





The Game

The nationally-ranked Fighting Scots host the Rockets of Slippery Rock today. Pizza Hut is the game sponsor in Edinboro's final regular-season home contest for 1992.

The Records

Edinboro is 7-0, while the Rockets counter at 6-2. The Scots are unbeaten in four tries in the PSAC Western Division, while the Rockets are 2-1. Edinboro is 4-0 at home in '92, while the Rock is 2-1 on the road. Under fifth-year coach Tom Hollman, the Boro has won 23 of 26 home games (23-2-1) with a tie against Slippery Rock (14-14) at the conclusion of the 1988

season. The Scots own wins over Buffalo (35-13), Northwood (37-13), Southern Connecticut (41-0), Clarion (26-17), Lock Haven (38-10), Shippensburg (47-3) and California (33-13). The consecutive wins beginning the year match a 7-0 start for the 1982 team. The last time the Plaid won eight straight to begin the year was in 1971, the year Edinboro captured the Lambert Bowl trophy.

Slippery Rock opened with wins over West Virginia Wesleyan (45-7) and Fairmont State (24-0) before bowing to Ashland (31-37). The Rock then ran off four straight wins against Northwood (35-21), Shippensburg (20-3), California (23-15) and Cheyney (43-27) before losing to #2 IUP (17-34) last Saturday.

The Series

The Rock holds a 17-36-7 edge despite Edinboro posting seven wins in the last ten games (7-2-1). Last year, Slippery Rock ruined any Edinboro post-season playoff hopes with a 7-0 decision in Slippery Rock. The last two games at Sox Harrison have been great battles with the Scots prevailing 17-10 in 1990 and the tie 14-all in 1988.

The Coaches

Hollman is 36-14-1 (.713) and has won 22 of 28 (22-5-1) contests in the PSAC West. The 1989 Kodak "Coach of the Year" has led the Scots into the NCAA II playoffs on two occasions. His nineyear head coaching record of 60-25-2 (.698) includes directing Wooster College (OH) from 1977-80.

The Rock counters with fifth-year head coach George Mihalik. A former star quarterback for Slippery Rock, Mihalik has led the Rock to 10 wins in their last 15 PSAC West clashes and owns a 25-20-4 overall record.

The Scots grind it out behind tackles Mike Kegarise and Tony Tighe, guards Chadd Wallick, Bill Sparenberg and Scott Nickel and center Gordy Hitchcock. The line has cleared the way to average over 420 yards per game offense.

Larry Jackson claimed PSAC West Player of the Week honors for the fourth time last week and leads the ground attack. He nets 132.6 yards per game and has scored 15 rushing touchdowns. Jackson has tallied 928 yards on just 132 carries for a hefty 7.0 YPC mark. Backfield mate Derrick Russell has earned 424 vards on 82 carries and five scores. The fullback spot is split with Tom Tedder (15-50-2td) and Chris Snyder (18-99-1td).

Sophomore quarterback Jody Dickerson (61-122-993 yds-7td-7int) will make his 19th consecutive start under center. He can also rush the ball, netting 147 yards on 39 carries and one score. Wrentie Martin (32-572-2td), Dave Ashton (10-143-1), Brian Heebsh (8-154-1) and Paul Stone (6-54-1) are all solid receivers.

Calling the shots for Slippery Rock will be veteran quarterback John Linhart who has thrown for 1,116 yards and 14 touchdowns this season. His 55% completion mark has come on 79 of 144 passing. He has thrown 11 interceptions. Key targets are Mark Booth (30-376-4td), Greg Hopkins (19-258-3) and Duane Hitchcock (11-169-3).

The running attack is also well balanced with heavy contributions from Sonny Carson (171-662-5td-83ypg) and Kevin Reardon (83-503-4-63).

Two nationally-ranked defenses will take the field this Saturday. Edinboro continues to rely on the efforts of All-American linebacker Jason Perkins and a very aggressive front four. Perkins leads the Scots with 76 stops including 51 solo tackles. He also has five

sacks, six other tackles for loss, and four forced fumbles. Up front, the Scots have been tough with ends Devas Simmons (36 tackles, 3 sacks) and Anthony Ross (49team high, 6 sacks) and tackles Rob Harmer (28-5 for loss) and Russell Cray (59-5 sacks-8 for loss-1 int & td return). Joining Perkins at linebacker will be Michael Sims (51-4 for loss-9 deflections) and Michael Edwards (32).

The secondary ranks among the nation's leaders with safeties Mike Barnes (37) and Steve Russell (20) tied for the team in interceptions with three. Corners are steady with Mario Houston (24-3 punt blocks) and All-American Georj Lewis (22-1 int). Lewis will start his 42nd straight game.

The Rock is very aggressive in '92, similar to the '91 squad. Leading the hit parade are linebackers Sam James (86-39 solo-3 sacks-3 rec) and Kareem Coles (67-2 int) and a pair of All-Americans: tackles John Sikora and defensive back Tony Robinson.


Sikora has been in on 72 stops, including 9 for loss. Robinson owns 31 tackles, 3 interceptions, 7 pass deflections and 2 fumble recoveries while FS Bob Culp leads the team with five picks and 12 deflections.


Special Teams/Kicking Game

Edinboro has the #1 punter in the PSAC in Gary Lhotsky (41.8ypp) while the Rock counters with junior Kevin Morgan (36.2). Lhotsky ranked 10th in Division II a week ago.

The placekicking duties are shared for both clubs as the Boro features Scott Rupert (3-7fg,21-27 PAT) and Mike Joyce (2-3fg, 5-6 PAT) and the Rock Pete Banaszak (5fg, 29-31 PAT) and Mickey Flood (2fg).

Return specialists for the respective clubs include Edinboro's Jackson (23.4 yp ko-ret) and the Rock's Tony Robinson (8.0 yp punt ret).



President Foster F. Diebold



Foster F. Diebold

Now in his thirteenth year as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, Foster F. Diebold is the fourteenth chief executive officer of the institution of higher learning that has come to acclaim in the last decade as one of Pennsylvania's and the nation's finest. He has brought a vigorous educational and moral leadership, a strengthening of the spirit of community, a clear sense of direction and purpose, and a dimension of multicultural pluralism and diversity.

Much has been accomplished during President Diebold's tenure. The University has returned to financial health. Significant facilities and grounds improvements have been achieved, with several of the historic structures on campus restored to their original splendor. Academic programs have been emphasized and improved, with more than 100 degree offerings now available. Enrollment gains have been unprecedented in both numbers and academic quality. International linkages have been established with institutions in several other countries, and Edinboro University's disabled student services program continues to garner acclaim as one of the finest among all colleges and universities in the United States. Widely recognized as a leader in education both here and abroad, President Diebold has positioned Edinboro University to meet the challenges of the 1990s, as well as those that will face public higher education in the 21st century.

The Orange, New Jersey, native is a graduate of Monmouth College and also holds a master of arts in educational administration from Seton Hall University. He has met coursework requirements for a doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently completing the dissertation requirement for the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency of Edinboro University, President Diebold was president of the University of Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Before that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey and a member of the graduate faculty at that institution; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township (New Jersey) Public Schools.

Recognized for his extensive experience in the field of education management, President Diebold's scholarly achievements in the discipline of applied ethics in higher education deserve special mention. The model statement he authored for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, "Ethical Practices for College Presidents," was unanimously adopted by that professional organization and published as policy for the chief executives of its nearly 400 member institutions nationwide. It is the first formally adopted ethical practices and policy statement for higher education presidents.

For his leadership on an international scale and for his many contributions to the advancement of higher education and enrichment of an emerging culture in Pakistan, President Diebold was decorated with prestigious gold medals from three Pakistani universities. The awards for educational eminence were presented during visits to the Edinboro campus by official Pakistani delegations.

Most recently, President Diebold was honored by the Government of Pakistan with the presentation of the degree of Doctor of Laws (honoris causa) presented at the Government House in the City of Karachi. The ceremony was attended by the presidents of the various universities holding linkage agreements together with Edinboro University and many high-ranking officials of the Government of Pakistan.

A staunch advocate of a statewide system of public universities in Pennsylvania, President Diebold supported the enabling legislation for the State System of Higher Education (Act 188 of 1982) and saw the State System come to existence in 1983 as a member of the transition team. He currently serves on the System's Executive Council of Presidents and on the boards of the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, and the University Center at Harrisburg.

Active in community affairs, he serves on the Board of Directors of the Erie Conference on Community Development and the United Way of Erie County, the Board of Corporators of both St. Vincent Health Center and Hamot Medical Center, and on the Executive Committee of the French Creek Council, Boy Scouts of America. He is also a member of the Marine Bank Advisory Board, the Advisory Board of the McMannis Educational Trust Fund, and the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Corporation Scholarship Review Committee.



Athletic Director James K. McDonald

Edinboro University's athletic program was placed under the talented and aggressive leadership of Jim McDonald in July of 1981. Increased emphasis on fund raising to provide a sound scholarship foundation has become his top priority while numerous changes and innovations have also keyed the Scots' athletic program under his direction.

Through his efforts more than \$4 million has been raised during the past eleven years. The funds generated by the energetic athletic director's efforts will be used to assist Edinboro's men and women athletes who compete in the Scots sixteen intercollegiate sports.

In addition to maintaining Edinboro's respected winning tradition in intercollegiate athletics, the former health and physical education professor has vastly expanded the University's summer activities.

Sixty camps were sponsored by the Fighting Scots Booster Club this past summer on the University's campus. Sox Harrison Stadium was the site for the Buffalo Bills–Pittsburgh Steelers first scrimmage, an event the veteran athletic director hopes to bring back to the area each year.

The personable athletic director also introduced Edinboro's Hall of Fame program which has evolved into an annual year-ending event to honor present and past athletes.

McDonald has been at Edinboro since 1962 and for 12 years served as the Fighting Scot basketball coach (1962-1975) and never experienced a losing season while his teams compiled an impressive 181 wins against only 89 losses. During that span, his cagers won four Western Division Pennsylvania Conference crowns, the PC state championship and two District 18 titles that netted trips to the NAIA National Tournament. His teams set 27 University records and made 19 post-season appearances while four of his players were named All-Americans.


Prior to accepting his position at Edinboro, McDonald served as assistant basketball coach in Erie, Pa. He is a 1956 graduate of Bridgeport High School in his home town of Bridgeport, West Virginia.

In 1960 he received a degree in chemistry and physical education from West Virginia Wesleyan College and he also holds a master's degree in health from the University of Buffalo.

As an undergraduate, he set nine school records at Wesleyan and was twice voted both AP and UPI basketball All-American. In 1960, he was the second leading scorer in the United States, averaging slightly over 33 points a game, and led his team to the national basketball tournament in Kansas City, Missouri. He was named to the NAIA's All-Tournament Team in 1959 and 1960.

In 1966, McDonald was selected Area Eight Coach of the Year by the eastern seaboard coaches and that same year was honored as one of the top ten finalists in the Coach of the Year national poll. McDonald's honors also include selection to the West Virginia All-Time College Basketball Team and membership in the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

As a resident of Edinboro, McDonald has a record of extensive community involvement. He was Little League Baseball director for four years and also held a four-year post as a member of the General McLane School Board. He and his wife, Mary Lou, have three sons – Mark, Mike and Matthew.

Scots Look to Rebound; Eye Trip to the NCAA IIs

It's hard to say that a 7-4 season was disappointing. But when expectations were to advance to the NCAA II playoffs for the third consecutive year, the 1991 won-lost mark was not what the Scots had envisioned.

Anticipating that the 1992 pre-season polls will have Edinboro back in the national picture, Football Gazette will rank the Scots number eight. It appears the pressure will be on once again. Expectations yes, but the Fighting Scots' recent success has created them.

The Hollman Era of 1988-92 has Edinboro posting a 29-14-1 slate, including 18 of 24 wins in the rugged Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division. Two trips to the national playoffs, co-championship of the PSAC, forty school records, two Division II Player of the Year finalists and 17 All-Americans are among the accomplishments. All in the last four years.

Tom Hollman begins his fifth season with the Scots and boasts a 53-25-2 record in eight years on the Division II level. His winning percentage of .663 is among the nation's best in small-college football.

Edinboro returns 33 lettermen and 17 starters (including specialties) in 1992 and should once again battle for the PSAC West title. Home encounters include the University of Buffalo and Northwood (MI), as well as PSAC western division rivals Clarion (Homecoming), Slippery Rock and Shippensburg.

The Scots travel to Southern Connecticut, Lock Haven, California, IUP and Millersville with hopes of extending their season beyond November 14.

In 1991, Edinboro played five of their first seven games on the road, and ultimately it cost them a trip to the national playoffs. This season shows more of a balance, with the Plaid hosting three of the first four games at Sox Harrison Stadium. With a 19-2-1 home record under Hollman, look for the Scots to come out of the blocks quickly in '92.

A LOOK AT THE SCOTS

Skill Positions

PSAC West Rookie of the Year Jody Dickerson returns at quarterback with veteran Sean Seibert ready to step in if needed. Dickerson connected on 53 percent of his passes last year, covering 1,382 yards and eight scores, while rushing for another 240 yards and three touchdowns.

Seibert can still lay claim to Edinboro's lone NCAA II playoff win when he engineered a convincing 38-14 margin at Virginia Union in 1990.

A veteran crew of receivers returns, led by Wrentie Martin (39-607-3 TDs), Paul Stone (9-117) and tight end Brian Heebsh (13-162-2 TDs). Martin and Heebsh were PSAC West second team selections in '91 and all three bring a wealth of game experience to the offense.

The running back position is solid with Derrick Russell (68-403-3 TDs), Larry Jackson (29-188-2 TDs), Corey Hill and Vidal Farr. Someone will have to carry the bulk with the departure of All-American Lester Frye. Three-year starter Tom Tedder (41-173-1 TD) returns at fullback and could be the PSAC West's best at this spot. Tedder will get plenty of backup support from sophomore Chris Snyder.

With the graduation of All-American Curtis Rose and All-PSAC pick Wally Spisak, the Scots must fill two rather large pairs of shoes. PSAC West second team choice Mike Kegarise has pro potential with his 6-7, 300 pound frame. Starters Scott Nickel, Tony Tighe and Gordy Hitchcock also return, as will Chad Wallick, Det Betti and Dave Nowacki. Quality depth is key, so Hollman will most likely call on a pair of top recruits to help anchor the offensive front.

Defensive Line

Gone is All-American tackle John Messura, so the interior will highlight some new faces. Experience does return in Otha Davidson (22 tackles) and Russell Cray (42) while LB Devas Simmons (36) is likely to convert to a down lineman spot. End Anthony Mariani (48 tackles, 8 for loss) also returns and had a solid '91 in his initial year. Messura's spot must be filled if the Scots are to improve on their 150-yard per game rushing yield of last year.

All-American and All-PSAC West choice Jason Perkins (135 tackles) returns to solidify a very good corps of linebackers. Perkins was sensational in'91, picking off two passes, recording nine tackles for

losses and adding four sacks to his team high tackle mark. Perkins has been chosen as a 1992 pre-season first team All-American by the Sporting News. Returning sophomore Steve Russell will give help after recording 41 tackles in '91 and tying Perkins for the team lead in interceptions with two.

Veteran Steve Nagy and newcomer Mike Edwards both looked good in spring workouts and will make heavy contributions. Simmons can play both the down position and linebacker and should be an impact player in 1992.

Secondary

With the return of All-American Georj Lewis and PSAC West second team pick Mike Barnes, the Scots' defensive backfield returns plenty of experience. 1990 PSAC West Rookie of the Year Mario Houston will be at the other corner spot. Houston was in on 75 stops last year and led the team with 12 pass deflections.

Lewis was a third team choice by Football Gazette last year and has started 34 consecutive games at the corner. His 50 tackles also earned him a first-team spot on the PSAC West All-Star squad. Barnes, a free safety/linebacker with outstanding speed and toughness, was third on the squad in '91 with 83 tackles. Only linebackers Perkins and Joel Marratta (88) were in on more tackles than Barnes.

Backup quarterback Sean Seibert has the inside track at the vacant free safety spot, vacated by four-year starter Wade Smith. Mike White and a host of top caliber freshmen give Edinboro a great secondary in 1992.

Specialties

A pair of starters return in punter Gary Lhotsky and place-kicker Scott Rupert. Lhotsky earned second team PSAC West honors a year ago with his 38.1 yards per punt. His average was second best in the division and fifth overall in the state. Lhotsky has averaged just under 37 ypp over his two-year career.

Rupert, just a sophomore, had a solid freshman year in '91, finishing second on the team with 36 points. He was true on 5-of-7 field goal tries and converted 21 extra point attempts. A great all-around athlete, Rupert led the Scot baseball team last spring with a .398 batting average.

Head Coach Tom Hollman

"Edinboro has been a great experience, and I like the direction of the program." In January 1988, Edinboro University hired Tom Hollman, Athens, Ohio, as its eleventh head football coach in the school's history. Hollman came to Edinboro from Ohio University, where he was the defensive coordinator.

Hollman, beginning his fifth year, has the Scot program back in the national spotlight. At Edinboro, he has earned 29 wins against just 14 losses and one tie and owns an impressive 18-5-1 slate against the PSAC Western Division.

In 1989, he was named the top coach in the East Region by the National Football Coaches Association and also tabbed the top coach in the PSAC West. In 1990, he guided the Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro routed Virginia Union and advanced to the national quarterfinals.

"Edinboro has been a great experience, and I like the direction of the program," Hollman said.

"As a coach, I have been fortunate to coach at many different levels, from high school to Division I. The Division II level here at Edinboro is very appealing to me in relation to my career goals. It is a great feeling to be a head coach at this level."

Hollman's educational background begins with a high school diploma from Memorial High School in St. Mary's, Ohio, followed by his undergraduate degree in education from Ohio Northern University in 1968. Three years later Hollman received his master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio.

While at Ohio Northern, Hollman was a three-year starter for the football team and a two-way performer as a defensive back and offensive end during his junior and senior years. He holds the school record with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years during his stay at Ohio Northern.

A chronological look at Hollman's coaching career begins in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. From there, Hollman moved on to Greenville High School in Ohio where he became head coach from 1971-73. His Greenville squads posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark during his three-year stay.

Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974 and 1975 seasons, where his squad recorded 15 wins against three setbacks and two ties. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in '74, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In '76, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University.

The following year, Hollman accepted the head coach position at Wooster College (OH) and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school's history (24-11-1).

In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the '84 campaign. Then, beginning in 1985 Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University.

"It has been a very comfortable transition for me," Hollman added. "I have found the community to be supportive and the administration is giving me every opportunity to be successful here at Edinboro," he concluded.





Scott Browning – Secondary

Moving to the defensive side of the ball, from the offensive backfield, Scott brings a wealth of coaching experience in his seventh year at the 'Boro. Under his guidance the Scot defense has intercepted 63 passes the past four seasons. He has guided the fortunes of All-Americans Wade Smith and Georj Lewis, and PSAC Rookie of the Year Mario Houston.

Scott came to Edinboro from Ohio State University, where he coached receivers and runningbacks including Keith Byers. Prior to his start at OSU, Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview High Schools in Ohio, from 1979-81. Then, as a graduate assistant, he coached the defensive secondary at New Mexico State in 1982.

In 1983, he mentored the receivers at Idaho State University which advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs.

Browning earned a master's degree in education administration from New Mexico State in 1983, and a BS in education from Ohio State in 1981. Earlier, before transferring to OSU, Scott attended Capital University where he played football for one season. Browning was a four-year letterman in four sports at Loudenville High School (OH) prior to his collegiate days. Scott is married to the former Lynn Hook and resides in Edinboro.

Dan Gierlak - Running Backs

Dan Gierlak enters his sixth season as a full-time coach with his responsibilities concerning the running backs. He is also the head women's softball coach for the Scots and led the squad to the PSAC playoffs in 1990.

Gierlak came to the 'Boro from Thiel College (Pa.) where he coached the defensive secondary for the 1984 season. Dan, a starter and three-year letterwinner for the Plaid in the secondary, moved on to the semi-pro ranks with the Chicago Cowboys. During his short stint with the Cowboys, Gierlak's squad gained national championship honors in 1984 and runner up nationally in the 1985 season. Gierlak brings both playing and coaching experience to the staff, giving the Scot players an added plus on the offensive side of the ball. As backfield coach, he has guided former Harlon Hill finalist Elbert Cole and Boro All-American Lester Frye.

Originally from Buffalo, New York, Dan graduated from Edinboro with a degree in health and physical education. He and his wife, the former Amy Adams and one-year-old daughter, Alexandria Alicia, reside in Edinboro.

Mark Niswonger – Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers


Mark Niswonger, a veteran of the coaching ranks for 19 years, begins his fifth year with the Plaid as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. Former understudy of head coach Tom Hollman at Greenville High School, Mark brings extensive experience both on and off the field to the Scot coaching staff. He has helped mold the Scot defense into one of the most respected squads in the country over the past four years.

His coaching stint began back while attending Findlay when he was the head scout for Arlington High School. His first job after college was as defensive coordinator for Bryan High School (OH) where the team earned a 9-1 record. 





Gene Smith - Defensive Line

Nine Seniors to Play Last Home Game

For the past four years, a group of nine Edinboro University football players have been masquerading as members of one of the finest teams in NCAA Division II. It is appropriate, then, that today, on Halloween, Boro's seniors look to pull one more treat out of their bag of tricks.

Since the 1988 season, this year's senior class has helped the Fighting Scots amass a 36-14-1 record (a winning percentage of .716). And a win today will move the Boro to 8-0, its best start since 1971.

"Without question," admits Edinboro head coach Tom Hollman, "a big reason for our success this season, and really since I've been here, has been the leadership provided by our seniors. And this year's group could be the most outstanding, both in terms of leadership ability and maturity."

Meet Mike Barnes, Brian Heebsh, Georj Lewis, Wrentie Martin, Steve Nagy, Scott Nickel, Anthony Ross, Sean Seibert and Paul Stone. Each has, in his own way, contributed mightily to the successes of the Edinboro program during their careers.

Barnes, a 5-foot 10-inch, 205pounder from Euclid (OH) High School, will make his 42nd consecutive start today for the Scots, the last 37 at safety. He's tied for the team lead in interceptions in 1992 with three, and has also contributed 37 tackles (19 solos), five pass deflections and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Cleveland native has well over 200 stops and was a PSAC-West second team selection in 1991. The son of Joseph and Grace Barnes of Cleveland, Mike will graduate with a degree in political science.

Heebsh, 6-2, 230, was also named PSAC-West second team last year. An outstanding blocker and pass receiver, Heebsh is third on the team in receptions with eight, and has averaged a healthy 19.3 yards per catch this season, including a 49-yard touchdown grab in the Boro's win over Lock Haven. The Tiffin Columbian (OH) High School product has averaged 16.3 yards per catch (on 34 receptions) from his tight end position throughout his Edinboro career. Off the field,

Lewis, a 5-9, 175-lb. product of Connellsville High School, has started every game at cornerback since his freshman year, a string of 41 consecutive. He was named third team All-American by the Football Gazette and PSAC first team in 1991. Also a tremendous student, his 3.0+ grade point average has earned him recognition from the University as a Fighting Scot Scholar Athlete the last three years. Statistically, Lewis has recorded 22 stops and an interception in 1992, running his career numbers to 185 tackles and a half-dozen picks. An accounting major, Georj is the son of Robert Lewis of Connellsville.

Martin, 6-1, 180, has led the Boro in receptions each of the past two seasons, including 32 grabs this year. He needs 18 more catches to set a new school record for receptions in a season, and is just 25 shy of the all-time receiving mark. The Massillon, Ohio, native and Washington High School graduate was a PSAC-West second team selection last year at wide receiver. His 81.7 receiving yards per game this season ranks Martin among the top 20 in NCAA Division II. The son of Rosalyne Martin of Massillon, Wrentie is majoring in business administration.

Nickel, from Conneaut (Ohio) High School, is in his third season as a starter on the offensive line. The 6-4. 278-pounder is very versatile, as Nickel can play all five positions across the offensive line. Known as an excellent


Nagy, 6-1, 215, has seen action in every Fighting Scot game since his sophomore season as the team's long snapper and as a reserve outside linebacker. A tremendous special teams player with a great work ethic, Nagy has made solid contributions to the Scot program throughout his career. A graduate of St. Vincent-St. Mary High School in Stow, Ohio, Steve is the son of Steve and Patricia Nagy of Stow. He will graduate with a

pass blocker, he has also contributed to a Scot ground attack that is averaging better than 260 yards per game, tops in the PSAC. The son of Kevin and Sandy Rodgers of Conneaut, Scott is a biology major.

Ross, a 6-2, 235-lb. defensive end, is a converted linebacker who leads the Scots in sacks (6) and ranks fourth on the team in tackles (49, 23 solos). A native of Cleveland, Ohio, and graduate of Shaw High School, Ross has consistently provided the big play. In addition to his sacks, he has also added six tackles for loss, three deflected passes and a fumble recovery in 1992. He is coming off a 12-tackle performance in the Boro's 33-13 win over California. A criminal justice major, Ross is the son of Julia Woodruff of Cleveland.

Seibert, who hails from Painesville, Ohio, provides solid experience at the quarterback position as a backup to starter Jody Dickerson, and led the Scots to the only playoff win in school history (a 38-14 victory over Virginia Union in the opening round of the 1990 NCAA Division II playoffs). He has completed 8 of 20 passes this season for 77 yards and a touchdown for a quarterback efficiency rating of 93.3. He has been recognized each of the past three years for his outstanding scholastic accomplishments by the University. Sean will earn a political science degree this December in just seven semesters. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. David Seibert of Painesville.

Stone, 6-0, 178, is in his third year as a starter at wide out and ranks fourth on the squad in receptions. Over the course of his career, Stone has hauled in 48 passes for 441 yards and three touchdowns. His sure hands have also made him the holder for kick placements and he also returns kickoffs and punts. A native of Norton, Ohio, and a graduate of Norton High School, Paul will earn a degree in secondary education. He is the son of Peter and Pauline Stone of Norton.
