-America linebacker Rocky Calmus returns to anchor the defense. The 6-3, 235-pound senior has posted consecutive 100-plustackle seasons, and is the first Oklahoma linebacker since Joe Bowden (1991) to earn All-America honors. Stumbling Block: The loss of Heupel will dominate all the early talk surrounding this team's chances to repeat as conference champions. That talk will continue until either Nate Hybl, last year's backup, or redshirt freshman Jason White takes command of an offense that ranked third in the conference and seventh nationally, blistering opponents for 39.0 points per game. Hybl, who completed 9 of 16 passes in five games, will start the season No. 1 on the depth chart.

"We're in a good situation with Nate and Jason," said Stoops. "They both have shown us that we can win a lot of games with them back there." Key Dates: October 6 vs. Texas (at Dallas); October 27 at Nebraska

continues to develop into the blue-chip prospect that he is.

Springboard: No wonder the Texas quarterbacks play so well on Saturdays. Every other day of the week they have to face cornerback Quentin Jammer. The 6-1, 198-pound senior is probably college football's top-ranked defensive back. Switched over from free safety, Jammer started all 12 games for Texas in 2000 to run his consecutive total to 25. In the process, Jammer recorded 43 tackles and three interceptions, including conference highs in passes-defended (20) and caused-fumbles (4).

Stumbling Block: Texas' conference-best run defense (93.4 yards per game) took a huge hit with the loss of tackles Casey Hampton and Shaun Rogers. Both starters were large and dominating and could collapse the pocket and command constant double-teaming. The team expects sophomore Marcus Tubbs, named Texas' Most Improved Defensive Player in 2000, to step up. Key Dates: September 8 vs. North Carolina; October 6 vs. Oklahoma

tackles-for-loss (5), and passes-defended (8). An Academic All-America, Hope will have to become the unit's leader. Stumbling Block: While there are several to choose from, the Seminoles' most glaring need is at quarterback. While redshirt freshman Chris Rix has the inside track on the job, Anguan Boldin, who was named this spring's most improved offensive player, will push him.

"We've got to give Rix and Boldin enough reps in practice so that we go into the fall with a good idea of what we can and can't do," said offensive coordinator Jeff Bowden.

Key Dates: October 13 vs. Miami: November 3 at Clemson



8. Nebraska Cornhuskers

2000: 10-2, 6-2 Big 12, Final BCS Rank: 8 Head Coach: Frank Solich (4th year: 31-7, career: 31-7) Breakdown: Four seasons ago when Frank Solich replaced the legendary Tom Osborne as Nebraska head coach, the team's superior ground game faltered. No fault of Solich's, he was the victim of bad timing. This season, like 1997, Nebraska enters the year with a long list of key replacements on offense and depending on how well the staff fills those vacancies will determine the Big Red's fate.

Fortunately for the Cornhuskers, guarterback Eric Crouch, who has rewritten several chapters in the school record books, returns, along with nine starters from a defensive unit that finished fifth in the conference in scoring defense, allowing 19.4 points per game.

9. Oregon Ducks

2000: 10-2, 7-1 Pac-10, Final BCS Rank: 10 Head Coach: Mike Bellotti (7th year: 32-17. career: 53-40-2)

Breakdown: The second team from the Beaver state to make TDI's Top 10, the Ducks' presence helps bolster the claim that Oregon has become the premier football state in the country.

"I do think that it's exciting for athletes, our boosters and alumni that Oregon is mentioned with the best programs in the nation, and I certainly think we deserve to be there because we've earned that right," said head coach Mike Bellotti. "But I think you have to earn it every year."


Similar to their in-state rival Oregon State. the Ducks feature a stellar quarterbackrunning back combination in Joey Harrington and Maurice Morris.

10. Michigan Wolverines

2000: 9-3, 6-2 Big Ten, Final BCS Rank: 16 Head Coach: Lloyd Carr (7th year: 58-16, career: 58-16) Breakdown: While the loss of quarterback Drew Henson, who signed a lucrative, long-term contract with the New York Yankees. would cripple most clubs, the Wolverines will be able to overcome the setback, thanks to the presence of John Navarre. Last season. Navarre saw extensive action filling in for the injured Henson, throwing for eight touchdowns and only one interception on 77 pass attempts. Most important, the club was 3-1 in his four starts.

Michigan returns nine starters on defense and the game experience should dramatically improve the stop unit. The 6-1, 200-pound senior possesses blazing speed (4.47 in the 40), tremendous on-field awareness (sacked only three times in 2000) and the toughness to be considered one of the best signal-callers in school history. Crouch, who averaged 188.4 yards of offense per game and scored a team-high 120 points for the Big Red last season, had offseason shoulder surgery and was held out of spring practice as a precaution. Crouch enters 2001 as one of the leading Heisman Trophy contenders.

Stumbling Block: While the offensive line returns only two starters from last season's top-ranked ground game (349.9 vards per game), the backfield is bare. Both Dan Alexander (team-high 1,154 yards) and Correll Buckhalter (750 yards) have departed, leaving the burden on Crouch and an inexperienced and untested group of letterwinners.

Springboard: In a conference featuring several outstanding signal-callers, Harrington doesn't take a back seat to any of them. And the bottom line with Harrington is his ability to win games-he's 14-2 as a starter.

Stumbling Block: Even though the Ducks need to find three new starters along the second line of defense, the club's decimated special teams are the No. 1 concern. Oregon, with a new special teams coordinator, must find a punter, placekicker and long snapper. For a team that led the conference in kickoff returns, kickoff coverage and net punting, this will be a considerable drop-off.





New Coach

For Oklahoma it all started with head coach Bob Stoops, who led the Crimson and Cream back to the top in only two years in Norman. Stoops, the fourth coach at OU since Barry Switzer's glory days, was hired to return the Sooners to their lofty place in college football. Where Gary Gibbs, John Blake and Howard

Schnellenberger failed, Stoops, the former defensive coordinator at Florida, succeeded. With a winning percentage of .800 percent in two full seasons. Stoops is just the second OU sideline boss to take his team to a bowl game in each of his first two years (Chuck Fairbanks was first in 1967-68).

Franchione, 50, coming over from a three-year stint at TCU to replace the embattled Mike DuBose, is charged with an equally daunting task.

"We have found, what I believe, is the coach most capable of guiding this team

into the future," athletics director Mal Moore said. "His success has been impressive at every level."

In three seasons at TCU, Franchione's team needed to make postseason plans, as it played, ironically, in consecutive Mobile Alabama Bowls and the Sun Bowl after the 1998 season. Franchione's impact was felt immediately, when he took a team that finished 1-10 in 1997 and led them to a 7-5 mark and a Sun Bowl berth in '98.

Franchione did not travel southeast alone after leaving TCU. Joining him are eight of his assistants from the Horned Frogs and a total of 10 assistants beginning their first year in Tuscaloosa.

The Tradition


"Our players recognize that the history of Oklahoma is winning championships," Stoops said after the Orange Bowl victory.

Not many clubs can match Oklahoma's national standing through the years, but Alabama certainly can. Last year's Bowl Championship Series victory marked the club's seventh national title, tying the Crimson Tide's total. 'Bama has also notched 21 SEC

"It is an honor for me to become head coach at a school so rich in tradition and to follow in the footsteps of coach Paul 'Bear' Bryant," Franchione said when introduced as the team's 24th head coach and third since 1996. "At a lot of places, they just play football; at Alabama, they live it. It has been a dream of mine to be able to coach at a school like Alabama."

The Quarterback

On the field, OU's success was embodied by the tough and intelligent play of senior quarterback Josh Heupel. No one Sooner



carried a heavier burden, or made as dramatic an impact on the storybook season as No. 14. Heupel rewrote several chapters worth of school passing records by completing 280 of 433 attempts with a 20:14 touchdown-to-interception ratio. It was Heupel's coolness under pressure and his ability to make something out of

nothing that separated him from the rest. Nowhere was this more evident than in the Oct. 28 showdown with bitter rival Nebraska. Trailing 14-0 at the end of the first quarter after two long, timeconsuming Cornhusker drives, Heupel dissected the highly regarded

"Blackshirts" to finish with 300 yards on 20 of 34 passing and rushed for a careerhigh 46 yards on eight carries. OU took a 24-14 lead into the lockerroom at halftime and never looked back.

All Zow has to do is watch the tapes from the 1999 season in which he engineered two exceptional wins for the club. On Sept. 15, before a capacity Bryant-Denny Stadium crowd, Zow completed 14 of 24 attempts for 234 yards with two touchdowns over then-14th ranked Arkansas. The following week, Zow completed 28 of 40 attempts



with backup Tyler Watts. Zow finished the frustrating season completing 120 of 249 passes with only six touchdowns and 14 interceptions.

Zow's a much better passer than that, and behind an offensive line that returns two starters and tips the scales at an average of 6-5, 319 pounds, he should improve dramatically.

The Schedule

The Sooners raced out to a 4-0 start thanks, in part, to a feeble schedule which featured not one team that played in a 1999 bowl game and combined to post a 18-27 record overall. It also helped that they hosted the Cornhuskers.

While life is always tough in the SEC, the Crimson Tide host Arkansas. Tennessee, LSU and Mississippi State, while also playing their first three games against a trio of opponents (UCLA, Vanderbilt and Southern Miss) that won only 17 of 35 games last season.

A Longshot

Make no doubt about it, the Tide are a longshot to duplicate the championship season Oklahoma placed in the record books. But like the Sooners and the Northwestern Wildcats before them, Alabama has enough returning talent, proven coaching and a favorable schedule to shock the nation's premier conference and possibly college football as well. lacksquare

Despite a near fatal car accident, Hawaii head coach June Jones has picked up right where he left off -on the sidelines trying to lead the Warriors to another victory

awaii football coach June Jones still can't remember what happened, but neither can he forget.

Jones can't recall anything from that fateful day last February other than that he was on his way to visit a friend on the other side of the island

After that, nothing...for 10 days.

But, he can't forget the auto accident that could have claimed his life, for it has caused him to question everything in his life, everything except his family and coaching football.

"I've relived my whole life the past few months," Jones said, "wondering why everything is the way it is. I know the good Lord saved me for a reason. I feel it will be shown to me shortly."

He should have died that day.

The doctors told him as much after he finally could comprehend what happened to him, more than a week after he drifted off H-1 in his Lincoln Town Car. Jones can't say why his car left the road and struck a cement pillar that day.

He can say he's thankful to be alive, because he was not wearing a seatbelt.

He needed two surgeries, the most critical to repair his aorta, which was sliced open.

"The doctor told me that I'm one in a million," said Jones, who turned 48 just a few days before the accident.

es is no stranger to miracles. He has turned around the once-dead program of Hawaii and. even more impressive. he is still here to talk

about it.

"Normally if you don't get treatment for something like that in 15 to 20 minutes, you'll die. I went almost four hours, so I was pretty lucky."

The whole state of Hawaii was in shock, fans and nonfans rooting for the man who had resurrected Warriors football from laughingstock status to respect.

Hawaii wide receiver Craig Stutzman said, "He's like a dad to us," as everyone awaited word if Jones would live.

One Hawaii columnist called him "the most popular person in Hawaii," and that's probably not far off.

"Statewide, it was almost like when Martin Luther King got shot or JFK got assassinated," said Artie Wilson, a lifelong friend of Jones who played on the same Pop Warner team. "It was almost to that degree. The entire state came to almost a standstill. People would go to church and have prayer services. There were a lot of hopeful people at the time."

Reaction like that is one of the reasons Jones turned down a chance to erase the interim tag that came before



his title of head coach with the San Diego Chargers. The job was his, if he wanted it.

"It was unbelievable how bad it was." said longtime Hawaii beat writer Paul Arnett. "It was brutal. The program was hanging on by a

thread. The program was suffering immensely."

But Jones believed, and he made his players believe, even after that 62-7 shellacking Hawaii endured at the hands of USC in the season opener.

"One thing he can do is motivate players, make them believe they are better than they are," said Chargers running backs coach Ollie Wilson, who was a Jones assistant with the Atlanta Falcons and Chargers, and flew to Hawaii to be at Jones' bedside after the accident. "He doesn't have any highs or lows. He doesn't get too excited about the good things or the bad things."

Which would prove to be valuable, because Jones experienced both in his first two seasons as head coach.

Hawaii turned it around after that USC loss to go 9-4 and win a share of the WAC title—just like Jones predicted-culminated by a win in the Oahu Bowl over Oregon State.

And then last season, Hawaii, with a very inexperienced roster. went 3-9.

"Reality set in when they lost some pretty good players," Ollie Wilson said. "But I wouldn't be surprised if they didn't come back and be as good this year as they were that first year."

If the Warriors do turn it around, they will have done so coming off a spring in which Jones did not participate.

He spent a month recovering in the hospital, a month shorter than doctors wanted. But even he knew that it was going to be a long road back, and his usual manner in which he had to always be busy couldn't get in the way of his recovery.

He spent the rest of the spring and part of the summer lifting weights, doing cardio workouts as part of his rehab, making him think he was "getting ready to play quarterback again."


The Jones family has already overcome one near-tragedy. June's wife, Diane, is a cancer survivor.

No one is surprised that Jones lived to tell about his accident, just like no one should have been surprised Jones' second season would be a bit of a letdown. The cupboard was bare.

"People were as positive as you can be for a 3-9 season; even after a loss, people would smile because they were happy with the effort," said Artie Wilson, who also broadcasts Hawaii basketball games. "It was a tough year though. The winning season created a huge monster to feed. People were a bit too optimistic, maybe, but anyone who knows June knows that he'll get this thing turned around for good."



The Right Choice DICK KAZMAIER, HEISMAN TROPHY WINNER IN 1951, NOT ONLY DOMINATED ON THE GRIDIRON, BUT IN THE BUSINESS

ick Kazmaier admits it. Turning case he changed his mind-Kazmaier hung thing. Snubbing a few million in 2001 is quite another

When Kazmaier graduated, cum laude, from Princeton nearly 50 years ago, he had no interest in entering the NFL. The league was hardly the conglomerate it is today. It was nowhere near the nation's athletic religion. Games were played in baseball's shadow. TV networks didn't shower billions on franchises. Most players aug-

"Seventy-five hundred a year would not impress me today, just as it did not then," says Kazmaier, who authored a dream season in '51, winning the Heisman Trophy and capturing the imaginations of those searching for a true "student-athlete." "Obviously, compensation levels and income opportunities are much greater today. It's a different world. I'd have to make my decision based on today's world."

Back then, Kazmaier passed on professional football. Even though Chicago's George Halas drafted him in the 15th round-just in

down \$7,500 in 1952 was one up his spikes and moved on. The sporting world's loss was the business arena's gain.

Kazmaier came to Princeton after a fivesport career at Maumee High School, outside of Toledo. He fully expected to continue his yearround athletic schedule for the Tigers and did play football and basketball at Old Nassau. But he distinguished himself on the gridiron as one of the last great single-wing tailbacks. In 1951, he mented their incomes with offseason jobs. with AMF. "It became clear to me that the business was something I could pursue with ease," Kazmaier says. "I could become an individual entrepreneur in the field." Today, Kazmaier serves as chairman of the U.S. Sporting Goods Manufacturers Association. Though highly successful in business-his

Kazmaier Associates, Inc. has holdings in many different businesses, primarily in the sports and events fields-Kazmaier has not left the world of competitive athletics. Though no longer on the fields and courts, he has played large administrative roles. He is a past chairman of the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports and was the president of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. He was also Chairmen of the U.S. Field Hockey Foundation, a role he assumed as a result of watching his six daughters play the sport.

But Kazmaier's most significant contribution may have come as a member of the Knight Foundation Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics. The body has devoted considerable effort to seeing that college sports stay in concert with academic institutions' overall missions. With the exception of the top-ranked Georgia Southern Eagles and No. 3 Montana Grizzlies, three other teams will no doubt have to rely on their signal callers in order to take the next step. After all, shouldn't that responsibility fall on, arguably, the most important player?

1. Georgia Southern

The Eagles have won two straight national titles and return 15 starters (eight offense, seven defense), which once again makes Georgia Southern the team to beat.

For the Eagles, offense equals Adrian Peterson. The 5-10, 212-pound senior has

reached the 100-yard plateau in all 43 of his games and helped the Eagles to the third-best rushing offense in the country (331.1 ypg).

GSU's big-play defense should be productive again, with each of its top four linebackers returning.

Keep An Eye On Adrian Peterson, Sr., RB: Arguably the best running back in Division I-AA since Walter Payton, Peterson needs 1,454 yards to become the division's all-time leading rusher.

Freddy Pesqueira, Jr., DT: Earned All-America honors as a sophomore with 122 tackles, 8.5 sacks and seven hurries.

2. Youngstown State


First-year head coach Jon Heacock could not ask to take over a better situation. The Penguins return eight starters on offense, including quarterback Jeff Ryan, who has thrown for 6,475 yards and a school-record 42 touchdowns in his career. Protecting Ryan will be an offensive line led by All-Gateway Conference selection Pat Crummey.

Seven starters return on defense, led by defensive back Bruce Hightower (67 tackles)

Keep An Eye On Jeff Ryan, Sr., OB: Ranks third in school history in completions (351) and fourth in completion percentage (.572). Jon Tekac, Sr., LB: Recorded 65 tackles and two interceptions in 2000.

3. Montana

The Grizzlies are looking to avenge last season's two-point national championship loss to Georgia Southern. Montana returns 14 starters,



return. The duo combined for 1,560 yards and 17 touchdowns last year.

Cornerback Bobby Sippio heads up a defensive backfield that also features Joseph Jefferson (6 INT, 64 tackles) and free safety Mel Mitchell (98 tackles).

Keep An Eye On Jason Johnson, Sr., OB: Threw for 1,148 yards and 6 TDs last year, while rushing for another 756 yards and 6 TDs.

Bobby Sippio, Jr., CB: A talented one-on-one cover man, Sippio recorded 10 interceptions last year and 27 pass breakups.

5. Trov State

The four wide receiver "Trojan Spread" offense will have a marquee quarterback calling the shots. Three-year starter Brock Nutter will be directing the new formation that will be aided by senior tailback Demontray Carter (800 yards).

While Nutter should carry the offense, linebackers Naazir Yamini and Jimmy McClain (combined 227 tackles) head up a defense that allowed conference opponents only 14.6 points per game.

Keep An Eye On Brock Nutter, Sr., OB: Just 1,741 passing yards shy of setting the school record, and has a chance to set the records for total offense (1,499 shy), pass attempts (180) and completions (155).

Naazir Yamini, Sr., LB: This all-conference selection recorded 120 tackles and led the team with six sacks and three forced fumbles. lacksquare

The Bison return 11 starters (7 offense, 4 defense) coming off a season in which they lost to eventual national champion Delta State in the national semifinal.



Mount Union is seeking to continue its reign as the king of Division III football

he 2000 season ended much like many of the others in the previous decade, with Mount Union hoisting the national championship trophy. However, the day did not provide the usual attack from the Purple Raiders, as Saint John's of Minnesota held the Mount to just 10 points on the afternoon.

Perhaps teams have solved the mystery of the vaunted Purple Raider passing game. Maybe, maybe not. Either way, several teams are vying to knock the Purple Raiders off the mountaintop, as the Division III ranks offer more parity than ever before.

1. Mount Union

The defending national champions have taken home five of the last eight titles and nine straight Ohio Athletic Conference championships.

As usual, MU led the nation in total offense, with 530 yards per game, and points, scoring an alarming 49 per contest. All-American Chuck Moore (1,647 yards, 27 TDs) and junior Dan Pugh (985 yards, 16 TDs) form a deadly backfield combination, which should take some pressure off the passing game, led by QBs Rob Adamson and Jesse Burghardt.

While the offense is busy scoring points, the defense keeps busy denying them. In the trenches, the Raiders should be effective

against the run, as junior defensive end Matt Campbell returns along with Todd Braden and Jeff Knoblauch. Keep An Eye On Chuck Moore, Sr., RB: Mount Union's all-time

leader in scoring (318 points) will look to improve on last season's terrific numbers.

Jason Perkins, Sr., LB: Relies on instincts while patrolling the outside; recorded 78 tackles last season.

2. Hardin-Simmons

A national-semifinal loss to Trinity University last season has the Cowboys primed to take the next step, as 15 starters return.

Wide receiver Kirk Rogers (1,371 yards, 15 TDs) is one of the best in the nation, and with four offensive linemen returning, quarterback Travis Jones (2,097 yards, 30 TDs) should have plenty of time to find him. strong enough to keep the Johnnies in contention for a national title. Wide receiver Blake Elliot caught 60 balls for 967 yards last year. Tackle Brent Vogt and center Josh Dirlam provide stability up front, where it is needed most. Brad Beyer has big-play ability on the defensive side, as he had eight interceptions last season.

Keep An Eye On Blake Elliot, Sr., WR: Dangerous punt returner as well, averaging 11.6 yards per return in 2000.

Ryan Danielson, SR., DL: Picked up 72 tackles-26 for a losslast season

5. Central College

Head coach Rich Kacmarynski doesn't have a whole lot to work with (only six starters are back), but his 40-6 record at Central makes the team a strong Iowa Conference contender.

Linebacker Austin Bonnema leads a stingy defense, while fullback Joe Ritzert and tailback Joey Liekweg will carry the offense. Keep An Eye On Matt Peterson, Sr., RG: A house up front at 6-2, 273 pounds





TDI: What's it like walking through the beautiful grove on campus before home games?

EM: It's a wonderful tradition. All the fans are out there, and it gets a little painful (he laughs) when they're hitting you on the back and pushing you around. It's real fun; it gets your heart pumping and ready for the game. TDI: Do you have words to live by?

EM: Be yourself. Do the things how you do them and don't worry about other people's views.



Mind Over Matter

Keeping cool is the kicker's best way to avoid being "iced"

"Take time out to ice the kicker"



Like most kickers, Roise State's Nick Calaycay, believe that the ploy of icing the kicker is overrated.

he clock read :06 as Ohio State's junior kicker Dan Stultz lined up to attempt a game-winning 34-yard field goal. The crowd at University of Illinois' Memorial Stadium was in a frenzy, trying to distract him and keep the game tied at 21.

It was to no avail. Stultz drilled the field goal and Ohio State won the game, 24-21.

It was an emotional loss for the Illini, who had done everything to try and upend the Buckeyes. UI head coach Ron Turner even burned his final two timeouts attempting to "ice" Stultz.

Nick Lowery, a Dartmouth grad and a 17-year NFL veteran—who happened to be part of the ABC broadcast team for the Ohio State-Illinois game—believes Stultz should have thanked Turner.

"I've been saying for a long time, [icing the kicker] is the most misperceived act that coaches consistently do," said Lowery, a three-time Pro Bowler and the NFL's alltime record holder for most career field goals. "They think it's gonna make the guy think too much. But what it does is it gives him time to get organized. It gives him some time to collect his thoughts. I think it's very, very overrated. I think, generally speaking, the advantage shifts to the kicker when they call timeout."

Lowery believes the kicker can best take advantage of the situation by simply doing what he does best.

"Stay with your routine," he said. "Don't think about the importance of the kick. Focus on the things that you always have to do anyway to make it work. That's really the key thing. Develop a routine and a consistency and a pattern. You still need to allow for the unexpected, but stay within your routine. Stay in control of the situation."

Boise State placekicker Nick Calaycay agrees.

"I go into every kick the same way, relaxed, not worrying about the outcome, rather than just focusing on the kick at hand." said Calaycay, who led all D-IA kickers in scoring last season (112 points). "[Opponents] have only really [called timeout to ice me] once, maybe twice. But when they call timeout, basically I just talk to my teammates, joke around with them, stuff like that. I don't really worry about it too much."

A junior for the Big West Conference Champion Broncos, Calaycay missed one field goal in 16 attempts (his long was 46 yards) and two extra points last season and was named All-Conference. He believes that his patience and kicking experience give him a psychological edge late in the game.

"When I wind up on the field, that's when I'm focused within those few seconds," he said. "I focus on making sure I line up correctly and take the right steps to the ball and just relax. I've done it a hundred times in practice; it's basically the same thing when I go out on the field.

"When I go out there, every single kick is the kick," he said. "So later on in the season, when it comes down to a championship, and there's like one minute left in the fourth quarter and you have to kick a field goal, you go out there the exact same way you always have."

Opposing coaches will likely continue to use timeouts at the end of games the way they always have, but Calaycay doesn't care. They can use all the timeouts they want. The only ice Boise State will ever know of is the one Calaycay puts the game on after he's nailed the gamedeciding kick.


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
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

After laying on the field motionless following an attempted tackle, Penn State defensive back Adam Taliaferro walked into the same Columbus, Ohio, hospital where a few months earlier doctors told him and his family he might never walk again. After several months of intensive rehab, Taliaferro was able to get rid of the wheelchair in favor of crutches. By April, he was walking without any sort of aid. A metal plate in his neck serves as a constant reminder of the fine line every player walks.








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

NCAA college football achieved its second-highest home attendance total in 2000 by attracting more than 39 million fans for only the second time in history. The 606 NCAA teams totaled 39,147,114 fans for all four divisions, trailing only the all-time record of 39,482,657 set in 1999. The 1999 total was the biggest one-year jump since 1978. Even though the 2000 sum was a near record, it was the first time since 1995 that college football had not posted a gain in total attendance. Home-game attendance in Division I-A accounted for 74 percent of the 2000 national totals. Despite attendance figures decreasing from a year ago, the 2000 totals nonetheless are indicative of college football's increased popularity. The Michigan Wolverines took the home attendance title

for the third consecutive year, averaging 110,822 at each of its six home contests in 2000. Tennessee was second for the third year in a row, posting an all-time school high of 107,595 per game. Ohio State was third for the first time since 1990 with a 97,757 average, edging Penn State, which was fourth at 95,543. LSU was fifth, averaging 87,815. The SEC captured the conference attendance title with a record 72,448 per game to outdistance the Big Ten, which finished with a conference-best average of 68,525.

Southern University captured its first Division I-AA attendance title since 1992 by averaging 27,190 per game to outdistance second-place South Florida's 26,414. North Dakota State took its fourth Division II attendance title and its first since 1997 with an average of 12,723. In Division III, Emory & Henry won its second crown (the first was 1997) with an average of 6,263 fans per game. A A F O O T 8 A L L . N E T




TAHG PROGRAM CONTINUES TO IMPRESS

FOOTBALL RULES PANEL SETS INCREASED SPORTSMANSHIP AS GOAL

Timeouts, safety and sportsmanship dominated the work of the NCAA Football Rules Committee at its recent meeting.

The committee approved a rules change to allow for a charged team timeout to be 30 seconds in duration, if so desired by the team calling the timeout. The previous rule was for charged team timeouts to be 90 seconds, unless the team calling the timeout wished to resume play within one minute and the opposing team agreed.

"There are situations when a team simply wants to stop the game clock to save time or to avoid a delay-of-game penalty before the play clock expires," said Max Urick, athletics director at Kansas State and the committee chair. "This change will enable timeout's taken in those instances to be brief and not interrupt the flow of the

The committee also voted to eliminate radio and television timeouts during overtime periods. "Once the overtime starts and the excitement builds, any extended breaks not related to normal game activity are detrimental to most parties involved, especially the teams and spectators," Urick said.

Committee in its oversight role on matters related to the image of the game. If approved, it would be used during games only with the prior permission of the umpire and the participating institutions.

"There is a fine line between enhanced coverage for the good of the game and unwarranted intrusion," Urick said. "The committee believes this camera can be a valuable teaching i instrument for viewers, featuring the finer points and intricacies of interior line play."

Other rules changes approved by the committee include:

- Enforcing all penalties for offensive team fouls that occur behind the neutral zone from the previous spot;
- Deleting the exception that visual 25-second play clocks are not mandatory for games played on the home fields of NCAA Division III institutions, effective

August 1, 2003. This change is subject to the approval of the Executive Committee in its oversight role involving matters of significant financial impact;

- Stopping the clock when a runner's helmet comes off. Previously, the play was blown dead immediately when a runner's helmet came off, but the clock was stopped only for administrative reasons (penalty, first down, charged team timeout, etc.);
- Exempting the runner from the rule prohibiting hurdling; and
- Assessing personal fouls against a passer during a successful twopoint conversion try on the succeeding kickoff or from the succeeding spot in extra periods.

The committee also approved the addition of a rules book appendix on guidelines for game officials to use during severe weather with lightning.

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



The improvement of the coaching profession and the sport of football always has been among the top priorities of the American Football Coaches Association since it was founded in 1922. The AFCA is considered the primary

professional association for football coaches at all levels of competition. The 8,000-member organization includes more than 90 percent of head coaches at the 700-plus schools that sponsor football at the college level.

The AFCA teams joined with USA Today, ESPN and Sears to select and honor national football champions. The athletics department of the AFCA Coaches' Poll champion each January receives the Sears Coaches' Trophy and a \$20,000 academic scholarship provided by Sears. The remaining NCAA and NAIA national champions also receive trophies from the AFCA and Sears.

The AFCA stands as the single entity solely representing all levels of football and the football coaching profession. The AFCA works closely with the NCAA, NACDA, the NAIA, the NFL, the Canadian Football League, the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame, Pop Warner Football and other organizations involved in the game.

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
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

NC44 THE NATIONAL **CoSIDA/Verizon Academic All-America Team College Division**

he 2000 CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-America Football Team, selected by members of the College Sports Information Directors of America, honors the nation's best student-athletes.

Just as the balancing of football and academics is difficult, the standards for nomination and selection to the team are rigorous. To be nominated, a varsity starter or key reserve player must have a minimum 3.200 cumulative grade-point average (on a 4.000 scale).

The program began in the 1950s with honorees in football; later, basketball and baseball all-academic teams were added. Academic and athletic biographical data of nominees are prepared in ballot form and mailed to the CoSIDA membership, who vote in each of eight districts. From the eight district teams comes a national ballot, distributed to the 1,400 members for the final all-academic team.

Offensive lineman Dave Wonderlick of Susquehanna University, a senior who made the first team for the second straight season, was named Verizon Academic All-America Team Member of the Year.

Arkansas Tech was the only school in the college division with a pair of firstteamers - kicker Paul Peletz and defensive lineman Robert Bayer. This year's teams:

Quarterback - Timothy Vinyard, Coe, biology.

Running backs - Jake Barkley, St. Thomas (Minnesota), entrepreneurship: Chuck Moore, Mount Union, business administration.

Receivers - Jason Berkhimer, Waynesburg, biology (pre-physical therapy); Nathan Tuck, Emory and Henry, physics/mathematics.

Tight end - Frank McCabe, Wilkes, political science/English.

TAKING A LOOK BACK AT HOMECOMING'S PAST by Bob Shreve, Sports Information Director

With Edinboro celebrating Homecoming festivities today, we thought we'd take a look back at the last two year's contests, both Edinboro victories, but coming in entirely different fashions. Two things that were consistent, large crowds enjoying a victory. Hopefully it will be three years in a row for that scenario.


Edinboro 31, California(Pa.) 17 September 30, 2000

Bernard Henry scored three touchdowns to lead the Fighting Scots to an impressive win in front of 5,400 fans. The pre-game hype involved the Battle of the Tailbacks, with Henry opposing Cal's Wesley Cates. The day belonged to the Edinboro senior, as he gained 198 yards on just 16 carries, adding a 99-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. The Edinboro defense, meanwhile, constantly harassed Cates, limiting the Vulcans standout to 91 yards on 19 rushes.

Henry opened the scoring on the third play of the game with a 32-vard run. It came just two plays after Steve Tryon, in his first start at Edinboro, hooked up with Chris Buehner for a 43-yard pass play on the game's initial play.

After the Vulcans kicked a field goal to make it 7-3, Henry returned the ensuing kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown, the thirdlongest kickoff return in school history. As fate would have it, it was the only kickoff Henry returned all season.

Edinboro boosted the margin to 21-3 with just 38 seconds remaining in the first half when Tryon completed a 20-yard scoring toss to Stephane Lubin. It marked Edinboro's first touchdown pass of the year.

Henry would add a 64-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, his third run of 60-or-more yards on the year. Sean McNicholas closed out the scoring for Edinboro with a 35-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

Henry registered his third straight 100-yard game. It keyed a 267yard rushing effort for the Scots, coming against a Cal defense which was allowing just 99.5 yards per game on the ground. Tryon completed 5 of 10 passes for 95 yards.

Edinboro 30. **Clarion 29** October 9. 1999

In one of the most exciting games in Sox Harrison Stadium in several years, Edinboro rallied from a 26-15 deficit to upend the Golden Eagles. Chris Buehner

hauled in an 8-yard pass from Jack Davis with 1:08 remaining for the winning points.

Edinboro's winning drive came after Clarion went ahead 29-23 with 5:51 to play. The Fighting Scots proceeded to drive 77 yards on 11 plays, as Davis completed 7 of 9 passes. He twice converted on fourth down, including a 4th-and-16 play. Sean McNicholas, then a freshman, converted the winning extra point.

Davis, a redshirt freshman, was impressive in his first career start. He completed 15 of 22 passes for 206 yards and 2 TDs, adding a 7-vard scoring run.

In fact, it was that run which opened the scoring with 9:00 left in the first quarter, coming from seven yards out. The extra point was no good, and Clarion would take a 7-6 lead less than four minutes later on a 49-yard pass from Adam Almashy to Andy Pore.


Davis threw his first touchdown pass of the afternoon early in the second quarter, covering 16 yards to Bernard Henry. The twopoint conversion run failed, leaving the Scots with a 12-7 advantage. McNicholas added a 47-yard field goal to make the score 15-7. but then Almashy accounted for three straight Clarion scores. The freshman quarterback scored on a 22-yard run with just over four minutes left in the half, then gave the Golden Eagles a 19-15 lead at intermission when he found Glenn Allen on a 7-yard pass with just 13 ticks left.

The same combination hooked up on a 20-yard scoring play midway through the third period, setting the stage for the Edinboro comeback.

The Scots closed to 26-23 on Henry's 34-vard run, with Davis completing the two-point conversion pass to Brandon Richardson. Clarion answered with Frank VanWert's 25-yard field goal with just 5:51 to play.

The contest featured plenty of offense. Clarion totaled 417 vards, while the Boro rang up 354 yards. Henry carried 22 times for 90 yards, adding 4 catches for 39 yards. Buehner had 5 receptions, including the game-winner, for 48 yards.

Almashy completed 11 of 28 passes for 180 yards, with 3 TDs and 2 INTs. Demetric Gardner rushed for 66 yards on just 5 carries, with Doug Dudash adding 57'yards on 11 rushes.
