- The Institute formed subcommittees with the expanded membership. The following subcommittees were formed:

 - Outcome Based Education Day
- Breakfast meetings were held in November and December with the area superintendents, School of Education Chairpersons, Ken Adams, and the Dean of Education.
 - Eleven area superintendents attended the November Breakfast
 Meeting. Richard Arnold, Nick Stupiansky and Salene Cowher presented overviews of major grant initiatives under their direction.
- The Institute in collaboration with the Center for Excellence in Teaching and the Dean of Education office made plans for the Outcome Based Education Day on October 4.
- Planning for the Evening of Science started.
- Collaborative Directory was revised throughout the semester.
- The Institute worked with the Middle Level Committee on the October 16 conference. The conference was a success. One hundred and ten Educators attended.
- The Future Teachers Organization subcommittee set up a timetable for meetings with interested area teachers to connect them with School of Education faculty and education majors.
 - On December 7, the first meeting was held for School of Education faculty and representatives from student educational organizations.
 The purpose of the meeting was to establish the groundwork for the potential formation of a school district and university Chapter Membership in Future Educators of America.

Fall 1993

- Planning was begun for the First Annual Children's Fair to celebrate Week of the Young Child.
- Kitty Cansilla, Executive Director of Community Shelter Services, was invited to present information on homeless children. Institute members then discussed related projects that could address the Institute's goals.
- A Brown Bag Session was held on November 16. Roy Shinn presented "The Role of Hearing in Early Childhood Development." Thirty-five persons attended.

Fall 1993

- The Freshman Values Inquiry Project was discussed and finalized.
- Six Educational Service faculty held evening seminars for their freshmen majors to discuss the Freshman Values Inquiry Project.
- A review of the first faculty workshop for the Problem-Solving and Conflict Resolution Grant was discussed, along with a summary of future workshops.*
- Ken Adams and Tina Oonnithan reported on their attendance at the Society for Values and Higher Education conference held in August at Bowdoin College, Maine.
- The Interuniversity Values Newsletter was discussed. Edinboro faculty will be encouraged to submit articles for inclusion.
- Three undergraduate students attended the Fifth Annual Women's Institute at McKeever Environmental Center. The possibility of writing a mini-grant to be presented to the Commission on the Status of Women was discussed.
- The President's Scholarship application was further finalized.

- The interdisciplinary course offering for general education, Ethics and American Education, was discussed.

- Members were asked to review recently circulated articles on the teaching of history, values audits, and the use of curriculum in moral development.

- The Miami University of Ohio multicultural interactive video was rented for the spring semester.
- Institute members reviewed articles for possible distribution to faculty for use during Black History Month.
