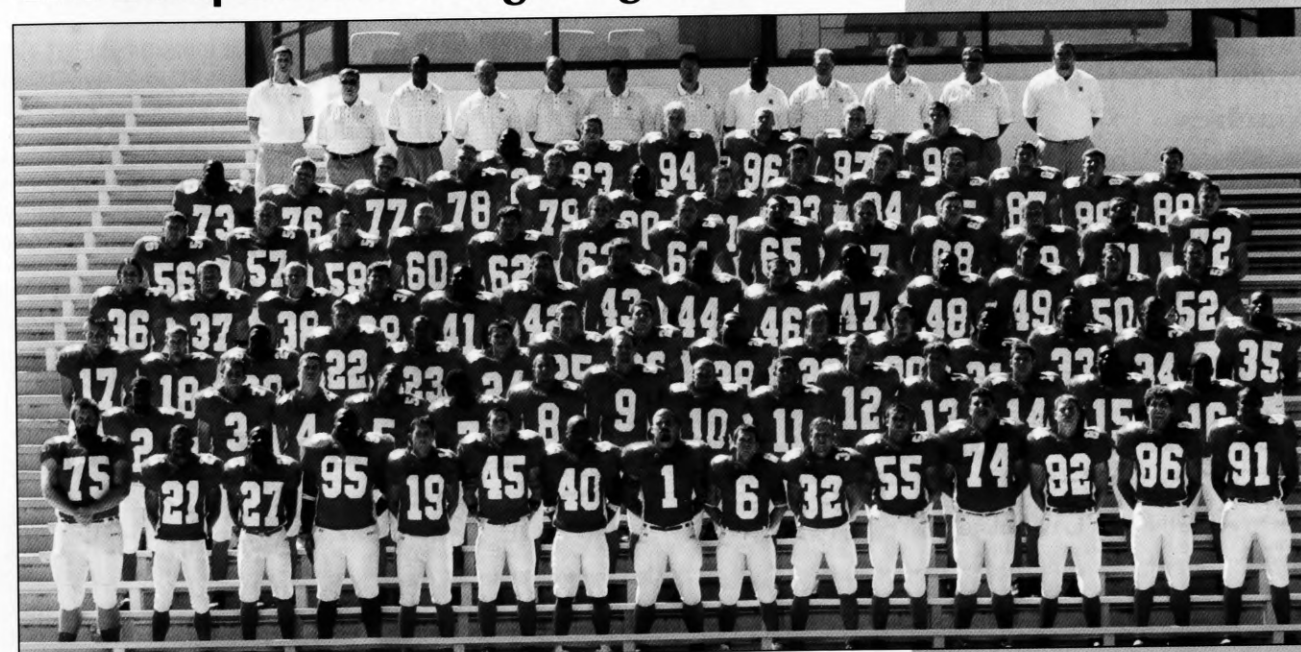

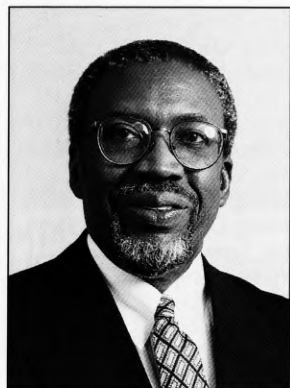

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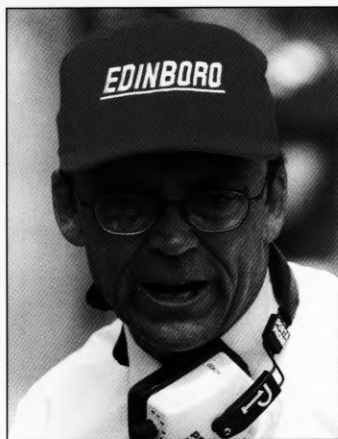


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Head Coach Lou Tepper



Veteran Division I mentor Lou Tepper was appointed the 12th head football coach at Edinboro University, officially taking charge of the Fighting Scot program on January 5, 2000. He promised a tough and classy program, and in four short years has delivered a championship team that fans and alumni enthusiastically endorse.

Tepper inherited an Edinboro program which had won just eleven games in the previous three seasons. The Scots have shown consistent improvement in "Coach Tep's" four years, culminated by an appearance in the NCAA Division

II Playoffs this past year. The 2000 season brought a 5-6 record, matching the Edinboro record for wins by a first-year head coach, and a fifth place PSAC finish. In 2001 and 2002, the Fighting Scots were very competitive, setting the stage for last year's breakthrough season that saw Edinboro ranked 18th nationally.

BIG TEN HEAD COACH

The 58-year-old Tepper was appointed the head coach at the University of Illinois on December 13, 1991, just prior to the team's appearance in the John Hancock Sun Bowl. He replaced Mackovic, who left for the head coaching position at the University of Texas. During his five-year stint as the Fighting Illini head coach, Tepper compiled a record of 25-31-2, including two more bowl appearances. He guided Illinois to a pair of wins over Ohio State, including one at Columbus; the school's first victory in Ann Arbor against Michigan in 27 years; and three consecutive wins over rival Iowa by a combined score of 122-17. Just as impressive, Tepper graduated 91 percent of his seniors.

Tepper joined the Illinois program in 1988, serving as the defensive coordinator for four seasons and assistant head coach for two years. In his nine seasons at Illinois, he helped the program to six bowl invitations, one Big Ten title and top ten rankings in the AP and UPI polls.

He was honored as the Big Ten's top defensive assistant coach in 1990 by The Sporting News. His defensive units annually ranked among the best in the country, finishing 10th in 1989, 14th in 1993, ninth in 1994, and 21st in 1995.

Tepper's 1992 Illini squad finished 6-5-1, suffering a 27-17 defeat to Hawaii in the Holiday Bowl. Illinois went in to Columbus and upset Ohio State, 18-16, and posted a 22-22 tie against Michigan in Ann Arbor.

While his '93 edition finished 5-6, that included a 24-21 win in Ann Arbor against the Wolverines. The Illini made it back to postseason play in 1994, handing East Carolina a 30-0 whitewashing in the Liberty Bowl. The '94 squad finished 7-5, again upsetting one of the

The Fighting Scots survived a brutal three-game stretch early in the season, defeating 16th-ranked East Stroudsburg, 30-21, dropping a 40-34 decision to 22nd-ranked Shippensburg, and finally upsetting fourth-ranked Indiana (Pa.) on the Indians' home turf, 28-20. That win propelled the Scots to a six-game winning streak to end the regular season. During that stretch Edinboro held opponents without a touchdown for 20 consecutive quarters. Tepper was recognized as the PSAC West Coach of the Year in 2004.

While winning is important, it isn't the only emphasis at Edinboro with Tepper at the controls. He has stressed improved character and talent, a family concept and racial harmony. In the classroom the Fighting Scots have shown marked improvement in recent years. It all adds up to a championship program.

BACKGROUND

Tepper, a native of Keystone, PA, returned to the Division II level after coaching at Division I institutions for almost thirty years. He is renowned as a defensive coaching genius, with a resume that includes three Butkus Award honorees and an Outland Trophy winner. Tepper's list of standouts include Bruce Smith, John Holecek, Simeon Rice, Kevin Hardy, Brad Hopkins, Booger MacFarland, and Ken Dilger, all current or former NFL standouts. In addition, he has worked with some of the top head coaches in the country, including Bill Dooley at Virginia Tech, Bill McCartney at Colorado, John Mackovic at Illinois and Gerry DiNardo at LSU.

"Being a native of western Pennsylvania, it has been neat to be a head coach again and to be a head coach in this environment," Tepper related following his first season at Edinboro. "I've recruited western Pennsylvania for half of my career. It's a joy to be back home."

Tepper completed his second full season as the defensive coordi-

elite in the Big Ten. And once again it was on the road, as Illinois shocked Ohio State, 24-10, in Columbus behind Butkus Award winner Dana Howard.

LINEBACKERS

Through the years Penn State had gained the reputation as "Linebacker U", but Illinois could have made a good case for that designation as well during Tepper's tenure. He produced consecutive Butkus Award winners in Dana Howard (1994) and Kevin Hardy (1995). Along the way, he also produced Big Ten Defensive Players of the Year in Moe Gardner and Darrick Brownlow (1990), Howard (1993 and '94) and Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year Simeon Rice in 1994. For the only time in Big Ten history, Tepper had four first team All-Big Ten linebackers at his disposal. In all, he has coached over 20 professional linebackers, and has published a book, "Complete Linebacking", a 312-page comprehensive book on linebacker play.

Hardy and Rice became the highest defensive draft duo in the history of the NFL draft in 1996 when Hardy went second to Jacksonville and Rice third to Arizona. That stood until the 2000 NFL Draft when Penn State's Courtney Brown and Lavar Arrington went one-two.

DIVISION I ASSISTANT COACH

In over thirty years as an assistant coach, Tepper has worked at some of the top institutions in the country. That includes the likes of Pittsburgh, Virginia Tech and Colorado, in addition to his time at Illinois and LSU.

Tepper began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 1967, then moved on to the University of New Hampshire from 1968-71, coaching the running backs and linebackers before becoming the defensive coordinator. His next stop was the College of William & Mary, where he joined former New Hampshire head coach Jim Root as the defensive coordinator from 1972-77. The 1976 William & Mary squad posted the school's best record in thirty years. He was the assistant head coach his final year at William & Mary.

In 1978, Virginia Tech head coach Bill Dooley hired Tepper as his linebackers coach. Tepper helped build the Hokies into a consistent bowl con-

tender with a defense that annually ranked among the nation's top ten. He stayed at Virginia Tech from 1978-82, working with Outland Trophy winner and Buffalo Bills great Bruce Smith, among others. The 1980 Hokie edition played Miami (FL) in the Peach Bowl.

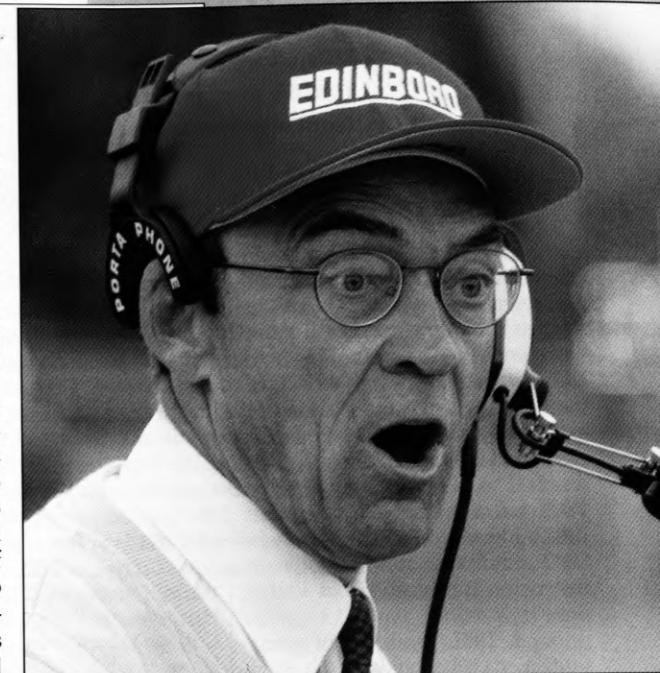
Tepper joined Bill McCartney's staff at Colorado in 1983, serving as the defensive coordinator and assistant head coach until departing for Illinois in 1988. Tepper helped turn around a Buffalo defense which ranked No. 100 nationally in yards allowed prior to his arrival, to one which was as high as 11th in Division I in total defense. He earned the title of assistant head coach to McCartney his final two seasons, and helped the Buffaloes to the 1985 Freedom Bowl and the 1986 Blue Bonnet Bowl.

Among the assistant coaches at Colorado was Gerry DiNardo, who would later bring Tepper in to direct his LSU defense.

PERSONAL BACKGROUND

Tepper, born September 7, 1945, graduated from Rutgers University in 1967. He enjoyed a standout career as a defensive back at Rutgers from 1965-67. As a player, Tepper led the Scarlet Knights in interceptions as a junior and tackles as a senior. He won the George Cronin Trophy as the Most Improved Player in 1965.

Tepper is an active member of the American Football Coaches Association and has served on the All-American Committee and the NCAA Ethics Committee. He is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and has spoken for Promise-Keepers, founded by former Colorado coach Bill McCartney. Tepper and his wife, Karen, have two children, Matthew, who recently graduated from Edinboro with a master's degree in Counseling, and Stacy Ann, a graduate of LSU who is an administrator for Young Life Ministries in Columbus, OH.

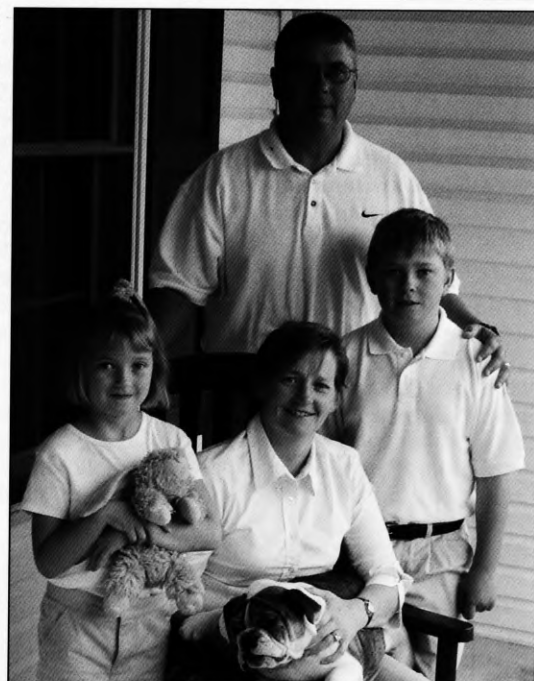
Scott Browning is in his 19th season as a Fighting Scot assistant, working with his third head coach.

After serving as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator in Lou Tepper's first season, Browning took over as the offensive coordinator three years ago, while continuing to work with the linemen. This marks his 11th year in charge of the offensive linemen, and ninth as offensive coordinator. He has also coached the running backs and defensive backs in the past.

Browning has served as an assistant coach at three NCAA Division I institutions. Prior to joining the Fighting Scot staff in 1986, he coached receivers and running backs at Ohio State for two years. The Buckeyes went to the Rose Bowl and the Citrus Bowl in his two seasons. Browning served as a graduate assistant coach at New Mexico State in 1982, and the following year instructed the receivers at Idaho State.

A 1981 graduate of Ohio State with a bachelor's degree in Education, Browning began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Worthington High School and Dayton-Fairview High Schools in Ohio from 1979-81. Before transferring to Ohio State, he attended Capital University where he played football for one season. Browning later earned a master's degree in Education Administration from New Mexico State in 1983.

Browning and his wife, Lynn, reside in Edinboro and have two children, Andrew, 10, and Katelyn, 6. His brother, Mitchell, is the offensive coordinator at the University of Minnesota. Browning is also camp director of the Tri-State Linemen's Camp, a highly successful instructional camp for linemen now in its ninth year.



Wayne Bradford
Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Line
6th Year

Wayne Bradford is in his sixth year as a member of the Edinboro coaching staff. Bradford was recently given the additional responsibilities of defensive coordinator, a position which he previously held in 1999 under former head coach Tom Hollman. He will continue to oversee the defensive line.

Under Bradford's tutelage, Edinboro has had five first team All-PSAC West defensive linemen. That includes Dave Smith, a four-time All-PSAC selection who ranks first in career tackles for losses and tied for second in sacks, and Eugene Grooms, who was a three-time All-PSAC selection. His 2003 defensive line featured three all-conference performers.

Bradford had previously been at Salisbury State since 1990, and was the Sea Gulls' defensive coordinator from 1994-98.

A graduate of Salisbury State, Bradford began his coaching career at his alma mater in 1990, serving as an assistant coach in charge of the linebackers (1990-92) and defensive linemen (1992-94). In 1994, he was promoted to defensive coordinator. In 1997, Salisbury State ranked 38th in NCAA Division III in total defense, allowing just 268 yards per game. His 1995 defensive unit produced a first team AFCA All-American at linebacker, and helped the Sea Gulls finish 7-2 with a berth in the ECAC Southwest Championship Game.

Bradford graduated from Salisbury State in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration. He completed work on his master's degree in Business Administration from Salisbury State in 1992. In addition to working as a member of the football staff, Bradford was a faculty member in the School of Business. Beginning in 1996, he was the Director of the Business Graduate Programs for the Perdue School of Business.

As an undergraduate, Bradford was an offensive lineman. He played on the 1986 Salisbury State team which finished as the NCAA Division III national runnerup.

Bradford and his wife, Gwen, reside in Edinboro with their six-year-old son, Nicholas, and four-year-old daughter, Julia.

Jim Henson, a highly successful high school coach in Ohio for over twenty years, enters his seventh season on the Edinboro staff. After working on the defensive side of the ball as the strong safeties/outside linebackers coach for two years, he moved over to the offense and will instruct the running backs for the third straight season. He previously worked with the running backs in 1999 and was in charge of the defensive linemen in '98. Henson is also a professor in the Mathematics Department at Edinboro.

Henson joined the Edinboro staff after serving as a mathematics teacher, football coach and athletic director at Grand Valley High School in Ohio for 22 years. He led the Mustangs to a 150-68-4 record, with five Grand River Conference championships, three East Suburban Conference titles, and three state playoff appearances. In the 1990's, Henson's charges posted three undefeated campaigns and a 23-game regular season winning streak. He was named the Conference Coach of the Year eight times and County Coach of the Year three times, culminated by his selection as the Ohio Division V Coach of the Year in 1997 and the Division IV Coach of the Year in '92.

Prior to beginning his stellar career at Grand Valley, Henson debuted as an assistant coach at Cardinal Middlefield (OH) High School, where he served for eight years.

Henson graduated from Hiram College in 1968 with a bachelor of arts degree in Mathematics, then completed work on his master of science degree in Education with a major in Mathematics from Youngstown State in 1972. He and his wife, Evelyn, reside in Edinboro. They are the parents of a son, Jim, and a daughter, Jennifer, along with four grandchildren.

Mike Hodgson is the newest member of the Edinboro staff, replacing Scott Weaver as quarterbacks coach in July. Hodgson brings 23 years of experience on the collegiate level with stops at schools such as Princeton, Maine Maritime Academy and Central Connecticut State.

Most recently Hodgson served as the offensive coordinator while working with the quarterbacks and wide receivers at Central Connecticut State from 2000-2004. Prior to joining the Central Connecticut State staff he was the head coach at Maine Maritime Academy for seven years, from 1994-2000. In his seven seasons at Maine Maritime his teams were ranked in the top 25 by Street & Smith and won New England Football Conference titles in 1994 and 1998. During Hodgson's tenure the Mariners established 70 school, NEFC, ECAC, and NCAA records. The Mariners produced three All-American running backs during that period.

Hodgson arrived at Maine Maritime following a nine-year stint as receivers coach at Princeton University. He served as the passing game coordinator for two seasons and was also the recruiting coordinator for two years. While at Princeton he coached several All-Americans, along with NFL quarterback Jason Garrett. The Tigers won two Ivy League championships during his stay while winning over 60 percent of their games and establishing 29 school records.

A 1979 graduate of the University of Maine with a bachelor's degree in Park and Recreation Management, Hodgson began his coaching career at his alma mater in 1979. He remained a member of the Maine staff from 1979-85, working with the tight ends, offensive line, running backs and receivers. He completed work on his master's degree in Education Administration in 1982.

Hodgson was a three-year starter for the Black Bears at tight end and kicker. A native of Newark, DE, he earned All-State honors as a quarterback at St. Mark's High School. He led his team to a perfect 12-0 record and the Delaware State title, earning game MVP honors.

McDonald was a four-year starter for the Fighting Scots at cornerback from 1997-2000, earning first team All-PSAC West honors as a junior when he finished with 29 tackles and a team-high 11 passes broken up. He finished his career with 108 tackles, 4 interceptions and 34 passes broken up, leading the team in the final category in all but his sophomore year. McDonald played for Tepper as a senior.

A 2001 graduate of Edinboro with a bachelor's degree in History, McDonald has also been an area representative for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He is extremely active in the Erie area as a speaker.

Tom Parry is in his third season as a member of the Edinboro football staff, coaching the wide receivers.

Parry has been a head football coach on the high school level for 17 years and an assistant coach at the collegiate level for 15 seasons. He coached the quarterbacks and receivers at Mercyhurst from 1995-2001.

Prior to joining the Mercyhurst staff, Parry was the passing game coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Iona College from 1992-95. He also served on the collegiate level in 1979-80 at Cortland State, from 1977-79 as the defensive coordinator at St. Lawrence University, and got his start as a student assistant at his alma mater, Slippery Rock State, in '63-64.

Parry served as an assistant coach at Academy High School in Erie in 1965-66. He served as the head coach at Tech Memorial High School from 1967-69, and was also the head coach at Bishop Ludden(NY) High School and Mount Vernon(NY) High School.

Dan Holland enters his first season as a member of the Edinboro coaching staff but is well-known in western Pennsylvania. All told he has 14 years experience on the high school level, serving as the head coach at Saegertown High School from 2001-03 in addition to stints as an assistant coach at McDowell High School and General McLane High School. He will coach the strong safeties and drop linebackers.

Holland led Saegertown to the 2002 French Creek Valley Athletic Conference championship, as the Panthers finished with a 9-1 record. He was recognized as the 2002 FCVAC Coach of the Year and was also named the PIAA District 10 Coach of the Year by the Pennsylvania State Football Coaches Association. He posted a 19-10 record in three seasons as head coach, resurrecting a program which had gone just 1-17 the previous two years.

Holland began his coaching career as an assistant at General McLane in 1990, leading his 1993 junior varsity squad to a 7-1 record. He moved on to the McDowell school system in 1994, working for three seasons as the head coach at J.S. Wilson Middle School before joining coach Jon Cacchione's varsity staff in 1997. The 1997 edition of the Trojans advanced to the PIAA Class AAAA western finals. While serving on the McDowell staff for four seasons, Holland worked with the offensive and defensive lines, tight ends and special teams.

A 2001 graduate of Edinboro with a bachelor's degree in Specialized Studies, Holland resides in Meadville with his wife, Brenda, a 1996 graduate of Edinboro University with a bachelor's degree in Education.

The team is in a co-op with Cranberry High School, and participated in the Class AAA District IV Playoffs four of the five seasons.

Gilman previously had stints as an assistant coach at Northern High School in Dillsburg, PA and Pittsburgh North Catholic High School. He also served as the head coach at Finley (Pa.) Junior High School, where one of the players on his team was Joe Montana.

In the summer of 2001, Gilman guided the Pennsylvania All-Stars to the gold medal in the Down Under Bowl in Australia.

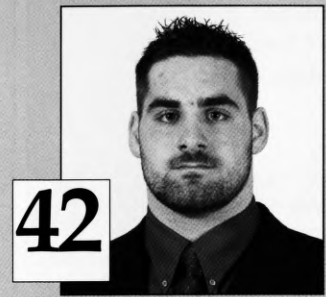

Game: Grand Valley State at Saginaw Valley State; October 16 at Wickes Memorial Stadium
Last Meeting: Saginaw Valley State 34, Grand Valley State 20 (10/18/03 at Grand Valley State)
Breakdown: Scoring over 40, 50 or even 60 points in a game is common for the Lakers of Grand Valley State University, winners of back-to-back Division II national championships. However, the strength of last year's title team lied in a defense that yielded only three points to each of its last three playoff opponents. Former defensive coordinator Chuck Martin took over as head coach this year and hopes his Lakers can avenge their only loss from the past two seasons. Star quarterback Cullen Finnerty will do all he can to deliver, but Saginaw Valley's signal-caller, Mark Radlinski, has repeat on his mind.

Game: Kansas State at Missouri; November 6 at Faurot Field
Last Meeting: Kansas State 24, Missouri 14 (11/22/03 at Kansas State)
Breakdown: It is a wide-open race in the North Division of the Big 12 this season, and Kansas State and Missouri are right in the thick of it. Two of the nation's most electrifying players should fill the highlight reels in this one. Kansas State's Darren Sproles, who led the nation with 1,986 rushing yards in 2003, is pushing for 2,000 this season. Meanwhile Brad Smith, Missouri's versatile quarterback, gained at least 2,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in each of the past two seasons, becoming the first player in NCAA history to do so. Whichever big-play threat strikes more often could determine the outcome.

Game: Toledo at Northern Illinois; November 10 at Huskie Stadium
Last Meeting: Toledo 49, Northern Illinois 30 (11/15/03 at Toledo)
Breakdown: The MAC's best 1-2 punch is once again striking fear into opposing defenses in 2004. Quarterback Bruce Gradkowski, in his second year as the Rockets' starter, broke the school record for completion percentage (71.2) and touchdown passes (29) in his first season behind center. His No. 1 target, Lance Moore, hauled in 103 receptions in 2003 and could be a factor in the Biletnikoff Award race. Trying to shut down this dynamic duo this time around will be an experienced Northern Illinois secondary, led by seniors Rob Lee at cornerback and Lionel Hickenbottom lined up at free safety.

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CLASSICS WITH A TWIST

Close CALLS

Every championship season features great talent, determination and inspired coaching. It also has that one game, that one close shave, which stands out as a thrilling near-miss. Here are three such games from three title winners.

1969: Texas 15, Arkansas 14

How big was this one? Well, President Nixon traveled to rainy Fayetteville to watch top-ranked Texas take on No. 2 Arkansas. When Arkansas' quarterback Bill Montgomery hit Chuck Dicus with a 29-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter, Arkansas had a 14-0 lead and looked comfortable. But back came Texas. Quarterback James Street ripped off a 42-yard scoring run, and Texas converted the two-point play to trim the gap to 14-8. With 7:58 to play, Texas faced a fourth-and-three from its own 43. Instead of trying the run--Texas led the nation on the ground with their vaunted wishbone--Street surprised Arkansas by hitting tight end Randy Peschel with a razor-sharp 44-yard pass. Two plays later, Jim Bertelsen scored on a two-yard run. Happy Feller's extra-point conversion made it 15-14, and Tom Campbell's late interception preserved the win. Less than a month later, on New Year's Day, Texas upended Notre Dame, 21-17, to finish a perfect 11-0 and take the national title.

1975: Oklahoma 28, Missouri 27

Oklahoma had won the national championship in 1974 and were top-ranked heading into November the following year, before stumbling against Kansas. But there was still time for Oklahoma to revitalize and hope for a number-one ranking, if OU could beat Missouri and Nebraska to finish the season. Everybody expected the meeting with Nebraska to be a doozy, but the game against Mizzou was as close as a blade can get to your face. Although Oklahoma bolted to a 20-0 lead, thanks to the use of an unbalanced line formation that confounded the Missouri, Missouri barreled back with four straight touchdowns. Although Mizzou kicker Tim Gibbons missed the extra point following the fourth score, things still looked good for them, leading 27-20. Then

came the lightning. OU halfback Joe Washington took a pitch from Steve Davis and cut through Missouri for a 71-yard touchdown run with 4:20 to play. Washington then ran over Missouri's Kenny Downing for the two-point conversion, giving Oklahoma a 28-27 win. A week later, Oklahoma routed Nebraska, 35-10. On Jan. 1, the OU disposed of Michigan, 14-6, in their Bowl Game to earn their second straight national crown.

1997: Michigan 28, Iowa 24

It had been a dream until this point. Dismissed by some as mediocre and expected to struggle in the conference, much less compete for national laurels, Michigan entertained Iowa with a perfect 5-0 mark and hopes of greatness. By halftime, all of that was in jeopardy. Iowa held a 21-7 lead and looked poised to cut down Michigan. But Michigan wasn't about to quit. Michigan tied the game in the third quarter on a 10-yard scoring pass from Brian Griese to Russell Shaw and a one-yard sneak by Griese. Iowa answered back with a Zach Bromert field goal that made it 24-21 and set up a dramatic fourth-quarter comeback. With time winding down, Griese drove Michigan down the field and then calmly hit tight end Jerame Tuman with a two-yard pass in the end zone. When Sam Sword intercepted an Iowa aerial in the final minute, Michigan had a whisker-close 28-24 win and a still-perfect record. Nearly two months later, Michigan concluded their magical season by gliding into the Bowl Game and whipping Washington State to capture a national championship.

Season after season, championship teams face these rough obstacles at least once. These three games are just an example of how dramatic and satisfying a close shave can be. ☺

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TOTAL COMMITMENT

The success garnered by the BYU Cougars during LaVell Edwards' 29-year tenure on the sidelines has earned the legendary head coach induction into the College Football Hall of Fame **BY WILLIAM K. WOLFRUM**

In the late-1970s to the mid-'80s, there was but one game a year that could accurately be considered a "can't-miss game." Year in and year out, the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl provided more thrills than most other bowl games combined, with Brigham Young University always in the mix.

"I look at them now and wonder how I survived those games," former BYU head coach LaVell Edwards said. "We were going along thinking there was no way you can ever win it."

BYU managed to win the Holiday Bowl four times in seven tries under Edwards, though it could have been worse. In 1980, the Cougars overcame a 45-25 fourth-quarter deficit to beat SMU, 46-45, on a final-play Hail Mary pass from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown.

Another improbable victory came in 1983, when Edwards rolled the dice, trailing Missouri, 17-14, with 30 seconds left. The call was "Fake right, 28 quarterback screen left" and quarterback Steve Young corralled a 14-yard touchdown pass from tailback Eddie Stinnett to give the Cougars a 21-17 victory.

"It was a lousy call," Edwards confessed. "One of their

defensive backs read it and just missed the interception, and then Steve caught it on his outstretched fingers. One of our wide receivers clipped someone down the field and that wasn't called. I guess it was meant to be."

Just as it was meant to be that Edwards will join other coaching greats this season by being inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame.

"This is the epitome of what can happen to you when you get into this profession," said Edwards, 73. "This just seems to cap everything."

To sum up Edwards' accomplishments at BYU as just "everything" would be a disservice to him. In his 29 seasons at the Provo, Utah, school, Edwards' Cougars went 257-101-3, winning the Western Athletic Conference an astounding 20 times. In 1984, Edwards led BYU to the school's only national championship, a feat Edwards believes is likely impossible for the Cougars to repeat.

"We'd have never even gotten a chance the way it's set up now. I'm not even totally sure we'd get a BCS bowl," said Edwards, who still resides in Utah. "In 1996, we were 13-1 and didn't get a sniff from the bowl coalition."

It was after the 1984 championship season that Edwards was offered his most tempting opportunity to leave BYU, when the Detroit Lions offered him their head coach opening.

"I used to think that if I got an NFL offer that I'd take it," Edwards said. "When I finally got the opportunity, I just didn't do it. When it came right down to it, I couldn't bring myself to leave. Obviously it turned out for the best."

Family is where Edwards, a life-long Mormon, found his base amongst the rigors of big-time college football. He and wife Patti have three children and 14 grandchildren. Of his 53-year marriage, Edwards' notorious wry wit emerges: "I think we might have a shot [at lasting]."

Lasting was never a problem for Edwards, and he bowed out of BYU in 2000 with the same class he brought to the job. While occasionally doing work for Church of Latter-Day Saints, Edwards is now retired and spends time on golf courses and rooting on grandchildren at sporting events.

Looking back, he seems to still be amazed his run at BYU happened.

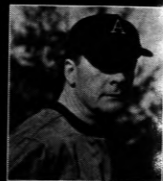
"All I thought about the first couple years is that if I had a good enough year, I'll be able to coach again for a couple more years," Edwards said. "I got a chance to do it until I turned 70, so it worked." ■

EARL "RED" BLAIK, CLASS OF '64

Earl "Red" Blaik, elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1964, spiced football and the military to perfection in his illustrious career.



After a brief stint at Dartmouth, Blaik took over the head coaching position at Army in 1941, winning 166 games and two national championships before retiring in 1958.

His fingerprints remain all over the college football landscape, from his creation of the "lonesome end" offense, to his three Heisman Trophy winners—Glenn Davis, Doc Blanchard and Pete Dawkins. One of his assistant coaches was the great Vince Lombardi.

Blaik died on May 6, 1989, leaving a legacy of leadership at Army and in college football. —WKW

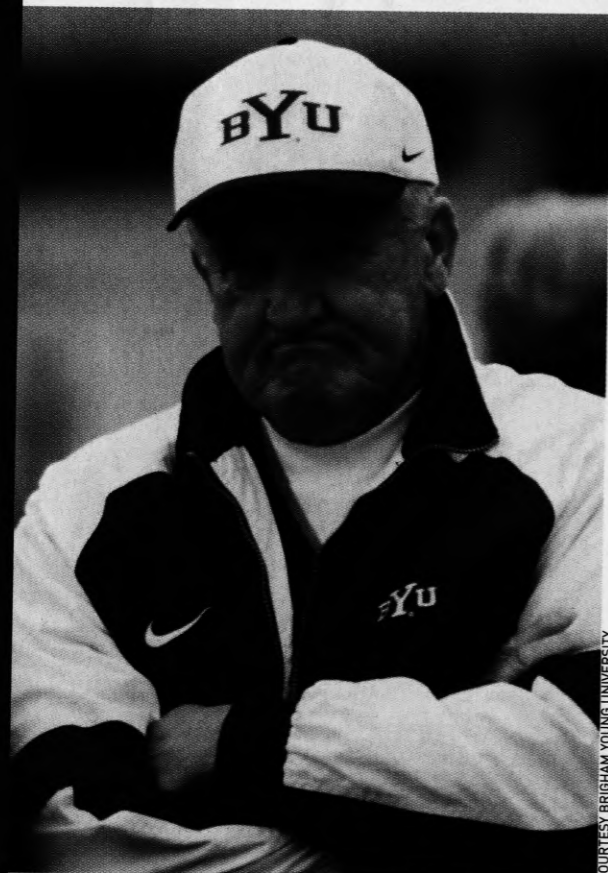

In Edwards' 29 seasons at Brigham Young, the Cougars won 257 games, 20 conference titles and the 1984 national championship.

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The adventure started from midfield, with just a second left and the 'Noles holding a newly minted four-point lead. The then-freshman was flushed left and took off, weaving through Florida State defenders. At the 40, most thought he was crazy for not having thrown a prayer into the end zone. And maybe he should have done it. But at the 30, people started to get a little excited. By the time he hit the 20, the stadium was agog. But too many Seminoles were waiting at the 18, and they forced him out of bounds. Magic show over.

"It was a great run, but those are the types of plays you learn from," Florida head coach Ron Zook says. "I have to give him a lot of credit for the things he did accomplish."

Leak had unveiled an afternoon of tricks. He threw for 273 yards, and he completed 22 passes—the most ever by a freshman at the pass-happy school. And if P.K. Sam hadn't serpentine under a Chris Rix rainbow in the last minute, Leak would have led the Gators to their sixth win in a row. Instead, he had to settle for just amazing

onlookers and the TV audience. And letting everybody know that more wizardry was coming in the future.

It's coming all right. Even if Leak were some ordinary sophomore, he would show improvement. That's just how it is in college. A year older. Wiser. More mature. But what can we expect from someone who threw

It looked like he could. He might. There were sure a lot of Florida State Seminoles in his way. And a lot of green Florida Field turf to cover. **Maybe. Perhaps.**

It didn't happen. Chris Leak didn't get into the end zone in the dying seconds against Florida State on a crazy, improbable scramble from the pocket that ended a crazy, improbable game. FSU won, 38-34, but when it was all over, everybody knew. They knew that all Leak needed was another few seconds. Another block. And he would have done it—even if "it" wasn't exactly what he should have done.

for 2,435 yards in a rookie season that included just nine starts? Too much. Or maybe just enough. If Florida is to get back among the national elite—and the Gators took some definite steps in that direction in 2003—it will do so behind Leak.

Not that he will don a drum major's outfit and parade the team back into prominence. No, sir. You won't find too many more unassuming top-shelf athletes on a college campus. At least that's the Leak persona in public. He's all about the team, all about winning. He does his job, and he helps others do theirs. It's boring as heck, except for Saturday afternoon.

"He has both feet firmly on the ground," says Ed Zaunbrecher, last year's Gator offensive coordinator and the 2004 quarterbacks coach. "He knows he's capable of doing things, but he also knows that it's a team

game. He's not vocal, but the players respond to him because he leads by example through his preparation."

You might say Leak has been preparing for a starting job since he was a young boy. That's when his father, Curtis, who had spent some time in NFL training camps as a wideout, ran Chris and his older brother, C.J., through backyard workouts.

"I have been around football for so long," Chris says. The mini-camps obviously paid off. C.J. was one of the nation's most highly regarded recruits in 1999 and signed with Wake Forest. (He later transferred to Tennessee.)

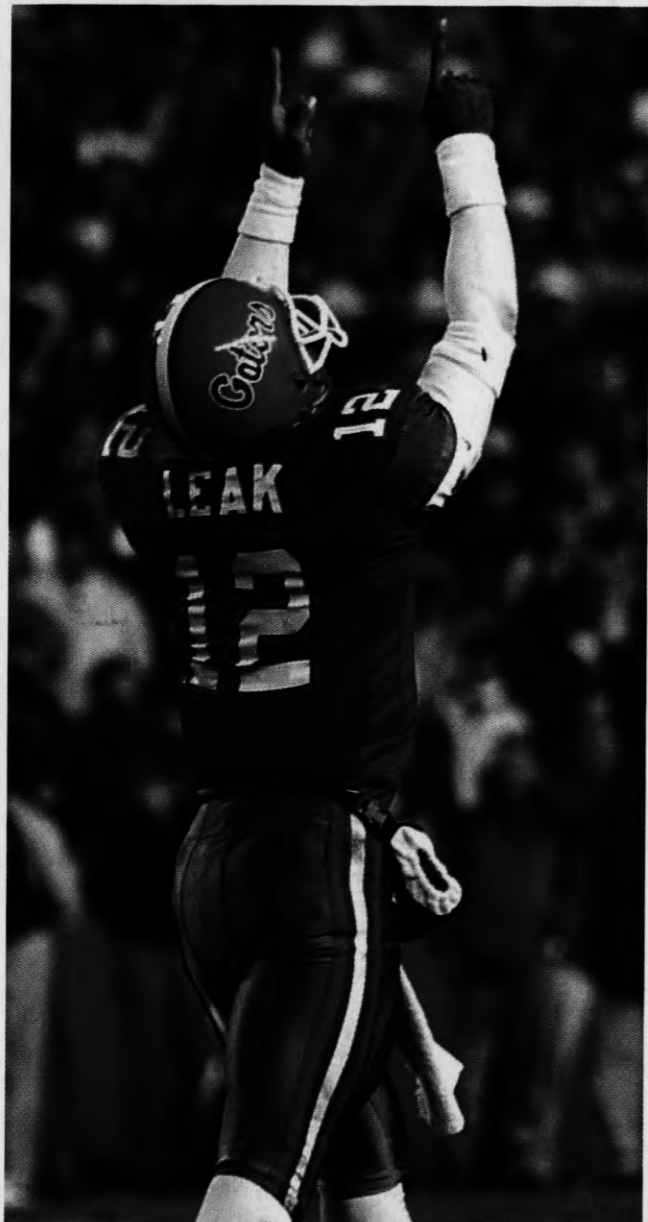
By the time Chris was a prep senior, he had spawned even more recruiting hysteria by setting a national high school record with 185 career touchdown passes and throwing for 15,593 yards—second-best ever. He led Independence High School (Charlotte, N.C.) to three straight state titles and won enough awards to open his own trophy store. His "short" list of college choices read like the Associated Press top 10.

"My brother told me to take my time and go with my heart," Leak says. After a visit to Gainesville, Leak's heart said, "Florida."

"When I came down on my visit, I saw that they cared about their players," he says. "Everybody cared about everybody."

The Gators weren't exactly sitting around campfires at night singing "Kumbaya," but they demonstrated some unity during the 2003 season by banding together in the face of criticism about their '02 performance—an

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BACK TO SCHOOL

Believe it or not, sophomore outside linebacker Richard Brown made the switch from professional baseball to college football in order to get healthy. It was a sound strategy—at first.

Brown had battled shoulder problems for years during his stint in the New York Yankees organization, and each new surgery made it harder for him to throw and cost him ground in his quest to reach the majors.

"Baseball is a very detailed game," Brown says. "You can play with some injuries in football, but you can't do that so well in baseball."

So, what happens in the second game in which Brown saw action in 2003? You got it. He tore his ACL and was done for the season. Brown had surgery on his knee. Then, he had the cranky shoulder fixed up. He entered the 2004 season hoping to put the pain and hurt behind him and become an ordinary football player. OK, an ordinary football player who is 24 years old with a wife and two kids.

Brown signed with the Yankees in 1995, right out of high school.

"The money looked good, and we were a poor family," he says. "I thought I could help my mother out right away."

Things looked great for Brown, as he moved up to Class AAA Columbus, but his bad shoulder led to thoughts about the gridiron. He had signed with Florida State out of Nova (Fla.) High School before the Major League Baseball Draft. So his first call was to Mark Richt, the former FSU coordinator now the head coach at Georgia. But he eventually took a visit to Gainesville, liked what he saw and decided to play for the Gators.

This fall, the 6-0, 225-pounder expects to show off his quickness and athletic ability.

"I'm excited about Richard," Florida head coach Ron Zook says. "His maturity is such a delight."

Expect to see Brown on special teams and as part of the regular linebacker rotation.

And not in the infirmary—for once. —MB



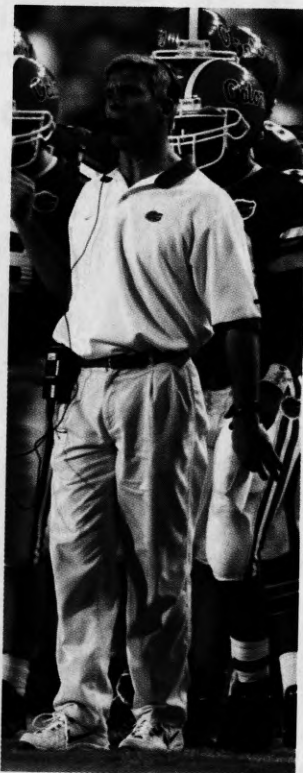

uncharacteristic 8-5 record—and some pretty loud calls for Zook's resignation (or worse).

It wasn't easy. The season started with big questions about the quarterback position, which was left empty thanks to Rex Grossman's decision to leave a year early for the NFL. Leak, Ingle Martin and Gavin Dickey competed for the job, but none distinguished himself enough to grab the position outright until Leak took over in week five against Kentucky.

"The one thing you never know is how someone is going to handle that," Zook says. "There was no question Chris was talented, but it takes a lot of maturity to be a starting quarterback in the Southeastern Conference. Once we made the decision, we couldn't stick him in there and, the first time something went wrong, yank him out. I told him to go out and play."

It was good advice. Leak threw for 268 yards in a win over Kentucky and went 6-1 in SEC play, leading the Gators



to wins over Georgia and LSU. He improved every week, and though the season ended with losses to Florida State and Iowa (in the Outback Bowl), Leak was clearly the right choice to lead the team.

Each week, Zaunbrecher opened the offense up a little more. While Leak wasn't operating the entire attack by late November, he was piloting a scheme that had been tailored to his talents, with various packages cherry-picked especially for him. It's what most offensive coordinators do with young quarterbacks. Instead of overloading them with too much information, they pare things down. Though it didn't allow the Gators to be as wide-open as they could have been, it optimized Leak's performance.

"The offense was similar to what we did in high school," Leak says. "They made some things easier for me, but I was used to working at a quick tempo, and we used a lot of the same routes we did in high school. It made the adjustment easier."

The real work for Leak began after the Iowa loss. Quarterbacks thrown into action in their first years have little time to step back and assess their performances. They live week to week, game plan to game plan, trying to digest what must be done against a certain opponent. The big picture can wait.

Last winter and spring, Leak had a chance to take a step back. He watched film. He worked on his strength and conditioning. Threw to receivers. Learned. And learned some more. Now, Leak is far more confident and comfortable within the offense.

"Even in the spring, I saw a player who was doing less thinking and more reacting," Zook says. "That in itself is great. He's letting his God-given talent take over."

And there is plenty of that. Leak throws a beautiful spiral, and accuracy is one of his strong suits—not usually the case for a quarterback so young. He completed 59.4 percent of his throws last year, a huge number for a freshman. Gator linebacker Richard Brown says he can "count on one hand" the number of times Leak hasn't thrown a perfect spiral. Zaunbrecher raves about Leak's strength. And Zook is impressed with Leak's humble approach to his work and his willingness to sacrifice for the team.

"Part of being a leader is trying to help everyone else make plays," Leak says. "My teammates know I'll stick with them and help them improve."

And make more magic. ■

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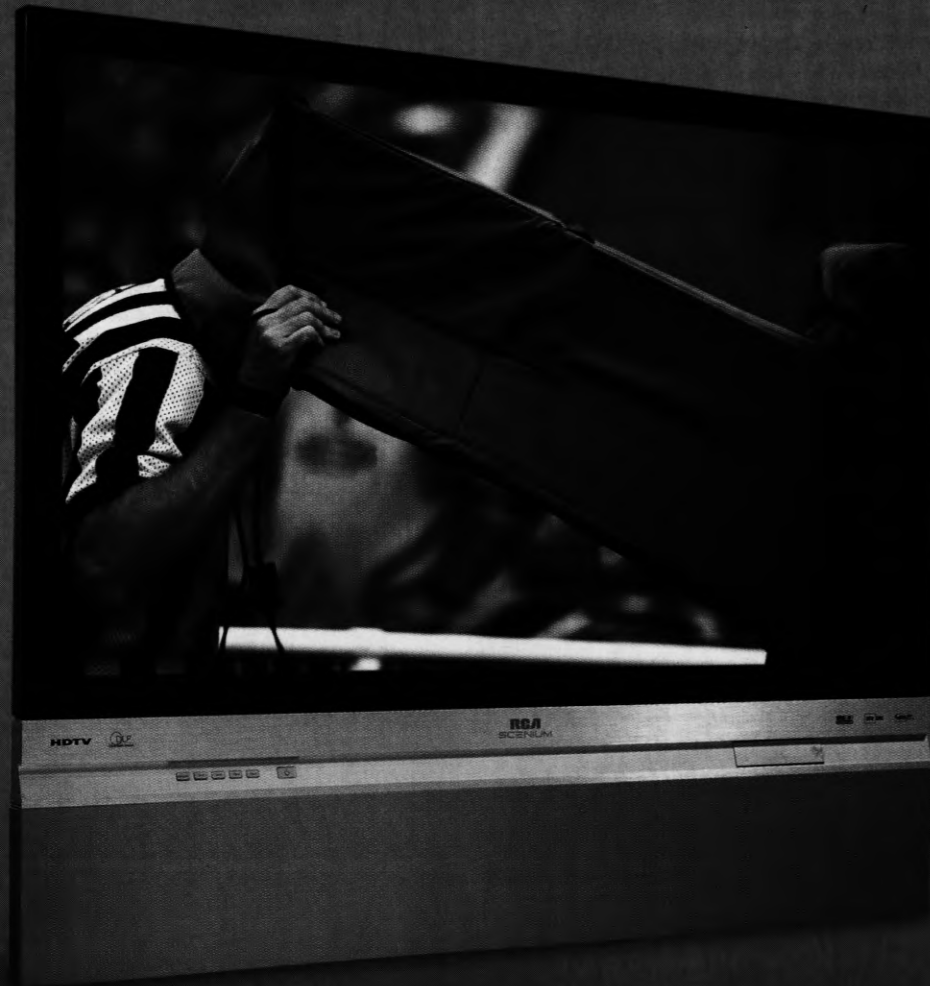
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READY, WILLING AND ABLE

Barry Alvarez' preparation as head football coach of the Badgers has helped prepare him for his dual role as the university's athletics director **BY MIKE LUCAS**

Wisconsin head coach Barry Alvarez did his homework before taking on the added responsibility of serving as the school's athletics director; a dual role shared by only one other Division I-A contemporary, Alabama-Birmingham's Watson Brown. Alvarez contacted a cross-section of people who had experience juggling the two jobs. The list included John Mackovic, who was the head coach and AD at Illinois when Alvarez took over the moribund Wisconsin program in 1990. Also on the list was UNLV's John Robinson, who, at one time, also held down both positions before eventually dropping the AD title to concentrate solely on football. Robinson stressed to Alvarez, "Don't lose your identity as a football coach."

Today, in addition to roaming the sidelines for a 15th season, Alvarez is overseeing 23 sports, 800 student-athletes and a \$58 million dollar budget. Over the last year, he has helped spearhead a massive renovation of Camp Randall Stadium that has added 72 suites and increased capacity to nearly 80,000.

"The buck now stops here," said Alvarez, who will not receive any additional financial compensation in his new dual role. Nonetheless, he will be following in the footsteps of his mentor, Bob Devaney, the former Nebraska

icon. Devaney took over a losing football program in Lincoln, turned it into a winner and established a tradition that he helped preserve his role as the athletic director.

With three Rose Bowl triumphs and the most wins (99 prior to the 2004 season) in school history, the 57-year-old Alvarez is heading down the same path. "When you build something," he said, "you want to sustain it."

TOUCHDOWN ILLUSTRATED: From the time it was announced that you'd be replacing the retiring Pat Richter as athletic director to the official takeover date, in April 2004, there was a 13-month transition period. How did that help you?

BARRY ALVAREZ: I had Pat here with me over the last year to attend the Big Ten meetings and basically make many of the decisions of the department, which has allowed me to put my senior staff in place [headed by Jamie Pollard, the deputy AD] and gradually work my way into things. I never felt like I was stretched in any way, and I was able to bounce a lot of things off Pat. What it did was give me a really

good feel for the director's job before I took over on a full-time basis.

In addition, now, I feel good about the people who are working for me, and we've had a good dialogue to where I understand them and they understand me a little bit more. Over this period, I've done more sitting back and more listening in trying to learn the different areas. I didn't try to come in and act like I had all the answers, because I didn't.

TDI: How did your coaching background prepare you to be an athletic director and, in this context, how important is delegating authority?

BA: The number one thing with a football coach is organization. You're dealing with problem solving and a number of different people, and you're trying to get everyone on the same page. So there has been a tremendous amount of carryover.

In both cases, one person can't do it all. I learned a long time ago as a young assistant coach that I wanted somebody to give me something to do, to tell me what to do and to let me do it. And if I didn't do a good job, I'd

Despite being relatively undersized for the Big Ten, the 5-11, 170-pound Williams has compensated with his competitiveness and play-making ability. Size has never been an issue for Williams, a junior from St. Louis, who volunteered, "I play big and with a certain type of swagger."

As a freshman, Williams stepped into the void created by wide receiver Lee Evans' knee injury and wound up leading the team with 52 receptions in 2002. When Evans returned last season, Williams assumed a complementary role to Evans but still managed 49 catches.

"With Lee gone now," Alvarez pointed out, "Brandon's biggest challenge will be the coverage he faces. If you're preparing for us and you have a chance to double somebody, you'll double Brandon Williams. Defenses are going to pay more attention to him. But he can handle the situation because he's such a fierce competitor."

expect changes. That's my philosophy: you have to hire good people and you have to let them do their job. In the same respect, they have to know exactly what you expect out of them and what their role is.

TDI: While playing football falls under the heading of a meritocracy—a system in which achievement is rewarded with promotion—would you agree that coaching football is closer to being a dictatorship than a democracy?

BA: That's true, because in football, you have to be a dictator. You don't have the time to take a straw poll. You don't have the time to listen to everybody's opinions. Now, there are times in staff meetings when you do. But, many times, you have to make the decision and you have to be totally controlling. That's the only way you can operate with over 100 players and all of the people who touch a major college football program. You can't be successful unless you have control.

TDI: How then is that different, if it is, from athletic administration?

BA: I think the athletic director's job is more of a consensus of a number of opinions. It's a different approach because it's a different ballgame. It's all encompassing. I can't have as narrow a vision as I do just with football. I have to have a broader vision and, consequently, I'll be taking in the information and listening and depending on more people. There will be staff members who will be closer to their specific areas of responsibility and I will listen to those people, take a consensus and come up with a decision in more of a global or democratic fashion.

TDI: What do you expect to be your biggest challenge during the football season?

BA: The demand on my time. I've already attended a lot of meetings during the slow times on the football calendar to see how things work. I just wanted to have a presence, even in meetings that normally I wouldn't have to be at. I realize that I can't be in two places at once. But I have great respect and trust in the people around me, and I'm going to have to rely on them. We've got good administrators in place, and I wouldn't have taken on this dual role if I didn't feel confident in them.

TDI: Will your success as an AD be predicated on your success as a football coach?

BA: When you take a look at the books and the numbers and the income that is generated by football, which enables us to operate this program, the stadium has to be filled and those suites have to be sold. And to do that, we have to be competitive, we have to be successful. If that slips, it slips for everyone. And there's no question that the football program can't slip.

TDI: How long do you plan on holding both titles?

BA: I will probably have a better idea at the end of the football season. Right now, I feel comfortable doing both. I feel like I have a good pulse in both areas, and I will do this as long as I feel I'm doing both jobs well. I'm enjoying sinking my teeth into being an athletic director and learning the ropes. Yet, I still love football. I still love working with players and developing a team and all the things that go along with it. I still have the goose bumps that come with the excitement of a new season. ■

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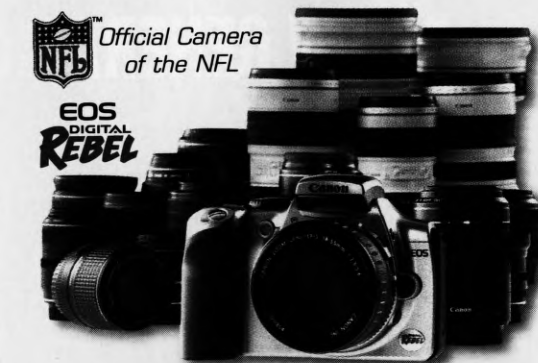

Texas A&M transfers Derek Farmer and Dustin Long are sparking excitement and feeling at home in the Southland Conference **BY BOB FULTON**



Dustin Long was a bawling baby when Stephen F. Austin head coach Mike Santiago first laid eyes on him.

Come Oct. 30, a grown-up Long—now the quarterback at Sam Houston State—could prove more troublesome to his former babysitter than he ever was as a diaper-filling infant.

The annual Texas shootout between the Southland Conference foes will also reunite Long and Lumberjacks tailback Derek Farmer, teammates a year ago at Texas A&M before a lack of playing time prompted their transfer to the nearby Division I-AA schools.

"It'll be fun," said Long, a 6-3, 210-pound senior from Port Neches, Texas. "Me and Derek were friends at A&M. Sam Houston State and Stephen F. Austin are rivals, so it's a big game no matter what. That we're friends just adds a little bit to it."

As will Long's link to the opposing coach.

"When I was a grad assistant at Lamar, my first coaching job, Dustin's dad was our quarterback," said Santiago. "Mike and Kim had Dustin when they were students there. And a couple times I baby-sat him so they could have a night out."

If Santiago had his hands full back then, imagine the predicament he'll face Oct. 30. Given that Long threw for 661 yards and completed 59 percent of his passes last



year in the competitive Big 12 Conference—highlighted by a 21-for-27, 241-yard performance against Missouri—he's a bona fide threat to pick apart Southland secondaries, not to mention make the Bearkats contenders in the conference.

"Dustin's arrival has helped energize our entire team," said Sam Houston State head coach Ron Randleman.

Running back Derek Farmer (above) and quarterback Dustin Long (left) have given Stephen F. Austin and Sam Houston State, respectively, a huge boost this season.

"There's a feeling that with a player the caliber of Dustin, we've got a chance to have a real good season. There's probably more excitement around our football program than we've had for a couple years, and Dustin's a big part of that."

There's excitement, too, at Stephen F. Austin, where Farmer figures to have an enormous impact. After all, he led Texas A&M in rushing as a freshman (503 yards) and sophomore (739), piled up 122 yards against 10th-ranked Texas in 2002 and enjoyed a career-best 133-yard game vs. Iowa State the year before.

The 5-11, 205-pound senior gained 340 yards last season in a diminished role (the emergence of freshman Courtney Lewis reduced his workload). Farmer averaged only 6.8 carries per game, which convinced him a change of scenery was in order.

Division I-A transfers like Long and Farmer often blossom at lower-level programs. Here are some examples from recent years:

- Quarterback **Dusty Bonner** twice won the Harlon Hill trophy as the premier Division II player in the nation (2000 & '01) after leaving Kentucky for Valdosta State. In two seasons with the Blazers, Bonner completed 71 percent of his passes for 8,163 yards and 107 touchdowns, and led VSU to a 22-3 record.

- Quarterback **Andy Hall** and defensive end **Shawn Johnson** spearheaded Delaware's charge to the Division I-AA championship last year, earned first-team All-America honors and were selected in the sixth round of the NFL draft. Hall, a transfer from Georgia Tech, threw for 2,764 yards, rushed for another 710 and was named Atlantic 10 Conference Offensive Player of the Year. Johnson, who played three seasons at Duke, recorded 13 1/2 sacks and was named the A-10 Defensive Player of the Year.

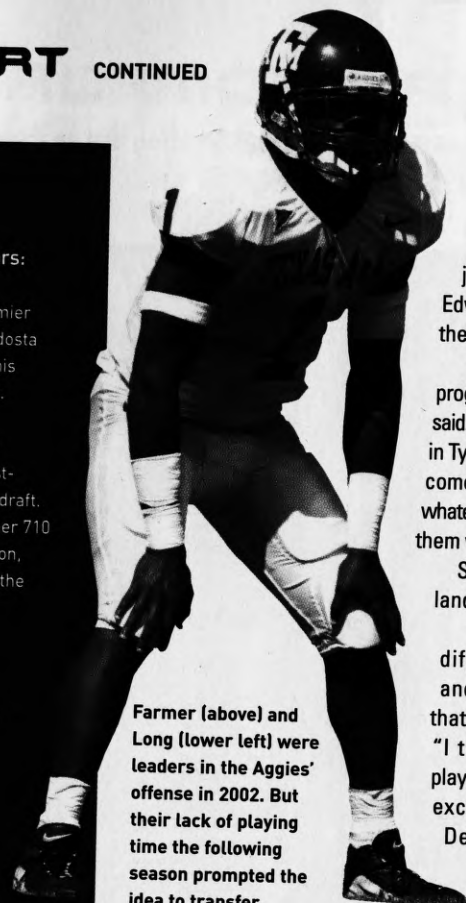
- **Edgerton Hartwell**, who starts at linebacker for the Baltimore Ravens, transferred from Wisconsin to Western Illinois, where he won the Buck Buchanan Award in 2000 as the most outstanding defensive player in I-AA and led the nation with 191 tackles.

- After transferring from Nebraska, **Austin Forster** rushed for 2,792 yards in three seasons at Chadron State, piled up 4,302 all-purpose yards and scored 30 touchdowns.

- Quarterback **Josh Blankenship**, who transferred from Tulsa, threw for 3,243 yards and 30 touchdowns as an Eastern Washington senior in 2002 and was named the Big Sky Conference Offensive Player of the Year.

- **P.J. Mays**, a transfer from Cincinnati, rushed for 2,730 yards and scored 35 touchdowns in his last two seasons at Youngstown State and earned Gateway Conference Offensive Player of the Year honors in 2001.

He cast his lot with the Lumberjacks, who can also call on Cliff Edwards—Farmer's cousin—to lug the ball.

"Stephen F. Austin has a great program and a solid tradition," Farmer said. "The fact that it's close to my home in Tyler was also a factor. I wanted to come here, display my talents and do whatever I could to help the team, to help them win a championship."

Santiago was positively thrilled to land a player of Farmer's pedigree.

"We felt like we needed a difference-maker at tailback, and Derek has really answered that need for us," Santiago noted. "I think he can be an excellent player at this level. I think he was an excellent player at Texas A&M."

Derek was the leading rusher down there for two years, and I think that's something he deserves to try to be

again. And he'll get that opportunity here."

Opportunity's call also beckoned Long. Sophomore Reggie McNeal took most of the snaps last year at A&M, so Long said "so long" and looked to make a fresh start elsewhere. He wound up at Sam Houston State.

"I like the type of offense they run here," Long said. "They throw it around a lot, have more of a pro-style offense, so if I want to go to the next level, this is a good offense to see what I can do. You always think if you have that one good year, people will notice you. You never know what could happen."

Long certainly wouldn't mind if lightning strikes twice. Josh McCown transferred to Sam Houston State from SMU for one season (2001), won conference Player of the Year honors and now plays for the Arizona Cardinals.

That's not to suggest every transfer thrives in his new environment.

"Just because a guy's coming from I-A doesn't automatically make him a player in I-AA," said Santiago. "We're honestly getting about a 50-50 success rate on I-A transfers. Some of them come in and end up being backups for us. Some come in and are really great players. I think Derek's going to be one of those guys."

Farmer's former Texas A&M teammate is expected to flourish, too. Just as he did as a new addition to the Long family, the new addition to the Sam Houston State family hopes to make some noise this season, especially when he's reunited with his babysitter.

Only this time, Mike Santiago's worst fear won't be a bawling infant filling his diaper. It'll be a grown-up Dustin Long filling the air with footballs. ■

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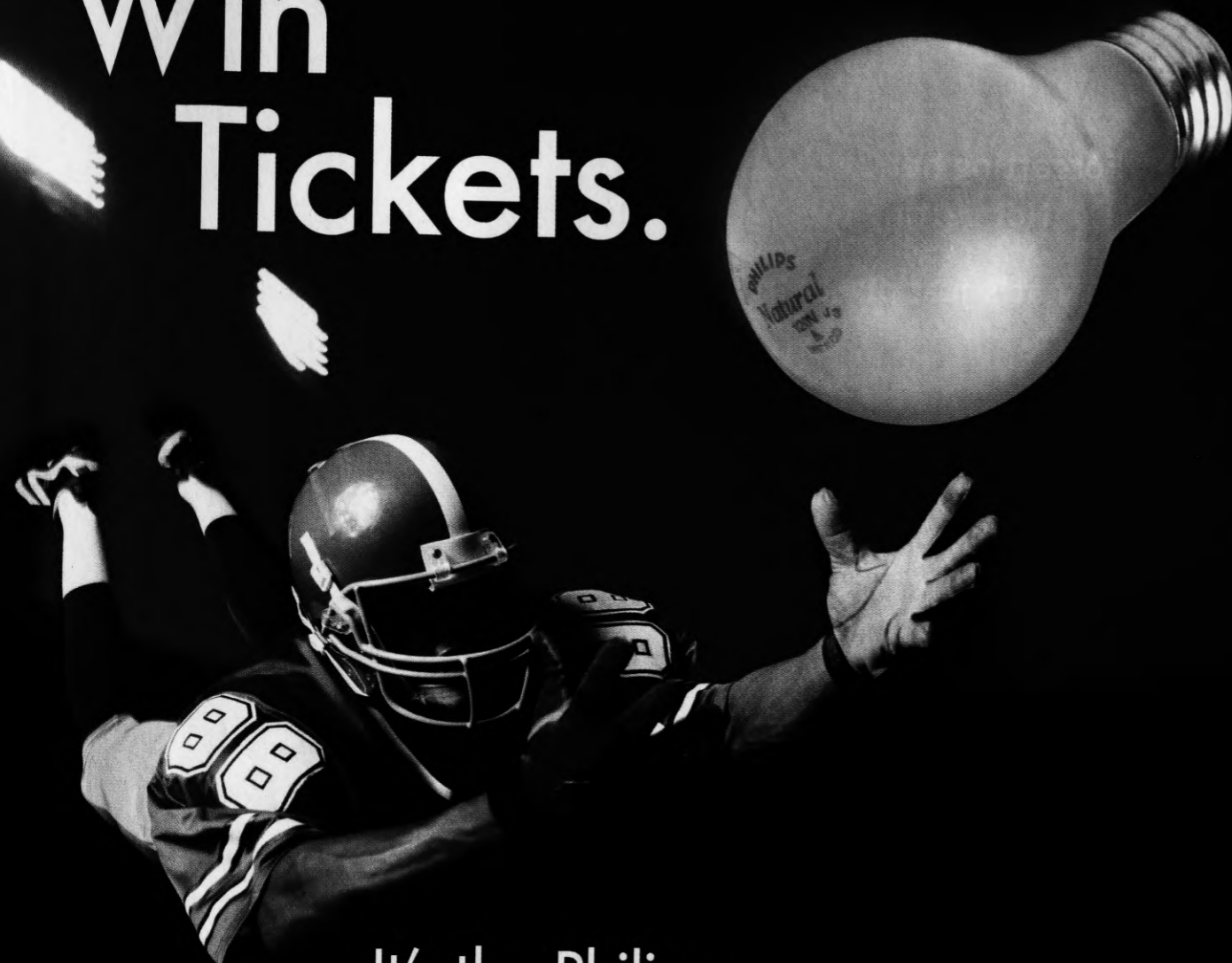

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TRUE GRIT

Hard work and determination made College Football Hall of Famers Tony Casillas and Tracy Rocker two of the best defensive linemen to ever play the game **BY MATT KALMAN**

The Lombardi Trophy—given each year to the nation's best collegiate lineman—along with conference titles and NFL stints already dotted their resumé. Now, Tony Casillas and Tracy Rocker boast another similarity because both were selected among the 2004 College Football Hall of Fame induction class.

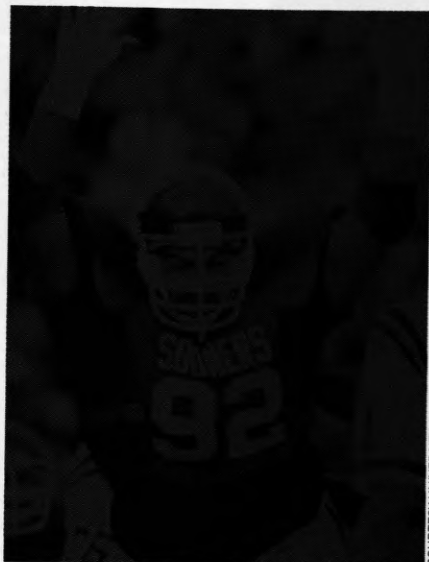
Casillas, a two-time consensus All-America selection at Oklahoma, and Rocker, a unanimous First-Team All-America selection in 1988 and a consensus pick in '87 at Auburn, were two of the most menacing defensive linemen in the history of the game. Both, however, were awed by their selections.

"I'd been nominated a number of times, but when I actually got voted in, it was such a surprise," said Rocker. "The biggest thing to me is thinking about all the people that had an effect on me and helped me become a great football player."

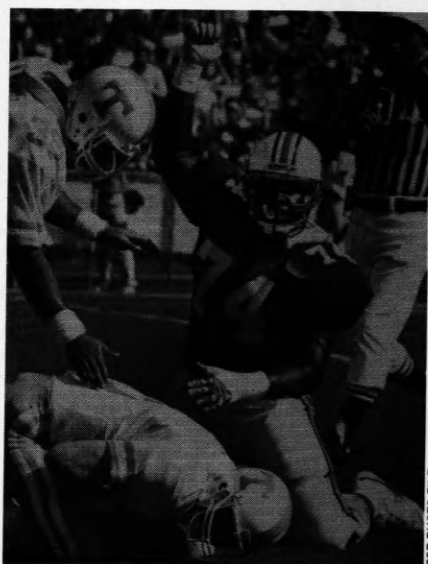
Said Casillas: "Any time you get recognized by any Hall of Fame, it's kind of humbling. It shows that there are people who respected what you did as an athlete on the football field, and it distinguishes you as a great player."

Casillas, a star for the Sooners from 1982-85, won the Lombardi as a senior, the same season he led Oklahoma to an Orange Bowl win against Penn State—a game he remembers as his biggest collegiate highlight—and the school's first national title in 10 years. A two-time All-Big Eight performer, Casillas was named the conference's Defensive Player of the Year and National Lineman of the Year by UPI in 1984. He was selected second overall in the 1986 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons. Overall, he played for four different NFL teams in his career, including the Dallas Cowboys, with whom he won two Super Bowl titles.

Rocker, a Tigers competitor from 1985-88, was the first SEC player ever to win both the Lombardi and the Outland Trophies in the same year (1988). He was also the SEC's

Defensive Player of the Year. Auburn won two SEC titles during Rocker's tenure, and the three-time First-Team All-SEC selection lists the Tigers' three-game winning streak versus archrival Alabama as his best collegiate memory. Rocker followed his collegiate career by playing three years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins.

In the intangibles department, both players shared a key to success: grit.

"My key was hard work," said Rocker. "I played with some great players and any one of them could've been me. Hard work and dedication, and even making a commitment to what I wanted to be [was the difference]."

"I think it was just my relentless determination," Casillas said. "I just had a tenacity that wasn't really coachable. A lot of guys are built like Tarzan, but play like Jane. They don't have the tenacity to go along with their playing attributes. I wasn't the biggest guy, but I was able to overcome that with my tenacity on the field."

With his playing days behind him, Casillas has carved out a successful career as president of T.C. Oil and Gas Company and as a radio broadcaster. Rocker has

stayed on the field as an assistant coach at Troy State, Western Alabama, Cincinnati and Arkansas, where he currently coaches the defensive linemen.

"It's been great. I never thought I'd be on this side of the profession," said Rocker. "I had a great college playing career and, hopefully, I'll be a great college football coach. I don't foresee myself as a head coach, but as a defensive coordinator. That's what I want to do." ■

20 YEARS AGO...

"MEAN" JOE GREENE, CLASS OF '84

Setting a whole new level of ferocity in the late 1960s, "Mean" Joe Greene frightened all offensive players and coordinators as one of the nation's premiere defensive tackles for North Texas State University from 1966-68. The 6-4, 270-pound Greene led North Texas to a 23-5-1 record during his tenure, and in his 29 games, the Mean Green, as they were known, limited opponents 2,507 rushing yards on the ground on 1,276 attempts—that's less than two yards per carry.

A 1968 consensus All-America selection, Greene was a first-round draft pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers. He won four Super Bowl titles as a key member of Pittsburgh's "Steel Curtain" defense before he earned induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1987.

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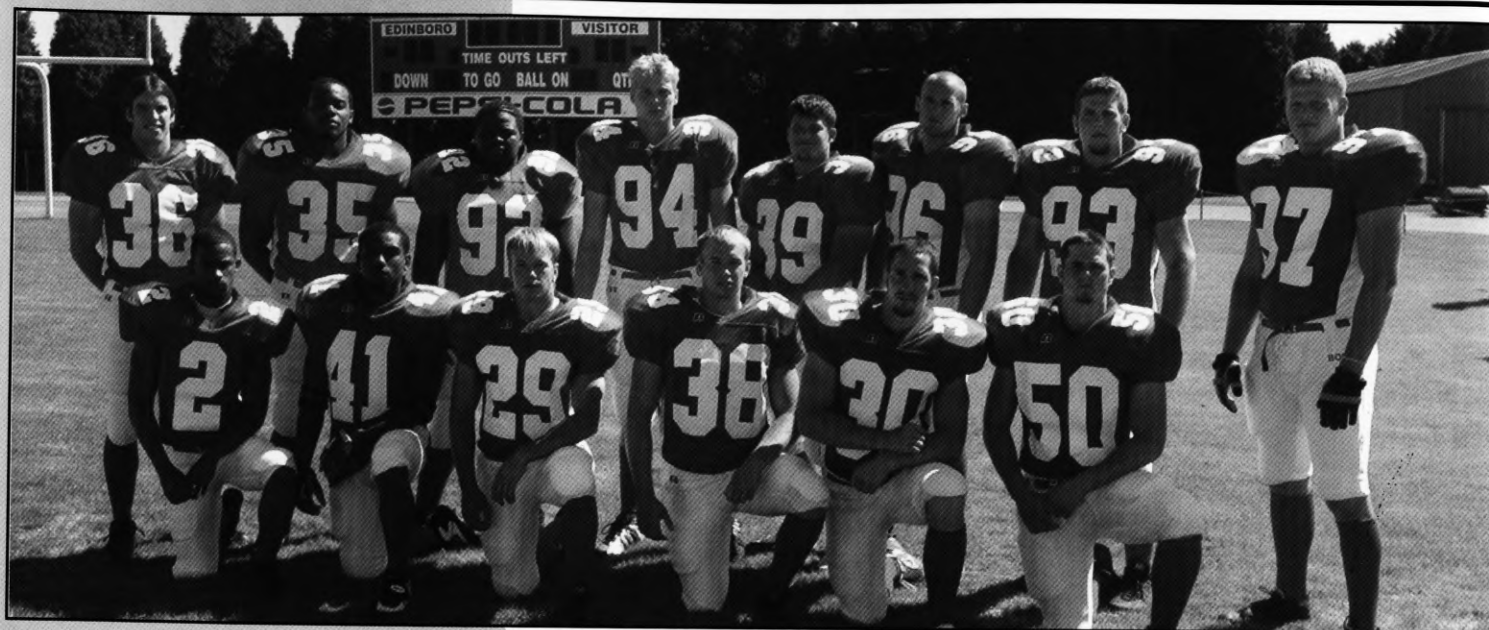
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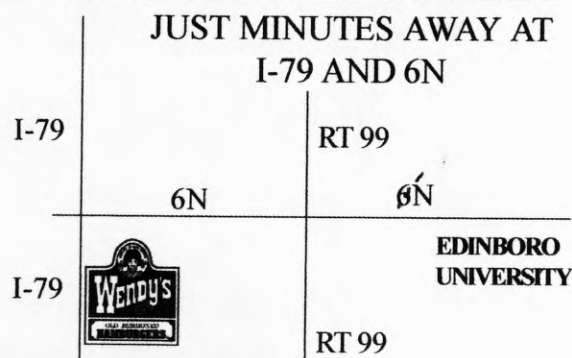
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Edinboro Marching Band

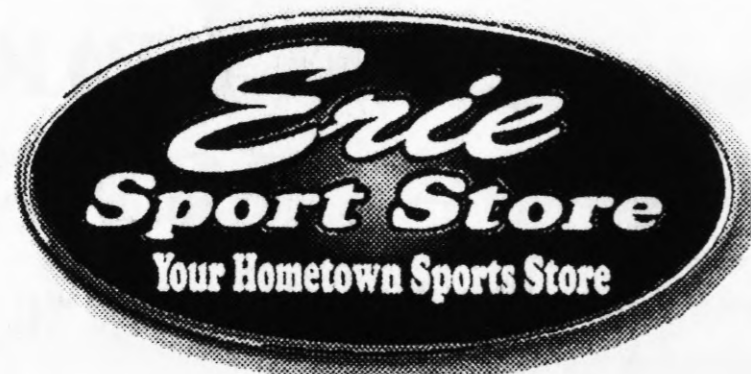

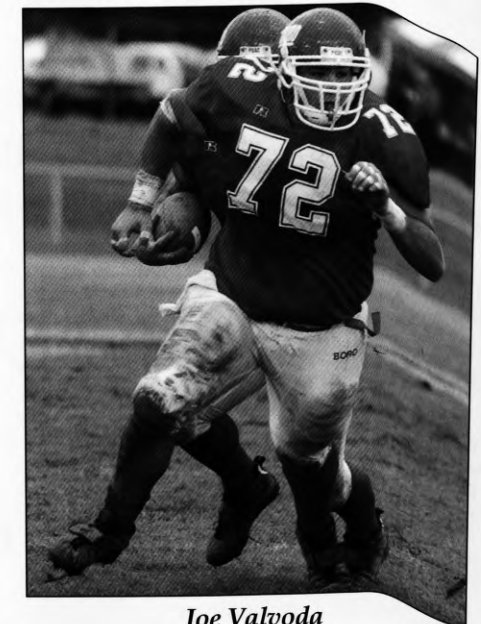

Lipscomb Streak Up to 28 Games

Justin Lipscomb was held to a season-low 3 receptions against California(Pa.), but that was still good enough to hold the junior wide receiver boost his streak to 28 straight games at least one catch.

Fighting Scots in the NCAA Statistics

Edinboro is ranked 17th in Division II in rushing defense (93.3 ypg.) and 29th in scoring defense (18.0 ppg.). Individually, Andre Burke stands seventh in the country in rushing (142.2 ypg.), third in scoring (13.0 ppg.) and is 19th in all-purpose yards (152.5 ypg.). Justin Bouch ranks 24th in passing efficiency (139.6). Jim Soltis and Tom Davidson are tied for 12th in interceptions with 4 apiece.

Red Zone Offense Very Efficient

When Edinboro dropped a 20-7 decision to East Stroudsburg to open the season, one factor was a poor performance in the red zone. The Fighting Scots managed just one score in three trips inside the ESU 20. Since that time Edinboro has experienced a turnaround in the red zone. The Scots have driven into the red zone 22 times in the last five games, scoring 17 touchdowns and kicking three field goals. That's scores in 20 out of 22 trips. All told, Edinboro has been in the red zone 25 times, with 18 TDs and 3 FGs.

Kody at 17 and Counting

Sophomore placekicker Kody Robertson all three of his field goal attempts and has made 23 of 24 extra points. That includes a string of 17 consecutive extra points. His last miss came against WVU Tech.

On the Injury Front

Senior tight end C.J. Trivisonno, a second team All-PSAC West selection a year ago, was injured early in the season and has missed the last four games. He will take an injury redshirt season and return for his final season next year. The secondary has been without expected starters Raji El-Amin and Jermaine Truax literally since the second quarter of the season opener against East Stroudsburg. The duo started at free safety and cornerback, respectively, but it is uncertain when either will be back. El-Amin set a school record with 9 interceptions last year while earning All-American honors. Truax was in his first year as a starter.

Next for the Fighting Scots

Edinboro once again hits the highways with back-to-back road games before playing its season finale at home. The Fighting Scots are at Slippery Rock on Saturday, October 23. Kickoff is 2:00 p.m.

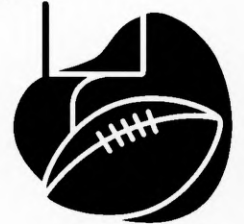


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
