Report of Committee

The Committee, consisting of Mabel M. Burton, Helen

Schluraff and C. C. Eaton, appointed January 29, 1936, by the Board of Trustees of Edinboro State Teachers College to open bids for the work relative to the wiring at the college, met at the office of C. C. Eaton, Erie, Pennsylvania, on March 3, 1936, at 11 o'clock, A. M.

There were present at this meeting besides the above names committee, the following:

Dr. Carmon Ross William P. Johnson, Architect Mr. Marvin, of Marvin Electric Co. New Castle, Pa.

Bids from Marvin Electric Company, New Castle, Pa., Northwestern Electric Construction Co., of Erie, Pa., Garvin Bros. Electric Company, and Bloss & Schauble, of Erie, Pa., were received and opened. Bids were as follows:

MARVIN ELECTRIC COMPANY, base bid, \$16,596.00, with deduction of No. 5 Alternate, \$3500.00, net, \$13,096.00.

NORTHWESTERN ELECTRIC CONSTRUCTION CO., base bid \$17,620.00 deduct No. 5 Alternate, \$5175.00, net \$12,445.00.

GARVIN BROS. EERCTRIC COMPANY, base bid, \$18,074.00, deduct No. 5 Alternate, \$4744.00, net \$13,330.00.

BLOSS & SCHAUBLE, base bid, \$16,825.00, deduct No. 5 Alternate, \$4880.00, net \$11,945.00.

Further deductions for various items amounting to \$1485.00 could be made leaving lowest bid of \$10,460.00 from Bloss & Schauble.

Mr. Johnson was instructed by the committee to tabulate the bids, make inquiry as to the responsibility of the lowest bidder, Bloss & Schauble, and make report to the Department at Harrisburg.

The committee accepted no bid and made no recommendation as the lowest bid was in excess of the amount said to be a vailable for the work.

The Board also approved the action of Dr. Ross in notifying Dean Stillings that he would be released May 31, 1936. This action had been agreed upon by the Education Committee prior to the regular meeting of the Board. Mrs. Schluraff did not vote on the above question.

Upon motion of Mrs. Schluraff, seconded by Mr. Loveland, the Board approved the action of the Fresident in retiring Miss Chapman May 31, 1936.

Upon motion of Mr. Loveland, seconded by Mr. Earp, the meeting was adjourned.
