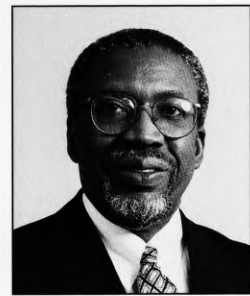

Fighting Scots Seek Recipe for Third Straight PSAC Crown

Greg Walcavich enters his 25th season as a head coach with a recipe for success. He knows a thing or two about mixing a little bit of this and a pinch of that to come up with just the right ingredients for a winner.

Walcavich enters the 2006-07 campaign with the most career wins of any PSAC coach, and like a fine wine, he's getting better with age. Edinboro has finished either first or second in the PSAC West each of the last six seasons, with a 51-21 record during that period.

After leading the Fighting Scots to a 24-7 record in 2004-05, Walcavich was bold enough to predict he could bake up another big winner in 2005-06. All he did was lead Edinboro to the 21-10 ledger. More importantly, the Boro became the first team to win back-to-back PSAC championships since Cheyney in 1982 and '83, and made its second straight appearance in the NCAA Division II Playoffs. That had never previously happened at Edinboro.

Now Walcavich is ready to step back into the kitchen, don the apron, and cook up another winner. "We feel good about the ingredients, we just need to know what temperature to cook it at," referring to his 2006-07 Fighting Scot edition.

For starters, every successful team needs a good big man, and Edinboro has that in Daren Tielsch. The 6'8" forward was granted an additional year of eligibility by the NCAA

this summer, in effect providing the Fighting Scots with a recruiting bonanza. Tielsch averaged 18.7 ppg. and 9.5 rpg. in '05-06.

Next, you need a standout in the backcourt. Enter Curtis Ingram, a 6'3" senior who joined the Fighting Scots a year ago after transferring from Wofford. Ingram averaged a modest 13.1 ppg., but gained a quick reputation as a defensive standout.

Now here comes the tricky part, mixing in a group of returnees with an additional year of experience with a recruiting class that can hopefully provide immediate dividends.

"It's a step-by-step process," admitted Walcavich. "You look to go forward and get better every day. That's the most fun part of the job."

"I feel as optimistic this year as I did last year. I think that we have a chance to be a very good basketball team. We have two very good players back. You hope you have players in the program who can grow. We have that. You hope you have recruits who can help. We think we have that."

The Fighting Scots return two starters and five letterwinners, adding a pair of transfers and two freshmen to the mix. Walcavich likes what he sees in the early going.

"I think we have good athletic ability," Walcavich related. "We're quick enough at all the positions that we can successfully defend. We have good enough size at the perimeter spots that we should be a pretty good rebounding team. I don't think we're going to be consistently overmatched from a size standpoint. I don't think we'll be at a disadvantage from an athletic standpoint."

What does concern Walcavich is the large turnover in the roster over the last two years. Tom Grabill is the lone player who was with the Fighting Scots prior to 2004-05, and over the last two years they've lost the likes of Jakim Donaldson, Rob Sims, Torry Mitchell, Chris Ravello, and Dan Grabill.

"I have some concerns in regards to us being able to come back from what we've lost in the last two years," he pointed out. "We've had to replace three first team all-conference players, the MVP of the conference, and a former Rookie of the Year, along with some players who were part of the team for four or five years. We lost people from last year on the heels of the year before. We have some real voids there."

"We've almost gutted the team in the last two years. When you look out there this coming year, only Daren (Tielsch), Devon (Knight), Ryan (McLemore) and Tommy (Grabill) have been there. So that is a concern. That becomes the team-building aspect, which is the fun part."

One thing Walcavich hopefully can count on is more intimidating defense. The Fighting Scots blocked a school-record 188 shots, with five players blocking at least ten shots.

Edinboro will open the 2006-07 campaign on November 15 against West Virginia Wesleyan. The Fighting Scots then play six straight games at home, including contests against local rivals Gannon and Mercyhurst.

"It will be pretty taxing and demanding," admitted Walcavich. "I dislike the fact it is so out of balance in terms of home and away. You play four in a row at home, then four in a row on the road. The month of December we're at home, the month of January on the road."

Edinboro's schedule includes a pair of games against PSAC West regular season champion Shippensburg, along with games against Alderson-Broadus and Charleston(WV), all nationally-ranked. Walcavich also pointed out that the Fighting Scots not only have 19 games against PSAC teams, but also face fully-funded programs such as Gannon, Mercyhurst, Charleston and Alderson-Broadus.

"I think our schedule will be challenging and a good indication of what type of team we'll have," Walcavich concluded. "It's conceivable we could be pretty good and not have as good a record."

Here's a look at the 2006-07 Fighting Scots:

Backcourt

In recent years Edinboro has gone with a three-guard alignment. Unfortunately, they must replace two of last year's three starters. The duo of Torry Mitchell and Chris Ravello accounted for 753 points and 123 three-pointers. Mitchell may well have been the PSAC's best one-on-one player, and was named a first team All-PSAC West performer after averaging 14.3 ppg. and leading the Boro with 129 assists.

"We have to find somebody to replace the minutes, Torry Mitchell player," admitted Walcavich. "That's a huge loss. He was so experienced, and so explosive in big games. He didn't pad his average against lesser opponents. That's a huge void."

Devon Knight and Dan Walsh will battle for the right to replace Mitchell at point guard. Both will likely see plenty of action. Knight is a diminutive 5'9" junior who was one of the stars of Edinboro's 2005 postseason run and an explosive player in his own right. After getting off to a fast start a year ago, scoring in double figures in six of the first nine games, he failed to score in double figures the rest of the year while battling several injuries. He ended up averaging 5.0 ppg.

"Devon has been capable in the past," noted Walcavich. "I feel he's really ready to take a big step, and he's been good previously."

Walsh is a 6'2" freshman who has impressed the coaching staff with his toughness and maturity for a first-year player. He earned third team All-State honors at Moon Area (Pa.) High School as a senior, leading the Tigers to a 24-6 record.

"We think Dan will be a very productive

player for us," commented Walcavich. "He'll be a very big part of our team this year."

The Fighting Scots are well-armed at the two wing positions, with a trio of former transfers leading the way. Curtis Ingram joined Edinboro a year ago after playing two seasons at Division I Wofford. The 6'3" senior battled a knee injury early in the year, missing three games. Down the stretch he was everything the coaching staff had hoped for when he joined the program.

Ingram averaged 13.1 ppg., third on the team, while making 41 of 108 three-pointers. But the most notable aspect of Ingram's game is his defense. He regularly shut down some of the best scorers in the PSAC. And Edinboro fans will long remember his free throw with no time left on the clock to give Edinboro a 52-51 win over Shippensburg in the PSAC championship game.

"We expect Curtis to lead the way," Walcavich stated. "He's just been great for us. He was one of our best players last year, and excelled on both ends of the court. He's an outstanding defensive player, and a very good offensive player. I expect him to have a terrific season."

Kyree Brown and Joseph Jones will battle for the right to play alongside Ingram. Brown is a 6'3" sophomore by way of Division I Eastern Illinois, while Jones is a local product from nearby Cathedral Prep who spent two seasons at Roberts Wesleyan. The 6'2" sophomore now moves up a level, and figures to see plenty of time.

Brown saw limited action at Eastern Illinois, playing in 18 games and scoring eight points along with pulling down 12 rebounds. His high school credentials are quite impressive, however. At Friends Central High School in Philadelphia, he averaged 24.3 ppg.

and was rated the number two "sleeper" in the metropolitan area by one on-line service.

"Kyree is someone we're looking to do a very good job for us," Walcavich stressed. "He will certainly be playing right away. He's a gifted athlete who will help us."

Jones sat out the 2004-05 season at Roberts Wesleyan, but blossomed a year ago. He averaged 13.5 ppg. with 4.2 rpg. and led the team in assists (149) and steals (56). He was a third team All-American Mideast Conference selection.

"We think Joe will really make a positive impact for us," Walcavich assessed. "He continues to grow physically and as a player. We're real excited to have him."

Tom Grabill is the lone four-year player on the Fighting Scots. A frail-looking 5'8", 140 lbs., he has improved each year. He saw action in nine contests last year.

"Tom has been a very big part of our program for three years," noted Walcavich. "He's a good player who has hit some big shots for us. He knows what we want to do, and can come off the bench and hit shots."

Giuseppe Barone, a 5'10" freshman, is a walk-on who will provide further depth at guard.

Frontcourt

Edinboro received a huge boost with the news that Daren Tielsch would be back. The 6'8", 230 lb. forward is a creative offensive player who was healthy for the first time a year ago. The results were impressive - team-leading figures of 18.7 ppg. and 9.5 rpg., ranking seventh in the PSAC in scoring while leading the league in rebounding. He shot 55.4 percent from the floor and attempted a school-record 210 free throws, although he shot just 57.1 percent from the line.

Tielsch added 81 assists and 42 blocked shots, both second on the team, while leading the Fighting Scots with 37 steals. He was accorded first team All-PSAC West honors and was the Most Outstanding Player at the PSAC Championships. He was even selected to play in the inaugural Division II All-Star Game, a point not lost on the NCAA. His appearance in the postseason event will force him to sit out the season opener against West Virginia Wesleyan. In two seasons at Edinboro, Tielsch has scored 914 points.

"We're fortunate to have him back," admitted Walcavich. "We didn't plan on it, but we're happy and grateful he is. We've played quite well with him. He can play all over the court, and stuff the stat sheet."

The rest of the frontcourt is young and somewhat untested. However, if enigmatic Ryan McLemore steps up, the Fighting Scots could have an imposing one-two frontcourt punch. McLemore is a skinny junior whose long arms make him appear much bigger than 6'8".

Those same long arms have made him an intimidating force in the middle. A year ago McLemore blocked 61 shots, the eighth-highest season total, despite averaging just under 15 minutes per game. He ranked third in the PSAC and 19th in Division II. McLemore

added 3.2 ppg. and 4.4 rpg. while shooting 54.8 percent from the floor.

"Ryan is now in his third year," Walcavich stressed. "We think he will make a big step. He's worked at it, and will get more minutes this year. I expect Ryan to step forward and have a big year for us."

Vlad Kovalevsky will likely get a chance to see significant minutes early on. The 6'7" freshman is an import from Richmond Hill, Ontario who was rated the ninth-best power forward in Canada by HoopLife.ca after averaging 21 points, 9 rebounds and 3 assists for Vaughan Secondary School. He led the Canadian team in scoring in the 2005 Maccabiah Games.

"Vlad will help us right away," promised Walcavich. "He's very capable as a freshman, and will only get better. There's a certain amount of adjustment when you start playing on the college level. It's really difficult in the frontcourt, because the game is officiated differently. There's a lot more banging and holding. Vlad's ready to learn."

Redshirt freshman Robbie Lowther (6'6"), from nearby Villa Maria Academy, and senior Aaron Fetty (6'5"), provide further depth. "Rob has made great strides," commented Walcavich. "He had the chance to practice with us. As a freshman he'll go through some of the same things Vlad will go through. He has less game experience than Vlad. I'm hopeful he can continue to improve."

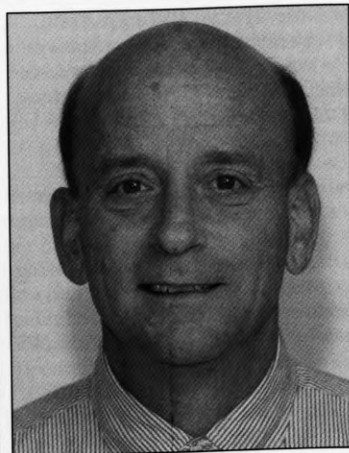
Fetty has not played basketball since high school, but is no stranger to Edinboro fans after previously playing wide receiver for the Boro football team. He chose to sit out his senior season on the gridiron, and will now try his hand at hoops.

Greg Walcavich and John Chaney. Chances are that not many people will confuse one for the other, and it's highly likely their names haven't been linked in the same sentence many times in the past.

But after leading Edinboro to its second straight Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference championship, Walcavich became the first coach to lead his team to back-to-back PSAC titles since Chaney did it from 1976-80 while coaching at Cheyney.

However, when it comes to winning Walcavich doesn't need to be connected

with the former Temple mentor. Walcavich leads all active PSAC coaches with 465 career victories, ranking him 11th among all active Division II coaches. He also ranks 28th in career winning percentage (.663) among all active coaches. Entering his 18th season at Edinboro and his 25th overall, only Dick DeLaney of West Chester and Clarion's Ron Righter outrank him in terms of longevity in the conference.

Walcavich's tenure at Edinboro has been earmarked by winning basketball teams. He surpassed Jim McDonald to set the school record for career wins during the 1998-99 campaign, and he recorded his 250th win at Edinboro during the 2002-03 season. He enters his 18th season as the Fighting Scot head coach with a 311-173 record. Add in five seasons at Birmingham Southern and two more at West Virginia Wesleyan, and he owns a career mark of 465-

236.

But Walcavich isn't just about winning. He places a sincere emphasis on success off the court - in the classroom and the community. He expects his student-athletes to perform with the same winning attitude in the classroom as they do on the basketball court. In fact, his office is not adorned with pictures of past greats. It does, however, feature a photograph of every student-athlete to graduate from Edinboro.

Walcavich received his bachelor's degree in Communications from Rutgers University in 1973, then completed work on his master's degree in Physical Education from the University of Alabama-Birmingham two years later.

During his seventeen seasons at Edinboro, the Fighting Scots have won 20-or-more games eight times, including a 21-10 ledger a year ago and a 24-7 record the year before that. In winning back-to-back PSAC Championships, Edinboro became the first team to do so since Cheyney in 1982 and '83.

A year Edinboro finished second in the PSAC West, but defeated West Chester, the Eastern Division champion, on the Golden Rams' home court in the semifinals, 62-59. In the championship game the Fighting Scots upset 19th-ranked Shippensburg, 52-51, for their second straight title.

In 2004-05, the Fighting Scots won the PSAC Championship with a 85-76 win over Millersville and advanced to the NCAA Division II East Regional. At one point in the season Edinboro climbed to 10th in the NABC Division II rankings, the highest in school history.

The 24 wins was tied for the second-highest win total in school history. The 1997-98 team set the record wins with a 26-8 record. Edinboro went on to capture the PSAC Championship for the first time in thirty years, advancing to the NCAA East Regional. There the Scots handed California(Pa.) a narrow 79-78 defeat before suffering a

91-83 setback to Salem-Teikyo in the semifinals. Walcavich was recognized as the PSAC West Coach of the Year.

He picked up his second PSAC West Coach of the Year plaque four years ago, guiding the Fighting Scots to a 21-7 finish. Edinboro captured its first PSAC West crown since 1985-86 thanks to a 9-3 finish in league play, earning the right to host the PSAC Tournament. Unfortunately, a possible NCAA Tournament berth was denied the Scots when West Chester posted an 82-72 upset in the PSAC semifinals.

The Fighting Scots have finished either first or second in the PSAC West each of the last six seasons, with a 51-21 record during that period, the best in the division during that period.

Three years ago Edinboro was 14-14 overall while playing a schedule with just 13 home games, but earned second place in the Western Division with an 8-4 record.

After two straight years in first place in the PSAC West, the Scots dropped to second in 2002-03, but still finished 17-11 after being picked to finish fifth in the preseason. A similar scenario occurred in 2001-02, with the Scots going 18-9. The coaches' preseason poll had picked Edinboro fourth.

Unfortunately, the three-way tie for first with Indiana(Pa.) and California(Pa.) saw the Fighting Scots have to go to California for the first round of the PSAC Playoffs, where the Scots lost, 82-70.

In all, Edinboro has made the NCAA Division II Playoffs five times under Walcavich, while qualifying for the PSAC Tournament thirteen times. His 1993-94 squad finished with a 20-8 ledger, defeating West Chester in a NCAA play-in game before losing to Indiana(Pa.) in the regional semifinals. The Boro made it back to the tournament in '95-96, defeating Bloomsburg, 90-82, in the first round. The Scots squandered an 11-point lead to California(Pa.) in the semifinals, losing 84-76. That concluded the season with a 21-8 mark, with Walcavich capturing PSAC West Coach of the Year accolades for the second time.

Walcavich took over the Fighting Scot program in 1989-90, guiding the Boro to one of its best seasons ever. Edinboro won its first twelve games, the best start in nearly fifteen years, and was ranked in the Division II top twenty. The Scots eventually finished 22-5, the most wins since 1981-82. On three occasions the Fighting Scots were ranked in the nation's top twenty. The following season the Scots made their second straight appearance in the PSAC Playoffs under Walcavich, finishing with a 18-10 ledger.

The Scots made it three straight seasons in PSAC postseason action the next year, and the second twenty-win season in three years, with a 20-9 finish. Walcavich picked up his first PSAC tournament win, an 81-78 triumph over East Stroudsburg, before falling to California(Pa.) in the finals.

The 1992-93 campaign brought a very unfamiliar result for Walcavich - a losing season. The Scots finished at 12-17, losing eight games by five points or less. The Boro more than made up for it the next year with the trip to the NCAA Playoffs. The '93-94 season also saw the Scots finish 14th in the Division II final rankings, their top finish ever. The 1994-95 edition added another milestone to Walcavich's resume, as the Scots handed number one ranked Indiana(Pa.) a 94-77 loss. The season ended at 15-11.

Walcavich's fourth 20-win campaign at Edinboro in '95-96 was followed by his second losing season, a 13-14 finish. Despite the losing record, the Boro made it to the PSAC Playoffs for the fifth time in his first eight years. That mark improved to seven out of ten the next two seasons, thanks to the 26-8 finish in '97-98 and the 16-12 ledger in '98-99. After replacing four starters from the '97-98 squad, Walcavich directed the Scots to three wins over nationally-ranked opponents. The Boro upended IUP twice, including a 63-61 win in Indiana in the first round of the PSAC Tournament, and St. Rose, an Elite Eight team for the second straight season, a 50-48 setback.

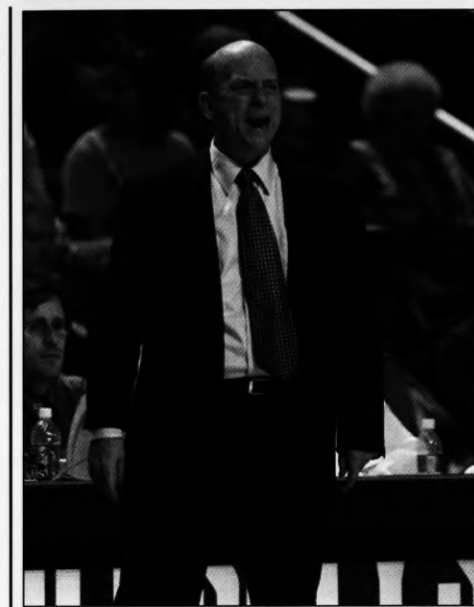
The Scots appeared well on their way to a third straight PSAC postseason appearance in 1999-2000 when starting center Jason Roseto, the leading shot blocker in Division II, went down with a broken hand. Prior to injuring the hand, Edinboro was 10-6. The Scots would lose six of its final nine contests without Roseto to finish at 13-13.

Walcavich took over as head coach at Edinboro after a successful two-year stint at West Virginia Wesleyan, where he posted a 40-19 mark. In his first season, he inherited a team which returned just four players, but quickly turned the Bobcats into a winner, finishing at 18-10. His second season concluded with a 22-9 ledger, including a pair of wins over Edinboro, while playing all underclassmen.

Walcavich began his coaching career at Birmingham Southern College in 1973, staying for four seasons before obtaining his first head coaching job at Alexander City (AL) Junior College in 1977.

After one year, Walcavich returned to Birmingham Southern as the school's head coach. During his five seasons as the head coach, the NAIA affiliate posted an impressive 114-44 record, with Walcavich named the Coach of the Year three times. His teams were ranked in the NAIA Top 20 four of the five seasons, as high as number two in 1979, and twice appeared in the NAIA National Tournament in Kansas City, Missouri.

While at Birmingham



Southern, Walcavich was recognized nationally in 1981, being selected to serve as an assistant coach for the United States Olympic Festival in Syracuse, New York. He coached future NBA stars, including Michael Jordan.

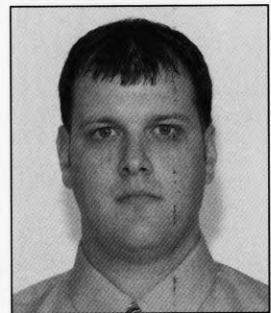
In 1983, Walcavich moved on to the Division I ranks as an assistant coach at Rice University. He was involved in some of the biggest wins in the Owls' basketball history at Rice, including triumphs over Arkansas, Houston and Notre Dame. After four years as a member of the Rice staff, Walcavich left for the head coaching job at West Virginia Wesleyan.

Walcavich and his wife, Dr. Maureen Walcavich, a professor in the Education Department at Edinboro, have been married for 32 years. They have two daughters, Sarah (26), a graduate of Penn State and the Georgetown Law School, who is now teaching practicing law in New York City, and Jennifer (23), who graduated from Penn State last May and is a teacher in LaPlata, MD.

It's easy to give all the credit to the head coach when a team is winning. Edinboro University head coach Greg Walcavich would be the first to point out that over the last six years praise must also be heaped upon assistant coach Patrick Cleary for the success enjoyed by the Fighting Scots.

Cleary has become a tireless recruiter who has developed many contacts in his efforts to come up with the next great Fighting Scot. Cleary has become

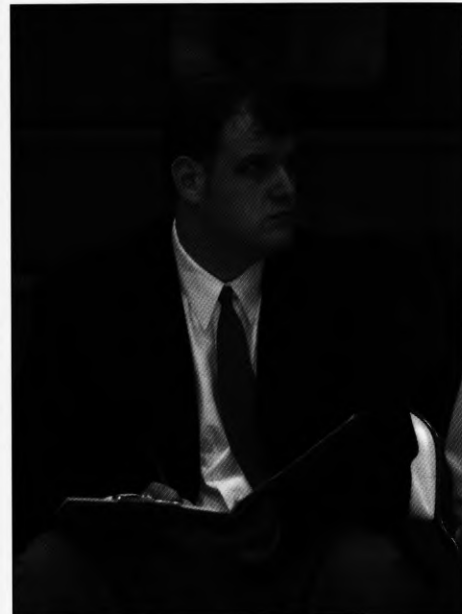
renowned for his ability to find talent and his relentless approach to recruiting. He has had direct input in tracking down players such as Kenny Tate, Blake Johnson, Rob Sims and Rob Green, among others. In addition to handling the day-to-day duties of recruiting and scouting, he assists head coach Greg Walcavich with the running and promotion of summer basketball camps.

Seven years ago Cleary was hired as an interim assistant coach following the sudden death of assistant coach Bryant Houston. That designation changed in the spring of 2000, as Cleary was appointed a full-time member of the Edinboro University coaching staff. He served as a student assistant from 1997-99, helping the Fighting Scots reach the PSAC Playoffs both years, along with an NCAA Division II Playoff berth in 1997-98.

Now comes back-to-back PSAC championship teams and two straight trips to the NCAA Playoffs. All told, Edinboro has won 20-or-more games three times in his six seasons, and shows an overall record of 115-58. In addition, he has helped bring in two All-Americans and seven All-PSAC performers. Five players have moved on to play professionally.

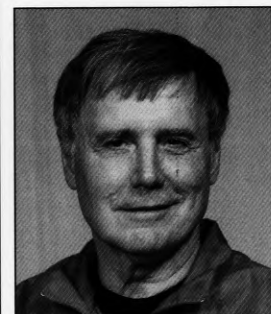
Cleary attended Sharon High School where he played basketball for the Tigers. He completed work on his Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1999. In addition to his basketball duties he is the co-director of the Athletic Department Study Program. He was presented the Outstanding Supervisor Award for Peer Tutoring by Edinboro University in 2005 and '06.

Cleary is single and resides in Edinboro. An active member of the Sons of the American Legion, he currently serves as the chaplain for Post 162 in Sharpsville, PA.

Terry Thompson is in his first season as an assistant coach with the Edinboro University men's basketball team, but is no stranger to Fighting Scot athletics. He previously served four seasons as a volunteer assistant for the women's basketball team, assisting head coach Stan Swank from 2000-04.

Thompson spent the last two years serving as the boys basketball coach at Girard High School. A year ago the YellowJackets were 19-8 and reached the

District 10 Playoffs, and the year before that they were 14-12 and also in the District 10 Playoffs.

Thompson's experience and enthusiasm are all too familiar to area basketball fans. He began his coaching career in 1965 as the boys basketball coach at East Brady High School, where he also served as a teacher. He led the team to the PIAA state runnerup spot in 1968, before leaving East Brady after the 1969 season.

After a one-year hiatus from coaching, in which Thompson

completed work on his master's degree in Education from Slippery Rock University, he served as the assistant boys varsity coach at Butler High School for two years.

In 1973, Thompson took the head coaching position at Knoch High School, where he held a teaching and coaching position for nine years.

After a two-year break from coaching, Thompson found his way to the Erie County League, where he guided the Fairview High School boys team for seven seasons. During the 1985-86 season, Thompson led the Tigers to the ECL and District 10 championships. Fairview had a 124-56 record during Thompson's tenure.

In 1990, Thompson made the jump to the collegiate ranks, working for three seasons as an assistant men's basketball coach at Penn State Behrend.

Thompson returned to the high school level in 1992, taking the assistant girls coaching position at Girard High School. In nine seasons as an assistant for coach Larry Seneta, Thompson helped lead Girard to a PIAA state championship, a PIAA state runner-up, five District 10 titles and three Erie County League titles.

Thompson and his wife Donna have two daughters, T.L. and Courtney. After outstanding high school careers at Girard, both daughters played collegiately. T.L. played at Grove City College, and now serves as the basketball coach at Grove City City High School. Courtney was a standout at Edinboro for four seasons, concluding her career in 2003-04. She earned an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship, which she used to earn her master's degree at Bowling Green State University. She now serves as a professor in the Math Department at Penn State Erie.

Athletic Administration



Edinboro University of Pennsylvania is the largest comprehensive four-year university in northwestern Pennsylvania. Its 585-acre campus is home to nearly 8,000 students studying in more than 100 academic programs. The University's programs in art, criminal justice, and speech language pathology, among others, have earned regional and national recognition and accolades and the University has been named a "College of Distinction" by Student Horizons, Inc. In 2003 the University's institutional accreditation with the Commission on Higher Education Middle State Association of Colleges and Schools was reaffirmed with commendation for ten years. In the 2006-07 academic year,

the University is celebrating its Sesquicentennial recognizing 150 years of service to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and beyond.

Edinboro is situated just 100 miles from the metropolitan areas of Cleveland, Buffalo and Pittsburgh, and less than 20 miles south of the city of Erie - Pennsylvania's fourth largest city. Meadville, the seat of Crawford County, is approximately 20 miles south of Edinboro.

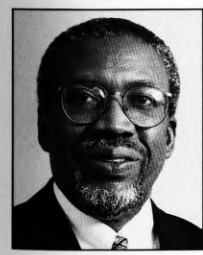
The University's Baron-Forness Library has more than 500,000 bound volumes and 1.4 million microform units, along with an online catalog, access to numerous online databases and electronic reserves. The building is equipped with a wireless network, computer labs and equipment to assist users with visual impairments.

The main campus also includes a modern University Center that is undergoing a \$17 million renovation, planetarium, observatory, reading clinic, speech and hearing clinic, science and robotics labs, writing center, numerous computer labs with the latest hardware and software, three art galleries, an animation studio, campus radio and television stations, health center, counseling center, and much more - all accessible for people with disabilities. The Crawford Center for Health and Physical Education and Disability Resources rivals any facility of its kind in the nation.

In addition to a five-acre lake and wooded areas, there are 43 buildings on the spacious Edinboro Campus, including five residence halls with private or shared rooms, co-ed housing, honors housing, and living-learning floors - all are wired for voice, video and data.

Edinboro University also operates centers in Erie and Meadville. Edinboro University in Erie - The Porreco Center is a beautiful 27-acre campus that includes classrooms, a computer laboratory, and a unique facility for small conferences, business meetings, and special events. Edinboro University in Meadville is located in the city's historic Bessemer Building.

Dr. Frank G. Pogue
President, Edinboro University of Pennsylvania



Frank G. Pogue was appointed the 15th president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania on July 1, 1996.

A sociologist, Dr. Pogue holds a bachelor's degree from Alabama State University, a master's degree from Atlanta University, and a Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh.

Prior to his presidency at Edinboro University, Dr. Pogue was the vice chancellor for student affairs and special programs at the State University of New York (SUNY) Central Administration in Albany, serving in that position for 10 years. While vice chancellor, he also served for one year as interim president at the SUNY College at Cobleskill. Prior to his assignment in the SUNY Central Administration, President Pogue was vice president for student affairs, associate vice president for research and educational development, dean of undergraduate studies, and a department chairperson, all at SUNY at Albany.

Dr. Pogue participates in national, regional and statewide leadership groups. He serves as a member of the American Council on Education (ACE) Commission on Women in Higher Education which provides counsel to ACE on policies and concerns related to expanded roles and equal opportunity for women in higher education. He is a member of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) Millennium Leadership Initiative (Chair), Committee on Professional Development, and Christa McAuliffe Selection Committee. He was appointed in 2003 to the International Association of University Presidents Commission on Disarmament Education, Conflict Resolution and Peace. Since 1984, Dr. Pogue has served on the Commission on Higher Education Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools (MSA). Currently, he serves on an advisory panel to address accreditation issues related to "affiliated" candidate and accredited institutions. Recently, he served as President for the MSA Board of Trustees and as a member of its Executive Committee, and he is a former vice chair of the Commission's Executive Committee. Dr. Pogue also serves on the Board

of Directors of Pennsylvania Campus Compact. He served for two years as chairperson of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education (PASSHE) Commission for the Universities and Commission of Presidents Executive Committee. He is a member of the Executive Board of A Community of Agile Partners in Education (CAPE). In October 1996, Dr. Pogue was appointed by then Pennsylvania Governor Tom Ridge to the Governor's Commission on Academic Standards. In November 2002, he was appointed co-chair of the Higher Education Committee of Pennsylvania Governor Ed Rendell's Transition Team. In May 2004, he was appointed to the Pennsylvania Department of Education's Higher Education Advisory Board.

Locally, Dr. Pogue serves on the Boards of Directors for the Meadville Area Industrial Commission, the Erie Regional Chamber and Growth Partnership, and the Erie Philharmonic Orchestra. In 2005, he was elected to the Executive Committee of the Civic Coordinating Committee of Erie County. Additionally, he serves on the Boards of Corporators for the Hamot Health Foundation, the Saint Vincent Health Center, and the Meadville Medical Center. He is a member of the Erie Martin Luther King Center Scholarship Committee and an Honorary Member of the Erie Wolves Club. Dr. Pogue was chairperson of the Erie County Millennium Commission, the Erie County State Employees Combined Appeal (SECA) campaign in 2001 and 2002, and of the Erie Day School's Adopt-A-Scholar scholarship program (2000-01 and 2002-03). He was also a member of the Erie Mayor's Task Force on Public Safety. Dr. Pogue has served on the boards of directors for the United Way of Erie County and the Greater Erie County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Dr. Pogue was honored by the Erie Area Chamber of Commerce with the Louis J. Tullio Community Service Award. The Greater Erie Community Action Committee (GECAC) honored him in 2004 with the Othello Myers Johnson Human Services Award and with the Paul P. Martin Community Service Award in 2000. In 1999, the Distinguished Service Award for Leadership and Vision was presented to him by the SUNY at Albany Council of Trustees.

Dr. Pogue has shared his experiences and expertise in Edinboro University classrooms via guest lecturer presentations. He has also taught a course titled, "Special Topics in Sociology" for the Department of Sociology. He continues to enjoy working in the classroom environment.

Since becoming president, Dr. Pogue has created the concept and philosophy of the Edinboro Family, a learner-centered environment where students come first and are an integral part of a caring and supportive campus community.
