Edinboro Football Flourishes Under Hollman Scots Hope to Contend in PSAC, NCAA Division II

The Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Fighting Scots enter the 1995 football season hoping to continue an impressive run of success the program has enjoyed the past seven years under the leadership of head coach Tom Hollman.

Edinboro has not only established one of the premier football programs in the PSAC, but the Fighting Scots also have enjoyed their share of national recognition in recent years as well. With 13 starters returning from last year's 7-3 squad that was ranked 17th in the final NCAA II poll, Edinboro enters the upcoming campaign ranked among the nation's elite once again in several pre-season polls.

Here's a glance at a few *Highlights of the Hollman Era* . . .

- Four NCAA Division II playoff appearances in the past six years (1989, 1990, 1992, 1993).
- A 52-22-2 overall record, including a 31-9-2 mark in PSAC Western Division play.
- Six consecutive seasons ranked in the NCAA Division II top 20 in the final poll.
- Two players selected as finalists for the Harlon Hill Award presented annually to the NCAA Division II player of the year - Elbert Cole, 1989 (third place) and Ernest Priester, 1990 (runner-up). Edinboro has produced 38 All-Americans on 35 different teams since 1988.
- Eight national scholar athletes since 1991.



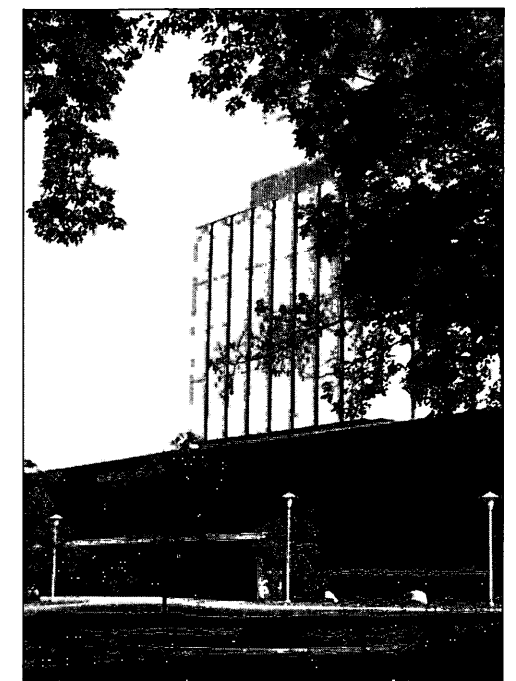

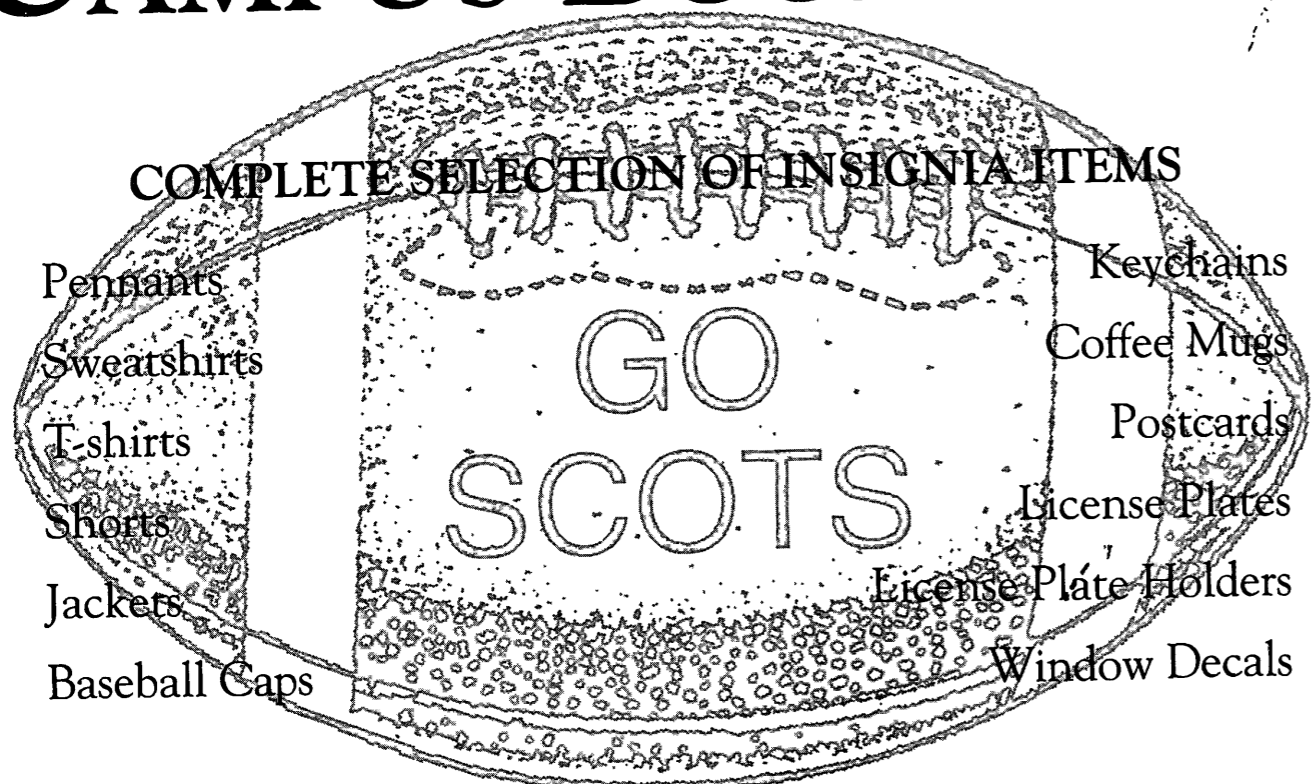

President Foster F. Diebold

Now in the final year of his presidency, Foster F. Diebold will retire in the summer of 1996 after having served Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, the State System of Higher Education and the people of Pennsylvania for 17 years as the 14th chief executive officer of the institution of higher learning that has come to acclaim under his leadership as one of Pennsylvania's and the nation's finest. Only one other chief executive, Joseph Cooper, who was principal of the then Edinboro State Normal School for 29 years between 1863 and 1892, has served a longer term of office than President Diebold.

Much has been accomplished during President Diebold's tenure. He has brought a vigorous educational and moral leadership, a strengthening of the spirit of community, a clear sense of mission and purpose, and a new dimension of multiculturalism and diversity. The University has returned to and maintained financial health. Academic programs have been emphasized and improved, with more than 100 degree programs now offered. A renewed commitment to teacher education came with his establishment of the Center for Excellence in Teaching. Significant facilities and grounds improvements have been achieved, with several of the historic campus structures restored to their original splendor, a student union expansion completed, and an Alumni House constructed. Enrollment gains have been unprecedented in both numbers and academic quality. International linkage agreements with 15 educational institutions and organizations in four countries have positioned Edinboro University as a leader in international education both in the U.S. and abroad. And Edinboro University's program for students with disabilities, one of the first in the nation, continues to enjoy wide recognition as one of the finest at any college or university in the country.

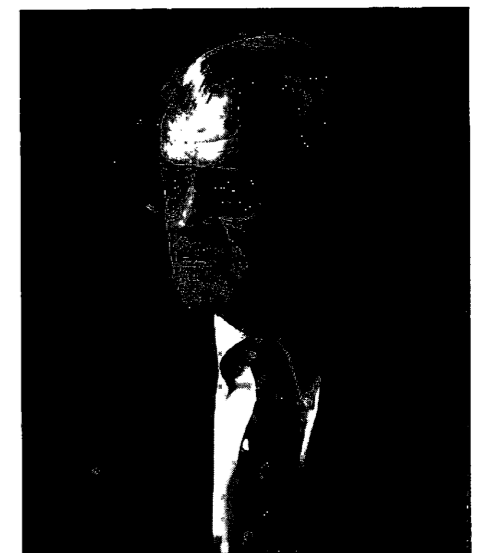
The Orange, New Jersey, native is a graduate of Monmouth College and

also holds a master of arts in educational administration from Seton Hall University. He has met coursework requirements for a doctorate in education at Rutgers University and is currently completing the dissertation requirement for the Ph.D. program in higher education at the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency of Edinboro University, President Diebold was president of the University of Alaska from 1977 to 1979. Before that, he was executive secretary to the Board of Regents and special assistant to the president of the University of Alaska Statewide System. From 1969 to 1976, he was director of Development and Planning at Kean College in New Jersey and a member of the graduate faculty at that institution; and from 1965 to 1969, he was assistant superintendent of the Neptune Township (New Jersey) Public Schools.

Recognized for his extensive experience in the field of education management, President Diebold's scholarly achievements in the discipline of applied ethics in higher education deserve special mention. The model statement he authored for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, "Ethical Practices for College Presidents," was unanimously adopted by that professional organization and published as policy for the chief executives of its nearly 400 member institutions nationwide. It is the first formally adopted ethical practices and policy statement for higher education presidents.

President Diebold has been honored by the Government of Pakistan with the awarding of the degree of Doctor of Laws (*honoris causa*), presented at the Government House in the City of Karachi. The ceremony was attended by the presidents of the several Pakistani universities holding linkage agreements with Edinboro University, as well as many high-ranking officials of the Government

of Pakistan and U.S. diplomatic officials.

A staunch advocate of a statewide system of public universities in Pennsylvania, President Diebold supported the enabling legislation for the State System of Higher Education (Act 188 of 1982) and saw the State System come to existence in 1983 as a member of the transition team. He currently serves on the System's Executive Council of Presidents and on the boards of the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, and the Dixon University Center at Harrisburg.

President Diebold's stature in American higher education has been recognized by several high-level appointments. He was named to the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, the leading national organization devoted to building constructive relationships between the two countries. He was also appointed to the Leadership Council of the Northeast-Midwest Institute, a regional component of the Center for Regional Policy, and to the Pennsylvania Humanities Council, the private, non-profit group promoting statewide public understanding of the humanities.

Athletic Director Jody Mooradian

Jody Mooradian begins her second year as athletic director at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. She joined the Edinboro staff in August of 1993 as associate athletic director and senior women's administrator for the Fighting Scots before being named athletic director a year ago.

A New Hampshire native, Mooradian earned a bachelor's degree in political science at the University of New Hampshire in 1981, a master's in public administration at the University of Delaware, and a doctorate at the Delaware Law School. She served as a New Hampshire state representative for District 4 from 1980-82 and is a member of the New Hampshire and Pennsylvania bar associations.

Before dedicating herself to a career in intercollegiate athletics, Mooradian served five years as a practicing attorney. She handled all aspects of insurance litigation for Devine, Millimet and Branch of Manchester, New Hampshire, for nearly two years after serving as in-house counsel for the CIGNA Insurance Company from 1987 to 1991.

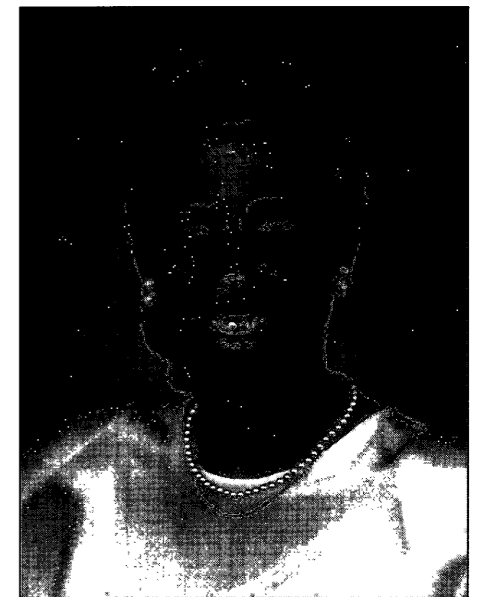
In 1993, Mooradian completed an administrative internship with the athletic department at the University of California in Los Angeles. While there, she handled NCAA compliance and eligibility matters and worked with tutorial services budgets and Title IX evaluations. She performed similar duties in her first position at Edinboro where she assumed responsibility for financial aid for Edinboro's more than 300 student athletes. She was also responsible for scheduling and administering Edinboro University's intercollegiate

athletic events, as well as the University's outstanding summer camp program, and overseeing compliance for NCAA Division I and Division II sports programs.

In her current position, she is responsible for overseeing the daily operation of the Fighting Scots' 16-sport intercollegiate athletics program, including the supervision of a staff of more than 40 professionals and an annual budget of \$1.5 million. She is director of all home, conference and NCAA athletic events and oversees NCAA and PSAC compliance and eligibility matters, financial aid, and scheduling for all athletes.

As athletic director, Mooradian provides leadership for the Fighting Scots athletic department and is a key figure on the campus and within the Pennsylvania Conference. A member of the President's Cabinet, she has been named chairperson of the Gender Equity Committee and was recently appointed to the PSAC Executive Committee.

Her father, Andy Mooradian, was athletic director at the University of New Hampshire for 22 years.

In January 1988, Edinboro University hired Tom Hollman, Athens, Ohio, as its eleventh head football coach in the school's history. Hollman came to Edinboro from Ohio University, where he was the defensive coordinator.

Hollman, beginning his eighth year, has the Scot program back in the national spotlight. At Edinboro, he has earned 52 wins against just 22 losses and two ties and owns an impressive 31-9-2 slate against the PSAC Western Division. Throughout his seven year career at Edinboro, he has never had a losing season. In addition, he has coached two Harlon Hill Award finalists, and the schools career leaders in passing, rushing, receiving and interceptions. The Scots have advanced to post-season play four of the past six years.

In 1989, he was named the top coach in the East Region by the National Football Coaches Association and also tabbed the top coach in the PSAC West. In 1990, he guided the Scots to their first-ever NCAA II playoff win as Edinboro routed Virginia Union and advanced to the national quarterfinals.

"As a coach, I have been fortunate to coach at many different levels, from high school to Division I. The Division II level here at Edinboro is very appealing to me in relation to my career goals. It is a great feeling to be a head coach at this level."

Hollman's educational background begins with a high school diploma from Memorial High School in St. Mary's, Ohio, followed by his undergraduate degree in education from Ohio Northern University in 1968. Three years later Hollman received his master of science degree in education from Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio.

While at Ohio Northern, Hollman was a three-year starter for the

football team and a two-year performer as a defensive back and offensive end during his junior and senior years. He holds the school record with 13 career interceptions and earned All-American and All-District honors during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Hollman also lettered in baseball for three years during his stay at Ohio Northern.

A chronological look at Hollman's coaching career begins in 1968 as an assistant coach at Sidney High School in Sidney, Ohio. From there, Hollman moved on to Greenville High School in Ohio where he became head coach from 1971-73. His Greenville squads posted an impressive 26-2-2 mark during his three-year stay.

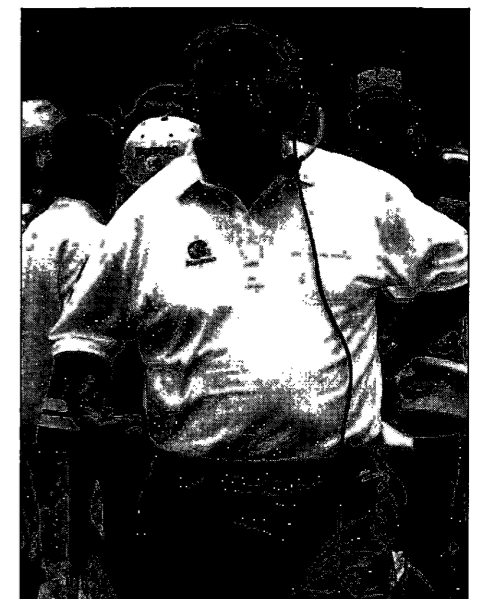
Hollman then moved on to Fremont Ross High School as head coach for the 1974 and 1975 seasons, where his squad recorded 15 wins against three setbacks and two ties. Fremont was the Buckeye Conference champ in 1974, unbeaten at 9-0-1.

In 1976, Hollman moved on to the collegiate ranks where he was the defensive coordinator for his alma mater at Ohio Northern University.

The following year, Hollman accepted the head coach position at Wooster College (OH) and guided his squad to the best four-year record in the school history (24-11-1).

In 1981, Hollman took an assistant coaching spot with Ball State University which he held through the 1984 campaign. Then, beginning in 1985 Hollman held the defensive coordinator position at Ohio University.

Tom resides in Edinboro with his wife, Kandi, and four children, Mari, Jon, Tim and Denise.

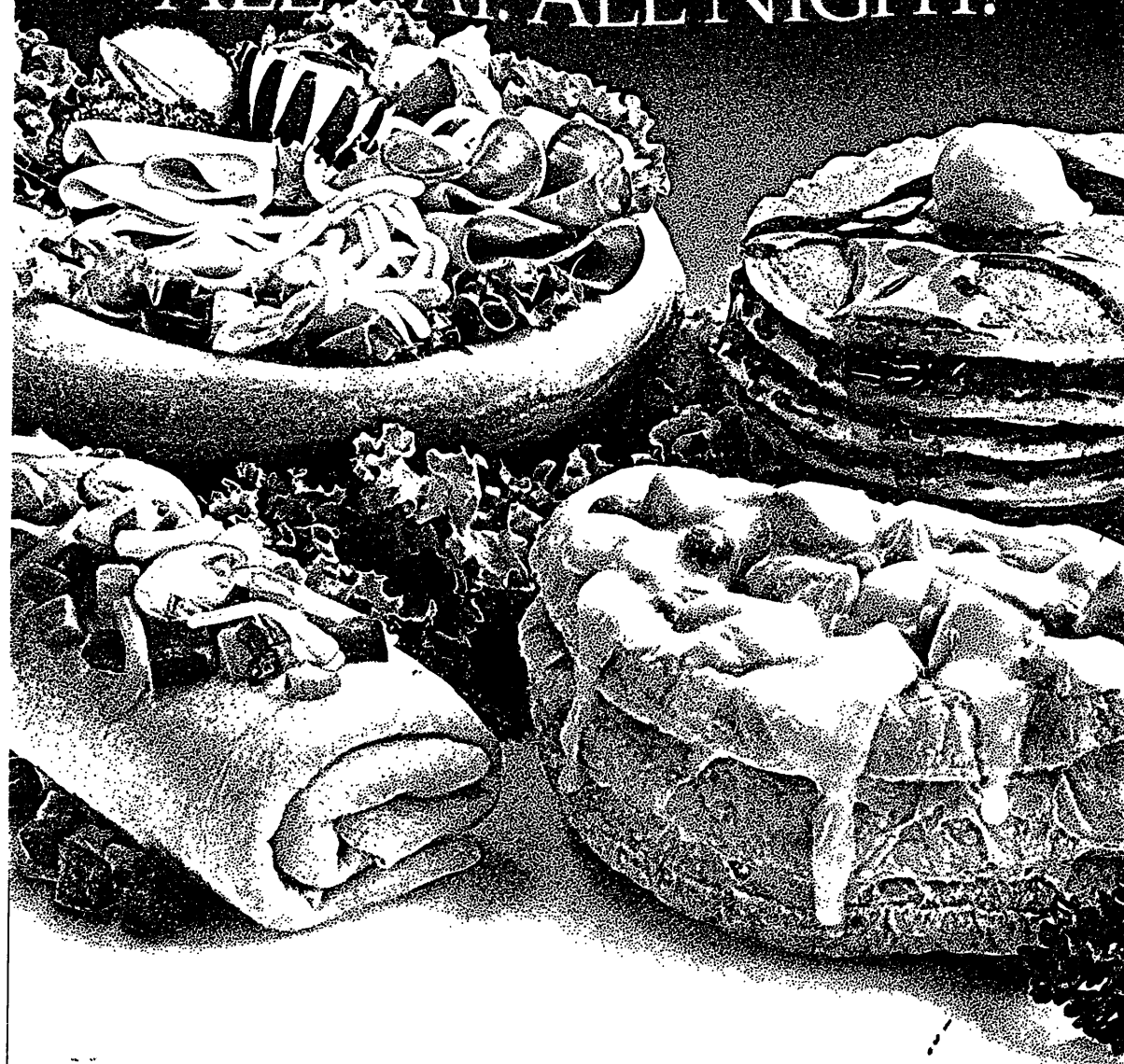

1995 Preview – Reloading or Rebuilding?

Replacing players each year is a challenge – but replacing greatness is another. Gone from a season ago is the school's all-time leading rusher, passer and interception leader.

Whether 1995 turns into a season of reloading or rebuilding remains a mystery but it is likely the program's foundation and well-deserved reputation will have the Scot program back in the limelight again this fall.

Entering his eighth season directing the Boro fortunes, head coach Tom Hollman returns 14 starters and 33 lettermen to a squad that posted a 7-3 mark a year ago. In '94, the Scots earned a #17 ranking at season's end marking the sixth consecutive season Edinboro had finished among the nation's top 20. Since '91, the Plaid has earned two trips to the NCAA II championship field of 16 and posted an impressive 30-12-1 overall record.

The task at hand in '95 will be filling the shoes of record-setting All-Americans Larry Jackson, Jody Dickerson and Steve Russell. What makes this season even more of challenge is the Boro must look for replacements while playing, arguably, the toughest schedule in school history. Difficult from the beginning, the Scots open with a home contest against Hillsdale, Division II's winningest program. The 10-game ledger also features non-conference road games at Division I-AA Appalachian State and Division II power Portland State, while the Boro's cross-over home game from the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Eastern Division is vastly improved Mansfield. The divisional slate consists of home games against Lock Haven, California and IUP whereas the Boro treks to Shippenburg, Slippery Rock and Clarion. A strong road team the past three regular seasons (12-2-1), the Scots successes in '95 will again be based on their abilities to continue winning away from Sox Harrison Stadium.

A Breakdown of Personnel

Skill Positions

Traditionally a strength for the team has turned into the biggest question mark for '95. With the departure of Jackson and Dickerson, the Scots lose over 12,000 yards of total offense. Simply stated, the Boro's success offensively will parallel the progression of junior quarterback Chris Hart. A backup the past two seasons, Hart has played in 16 games, completing 38% of his passes for 112 yards, one score and one interception. The running back spot is solid with the return of Tony Brinson (221 yards, 2 TDs) and the addition of highly-touted Gerald Thompson. Look for the Scots to rely heavily on the running game to assist Hart's development. The wideout spot is open with the departure of big-play man Lateef Walters. Terry Roberts, who has averaged nearly 27 yards per catch the past two years, must step up in '95.

Offensive Line

If who is throwing, running or catching the ball is a question, then the foundation for '95 will be the return of the entire offensive line from a year ago. All-American tackle Jeremy O'Day is outstanding and will team with center Det Betti, guards Chad Wallick and Chris Barney and tackle Tom Lavis to secure the attack. Jesse Trevino also has plenty of game experience from a year ago. Tight end Todd Henne (15 receptions, 158 yards, 2 TDs) was named second team PSAC-West a year ago and returns as the squad's top pass catcher. John Sabo (6, 53, 1 td) is also solid.

Defensive Line

Another crew which returns intact is the defensive front. All-American end Pat Schuster (65 tackles, 10 sacks) is closing in on the school's all-time sack record. Last season, Schuster registered 22 total tackles behind the line for -103 yards. All conference end Bryan Lambert (73 stops, 7 sacks) also returns along with tackles

Matt Gentile (46 tackles) and Al Bass (32, 2 recoveries). Rich Jones (21 stops, 6 games) is also back while junior college transfer Jeff Traversy should step in and have an immediate impact.

Linebackers

All conference performer Michael Sims returns to anchor the second line of defense. Sims led the squad with 124 total tackles a year ago including 85 solo hits. He was in on four tackles for loss and intercepted one pass. With the departure of All-American Michael Edwards, the Scots may face a void here. Jerry Roberts, who recorded 16 hits in a reserve role a year ago, may be the one to step up. Emery Martin (9 stops, 3 games) and transfer Vanroy Williams (6-2, 235) could also play major roles for the Scots.

Secondary

Gone is All-American Steve Russell, the team's all-time interception leader but three other starters, with plenty of big-game experience return. Both cornerbacks, Marty Williams and Keith Cushenberry, earned second team all-west selections in '94. Williams was fourth on the squad with 68 stops including four tackles for loss, one interception and six deflections. Cushenberry registered 36 tackles and was second on the team with two picks. Rick Walker, a part-time starter through his career, is looking to recover from last year's shoulder injury. He contributed 39 hits in just six games in '94.

Specialties

The Boro faces two holes to fill with the graduation of veteran placekicker Scott Rupert and the departure of Eric Wagner. In addition, with the graduation of Russell and Walters, the Scots must find replacements to return kicks and punts.

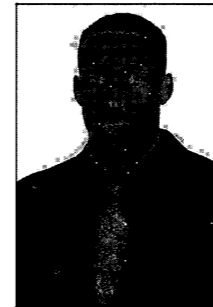

Scot Success in the Classroom

Progression of the student-athlete has always been a priority for Coach Tom Hollman and his staff. This past year, the tradition of success on the field and in the classroom continued for the Fighting Scot football program. A pair of starters, tight end Todd Henne and safety Rick Walker, not only had quality years on the gridiron for the Scots but were recognized as national scholar-athletes by *College Football Preview* magazine. The pair were also honored as top student-athletes by the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference and Edinboro University. Both students currently own cumulative grade point marks of better than 3.5. In 1994, Henne earned PSAC-West second team all star honors for his 15 catches for 158 yards and a pair of scores while Walker recorded 39 tackles, 20 solo, in just six games due to a shoulder injury.

THE GAME

The Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Fighting Scots, 7-1 overall and ranked ninth this week in the NCAA Division II football poll, will host the Mansfield University of Pennsylvania Mountaineers on Saturday (Nov. 4). Kickoff for the non-conference game is set for 1 p.m. at Edinboro's Sox Harrison Stadium.

THE RECORDS

Edinboro enters Saturday's game with a 7-1 overall record, and a 5-0 mark in the PSAC-West, after posting a 35-18 home victory over Indiana University of PA last Saturday. Edinboro, which has won six straight games, clinched at least a share of first place in the PSAC-West with the win over IUP. The Boro can win the West title outright with a win or tie against Clarion University of PA in the regular-season finale (Nov. 11).

Mansfield won its first game of the 1995 campaign last Saturday, a 28-20 victory over winless Cheyney University of PA. The Mountaineers are 1-7 overall, and 1-4 in the PSAC-East.

NCAA NATIONAL/REGIONAL RANKINGS

Edinboro moved up three more spots in the NCAA Division II national rankings this week, climbing from 12th to the No. 9 spot. The Fighting Scots also jumped one spot in the Northeast Regional rankings, from fourth to third.

The last time the Scots were ranked in the top 10 was in 1992, when EUP was 8-0 and ranked third nationally. Edinboro also was ranked seventh in the final NCAA Division II poll of 1989. Edinboro's win over IUP knocked the Indians completely out of the Top 20 after being ranked seventh entering the game.

IUP also dropped from third to sixth in the region. The top two teams in the region remained the same — Ferris State (MI) University, now 8-0 on the season, was No. 1 in the region and third nationally, while New Haven (CT) University, 7-0-1, was No. 2 regionally and fifth nationally.

Edinboro's win over IUP also opened the door for PSAC East member, Millersville University of PA, to jump from sixth to fourth in the region, and into the No. 15 slot nationally. Grand Valley (MI) State University remained fifth in the Northeast and dropped two spots in the national poll, from 14th to 16th.

THE COACHES

Tom Hollman (Ohio Northern University, 1968) became the winningest coach in Edinboro history earlier this year.

Now in his eighth year as head coach of the Fighting Scots, Hollman has compiled a 59-23-2 overall mark (.714) with the Scots. He passed Bill McDonald, 54-34-7 from 1969-78, on the school's all-time victory list.

Hollman, who also is the winningest coach in school history based on winning percentage, was ranked 13th on the NCAA Division II winningest active coaches list entering the season.

Hollman has led Edinboro to the NCAA Division II playoffs in four of the past six seasons (1989-90-92-93). The Scots are 36-9-2 in games against PSAC-West foes (.787) under Hollman. The Boro won the PSAC-West title in 1989.

Hollman also posted a 24-11-1 record at the College of Wooster to bring his overall coaching record to 82-34-3 in 11-plus seasons, a .702 winning percentage.

Joe Viadella (University of Rhode Island, 1983) is in his first season as head coach at Mansfield after serving as the defensive line coach with the Mounties during the '94 campaign.

Viadella is a former assistant coach with the Ohio Glory of the World League of American football and the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League. He also has Division I experience as an assistant at the University of Louisville (1991), the University of Wyoming (1989), the University of Kentucky (1983-85) and at his alma mater, Rhode Island. Viadella also was the offensive coordinator at Bloomsburg University of PA (1986-88).

THE SERIES

Mansfield holds a 12-10-1 lead in the overall series, including a 31-26 victory in last year's game at Mansfield. The Mounties overcame a career-best 275-yard rushing performance by Edinboro's Larry Jackson to hold off the Scots.

Prior to last year's defeat, Edinboro had won 10 of the previous 11 match-ups dating back to 1950.

EDINBORO AT HOME, MANSFIELD ON THE ROAD

Edinboro has posted a 31-5-1 record at Sox Harrison Stadium (.851) during the Hollman era. The Scots are 4-0 at home this season, outscoring opponents 139-51 at Sox Harrison. Mansfield is 0-3 on the road this year.

EDINBORO DEFENSE NAMED PSAC "PLAYER" OF THE WEEK

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference named the entire Edinboro defense as its Western Division "Player" of the week.

The Scots held the Indians to just 287 yards of total offense, nearly 150 yards less than IUP was averaging entering the game. Edinboro forced four IUP turnovers, had three QB sacks and the Indians were just 2 of 13 on third down conversions.

Senior linebacker Michael Sims led the charge. He returned an interception 26 yards for a TD to put the Boro ahead 7-0, the second game in a row he returned an INT for a touchdown. Sims now has five interceptions on the year. He had 13 tackles versus IUP to take over the team lead with 75 tackles this year.

Junior cornerback Keith Cushenberry picked off his first pass of the year and broke up four additional passes.

Senior defensive end Pat Schuster caused a fumble and recorded seven tackles. Two IUP holding calls were against Schuster, who now has 71 tackles on the season and 10 sacks. Schuster also has a school-record 32 career sacks.

For the season, Edinboro now has sacked opposing quarterbacks 29 times, an average of 3.6 per game, and the Scots are a plus-six in turnovers for the season.

THOMPSON INJURED BUT BACKS STEP UP

Edinboro running back Gerald Thompson, a red-shirt freshman from Pittsburgh, suffered a hip-pointer in Saturday's game and could miss the Mansfield game. Thompson entered the IUP contest as the PSAC's top rusher, averaging more than 134 yards per game to rank fifth nationally. He put together a string a five consecutive games rushing for 139 yards or more, but he carried the ball just 10 times last week for 28 yards, all in the first half. Thompson still leads the conference in rushing (969 yards on 167 carries, 121.1 ypg, 5.8 ypc).

When Thompson couldn't play in the second half, junior backfield mate Tony Brinson and another freshman, B.J. Harrison stepped up. Brinson carried 23 times for 71 yards and scored two touchdowns, while Harrison rushed for 95 yards on just nine carries.

MORE ON THE OFFENSE

Junior quarterback Chris Hart directs Edinboro's attack, calling the signals behind a veteran offensive line that returned all seven starters from last year's team. Against IUP, Hart completed 13 of 21 passes for 193 yards with two TDs and two interceptions. For the season, Hart has completed 93 of 182 passes (51.1%) for 1,339 yards with 12 TDs and 14 INTs.

Junior Gilbert Grantlin leads the team with 32 catches for 636 yards (19.9 ypc, 79.5 ypg) and 8 TDs. Grantlin also has a rushing TD for a total of 54 points (6.8 ppg).

Sophomore Quentin Ware-Bey has emerged as a quality receiver for the Boro as well. In the last two games, he has nine catches for 147 yards — five catches for 84 yards versus IUP and four for 63 yards versus Slippery Rock. For the season, Ware-Bey has 20 catches for 273 yards (13.7 ypc, 34.1 ypg).

Senior tight end Todd Henne had a crucial nine-yard touchdown catch versus Indiana, turning a 21-18 game into a 28-18 contest. It was Henne's first TD reception of the season and the seventh of his career.

A LOOK AT MANSFIELD

The Mountaineers are coming off perhaps their best offensive performance of the year. Sophomore runningback Jason Donadi carried the ball a school-record 42 times for a career-high 197 yards and three TDs to spark the win over Cheyney. He was selected the PSAC East Offensive Player of the Week.

Senior quarterback Bryan Woodworth completed 12 of 31 passes for 205 yards. Freshman Jason Williams caught seven passes for 137 yards.

For the season, Donadi has rushed for 621 yards on 163 carries (88.7 ypg, 3.8 ypc) with six TDs. Millersville averages just 107.5 yards per game on the ground. Woodworth has completed 131 of 313 passes (41.9%) for 1,486 yards. He has thrown 4 TD passes, but has also tossed 19 interceptions. Senior wide receiver Jeff Harris tops the receiving charts with 24 catches for 309 yards, but he is questionable for the Edinboro game. Donadi has 21 catches for 146 yards, and Geoff Woodworth, QB Bryan's brother, has 18 catches for 188 yards with a pair of TDs.

Defensively, Mansfield is led by senior outside linebacker Dave Mitchell who has been credited with 105 tackles this year, including seven stops for losses and 3.5 QB sacks.

QUOTING COACH HOLLMAN

"I thought our ability to control the line of scrimmage, for the most part, was the difference. We controlled the football in the third and fourth quarter and we made big plays on both offense and defense when we really needed them. We did a good job of putting pressure on their offense and keeping our poise when we had the ball."

"It was just a great team win, a victory that gives us a chance to win the conference title and receive a playoff berth. But, it was just one game, number five on our conference schedule. We still have two more big ones to go. Our team has worked too hard to get to this point and I fully expect us to keep our

Scott Browning – Offensive Line

Starting his 10th season at the Boro, Scott has coached running backs and the defensive backfield in year's past and now enters his second season directing the offensive line. Under his guidance a year ago, the Scots' front line cleared the way for over 450 yards of total offense per game and conference best 250 yards per game rushing. In his many capacities, he has guided the fortunes of All-Americans Steve Russell, Michael Willis, Wade Smith, Georj Lewis, Mike Barnes, Elbert Cole and Jeremy O'Day.

Scott came to Edinboro from Ohio State University, where he coached receivers and running backs. Prior to his start at OSU, Browning coached at Worthington and Dayton-Fairview high schools in Ohio, from 1979-81. Then, as a

graduate assistant, he coached the defensive secondary at New Mexico State in 1982.

In 1983, he mentored the receivers at Idaho State University which advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs.

Browning earned a master's degree in education administration from New Mexico State in 1983, and a BS in education from Ohio State in 1981. Earlier, before transferring to OSU, Scott attended Capital University where he played football for one season. Browning was a four-year letterman in four sports at Loudonville High School (OH) prior to his collegiate days. Scott is married to the former Lynn Hook, and has a son, Andrew Scott. The Brownings reside in Edinboro.



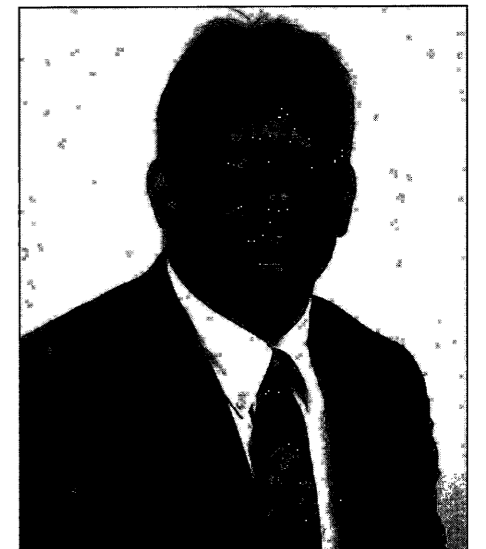
Dan Gierlak – Linebackers

Dan Gierlak enters his ninth season as a full-time coach, shifting his responsibilities from coaching the running backs to linebacker coach. He was formerly the head women's softball coach for the Scots and led the squad to the PSAC playoffs in 1990.

Nicklaus Cronk – Defensive Line

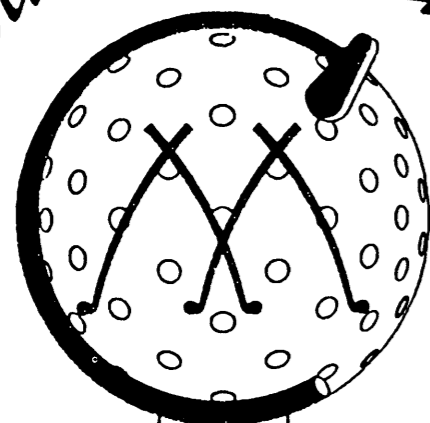

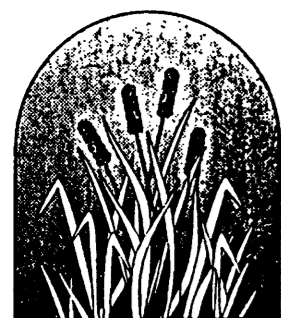

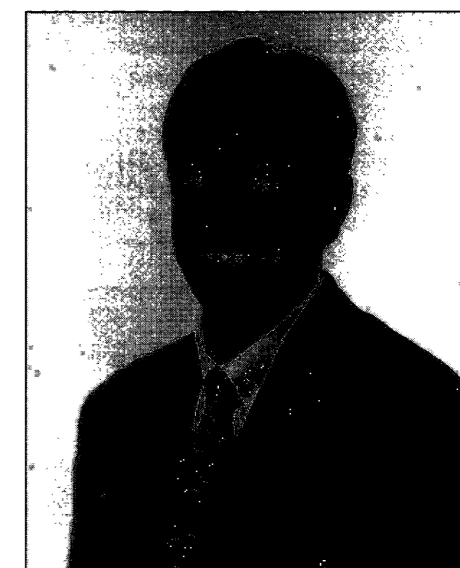
Mike Nelson – Wide Receivers

Vince Skillings – Running Backs

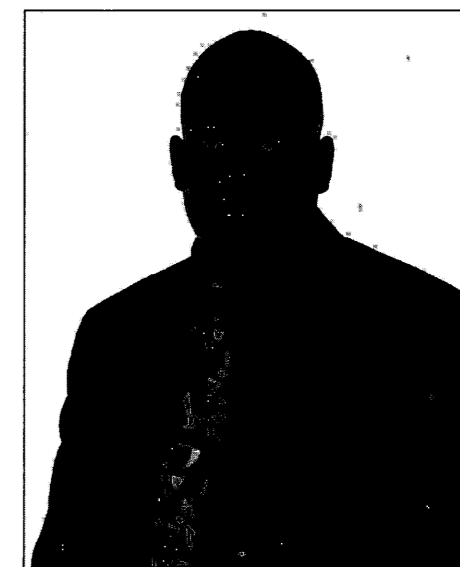

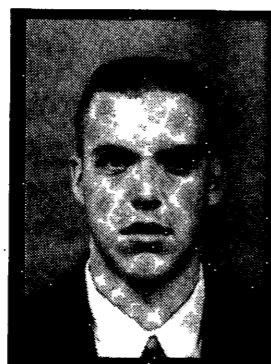

Also a member of the softball team, Miller saw action in 34 games while starting in 25 in helping the Huskies to the national runner-up spot this past season and a P.S.A.C. title.

Metzka, a senior Sport Management major from New Middletown, OH (Springfield Local), earned a 3.874 cumulative GPA while excelling in basketball.

A three year starter for The Rock, Metzka is only one of 17 SRU basketball players to score over 1,000 career points (1,073) and is one of the all-time assist leaders in school history with 301. He finished sixth in the NCAA Division II this past season in three point makes per game at 3.8 while averaging 17.7 points per game, second on the team.

Metzka is a first-team 1994-95 GTE Academic All-American after garnering second-team honors last season.

Jack Benedict Named 1995 PSAC Media Award-Winner

Jack Benedict, sports director of 1160/WCCS Radio, Homer City, has been selected the 1995 winner of the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (P.S.A.C.) George Heaslip Media Award.

Benedict is the seventh recipient of the annual award presented by the sports information directors of the P.S.A.C. to a media professional for his or her efforts in covering Conference student-athletes and teams.

1995-96 represents Benedict's 28th year of sportscasts of IUP football and men's basketball, and on television for several years when IUP produced a weekly football program on KBL-TV, Pittsburgh, that was carried by the PRIME cable network in a several-state area. He has produced a daily morning sports show first with WDAD, Indiana, from 1969 to 1989 and then with WCCS.

In the process of broadcasting IUP events, from across the state and literally all parts of the United States, Benedict has

described games involving every P.S.A.C. university. Followers of all such teams have invariably commented on the accurate, objective manner in which he has reported on the competition.

Originally from Mount Pleasant, in Westmoreland County, he first worked seven years (1962-69) as sports director of WCVI Radio in neighboring Connellsville.

How well he has performed was most recently denoted by his earning the Pennsylvania Association of Broadcasting award for his coverage of the 1993 IUP/North Alabama NCAA Division II national championship football game. This was his fourth PAB sports award; he was also recognized in 1980 for "Best Public Service in Pennsylvania" for a report on the homeless.

Inducted into the Indiana County Hall of Fame this past spring (1995), in part as a result of his avid interest in American Legion baseball as well, he has been heard nationwide by reporting and interviews done

for the CBS radio network.

As a radio personality, Benedict joins Jim Doyle of W H L M , Bloomsburg, who received the Heaslip Award in 1993.

Recognized last year was Tom Rose, sports editor of the Washington (Pa.) Observer-Reporter.

Other winners, in order since the honor was initiated in 1989, have been sports writers Ray Kienzl of the Pittsburgh Press, Ross Nevel of the Lock Haven Express (a former sports information director at LHU), Skip Hutter of the Harrisburg Patriot-News and Pete Zapadka of the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette.

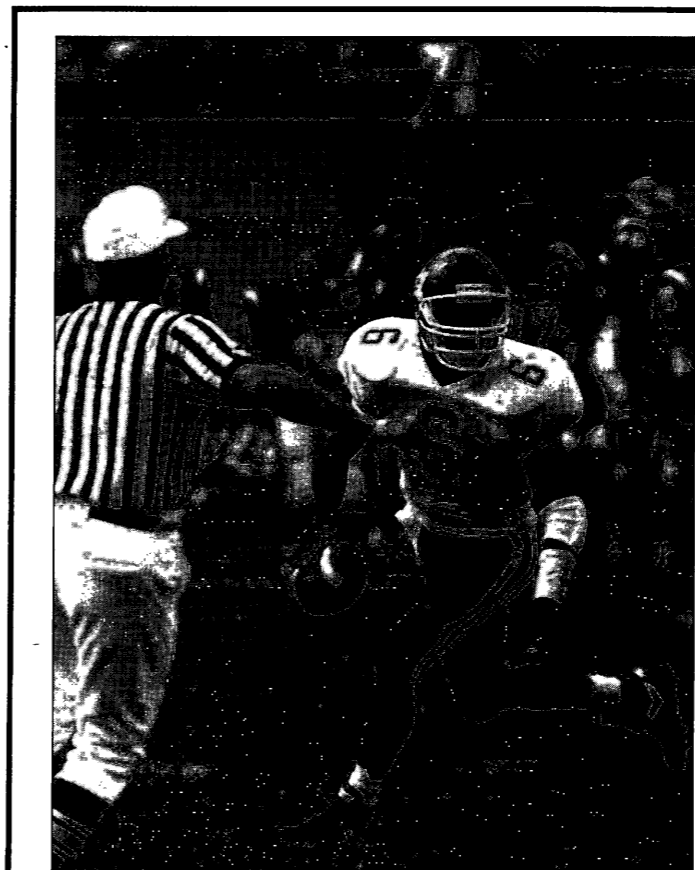

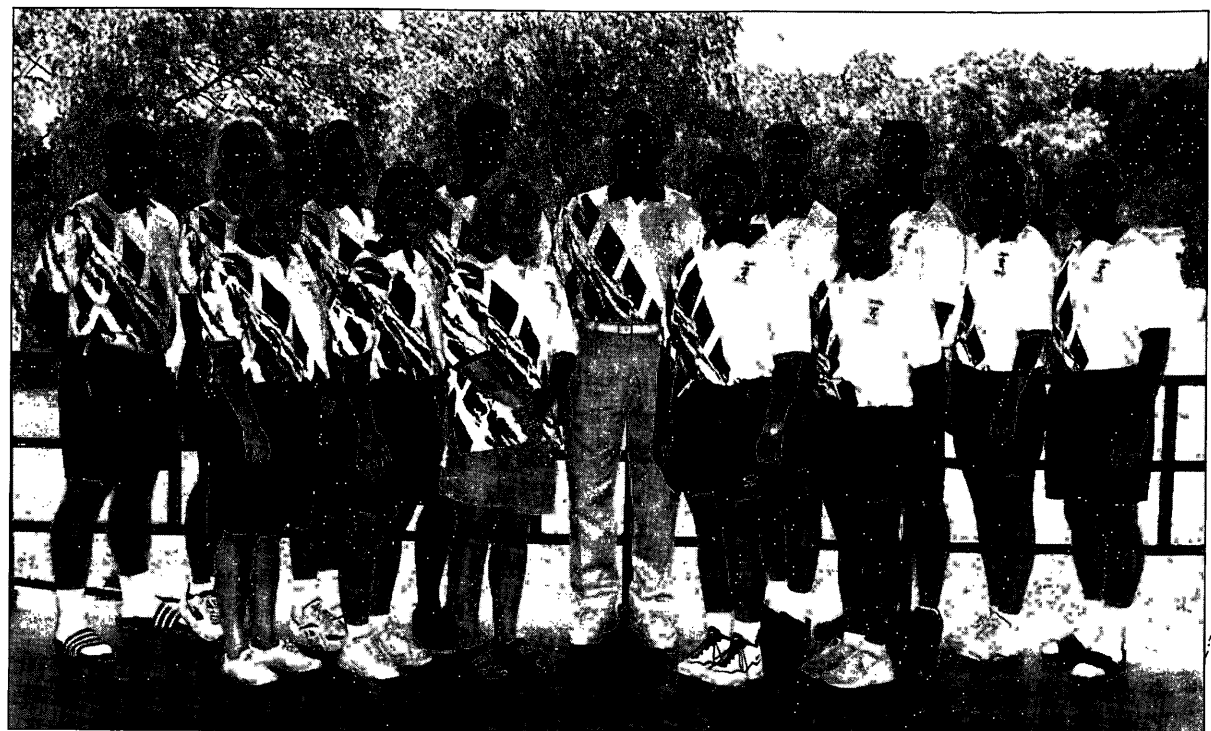

Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference and Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) was organized in 1951 for the purpose of promoting and administering men's athletic programs within the fourteen state teachers colleges in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

In 1977, due to the interest and growth of women's athletics, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference was restructured to provide for women's programs.

From its inception, each Conference member selected its own competitive division within the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). In 1980, however, the presidents of the schools voted to reclassify to Division II.

In 1983, all member institutions were granted university status as a result of Legislative Act 188 which formed the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education (SSHE). This system now enrolls in excess of 99,000 students. The alumni of the SSHE number more than 402,000, including 287,000 in Pennsylvania. The chancellor of the SSHE is Dr. James H. McCormick.

One of the largest conferences in the nation, the PSAC is under the leadership of a board of directors (the 14 university presidents). The Conference also employs a commissioner, Dr. Charles A. 'Tod' Eberle.

The PSAC sponsors 20 men's and women's intercollegiate sports. For men the PSAC offers baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, track and field, and wrestling. For women the sports include basketball, cross country, field hockey, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track and field and volleyball.

Although all 14 institutions are members of NCAA Division II, nine schools have elected to participate at the Division I level in selected sports.

The PSAC is one of the nation's most respected Division II conferences. Annually the PSAC places several teams in various NCAA top 20 polls. In addition, it has produced numerous national champions over the years.
