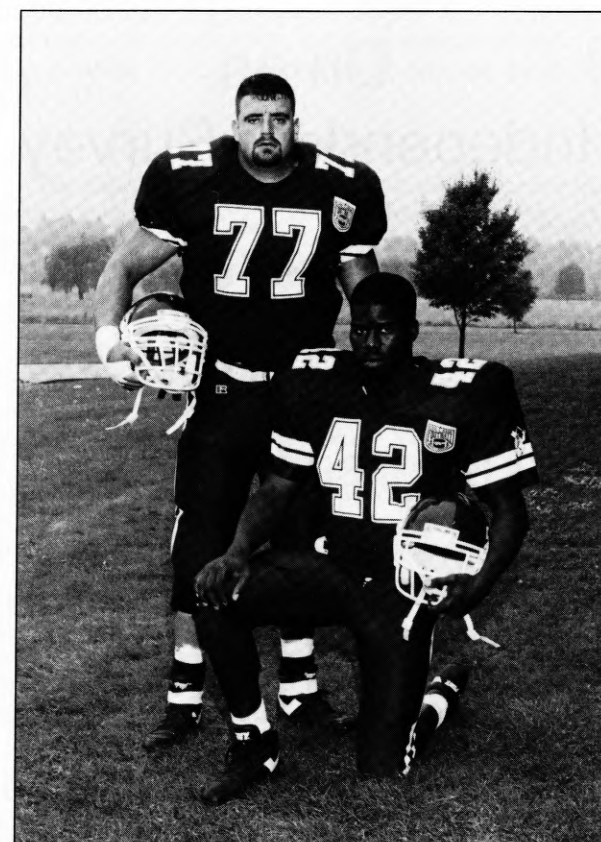

Edinboro/Clarion Battle in Regular Season Finale

The Game

Edinboro University's quest for its third consecutive NCAA II playoff berth continues today as the Fighting Scots play host to Clarion University in their 1994 regular season finale.

The Records

The Scots, 7-2 overall and 4-1 in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division, opened the year beating Hillsdale, 31-28, then dropped a decision to Mansfield, 31-26. Consecutive wins followed against Elizabeth City, 28-0, Lock Haven, 33-16, Shippensburg, 31-17, California, 67-6 and Slippery Rock, 59-39, before a 21-7 loss to IUP. Last Saturday, the Scots stormed American International, 65-25.

Clarion, a deceiving 3-6 and 1-4, dropped a tough seven-point decision to West Chester, 37-30, in its opener, then beat Fairmont State, 29-19. A win over NAIA powerhouse Westminster, 32-28, followed in week three, then a loss to Millersville, 40-27. The Golden Eagles have dropped four of five recently, downing Lock Haven 41-20, but have fallen in straight games to Shippensburg, 31-21, California, 41-31, Slippery Rock, 34-31, and IUP, 44-17.

The Series

The Golden Eagles hold a 33-29-2 edge over the Scots in a series dating back to 1926. Edinboro has won the last six games, including a 28-0 shutout on the road last season. The last Clarion victory was 48-24 in 1987 at Memorial Stadium.

The Coaches

Edinboro features seventh-year coach Tom Hollman while Clarion counters with first-year head coach, and former Edinboro assistant (1981-83), Malen Luke. Hollman, the 1989 Kodak East Region and PSAC Coach of the Year, boasts an impressive 52-21-2 mark including a 31-8-2 record in the PSAC West. His 11-year collegiate mark of 76-32-3 includes a 24-11-1 stint at Wooster, Ohio. He has led the Boro to four NCAA II playoff appearances, including a quarterfinalist showing in 1990.

Malen Luke was hired as Clarion University's 10th head football coach this past December, following the coaching retirement of long-time mentor Gene Sobolewski. Luke came to the Golden Eagle program after a very successful run at Defiance College, Ohio, where he led the Yellow Jackets to a 33-7 mark over his final four seasons.

The Offenses

Edinboro features great balance with the legs of Larry Jackson and the arm of Jody Dickerson. Jackson recently became just the third player in PSAC history to eclipse the 4,000 yard barrier for a career. Currently with 4,114 rushing yards, Jackson continues to lead the conference with his 1,537 yards on 250 carries and 14 touchdowns. He has gone over the 100 yard mark in 15 consecutive games, while his 238 all-purpose yards per game standard is second on the Division II level.

Dickerson, coming off a 278 yard effort in the win over AIC, continues to rewrite the Edinboro record books. Starting since his freshman campaign, Dickerson has established school records in yards (7,145), touchdown passes (60), completions (471) and attempts (889). In 1994, he has connected on 109 of 188 passes for 1,719 yards and 15 scores. Getting his 42nd career start today, he has led the Scots to an overall slate of 30-10-1, including a pair of NCAA playoff appearances. Fullbacks Chris Snyder (29 att., 136 yds., 4 TDs) and Saul Harrison (32, 170, 7 TDs) split duties while, up front, center Det Betti, guards Chadd Wallick and Chris Barney and tackles Tom Lavis and Jeremy O'Day get the starting call.

The Scots main receiving weapons are Lateef Walters (39 receptions, 675 yds., 8 TDs), who has missed the past two games with an ankle injury and is still questionable, and Corey Keyes (16, 432, 27.0 ypc, 3 TDs). Tight end Todd Henne (14, 153, 1 TD) and Jackson (17, 237) are also capable pass catchers.

Clarion answers with a high scoring attack featuring quarterback Craig Ray, wide out Marlon Worthy and running backs Steve Witte and Art Gregory. Ray has established a school record with his 2,346 yards passing this season, connecting on 191 of 332 tries and 11 touchdowns. Worthy, also setting a school standard for receptions, has grabbed 66 passes for 848 yards and five scores. His 94.2 yards per game receiving mark is among the best in the PSAC. Witte has scored 16 times, 11 on the ground and five through the air, earning over 1,000 yards combined rushing and receiving. Gregory, a three-year starter, has logged 475 yards on the ground and six scores. Wide out Chris Skultety (36 catches, 488 yards) is also a threat.

The Defenses

Today marks a great test for a pair of defensive squads which have improved greatly since the opener. Edinboro looks to linebackers Michael Sims (team high 107 stops, 4 for loss, 1 INT, 1 forced fumble), Michael Edwards (92, 5 for loss, 1 INT, 2 recovery) and Rahshahn Alston (58, 1 INT, 6 deflections, one blocked field goal) to make most of the plays on defense. Along the front, the Boro features tackles Matt Gentile (40, 5 for loss and 2 sacks), Al Bass (23, 1 INT, 1 recovery) and Otha Davidson (18, 2 sacks, one force) matched with ends Pat Schuster (52, 8 for loss, team high 10 sacks, one recovery) and Bryan Lambert (64, 6 sacks, 3 for loss).

The Edinboro secondary is anchored by All-American safety Steve Russell, the school's all-time interception leader with 19. He has five picks in six games played in 1994, after not suiting up until week four due to injury. Russell has also added 33 tackles and four breakups. Keith Cushenberry (31, 1 INT), Jermaine Carswell (16, team high 9 deflections), Marty Williams (56, 1 INT, 6 deflections) and Ron Allen (41, 1 INT, 4 breakups, 1 recovery) all see plenty of time in the Scot backfield.

Clarion, who held IUP in check in the first half, features linebacker Clint Terza (99 stops, 4 sacks, 2 INTs) and free safety Sean Spencer (92, 2 INTs, 3 breakups) in its defensive scheme. Cornerback Eldridge Ponder leads the team with 13 passes defended and has also registered 44 tackles, while safety Kim Niedblal has a team leading three interceptions. Linebackers Thomas Williams (87 hits) and Alim Kamara (team high 5 sacks) are also solid, whereas end Brent Lehman (57, 8 for loss) leads the charge across the interior.

Kicking Game/Specialties

The Scots look to Scott Rupert (5-7 fg, L 32, 30-40 PATs, 16 punts, 37.8 ypp) to handle both kicking jobs while the Golden Eagles answer with kicker Paul Cramer (9-17 fg, 24-25 PATs) and punter Keith O'Connor (46 punts, 34.0 ypp).

Jackson (24.7 ypr) and Russell (26.0) are threats returning kicks for the Scots while Clarion has Worthy back on kickoffs (30.4) and punts (9.4). Russell and Keyes are deep on punts for the Boro.

Turnover Ratio

The Boro has improved to +6 with the Scots losing nine fumbles and throwing nine interceptions (-18), while recovering ten enemy miscues and grabbing 14 interceptions (+24). Clarion has lost 20 turnovers (11 fumbles, 9 INTs) while gaining 22 errors (13 recoveries, 9 INTs) to also stand on the plus side at +2.

President Foster F. Diebold

Now in his fifteenth year as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, Foster F. Diebold is the fourteenth chief executive officer of the institution of higher learning that has come to acclaim in the last decade as one of Pennsylvania's and the nation's finest. He has brought a vigorous educational and moral leadership, a strengthening of the spirit of community, a clear sense of direction and purpose, and a dimension of multicultural pluralism and diversity.

Much has been accomplished during President Diebold's tenure. The University has returned to financial health. Significant facilities and grounds improvements have been achieved, with several of the historic structures on campus restored to their original splendor. Academic programs have been emphasized and improved, with more than 100 degree offerings now available. Enrollment gains have been unprecedented in both numbers and academic quality. International linkages have been established with institutions in several other countries, and Edinboro University's program for students with disabilities continues to garner acclaim as one of the finest among all colleges and universities in the United States. Widely recognized as a leader in education both here and abroad, President Diebold has positioned Edinboro University to meet the challenges that will face public higher education in the 21st century.

The Orange, New Jersey, native is a graduate of Monmouth College and also holds a master of arts in educational administration from Seton Hall University. He has met coursework requirements for a doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently completing the dissertation requirement for the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency of Edinboro University, President Diebold was president of the University of

Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Before that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey and a member of the graduate faculty at that institution; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township (New Jersey) Public Schools.

Recognized for his extensive experience in the field of education management, President Diebold's scholarly achievements in the discipline of applied ethics in higher education deserve special mention. The model statement he authored for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, "Ethical Practices for College Presidents," was unanimously adopted by that professional organization and published as policy for the chief executives of its nearly 400 member institutions nationwide. It is the first formally adopted ethical practices and policy statement for higher education presidents.

For his leadership on an international scale and for his many contributions to the advancement of higher education and enrichment of an emerging culture in Pakistan, President Diebold was decorated with prestigious gold medals from three Pakistani universities. The awards for educational eminence were presented during visits to the Edinboro campus by official Pakistani delegations.

President Diebold was also honored by the Government of Pakistan with the awarding of the degree of Doctor of Laws (*honoris causa*), presented at the Government House in the City of Karachi. The ceremony was attended by the presidents of the several Pakistani universities holding linkage agreements with Edinboro University, as well as many high-ranking officials of the Government

of Pakistan and U.S. diplomatic officials.

A staunch advocate of a statewide system of public universities in Pennsylvania, President Diebold supported the enabling legislation for the State System of Higher Education (Act 188 of 1982) and saw the State System come to existence in 1983 as a member of the transition team. He currently serves on the System's Executive Council of Presidents and on the boards of the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, and the Dixon University Center at Harrisburg.

President Diebold's stature in American higher education has been recognized by several high-level appointments. He was named to the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, the leading national organization devoted to building constructive relationships between the two countries. He was also appointed to the Leadership Council of the Northeast-Midwest Institute, a regional component of the Center for Regional Policy, and to the Pennsylvania Humanities Council, the private, non-profit group promoting statewide public understanding of the humanities.

Edinboro Honors Nine Seniors Today

First and foremost, today's game against Clarion University is quite significant to the Scots and their 1994 national playoff aspirations.

What can't be overlooked though, is the profound impact nine student-athletes, playing in their final game at Sox Harrison Stadium, have had on the Scot program since 1991. Over the span, this group can boast about a pair of Division II playoff appearances and a won/loss mark of 30-11-1.

Among the participants recognized today are Edinboro's all-time leaders in yards rushing and passing and the school's career interception leader. Noting that records and results date back to the 1920s, these three players before you today may be considered among Edinboro's best ever. In addition to record-holding, All-Americans **Larry Jackson** (RB), **Jody Dickerson** (QB) and **Steve Russell** (FS), **Otha Davidson** (OT/DT), **Michael Edwards** (LB), **Jeff MacIntosh** (WR), **Scott Rupert** (PK/P), **Chris Snyder** (FB) and **Lateef Walters** (WR) will display their skills before the partisan crowd for the last time today.

Jackson, the PSAC West Player of the Year in 1992, recently became just the third player in PSAC history to eclipse the 4,000-yard barrier and currently stands with 4,114 career yards. Announced as one of 23 players in the running for national player of the year honors this season, Jackson currently leads Division II in yards per game rushing (170+) and has totaled 40 rushing touchdowns.

Dickerson has started every game except one (Mansfield '94) since 1991 and is the Scots record holder in yards passing (7,145),

touchdowns (60), total offense (7,509) and completions (470). With him under center, Edinboro has won 17 of 24 games (17-6-1) in the rugged PSAC Western Division.

Russell, having already earned his undergraduate degree, returned to the program this season to continue his stellar career. Entering today's contest, he has set the Edinboro standard with 19 interceptions including a team high five this season. He was a first-team choice, along with Jackson and Dickerson, to the western division all-star squad a year ago.

Davidson, currently along the defensive line, has been a versatile lineman playing offensive guard and defensive tackle. He has been in on 18 tackles in 1994 and is tied for third on the team with two quarterback sacks.

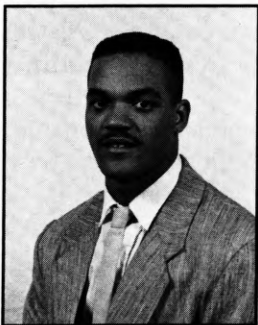
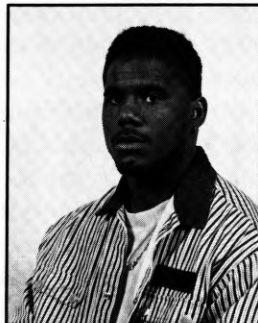
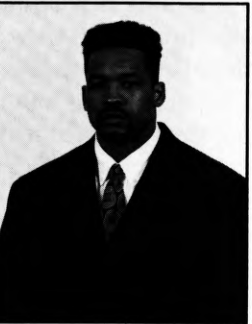
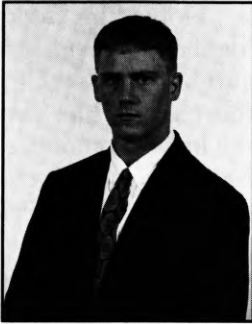
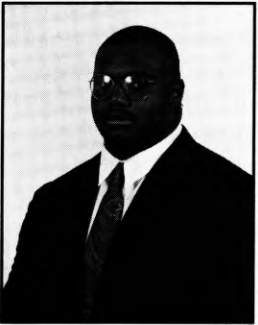
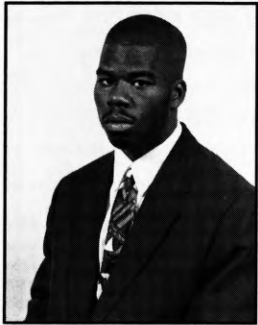
Edwards, a three-year starter, is currently second on the team with 92 tackles. An all PSAC West performer a year ago, he is the school's 11th all-time leading tackler with 305 career stops.

MacIntosh has turned in a solid 1994, catching six passes for 76 yards and one score. His touchdown grab and 31-yard reception setting up the go-ahead touchdown, were very instrumental in the 'Boro's wild win over the Rock.

Rupert, ranked third on the all-time kick scoring charts with 169 points, is currently third on the team with 45 tallies on 5 of 7 field goals and 30 extra points. The 1994 PSAC Player of the Year in baseball, he set nine school records for the western division champion Scots last spring.

Snyder, from nearby Seneca High, has been the starting full-back since 1993. He is currently third in yards rushing (136) and touchdowns (4). He, along with Saul Harrison, has helped clear the way for Division II's top rusher this season.

Walters, recovering from an ankle injury, is on pace to establish a school record for catches in a season (50). He currently owns 39 grabs for 675 yards and eight scores. His 19.5 yard per catch mark is second best in school history, following 1990 Harlon Hill runner up Ernest Priester.



Scot Success in the Classroom

Under the direction of Tom Hollman, the Scots have not only excelled on the field but in the classroom.

Last year the football team had 28 different student-athletes earn semester grade point averages over the 3.0 mark, up one from a year ago. Furthermore, the Scots also increased the number of players who eclipsed the same standard on a cumulative basis.

Among the 'Boro's standouts were 1994 graduates **Scott Mikowicz** and **Dave Ashton**. Mikowicz displayed outstanding work in the classroom, finishing his academic career with an impressive 3.40 QPA. The height of his studies was exemplified with his representation of Edinboro University as an NCAA post-graduate scholarship nominee. Also the starting tight end on the football team, Mikowicz caught 25 passes for 365 yards and four touchdowns. Ashton earned honors as a national scholar-athlete and as a three-time Edinboro University scholar-athlete, maintaining a 3.22 QPA during his four years at the 'Boro. He was a starting wide receiver in 1993, catching 26 passes for 334 yards and three touchdowns.

Several 1993 graduates earned laurels on and off the field during their careers at Edinboro. **Sean Seibert** and **Brian Heebsh** were both recognized as national scholar-athletes by *College Football Preview* magazine a year ago, while All-Americans **Georj Lewis** and **Mike Barnes** were nominated for NCAA minority post-graduate scholarships.

1994: Building a Tradition

Before the arrival of Tom Hollman in 1988, the Fighting Scots knew that their football program needed a lift. What they didn't know was that under Hollman's direction, their lift would quickly become a significant elevation.

Edinboro has taken its program to national prominence, and in 1994 will aim to reach the NCAA II playoffs for the fifth time in the past six seasons. Last year, the Scots earned their second straight post-season appearance while posting another eight-win (8-3) season. With all three hard fought losses coming at the hands of nationally-ranked opponents, the Boro was strong enough to finish the year ranked #14 among the Division II elite.

This upcoming season should be a good measure of just how successful the Edinboro tradition has become. Graduation took 11 starters, many of whom spent multiple seasons at the top of the depth chart. And while the good fortune has been enjoyed, it has not gone unnoticed. The Scots will have to carry on the tradition without both former offensive line coach Ed Stults, who assumed the head coaching duties at Defiance College (OH), and former defensive line coach/recruiting coordinator Gene Smith, who now works as an NFL BLESTO scout.

The quest for a third straight post-season berth in 1994 will not be easy with another rugged 10-game schedule. The PSAC West slate is more balanced than ever, while, furthermore, the Scots face formidable non-conference foes in Hillsdale (MI), Elizabeth City and American International, and Mansfield.

The Plaid will host five games and play five on the road in 1994, including the visitors role in two straight contests to begin the year. In a strange twist of fortunes, the Boro has been a terror away from home the past two years. Since the start of the 1992 campaign, Edinboro has gone 10 straight regular season road games without a loss while posting seven wins and three setbacks at Sox Harrison Stadium.

A Breakdown of Personnel

Skill Positions

Quarterback Jody Dickerson will head the offense for the fourth straight season. On pace to break several Edinboro career passing records, the PSAC West first-teamer, and honorable mention All-American, returns after a stellar 1993

campaign in which he set single season standards for yards (2,209), touchdowns (25), and attempts (277). The Scots have compiled an impressive 23-9-1 record during his string of 33 consecutive starts.

Larry Jackson, one of the best tailbacks in Edinboro history, also returns for his senior season. The 1992 PSAC West Player of the Year returned from early season injuries to amass 1,171 yards and eight touchdowns in 1993. Jackson's 2,577 career rushing yards puts him within 823 yards of the Boro's all-time mark. Full-back Chris Snyder, both a tough runner and punishing blocker, will solidify the Plaid backfield.

When the Scots go to the air, they'll look in the direction of wide out Lateef Walters (23 receptions, 550 yds., 6 TDs) who gives them plenty of big-play experience.

Offensive Line

The Boro is strong up the middle, with returning guards Det Betti and Jeremy O'Day. Betti may be asked to play center to make room for either Chadd Wallick or Otha Davidson, both of whom have started in big games during their careers. On the outside, they must somehow replace former All-PSAC tackles Mike Kegarise and Tony Tighe. Todd Henne caught four touchdowns last season and could get the nod at tight end.

Defensive Line

With only one returnee from last year's squad, the defensive front could be a big question mark. All-Northeast Region defensive end Pat Schuster looks to duplicate a spectacular 1993 campaign in which he had 76 stops and 11 sacks. Playing opposite Schuster could be converted linebacker and special teams standout Bryan Lambert (59 tackles).

The main concern is plugging up the middle with the departure of All-American tackle Russell Cray and linemate Rob Harmer. Matt Gentile played well last year when injuries put him into a starting role. The other tackle spot will be up for grabs when the fall practice sessions get underway.

Linebackers

Michael Edwards will spearhead a linebacking crew who all return as former starters. The two year backer recorded 127 tackles and six break-ups en route to a PSAC West Second Team selection a

year ago. Another great season from Edwards could vault him into the Boro's top ten in career tackles. Michael Sims, a 1993 redshirt, will be asked to fill the big shoes of three-time All-American middle linebacker Jason Perkins. Sims had an impressive freshman season two years ago in which he had 84 stops at one of the outside positions. Rahshahn Alston will be expected to round out an excellent core of linebackers in 1994. Only a freshman last year, Alston gained experience as a starter, totaling 69 tackles from the outside.

Secondary

The Boro returns three-fourths of a defensive backfield that terrorized quarterbacks for 22 interceptions last season. All-American safety Steve Russell will lead the talented unit. One of the best athletes on the team, Russell is a school record holder with 14 interceptions. Last season the All-American and PSAC West first teamer stole seven aerials and registered 68 tackles. Also feared for his hitting ability, Russell has forced six fumbles over his stellar career.

Marty Williams and Rick Walker also return after starting all eleven games last season. Walker accounted for 46 tackles, five break-ups, and one interception from his free safety position while Williams, a cornerback, recorded 61 tackles, 10 break-ups, two interceptions and a blocked punt. Both returnees caused two fumbles and recovered another in 1993. Corners David Harris and Ron Allen both saw action throughout the past season and are expected to compete for more playing time this year.

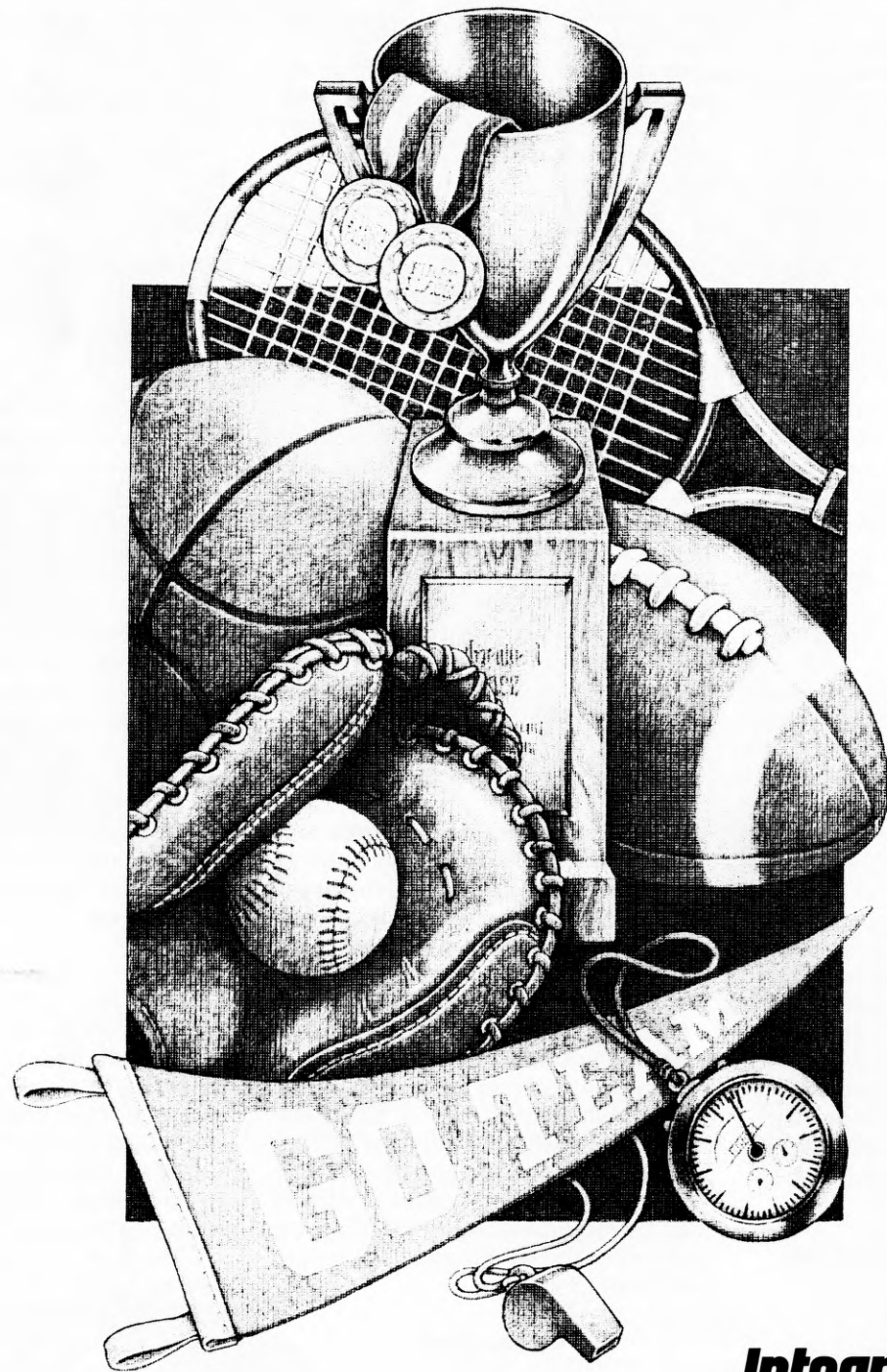
Specialties

Place-kicker Scott Rupert, a Boro mainstay the past two years, returns to handle the kicking chores for yet another season. In 1993 Rupert set an Edinboro single season record by connecting on 43 of 45 PAT tries. Five of his 11 field goal attempts were also true, including a career best 44 yarder.

The Boro will have a new punter in 1994 for the first time in four years due to the graduation of All-American Gary Lhotsky. The vacancy remains up for grabs as camp starts in August.

Walters is likely to be the Scots' top punt return threat while Russell averaged over 24 yards per kickoff return last season, including a 92-yarder for a score at Slippery Rock.

Head Coach Tom Hollman

In January 1988, Edinboro University hired Tom Hollman, Athens, Ohio, as its eleventh head football coach in the school's history. Hollman came to Edinboro from Ohio University, where he was the defensive coordinator.

Hollman, beginning his seventh year, has the Scot program back in the national spotlight. At Edinboro, he has earned 45 wins against just 19 losses and two ties and owns an impressive 27-7-2 slate against the PSAC Western Division. The Scots have advanced to post-season play four of the past five years.

In 1989, he was named the top coach in the East Region by the National Football Coaches Association and also tabbed the top coach in the PSAC West. In 1990, he guided the Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro routed Virginia Union and advanced to the national quarterfinals.

"Edinboro has been a great experience, and I like the direction of the program," Hollman said.

"As a coach, I have been fortunate to coach at many different levels, from high school to Division I. The Division II level here at Edinboro is very appealing to me in relation to my career goals. It is a great feeling to be a head coach at this level."

Hollman's educational background begins with a high school diploma from Memorial High School in St. Mary's, Ohio, followed by his undergraduate degree in education from Ohio Northern University in 1968. Three years later Hollman received his master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio.

While at Ohio Northern, Hollman was a three-year starter for the football team and a two-year performer as a defensive back and offen-

sive end during his junior and senior years. He holds the school record with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years during his stay at Ohio Northern.

A chronological look at Hollman's coaching career begins in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. From there, Hollman moved on to Greenville High School in Ohio where he became head coach from 1971-73. His Greenville squads posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark during his three-year stay.

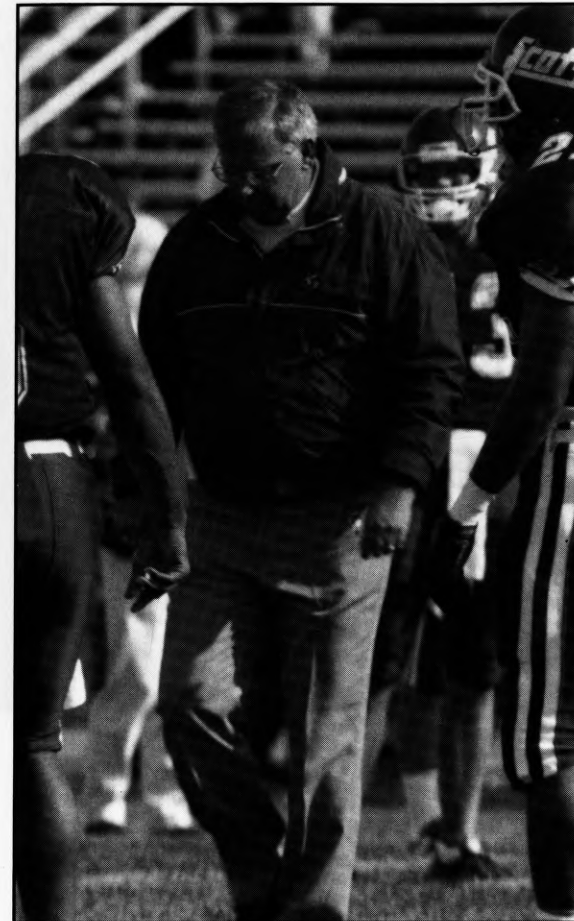
Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974 and 1975 seasons, where his squad recorded 15 wins against three setbacks and two ties. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in 1974, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In 1976, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University.

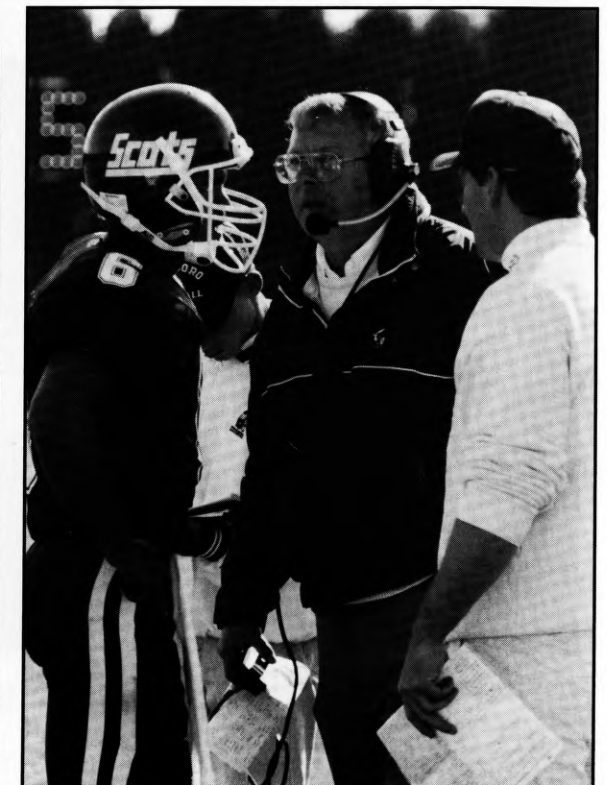
The following year, Hollman accepted the head coach position at Wooster College (OH) and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school history (24-11-1).

In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the 1984 campaign. Then, beginning in 1985 Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University.

Tom resides in Edinboro with his wife, Kandi, and four children, Mari, Jon, Tim and Denise.

Scott Browning – Offensive Line

Moving to the offensive side of the ball, from the defensive backfield, Scott brings a wealth of coaching experience in his ninth year at the 'Boro. Under his guidance the Scot defense has intercepted 78 passes the past six seasons. He has guided the fortunes of All-Americans Steve Russell, Michael Willis, Wade Smith, Georj Lewis, and Mike Barnes, and PSAC Rookie of the Year Mario Houston. 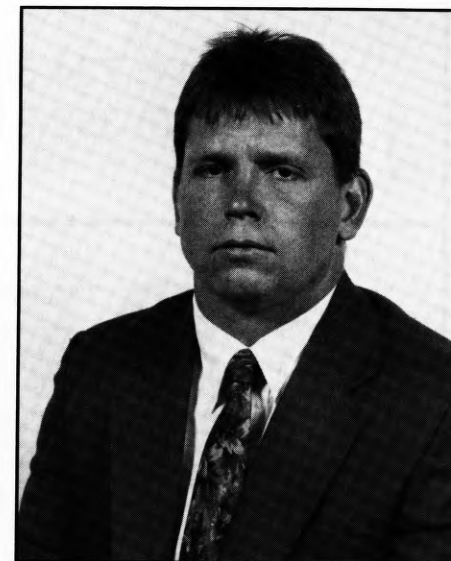
Dan Gierlak – Running Backs

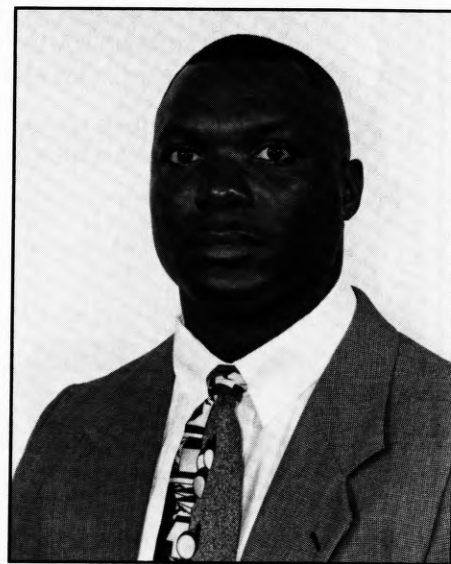
Tony Elliott – Secondary

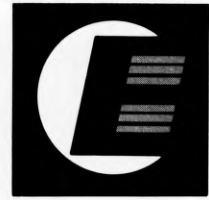

NCAA's Highest Honor— The Theodore Roosevelt Award

The Theodore Roosevelt Award is the highest honor the National Collegiate Athletic Association may confer on an individual. It is presented annually to a distinguished citizen of national reputation and outstanding accomplishment who has earned a varsity athletics award in college. That individual must have shown continuing interest and concern for physical fitness and competitive sport, and exemplified by personal example most clearly and forcefully the ideals and purposes to which college athletics programs and amateur sports competition are dedicated. The award is presented annually at the honors dinner at the Association's Convention.

The 1994 "Teddy" recipient and 28th honoree is businessman and civic leader Rafer Johnson.

Johnson is president of Rafer Johnson Enterprises, which works with companies that are involved with providing activities for youth. In addition, he serves as the chairman of the board of directors for the California Special Olympics.

He was on the board of directors of the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee (LAOOC) and a member of its 22-member Executive Committee. Johnson was honored for his many athletics achievements by being selected as the torch-bearer for the 1984 Summer Olympic Games.

He currently serves on the board of directors of the Amateur Foundation, the organization that distributes surplus money earned by the LAOOC during the 1984 Olympics.

Johnson competed in two Olympic Games, winning a silver medal in the decathlon at the 1956 Games in Melbourne, Australia, and a gold medal at the 1960 Games in Rome. As a student-athlete at UCLA in 1958, he was named Sportsman of the Year by Sports Illustrated and also won recognition as North American athlete of the year.

In 1960, Johnson won the Sullivan Award, given to the outstanding amateur athlete in the United States. He also was named The Associated Press male athlete of the year, and was the flag-bearer and team captain for the 1960 U.S. Olympic Team.

Johnson has been involved with the President's Council on Physical Fitness, the President's Commission on Olympic Sports, the International Olympic Academy Committee of the United States Olympic Committee, the Advisory Committee of the World's Sport Foundation and the athletics advisory panel for the Department of State.

Johnson lettered in track and basketball while earning a bachelor of arts degree in physical education from UCLA. He was the AAU decathlon champion in 1956 and 1958 (the NCAA did not include the decathlon in its championships until 1970).

Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States from 1901-1909, for whom the award is named, summed up the creed of amateur athletics this way:

"In the battle of life, it is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbled, or where the doer of deeds could have done better.

"The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena; whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs and comes short again and again, because there is no effort without shortcoming; who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotion, spends himself in a worthy cause; who at best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement; and who at worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who have tasted neither victory nor defeat."

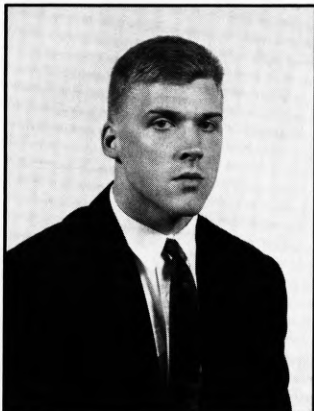


Nicklaus Cronk – Defensive Line

Also an excellent student, Mikowicz carries a 3.4 QPA as a health and physical education major. In 1994, he was chosen by the University as an NCAA post-graduate scholarship nominee.

Tom Rose Named 1994 PSAC Media Award-Winner

Tom Rose, sports editor of the *Washington Observer-Reporter* has been named the 1994 winner of the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) George Heaslip Media Award.

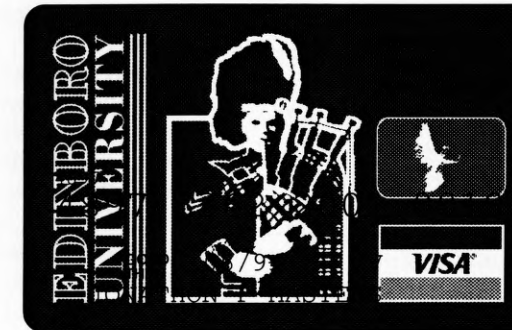

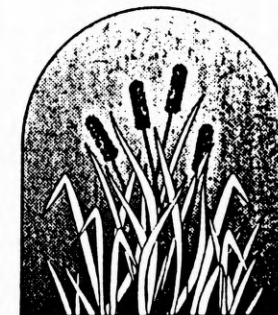

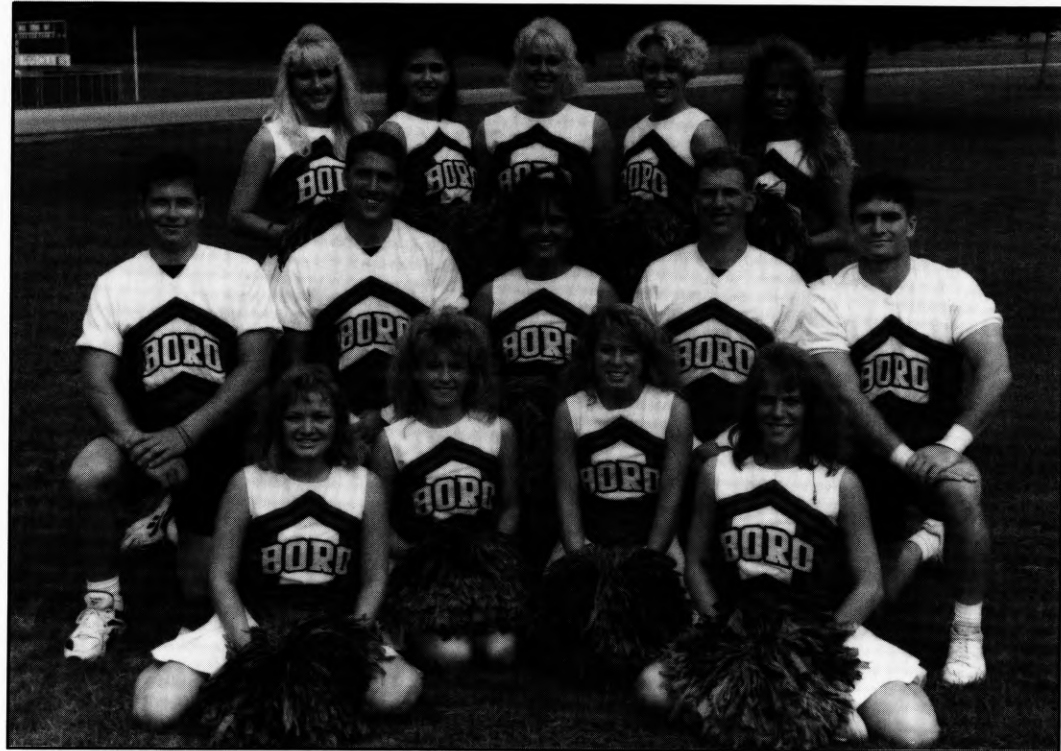

The State System of Higher Education

- ✓ The state universities spent the first 100 years of existence training teachers for Pennsylvania's schools. The Normal School Act of 1857 established regional teacher training institutions throughout the Commonwealth. The School Code of 1911 called for the state purchase of all normal schools, and by 1921 the present configuration of 14 state-owned universities was established. The 14 normal schools evolved from state normal schools, to state teachers colleges, to state colleges. On November 12, 1982, Act 188 was signed into law establishing on July 1, 1993 the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. Thus, the 13 former state colleges joined with Indiana University of Pennsylvania to achieve university status. The universities have a cumulative history of 1,600 years.
- ✓ There are 14 universities in the State System of Higher Education with four branch campuses and the McKeever Environmental Center.
- ✓ The total student population among the System universities is 95,000. While 89% of students are from Pennsylvania, they represent many other states and foreign countries.
- ✓ The total university campus has over 4,000 acres in 19 Pennsylvania counties. Buildings for classrooms, residences, administration and student support number 719.
- ✓ Collectively the 14 universities offer 217 undergraduate and 107 graduate degree programs, led by 5,500 full-time faculty members.
- ✓ An average 75% of undergraduate students receive some form of financial assistance to help meet costs.
- ✓ Several study abroad programs are available in System universities.
- ✓ All the universities support life-long learning programs throughout the academic year. Many feature Elderhostel.
- ✓ Most universities have honors programs, student counseling and career planning, cooperative education, and internship programs.
- ✓ System library holdings total more than 5.5 million volumes and 13 million periodicals, microforms, and audio materials.
- ✓ The universities in the State System of Higher Education are fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and several appropriate national professional organizations.
- ✓ System graduates living in the Commonwealth number over 296,000.
