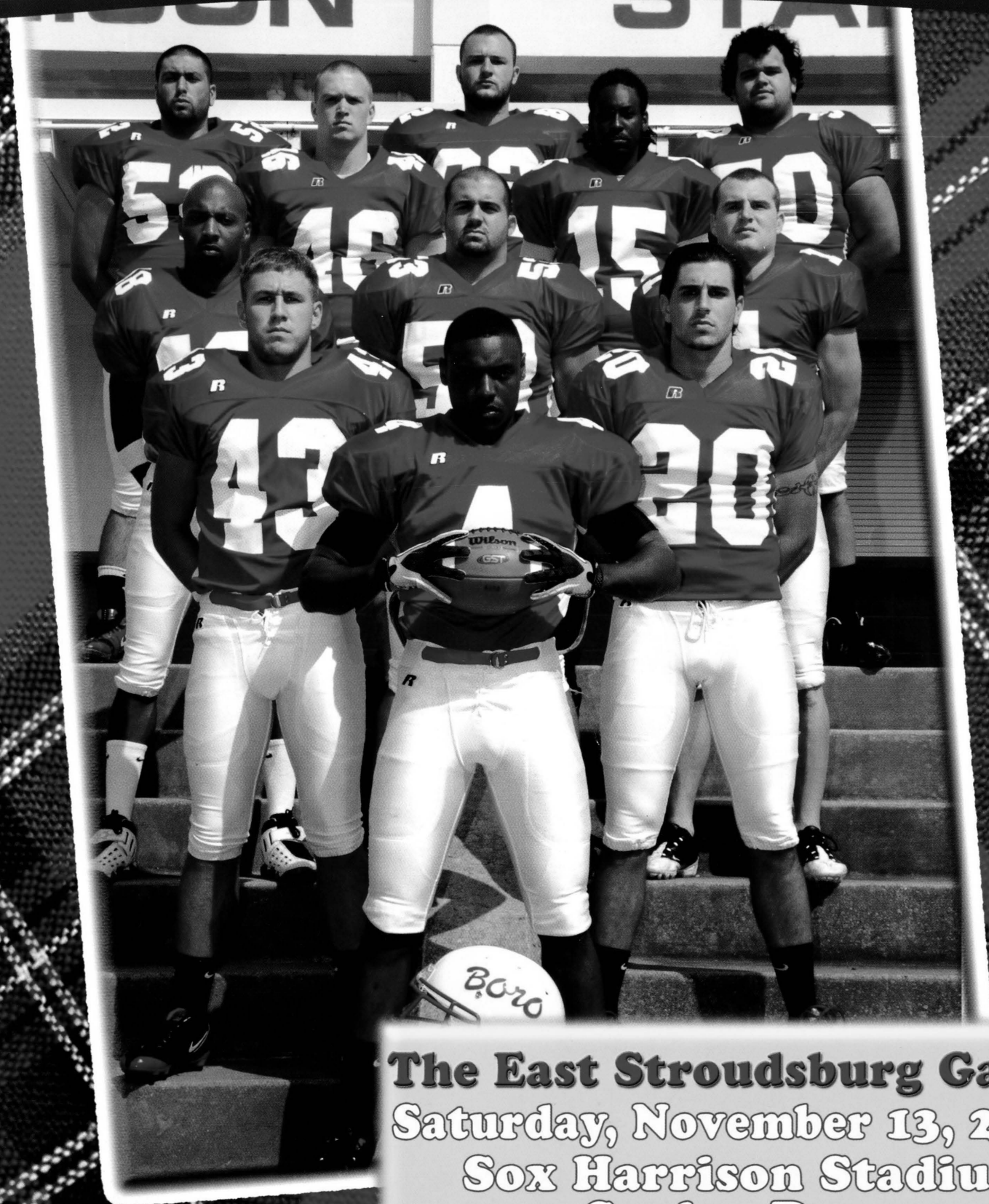

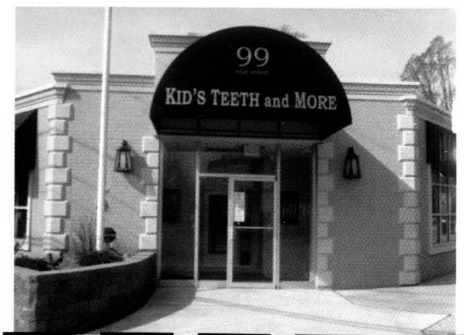

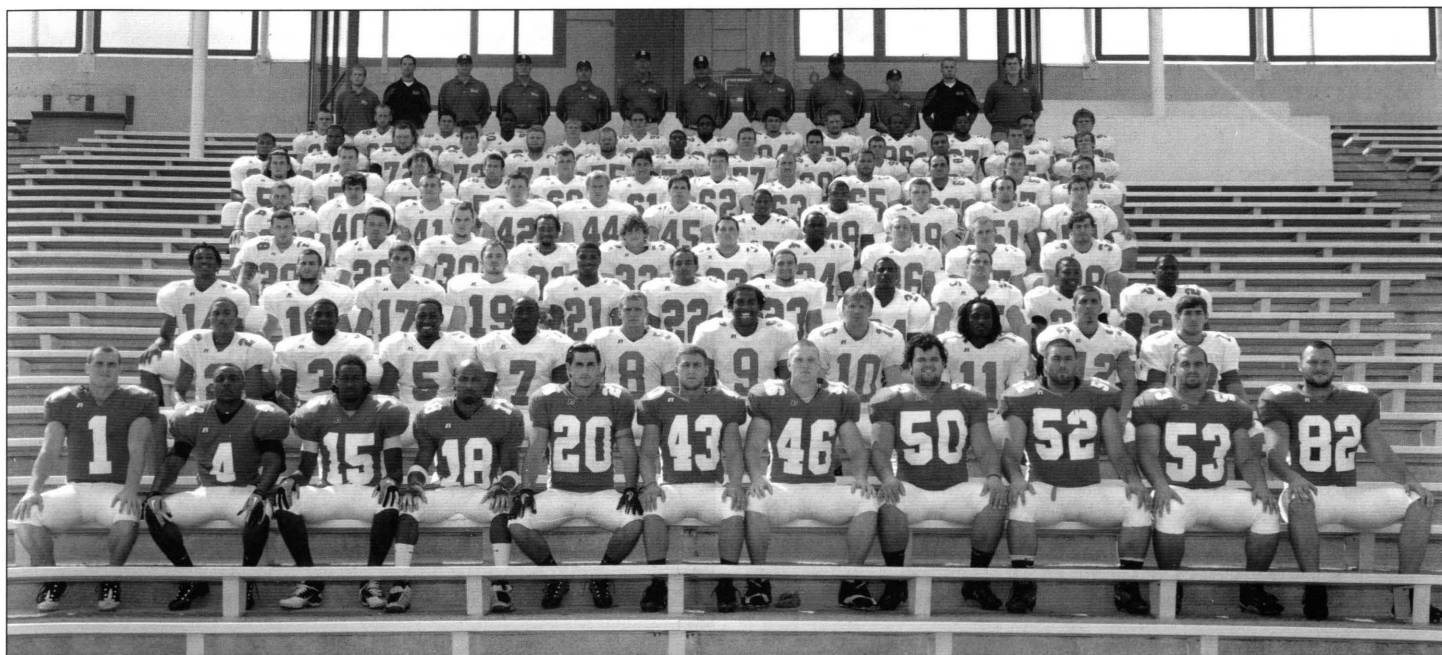

game. Unlike last year's game with the winner moving on, this one will just be for pride with both teams packing up the uniforms afterwards.

Edinboro comes in with a 6-4 record as head coach Scott Browning has now led the Fighting Scots to five straight winning seasons. It has been an odd season for this young team that has battled injuries. The Fighting Scots have played their best football on the road, winning five of six games, but at Sox Harrison Stadium they have thrilled the home crowd with a win just once.

East Stroudsburg has suffered through a disappointing season with a 3-7 record, a rarity for long-time head coach Denny Douds. The War-

rriors have also been better on the road with a 2-3 record away from home and 1-4 at home. Beware, though, as ESU has lost four games by a touchdown or less.

Most importantly today, we will bid farewell to eight seniors playing in their final game today. *For more on our 2010 seniors, see page 64.*

The Coaches

Scott Browning (Ohio State '81) took over as Edinboro's 13th head coach on January 5, 2006, and as he completes his fifth season he has tied Tom Hollman's record for most games won by a coach in his first five seasons with a 37-19 record. He was certainly no stranger to Fighting Scot football, however, serving as an assistant coach for the previous twenty years. While at Edinboro he has coached the offensive linemen, defensive backs and running backs, along with serving as the offensive coordinator. Browning became the first head coach at Edinboro to debut with a win since Bill McDonald in 1969 when the Fighting Scots opened the 2006 season with a 28-14 win at West Chester. He went on to lead Edinboro to a 6-5 finish, the most wins ever by a first-year coach. Three years ago he led the Fighting Scots to a 7-4 record, and he has directed his last two squads to a school-record tying nine wins the last two years. In 2008 Edinboro ended the year at 9-2 and was ranked 20th in the final AFCA Top 25. The Fighting Scots had a 9-4 record a year ago, making the NCAA playoffs for the first time in his tenure. Edinboro would end the year 24th in the AFCA poll. *(For more on Scott Browning, see pages 6-7.)*

Denny Douds (Slippery Rock '63) is completing his 37th year as the head coach at East Stroudsburg. During that period he has enjoyed great success, with a 229-153-3 record. He is the all-time winningest coach in PSAC history and was one of five active coaches in Division II with 200 wins entering the season, and one of 18 coaches in all Divisions with 200 wins. Douds has led ESU to nine PSAC titles and three NCAA playoff appearances, including the 2005 Northeast Regional championship. He has coached 19 AP Little All-Americans, five AFCA All-Americans and five finalists for the Harlon Hill Trophy, including the 2005 award winner, Jimmy Terwilliger. Oddly enough, Douds coaching career began in Erie, Pa. as an assistant coach for two years at McDowell High School.

The Edinboro-East Stroudsburg Series

East Stroudsburg leads 10-5

Edinboro and East Stroudsburg have met in some big games through the years, including last year's Super Regional One quarterfinal game. That marked the first meeting between the two since the 2006 season, when the Warriors handed Edinboro a 12-0 defeat in Scott Browning's first season as head

Scouting East Stroudsburg

The Warriors opened up the year with a big 57-0 win at Pace, but then lost their next six games. They would rebound with back-to-back wins over Millersville and Cheyney, scoring 123 points, but last week saw Shippensburg score late for a 20-17 loss to the Red Raiders. ESU is a dangerous team offensively, averaging 32.6 ppg., fifth in the PSAC, along with ranking second in passing offense (262.5 ypg.) and fifth in total offense (393.2 ypg.).

Players to Watch



Matt Freed, OLB -- the senior is a tackling machine, with three straight 100-tackle seasons. Freed had 12 tackles against Shippensburg to go over the 100-tackle mark for the third straight season and had his 23rd game with 10+ tackles in 33 career starts. He has 106 tackles this season and third with 385 career stops. Freed was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District first team for the third straight season last

week and can become the first two-time Academic All-America selection in ESU football history.

Matt Marshall, QB -- the senior failed to throw a touchdown pass against Shippensburg, ending his streak of 23 straight games with a TD pass. Marshall did move into third place in school history in career total offense (6,978) and enters the final game of his career with 6,350 passing yards -- currently fifth and 41 yards behind fourth place in school history, and 311 behind third.

Kendrick Williams, TB -- the sophomore carried 21 times for 119 yards and a TD vs. Shippensburg. It marked his second 100-yard game in the last three outings and he has 339 yards and 8 TDs in that span.

Ed Kiser, WR -- the senior is another player who has been on fire. Kiser had 4 receptions for 133 yards vs. Shippensburg, and the week before had 6 catches for 148 against Cheyney. He is the ninth ESU player to reach 2,000 career receiving yards. Kiser has 48 catches this season.

Taylor Groff, PK -- just a freshman, he tied ESU's school record with his 15th field goal of the season and has made at least one field goal in every game. He is 15-for-20 on field goals and has made 37 of 39 extra points for 82 points. He leads all PSAC kickers with 8.2 points per game.

coach. East Stroudsburg had won four straight games over Edinboro, and six of the last seven meetings, before the Boro's 31-16 win last year. Edinboro played at East Stroudsburg in a Division II playoff game in 2004, with the Warriors coming away with a last-minute 36-32 triumph. In addition, Edinboro and East Stroudsburg squared off twice in the PSAC Championship Game. ESU prevailed 24-20 in 1975, and was a 24-22 winner in 1982, with both games played at East Stroudsburg.

The Last Meeting

2009 - Edinboro 31, East Stroudsburg 16

Trevor Harris returned from knee surgery to throw for three touchdowns and Branden Williams made three big plays to lead fifth-seeded Edinboro to a 31-16 upset at fourth-seeded East Stroudsburg in the Super Regional One quarter-finals. Williams changed the entire complexion of the game on the last play of the first half. With East Stroudsburg leading 13-10 and attempting a 46-yard field goal, Williams swooped in from the left side to block Drew Reinhard's kick. He picked up the pigskin at the 39 and proceeded to outrun a pair of Warriors for a 61-yard touchdown as time expired. After trailing 13-3 less than a minute earlier, the Fighting Scots suddenly led 17-13. The blocked field goal return became an even bigger swing when Marcus Johnson took the second half kickoff and returned it 63 yards to the ESU 26. Five plays later Harris threw a nine-yard touchdown pass to Shawn Walker and the Fighting Scots led 24-13. Harris ended the afternoon completing 28 of 39 passes for 298 yards with 3 TDs and 0 INTs. ESU's Matt Marshall completed 15 of 26 passes for 301 yards with 2 TDs and an interception. He was also the leading rusher with 59 yards on 17 carries. Ed Kiser caught 5 passes for 121 yards.

Last Week's Games

California(Pa.) 24, Edinboro 0

Trailing just 3-0 at the half and holding the 12th-ranked Vulcans to 80 yards in the first half, the Fighting Scots were eventually worn down by the Vulcans. The defense still held Cal, one of the top rushing teams in the PSAC, to 90 yards rushing, but Edinboro would manage just 79 yards in total offense.

Shippensburg 20, East Stroudsburg 17

The Warriors led 17-3 at the half and entered the fourth quarter with a 17-6 lead but then saw Shippensburg score twice in the fourth quarter. The latter score came with just 24 seconds remaining, as the Red Raiders capped a nine-play, 80-yard drive that took less than two minutes. Kendrick Williams (14-yard run) and Eric Deery (3-yard run) accounted for ESU's scores.

Nolen Nears Career Receptions Record

Very quietly Gary Nolen has put together a big season catching the football. The senior wide receiver has caught five-or-more passes in seven games, boosting his season total to 48 receptions. That figure is tied for seventh in a season, but more importantly, he has pulled within striking distance of Ernest Priester's career receptions record. Nolen now has 144 catches, just four shy of Priester's record of 148.

Offense Offensive vs. Cal

Edinboro's offense was never able to get going against California(Pa.), leading to a pair of near record-setting figures. The Fighting Scots were held to 79 total yards, the fourth-lowest figure in school history, and finished with minus four yards rushing. That ranks third-lowest all-time. Edinboro failed to gain a first down and finished with just 16 yards in the half. The defense held Cal to 80 yards in the first half, but withered over the final thirty minutes as Cal had the ball for almost 39 total minutes.

Keep an Eye on Keir

When we look back at the 2010 season one of the biggest success stories will be the development of **Keir Jeter**. The junior defensive end actually started coming on late last year, but he has really come on the past few weeks. At 6'3", 233 lbs. he has always been considered a good pass rusher. Now he has developed against the run, as well. He leads all defensive linemen with 49 tackles, and has a team-high 13.5 tackles for losses while ranking second with 3.5 sacks.

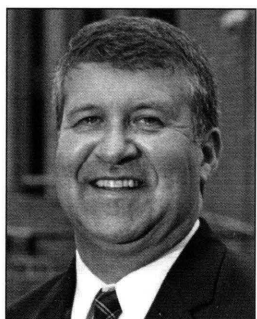

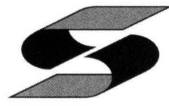

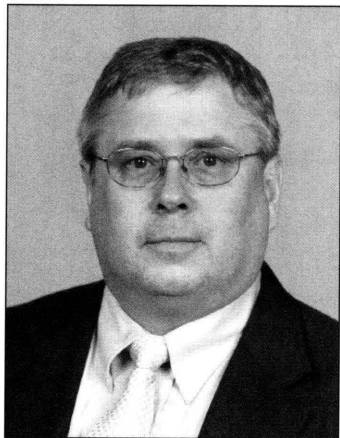

Scott Browning

5th Year

Scott Browning knows a thing or two about the Edinboro football tradition. With twenty years under his belt as an assistant coach, he was all too familiar with the glory days of Edinboro football. So it didn't take him long to restore some lost traditions when he took over as the 13th head football coach of the Fighting Scots on January 5, 2006.

Most prevalent was the return to the "Boro", the common name the football team

was referred to during the 1980's and '90's, some of the most successful periods in Edinboro football history.

One thing Browning didn't mess with was the tradition of winning. In fact, in his first four seasons Browning has led the Fighting Scots to 31 wins, more than any previous coach at Edinboro.

A year ago Edinboro tied the school record for wins for the second straight year while finishing with a 9-4 record. The Fighting Scots were selected for the NCAA Division II Playoffs for the first time since 2004, and won their third-ever playoff game with a 31-16 win at East Stroudsburg in the Super Region One quarterfinals. Edinboro would lose at West Liberty in the regional semifinals, but the Fighting Scots handed West Liberty one of its two losses in the season opener, claiming a 42-30 victory.

Edinboro ended the year ranked nationally for the second straight season, finishing 24th in the AFCA Top 25 and 20th according to D2Football.com. That despite facing a demanding schedule which saw eight of the 14 teams post winning records. Edinboro swept local rivals Gannon and Mercyhurst and defeated Indiana(Pa.) for the second straight year.

Browning was recognized as Edinboro's Coach of the Year.

His first edition finished with a 6-5 record, the most wins ever under a first-year coach. But it didn't end just on the football field. The Fighting Scots excelled in the classroom, including a cumulative team GPA of over 2.8 for the spring semester.

Browning became the first coach at Edinboro since Sox Harrison to win his first two games as head coach. That happened in 1926, the first year of football at the Boro. Thanks to a 28-14 win at West Chester, he became the first coach since Bill McDonald in 1969 to win his first game as head coach.

That victory, on the road at West Chester between a pair of 2005 NCAA playoff teams, also displayed Browning's propensity as a riverboat gambler. The Fighting Scots went for it on fourth down four times, and converted on three occasions.

Three years ago the Fighting Scots finished with a 7-4 record while facing one of the most difficult schedules in recent memory. Edinboro faced four nationally-ranked teams, upsetting 25th-ranked Bloomsburg thanks to a memorable comeback, 42-41, while losing to eighth-ranked California(Pa.), 17th-ranked West Chester and 24th-ranked IUP. In fact, Edinboro's four losses came to teams which combined for a 40-9 record.

The Fighting Scots also continued the strong academic trend, with 15 players earning PSAC Scholar-Athlete honors.

In 2008 Edinboro barely missed making the NCAA Playoffs for the first time since 2004 while tying the school record for wins in a season, finishing at 9-2. The wins included a 24-17 decision over 16th-ranked Indiana(Pa.). The losses came by a combined seven points to 14th-ranked California(Pa.) and Mercyhurst. The Fighting Scots finished 20th in the final AFCA Division II rankings.

Academically, 12 student-athletes earned PSAC Scholar-Athlete recognition and 34 finished with a GPA of 3.0 or higher in the spring semester. The Fighting Scots continued a strong trend in 2009-10 with a high percentage of

players with a GPA of 3.0 or higher. Four players were accorded ESPN The Magazine District 2 Academic All-American honors this past year.

After serving as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator in Lou Tepper's first season, Browning took over as the offensive coordinator in 2001.

He had previously served as the offensive coordinator for five seasons under Tom Hollman. In all, Browning had served as Edinboro's offensive line coach the previous 12 years.

Browning joined the Edinboro program in 1986 as the running backs coach under Steve Szabo. After two seasons on the offensive side of the ball, the graduate of The Ohio State University moved to the defensive side, serving as the defensive backfield coach under Hollman. In 1994 he moved back to offense as the offensive line coach. He had remained in charge of the linemen since that time, coaching such All-Americans as Jeremy O'Day, Joe Valvoda and Greg Bzorek. The last two years Browning's offensive line led the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference in fewest sacks allowed.

When Tepper came on board in 2000, Browning was appointed the recruiting coordinator in addition to his duties with the offensive line. A year later he was named the offensive coordinator, and the Fighting Scot offense made great strides over the last five years. Browning emphasized a balanced attack which showcased the combination of a strong ground game and dangerous aerial attack. Over his last three seasons Edinboro averaged 29.9 ppg. in 2003, 33.2 ppg. in '04, and 31.4 ppg. in '05.

All told, Browning has been an assistant coach on all seven of Edinboro's NCAA playoff teams, along with five of the nine PSAC champion squads. He took over a team which had been to the NCAA Division II Playoffs two of the previous three years, and during that period had posted a 26-8 record. The 26 wins were the most in a three-year period in Edinboro history.

"It goes without saying that I am extremely excited to have this opportunity," noted an elated Browning upon his hiring. "I was proud to be a part of the teams in the 1990's that ranked among the best in Division II, and over the last few years we have once again elevated the program to one of the best in the country. The University and the community of Edinboro mean a great deal to me. Over the years we have tried to become an integral part of this community. I am thrilled that I can continue that association while taking over a group of players that represent the ideals I believe in.

"I'm sure you will see some changes in the future, but I can tell you this, the ideals remain in place for this program, and always have in the time I've been here. Without question we want to be successful on the field, and that means challenging for the PSAC West title. But we won't compromise integrity. We will continue to bring in young men who have the ability to be successful both in the classroom and on the football field. It is my sincere belief that when they take the field, they must wear the Edinboro jersey with pride, and when they are in

the community, that they have earned the respect that comes with being a Fighting Scot."

Browning has served on the staffs at three NCAA Division I institutions. Prior to joining the Fighting Scot staff, he coached receivers and running backs at Ohio State for two years while serving as a graduate assistant. That group included Keith Byars. The Buckeyes went to the Rose Bowl in 1984, dropping a 20-17 decision to USC to finish with a 9-3 record. The following year Ohio State went bowling again, this time defeating Brigham Young, 10-7, in the Citrus Bowl, to once again finish at 9-3.

Browning served as a graduate assistant coach at New Mexico State in 1982, and the following year instructed the receivers at Idaho State. Idaho State reached the NCAA Division I-AA Playoffs before suffering a 27-20 defeat to Nevada.

A 1981 graduate of The Ohio State University with a bachelor's degree in Education, Browning began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Worthington High School and Dayton-Fairview High Schools in Ohio from 1979-81. Before transferring to Ohio State he attended Capital University where he played football for one season. Browning later earned a master's degree in Education Administration from New Mexico State in 1983.

Browning, 51 and a native of Loudonville, Ohio, and his wife, Lynn, reside in Edinboro and have two children, Andrew (16), a member of the General McLane High School football team, and Katelyn (12).

His brother Mitch has also enjoyed a successful career as a football coach. He served several noteworthy seasons as the offensive coordinator at the University of Minnesota, and has also been the offensive coordinator at Syracuse University. He is currently on the staff at Akron as the offensive line coach after coaching at Tennessee a year ago.

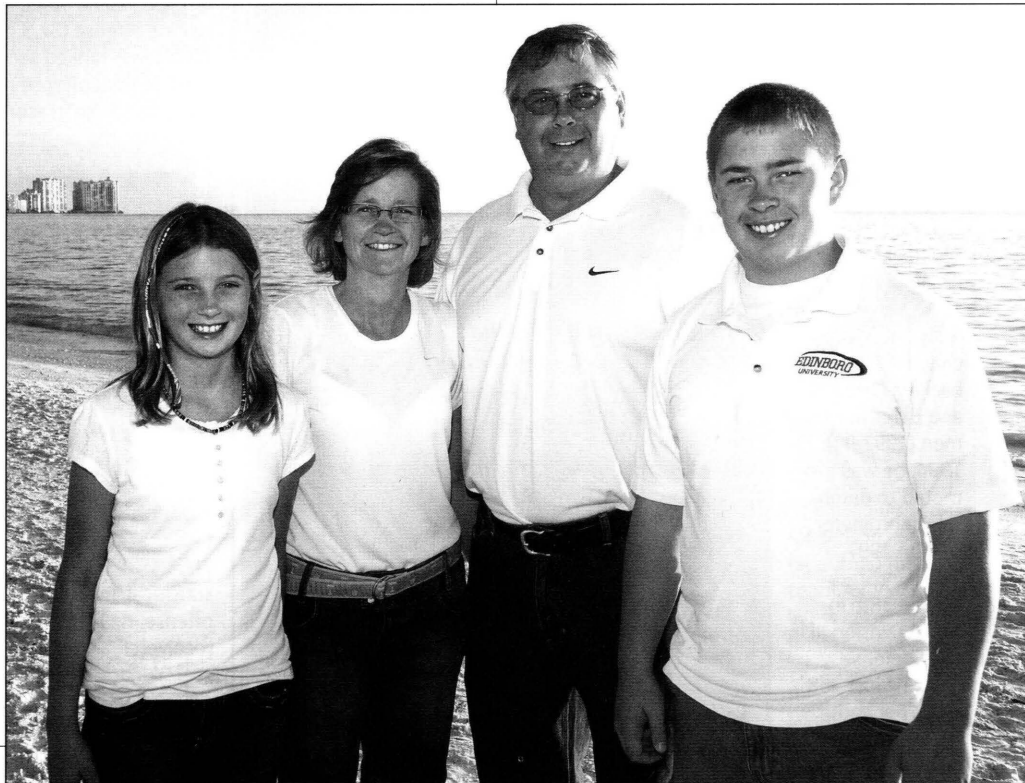

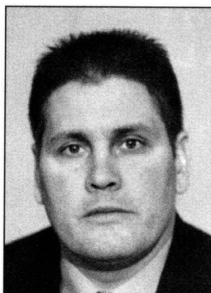

Wayne Bradford is in his 12th year as a member of the Edinboro coaching staff. He enters his sixth season as the Fighting Scot defensive coordinator, and had previously held the same title in 1999 under former head coach Tom Hollman. After overseeing the defensive line for seven seasons, Bradford took over as the linebackers coach in 2006.

Bradford orchestrated the top defense in the country four years ago, as Edinboro paced Division II in scoring defense (9.3 ppg.), total defense (211.2 ypg.), and rushing defense (53.7 ypg.). In addition, Edinboro was third in pass efficiency defense and turnover margin. The Fighting Scots recorded three shutouts, the most since the 1975 team also shut out three opponents. A total of seven opponents were held to seven points or less. He coached four all-conference performers a year ago.

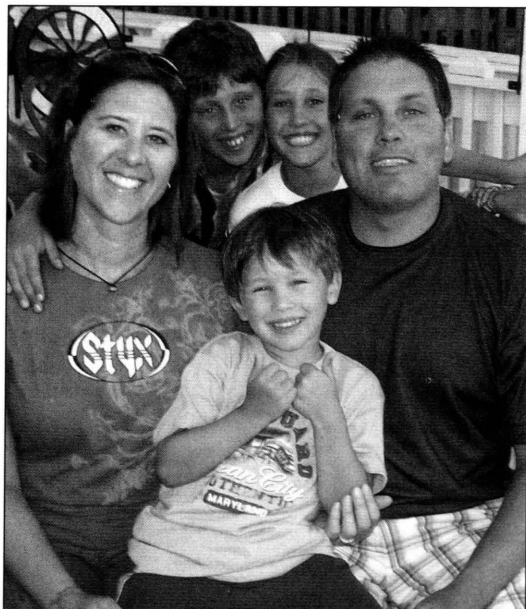
Three years ago his defensive unit recorded two more shutouts while leading the PSAC in rushing defense (70.6 ypg.), good for third in the country.

Two years ago Bradford guided a young defense that ended up having five players earn All-PSAC honors. Under Bradford's tutelage, Edinboro has had thirteen first team All-PSAC West defensive linemen. In fact, he was responsible for three of the last four PSAC West Defensive Players of the Year at that time, with Ben Stroup earning the honor in 2006, Chris Amico the 2005 recipient, and Seth Fragale the winner in 2004.

Bradford had previously been at Salisbury State since 1990, and was the Sea Gulls' defensive coordinator from 1994-98.

A graduate of Salisbury State, Bradford began his coaching career at his alma mater in 1990, serving as an assistant coach in charge of the linebackers (1990-92) and defensive linemen (1992-94). In 1994, he was promoted to defensive coordinator.

In 1997, Salisbury State ranked 38th in NCAA Division III in total defense, allowing just 268 yards per game. His 1995 defensive unit produced a

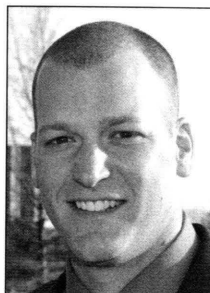

first team AFCA All-American at linebacker, and helped the Sea Gulls finish 7-2 with a berth in the ECAC Southwest Championship Game.

Bradford graduated from Salisbury State in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration. He completed work on his master's degree in Business Administration from Salisbury State in 1992. In addition to working as a member of the football staff, Bradford was a faculty member in the School of Business. Beginning in 1996, he was the Director of the Business Graduate Programs for the Perdue School of Business.

As an undergraduate, Bradford was an offensive lineman. He played on the 1986 Salisbury State team which finished as the NCAA Division III national runnerup.

Mike Yurcich enters his sixth season as a member of the Edinboro University coaching staff. Yurcich joined the football staff in April 2005 as the quarterbacks coach. He enters his fifth season as

the offensive coordinator after assuming that role in 2006.

Yurcich has overseen the development of the offense into one of the top units in the country. In particular, the Fighting Scots now rank as one of the top passing teams in Division II. A year ago Edinboro led the PSAC in passing offense for the second time in three years (278.5 ypg.) and was 17th in Division II. In addition, the Fighting Scots have now averaged 30 points per game in each of the last three years.

In 2008 Edinboro led the PSAC in total offense (449.4 ypg.), which was 11th in Division II. In addition, the Fighting Scots were 23rd in rushing offense (189.9 ypg.), 26th in passing offense (9259.5 ypg.), and 34th in scoring offense (32.3 ppg.). The 2007 team ranked second in the PSAC in total offense (455.7 ypg.), and was fourth in scoring offense at 35.7 ppg., the highest total since 1994 and the fourth-highest in school history. The Fighting Scots ranked eighth in Division II in passing offense, 18th in total offense, and 25th in scoring offense.

Yurcich played a large role over the past four years in the development of quarterback Trevor Harris, a four-time All-PSAC West selection who signed a free agent contract with the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars.

A native of Euclid, Ohio, Yurcich served as a graduate assistant coach at Indiana University in 2003-04. In addition to conducting statistical analysis for the Hoosiers' offense, he assisted with the wide receivers.

Yurcich is no stranger to the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference. After attending Mount Union in 1994-95, he transferred to California (Pa.) and played three seasons for the Vulcans. Yurcich was a two-year captain at California (Pa.), serving as the starting quarterback in 1996 and sharing the starting role in 1998.

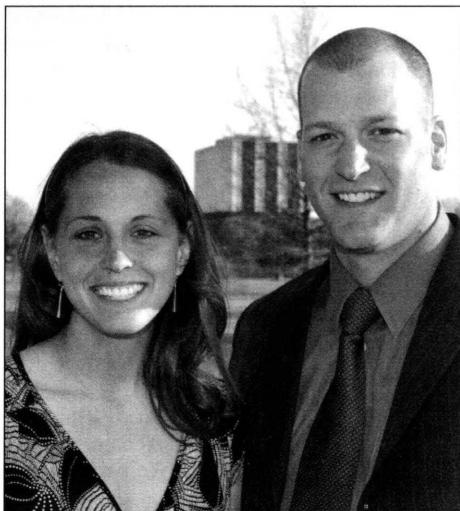

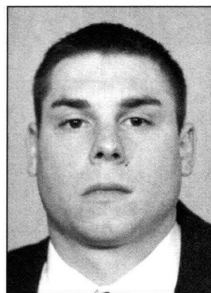
In all, he played in 44 career games with 35 starts. He was a captain as a senior.

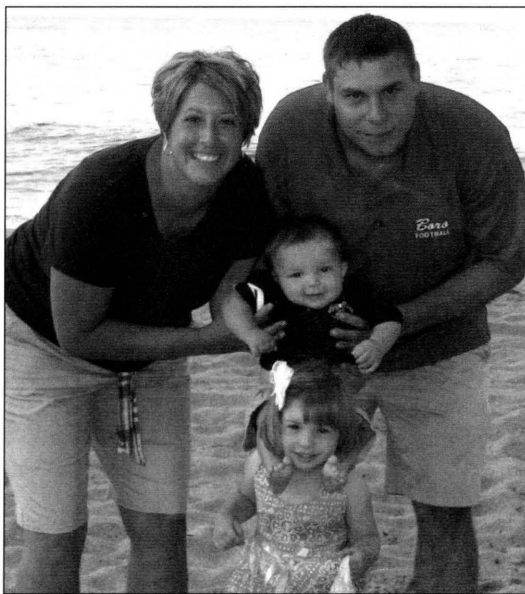
Kim Niedbala joined the Edinboro coaching staff in the spring of 2006 as the defensive backs coach after serving as an assistant coach at Clarion for seven seasons from 1999-05.

He has quickly made his mark at Edinboro while instructing the secondary. In his first season a pair of players earned All-PSAC West honors, and two years ago three of the four members of the secondary were recognized as All-PSAC performers. In fact, in each of his four years at least one member of the secondary has earned All-PSAC honors.

At Clarion, he was elevated to the defensive coordinator in 2002 after working with the outside linebackers in 1999, then taking over as the secondary coach and special teams coordinator from 2000-02.

One of the top players in Clarion history, Niedbala was a three-time All-American at free safety and strong safety from 1994-96. He was a consensus first team All-American in 1996, including Associated Press Little All-America after posting 106 tackles, 100 solo, with 20 passes broken up, 4 tackles for losses and a pair of interceptions. A captain on the '96 team, he helped the Golden Eagles finish with an 11-3 record. Clarion won the East Region title and advanced to the Division II semifinals before suffering a 19-18 loss to eventual national champion Northern Colorado. Clarion was awarded the ECAC Lambert Cup.

Niedbala recorded 117 tackles, 9 passes broken up, and had 5 interceptions in 1995, earning second team Associated Press Little All-America honors and second team Football Gazette All-American accolades. In 1994, he had 98 tackles, 6 tackles for losses, 4 interceptions and 3 sacks.

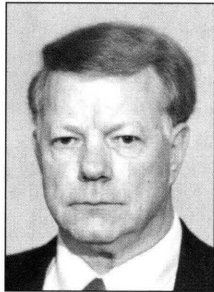

He is also a

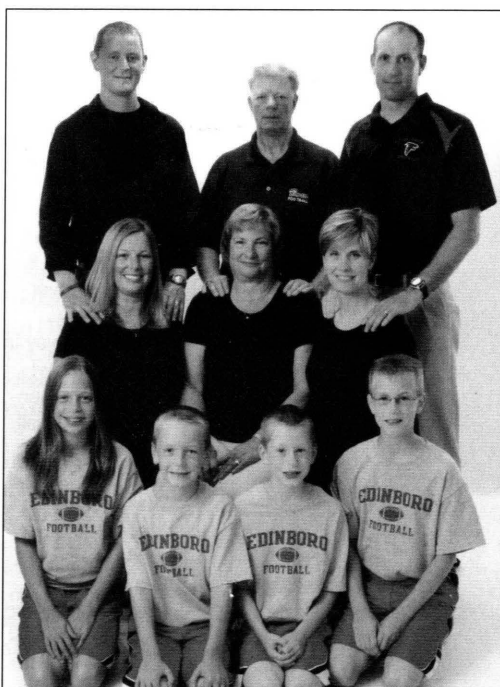
professor in the Mathematics Department at Edinboro.

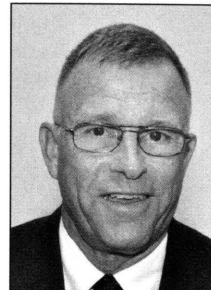

Bruce Zylstra is the newest member of the Edinboro coaching staff, joining the team in August. He will work with the offensive linemen, oddly enough assuming the role previously held by his late

son-in-law, Matt Gillette. Gillette passed away unexpectedly in May after serving as an assistant coach for the Fighting Scots for a year.

Zylstra brings a world of experience to the staff as he first began his coaching career in 1967 as an assistant coach in football plus serving as the wrestling coach at River Valley High School in Three Oaks, Michigan.

He would go on to serve as an assistant coach at the collegiate level at Grand Valley State University from 1975-82 and as an aide at Eastern Michigan University from 1989-94. He turned out four All-American offensive linemen at GVSU, including former Seattle Seahawk Ron Essink.

TDI GAMEBALL GOES TO... DUKE UNIVERSITY BLUE DEVILS

Behind the guise of their Blue Devil mascot's villainous exterior lies a host of Duke University student-athletes who are actually quite angelic.

Every year, the student-athlete population at Duke University routinely donates hundreds of hours to those in need near their Durham, N.C., campus. They work closely with the university's Student-Athlete Development office, as well as with the support of the Duke-Durham Neighborhood Partnership and Community Service office, which is located on campus.

Some Blue Devils have given their time to local children – reading to them, playing sports with them, cooking meals for them and their families. Others have joined forces with Habitat

for Humanity to build houses for needy families in Durham, while others still have put aside their rivalry with the Tar Heels of UNC – for a day, anyway – to co-host the Build Blue and True 5K Race. The race, which was run by 115 participants in March, raised \$2,500 for Habitat.

“There are many opportunities out there. It’s just a matter of, are you willing to put forth the effort to go and volunteer and do it?” says football senior Bryan Morgan. “It definitely makes us better people. It shows us how to live our lives. With us on this earth, it’s not about you yourself. It’s how you affect the people around you. And you want to affect the people around you in a positive way.”

The Blue Devils football team, specifically, has participated

in three distinct volunteer initiatives in recent years. The first, spearheaded by head coach David Cutcliffe, is the campus cleanup. Every summer, the guys on the team pick one morning to wake up early and head to campus, garbage bags in hand. The point of the day is to clean up all the trash and to beautify the campus that is their home away from home.

With a solid 8,000 or so acres to cover, that can be a daunting task. But the guys embrace the challenge and turn it into a good-spirited competition.

"We try to see whoever finds the craziest thing, or whoever [picks up] the most trash," says senior linebacker Adam Banks. "It's for bragging rights."

For the second of the team's projects, Coach Cutcliffe leaves the planning up to his players. They coordinate with each other – as do all of the other teams on campus at some point throughout the summer – and pick a date to visit Camp Kaleidoscope, which is a free summer camp funded by Children's Hospital for its young patients with special needs.

"The kids go out and live in cabins, and they play fun games.

They do all the same things that regular kids do," says Morgan, a center. "My first year [at Camp Kaleidoscope] we had a little water fight, and then we ended up having a shaving cream fight. Shaving cream was everywhere. I looked like the Michelin man. It was crazy."

It's the quality time spent with the kids that is usually the most rewarding part of volunteering for the Blue Devils.

"Hanging out with those little kids, they think you're a superstar," Banks says. "You're a lot bigger than them, and they just look up at you with awe."

It should come as no surprise, then, that the last – but certainly not the least – of the football team's three community service projects includes interacting with

the children and families of the Durham Rescue Mission, where they host Duke Football Day. The players eat lunch with the kids, sign autographs and run a series of football drills and activities.

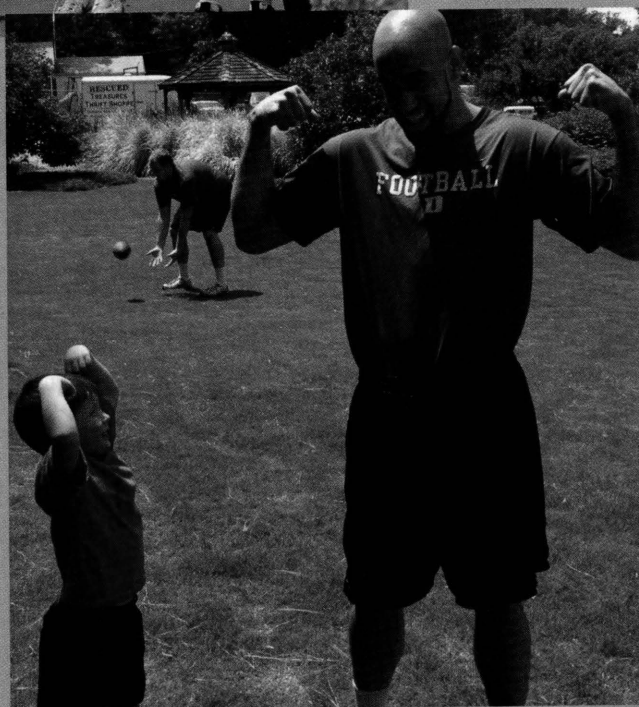
"The kids run around as hard as they can and try to catch passes to show off a little bit," Banks says.

They even learn some life lessons from their larger-than-life superheroes. Adds Morgan. "It's good for them to see male figures showing them the right way to live and the right way to do things. Their mothers really appreciate us going over there.

They tell us that the kids really love it. And we love it too."

The Blue Devils' love of giving back shows no sign of fading out any time soon. For these guys, it's not a chore. The work they do actually helps define their team.

"The community service solidifies the mission statement of who we are as a program and what's expected of Duke football players," Banks says. "We're living proof of what we believe in. Everyone is able to unite under that. It's part of our common mission."

The Heisman Trophy Breakdown...

TROPHY WINNERS BY REGION

College football is truly a nationwide sport and players from all over this great land, from universities far and wide, have won the game's most prestigious individual award. From Yale's Larry Kelley on the East Coast to USC's Marcus Allen out West, the Heisman Trophy has made stops all over the country in its 75-year history. BEASLEY'S BLITZ COMPARING CFB'S CATHEDRALS

THE BEST QUALITY OF ANY STADIUM IS THE FANS THAT FILL IT!

Squeezing into a stadium with thousands of your closest friends and fellow fans was always one of my favorite aspects of college football game day at the University of Georgia. The energy is electric. Waiting in a huge mob of people just to get into the stadium is actually one of the few instances in my life where I'm not impatient

to get where I'm going — undoubtedly a side effect of living in New York City — because I know what's inside is worth the wait. Admittedly, UGA's Sanford Stadium is one of only two college football stadiums I've ever been inside (the other is Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd Stadium), yet I'm fascinated by these structures that house some of the rowdiest fans across the nation every game day in the fall.

It's difficult to put my finger on what exactly makes a university's stadium stand out from the rest. Is greatness measured by the number of fans that can fit inside? I've heard rumors about schools embarking on massive expansion projects in order to have as few as 10 more seats inside the stadium than



its rival. Though I'm not sure if it's true, the mere fact that a story like that exists indicates that numbers are an important component of a great stadium. The University of Michigan prides itself on playing in the largest stadium in the country (and third largest in the world). Nicknamed "The Big House," Michigan Stadium

officially seats 109,901 people, though an NCAA-record 112,118 people attended the 2003 matchup against Big Ten rival Ohio State. It's hard to imagine how the players must feel walking through the tunnel while more than 110,000 people cheer you on.

But maybe it's a particular structural design that distinguishes a certain stadium. Ohio State University's Ohio Stadium is known for its unique horseshoe shape, originally conceptualized by architect Howard Dwight Smith in 1918. The stadium was later added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1974 and boasts several unique architectural elements, including the northern rotunda's Roman Pantheon influence and stained glass

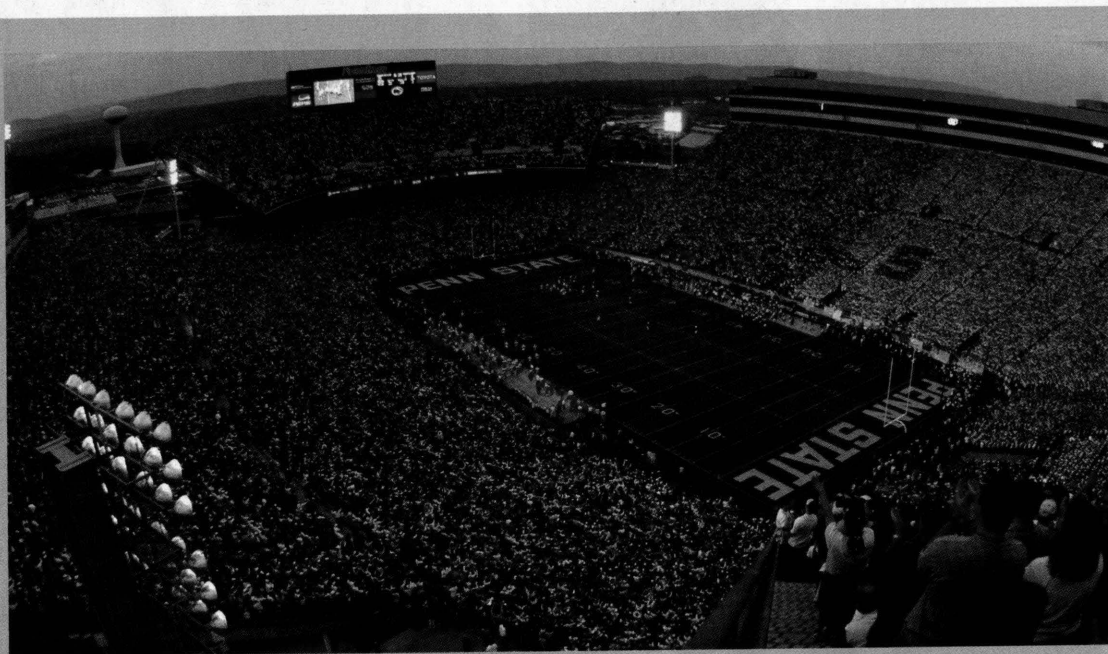

murals of the Buckeye squad. Another interesting stadium structure is the dome, like the one on Syracuse University's campus. A Syracuse alum explained to me that the dome is necessary so they "can play in comfortable temperatures even when there's 800 feet of snow" on the ground. As a Georgia native, I don't know what that would be like, but it's hard to picture a player diving for a touchdown catch in the

midst of all that snow. Alternatively, I do know what it's like to watch football in 100-degree weather, and I certainly wouldn't protest the opportunity to enjoy those "comfortable temperatures" on a hot September afternoon in the South.

Between the cheers, chants and screams, fan noise is a huge factor at any stadium. Clemson's Memorial Stadium has a reputation, along with Florida's Ben Hill Griffin Stadium (aka The Swamp), for being one of the loudest



stadiums in the NCAA. Memorial Stadium was dubbed "Death Valley" partially due to the fact that it's physically located in a valley and also because a cemetery overlooked the stadium before



upper decks were built. I have friends who have visited Clemson for a game and described the noise as deafening. Steve Young, former quarterback for Brigham Young University and later the San Francisco 49ers, is quoted: "Florida was loud in the Swamp. But, the loudest, not only the stadium, but the loudest place I have ever been in my life was definitely Death Valley."



Unlimited factors contribute to the uniqueness of a stadium, whether it's due to the number of people cheering beside each other, the shape of the facility or because fans can still hear a faint ringing in their ears hours after the game is over. Or it could be something different altogether; Alabama's Bryant Denny Stadium's opponent locker room is called The Fail Room, named after alum James Fail, but the double entendre deserves an honorable mention for cool stadium facts. But ultimately, I think what truly makes a stadium special is the team — and the fans — that adopt it as their home field.

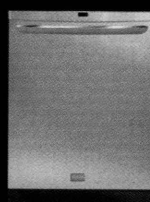
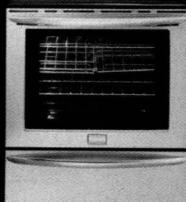

This town is Arkadelphia, Ark., and one day each year it plays host to the most unique sporting event in intercollegiate athletics.

Two prestigious institutions, rich in history and tradition, will meet on the football field as Henderson State faces off against Ouachita Baptist in the 84th meeting of "The Battle of the Ravine" set for October 30, 2010 at 1 p.m. at Carpenter Haygood Stadium, located on the Henderson State campus.

With most of the attention in the State of Arkansas focusing



on the happenings in Fayetteville, these two institutions receive very little television or radio exposure throughout the year. In fact, the reserved seat assigned for the local newspaper in each school's press box has remained vacant for several years.

However the spotlight will shine on the town of 11,000 for this one day. Television cameras, live pre-game radio remotes, numerous stations broadcasting the game, and newspapers statewide will report on

this year's event.

There are not many rivalries as old or rich in tradition as the Henderson State vs. Ouachita Baptist "Battle of the Ravine." It is the oldest rivalry among current NCAA Division II institutions, and after

83 games played between these two fine institutions, Ouachita Baptist took a one-game lead in the series following last year's 35-28 win to give the Tigers a 39-38-6 record.

"This is the biggest event in Clark County," said Henderson State Athletic Director Sam Goodwin. "This game has a large economic impact on the area, but more importantly, it is one of the most discussed events each year."

Goodwin's parents both attended OBU, but he was an All-American at Henderson State in the mid-1960s, playing football and also participating in track.

After a very successful coaching career, Goodwin returned to his alma mater to take over as the school's athletic director. Very passionate about Henderson State, Goodwin is often seen leading groups in the signing of the fight song "That Ole Reddie Spirit" or the alma mater.



OBU Athletic Director David Sharp is just as passionate for his alma mater. Sharp grew up with the purple and gold. His father Ike was a player and instrumental in one of the most exciting comebacks in the series history.

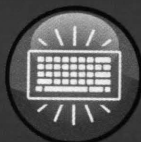
In 1949, the Tigers rallied from a 14-0 deficit to beat the Reddies 17-14. The Reddies were in

complete control for the first 53 minutes and on their way to a share of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference championship. However, Sharp became an unlikely hero, successfully kicking three onside kicks in the last seven minutes. After a touchdown made the score 14-7 and a successful on-side kick, Babe Henry silenced the Reddie crowd with a sweep to tie the score. Sharp was called on again to work his magic and the Tigers recovered the kick. With OBU on the Reddie 4, the Tigers kicked the game-winner. Sharp sealed the deal with another onside kick recovered by the Tigers, and OBU ran out the clock.

David Sharp has played, coached, and now serves as an administrator for the event.

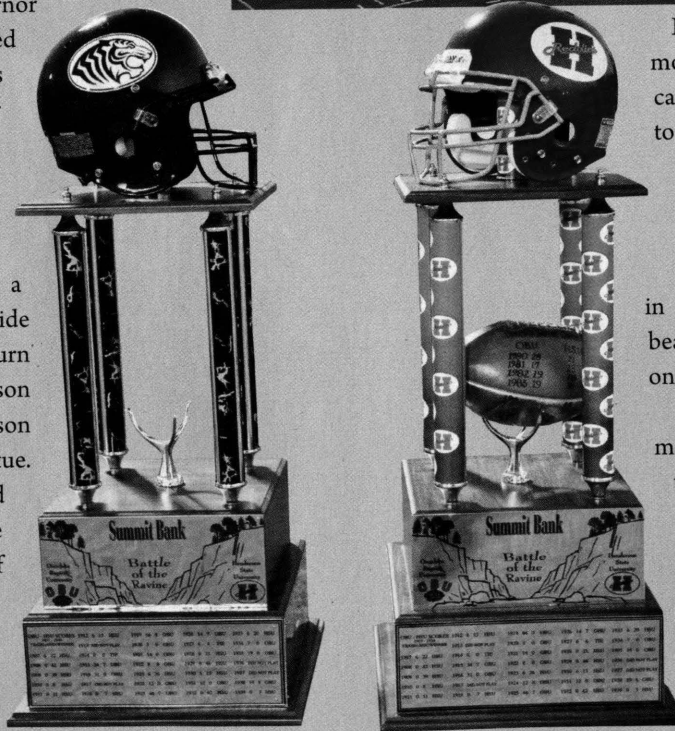
"It is a great event for both institutions, as well as the community," said Sharp. "There is not a more unique setting for a game. This is the only place where you can literally take a driver and a 3-wood and hit from one school's stadium to the other."

Along with the game are the shenanigans that lead up to that day. There are always pranks and practical jokes in which students from both schools participate. The pranks intensify during game week. Those involved in these pranks include members of both institutions' current faculty, vice presidents, and even government officials.

Even former Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee was involved in lighting Henderson State's homecoming bonfire a day earlier than scheduled.

Other pranks include HSU sorority and fraternity members painting marshmallows in the school's red and gray and having a crop duster drop them on OBU's side of the street, diesel fuel used to burn "OBU" into the grass on Henderson State's main campus and Henderson State students painting the tiger statue.

Ouachita Baptist students would sabotage the Henderson State fountain which is a focal point of the Henderson State campus and sits along Highway 7. Students have been known to put purple dye or fizzies in the fountain.



During game week, numerous monuments and memorials on both campuses are heavily covered in plastic to prevent them from being painted, as well as each school's football stadium lights remain on throughout the evening.

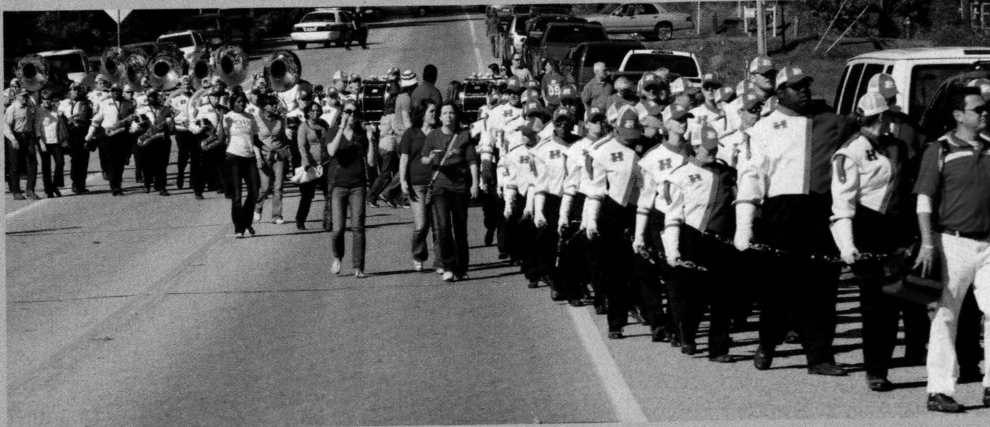
The history of this storied event began in 1895 when then Ouachita College beat Arkadelphia Methodist College, 8-0 on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28.

It took 12 years for the second meeting between the two institutions to take place. In the first sanctioned game of the series, in 1907, the Reddies beat the Tigers and went on to claim the Arkansas State Championship. This began a streak of seven straight Reddie wins.

The game was traditionally played on Thanksgiving, and both teams made it their homecoming game.

The series discontinued in 1951 after Henderson State won 54-0 and the pranks that went along with the series overshadowed the game and became more serious. The series did not resume until 1963 with the Reddies winning 28-13.

The series continued uninterrupted until 1993 because of Henderson State's move to the NCAA Division II Gulf

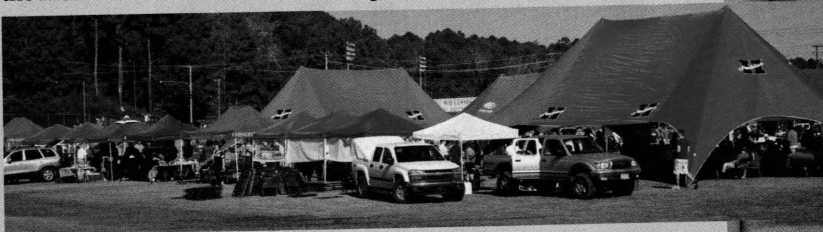
South Conference. After a three-year hiatus, the series began again in 1996 as OBU moved to the NCAA Division II Lone Star Conference.

Ouachita Baptist joined the GSC in 2000, however, an eight-year GSC schedule had already been put into place and the two schools did not meet every year. GSC schools do not play every team in the league due to the number of teams. Henderson State and OBU did not play in 2004 or 2005 because the two institutions rotated off each other's conference schedules.

Henderson State recorded its largest win over Ouachita Baptist in 1932, beating the Tigers 62-0, while OBU's largest margin of victory was a 66-0 win over the Reddies in 1919.

Of the 83 meetings between the two institutions, the game has been decided by a touchdown or less 37 times, with OBU having the advantage in close games, 19-12-6.

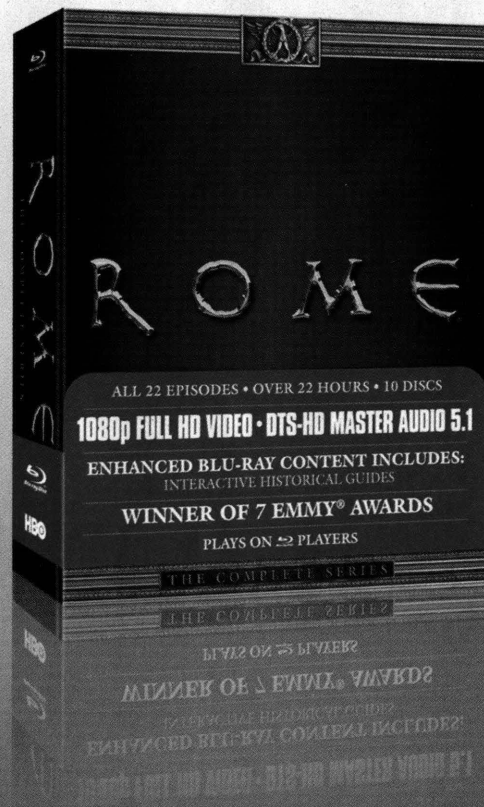
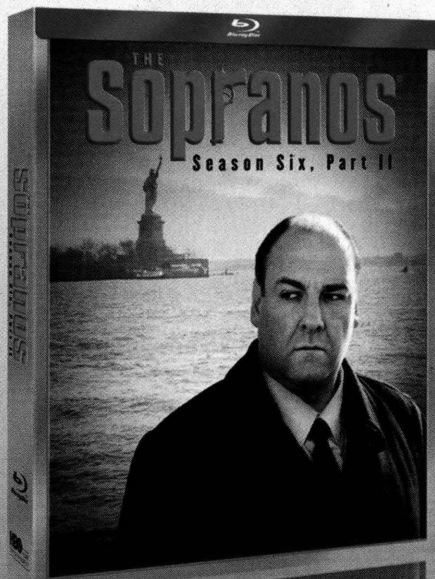
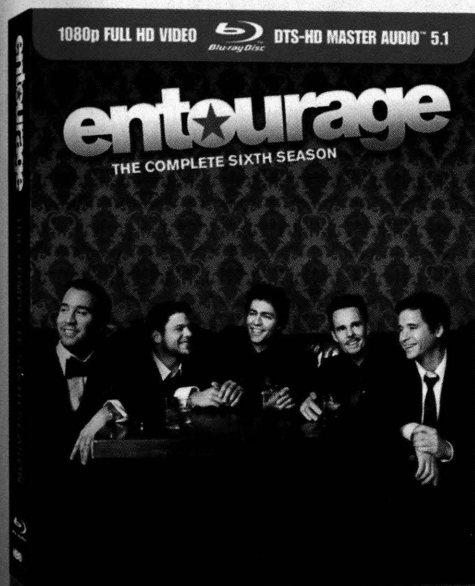
The game won't draw 100,000 fans, but rather 10,000, and each and every one will come away knowing they have been part of one of the most storied events in all of college football.

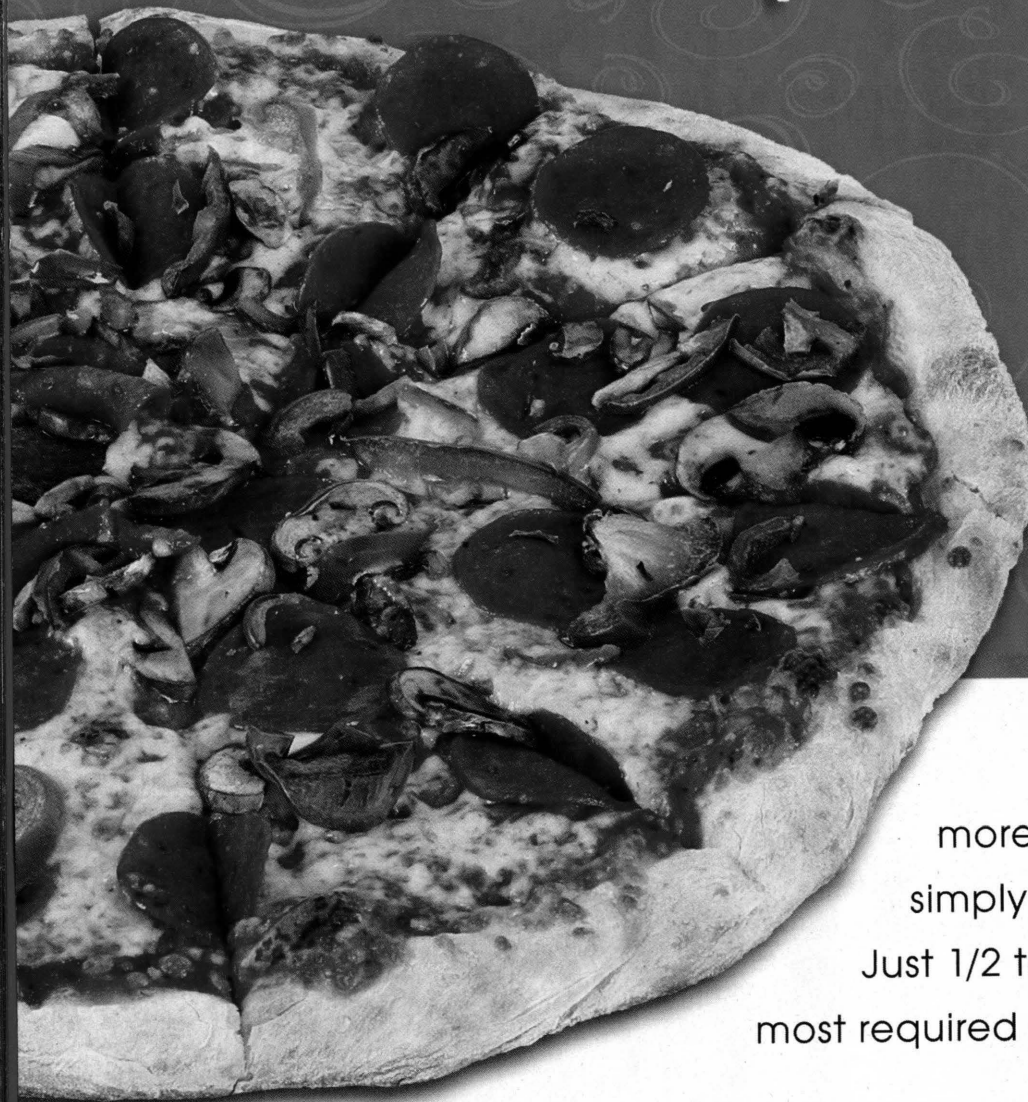

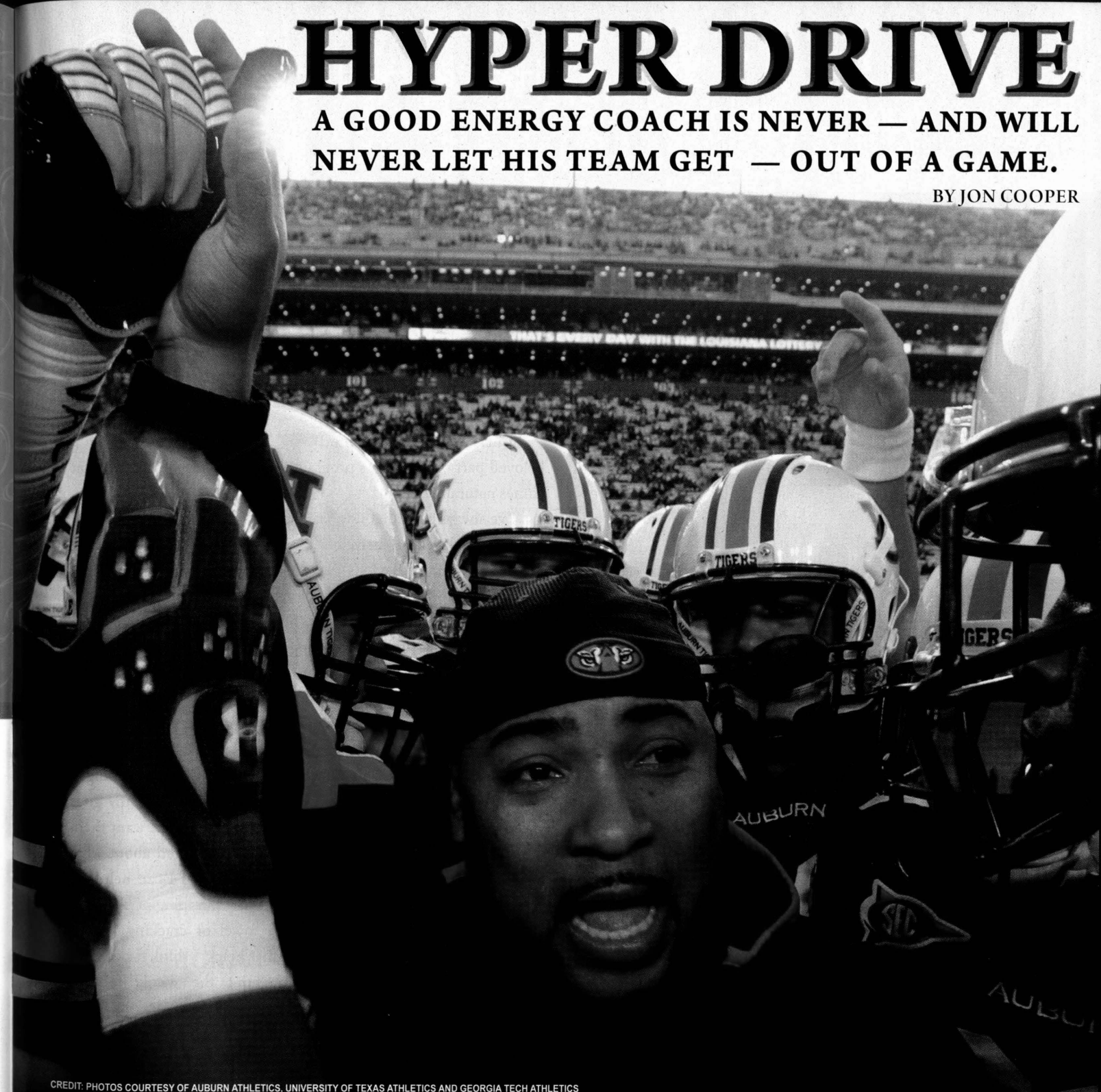

HYPER DRIVE

A GOOD ENERGY COACH IS NEVER — AND WILL NEVER LET HIS TEAM GET — OUT OF A GAME.

Emotion may play a greater role in football than in any other sport.

It can lift teams to great heights and create the feeling that anything is possible. However, sustaining that level of emotion over 60 minutes of play is difficult, if not impossible. So the ability to strategically place that spark can make all the difference in a close game.

Driven by a love of the game and armed with boundless determination to ignite a spark in their kids, coaches who inspire that spark have been given the unofficial title of “energy coach” and

have become important members of coaching staffs everywhere.

Being an energy coach starts with an unbridled passion for the game.

“I just love football,” said Will Muschamp, who has added “Energy Coach” to his unofficial title of “Head Coach-In-Waiting” at the University of Texas, where his official title is Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers Coach. “You work so hard in the off-season, the preseason and during that game week that when the guys make big plays in the game, I want to celebrate with them.”

Muschamp’s celebrations include everything from high-fives,

chest-bumps and hugs of leaping players as they come off the field, to verbal encouragement, which, on occasion, has been known to be unprintable in publications like *Touchdown Illustrated*.

It's hard to argue with the results of Muschamp's units as, in his 14-year career, he's coached the defense of a National Champion (LSU in 2004) and a BCS Title Game runner-up (UT in 2009), and his units regularly rank among the nation's best in total defense and scoring.

While his style is in stark contrast to his mentor Nick Saban (LSU, the NFL's Miami Dolphins) and other coaches for whom he's worked — Tommy Tuberville (Auburn) and current boss Mack Brown — the 39-year-old native of Rome, Ga. and former safety at

UGA just can't help but get caught up in the action.

"Football is a very emotional game. On defense, I call it 'controlled violence,'" he said. "Hopefully me getting a little excited lets them know that it's okay to get excited and have fun. It's just a game. Play with passion and intensity and, most important, have fun out there."

Getting players to have fun is a goal on both sides of the ball, as best evidenced by Trooper Taylor, Assistant Head Coach/Wide Receivers Coach at Auburn, coincidentally Muschamp's former stomping grounds.

In his second year on The Plains, Taylor has already proven a beloved part of the Tigers program. All it took was his doing what comes naturally.

"I've always been that way," said the 40-year-old native of Cuero, Texas, who played defensive back at Baylor and actually was wed on the playing field of Baylor's Floyd Casey Stadium. "I grew up in a big family (a total of 16) and we didn't have many toys so we had to create our own enthusiasm."

He's never had trouble creating enthusiasm, be it on the AU sidelines or any other he's been on.

"When I got to high school, one of our coaches told me that it was contagious and never change it. Always be you," he said. "So many people try to make the game a job. It is their job in a way but it also still should be fun. You can work hard and still have fun doing it."

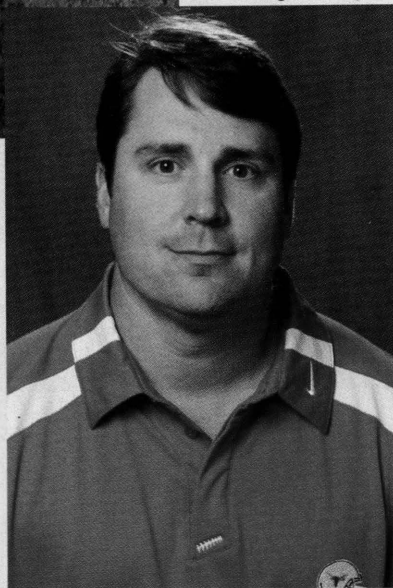
"That's my whole deal," he continued. "I don't want my guys coming through the door with a frown on their faces. I want them

coming through the door excited about what they're about to go and do. If I can help just by turning a flip or chest bumping or pumping somebody with a towel or cracking a joke, whatever, any of that helps. I think it becomes contagious throughout the whole football team."

Spreading that enthusiasm can come at a price, however. Over the years, Taylor has endured a sprained ankle after mistiming a jump on a celebratory pile, broken fingers from over-zealous high-fives, and even stitches from sharing head butts with psyched up players, forgetting he wasn't wearing a helmet on. But he proudly bragged about his durability.

"I've never made the injured pool where I didn't show up for practice or at the game," he boasted with a laugh. "It goes with it."

Involvement as an energy coach can be pain-free, however. Georgia Tech's Co-Offensive Line Coach Todd Spencer's high-

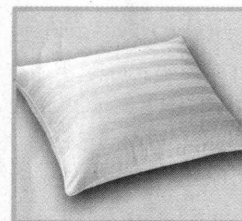
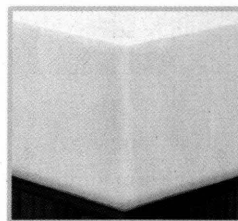

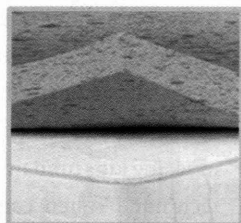

energy personality serves him well as a teacher. He frequently finds himself so wrapped up in teaching technique or in a drill that he doesn't even realize that he's entertaining the troops.

"I'm just trying to have a positive attitude and a positive approach," said the 54-year-old native of Beaverton, Ore., who has been a coach for 27 years. "I think you've got to coach according to your personality and be yourself and be honest and sincere and work hard on the field, show an emotional investment and I think the kids will follow you."

Tech's O-linemen not only follow Spencer, but feed off him. That was crucial during brutal August two-a-days.

"It's so hot and you're so tired every single day," said Preseason All-ACC center and Preseason Lowe's Senior CLASS Award candidate Sean Bedford. "But to see Coach come out and have that intensity and that fire and that passion that he has, it makes you realize that this is your chance to get better for the day and you need to seize that opportunity."

Georgia Tech players, also enjoy seizing the opportunity to share a good-natured laugh at their coach's expense.

"Watching [Coach Spencer] on tape is hilarious," said Bedford. "You'll see him jumping around and running in there. He always preaches that we should play under a chicken-wire cage, about 18 inches off the ground. So he'll be down there, but he'll be demonstrating it, too. When he's running around and correcting people and running all over the field, he's a blast. That's him and we wouldn't want him any other way."

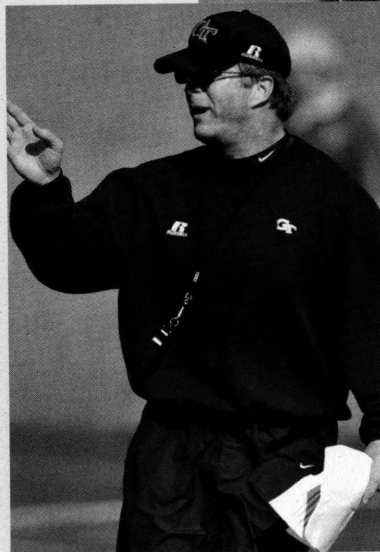
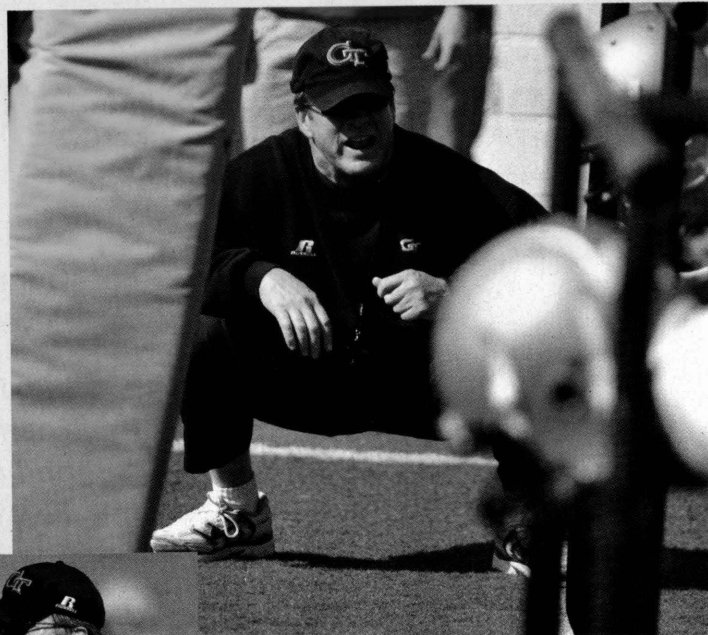
Cult status as a highlight-film favorite also has come Taylor's way.

"Every day, when we watch special teams cut-ups, the special teams coach will always show a clip of me jumping on the pile or chest-bumping somebody," said Taylor. "One time I missed the whole pile. He had to rewind that. The whole room just cracks up. I'm okay with that because, to me, it's about making sure that they understand that it's still a game to be played to have fun."

Making the rounds on the highlight shows and YouTube can draw mixed responses from the coaches' actual families.

"I hear about it all of the time from my wife, my parents, my kids, everyone," said Muschamp, a father of two sons. "I try not to watch it because I do say 'Who is that?' But, it's not something I plan on doing, I just really love being out there, having fun with the kids and coaching ball."

Going out has become something of an adventure for Taylor,



who has found that his role as Auburn's energy coach has extended to the entire city of Auburn.

"My kids will tell me, 'Dad, don't wear your hat in Wal-Mart. If you wear it in the store we'll never get out of there because somebody in the store will want a chest-bump or they're going to want a high-five,'" he said with a laugh. "The fans and the family that we have here at Auburn, they want to be a part of it. They want to experience the same thing that the players do."

Sharing that experience has become a cottage industry, as two Auburn students have started selling "Trooper Towels," at the games for fans

to wave. Taylor makes no money off the sale of the towels, and only gave the enterprising duo his permission to use his name under the condition that they donate a portion of the proceeds to a local charity called "The Miracle Fields."

For true energy coaches everywhere, the team's ends justify their means, whether it means creating that spark that helps lead to a 'W' on Saturday or building confidence and growth from their players.

"It's like a portrait of work as a coach when you see guys develop and start to do things right," said Spencer. "There's a tremendous joy in seeing kids fundamentally improve and improve their leverage and technique. When it comes to fruition, that is unbelievably rewarding."

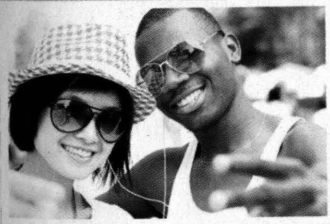
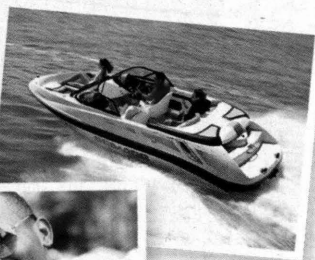
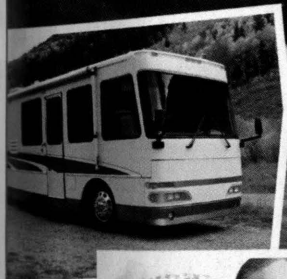

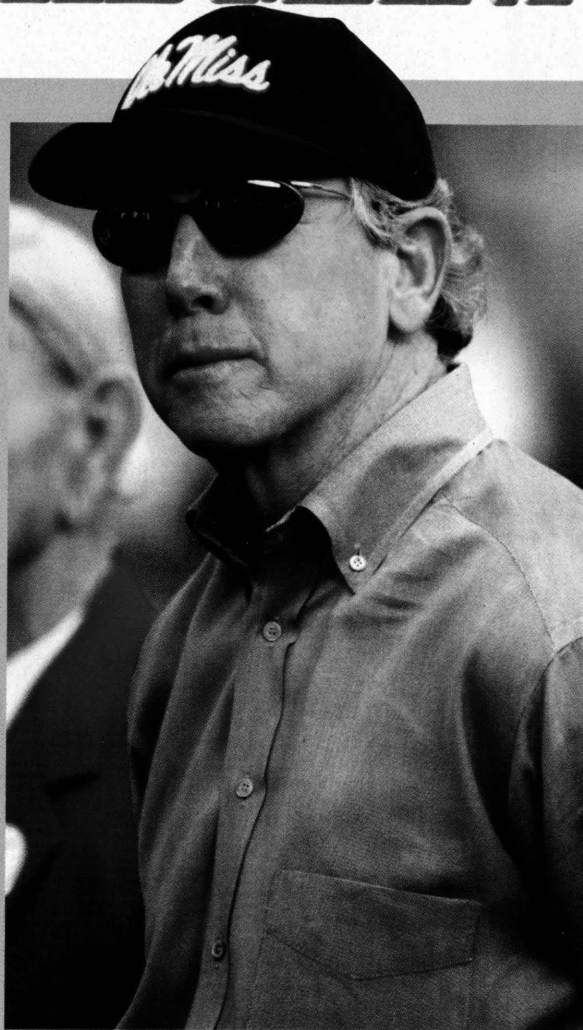
ARCHIE MANNING

When Archie Manning retired from football in 1984, he left the playing aspect behind and dove into a 25-years-and-counting career helping others enjoy the sport he loves so much himself.

Along the way, he and his wife Olivia raised three sons, Cooper, a financial analyst in New Orleans; plus a pair of pretty fair NFL quarterbacks in Peyton, a first-ballot Hall of Fame selection five years after he retires from the Indianapolis Colts; and Eli, like his brother in 1998, the first selection in the NFL Draft. Selected by San Diego in 2005, Eli Manning was then traded to the New York Giants. Both Peyton and Eli have led their teams to Super Bowl championships.

Archie Manning serves as chairman of the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame. He is also executive director of the yearly Manning Passing Academy. TDI spoke with the former Ole Miss All-American signal caller about his many passions for the game.



TDI: How did you first get involved with the NFF?

MANNING: I was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1989, a wonderful honor and a huge thrill. Shortly after that, I was asked to join the board of directors. Three years ago, the board asked me to consider becoming the chairman. It's been very much a labor of love for me; I'm very proud of the NFF and the work it does for college football.

TDI: Fifteen years ago, you, Cooper, Peyton and Eli formed the Manning Passing Academy. What went into that decision?

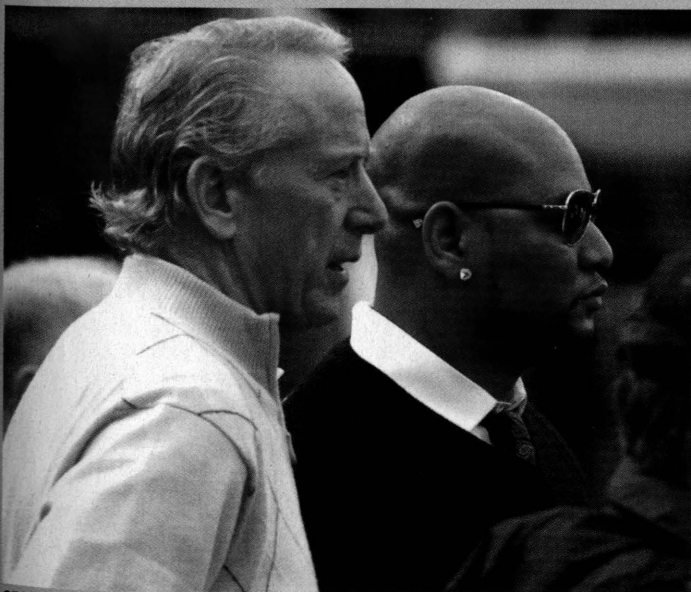
MANNING: It stuns me a little bit that we've been doing it for this long. It was Peyton's idea and it related to the high school

players in New Orleans. He was between his sophomore and junior years at Tennessee. He wanted to help the local quarterbacks and receivers become better football players. His biggest complaint [at the time] was that one school would beat another one 30-0, and the losing team's passing statistics were two of six.

TDI: What separates what you and your sons do from other camps?

MANNING: We are not a prospect camp. We are not a blue chip camp. What we are is a fundamentals camp for quarterbacks and receivers. When we started out in '96, we thought we could help the local high school coaches by getting the kids indoctrinated into the concept of quarterbacks and receivers working together in the offseason as well as the fall.

Our goal is for everyone to enjoy the high school experience of playing football. To do that, our campers need to learn the fundamentals of being a passer, and understanding the game

from a cerebral standpoint, developing a work ethic and showing leadership in the offseason.

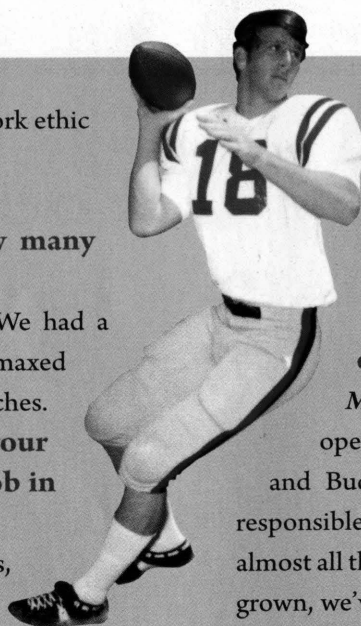
TDI: When you started out, how many attendees did you have?

MANNING: About a hundred eighty. We had a thousand sixty this year, and that just about maxed us out. We used a hundred twenty five coaches.

TDI: It sounds like recruiting your coaching staff could be a fulltime job in itself.

MANNING: We have high school coaches, college coaches, NFL coaches and some pro players. This year we had about thirty college quarterbacks. Of the thousand or so, about seven hundred are quarterbacks.

Many of our campers come for three or four years. [Stanford

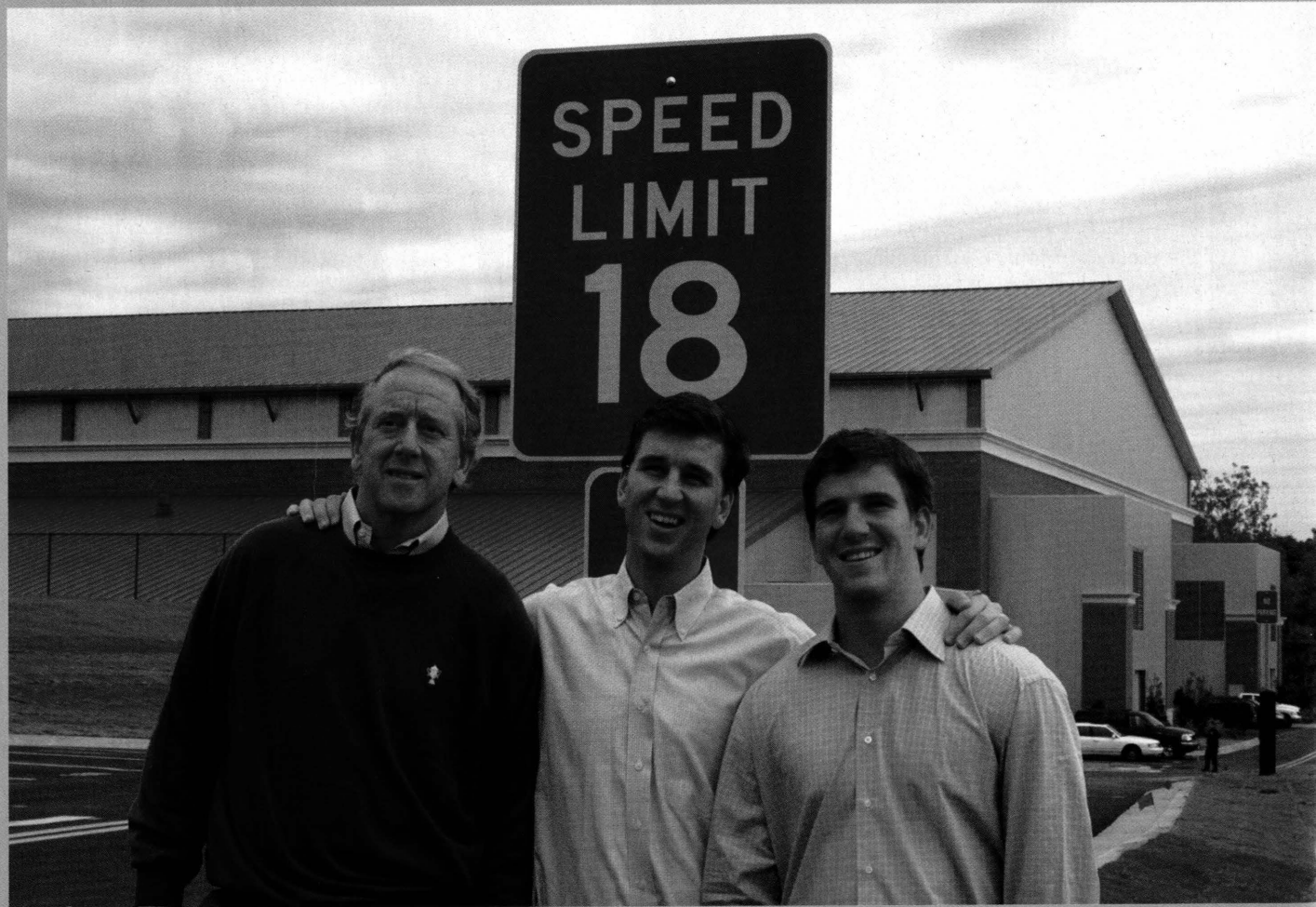


QB] Andrew Luck was one of our coaches this year and he'd been a camper with us before. I played with his father, Oliver, in Houston. Andrew is a very impressive young man.

TDI: Do you oversee the entire operation?

MANNING: I do. Jeff Hawkins, the football operations director at Oregon, handles the registration and Buddy Teevens, the head coach at Dartmouth, is responsible for the coaching staff. These days, we can do almost all the administrative work off of our website. As we've grown, we've needed more fields, so for the past five years we have been at Nicholls State [Thibodeaux, LA]. We have seven full practices over four days.

The thing that I am really proud of is that Cooper, Peyton, Eli and I have never missed one minute of one practice over 15 years.

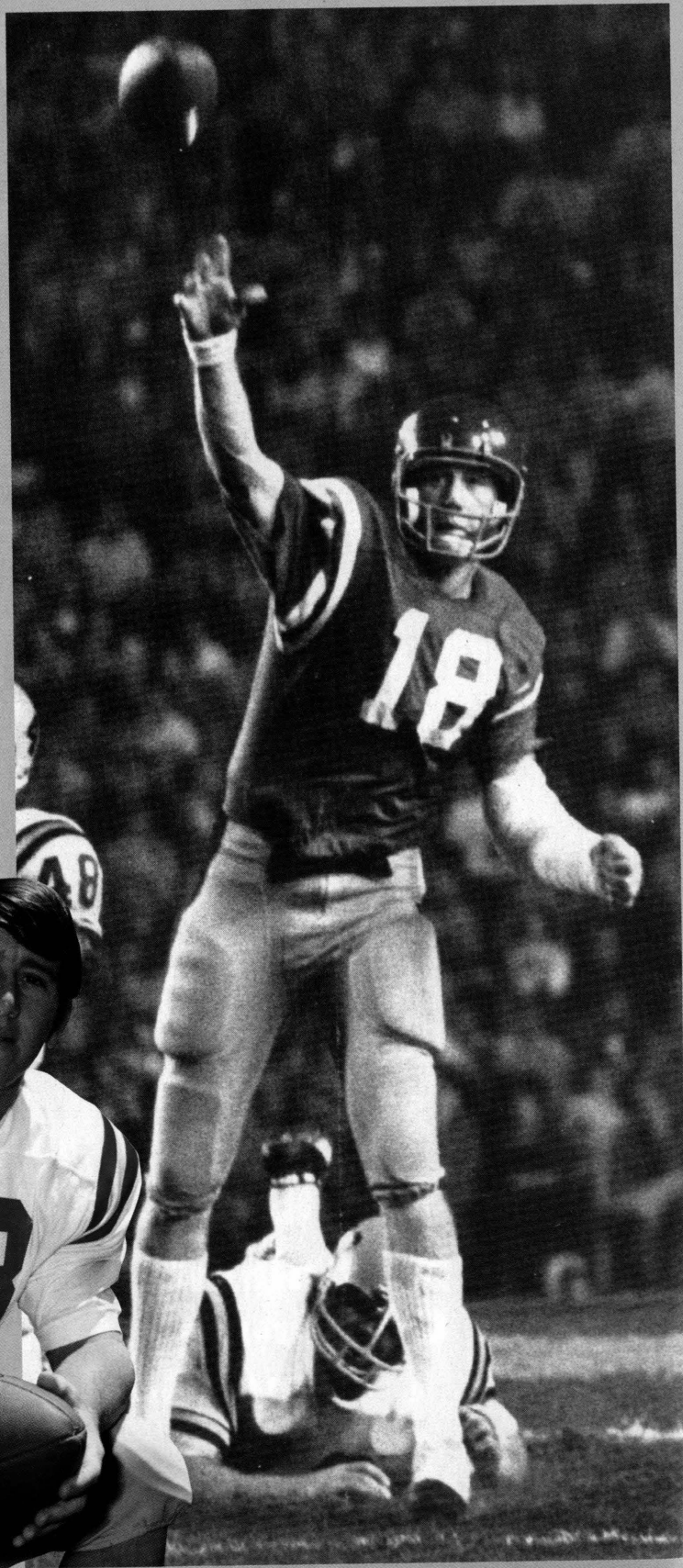
TDI: As Peyton and Eli were growing up, was there ever a time when you realized they'd have NFL careers, as you did?

MANNING: Olivia and I just tried to raise our kids the right way, and we never really envisioned when they were growing up that they'd necessarily be pro athletes. Peyton and Eli were five years apart, so they did not really compete against one another growing up. They played Little League in the same park, and a lot of basketball and baseball, but the high school they each went to [Isidore Newman] was a 2A school, more of an academic school.

TDI: How do you assess the state of college football today?

MANNING: I think the game is very healthy. I love college football; I am very passionate about it. It's a little tilted now, the haves and the have-nots. The financial part of the game is a big part of it. But I still think the excitement is there at every level. The vast majority of the kids are there to go to college, graduate and enjoy the traditions of their school, take pride in playing for their school.

We have outstanding coaches throughout college football. Coaches are very special to me. My dad wasn't a coach, but I felt like a coach's son. I grew up in a small town, and the housing for the coaches was near our school. Dad always tried to help the coaches get established in the area, and the coaches spent a lot of time with me in return and that started my interest in coaching. They are a special breed of people. The Liberty Mutual people have an annual award for the best coaches at each of the four levels [FBS, FCS, D-II, D-III] and I am extremely proud to help recognize these men and the work they do.

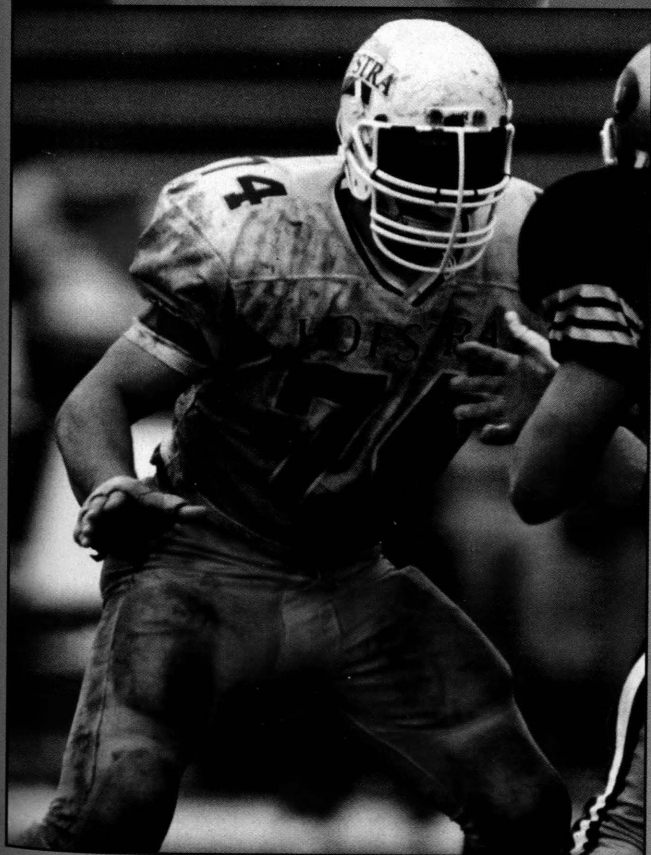

LOOKING BACK WITH PRIDE

AFTER SEVEN DECADES ON THE FIELD,
HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY'S FOOTBALL PROGRAM
IS GONE BUT CERTAINLY NOT FORGOTTEN

For years, opposing players would sit and listen to music, or chat calmly with their teammates as their bus approached James M. Shuart Stadium at Hofstra University on Long Island's Hempstead Turnpike, not suspecting a thing.

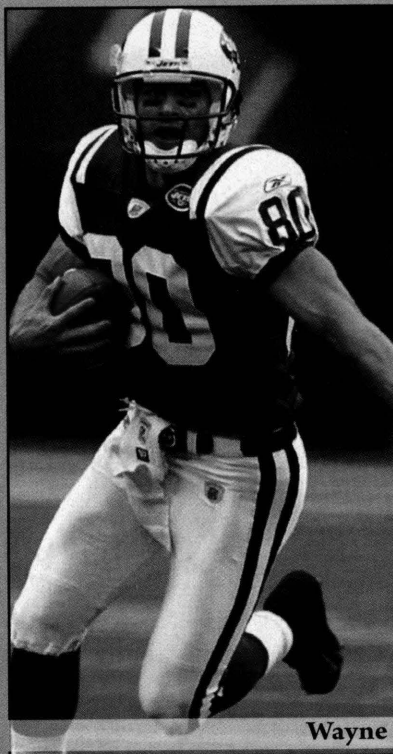
Opposing coaches and veteran players knew better; each one cast a wary eye on the stadium, fully aware that a long day awaited them.

Hofstra's football program enjoyed a long, storied tradition, dating back to 1937, producing NFL stars including John Schmitt, Wayne Chrebet, Lance Schulters, Marques Colston, Willie Colon and Dave Fiore, as well as Tampa Bay Buccaneers coach Raheem Morris along the way. Schmitt was one of the program's first stars, earning Little College All-America honors as a senior offensive lineman in 1963 before starting an 11-year NFL career, including 10 seasons with the New York Jets highlighted by the team's landmark victory in Super Bowl III in 1969.

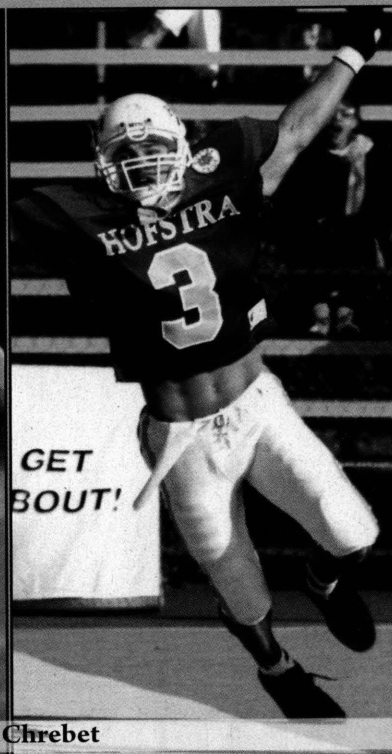

The program started to take flight in the 1990 season, when former New York Jets defensive coordinator Joe Gardi took the reigns as Hofstra's head football coach, sparking a football renaissance at the school. Gardi, a New Jersey native, used his extensive contacts with high school football coaches in New York and New Jersey to build the nucleus of a formidable football power, one which thrived by taking players who "flew under the

radar" during high school but had tremendous potential. As the years went by, Hofstra's reputation grew rapidly through word of mouth among local high school players who knew that Hofstra looked for players who were tough, smart, talented and disciplined.

Gardi used his expertise and coaching contacts to fashion a defense that was quick to bloody an opponent's nose, while the implementation of the run and shoot offense created an attack that caused havoc for opposing defenses. Quarterbacks such as California native Gio Carmazzi suddenly discovered Long Island, and what they found were numerous open receivers just waiting to catch passes.

As Hofstra continued to make strides in the college football world, a phenomenon began to take shape. Suburban Long Island had long supported NFL football, but now fans began to notice Hofstra. Hofstra was doing more than just winning football games; it was winning them in exciting fashion. Hofstra football offered entertainment value in addition to local pride. Exciting college football was no longer limited to images on a television screen; now, it was a local product, with a local flavor. Hofstra players, for the most part, hailed from places like Long Island, New Jersey, Brooklyn or the Bronx. Instead of grilling bratwursts, Hofstra fans opted for sausage and peppers

sandwiches. Suddenly, suburban commuters who took the subway and the train home from jobs in the City had a true connection to college football.

It didn't take Gardi long to develop a powerhouse at Hofstra. In 1990, his first season, the Flying Dutchmen finished with just the third undefeated season in the school's football history. With the arrival of Wayne Chrebet, Hofstra gained a quick, gummy, tenacious receiver with a knack for making

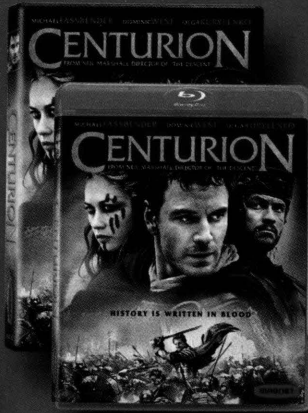
plays. Chrebet was then joined by high school opponent Dave Fiore from Waldwick, N.J., a bruising offensive lineman who gave receivers time to get open and paved the way for running backs by knocking down everything in his path. Next came Lance Schulters, a junior college transfer who played high school football at Canarsie High School in Brooklyn. Schulters, a defensive back with a nose for the ball, went on to record six interceptions in his second year in the NFL, earning a spot in the Pro Bowl. With Schulters making an immediate impact in the NFL, Hofstra's football reputation spread with the speed of an express train out of Penn Station.

At its heart, Hofstra's golden age began with Gardi and with Chrebet, who discovered the school on a chance visit.

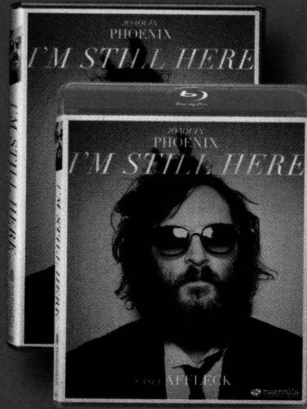
"My sister's boyfriend played for Fordham, so I went and watched Fordham play Hofstra at Hofstra," Chrebet said. "They used to play on Friday nights, and the place was packed, and I was watching him but I thought, 'Wow, this place is really nice.' So when I was trying to figure out where to go I visited Bucknell, Columbia and Fordham, but when I went to Hofstra, it just seemed like the right place."

In 1994, Chrebet's senior year, Hofstra moved up from Division III to Division I-AA, now known as the Football Championship Subdivision.

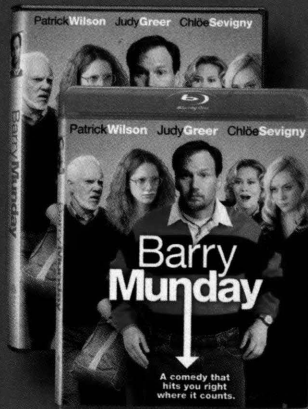

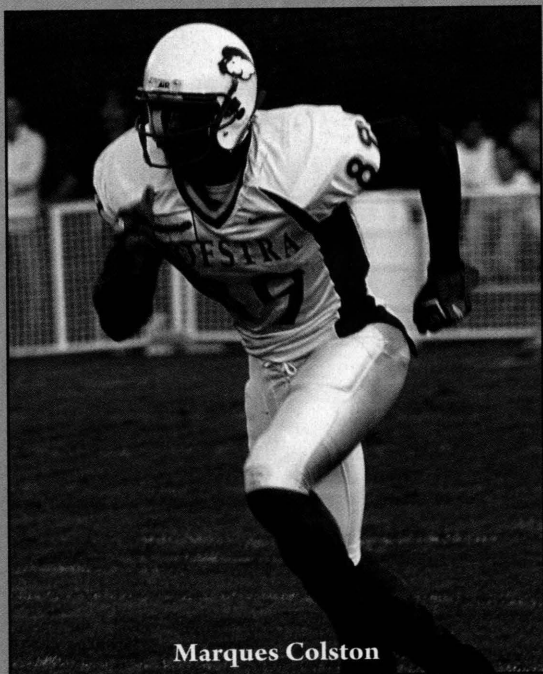
"Toward the end we were in the Top 25 when I was there," Chrebet said. "I kind of represented the team, but I guess when I made the pros it really caused people to look at Hofstra and the football program there, and the guys after me solidified that."

In fact, Chrebet opened a pipeline of talented players who streamed to Hofstra, all sharing one common thread; they had

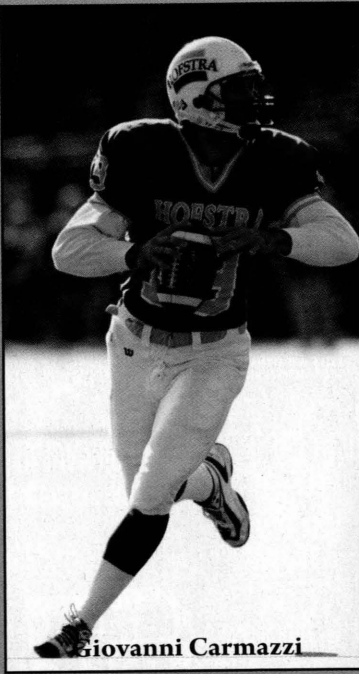
been overlooked by the major college football powerhouses. Those talented players, often carrying a slight chip on their shoulders, formed the hallmarks of Hofstra's success on the gridiron.

Art Weiss, Chrebet's agent and fellow Hofstra alumnus, shared his thoughts on the reasons for the program's success.

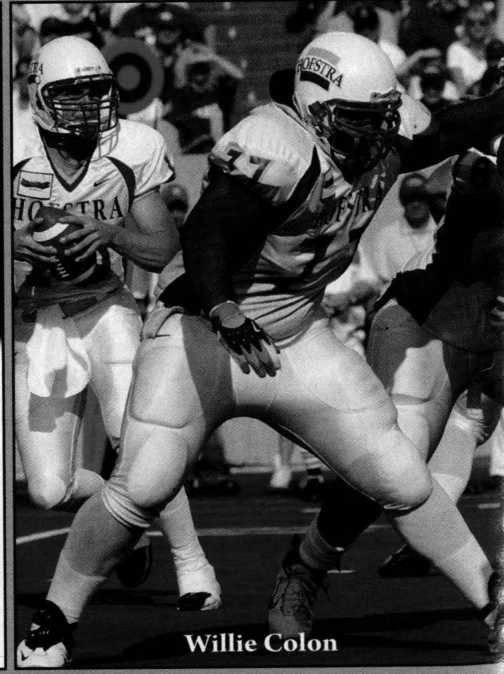

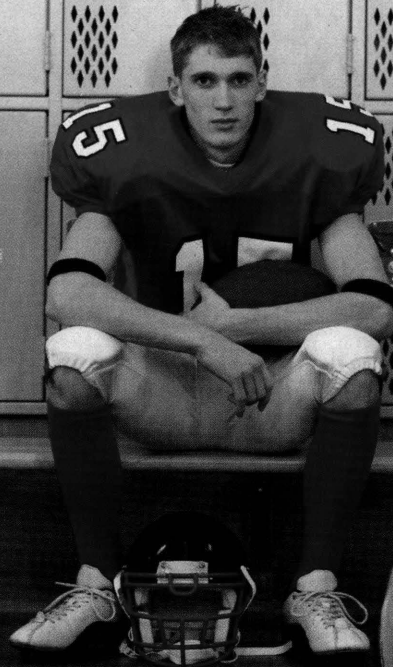

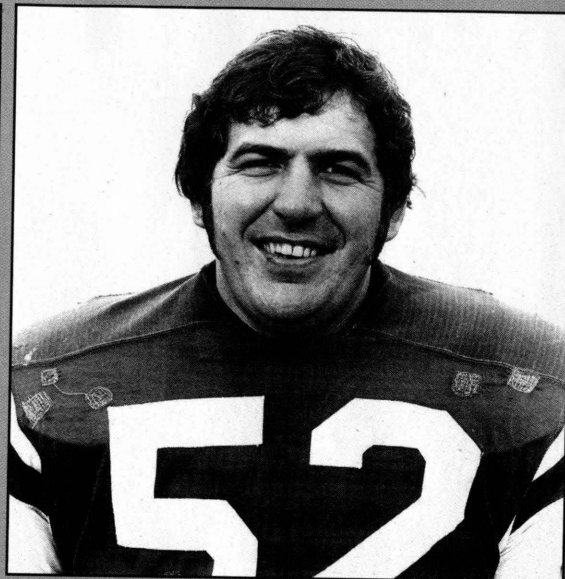

signed pro contracts from that school. Starting with Wayne, Hofstra put guys into the NFL year after year, including some very notable players," said Weiss. "There was a year when Hofstra put more guys in the pros than USC did. It was a phenomenal program, and you have to think it was because of Joe Gardi. Hofstra became a pro football factory because Gardi had them so prepared for the NFL that when they went to camp or the Combine, they were ready for anything."



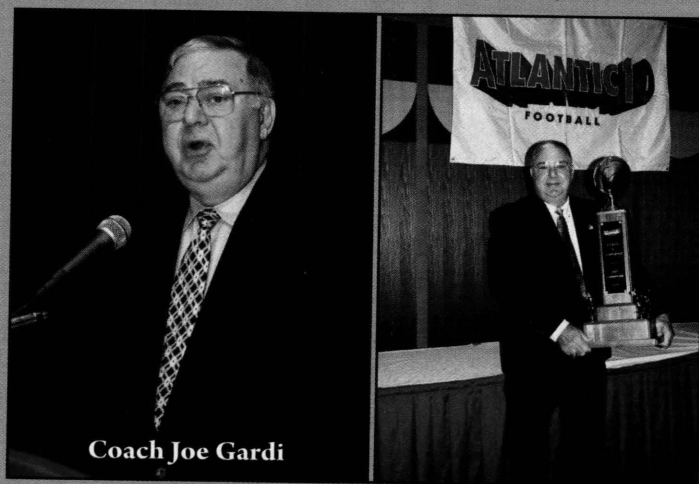
Gardi coached Hofstra for 16 seasons — long enough for the school's athletic teams to be renamed "The Pride" — and retired after the 2005 season with a record of 119-62-2 as head coach. During his tenure, Hofstra advanced to the NCAA playoffs six times, including five while the team played in Division 1-AA. In 2009, after a two-year internal study, University President Stuart Rabinowitz announced that Hofstra was discontinuing its football program, a move that shocked and saddened former players like Chrebet, Weiss and Colon, as well as alumni and fans who had supported the team and watched Hofstra football grow over the years.

Still, the program's influence continues to thrive in many corners of the sport, with former Hofstra stars playing and coaching in the NFL. Hofstra will always enjoy its reputation

in football circles as the commuter school that played host to some of the most impressive players in the nation. Coaches, scouts and players everywhere still realize what Hofstra's opponents knew during the Gardi years; that during its glory years, Hofstra's football team could compete with anyone. And if the Hofstra administration ever has a change of heart about football, there's a good chance that some gritty, overlooked players would find their way to the stadium on

Hempstead Turnpike.

FRTIZ POLLARD: A LEGEND REMEMBERED

Few remember Fritz Pollard anymore, but Walter Camp knew exactly who Pollard was. Despite his diminutive size, Pollard used his incredible speed to make his mark at Brown University as one of the first black players to make Camp's All-America team.

For that matter, Camp wasn't the only person to recognize Pollard's potential. John D. Rockefeller gave Pollard a loan to start the Brown Bombers football team in Harlem. In fact, football was just one of Pollard's many pursuits. Pollard could be described as an innovator, a trailblazer, an entrepreneur, a man who constantly reinvented himself to take advantage of opportunity, and if an opportunity were lacking, Pollard would create it. Pollard made his presence felt in football, business, music and race relations, but it was football, college football in particular, where Pollard first left his mark.

In 1915, Pollard led Brown to the 1916 Rose Bowl Game, where he made history as the first black player to play in the Rose Bowl. The following year he picked up where he left off, leading the Bears to another successful season. But to think his triumph occurred strictly on the field, and strictly as a football player, is far from correct. Pollard had to struggle every step of the way, despite his excellence on the field.

"That first year at Brown, he had to prove himself every step of the way from the time he first reported for practice," said Peter Mackie, sports archivist in the Edward North Robinson 1896 Collection of Brown Athletics at Brown University. "He was given what passed for a football uniform and sent off to the sideline until one of the assistant coaches finally said they would give him a shot on the junior varsity football team. Then he almost single-handedly led that 1915 team to the Rose Bowl Game. In 1916,

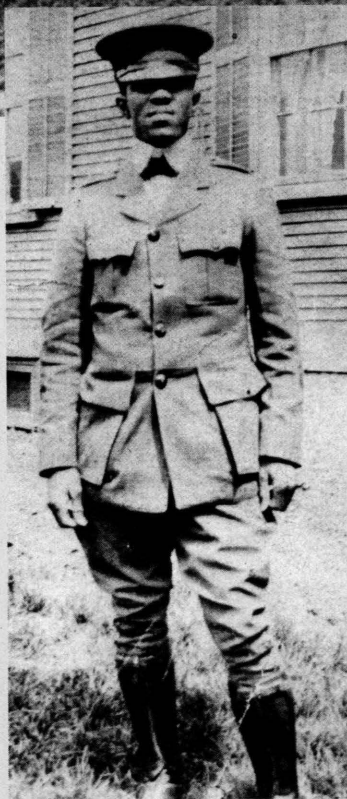

he led Brown to an 8-1 record and he almost single-handedly beat Harvard and Yale. It was Brown's first win over Harvard ever."

Maybe even more important than proving himself to opponents and his own coaches, Pollard had to prove himself to his own teammates. Pollard developed a lifelong friendship with teammate Wallace Wade, a southerner whose father complained to Brown coach Edward North Robinson that he didn't want his son to play on a team with a black player, but Wallace Wade insisted on playing. Wade later had the football stadium at Duke named for him after he led Alabama and Duke to five Rose Bowl Game appearances. Pollard also won over his Brown teammates. When a hotel owner refused to allow Pollard to stay at his hotel, Pollard's teammates insisted they wouldn't play unless Pollard stayed with them.

Pollard left Brown before graduating, and in 1919, after serving in the Army during World War I, he signed to play



with the Akron Pros, a professional team competing in the American Professional Football Association, which was later renamed the National Football League. During the 1920 season, Pollard led the Pros to an 8-0-3 record and the first championship in the league's history. The next season he was named co-coach, achieving the distinction of being the first black head coach in the NFL, more than 60 years before Art Shell was the next black head coach in the NFL with the Oakland Raiders.

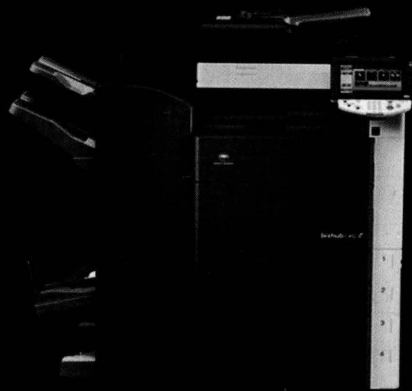
After playing and coaching in the NFL, Pollard began to mix social responsibility, entrepreneurial spirit and football together when he formed two football teams; first, the Chicago Black Hawks, and later, the New York Brown Bombers. These teams, particularly

the Brown Bombers, would play white teams of their era, promoting the quality of play among black players, serving as a showcase to illustrate the point that black players should be allowed in the NFL. Pollard's experience with the Brown

Bombers was one of several times when John D. Rockefeller, Jr. assisted him. Pollard also displayed the strategic creativity of his football brain, inventing the complicated Aeroplane Shift offense, which consistently befuddled opponents.

“Rockefeller had been the manager of the Brown football team and he took an interest in Pollard,” Mackie said. “He helped defray some of Fritz’s expenses at school. When Pollard created the Brown Bombers in Harlem, Rockefeller gave him the loan to get started.”

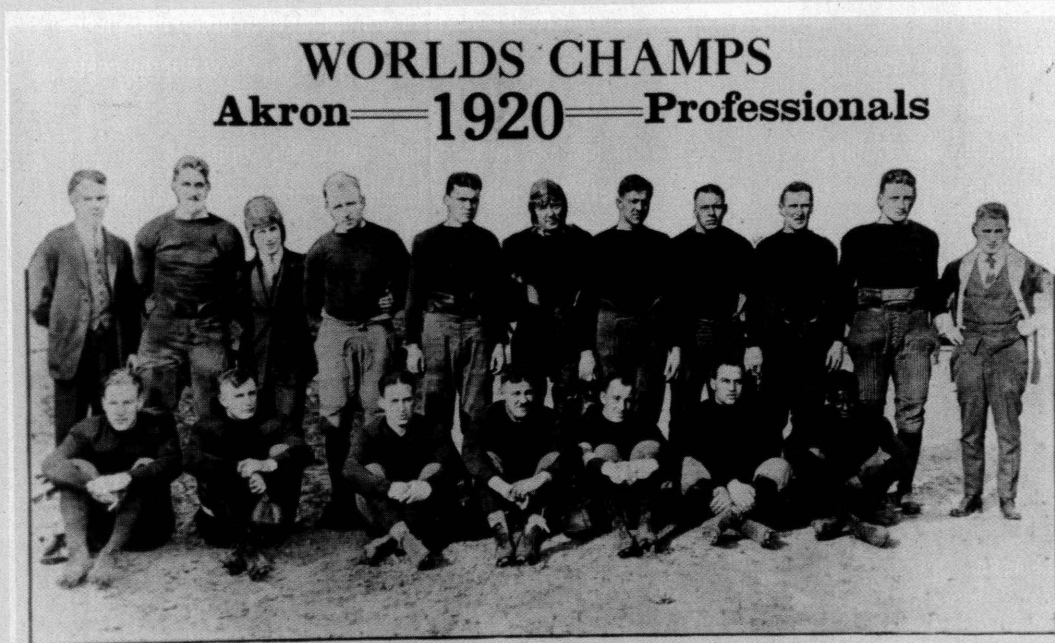
Off the football field, Pollard emerged as a renaissance man, always beginning new projects, in a seemingly endless variety

of pursuits. During his days at Brown, Pollard operated the Pollard Pressing Club, where he pressed students’ clothes for money. After leaving football, he founded a tabloid newspaper, and later founded Suntan Studios, where he showcased musicians and artists in videos. “They were the precursors to the music videos that we have today,” Mackie said.

Pollard was a person of many talents, but at his core, he was someone who used his ideas and determination to create many things, including opportunities, art, projects and ideas, which benefited people and society.

“He was a very smart, engaging guy, and he was a people person,” said Mackie. “He was able to engage people and break through any preconceived notions they had about him.”

Pollard faced numerous situations where he was forced to start over, but that never seemed to faze him. Pollard wasn’t always successful; some of his ventures didn’t fare as well as others. Yet he always came up with a new idea, and was always ready to take another risk. Years later, he was presented with an honorary

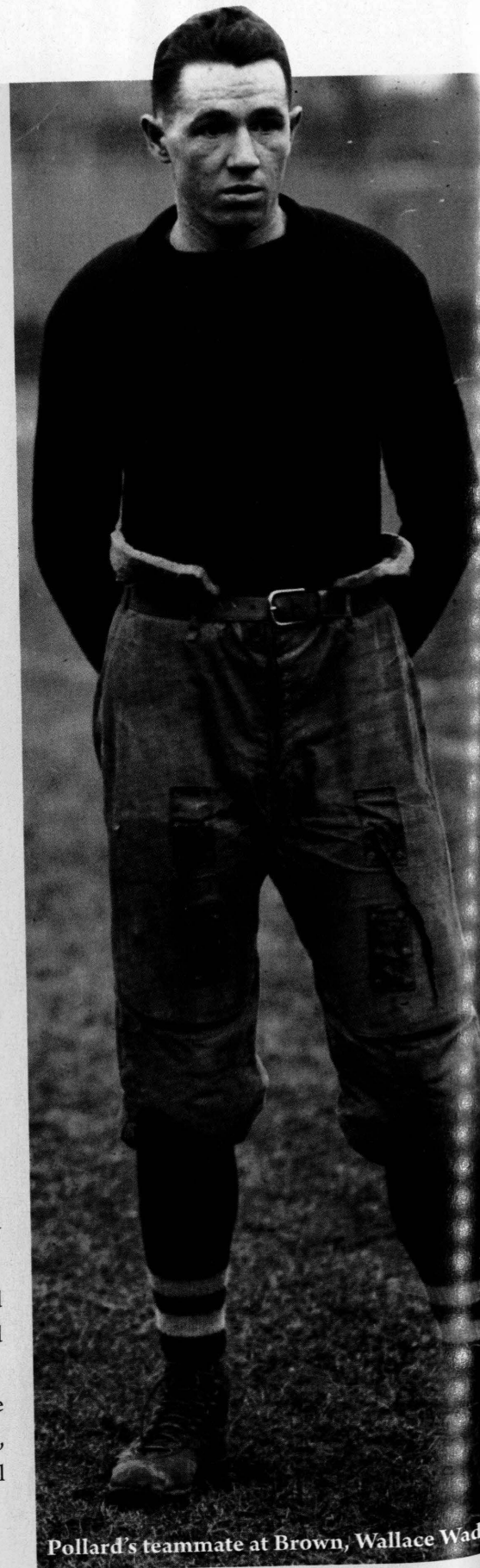

doctorate degree from Brown, and served as class marshal for the 50th reunion of the Brown class of 1919. His son and grandson also attended the University, a source of tremendous pride for Pollard.

Throughout his life, one of Pollard's greatest strengths was his ability

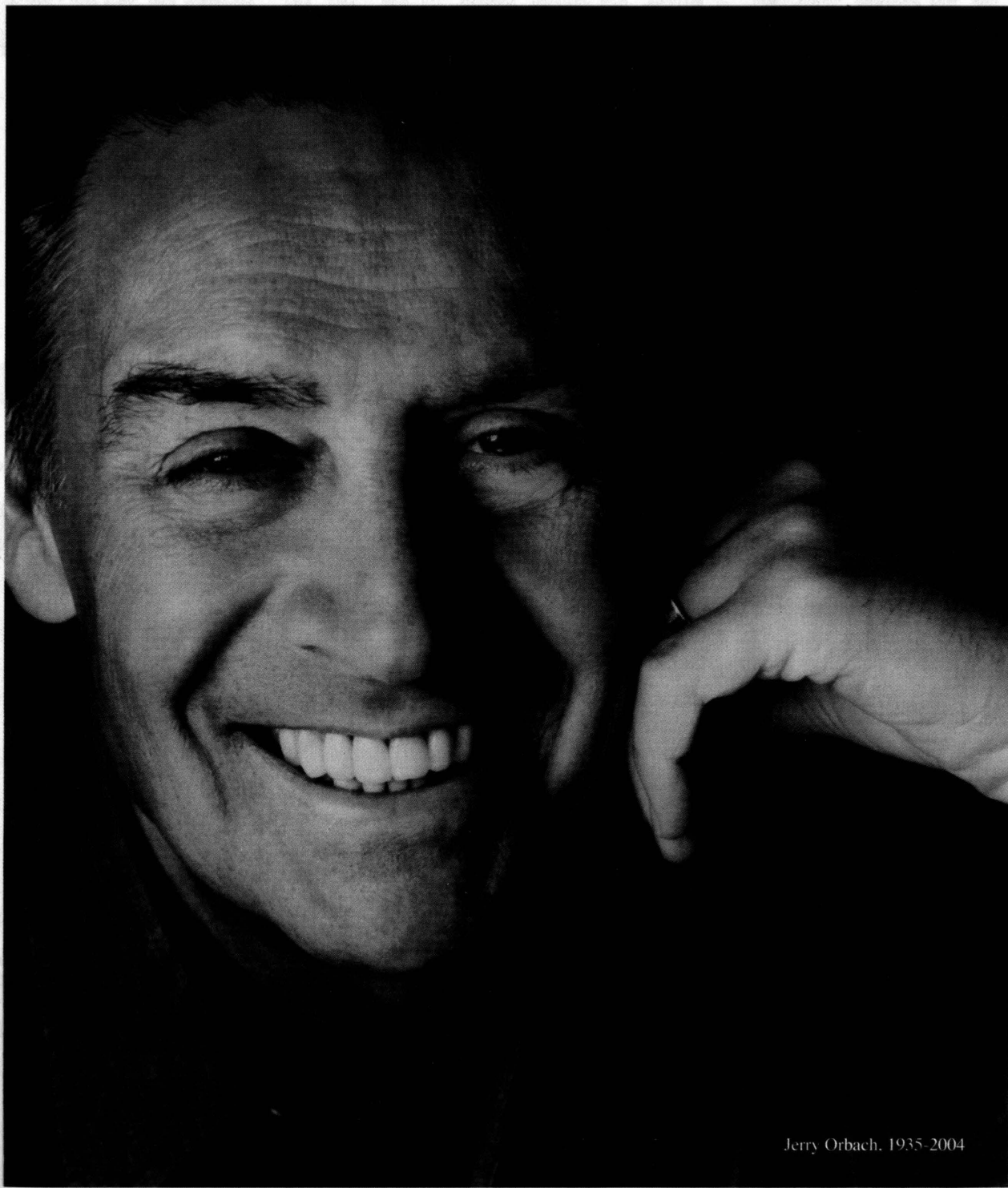
to persevere in the face of adversity, simply refusing to give up.

"In the face of all the racism that he encountered, he continually got up and bounced back," Mackie said. "He liked to say that on the field, he never wanted to show anyone they had hurt him."

The courage to fight through adversity, the ability to reinvent himself, the passion to pursue dreams and ideas and willingness to embrace any challenge, these were just a few of the things that made Fritz Pollard great. We could all learn from that.

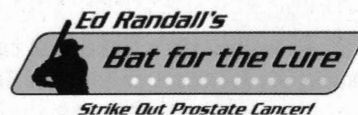

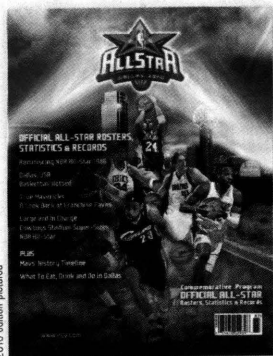

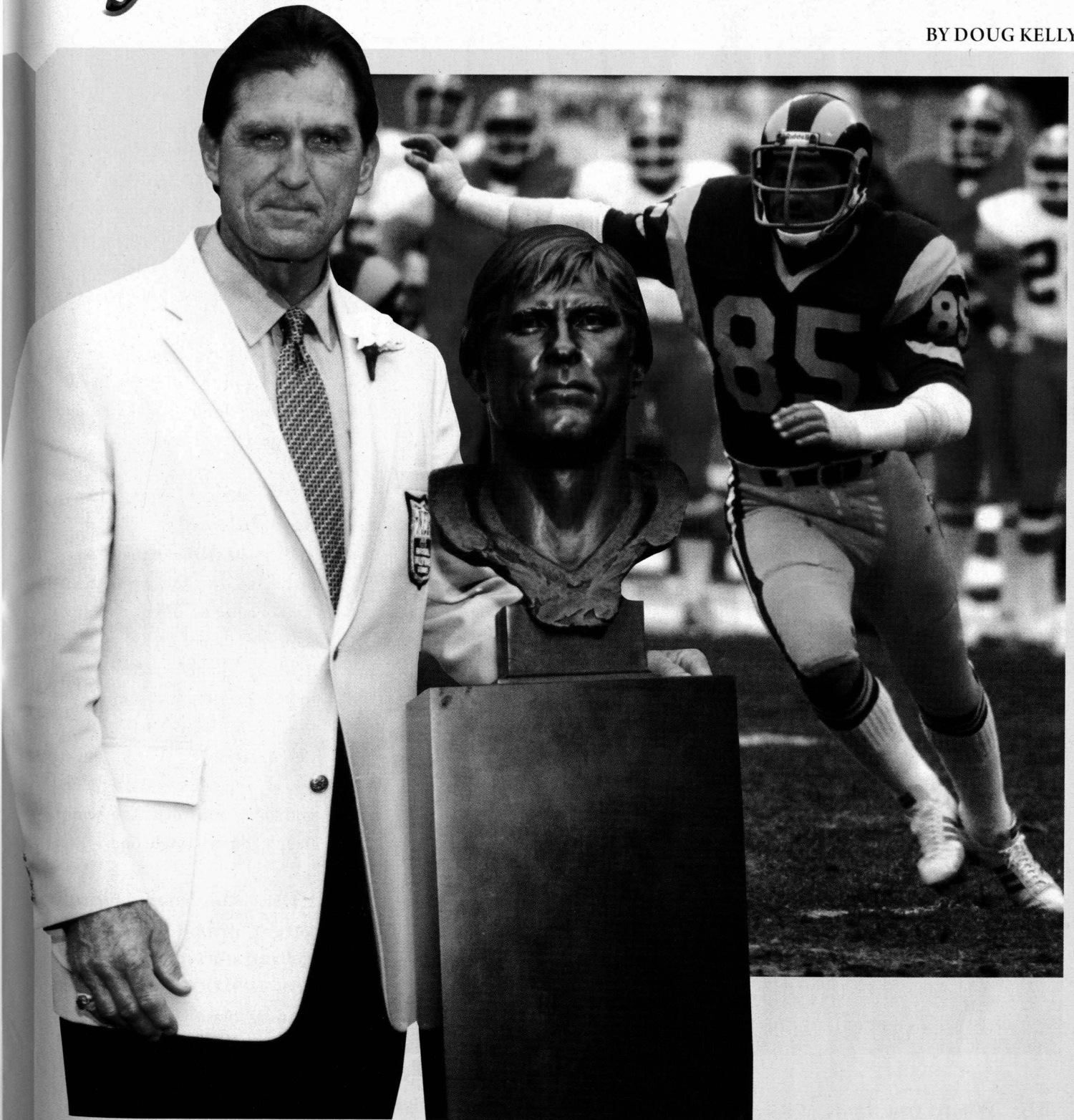

JACK YOUNGBLOOD

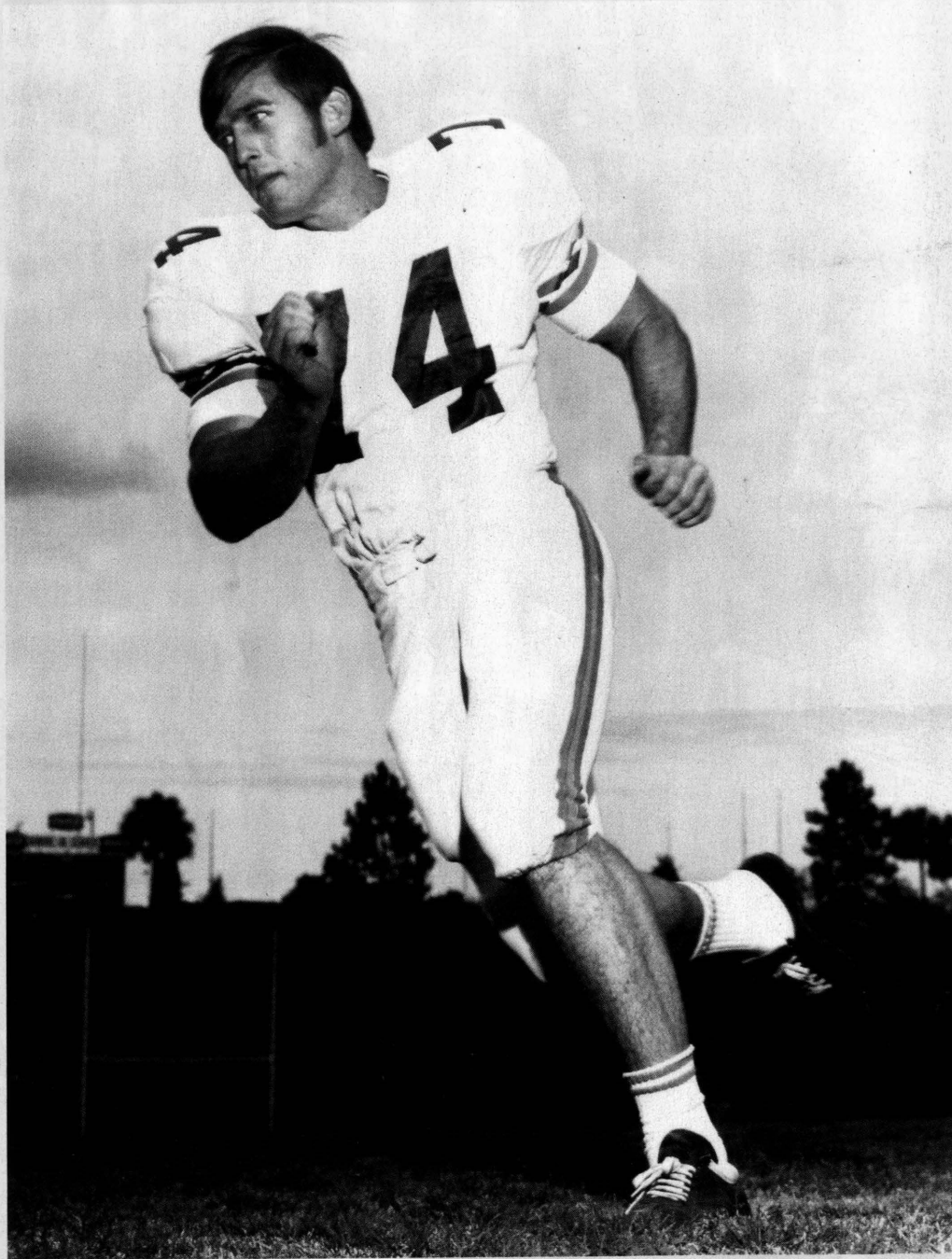
A college coach who later won two Super Bowls once told him he had no future as a college player.

Buoyed with that dubious vote of confidence, Jack Youngblood then forged an All-America career at the University of Florida, followed by 13 years with the Los Angeles Rams. Now 60,

Youngblood lives outside Orlando and is vice president for business development for CO2, a carbon credit firm. A member of both the College and Pro Football Halls of Fame, he chuckles when asked about how his alma mater recruits players today compared to when he was a high school senior in the mid-1960s.

TDI Q&A: JACK YOUNGBLOOD

CONTINUED



TDI: When you look back at how you were recruited to play college football, is it anything like it is today?

YOUNGBLOOD: Let me put it this way. I was well-known within the Youngblood household. That was it! The recruiting process back then, especially in rural Florida, was a universe

always thought it would be tremendous if I had a chance to be playing close to home.

TDI: Did they ever watch you play?

YOUNGBLOOD: Yes. The FSU assistant coach who was responsible for the panhandle area of the state was a young

away from what it is today.

TDI: In what ways?

YOUNGBLOOD: Recruiting high school players today, it's grown to celebrity status. [Recruiting] has become a cottage industry, and you can understand why. Parents more than ever want their children to be recognized, to get a quality education and be part of a major college football program.

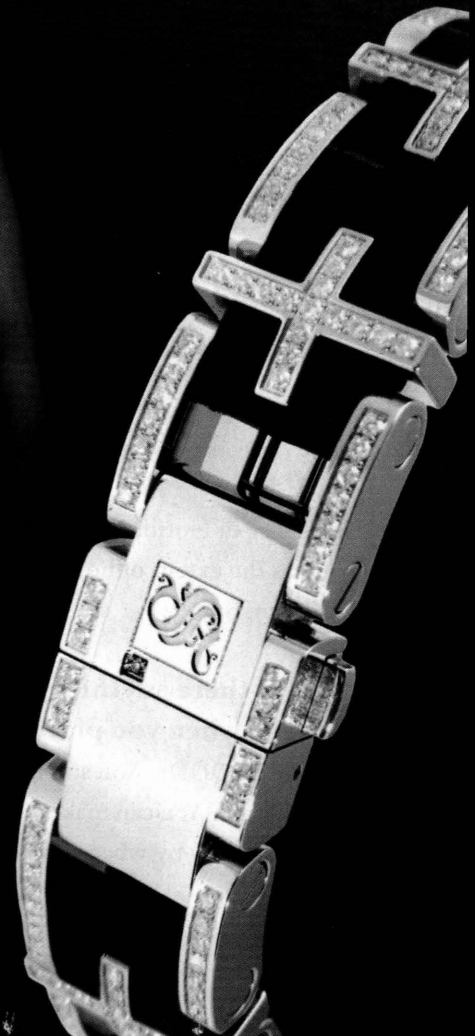
TDI: Hasn't that always been the case?

YOUNGBLOOD: In many ways, of course, but the whole focus is so magnified now. I went to Jefferson County High School in Monticello, Florida. We went to the playoffs my senior year in Class B. Went 10-1-1. Well, our quarterback started getting letters from schools, the tight end got some, and 'ol Jack, a senior, hadn't gotten a single one.

TDI: So your Florida career was a long way from getting started...

YOUNGBLOOD: You bet! Florida State was twenty-six miles from my high school. Bill Peterson was the head coach. I

guy, Bill Parcels. He came over when we were practicing for the playoffs, and then watched us beat Blountstown.

Bill went back to Tallahassee with his report from our game. It said that our quarterback, tight end and one of our running backs could maybe play at the next level. Now, Bill Peterson, he knew a little bit about me, and he asked Parcels, "What about the big, tall kid, Youngblood?" And Parcels told him, "Coach, he will never play college football."

TDI: How many times have you met up with Parcels since then?

YOUNGBLOOD: Too many to remember 'em all. And Bill always tells the story along the lines of "Well, I used to have a tremendous recruiting eye back in my college days!" We always laugh about it every time we see one another.

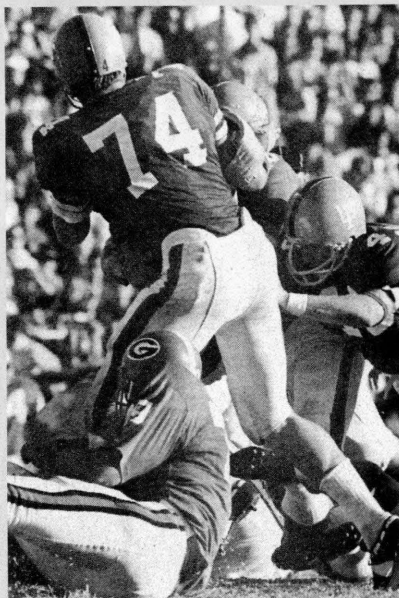
TDI: So Florida State missed out, but how did Florida find you?

YOUNGBLOOD: Unbeknownst to me, Ray Graves, then the Florida coach, had sent a man named Dave Fuller to scout the panhandle playoffs. Dave was the Gators' baseball coach, but he helped out with football. I had no idea he was watching us play, and now we win the championship game over Avon Park. We were celebrating on the field, and someone grabbed me by the elbow. I turned to look and I saw this man and I didn't know him from Adam.

And he says, "Son, would you like to play football for the University of Florida?" I answered, "Yes." Immediately. And that was the extent of how the University of Florida recruited Jack Youngblood.

TDI: Is there anything about recruiting today that was true when you played?

YOUNGBLOOD: You still have to observe the player on the practice field. You can make judgments off of tape, but you can never go solely by what you see on tape. I played linebacker



in high school, but when I got to Florida, I was six-four and about two hundred pounds and the coaches one day said to me, "Why don't we see what you can do with your hand on the ground?" Meaning the defensive line.

For whatever reason, I discovered I had a natural ability to play that position, left end. I never could see things on the right side the way I saw 'em on the left. From that day onward, I was a defensive end.

TDI: Urban Meyer often invites former Gators to talk to the team. What has that meant to you?

YOUNGBLOOD: I'm blessed to have a special relationship with Urban and his program. When Urban came here, he had a number of concepts, and one of them was that his teams respected and identified the legacy of the players and coaches who'd gone before them.

Since day one, he has reached out to the former players and has opened the door and wants them around the team as much as possible. Coach Meyer is very concerned with teaching his players that what they are doing now isn't solely about them, but is also about the past, the guys who made the sacrifices back then that they are making now.

TDI: Looking back, what's the biggest change in the game from your day?

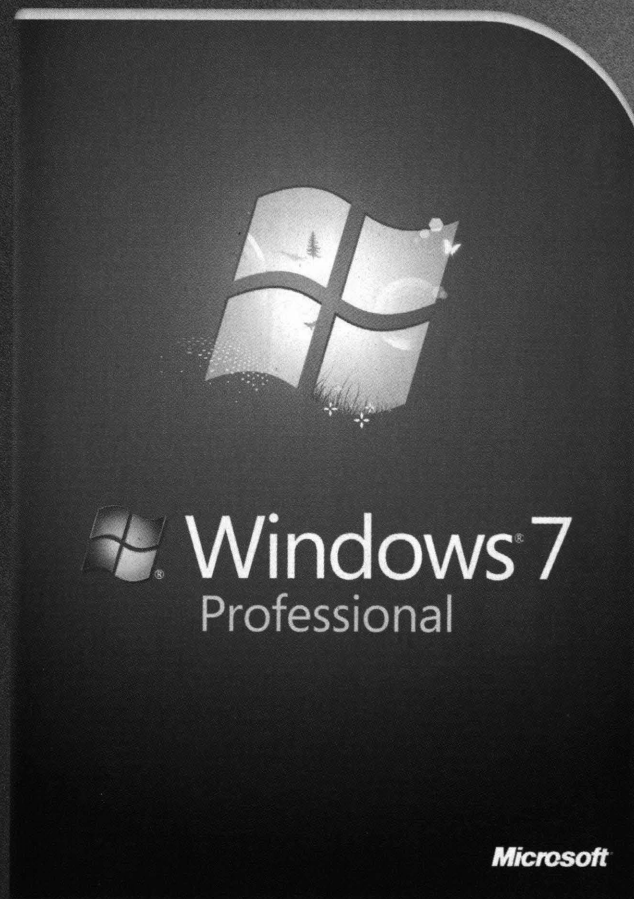
YOUNGBLOOD: On the business side, television. On the evaluation side, video and the ease with which it can be transmitted from one place to another.

The TV money has become the dominant source of revenue, not just for the football program but all the sports at a particular school. Recruits today have so many more options, locally and nationwide.

When coaches want to look at a prospect, they can do pretty much everything they need to do on the computer. Programs today are able to evaluate so many more players than ever before.

It is definitely an exciting time to be a Gator, past or present.

Sox Harrison Stadium



Sox Harrison Stadium serves as the home of the Fighting Scots. Dedicated in 1965, the stadium honors the memory of B. Regis "Sox" Harrison, the head football and basketball coach at Edinboro University for 34 years. Sox Harrison was the key figure in the building of Edinboro's athletic program, unselfishly devoting 34 years of service to the University as an athletic director, coach and physical education instructor. Appropriately, he was the first member inducted into the Edinboro Athletic Hall of Fame in 1982.



Harrison coached the Fighting Scot football team from its inception in 1926 to 1938, then returned to guide the gridirers in 1941 and '42. In addition, he coached the men's basketball team for 23 seasons, from 1928-53, winning 175 games.

The stadium received a facelift last summer, giving it a spanking new look. Most noticeable is the installation of an artificial surface, Sportex, to replace the natural grass. And it is now illuminated, with lights being installed for the first time. Finally, a new scoreboard was installed.

Sox Harrison Stadium seats 6,000 people in its two grandstands, along with plenty of standing room. In addition to press boxes on both sides of the stadium, the facility has locker rooms, a training room and complete amenities for fans.

The stadium has undergone several renovations, including a new sound system and improved handicapped access areas in 1999. In 1997, a new grandstand was constructed on the visitor's side of the field, adding 2,500 permanent seats, along with a press box, locker rooms and a training room.

In addition to the football field, the facility contains complete track facilities.

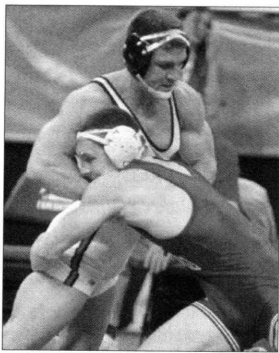

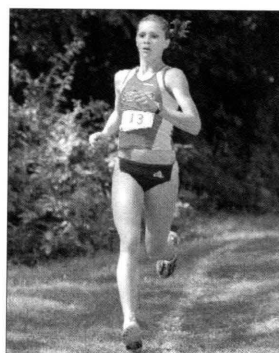

Jarrod King and Mary Dell Named PSAC Pete Nevins Scholar-Athletes of the Year

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) is pleased to announce its 2009-10 Scholar-Athletes, which are highlighted by the PSAC Pete Nevins Scholar-Athletes of the Year. A new record total of 2,021 PSAC student-athletes have been named Scholar-Athletes while Edinboro's Jarrod King and Shippensburg's Mary Dell have been named the PSAC Pete Nevins Scholar-Athletes of the Year. The 2,021 scholar-athletes represents a new league record, easily surpassing last year's record of 1,859 and an increase of nearly three percent of all PSAC student-athletes. The 2,021 scholar-athletes represents nearly one-third of all PSAC student-athletes - 32.8 percent.

The PSAC Pete Nevins Scholar-Athletes of the Year are presented to the top student-athletes who have achieved at least a 3.50 cumulative grade point average while competing at an outstanding athletic level. To be eligible for the Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards, a student-athlete must have been recognized as a fall, winter or spring PSAC Top 10 award winner in the same academic year. In their 19th year of existence, the awards were renamed in 2007 to honor East Stroudsburg's long-time sports information director, Pete Nevins, who passed away earlier that year. The awards are given to one male and one female candidate at the end of each academic year. In order to be named a PSAC Scholar-Athlete, a student-athlete must have compiled a cumulative GPA of 3.25 or above.

King is Edinboro's first-ever male PSAC Scholar-Athlete of the Year and just the third Fighting Scot ever honored as a PSAC Scholar-Athlete of the Year. One year after winning the NCAA Division I title in 165 pounds to become Edinboro's fourth national champion, he came back to finish third place at the 2010 NCAA Championships while leading Edinboro to a 16th place finish. He ended the 2009-10 season with a 39-2 record and was named the EWL Wrestler of the Year and the PSAC Wrestler of the Year for the second straight season. He also won three straight EWL and PSAC individual titles in the last three seasons and finished his Edinboro career with a 103-16 record and an overall career record of 125-27. He was a PSAC Winter Top 10 selection for the second straight year and graduated with a 3.70 GPA while majoring in individualized studies.

Dell is Shippensburg's third female winner and the fourth winner from Shippensburg all-time. She ends her career as a 10-time automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championships in both indoor and outdoor track, a six-time All-American in both indoor and outdoor, and with a single national championship on the indoor distance medley relay team at last year's NCAA Championships. Dell won three PSAC individual championships during the 2009-10 season in the indoor distance medley relay, the outdoor 1,500 and the outdoor steeplechase while helping the Lady Raiders win the PSAC Championships in cross country, indoor and outdoor track en route to the Raiders winning the 2009-10 Dixon Trophy and becoming the first school in PSAC history to win all three titles - women's cross country, women's indoor and women's outdoor track - in the same season. Dell finished her undergrad career with a 3.979 cumulative GPA and was both a fall and spring Top 10 honoree this year.

King and Dell were just two of the record 21 *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-Americans® from the PSAC and were two of seven PSAC student-athletes that earned Academic All-America recognition for the second straight year in 2009-10.

Trevor Harris (below) became the third Edinboro University football player to finish as a finalist for the Harlan Hill Trophy, presented annually to the top player in NCAA Division II football. Harris was a finalist in 2008 after being a

Northeast Region finalist in 2007.

Running back Elbert Cole was one of three finalists in 1989, while wide receiver Ernest Priester was a finalist a year later. Cole placed third in the '89 balloting. He earned All-American honors in 1989, receiving first team accolades from Kodak/American Football Coaches Association, second team recognition from Football Gazette, and third team status from Associated Press.

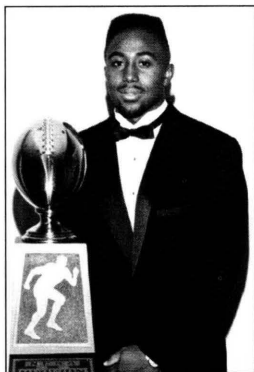
Cole rushed for 1,507 yards and set Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference records for touchdowns (24) and points (148). He led the Fighting Scots to the PSAC West title, a 8-3 record and a number seven ranking in the final Division II poll.

Priester was runnerup to North Dakota State's Chris Simdorn in 1990 when the Bison claimed the Division II national title. Priester was the PSAC Western Division Co-Player of the Year in 1990. He was also recognized by Kodak/American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press and the Football Gazette as a first team All-American.

The wide receiver hauled in 47 passes for 1,102 yards and 15 TDs. Edinboro finished 9-3, reaching the Division II quarterfinals.

Andre Burke made a run at the Harlan Hill Trophy in 2004, as the tailback was a Northeast Region semifinalist. Burke ended up with a school-record 1,713 yards and 19 TDs.

The Cactus Bowl

Trevor Harris continued the tradition of Edinboro Fighting Scots playing in the Cactus Bowl in January 2009. (NOTE: The 2007 contest was suspended.) The quarterback completed 10 of 13 passes for 97 yards and ran three times for 17 yards to help the West All-Stars to a 16-0 win over the East All-Stars. For a number of years Division II football teams had an all-star game named the Snow Bowl, which was played in Fargo, North Dakota. In 2000 the contest was moved to Kingsville, Texas and renamed the Cactus Bowl. The contest features the top small college seniors in the country. Edinboro has had at least one representative in every Cactus Bowl (aka Snow Bowl) but one, with a streak of nine straight years. Fighting Scots in the Pros



Former Edinboro Fighting Scot Jeremy O'Day (#54) helped lead Saskatchewan to the 2007 Grey Cup with a 23-19 win over Winnipeg. It marked the second time O'Day had hoisted a Grey Cup.

Edinboro University has had a history of players performing in the professional ranks. Record-setting quarterback Trevor Harris signed as a free agent in April with Jacksonville of the NFL and was in camp with the Jaguars before being cut in the final roster cutdown.

In addition, Jeremy O'Day has enjoyed an illustrious career in the Canadian Football League. O'Day

is in his 14th season as an offensive lineman in the CFL, and in his 12th season with the Saskatchewan Roughriders. A year ago he was named a CFL all-star for the fifth time overall while helping the Roughriders to the Grey Cup. It marked the second time in the last three years the Roughriders reached the CFL's championship game.

Saskatchewan defeated Winnipeg 23-19 in the 2007 Grey Cup. He was nominated as the CFL Lineman of the Year for the third time.

O'Day was chosen by the Toronto Argonauts in the second round of the 1997 supplemental draft, and was a member of the 1997 Grey Cup winning team. He has played in over 200 CFL regular season games as an offensive lineman, along with 14 playoff

games. He was Saskatchewan's nominee for CFL Most Outstanding Lineman in 2007.

John Williams was drafted by British Columbia in the fourth round of the 2002 CFL Draft. After one season with British Columbia the former Boro running back played for Toronto from 2004-07, and in 2008 and '09 he has been a member of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

Dave Green and Jim Romaniszyn playing for the Cleveland Browns in the 1970's. Green, a running back, also played for the Montreal Alouettes in the CFL. Romaniszyn, a 6'2", 225 lb. running back, was drafted by the Browns in the 13th round in 1973, then switched to linebacker. Romaniszyn holds the distinction of being the only Edinboro player drafted by the NFL.

Jeff Traversy, a 6'5", 280 lb. nose tackle, was the Calgary Stampeders' third pick in the 1997 college draft and played through the 2002 season.

A number of other Fighting Scots have made their marks in the professional ranks. Denorse Mosely was a member of the Miami Dolphins as a defensive back for two seasons, and was also in training camp with the Green Bay Packers. Fullback Matt Phillips signed as a free agent with the New England Patriots in 2005, and three years ago punter Sean McNicholas signed as a free agent with the New York Jets.

Erie's indoor football entrant has made ample use of of Edinboro players. Anthony Peluso twice earned All-AIFA honors while playing on the offensive line. Dave Smith and Seth Fragale also enjoyed successful careers.
