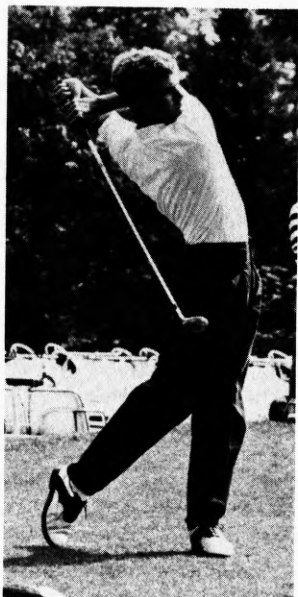


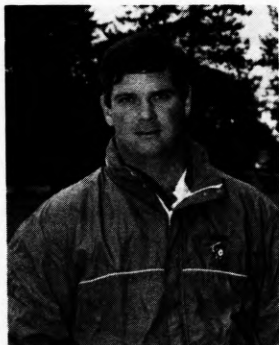

Bob Orr enters his fourth year as head coach of the Fighting Scot golf team. During his four year playing career at Allegheny College, Bob earned three letters and was named to the all-conference team twice. The high point in Orr's career came in his senior season when he received All-American honors. Orr

graduated from Allegheny with a degree in history in 1981. His vast knowledge and experience will certainly promote success in the Scots' golf program.

Spring Season Preview

The Boro linksters will face a great deal of tough competition throughout the 1993 spring season. Coach Orr will need some inexperienced underclassmen to step up their play a notch if they are going to continue to be competitive.

The Scots' rigorous schedule includes trips to both Indiana and Slippery Rock, both of whom split three first-place finishes in Edinboro's six fall tournaments.

Edinboro will look to the leadership and steady play of second year starter Justin Wysocki to guide them this spring. Also in contention for the top spot will be Eric Chuderewicz, who has started a team high 11 straight tournaments for Orr.

Among the inexperienced youngsters who had more than admirable seasons were Greg Long, Geoff Hirz and Todd Henry. All three showed they were capable of playing well in the fall season. Orr knows these three have great potential and can bring their games to the next level.

Mike Siembida, Kyle Longstreet and Greg Smith saw tournament action and will also be vying for playing time in 1993.

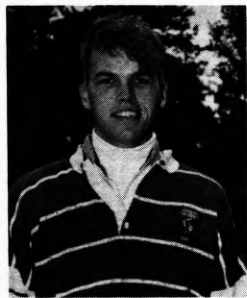

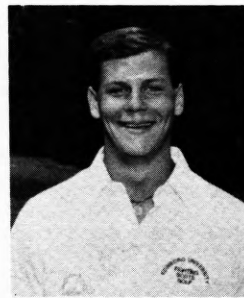

1992 Fall Season Review

The 1992 fall season turned out to be another rebuilding year for head coach Bob Orr and the Fighting Scots. While the team lacked experience, they showed a great deal of improvement throughout the season. The tough competition each week proved as a great benefit to the squad.

"It's great to see these kids so dedicated to improving their knowledge about the game and to see them remain eager to get better all the time," said Orr on the team's effort this fall. "I'm looking forward to working with them throughout the spring and for years to come."

The Scots were paced in the fall by sophomore Justin Wysocki who lead the team with an 83.8 tournament stroke average. He finished first among his Scot teammates twice this season, including an impressive 82 at the PSAC Tournament in Lock Haven.

Following close behind Wysocki was fellow sophomore Greg Long (84.4) and junior Eric Chuderewicz (84.6). Long had the Boro's best score of the day twice this fall and the team's season low of 80 at Slippery Rock. Chuderewicz owned team low honor three times. He is also credited with the team's second best score as he fired an 81 at both Gannon and Allegheny.

Also returning in the spring will be freshman Geoff "Keeg" Hirz, sophomore Todd Henry and senior Mike Siembida. As a newcomer, Hirz placed in all five matches he competed in this season. His season's best came at Slippery Rock where he stroked an 83. Henry placed in three out of the four matches and shot a more than respectable score of 82 at Slippery Rock. Siembida's marks were good enough to count in all three matches in which he participated. His season's low was an 85 at Gannon.

Freshman Kyle Longstreet and sophomore Greg Smith added to Orr's depth chart as they both gained valuable tournament experience during the fall campaign.
