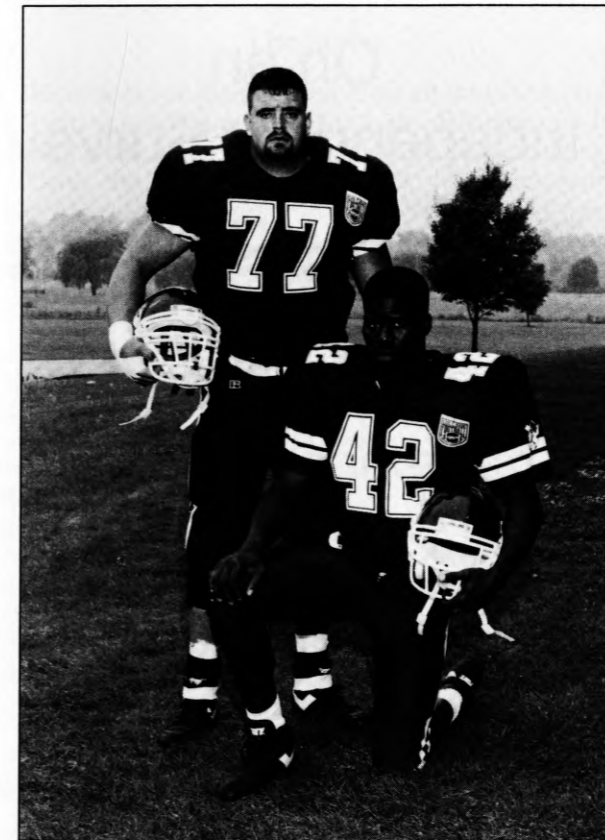

Edinboro Hosts Shippensburg in Homecoming Tilt

The Game

Today marks just the second time this season that the Edinboro University Fighting Scots will present the familiar turf of Sox Harrison Stadium. The Red Raiders of Shippensburg University are the 1994 Homecoming game opponent.

The Records

Edinboro stands at 3-1, while Shippensburg counters at 2-3. The Scots opened with a 31-28 win at Hillsdale before dropping a tough 31-26 decision to Mansfield. Week three saw the Scots pounce Elizabeth City, 28-0, then most recently defeat Lock Haven 33-16.

The Red Raiders recorded consecutive wins to start the year, 17-0 over Shepherd and 10-7 over Bloomsburg, before losing to West Chester, 14-10, Millersville, 31-14, and IUP, 20-13.

The Series

The Scots are on the short end of the all-time series, with the Red Raiders holding a 17-15-1 margin. Edinboro owns the advantage lately, taking five of the last six outings including a 34-17 decision last season. Previous to '93, the two clubs traded bruises with the Shipp dominating in '91, 45-7, and the Scots returning the favor in '92, 47-3. Including the '82 season, the Scots have won 10 of 12.

The Coaches

Edinboro's Tom Hollman enjoys a 5-1 mark against the Red Raiders with his lone blemish the loss three years ago. The Scots' seven-year mentor owns an impressive 48-20-2 (.700%) slate including a 28-7-2 (.784%) mark in the rugged Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division. The 1989 Kodak East Region and PSAC Coach of the Year has led the Boro to four NCAA II playoff appearances. His 11-year overall mark of 72-31-3 (.693) ranks in the top 12 among active small college coaches.

Shipp answers with Rocky Rees, currently 26-24-1 in his fifth year directing the Red Raiders. His overall college record of nine years is 62-39-2. In 1991, he led Shipp to the NCAA II quarterfinals and was named PSAC Coach of the Year.

The Offenses

Edinboro boasts three of the conference's most potent weapons in running back Larry Jackson, quarterback Jody Dickerson and wideout Lateef Walters.

Jackson, coming off a PSAC West Offensive Player of the Week, 172-yard effort versus Lock Haven, currently leads the NCAA II in rushing yards per game (181.6) and all-purpose yardage (258.8). He has netted 727 yards on 123 carries (5.9) and five scores. He needs 96 yards this week to eclipse Al Raines (3,399, 1969-71) atop Edinboro's all-time rushing charts. Jackson enters Saturday third, with 3,304 yards, still 38 yards behind Elbert Cole who stands second with 3,341.

Dickerson, currently the top rated passer in the PSAC, continues to rewrite the Boro's all-time record book, ranking first in touchdown passes (53), yardage (6,275) and completions (419). Through four games this year, he has connected on 57 of 92 passes (.62%) for 849 yards and eight scores. His prime target continues to be Walters, who leads the PSAC in yards per game receiving (120.3) and is second in catches per game (6.3). He has

grabbed 22 balls for 481 yards and five scores. Other receivers include Corey Keyes (3, 42, 1 TD), Terry Roberts (5, 68) and tight ends Todd Henne (7, 57) and John Sabo (4, 33, 1 TD). While Chris Snyder (9, 65, 2 TD) and Saul Harrison (12, 47, 1 TD) split time at fullback, center Det Betti, guards Chad Wallick and Chris Barney and tackles Tom Lavis and Jeremy O'Day clear the way up front.

The Red Raiders got a boost with the return of quarterback Michael Carver against IUP. Missing a game due to injury, Carver returned to drill the Big Indians for 240 yards and a score on 16 of 28 passing. For the year in four games, he has connected on 35 of 79 for 524 yards and three touchdowns. A trio of quality receivers include Michael Buglia (9, 228, 1 TD, 25.3 YPC), Tom Coleman (14, 186, 2 TDs) and Shawn Garner (11, 152, 1 TD). The running attack is well balanced with Seth Holderman (58, 152) and Brandon Overdorff (25, 93) handling the bulk of the load.

The Defenses

The Scots have been solid the past two weeks, recovering well after the shocker at Mansfield. Leading the hit parade continues to be linebackers Michael Sims (48 tackles, 3 for loss, 1 break up), Michael Edwards (40, 2 for loss, 1 interception) and Rahshahn Alston (33, 1 INT). Rashadeen Byrd (6) has been seeing more time as of late as well.

Up front, look for tackles Al Bass (12, 1 INT), Matt Gentile (15, 4 for loss, 2 sacks) and Rich Jones (9, 1 recovery) to rotate while ends Pat Schuster (20, team high 5 sacks, 1 recovery) and Bryan Lambert (27, 3 sacks) have been very steady in '94. The defensive secondary welcomed back All-American safety Steve Russell at Lock Haven, after the Scot senior had missed the first three games this year with an ankle injury. The Pittsburgh native responded with eight tackles and one interception in the victory. Russell is Edinboro's all-time leader with 15 picks. Other backfield mates include cornerbacks Marty Williams (19, 3 deflections) and Keith Cushenberry (14, 2 break ups) and safeties Rick Walker (21) and Ron Allen (22, 3 deflections).

Shipp, traditionally one of the best defenses in the PSAC, will be a major test for the Boro's offensive front. Highlighting a very good group are linebackers Martin Pepe (70, 3 for loss) and Chris Willingham (69, 3 sacks). The secondary features All-PSAC strong safety Doug Seidenstricker (55, PSAC high 5 interceptions) and free safety Chris Bickel (47, 5 break ups). The interior is also solid with tackle Mike Massey (32, 4 for loss, 2 sacks).

Kicking Game/Specialties

Edinboro relies on veteran place-kicker Scott Rupert (3-3 FG, 7th in PSAC at .8 per game and 11-14 in PATs) and freshman punter Eric Wagner (11, 32.0) who has improved each game in '94. Return specialists for the Boro include Jackson (21.0 on kick-offs) and Walters (5.6 on punts).

Shipp looks to All-Conference performer Joel Yohn (5-8 FG, 7-7 PAT) and Eric Dauberman (37.0 YPP, 7th PSAC) to handle its kicking chores. Seidenstricker is fifth in the PSAC in punt returns, netting 8.4 per try, while Tom Coleman ranks fourth in kickoff returns at 29.4.

Next Week

Edinboro takes back to the highways at California while the Red Raiders look forward to a home contest with the Golden Eagles of Clarion.

President Foster F. Diebold

Now in his fifteenth year as president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, Foster F. Diebold is the fourteenth chief executive officer of the institution of higher learning that has come to acclaim in the last decade as one of Pennsylvania's and the nation's finest. He has brought a vigorous educational and moral leadership, a strengthening of the spirit of community, a clear sense of direction and purpose, and a dimension of multicultural pluralism and diversity.

Much has been accomplished during President Diebold's tenure. The University has returned to financial health. Significant facilities and grounds improvements have been achieved, with several of the historic structures on campus restored to their original splendor. Academic programs have been emphasized and improved, with more than 100 degree offerings now available. Enrollment gains have been unprecedented in both numbers and academic quality. International linkages have been established with institutions in several other countries, and Edinboro University's program for students with disabilities continues to garner acclaim as one of the finest among all colleges and universities in the United States. Widely recognized as a leader in education both here and abroad, President Diebold has positioned Edinboro University to meet the challenges that will face public higher education in the 21st century.

The Orange, New Jersey, native is a graduate of Monmouth College and also holds a master of arts in educational administration from Seton Hall University. He has met coursework requirements for a doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently completing the dissertation requirement for the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency of Edinboro University, President Diebold was president of the University of

Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Before that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey and a member of the graduate faculty at that institution; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township (New Jersey) Public Schools.

Recognized for his extensive experience in the field of education management, President Diebold's scholarly achievements in the discipline of applied ethics in higher education deserve special mention. The model statement he authored for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, "Ethical Practices for College Presidents," was unanimously adopted by that professional organization and published as policy for the chief executives of its nearly 400 member institutions nationwide. It is the first formally adopted ethical practices and policy statement for higher education presidents.

For his leadership on an international scale and for his many contributions to the advancement of higher education and enrichment of an emerging culture in Pakistan, President Diebold was decorated with prestigious gold medals from three Pakistani universities. The awards for educational eminence were presented during visits to the Edinboro campus by official Pakistani delegations.

President Diebold was also honored by the Government of Pakistan with the awarding of the degree of Doctor of Laws (*honoris causa*), presented at the Government House in the City of Karachi. The ceremony was attended by the presidents of the several Pakistani universities holding linkage agreements with Edinboro University, as well as many high-ranking officials of the Government

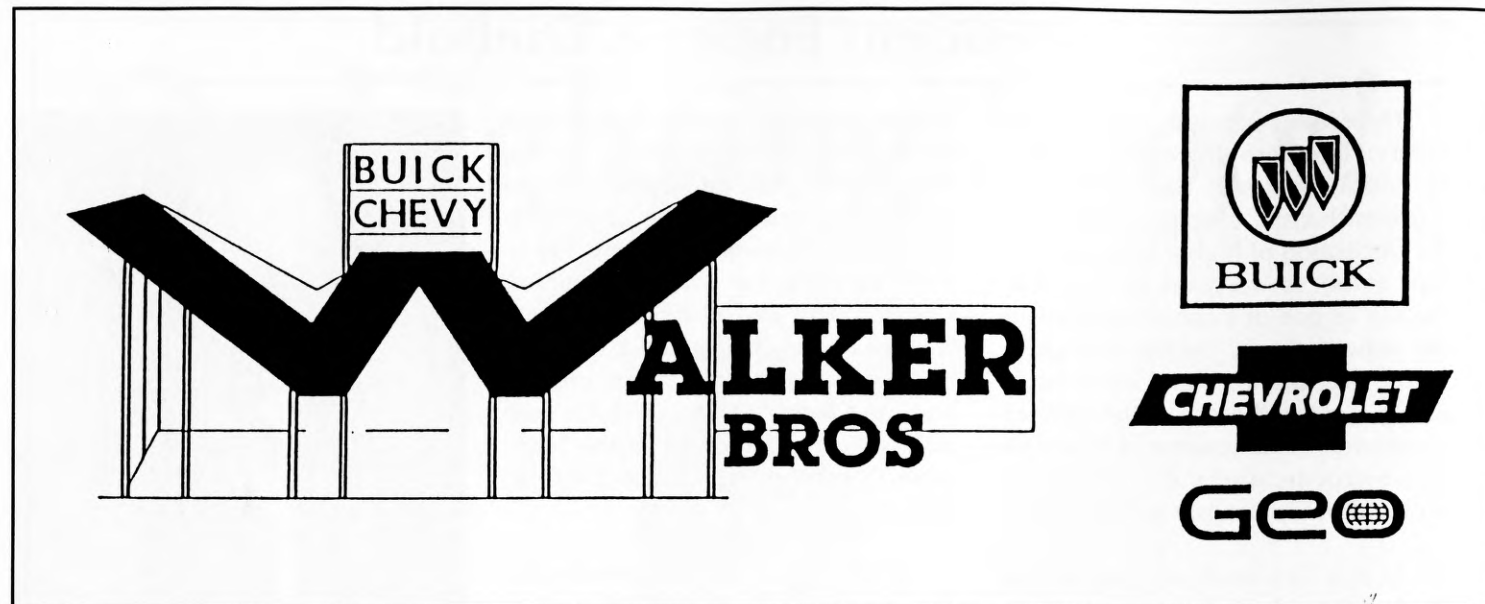

of Pakistan and U.S. diplomatic officials.

A staunch advocate of a statewide system of public universities in Pennsylvania, President Diebold supported the enabling legislation for the State System of Higher Education (Act 188 of 1982) and saw the State System come to existence in 1983 as a member of the transition team. He currently serves on the System's Executive Council of Presidents and on the boards of the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, and the Dixon University Center at Harrisburg.

President Diebold's stature in American higher education has been recognized by several high-level appointments. He was named to the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, the leading national organization devoted to building constructive relationships between the two countries. He was also appointed to the Leadership Council of the Northeast-Midwest Institute, a regional component of the Center for Regional Policy, and to the Pennsylvania Humanities Council, the private, non-profit group promoting statewide public understanding of the humanities.

Scot Success in the Classroom

Under the direction of Tom Hollman, the Scots have not only excelled on the field but in the classroom.

Last year the football team had 28 different student-athletes earn semester grade point averages over the 3.0 mark, up one from a year ago. Furthermore, the Scots also increased the number of players who eclipsed the same standard on a cumulative basis.

Among the 'Boro's standouts were 1994 graduates Scott Mikowicz and Dave Ashton. Mikowicz displayed outstanding work in the classroom, finishing his academic career with an impressive 3.40 QPA. The height of his studies was exemplified with his representation of Edinboro University as an NCAA post-graduate scholarship nominee. Also the starting tight end on the football team, Mikowicz caught 25 passes for 365 yards and four touchdowns. Ashton earned honors as a national scholar-athlete and as a three-time Edinboro University scholar-athlete, maintaining a 3.22 QPA during his four years at the 'Boro. He was a starting wide receiver in 1993, catching 26 passes for 334 yards and three touchdowns.

Several 1993 graduates earned laurels on and off the field during their careers at Edinboro. Sean Seibert and Brian Heebsh were both recognized as national scholar-athletes by *College Football Preview* magazine a year ago, while All-Americans Georj Lewis and Mike Barnes were nominated for NCAA minority post-graduate scholarships.

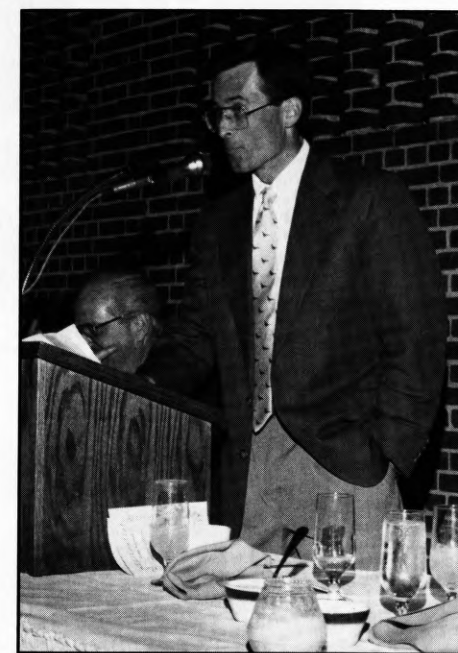

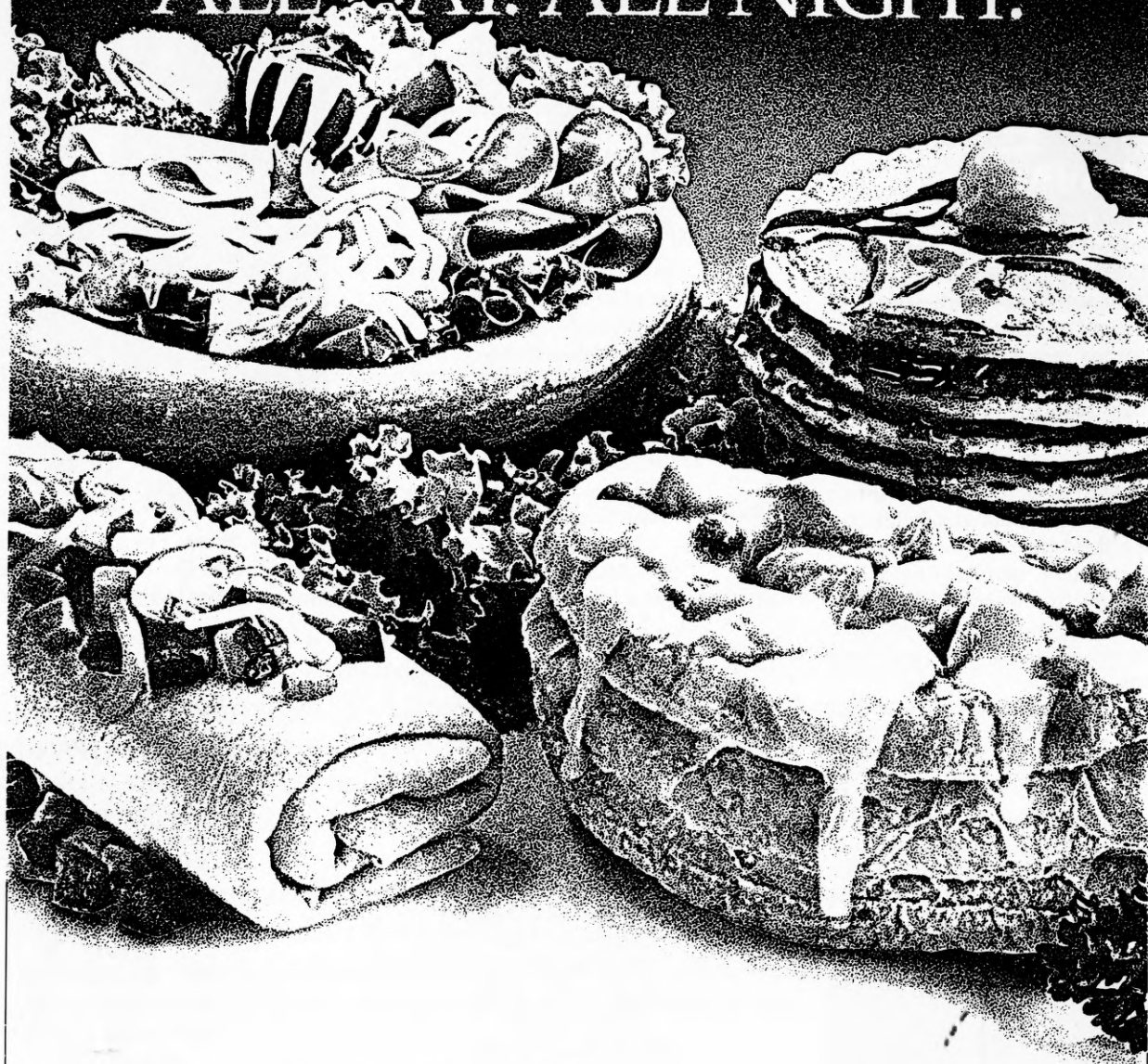

1994: Building a Tradition

Before the arrival of Tom Hollman in 1988, the Fighting Scots knew that their football program needed a lift. What they didn't know was that under Hollman's direction, their lift would quickly become a significant elevation.

Edinboro has taken its program to national prominence, and in 1994 will aim to reach the NCAA II playoffs for the fifth time in the past six seasons. Last year, the Scots earned their second straight post-season appearance while posting another eight-win (8-3) season. With all three hard fought losses coming at the hands of nationally-ranked opponents, the Boro was strong enough to finish the year ranked #14 among the Division II elite.

This upcoming season should be a good measure of just how successful the Edinboro tradition has become. Graduation took 11 starters, many of whom spent multiple seasons at the top of the depth chart. And while the good fortune has been enjoyed, it has not gone unnoticed. The Scots will have to carry on the tradition without both former offensive line coach Ed Stults, who assumed the head coaching duties at Defiance College (OH), and former defensive line coach/recruiting coordinator Gene Smith, who now works as an NFL BLESTO scout.

The quest for a third straight post-season berth in 1994 will not be easy with another rugged 10-game schedule. The PSAC West slate is more balanced than ever, while, furthermore, the Scots face formidable non-conference foes in Hillsdale (MI), Elizabeth City and American International, and Mansfield.

The Plaid will host five games and play five on the road in 1994, including the visitors role in two straight contests to begin the year. In a strange twist of fortunes, the Boro has been a terror away from home the past two years. Since the start of the 1992 campaign, Edinboro has gone 10 straight regular season road games without a loss while posting seven wins and three setbacks at Sox Harrison Stadium.

A Breakdown of Personnel

Skill Positions

Quarterback Jody Dickerson will head the offense for the fourth straight season. On pace to break several Edinboro career passing records, the PSAC West first-teamer, and honorable mention All-American, returns after a stellar 1993

campaign in which he set single season standards for yards (2,209), touchdowns (25), and attempts (277). The Scots have compiled an impressive 23-9-1 record during his string of 33 consecutive starts.

Larry Jackson, one of the best tailbacks in Edinboro history, also returns for his senior season. The 1992 PSAC West Player of the Year returned from early season injuries to amass 1,171 yards and eight touchdowns in 1993. Jackson's 2,577 career rushing yards puts him within 823 yards of the Boro's all-time mark. Fullback Chris Snyder, both a tough runner and punishing blocker, will solidify the Plaid backfield.

When the Scots go to the air, they'll look in the direction of wide out Lateef Walters (23 receptions, 550 yds., 6 TDs) who gives them plenty of big-play experience.

Offensive Line

The Boro is strong up the middle, with returning guards Det Betti and Jeremy O'Day. Betti may be asked to play center to make room for either Chadd Wallick or Otha Davidson, both of whom have started in big games during their careers. On the outside, they must somehow replace former All-PSAC tackles Mike Kegarise and Tony Tighe. Todd Henne caught four touchdowns last season and could get the nod at tight end.

Defensive Line

With only one returnee from last year's squad, the defensive front could be a big question mark. All-Northeast Region defensive end Pat Schuster looks to duplicate a spectacular 1993 campaign in which he had 76 stops and 11 sacks. Playing opposite Schuster could be converted linebacker and special teams standout Bryan Lambert (59 tackles).

The main concern is plugging up the middle with the departure of All-American tackle Russell Cray and linemate Rob Harmer. Matt Gentile played well last year when injuries put him into a starting role. The other tackle spot will be up for grabs when the fall practice sessions get underway.

Linebackers

Michael Edwards will spearhead a linebacking crew who all return as former starters. The two year backer recorded 127 tackles and six break-ups en route to a PSAC West Second Team selection a

year ago. Another great season from Edwards could vault him into the Boro's top ten in career tackles. Michael Sims, a 1993 redshirt, will be asked to fill the big shoes of three-time All-American middle linebacker Jason Perkins. Sims had an impressive freshman season two years ago in which he had 84 stops at one of the outside positions. Rahshahn Alston will be expected to round out an excellent core of linebackers in 1994. Only a freshman last year, Alston gained experience as a starter, totaling 69 tackles from the outside.

Secondary

The Boro returns three-fourths of a defensive backfield that terrorized quarterbacks for 22 interceptions last season. All-American safety Steve Russell will lead the talented unit. One of the best athletes on the team, Russell is a school record holder with 14 interceptions. Last season the All-American and PSAC West first teamer stole seven aeriels and registered 68 tackles. Also feared for his hitting ability, Russell has forced six fumbles over his stellar career.

Marty Williams and Rick Walker also return after starting all eleven games last season. Walker accounted for 46 tackles, five break-ups, and one interception from his free safety position while Williams, a cornerback, recorded 61 tackles, 10 break-ups, two interceptions and a blocked punt. Two returnees caused two fumbles and recovered another in 1993. Corners David Harris and Ron Allen both saw action throughout the past season and are expected to compete for more playing time this year.

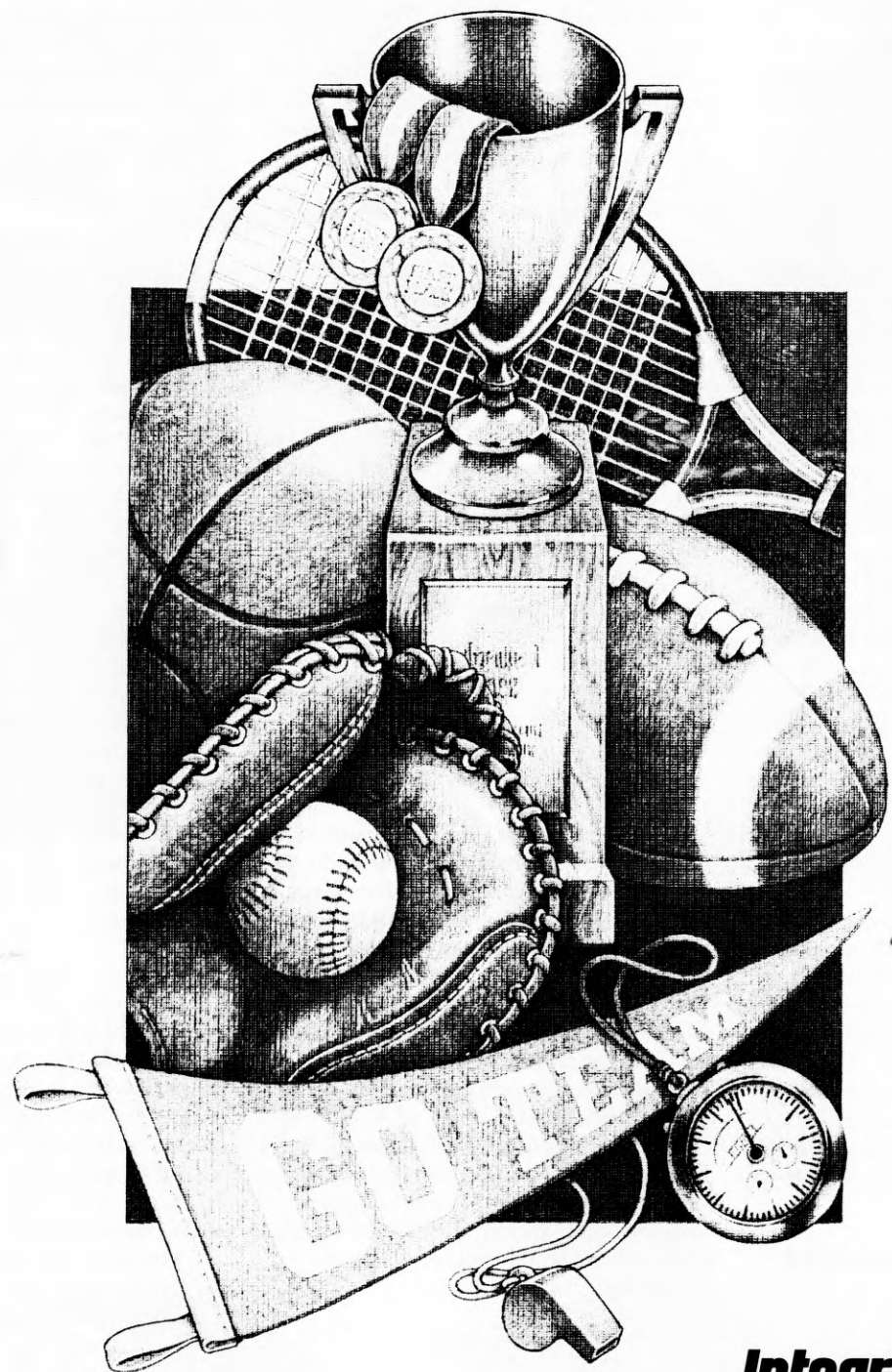
Specialties

Place-kicker Scott Rupert, a Boro mainstay the past two years, returns to handle the kicking chores for yet another season. In 1993 Rupert set an Edinboro single season record by connecting on 43 of 45 PAT tries. Five of his 11 field goal attempts were also true, including a career best 44 yarder.

The Boro will have a new punter in 1994 for the first time in four years due to the graduation of All-American Gary Lhotsky. The vacancy remains up for grabs as camp starts in August.

Walters is likely to be the Scots' top punt return threat while Russell averaged over 24 yards per kickoff return last season, including a 92-yarder for a score at Slippery Rock.

Head Coach Tom Hollman

In January 1988, Edinboro University hired Tom Hollman, Athens, Ohio, as its eleventh head football coach in the school's history. Hollman came to Edinboro from Ohio University, where he was the defensive coordinator.

Hollman, beginning his seventh year, has the Scot program back in the national spotlight. At Edinboro, he has earned 45 wins against just 19 losses and two ties and owns an impressive 27-7-2 slate against the PSAC Western Division. The Scots have advanced to post-season play four of the past five years.

In 1989, he was named the top coach in the East Region by the National Football Coaches Association and also tabbed the top coach in the PSAC West. In 1990, he guided the Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro routed Virginia Union and advanced to the national quarterfinals.

"Edinboro has been a great experience, and I like the direction of the program," Hollman said.

"As a coach, I have been fortunate to coach at many different levels, from high school to Division I. The Division II level here at Edinboro is very appealing to me in relation to my career goals. It is a great feeling to be a head coach at this level."

Hollman's educational background begins with a high school diploma from Memorial High School in St. Mary's, Ohio, followed by his undergraduate degree in education from Ohio Northern University in 1968. Three years later Hollman received his master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio.

While at Ohio Northern, Hollman was a three-year starter for the football team and a two-year performer as a defensive back and offen-

sive end during his junior and senior years. He holds the school record with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years during his stay at Ohio Northern.

A chronological look at Hollman's coaching career begins in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. From there, Hollman moved on to Greenville High School in Ohio where he became head coach from 1971-73. His Greenville squads posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark during his three-year stay.

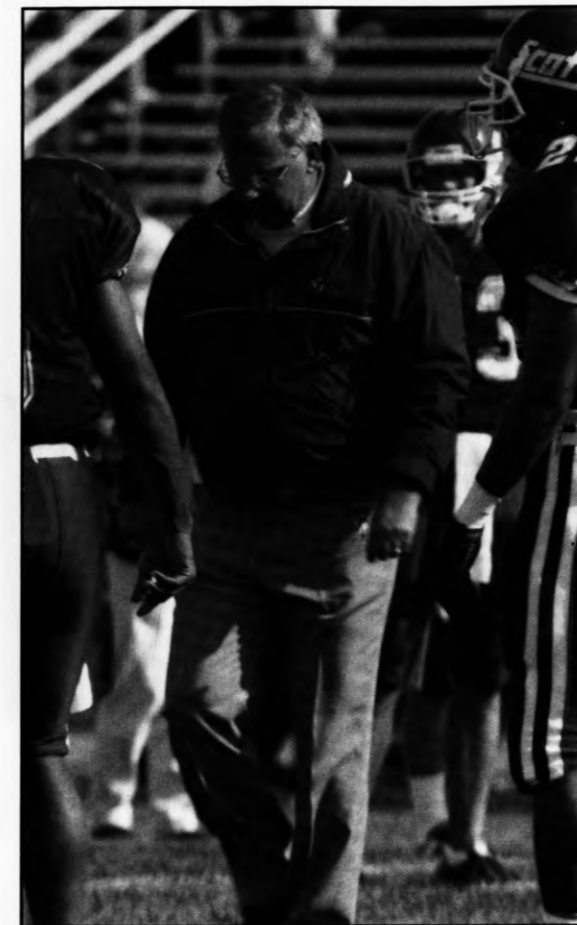
Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974 and 1975 seasons, where his squad recorded 15 wins against three setbacks and two ties. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in 1974, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In 1976, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University.

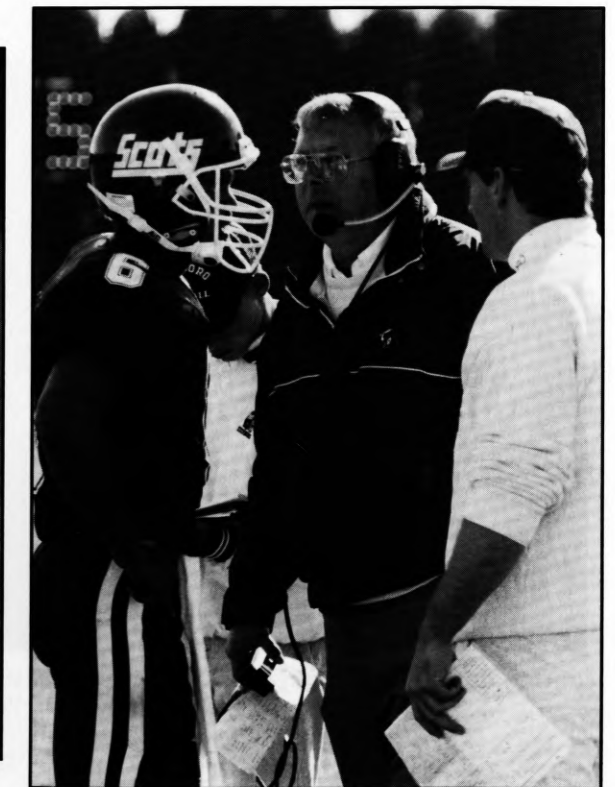
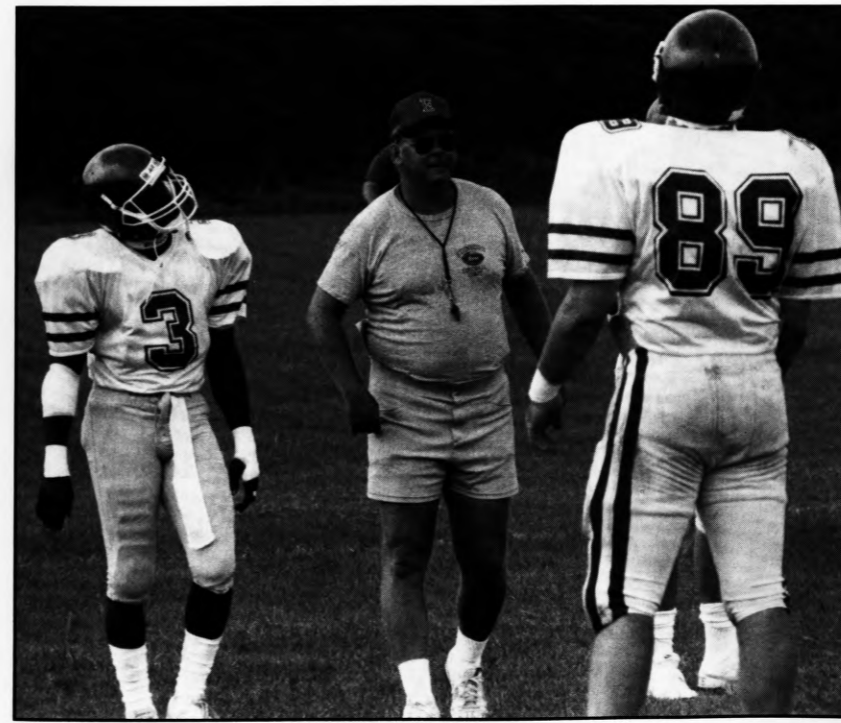
The following year, Hollman accepted the head coach position at Wooster College (OH) and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school history (24-11-1).

In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the 1984 campaign. Then, beginning in 1985 Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University.

Tom resides in Edinboro with his wife, Kandi, and four children, Mari, Jon, Tim and Denise.

Scott Browning – Offensive Line

Moving to the offensive side of the ball, from the defensive backfield, Scott brings a wealth of coaching experience in his ninth year at the 'Boro. Under his guidance the Scot defense has intercepted 78 passes the past six seasons. He has guided the fortunes of All-Americans Steve Russell, Michael Willis, Wade Smith, Georj Lewis, and Mike Barnes, and PSAC Rookie of the Year Mario Houston. Offensively, he coached former greats Elbert Cole, Floyd Faulkner and Ross Rankin.

Scott came to Edinboro from Ohio State University, where he coached receivers and running backs. Prior to his start at OSU, Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview high schools in Ohio, from 1979-81. Then, as a

graduate assistant, he coached the defensive secondary at New Mexico State in 1982.

In 1983, he mentored the receivers at Idaho State University which advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs.

Browning earned a master's degree in education administration from New Mexico State in 1983, and a BS in education from Ohio State in 1981. Earlier, before transferring to OSU, Scott attended Capital University where he played football for one season. Browning was a four-year letterman in four sports at Loudonville High School (OH) prior to his collegiate days. Scott is married to the former Lynn Hook, and has a son, Andrew Scott. The Brownings reside in Edinboro.



Dan Gierlak – Running Backs

Dan Gierlak enters his eighth season as a full-time coach with his responsibilities concerning the running backs. He was formerly the head women's softball coach for the Scots and led the squad to the PSAC playoffs in 1990.

Gierlak came to the 'Boro from Thiel College (Pa.) where he coached the defensive secondary for the 1984 season. Dan, a starter and three-year letterwinner for the Plaid in the secondary, moved on to the semi-pro ranks with the Chicago Cowboys. During his short stint with the Cowboys, Gierlak's squad gained national championship honors in 1984 and run-

ner up nationally in the 1985 season. Gierlak brings both playing and coaching experience to the staff, giving the Scot players an added plus on the offensive side of the ball. As backfield coach, he has guided former Harlon Hill finalist Elbert Cole and Boro All-Americans Lester Frye and Larry Jackson.

Originally from Buffalo, New York, Dan graduated from Edinboro with a degree in health and physical education. He and his wife, the former Amy Adams, three-year-old daughter, Alexandria Alicia, and 9-month-old son, Daniel "Joey" Jr., reside in Edinboro.



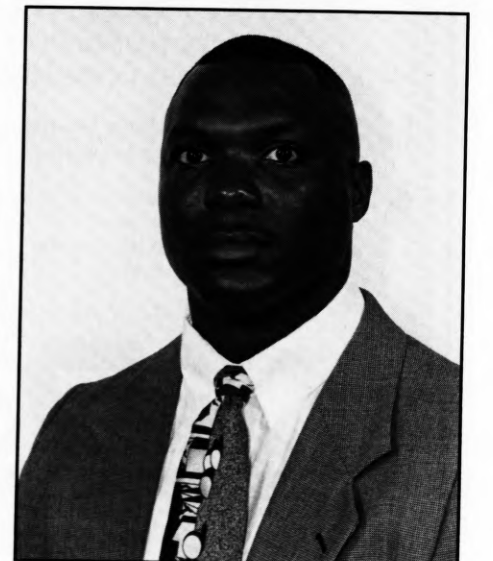
Tony Elliott – Secondary

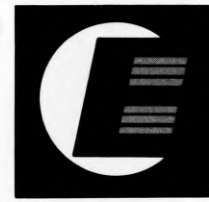

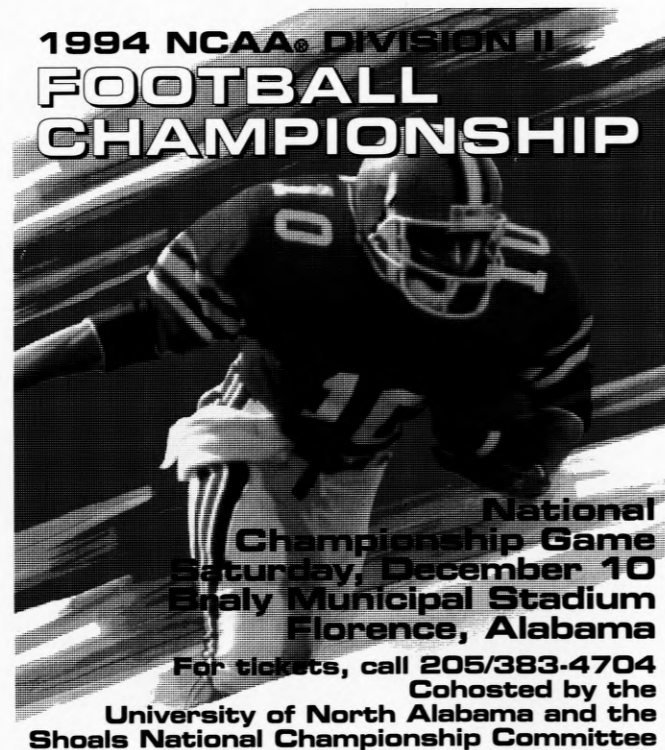

Mark Niswonger - Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

Mark Niswonger, a veteran of the coaching ranks for 21 years, begins his seventh year with the Plaid as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. Young Gun Found His Shot in the 'Boro

The year was 1990. Jody Dickerson, a highly-recruited quarterback from McKees Rocks, Pa., could have gone just about anywhere he wanted to continue his career as one of the many talented quarterbacks who hail from the western end of the Keystone State.

The strongest persuasion came from another Pittsburgh-area native, Michigan State University head coach George Perles. Apparently, bigger and better things were ahead for the strong-armed Sto-Rox High School graduate as he set off for Michigan State's Spartan Stadium.

But things took a turn for the worse. Dickerson found that the heralded cannon he possessed for a right arm was not being fired.

"I guess it's everybody's dream to go Division I," Dickerson said. "I was no different. Yeah, I was a freshman, and I really didn't expect to start, but I expected to get a shot, and I really didn't get my shot at Michigan State."

At home and without a school, Dickerson's dream was no longer alive.

Enter Tom Hollman, Edinboro University's head coach. Fresh off a 1990 season and the school's first NCAA Division II playoff victory, Hollman offered Dickerson the two things he was looking for – a winning program and a chance to make an immediate impact.

"I don't think my decision was that hard," Dickerson recalled about coming to Edinboro. "They had a great team the year before, and I wanted to go somewhere where I would get a chance to start. That's what led me here, and I don't regret any of the decisions that I made."

When Dickerson first reported to Edinboro, he showed that his year away from football didn't have many ill-effects, as he won the starting job and maintained his freshman eligibility.

And while Dickerson showed the coaches that he could, in fact, play quarterback, he had yet to prove his skills against his 1991 opponents, who must have been licking their chops at the sight of the inexperienced newcomer.

That first season proved to be tough on Dickerson and the 'Boro faithful. Despite the fact that the freshman directed the Fighting Scots through a good season, the Plaid failed to make the NCAA Division II playoffs for the first time in three years.

Dickerson did show some promise throughout the 11-game schedule and, by season's end, guided the Scots to a 20-17 setback in a near upset of top-ranked Indiana (Pa.)

Though Dickerson struggled statistically, the groundwork had been set. He had familiarized himself with Edinboro's offense and entered the next season with less pressure to prove himself.

"When I came into the program, I didn't really expect any pressure," Dickerson said. "But later, I felt like so much more was expected from me because I was so heavily recruited by Division I teams. After my freshman year, I felt right at home and felt like I fit in."

Dickerson soon found that another sophomore, tailback Larry Jackson, began to fit into the Edinboro system as well. The backfield tandem produced well over 3,000 yards of total offense for the 'Boro in 1992.

The dynamic duo also played a significant role in something that had eluded the year before – a return trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs. Dickerson also helped lead the Scots to an 8-1-1 regular season mark, their best record since 1971.

Comfortable with the system and with the pressure completely gone, the young gun had developed into a good quarterback throughout the 1992 season.

In 1993, the gun took aim and hit its mark. Dickerson rifled his way into the Edinboro record books by throwing for over 2,200 yards and 25 touchdowns in 1993, while once again guiding the Scots back to the postseason.

For his efforts, Dickerson was chosen as a Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division (PSAC West) first-team selection and was a *Football Gazette* honorable mention All-American.

Dickerson will humbly explain that his mighty right arm was not the only weapon in the 'Boro arsenal.

"We had many more options last year than we did in any of my other years," he said. "Everybody had to consider Larry in their game plan, and that took some of the pressure off our passing game."

Last season was obviously a breakthrough year for Dickerson, who now has shattered all of Edinboro's career passing records.

But Dickerson is not ready to rest on his laurels. "That's one thing that you really can't think about because that's when you start messing up," he said. "As long as our team wins and we keep reaching our goals, the numbers will fall in place for us."

Dickerson added, "Someday when I'm gone, I might look back on it and realize that I have some records at Edinboro, but right now I really don't think about it that much."

The 1994 season is now in full swing, leaving Dickerson only a few more games in an already remarkable football career. The four-year starter will tell you that his role has changed from a follower to a leader.

"There's no doubt that you take on a different role as a senior," he said. "You want to pick everybody up and go out as a winner."

As always, the Scots have set their goals high for the current season, and Edinboro's number 6 is no different from the rest of his teammates.

"We set high standards every year, but at the end of the year we've come up a little short," Dickerson said. "We've managed to make it to the playoffs the last two years and we have contributed to a great winning tradition."

Dickerson added, "Of course, I'd like to go out and win the PSAC and win the national championship. But if that doesn't happen, I just want to be remembered as one of the great players in Edinboro history."

Dickerson needs not to worry about having his name mentioned with the all-time 'Boro greats. He has already earned that distinction.

Right now, there is not much left for him to do but play his game. Four years ago, he was the kid who never got a shot at the Division I level. At the end of this season, he will be remembered at Edinboro as a quarterback who not only had a shot but also had a deadly aim.

"This is my senior year, and of course," said the gun, who really isn't young anymore, "I'd like to go out with a bang."

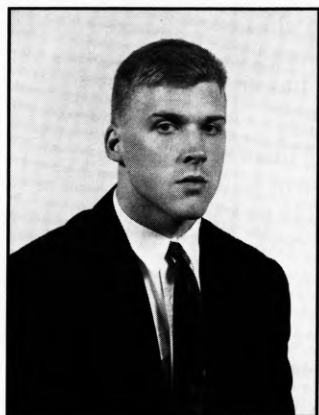


Nicklaus Cronk – Defensive Line

Academy student saw a great deal of action for the Boro in 1993, catching 25 passes for 365 yards and four touchdowns. Also an excellent student, Mikowicz carries a 3.4 QPA as a health and physical education major. In 1994, he was chosen by the University as an NCAA post-graduate scholarship nominee.

Tom Rose Named 1994 PSAC Media Award-Winner

Tom Rose, sports editor of the *Washington Observer-Reporter* has been named the 1994 winner of the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) George Heaslip Media Award.

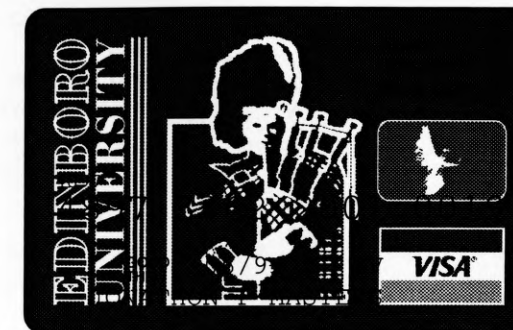

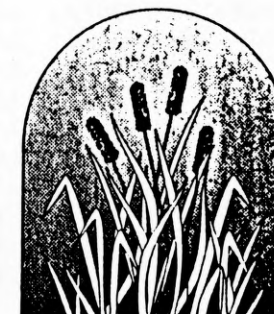

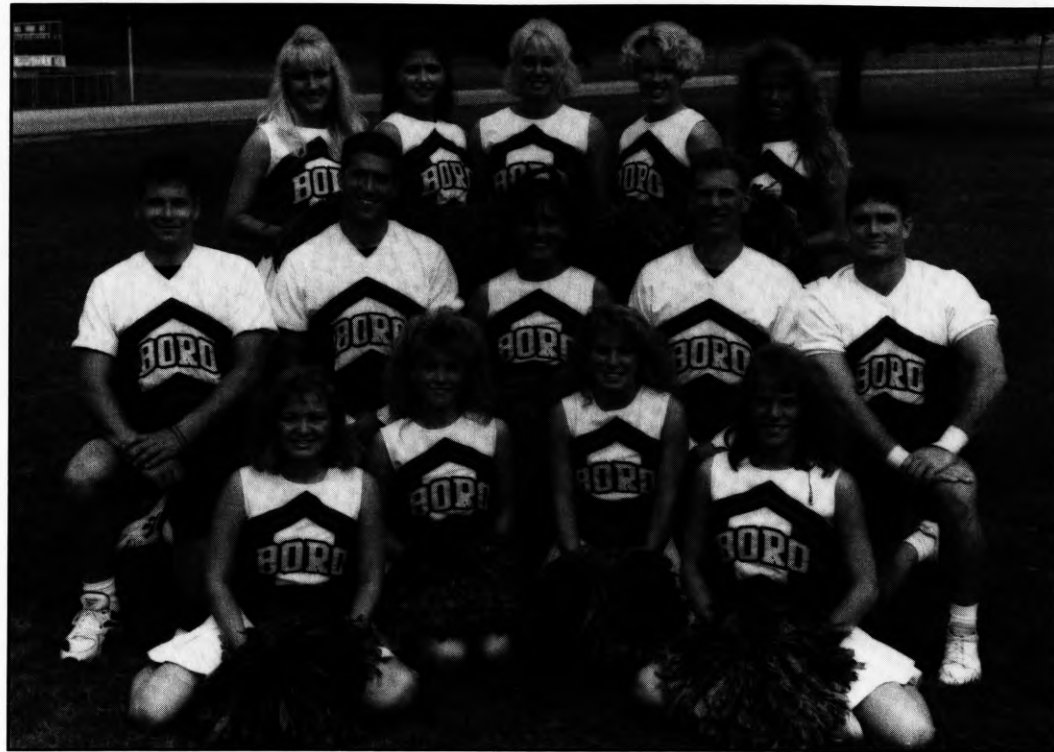

The State System of Higher Education

- ✓ The state universities spent the first 100 years of existence training teachers for Pennsylvania's schools. The Normal School Act of 1857 established regional teacher training institutions throughout the Commonwealth. The School Code of 1911 called for the state purchase of all normal schools, and by 1921 the present configuration of 14 state-owned universities was established. The 14 normal schools evolved from state normal schools, to state teachers colleges, to state colleges. On November 12, 1982, Act 188 was signed into law establishing on July 1, 1993 the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. Thus, the 13 former state colleges joined with Indiana University of Pennsylvania to achieve university status. The universities have a cumulative history of 1,600 years.
- ✓ There are 14 universities in the State System of Higher Education with four branch campuses and the McKeever Environmental Center.
- ✓ The total student population among the System universities is 95,000. While 89% of students are from Pennsylvania, they represent many other states and foreign countries.
- ✓ The total university campus has over 4,000 acres in 19 Pennsylvania counties. Buildings for classrooms, residences, administration and student support number 719.
- ✓ Collectively the 14 universities offer 217 undergraduate and 107 graduate degree programs, led by 5,500 full-time faculty members.
- ✓ An average 75% of undergraduate students receive some form of financial assistance to help meet costs.
- ✓ Several study abroad programs are available in System universities.
- ✓ All the universities support life-long learning programs throughout the academic year. Many feature Elderhostel.
- ✓ Most universities have honors programs, student counseling and career planning, cooperative education, and internship programs.
- ✓ System library holdings total more than 5.5 million volumes and 13 million periodicals, microforms, and audio materials.
- ✓ The universities in the State System of Higher Education are fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and several appropriate national professional organizations.
- ✓ System graduates living in the Commonwealth number over 296,000.
