Graduates gain the required knowledge in areas of mathematic, physics, communications, and aeronautics in order to immediately pursue a career as a commercial pilot. The flight and ground school training is provided by a flight school certified by the Federal Aviation Administration or, alternatively, this training may be satisfied by possession of a current license/certification at the appropriate level. Graduates of the Associate of Applied Science in Aeronautical Science will satisfactorily complete flight certification through the commercial pilot rating; be proficient in analytical and quantitative computations appropriate to the aeronautical environment; develop communications skills appropriate to meet the demands of being a commercial pilot; assess and operationalize a management and business plan in an aeronautical environment; and recognize weather patterns that may affect flight safety and take steps to mitigate them.

4	Associate of Applied Science – Applied Technology UWCC approved 2-10-16; Senate approved 2-29-16	R	This revision removes PHYS 181 (Principles of Physics) from Applied Practice Courses as it is not consistent with the other AAS (Associate of Applied Science) tracks which require PHYS 101 (Physical Science). PHYS 101 has been added to Applied Practice Courses. COMM 107 (Public Speaking) is replaced with COMM 298 (Business and Professional Communication) or COMM 107 in Skills. PHIL 240 (Intro to Moral Issues) is recommended as the Core general education 6 requirement.

Action Plan Preface

Looking to the future while understanding where we are today

The System's Strategic Plan 2020: *Rising to the Challenge* calls for the development of detailed annual actions plans for each university for transparency and to document progress toward system and university strategic goals. By their very nature, strategic plans look to change over a period of years; in contrast, action plans are designed to look at annual changes in the university and its context¹. Action plans chronicle where a university has been (previous year), where it is (current year) and where it is going (in the next two years). The format for annual action plans calls for universities to detail—in the context of university mission, vision and strategic directions—distinctive programs and accomplishments, opportunities and challenges, trends in enrollment, student success, and financial management. Looking at action plans annually is important because *proposed* directions in academic program development, enrollments, and finances are often shaped and re-shaped by critical changes and emerging conditions in student markets, educational interests, and regional economies. As such, they highlight the important balance between thoughtful longer-term planning and the flexibility needed to respond to changing dynamics.

Aligning institutional results and reports

To present a clear picture of the university, where it has been, and where it is going, it is essential that it is aligned with existing data reports, financial information, performance funding, and annual reporting on progress towards strategic goals. Over time, it is anticipated that episodic university reports be minimized and that more of them will be incorporated and summarized within the context of action plans to provide a more thorough understanding of university efforts to meet their mission and that of the State System.

University Mission, Vision, and Statement of Strategy

University Mission - Please provide a description of your university's purpose and primary objectives for success.

Edinboro University's Mission Statement describes its primary purpose and objectives. It is as follows:

Distinguished by its focus on individual attention to student success, commitment to diversity, and responsiveness to the evolving needs of the broader community, Edinboro University provides the highest quality undergraduate, graduate and co-curricular education.

The Mission Statement drives our strategic planning and operations and is evidenced in a number of University initiatives.

In the area of **student success**, Edinboro launched its Academic Success Center (ASC) in 2012 as an investment to improve student retention and completion. The ASC offers advising support services for all students, coordinates tutoring services, and directs an early alert system for student referrals from faculty and staff. The focus on student success has also been expanded this year with the development of the Learning Commons, centrally located in the campus Library. The Learning Commons includes the ASC, but also brings together multiple other student support offices and services, including the Center for Career Development, the Office for Adult and Transfer Student Services, the International Student Services Office, the Testing Center, and Writing Center. Construction is currently underway to transform a large section of library space into a new modern home for the Learning Commons and will be fully opened in January 2017. The University has also launched the use of the Starfish Retention Solutions software to enhance advising and retention support; departmental faculty champions have been identified and trained on the software and adoption by both students and faculty has been widespread. Edinboro continues to support student success with an improved First Year Experience program, the delivery of specialized advising for undeclared students, and the introduction of an intrusive conditional admission program.

Edinboro's commitment to **diversity** is supported through targeted recruitment of underrepresented minority students and employees; investment in expanding the recruitment and retention of international students; and our Porreco College initiative in Erie to meet the region's community college educational needs. An example of our success is our extension of opportunity to diverse students through Porreco College, many of whom likely would not have otherwise pursued higher education. At this College, African American students represent more than 21% of the students body (compared to 9% on main campus), and Hispanic students represent 5.3%, compared to 1.2% on main campus. Many of these students are excelling in their studies and looking to continue their education. At the level of faculty and other employees, Edinboro has implemented very intentional processes to maximize consideration of underrepresented minorities in search pools. This approach has been developed and supported collaboratively between the offices of the Provost, Social Equity, and Human Resources and we expect that these processes will increase faculty and employee diversity to better serve the mentoring needs of our students. Lastly, Edinboro's more unique commitment to diversity is through its decades-long dedication to providing services for students with disabilities, with our programming ranked among the top in the nation for those with physical disabilities.

Edinboro is also **responsive to the needs of the broader community** by offering academic and cultural programming to support the economic development of the region and improve the quality of life. Examples include the recent launch of the Porreco College in Erie, partnerships with regional social service agencies to develop pathways for low-income and underrepresented residents, and partnerships with regional industry to provide academic and noncredit-bearing programming to meet workforce needs. Edinboro continues to actively evolve its academic program array by discontinuing academic programs no longer needed to meet mission, while developing new programs that will be in demand by both students and employers. These include programs in pre-professional allied health fields, international business, energy science, digital media, and music therapy, among others.

University Mission, Vision, and Statement of Strategy (Continued)

University Vision - Please provide a description of your university's goals and aspirations for the years ahead.

The Edinboro University Vision Statement represents the institution's aspirations for the near future:

Edinboro University will be the first choice among students, employers, and the community for excellence in higher education.

Edinboro aspires to be the leading institution for quality higher education in its service region, and nationally for its online programs. Edinboro's goal is unrelenting consistency in program quality and for students to have the best possible educational experience.

The University has made progress toward this vision in recent years with the introduction of the Porreco College in Erie; multiple partnerships with other educational providers and industry leaders to provide workforce-ready, high-demand programming; and through multiple national recognitions of the University and its programs. Some of these recognitions include: Edinboro University ranking in the top tier of best universities in the Northern region (*U.S. News & World Report's 2015 Best Colleges*); 2nd in Pennsylvania among most affordable online colleges (*Affordable Colleges Online 2014*); 21st for Nursing in the ranking of Best Online Graduate Programs (*U.S. News & World Report*); 17th on the East Coast for Animation and Computer Animation programs, and 20th nationally among public colleges and universities (*Animation Career Review 2015*); 15th in the nation among public colleges for computer Game and Virtual World Development programs; 6th in the nation among the "Top 10 Accredited School Counseling Master's Degrees Ranked by Affordability" for the Master of Education in Educational Psychology program (*Best Counseling Degrees* website); and 6th in the U.S. for the Master of Social Work program from the Top 25 MSW Programs accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (*Social Work Degree Guide 2015*).

University Mission, Vision, and Statement of Strategy (Continued)

Statement of Strategy - Please provide a description of the strategy for fulfilling your university's vision and mission, given your university's current strengths, challenges, and available resources.

Edinboro University's Strategic Plan supports achievement of its mission and vision, and includes multiple objectives and specific initiatives to advance the University. The institutional goals as part of that Plan target improvements in program quality and student success, improving constituent experience through investments in faculty and staff excellence, enhancing the University's reputation and financial resources, improving institutional diversity, and actively engaging in the region to support its development. University resources are devoted to ensure success of each objective with allocation decisions recommended and assessed through an institutional Budget Planning Team.

Edinboro recognizes the financial challenges faced since 2011 and has developed and implemented multiple strategies to ensure its financial sustainability and success in meeting its mission and vision. A multi-year budget model was developed in spring 2015 that includes multiple scenarios based on potential enrollment and retention paths. The model addresses the need for institutional transformation through planned resource allocation in support of the core mission of the University in terms of instruction and student support. Edinboro will be guided by the developed model as it addresses continuing challenges. A decline in undergraduate enrollments in the current academic year and a recent downward revision in projections for high school graduates in our service region create greater pressure for use of reserve funds in the absence of significant action and redirection. Proactively, Edinboro's leadership is continuing to be aggressive in recruitment and retention investments while also continuing to reduce costs and seek efficiencies in areas across campus. The Academic Affairs division is actively changing scheduling and planning processes to improve student-faculty ratios and other metrics of academic and financial performance.

Undergraduate and graduate enrollment management plans have been developed and implemented, as has a student retention plan. Elements of these plans include redesigned campus visit programs and admitted student receptions; improvements in strategic name buy processes; targeting scholarship and financial aid as a leverage tool to impact yield; a graduate school assessment system for student satisfaction measurement and program improvement; a redesigned New Student Orientation program; a redesigned First Year Experience (FYE) program; an improved Living Learning Community program; a redesigned conditional admission program with significant student engagement; an improved program to support students on warning or probation; and improvements to academic advising through faculty professional development and technology investments.

An academic program array and faculty personnel plan has also been developed and implemented to strategicall	y plan

Academic Programs of Distinction

Academic Programs of Distinction - Please identify your university's top 3 or 4 Program Areas of Distinction (An Academic Program of Distinction is defined as a two-digit CIP level which includes general groups of related programs such as Business and Education. - (1) Arts and Digital Entertainment. Edinboro has a long history of offering quality studio arts programs, includes internationally-recognized artists among its faculty, and has many accomplished graduates. Faculty works have been exhibited at the Smithsonian, White House, and numerous galleries worldwide. Edinboro has also expanded its leadership beyond the studio arts disciplines with quality programs in the applied media arts, and in cinema and animation, in particular. The Art department includes 34 FTE faculty and more than 600 FTE student majors (in fall 2015) making it the largest in the PASSHE; the arts presence encompasses multiple facilities on campus, including two art galleries, and the programs are NASAD accredited. Edinboro also offers a Game and Virtual World Development program (an animation and computer science collaboration) that receives national ranking recognitions and has seen tremendous enrollment growth, even in years when enrollments university-wide were in decline.
- (2) Mental and Social Health Services. Edinboro is dedicated to STEM-H programming and has had a long commitment to providing quality facilities and instruction in the mental and social health disciplines. Multiple high quality programs are represented in this area at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. These include nationally recognized and accredited programs in Nursing, Speech Language Pathology, and Social Work. Others include accredited programs in Counseling, with emphases in Art Therapy, College Counseling, Clinical Mental Health, School Counseling (PK-12), or Rehabilitation & Clinical Mental Health. The Art Therapy program is the first in the nation to be offered online and is currently ranked 8th in the nation for online Counseling programs. Also at the graduate level, Edinboro offers an EdS in School Psychology and an Autism Spectrum Disorder Endorsement (Graduate) Certificate. At the undergraduate level, Edinboro offers a strong research-focused program in Psychology which boasts strong enrollment, high levels of student engagement, and very positive student outcomes; multiple nominees for the PASSHE Ali Zaidi award have come from this program. In general, Edinboro has a developed expertise in the mental and social health fields that has garnered strong enrollments and placements in national rankings, along with validations through accreditation recognitions.
- (3) <u>Business.</u> While nearly all PASSHE universities host business or similar programs, Edinboro considers its business programming as distinctive for multiple reasons. The School of Business was launched in 2011 to bring recognition to the quality, accredited programming in this area. While new incoming student enrollments have been weak since 2011 at the university-wide level, new enrollments in the business programs have been consistently strong compared to other discipline areas. This demonstrates the market recognition for this program, especially with similar programming offered at four other universities in the county. Distinctive features include the offering of a CFP Board® registered financial planning program, the hosting of a Financial Literacy Institute, programming in Forensic Accounting, very high graduate placement rates, and the hosting of a privately-funded Summer Business Academy targeted to at-risk youth. The business faculty developed and offered one of the first freshman engagement programs at the University, serving as a model for future university-wide programming. The School also offers an innovative student mentoring program that matches students with business executives for a year-long program of engagement and mentorship with very positive outcomes for students.

Other Areas of Distinction

Other Areas of Distinction - Please describe your university's admirable characteristics and accomplishments, including services, programs, student success and community engagement.

- (1) Edinboro University The Porreco College was launched in 2014 to assist in meeting the community college needs of the region. Located in Erie, the College offers associate degrees and other sub-baccalaureate programming at a cost consistent with that of a community college. This is accomplished by charging discounted fees and awarding scholarships through the Porreco Promise, a privately supported scholarship fund; when combined with federal and state gift aid, many students are able to attend at little or no cost. Edinboro has also engaged with regional business and industry partners to develop and offer programs that support workforce readiness and economic development in the region. During its first year, enrollments have exceeded initial projections; in fall 2014, the average student age was 26 and 72% of the incoming class was Pell eligible, with 46% representing the highest need. Edinboro University won the Exemplary Models Award in 2015 from the American Association of University Administrators for the Porreco College initiative.
- (2) Office for Students with Disabilities (OSD). Edinboro University is ranked as a top five university in the nation for providing full services to students with disabilities. Edinboro's OSD recently celebrated its 40th year of service to promote confidence and independent functioning for all students and to increase understanding of students with disabilities across campus. Edinboro is a first choice in the PASSHE for students with disabilities, where comprehensive services are available. These services include an academic aide system, attendant care program, learning disability support services, life skills center, meal aides, occupational therapy, a tactile laboratory, social work services, van transportation, and wheelchair maintenance.
- (3) Attendant Care Services. As an extension of OSD, Edinboro provides extensive attendant care services to address the personal needs of students with disabilities so that they may fully participate at the University. Students in the program are housed on a specially equipped floor in a traditional residence hall and are supported by a team of professionals that include a program nurse, occupational therapist, social worker and a student affairs professional. All care workers are employed by the University, including student personnel. Services include assistance with showering, dressing and grooming; laundry assistance; personal hygiene; room cleaning; assistance with braces and orthotics; service animal assistance; mobility, transferring, positioning and range of motion; and assistance with health and wellness.
- (4) ROTC. Edinboro's ROTC program has brought in 100 freshmen in each of the last three years and the department consistently places in the top third of all forty-two schools in the Northeast for overall production of the highest quality lieutenants. Five (of ten) of the program's seniors graduated as distinguished military graduates (DMG), recognized as part of the top 10% out of over five thousand Cadets in their year group across the nation. As a group, this achievement for Edinboro was the third highest ratio out of the forty-two Northeast schools. In the last year, ROTC achieved forty-five students on contract with forty of those on scholarship across all year groups. The ROTC is a strong partner with the University for modeling academic excellence and student success.



Opportunities

Opportunities include the following: a new Institute for Forensic Sciences leveraging expertise across multiple disciplines; an Institute for Financial Literacy with significant potential for both on-campus and community engagement; new graduate programming particularly in the areas of business and information technology; significant potential for expanded partnerships through the Porreco College; potential to reduce physical plant square footage on campus to improve energy and cost efficiencies; an employee age distribution supporting the potential for retirements to favorably and strategically adjust the employee complement; and expanded grant-funding opportunities, particularly for program and service improvement.

Challenges

Challenges include the following: uncertain State financial support; unfavorable high school graduate demographics in our primary service region; deferred maintenance needs of the physical plant; costs associated with the signature attendant care program; the financial sustainability of high-cost high-quality academic programs (e.g., Art, STEM-H); administrative and financial costs associated with state authorization of distance education programs; expanding federal mandates and regulations; and the need for a substantial and successful capital campaign.

Observations:

Edinboro University's 25% tuition surcharge for the BSN—Innovative Nursing Program took effect for all students in the program beginning fall 2014. In 2014/15, transitional financial aid was provided for students who were already enrolled in the program. These students have completed the program; there is no need to provide additional financial aid for students in this post-baccalaureate program. Demand for this program continued to be strong for the current fiscal year. However, in 2014 NCLEX pass rates for the traditional BSN program fell and the State Board of Nursing placed the programs on probation. Note that the Innovative program pass rates have continued to be over 90%. Quick steps were taken to address the traditional BSN program problem and pass rates for 2015 rose to 91%, and probation status was removed. We believe that probation has affected application rates, more so than the fee. At this point, we anticipate that we will achieve a full cohort for the Innovative program, but the backlog of applicants no longer exists. We are in the process of carrying out a marketing campaign to clear up any confusion that exists with regard to the status of the program.

Observations:

The implementation of the Art fee has helped the university to cover higher costs associated with the nature of studio arts courses. These fees also assist in maintaining the specialized accreditation associated with each Art area to ensure the department's ongoing viability. In the two years since the fee was instituted, Edinboro's enrollments have decreased by 7.7%. Although the enrollments in studio arts have decreased more significantly than that of the University, it is not believed that this is a result of the implementation of the fee. In fact, the enrollment decrease in fall 2015 (-4.0%) is slightly better than the decrease in total university enrollments (-4.2%). The proportion of students impacted by this fee who receive Pell grants remains significant at nearly 41% compared to an Edinboro University overall average of 46%, and nonmajority representation as a percentage of all students has increased slightly. In both fall 2014 and fall 2015, Edinboro University significantly increased levels of institutional financial aid for students impacted by this fee.

Observations:

The Pilot BSN Fee Revenue was implemented during the Fall 2015 semester. Students had been notified ahead of time that this fee was being implemented. Demand for this program continued to be strong for the current fiscal year. However, in 2014 NCLEX pass rates for the BSN program fell and the State Board of Nursing placed the programs on probation. Quick steps were taken to address the traditional BSN program problem and pass rates for 2015 rose to 91%, and probation status was removed. We believe that probation has affected application rates, more so than the fee. At this point, we are working hard to recruit a full cohort of students, including transfer students. We are in the process of carrying out a marketing campaign to clear up any confusion that exists with regard to the status of the program. While we are not ruling out the fact that the fee may be having some detrimental effect on enrollment, we believe that, even with the increased cost, the total cost of education at Edinboro University remains much lower that the other nursing programs in the region. We are closely monitoring this pilot.

Observations:

Edinboro's out-of-state tuition reduction pilot is in its second year. The analysis above compares the characteristics of entering fall cohorts from fall 2013, 2014, and 2015. In its first year of implementation, Edinboro did not have the benefit of a full recruitment cycle and enrollments increased by only 9 (headcount) compared to the base year. In 2015, headcount enrollments increased by an additional 61 students with no significant changes in student demographics. The revenue analysis shown above compares total undergraduate out-of-state revenues for the last year before implementation of the pilot (2013/14) as well as for 2014/15 and 2015/16. Despite the increases in headcount enrollments, tuition revenues have decreased each year as out-of-state students paying the higher 150% rate are graduating. In addition, institutional financial aid associated with new students has increased significantly; Edinboro cannot definitively state that the additional recruitments are the result of the lower tuition rate, or (instead) the result of increased institutional financial aid. It is likely a combination of both factors that yielded additional students in fall 2015. From a net revenue perspective, the additional enrollments have benefited Auxiliary Fee Revenue significantly, at some considerable expense to E&G revenues for tuition and fees. Some portion of this Auxiliary Fee Revenue increase is attributable to reductions in on-campus housing availability in order to promote (higher cost) use of privatized housing on campus. The fee revenues shown include new fees for Art, Music and Nursing programs. While overall revenues from the pilot are positive, the loss of E&G revenue at a time when Edinboro is struggling with E&G budget deficits is problematic for core academic programs. In addition, Edinboro will soon reach its 5% caps on institutional financial aid and cannot continue to offer aid at these levels to incoming classes. Edinboro is evaluating alternative pricing strategies to achieve institutional financial an



Chair Frampton noted for the record that the proceedings of the Edinboro University Council of Trustees Special meeting are recorded. Therefore, public disclosure to those in attendance via his verbal announcement and the written public notice avoids any violation of the *Pennsylvania Wire Tapping Act*.

The Chair requested a moment of silence in memory of Mrs. Peggy Pulice and Trustee John Horan. Following the moment of silence, Chair Frampton called twice for Public comment(s) from those in attendance. Hearing none, Chair Frampton called the meeting into an Executive Session to discuss the meeting topic of the transfer of The Highlands student housing facility from the EU Foundation to the University. All of the public meeting attendees exited the conference room. The Chair asked that Vice President Gil Brown, and his accounting team (comprised of Eric Sheppard and Sean Bliley) remain to answer questions and provide additional details.

Chair Frampton and Trustees met in Executive Session until 4:23 p.m. No other members of the public were in attendance at the reconvened public meeting of the EU Council of Trustees. In preparation for the vote, Trustee Shields asked if the needed changes had been made to the Resolution as suggested by Attorney Jacqueline Morrow. The Chair assured Trustee Shields and all Council members that a revised Resolution had been provided by Attorney Morrow and that the Recording Secretary had distributed fresh copies to those Council members in attendance at the Public meeting. Trustee Chaffee reaffirmed that the only change could be found in the first WHEREAS of the Resolution which included the insertion of the words "and a warehouse facility" after "... and furnished the Highlands Student Housing Facility" INSERT "between 2010 through 2016 on campus property leased to it by the University and the State System (the "Project"); and". Attorney Morrow noted there was also an additional insertion of the words "and warehouse" located in the sixth WHEREAS. Trustee Pape inquired about the ledger status of the Foundation's Accounts Payable and Accounts Receivable. Trustee Lowther elaborated further clarifying if Trustee Pape's concerns were related to the knowledge of Accounts Payable at the Foundation that could come back to the University following the acquisition. Attorney Morrow stated that at a minimum a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) would be created which detailed the accounting and would be reviewed prior to the closing. This same process was followed by California University in their recent acquisition of a student housing facility. Chair Frampton called for any additional questions prior to the motion and vote. Hearing none, the Chair presented the following Resolution seeking the transfer of The Highlands Student Housing Facility from the Edinboro University Foundation to Edinboro University of Pennsylvania:

WHEREAS, the Foundation incurred \$116,954,000 in debt issued through the Pennsylvania Higher Educational Facilities Authority to pay the costs associated with the Project, which debt is repaid from student housing charges and other housing revenues (the "Foundation Debt"); approximately \$113,270,000 of which was outstanding at January 1, 2016; and

WHEREAS, the University requested that the Foundation evaluate options for reducing the cost of the debt service associated with the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation and the University have determined that the best option for reducing the debt service associated with the Project is to transfer the Highlands Student Housing Facility and warehouse from the Foundation to the University subject to the Foundation Debt and to use capital facilities funding available through the State System to provide for payment for the Foundation Debt; and

WHEREAS, upon provision for payment of the Foundation debt, the ground lease will terminate and title to the Project will vest in the University and the State System; and

WHEREAS, the Council of Trustees has determined that acquiring title to the Project is in the best interest of the University;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of Trustees of Edinboro University as follows:

- The Council of Trustees agrees to accept the transfer of the Highlands Student Housing Facility from Edinboro University Foundation.
- The Council of Trustees authorizes the University to use capital facilities funding available through the State System to pay off the Foundation Debt and cover associated transaction costs.

For the record, Chair Frampton stated that Trustee Timothy Wachter determined there to be a potential conflict of interest under the Pennsylvania Ethics Act. As he disclosed previously to the Chair and members of the EU Council, his law firm represents the Foundation. While PASSHE Chief Legal Counsel Lehman have agreed that no legal conflict exists if Trustee Wachter was to vote or deliberate on this matter, it was with an abundance of caution that Trustee Wachter recused himself from this specific matter.

Chair Frampton noted for the record that the proceedings of the Edinboro University Council of Trustees are recorded. Therefore, public disclosure to those in attendance via his verbal announcement and the written public notice avoids any violation of the *Pennsylvania Wire Tapping Act*. He then moved to the first order of business - Public Comment. The Chair invited comment from the public in attendance.

EU student Barbara Israelson stepped forward and indicated that she represented a group of STEM majors from a number of departments. Ms. Israelson stated that the group was here to ask questions and get clarification on the STEM course fee policy. Chair Frampton reminded public speakers that they were limited to three (3) minutes per person. She requested the following of the Council:

- List of courses and whether the courses the fee applied to were changeable?
- Request for a solid course list so that students are prepared to understand what courses the fee would apply to.
- Request a copy of the formal/finalized STEM fee policy so that students have it on hand
- In the policy provided for review, it speaks to a percentage increase. The group is curious under what parameters the percentage could be increased.
- Asked if they could be provided with a list of how monies generated from this fee would be distributed and where.
- Asked how much monies would be coming back to those departments offering courses on the list.
- Want to know how the numbers that were presented in the fee pilot were calculated and what assumptions/projections were used?
- Concerned group hopes that they would be invited to make suggestions on how the money coming back to departments could be used to purchase equipment. Also want to suggest that a separate percentage could be used for advertising. Ms. Israelson noted the general public's view of Edinboro is that it is an "art" school. Therefore, it is their opinion that if EU advertised its cutting-edge technology in the STEM departments EU would be successful in attracting more STEM majors. She further stated that the demand for STEM majors is growing by 17% as projected by the Department of Commerce; whereas most other jobs are growing by only 8% projected over the next 10 years. Therefore, the group feels by investing more dollars into advertising we could show greater value to potential employers since students would need less training.

In closing, Ms. Israelson inquired about who best to direct their concerns and to get answers to those questions raised during the Public Comment session. Chair Frampton responded that today's forum is not designed to serve "discuss" the issues raised, but that the appropriate person from the University will be in touch with them to provide a response to questions raised. Ms. Israelson was appreciative of the response and stated that the group wished to be supportive of the generation of income that they would be the direct beneficiaries. The group seeks more information about the fee proposal and expressed again their interest in providing input with regard to how the monies are used by STEM departments. Chair Frampton asked Ms. Israelson if the group could submit their questions in writing. President Wollman further commented that it would be most appropriate to submit those questions and observations to Dr. Nathan Ritchey, Dean of the College of Science and Health Professions. Dr. Ritchey is already working on this matter and if he is not able to answer a question fully himself, he certainly knows who to work with to obtain the answer.

Chair Frampton inquired if there were any additional persons from the public that wished to speak. Dr. Nina Thumser, faculty member from the Biology and Health Services Department, stepped forward. Dr. Thumser asked that Council members reconsider the STEM-H Instructional Fee pilot as it is currently proposed, since she believes it to be a hardship on students. She stated that her department is currently in the process of writing grants that seek to increase the enrollment in STEM-related programs. The item of greatest concern posed in the grant application as a disadvantaged school was the financial need of students. As the proposal states, there could be as much as a \$2,000 increase in degree costs for almost all STEM majors. Dr. Thumser feels that this is a significant amount and that it would actually be detrimental to the retention and recruitment of STEM students. Chair Frampton thanked Dr. Thumser for her comments, and asked if there were any additional members of the public that wished to speak. Hearing no additional requests, Chair Frampton moved to the next item of business on the agenda – Old Business.

For consideration and action under Old Business was the approval of the Minutes from the Special Meeting of the EU Council of Trustees held on September 25, 2015. The Chair entertained a motion calling for approval of these minutes as stated above. **It was voted**, on motion of Trustee Chaffee, seconded by Trustee Shields, to approve the above-referenced minutes as presented. Chair Frampton requested a Roll Call vote, and the motion passed with unanimous approval by the Council.

For the record, Chair Frampton stated that the unofficial Notes taken at the September 22, 2015, Information Session would be held on file in the Office of the President and can be made available should any questions or concerns arise.

Next, Chair Frampton asked President Wollman to deliver the President's Report to the Council of Trustees. Dr. Wollman began her report with an update on the enrollment for the Winter session as well as the Spring 2016 and upcoming Fall 2016 semesters. Enrollment for 2015-16 Winter session is up by 161 students or nearly 44 FTE's over last year's Winter session. Currently, there are 892 students registered for Winter session - 63% are undergraduates. Given this high percentage she noted that we are obviously attracting a large number of undergraduate students, but also a large number of graduate students as well. These increased numbers are very important to the University's overall FTE enrollment which is how the budget is built based on the overall FTE enrollment for the entire year. As expected and predicted, enrollment numbers for the Spring 2016 semester are down as smaller classes move through the University from the beginning of its decline in 2011. The University is down by 279 students or 219 FTE's over the same time last Spring. There is good news that graduate enrollment is up almost 11 FTE; this area continues to be successful and shows continued growth. The President reminded Council members that although the Fall 2015 to Spring 2016 retention rate will not be available until the start of the new semester in January, we remain hopeful to see a real impact as the result of changes implemented by Academic Success Center's Director, Fai Howard. It is anticipated that the retention statistics will be available for review at the Council's upcoming January Study Session. Dr. Wollman next provided information about the enrollment picture for the new enrolling students Spring 2016 and numbers for Fall 2016. The overall numbers for Spring 2016 is disappointing; deposits are down by 1.7% as of this week as well as deposits for transfer students (down 28% or 23 students). Therefore, and overall, deposits are down 17% or 24 students. Despite a heightened focus by enrollment managers and the Admissions staff, the University is not seeing marked results. Enrollment for Fall 2016 shows a 1.5% decrease in deposits by freshman and likewise a decrease in transfer students (6) compared to same time last year. The President reported that, in total, there

is an almost 10% decrease in overall deposits from freshman and transfer students. While these preliminary numbers are early in the Fall 2016 recruitment cycle, the Admissions office should experience the impact of the demographic shift that has been discussed with the Council – significant growth in student graduating from high school from the top five feeder counties in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Wollman next provided an update relative to the replacement of Chris LaRusso and search for a new Associate Vice President for Enrollment Services. Although an interim has been serving in this position, there is an urgent need to fill the position with a permanent person who is highly skilled in the area of enrollment management; the numbers reflect the great need for this appointment. President Wollman believes that enrollment is one of the University's greatest challenges, not unlike all of the other state universities. She reported that the present search is nearing its end and, in fact, offered the position yesterday to a candidate. The candidate was very well-received on campus and an Edinboro alum. Dr. Wollman stated that she expects to hear back from the candidate today or tomorrow. With a hoped positive response, it is Dr. Wollman's goal to have this person start by mid-January. The President thanked Vice President Gil Brown for serving as the chair of the search committee. Dr. Wollman sought a chair at the vice presidential level because of the importance of the position at the University. She noted Gil's extensive background and knowledge of strategic enrollment management and was confident that he would move the search along in an expeditious manner.

Following a recent meeting with Erie City School District Superintendent Jay Badams, President Wollman spoke of an idea discussed calling for the University's collaboration on an Early College High School initiative. Dr. Wollman, Provost Hannan and Vice President Brown have met to consider the possibility of an Early College High School where Erie City School District students would spend five years earning both a high school diploma and an Associate degree. These students would transition from a public high school setting to the Porreco College in their final year of study. She stated that this model has been used very effectively in other states; the per pupil costs are what pay for the students going through program and the group is looking at other funding sources as well. Superintendent Badams and his staff at the Erie City Public School District think there is great potential for such a collaborative initiative to be successful. Provost Hannan is taking the lead on the development of this initiative and working with the academic staff from the Erie City Public School District. She closed by stating that there is great potential to create a pipeline of students who will be enrolled at Porreco College and also be students of the Erie City Public School District at the same time.

President Wollman then provided a brief update on the University's 2014-15 Performance Funding Scorecard. She noted the distribution of both an electronic and paper version of the Scorecard. In summary, the scorecard shows that the University performed better this year than last year. She asked Council members to see column header "2013 Points" and color designation as either green or red. The color block green means that the University was successful; the color block red means the University was not successful. NOTE in "2014 Points" column that the University was able to convert six items that it was not successful meeting in 2013; there are two categories that actually flipped the other way from being successful to unsuccessful (% of full-time tenure/track faculty who are female; one measured against the local target and the other a peer target). President Wollman commented further that it will be very difficult to turn that situation around, given the University is hiring fewer tenure-track or tenured faculty positions due to continued declines in enrollment. The President is pleased that the University met 16 out of the 20 targets this year; a significant improvement for Edinboro. She closed by indicating that while the University is moving in the right direction, there is clearly still work to be done to maintain and improve.

As President Wollman stated during the early part of the day, she continues to work closely with Interim President Werner given the announcement this week of his acceptance of an interim appointment. She noted that he has been delightful to work with, very engaged, very knowledgeable and she thinks EU will enjoy having him here. Given his previous work in the State System (interim presidency stints at both Mansfield and Indiana), the University is very fortunate to have his leadership. Dr. Wollman plans to work closely with Dr. Werner not only up to the day she departs Edinboro, but will also avail herself to Dr. Werner beyond that period of time as needed. She promised to be available at any time to answer questions, but knows that he is also inheriting a wonderful team of faculty, staff and administrators. Dr. Wollman anticipates a very positive relationship and will be delighted to work with Dr. Werner to ensure that the transition is seamless and as smooth as possible.

With regard to State System news, President Wollman mentioned to Council members that Chancellor Brogan feels that there are going to be some very significant changes in the membership on the PASSHE Board of Governors. The Chancellor has been speaking about this possibility on a fairly regular basis. At the upcoming January meeting of the PASSHE Board of Governors, there is the expectation of six to seven new appointments; individuals who were not members of the Board of Governors last January. Some new appointments have already been announced by Governor Wolf (representatives of the Governor and the Secretary of Education, return of Governor Harold Shields to the Board) and three new Board members (all nominees of Governor Wolf) were just confirmed by the Senate last week with a fourth individual in the pipeline for approval. The message that the Chancellor wants to get across is that there is going to be a significant change in the political makeup of the Board that will likely lead to a new philosophy overall and a different direction taken on certain approaches and policies. By this summer, Chancellor Brogan also expects change in the leadership of the Board. As the PASSHE Board impacts the work of this Council of Trustees, you should be aware that there are some significant changes coming. President Wollman understands that there are about 45 Council of Trustee positions open (Trustee positions that are either expired or ready to be filled), including several of them at EU. Current members of the Council are aware that they continue to hold the position until reappointment or replaced by Senate confirmed appointment. Additionally, there are several student representative Trustee vacancies pending either action by the Governor or completion of search processes due to incumbent Student Trustee graduation. EU Student Trustee Shaquan Walker will graduate in May 2016 and is currently serving as chair of the Student Trustee Selection Committee. Since the Governor has not approved any new student trustee positions over the past year, these positions have been on hold. Therefore, many System Councils are working with identified Select-Student Trustees who do not have full voting rights.

In closing her report, President Wollman thanked each member of the EU Council of Trustees. She stated that it has been such a great pleasure to work with each member, the last several years with former Chair Horan at the helm and now with Chair Dennis Frampton. Dr. Wollman noted that she speaks regularly with the Chair of the Council and feels the support, receipt of good ideas, and suggestions to collaborate and plan meetings of the Council have been wonderful. She admires that the Council always keeps front and center the interests of the students and never forgets that is why we are here. The President expressed appreciation for everything that the Council does as volunteers; Council members spend a lot of time at EU and spend a lot time reviewing meeting materials and other items that are sent. The Council's engagement is really admirable and an asset to the University.

Chair Frampton thanked President Wollman for her report and lauded her for all that she has done for the University. He is confident that the policies, goals and objectives put in place during her tenure as President will help to guide the University for many years to come; the University just needs to stay on track with those goals.

The Chair moved to the first agenda item under New Business – Academic Affairs. He requested Provost Michael Hannan to step forward for the presentation of related action items and delivery of highlights from the 7-page written Academic Affairs Report (Attachment #1). Dr. Hannan began with the action item requesting the Council's approval of a number of New Programs, Program Revisions – Addition of New Track to Existing Degree Program; Program Revisions – Request to Place Existing Programs in Moratorium; Program Revisions; and Program Revisions – New Track to Existing Program. Provost Hannan reminded Council members that this requested action item was reviewed in greater detail at the Committee meeting session held earlier in the day. Dr. Hannan posed a motion noting President Wollman's recommendation seeking approval of the following New Programs, Program Revisions – Addition of New Track to Existing Degree Program; Program Revisions – Request to Place Existing Programs in Moratorium; Program Revisions; and Program Revisions – New Track to Existing Program:

Following the Roll Call vote, the Chair noted the motion carried with unanimous approval.

Provost Hannan continued to deliver a brief informational summary of highlights in the Academic Affairs area from events held this past fall and since the Council's last business meeting. These included:

- EU hosted its 22nd Annual Highland Games & Scottish Festival September 10-13. The Festival included competitive events, disc golf, canoe battleship, archery, workshops, music and food. The event was coordinated by Dr. Timothy Thompson (Communication Studies Department) and coincided with a home football game which lent to a larger contingent of students who attended as well as external community members.
- On November 10, EU held the 9th Annual College Bowl where judges and audience attendees were impressed by students' knowledge in multiple categories of competition. At the graduate level, the competition ended with Team MA Social Sciences in 1st place and Team Speech, Language, and Hearing in 2nd place. For the undergraduate competition, 1st place went to Team Mathematics and Computer Science; 2nd place Team Middle & Secondary Education and Educational Leadership; 3rd place Team History, Anthropology, and World Languages (HAWL); and 4th place Team Communication Studies. Provost Hannan recognized Dr. Jerra Jenrette for the organization of the event over the last nine years and also the many other faculty and staff across campus that volunteer. He noted that the highest performing students across all of departments will form a team to represent the University at a regional competition this Spring.

- While the report contains many student and faculty accolades, Provost Hannan specifically mentioned two:
 - Two sculptures by Dietrich Wegner, Associate Professor of Art, were featured in Banksy's Dismaland Bemusement Park (a dystopian theme park and art exhibition in Weston-super-Mare in southwest England). A full solo exhibition of Wegner's work will be presented locally in the main gallery of the Erie Art Museum July 27 – November 20, 2016.
 - On November 14, Dr. Rhonda Matthews, Associate Professor in the Political Science and Criminal Justice Department, Abdullah Washington, an actuarial science major; and Nick Cianci, a graduate student pursuing a Master's degree in Educational Leadership, gave a TEDxErie talk at the Erie Art Museum. TEDxErie is a program of local, self-organized events that bring people together to share a TED-like experience sparking deep discussion and connection in a small group. The theme for TEDxErie 2015 was "The Rising Tide."

For the record, Provost Hannan reported the following informational items:

Individual Grant Sabbatical Leave

Dr. Joseph Laythe of the History, Anthropology and World Languages Department for Spring 2016 semester at full pay.

Change in Sabbatical Leave

Dr. Lenore Barbian of the History, Anthropology and World Languages Department granted deferral from Spring 2016 to Spring 2017 semester.

Dr. Wook Lee of the Geosciences Department granted change in sabbatical leave from 2016-17 academic year at half pay to Spring 2017 at full pay.

Individual Granted Tenure

Dr. Stacie Wolbert from the Middle & Secondary Education and Educational Leadership Department was granted tenure effective January 2016.

Lastly, Provost Hannan provided additional commentary on the topic addressed during the Public Comment period – STEM-H Instructional Fee Pilot. Dr. Hannan stated that when the proposal was developed, the University certainly recognized that it would result in a higher cost for students who are in the identified STEM-H programs. The proposal is very similar to fees that have been implemented in the last couple of years and approved for other high-cost programs at the University. There are additional fee charges in Art, in Music, in the Innovative Nursing Program and also more broadly for students in the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. All of the program areas mentioned are high-cost programs. From a competitive standpoint, tuition is at a constant level for all students across all 14 State System universities regardless of major. Therefore, it is generally through these pilot and special fees that are approved by the PASSHE Board of Governors that a university can charge additional fees to help cover costs associated with high-cost programs. He further noted that at private universities it is not usual to charge a higher base tuition for high-cost programs many of which are in the STEM area. In the State System, there are four other universities that also have a STEM-related fee (Clarion, Mansfield, Millersville and Slippery Rock). At Mansfield it is a \$100 per course fee and at Clarion it is 10% premium on tuition that is charged. The fee approved for Edinboro University by the PASSHE Board of Governors was a \$30 per credit for STEM-H courses. Provost Hannan reported that

many of the EU courses are 3 credits, some courses are 4 credits, but most of the courses charged this fee technically have a higher load hour for the faculty member. A faculty member may be paid 5 or 6 credits load hours while the student is charged for 3-4 credits for that same course. In our review of the cost structure in the original proposal, the total revenue projected was \$467,000. This figure was based on the original identified list of courses provided by Dean Ritchey. Since that time, Dean Ritchey received input from the impacted departments relative to what courses may or may not be appropriate for inclusion on the list. Based on the revised course list, we estimate the projected revenue generation from this fee to be closer to \$400,000 per year pending agreement on the final course list. If one looks at the net revenue, personnel and operating budget costs in the Biology and Chemistry Departments alone and compares it to the revenue generated through credit hour production by those departments, there is negative net revenue of \$680,000 (not including the other STEM field related departments). Therefore, it is important to note and ascertain that the proposed fee was designed to close the gap and reduce the negative net revenue in high-cost program areas like Nursing, Art, Music, etc. Realizing that the University endorses and wishes to continue to offer certain high-cost programs, it is necessary to continue the practice of subsidizing these programs with revenue generated by lower cost programs while attempting to minimize, where possible, the negative net revenue in identified high-cost programs. Provost Hannan assured constituents and members of the public that proposal contains language that guarantees a portion of the generated fee will be earmarked specifically for reinvestment in STEM-H departments: Of the proposed fee, approximately \$100,000 per year will go specifically to a fund with rollover capability for the Dean to manage in cooperation with STEM-H department chairs in the determination of how those funds will be reinvested. Dr. Hannan stressed that it is important for EU STEM programs to remain competitive with others offered in the State System, in the region and others across the nation. While the goal is not just to reduce the financial loss from the offering of these programs, we must also make certain that there are new dollars made available for reinvestment in these programs. And, those decisions about the best ways to reinvest will be made in collaboration with the Dean, department chairs and faculty members in the affected STEM-H departments.

Chair Frampton thanked Provost Hannan for the additional clarifications and asked if there were any questions? Trustee Horan sought verification of the total fee cost to be bore by a student and over what period of time. Dr. Hannan responded that the two degrees with the highest cost, Bachelor of Science in Biology and Bachelor of Science in Chemistry, would result in additional fees of \$2,160 over 4-year period (based on the original course list that contains approximately 40 courses). The lowest fee amount would be \$390 (over 4-year period) for the Bachelor of Science in Psychology program. For other majors (over 4-year period) the range is between \$1,300-1,400. Trustee Lowther reiterated that the highest cost would be \$2,160 over a 4-year period, correct? Provost Hannan responded in the affirmative. Trustee Horan commented that it would then roughly calculate to \$250 per semester (based on the highest cost). Again, Provost Hannan responded in the affirmative stating that it will depend on the program and the number of majorrelated courses that are scheduled per semester. Dr. Hannan also reminded Council members that the proposal allows for the fee to be reviewed and adjusted annually; however, it is not to exceed a 10% increase per year. Trustees Lowther and Higham asked if some of the generated fee would be designated and used for scholarship in support of students. Vice President Brown confirmed that this proposed fee would be used in the calculation of institutional aid expenditure. The PASSHE Board of Governors sets the threshold, and EU will be nearing that threshold during the 2017 budget year. Mr. Brown stated that EU plans to hit and stay at the cap by 2017-2018.

Chair Frampton again thanked Provost Hannan for the summary and additional commentary on the topic of the STEM-H Instructional Fee Pilot. The next agenda item for review and discussion

were items from the area of Finance and Administration. Finance and Administration Vice President Gil Brown approached the podium to present those items for consideration. Mr. Brown made a motion for the approval of Contract and Purchases, as recommended by President Wollman, for the period September 1-30 and October 1-31, 2015. Hearing no requests for further or discussion, Chair Frampton called for a Roll Call vote. <u>It was voted</u>, on motion of Trustee Shields, seconded by Trustee Steele, to approve the Contracts and Purchases for the periods September 1-30 and October 1-31, 2015, as submitted electronically.

The motion carried with unanimous approval by the Council.

Vice President Brown reminded Council members that the action item seeking their approval of the STEM-H Instructional Fee Pilot had been discussed with them at a March 10, 2015, Committee meeting (Attachment #2). Since that time and following Council approval, the proposal was moved forward to the PASSHE Board of Governors. The PASSHE Board of Governors approved EU's proposal that the October 8 quarterly meeting. Pages 57-59 of the electronic meeting materials confirm the action taken by the Board and document not only the pilot requirements, but also outline expectations with regard to ensuring access, timeframe for the pilot and assessment requirements relative to enrollment, access, net revenue and capacity. The proposal now comes back to the EU Council for final approval and implementation. Once again, Trustee Horan asked how much additional revenue would be generated by this fee and also wanted to know how many students would be affected. Vice President Brown noted that the original proposal submitted to the Board of Governors was based on the course list and would generate approximately \$467,000 per year. As the result of subsequent discussions, Mr. Brown's understands there to be a reduction in the number of courses on that list and the new estimate was now in the neighborhood of \$400,000 per year. Dean Nathan Ritchey estimated that the new imposed fee would impact about 2,000 students (or about 1/3 of the student body). Chair Frampton and Trustee Lowther inquired about the amount to be reinvested. Vice President Brown acknowledged that approximately \$100,000 would be made available for reinvestment or 25% of the total fee revenue. Again, he reiterated that the funds realized would be set aside in an account and would have roll over flexibility. Trustee Pape remarked in favor of the marketing remarks raised by the speaker during the Public Comment session. Trustee Chaffee added that it really makes sense to invest some of the revenue in marketing since STEM and STEAM are hot button topics of concern. Vice President Brown further elaborated that the financial plans calls for 75% of the fee revenue to be used for E&G (Education & General) in support of expenditures which includes marketing, communications, admissions and enrollment management costs. The

remaining 25% will be earmarked for reinvestment in STEM-related departments. With regard to marketing, Vice President Mengine stated that the Communications and Marketing Department is working with the Deans and Department Chairs from the various Schools and Colleges to provide for general and target-specific recruitment messages both at the undergraduate and graduate level. A fair amount of dollars are spent on marketing the University. In consultation with the Provost and Deans, she reported that a marketing plan has been developed and it is a matter of balance in support of Admissions, Porreco College and the individual Schools (Business and Education) and Colleges (Arts, Humanities and Social Services and Sciences and Health Professions). EU will work to compete and combat marketing efforts made by other area colleges (namely Mercyhurst and Gannon); it is the nature of the game. President Wollman commented that other marketing efforts take place on a daily and weekly basis that do not necessarily require more dollars in the budget. Admissions recruiters and speakers welcoming various groups to campus talk and brag about the quality of EU's science building, new equipment and renovated labs. Facilities located in the Brown Human Services building boast simulation labs utilized by the Nursing department and offer a wide variety of Speech, Language and Pathology experiences to both students and external constituents. On motion of Chair Frampton, and based on President Wollman's recommendation, approval was sought for the implementation of EU's STEM-H Instructional Fee Pilot as presented and approved by the PASSHE Board of Governors on October 8, 2015 (Attachment #3). It was voted, on motion of Trustee Steele, seconded by Trustee Higham to approve and implement the STEM-H Instructional Fee Pilot for students enrolled in high-cost, high-demand Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics and Health (STEM-H) courses (excluding specific courses that are required for nursing students).

The motion carried with unanimous approval by the Council. As an aside, Trustee Shields noted that next Tuesday (December 15) the PASSHE Board of Governors planned to hold a Study Session with a focused review of all the tuition changes across the System. He stated that there has been pressure by the Governor's office to look at how tuition and fee increases affect students, how effective these changes are, and how are these changes meet the institution's stated goals.

Chair Frampton reported the addition of an agenda item under Finance and Administration — Resolution for the approval of Edinboro University's Hazard Mitigation Plan. Vice President Brown stated there was a requirement for the University to provide to FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) with an adopted Resolution as well as an electronic copy of the final EU Hazard Mitigation Plan. As a prerequisite to receiving post-disaster Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funds, the University must have developed a Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP). The HMP was developed by the University's Emergency Response Team (ERT) in cooperation with other academic and administrative departments, student,

faculty and staff and with the assistance of a consultant who worked with PASSHE. The HMP went through multiple public hearings and approval processes prior to its submission and eventual approval by FEMA. In summary, the approved HMP contains recommended mitigation activities that will reduce losses to life and property affected by both natural and human-caused hazards that affect the University and its students, faculty, staff and members of the general public. Mr. Brown noted that Council members may review and access the complete plan online at https://my.edinboro.edu/web/ehs/hazardmitigationplan. The Statement from the University of the restricted and unrestricted financial support received was drawn from the completed annual audits conducted by external public accountants for each individual entity. Chair Frampton entertained a motion for certification that the entities named above make a financial contribution to the University or provide similar benefits on a regular basis, satisfactory to the EU Council of Trustees and to the President. He requested that each entity be reviewed one at a time and then action taken.

On behalf of the Student Affairs division, Chair Frampton requested Vice President Kahan Sablo to deliver a report. Dr. Sablo noted the distribution of a three page written report (**Attachment #7**). He proceeded to highlight the following entries from that report:

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

• During the 2014-15 academic year, the Edinboro University Athletic department raised \$13,665 for the Make-A-Wish Foundation. The NCAA recently announced that this

- amount was the highest dollar amount raised among all NCAA Division II universities. Edinboro University will host its third "Wish Reveal" in early 2016.
- Fighting Scot athletes once again participated in the *Read to Compete Program*, where student athletes read to students at the Edinboro Elementary School. Other athletic department service activities included the Swimming Team's participation in the Buddy Walk, the Lacrosse Team assistance with the cleanup of the ANNA Animal Shelter, and the Men's Basketball Team visit with students at Erie's JFK Center After-School program.
- Campus Life organized the annual Random Acts of Kindness (RAKE) in Edinboro. Students raked leaves for approximately 34 houses, disposing of 546 bags of leaves.
- Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity held its annual "Fulcrum for Food," raising \$3,012 in donations, which will allow the Edinboro Food Pantry to purchase approximately 23,200 pounds of food.
- Currently, nominations are being sought for the University's Martin Luther King, Jr. Award. Individuals are encouraged to nominate regional citizens whose life work emulates the philosophy and teachings of Dr. King.

STAFF ACCOLADES AND INITIATIVES

- Student Health Services began a collaborative research study with the University of Pittsburgh to explore best practices in alcohol education and intervention.
- With the assistance from a grant from the Erie County Health Department, a Parent Resource Room was opened in McNerney Hall to provide student parents a forum to interact with each other and assist with essential services (i.e. a private location for nursing mothers, a convenient location for parents to exchange child care responsibilities, etc.).

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

- Dr. Kahan Sablo and the Student Affairs office will assist with the selection process for the next student representative to the Edinboro University Council of Trustees. With the anticipated May 2016 graduation of Trustee Walker, the committee desires to conclude all aspects of the local selection process by March 2016.
- The Office for Students with Disabilities is piloting a Boro Autism Support Initiative for Success (BASIS) program. The BASIS program is designed to transition students to Edinboro University by providing them with the skills and strategies for collegiate and career success.

In closing, Vice President Sablo encouraged Council members to review the written report for updated information pertaining to the successes of our University student athletes and teams.

Chair Frampton thanked Vice President Sablo for the report and then asked the Vice President for University Advancement, Ms. Tina Mengine, to come forward. Ms. Mengine began with a motion seeking approval of the Resolution presented for the naming of the Garden House on the Porreco College campus. For the record, the Resolution reads as follows:

RESOLUTION

Council of Trustees

Naming of Garden House at Porreco College

"Joseph T. Thompson Education Center"

Whereas, Jess Thompson of Erie, PA is a supporter of Edinboro University and Porreco College;

Whereas, Jess Thompson is a longtime supporter of educational opportunities for the disadvantaged;

Whereas, Jess Thompson advocated for a community college and was thrilled with the launching of Porreco College, *The Community's College*. In support of the community's college and her wish to see it succeed, Jess Thompson made a generous gift of \$250,000 on December 14, 2014;

Whereas, this gift in honor of her late husband, Joseph T. Thompson, will support a Physics Lab and the Porreco Promise, ensuring that students will have the opportunity for an education.

BE IT RESOLVED, therefore, in recognition of the generosity of Jess Thompson, Edinboro University will name the Garden House at Porreco College, the "**Joseph T. Thompson Education Center.**"

Vice President Mengine stated that, by policy, the EU Council of Trustees be involved in the naming of buildings and asked for their positive endorsement and adoption of the above-referenced Resolution (**Attachment #8**). **It was voted**, on motion of Trustee Higham, seconded by Trustee Pape to accept and adopt the Resolution as presented above naming the Garden House at Porreco College to the Joseph T. Thompson Education Center. Chair Frampton called for a voice vote; the motion carried with unanimous approval by the Council.

Vice President Mengine followed with the oral delivery of significant highlights taken from the 20-page written report (**Attachment #9**) distributed in meeting materials.

Traditional Media (August 29 - November 13, 2015)

During this period of time, EU enjoyed a significant earned media presence (free publicity):

Received more than 120 mostly positive mentions in northwestern Pennsylvania/northeastern Ohio newspapers; 25 largely positive stories in regional electronic media; and more than 30 mentions in state, national and international media. The latter focused mainly on alumna LaToya Ruby Frazier's MacArthur grant and faculty member Dietrich Wegner's participation in Banksy's Dismaland.

Chair Frampton thanked Ms. Mengine for the brief report and asked if there were any questions by Council members. For the record and the Council's information, Vice President Mengine noted there was a list of gifts-in-kind received since the last meeting of the Council held on September 22 and 25, 2015, that had been electronically distributed with the meeting materials. See **Attachment #10** for detailed report and record of Gifts-in-Kind received by the University.

Hearing none, the Chair commented on recent news and the announcement of David J. Werner's appointment to serve as EU Interim President. He stated that the next step in the process is the formation of a search committee and the election of three Council members to serve as members. Chair Frampton circulated for the Council's review a draft list of the proposed membership. The composition of the search committee must be approved by the Office of the Chancellor; however, the EU Council of Trustees must recommend and approve three of its members to serve. The Chair proposed that Trustee Harold Shields serve as the Chair of the Presidential Search Committee and that Trustees Barbara Chaffee and Timothy Wachter be named to serve. Chair Frampton entertained a motion for the approval and appointment of Trustees Shield (Chair), Chaffee and Wachter as members of the Presidential Search Committee. It was voted, on motion of Trustee Higham, seconded by Trustee Pape to accept the motion as presented. The motioned

carried with majority approval by the Council. Chair Frampton reminded members of the need for formal approval by the Office of the Chancellor of the proposed full membership of the Presidential Search Committee.

Lastly, Chair Frampton requested Trustee Shields to provide an update on the PACT Conference held in Philadelphia on November 8. Interim PACT President Shields reiterated that this was the first time for the PACT Conference meeting to be held in concert with the Association of Governing Board (AGB) meeting. He felt that although it was not well attended, there was a lot of good data shared by PASSHE Board of Governors Chair Pichini, PASSHE Chancellor Brogan and other PASSHE Vice Chancellors. Looking forward, Trustee Shields commented on plans for the upcoming Spring Conference meeting to be held in Harrisburg on March 31 and April 1. He encouraged each member of the EU Council to attend and to get the date on calendar early. There is a focused effort to attain outstanding speakers to address not only national topics of interest, but also talk about the Trustee's role and ways to become a more effective Trustee. Secondly, Trustee Shields stated that the group looks to provide a development presentation geared toward students who attend the conference. Chair Frampton reported that his attendance at the fall meeting was one of the best ones ever attended. He felt that the Chancellor is sharing more information and looks for individual Trustees across the System to be more participative. The Chair invited Council members who have any thoughts or input to share about the meeting format or potential speakers to be in contact with Interim PACT President Harold Shields.

Prior to the motion for adjournment, Presidential Search Committee Chair Harold Shields asked to meet briefly with members of the EU Council about the process. <u>It was voted</u>, on motion of Trustee Pape, seconded by Trustee Wachter to adjourn the December 11 business meeting of the EU Council of Trustees. The meeting adjourned at 3:34 p.m. Next meeting of the EU Council of Trustees is a Study Session on January 26, 2016. The next quarterly business meeting of the Edinboro University Council of Trustees will convene on Tuesday, April 12, 2016.

Academic Affairs – Report Edinboro University Council of Trustees December 11, 2015

Accreditations and Recognitions

- The **Teaching Online Certification Course (TOCC)** attained **Quality Matters** certification in early October. The TOCC is a mandated five-week fully online course that is offered to faculty teaching at the following universities: Bloomsburg University, California University of Pennsylvania, Clarion University, Edinboro University, Kutztown University, Lock Haven University, and Shippensburg University. Dr. James Boulder, Manager of Online Programs, serves as an instructor in the multi-university course.
- The **Pennsylvania State Board of Nursing** performed a site visit on September 2, 2015. No deficiencies were identified and the Program remains on the Board's Approved List of Nursing Education Programs.
- At the October 2015 meeting, the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD) acknowledged receipt of the Progress Report submitted on September 1, 2015 by the Art Department and requested an additional Progress Report due September 1, 2017. The Commission noted the institution's revised plan to address concerns of inadequately sized classrooms and further recognized that the design phase of the project was expected to be completed by the end of October 2015 and that completion of the project is anticipated by June 2017.
- In early November, the **Council on Social Work Education (CSWE)** voted to accept the First Progress Report for the baccalaureate program in Social Work. The program continues to be fully accredited.

University Outreach and Campus Programs

- The **Al Stone Lecture Series** took place this fall in the Diebold Center for the Performing Arts. The lectures were free, open to the public and given by retired and active faculty in the area as well as individuals with special expertise.
- The 22nd Annual Highland Games & Scottish Festival was held September 10-13. The Festival included competitive events, disc golf, canoe battleship, archery, workshops, music and food. The event was coordinated by **Dr. Timothy Thompson** (Communication Studies Department).
- On **September 15** more than 500 Edinboro University students, joined by faculty and staff, participated in a walk to combat hunger during the University's **6**th **Annual "Walk for Food"** freshman service event. Sixteen boxes of nonperishable food items and \$90 in monetary donations were collected for the Edinboro Food Pantry.
- Edinboro University's Planetarium presented "Eclipse Mania" on September 26 educating guests about eclipses with an opportunity to view a total lunar eclipse in the observatory. Other shows that took place include "Planetpalooza: The Wandering Stars in our Sky" in October and "Stars of Wonder" in December.
- On October 9 a panel of experts discussed the impact the Internet and social media have had on business as part of **Edinboro University's "Media and Business in the Digital Age" symposium**. Panelists included: Jim Grillo, founder and CEO of the Cricket Group, a Denver-based media management consulting firm; Kevin Kleps, Assistant Editor of *Crain's Cleveland Business*, Northeast Ohio's Leading source for news, information and data essential to top executives and business owners; and Brett Pulley, a former financial journalist and entrepreneur who is Dean of the Scripps Howard School of Journalism and Mass Communication at Hampton University. Grillo and Kleps are both Edinboro alumni.
- The 27th Annual Speech-Language Pathology Alumni Conference was held on October 9. The conference was coordinated by Dr. Cynthia Reyes, director of the Leader Speech and Hearing Center and faculty member in the Speech, Language and Hearing department. Distinguished speakers included Dr. Paula Leslie, a professor of Communications Science and Disorders at the University of Pittsburgh and director of the Clinical Doctorate in Medical Speech-Language Pathology; and Dr. Erin Redle,

- Assistant Professor in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders, College of Allied Health at the University of Cincinnati.
- Andrea Rosenfeld, founder of the Detroit Art & Business Institute, presented a "Mind Your Art Business" workshop at **Porreco College** on October 24. The workshop was designed for artists, makers and designers contemplating a business, and those who have begun a start-up.
- On November 9-10 Edinboro University Alumna, Jessie Stehle, was on campus to discuss with students how to get hired and prepare for the job market. The event was also open to the public. Ms. Stehle, an Associate User Experience Researcher at Fitbit, graduated from Edinboro University in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in Marketing and Media Art. The Graduate competition ended with MA Social Sciences in 1st place and Speech, Language, and Hearing in 2nd place.

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania STEM-H Instructional Fee Pilot

As Approved by the Board of Governors, October 8, 2015

Concept: Edinboro University proposes to charge \$30 per credit to students enrolled in high-cost, high-demand science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and health courses, excluding specific courses that are required for nursing students. (Nursing students have already been assessed a separate high-cost program fee.) The proposed fee and course costs would be reviewed annually; the fee may be adjusted annually, not to exceed a 10 percent increase per year, to address increases in costs and to achieve balance between the cost of a course and the revenue it generates.

Justification/Rationale: The System's Strategic Plan 2020 specifies as one of its goals to ensure academic program excellence and relevance, with a corresponding expected outcome to increase the number of degrees awarded annually in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and health-related (STEM-H) disciplines. Edinboro University supports this goal and target outcome, having developed a strong infrastructure for growth in STEM-H programming and completions, and is committed to a performance funding measure for STEM-H degree completions. The clinical, practicum/internship, and/or laboratory nature of STEM-H programs significantly increases the cost of delivering high-quality student learning experiences, which the current proposal seeks to address.

Cost/Benefit Analysis: The current annual nonfaculty cost in the targeted STEM-H programs is approximately \$933,000; personnel costs are also higher in these areas due to accreditation-related costs and limited laboratory class sizes. The proposed fee is expected to generate approximately \$467,000 in fiscal year 2016/17, with the assumption that enrollment in STEM-H courses will increase two percent in fall 2016 in accordance with university enrollment trends. Annually, Edinboro University will evaluate the relationship between the fee level and course cost along with the impact on enrollment to determine if an increase in the rate is warranted.

No negative impact on enrollment is expected in these high-demand programs as a result of this fee. Since 2012, university full-time equivalent enrollment in STEM-H programs has increased by nearly seven percent, in spite of significant decreases in overall university enrollment.

Timeline: Fall 2016 through summer 2018.

Assessment Goals

Enrollment—The university anticipates this program will not affect projected enrollment.

Access—Edinboro University is committed to providing access to all students, especially those with exceptional financial need. The university will assess the impact of this fee and will target need-based scholarship assistance to qualified students within this pilot program, as needed. Access will be evaluated to maintain at least a similar profile of Pell grant recipients and underrepresented minority students within the STEM-H programs.

Tuition Revenue—Net tuition is expected to remain unchanged by the proposal, while instructional fee revenue will increase approximately \$467,000 annually.

Program Viability: If the program is unsuccessful at the end of the pilot period, the university is committed to reducing or eliminating the pilot. There is no anticipated negative impact to students if the pilot is discontinued.

Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education Pricing Flexibility Pilot Program Principles and Conditions

As Reviewed by the Board of Governors, January 23, 2014

As students provide a larger share of each university's revenue today, pricing flexibility is becoming a more important tool for PASSHE universities to be able to offer a high quality array of educational opportunities to Pennsylvania students at an affordable price and to more appropriately allocate costs of more expensive courses and programs. Currently, Board of Governors' Policy 1999-02-A: *Tuition*, establishes one undergraduate tuition rate for all resident undergraduate students and allows for flexibility in tuition rates for out-of-state and graduate students, summer and/or winter sessions, and distance education courses. In addition, Board of Governors' Policy 1989-05-A: *Student Fees*, provides the framework for councils of trustees to establish fees.

Other higher education institutions in Pennsylvania and across the country, both public and private, employ a wide variety of pricing practices. As PASSHE universities operate in a competitive higher education market, options are being considered that would allow PASSHE and its universities to develop more market-driven pricing practices and to assume the financial and operational risks of doing so. As part of the charge for the Funding Review Task Force that is currently reviewing pricing practices and the formula that allocates state appropriations, a process has been developed to allow universities, with Board approval, to test methods of targeting the net costs borne by a student in an effort to promote increased enrollment and/or more closely reflect program costs.

While pilot proposals are university-specific, each proposal has been made available for review by other PASSHE universities. As a system, PASSHE recognizes that actions taken by one university can impact students and staff at other System institutions and this process has taken into account comments as to such possible consequences. Additional review will be made over the course of the pilots to assess their impacts on other PASSHE universities.

The following conditions apply:

- Approval by a university's council of trustees.
- Timeframe: Pilots will be conducted within a two-year period.
- Assessment Expectations:
 - Each pilot will specify deliverables by which success can be measured, which include:
 - Enrollment targets.
 - Net revenue targets.
 - Access, to include Pell recipients and underrepresented minority enrollment.
 - Each university will report on its progress toward pilot targets annually.
 - An assessment of the pilot's success will occur within the second year, and the process will include a schedule for a determination and implementation of orderly continuance or termination.
- Universities are committed to ensuring access for students of all socioeconomic backgrounds, which is typically measured as maintaining at least the same level of Pell recipients and/or underrepresented minority enrollment in the affected programs. Appropriate need-based financial aid will be made available for students whose new or continued enrollment would be adversely affected by the increase in the cost of attendance created by the initiative.
- If pilots are unsuccessful, existing students receiving reduced tuition rates through the pilot will be grandfathered at the pilot tuition rate until graduation (up to five years or the equivalent of 10 semesters) or withdrawal from the university.

Budget

The Budget Office in conjunction with Accounting Office completed the first quarter and October projection for the fiscal year. The Budget Office provided financial data to the Nursing Department for the pending Nursing accreditation. We completed an Overload study for Academic Affairs; completed a Porreco College analysis; and presented to Provost and Dean of College of Science and Health Professions.

Enterprise Systems

Since September 2015, the Enterprise Systems Team has closed 174 Tech Help Tickets and processed 52 Employee Changes and Relocations requests. Our Nightly Batch system processes an average of 2,200 jobs per month. Since the beginning of the Fall semester, we have protected the University by blocking over 2,000,000 spam messages, stopping over 3,200 messages containing viruses, and delivered just under 1,552,000 email messages.

Banner modules were upgraded, these included Financial Aid, Student, General, and Accounts Receivable. We have also upgraded the Banner applications for FlexReg, BDMS, DegreeWorks, and Workflow.

Enterprise Systems setup configuration management and server monitoring to enhance security, performance and high availability. We also implemented Active Directory authentication for Linux servers, protecting the Production and Test environments.

Servers and appliances were updated to ensure Edinboro University has the latest protection for cyber-attacks including updated Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) certificate installations onto servers and load balancers.

Facilities Management and Planning

- The Porreco College kitchen and dining space renovation project was completed and a ribbon cutting ceremony was held on October 15, 2015. Chartwells has been serving food at the new location which has been named The Haystack Café'. The Haystack Café' is currently open Monday through Thursday.
- The Rose Hall Elevator Addition project is underway. Contractors have been working on the foundation for the new elevator shaft and completed cutting an opening into the existing building where the new elevator lobbies will be constructed. There have been several minor delays due to the discovery of unmarked underground utilities, but the contractors are optimistic they will complete the project well in advance of the August 2016 completion date.
- The Final Design Phase for the renovation of Earlley Hall is nearly complete and will be reviewed by the facilities staff and Art Department within the month. Bids are expected to be awarded in early Spring 2016.
- Desmone Architects are continuing the design of the Learning Commons on the second floor of the Baron-Forness Library. The project is scheduled to be bid early in 2016.
- The planning for an upgrade of the campus-wide access control security system is continuing. The surveys of all exterior doors to buildings on campus have been surveyed and the selection process to retain a project architect is underway.

- The Facilities department has a number of deferred maintenance and small construction projects underway or in final stages of planning and design. These projects include repairs to uneven sidewalks, roof repair to Compton Hall, replacement of electrical switchgear in Earp Hall, the renovation of the Porreco Cottage which will be completed with gift funds and the restoration and repair of the stone steps at the front entrance of Reeder Hall.
- We are working with Technology and Communications to create a call center on the first floor of Dearborn Hall which will be used to host phone-a-thons for fundraising and Admissions and will also provide a communications phone bank which will be used in the event of campus wide emergencies. The anticipated completion of the call center is December 2015.
- Ron Cole, longtime facilities staff member who was most recently our High Voltage Electrical foreman retired in November after many years of service to the University. Ron's expertise and knowledge will be missed but his years of leadership and training leave a number of capable electricians and maintenance personnel who are experienced in the repair and maintenance of our campus electrical system. We wish Ron a long and enjoyable retirement.

General Accounting (includes Bursar, Cash Management and Accounts Payable) Campus Services (Auxiliary Enterprises)

- The audited financial statements were completed and the results have been shared with management. For Fiscal Year 2014-15, Edinboro University received a "clean" audit report which formally stated by the auditors means that "in our opinion, based on our audits and the reports of other auditors, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the business-type activities of the University and the aggregate discretely presented component units as of June 30, 2015". Additionally no material weaknesses or findings were cited in reference to our internal control procedures.
- Accounting worked closely with Athletics Director to complete the Equity in Athletics Disclosure Act/NCAA June 30, 2015 report (due in mid-October) in a timely manner.
- Training and implementation for SAP Travel Management system has begun for the academic departments, with the first department slated for training on November 18.
- The new procurement card from Bank of America/Merrill Lynch was issued to staff and faculty. An initial trial with travel cards was implemented and three cards were issued.
- "Haystack Café" opened on October 6, 2015 and is a welcome addition for the students and staff at the Porreco Campus.

Currently working with the Residence Life office on a project that will enable current residence hall students to change their meal plans for spring semester on the Housing Portal, eliminating the need for them to come to the ID card office and complete change contracts. This will greatly decrease the manual input of changes in the ID Card Office.

- USI, Inc. has agreed to become an on-campus Boro Bucks vendor and is now active on the system.
- Chartwells and the SGA Convenience Store have also agreed to become on-campus vendors and will be active by the start of the Spring semester.

Purchasing and Contracts

Since September 2015, the Purchasing Office has reviewed multiple agreements and contracts, processed multiple bids including campus Ethernet services, emergency alert system, Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and accessories, and processed many purchase orders and service purchase contracts.

- Service contracts have been awarded for various projects including a 3-year agreement for webpage services for our Athletic department, campus pest control services, geotechnical engineering services for the Ross Hall elevator project, chiller repairs, athletic team physician services, renovations to the Ghering Parenting Room and multiple agreements for Homecoming. Work orders against open-ended agreements for paving, asbestos removal and project design services were also issued.
- Other agreements The Purchasing Office has fully executed multiple agreements including agreements with Wolters Kluwer for nursing software, Pre-K grant agreements with local sites; and Affiliation Agreements including Fort Belvoir and Naval Hospital among many others. Many of these are still in process.
- Staff development Our new Purchasing Agent continues to become more acclimated to the University environment and is doing well processing multiple purchase orders and service agreement. He has been a welcome addition to the office. Judy Magee and Darla Spaid attended the Fall Construction and Procurement Conference held at the Dixon Center on November 4-6, where various ideas and topics were discussed. Judy Magee and Pat McElhinny have attended Constituent Training and Ms. Spaid will attend later in November.

Other

Associate Vice President for Financial Operations continued in role as University Supervisor to the Student Government Association (SGA). Recent work has focused on creating and documenting financial procedures related to procurement and approval processes, and identifying possible internal controlled separation of duties issues.

- Worked with SGA Director of Operations to establish parameters for SGA Liability Insurance and Event Insurance; new policy is now in effect.
- Working with SGA Finance Director and Director of Operations to develop outline for possible banking Request For Proposal (RFP) or at a minimum, an improvement in the current level of banking services received by the SGA.

Human Resources and Faculty Relations

CUPA

In October of 2016, as part of the Southwestern Pennsylvania College and University Professional Association (SWPA CUPA) Chapter, the Human Resources office hosted a learning session for chapter members.

- There were approximately 30 individuals from 10-11 different institutions.
- Lunch was provided and a meeting location. A topic and speaker was also selected for this event.

Faculty clearances are currently on hold due to a court injunction filed by APSCUF.

- Background clearances for all employees who were active as of January 2015, except APSCUF, are required to have all clearances on file in Human Resources by December 31, 2015.
- There are approximately 65 current staff members that have at least one clearance that is not on file in Human Resources and must be completed by December 31, 2015. They are being contacted to complete the process.
- Since September 1, 2015, over 560 background clearances have been processed for current and new employees, with the majority student workers.
- SAP is being utilized to record all clearances.

Employment

Human Resources and Faculty Relations is working with Social Equity on diversity recruiting initiatives and responses to concerns from employees (constituent experience).

Conducted new employee orientation for 33 new employees (4 Managers; 16 AFSCME; 4 SCUPA; 2 SPFPA; 4 Coaches; 1 Cheerleading advisor; 2 student interns.

Currently working with Technology and Communications to develop an on-line/paperless tuition waiver process that will help Human Recourses, Bursar's Office and Institutional Research with reporting and expediency.

- Coordinated the 2015 SECA (State Employee Combined Appeal) Campaign for Edinboro University.
- Attended classification review training at Clarion University in conjunction with the statewide SCUPA Classification review project; performed 32 SCUPA classification reviews.
- Posted and advertised 14 staff positions and 12 Temporary and Tenure Track faculty positions.

Payroll and Benefits

Faculty overload calculations were paid on October 30, 2015, utilizing a new Excel format, which worked well. A few modifications have been made for spring, and the old paper/adding machine method has been retired!

- Distance Education will be paid on November 25, 2015.
- A third student worker was hired in Payroll. She is a quick learner and has proven to be reliable and dependable.
- We are moving forward with the faculty Employee Self Service (ESS) leave entry, and all adjustments to organization management have been made. We are working with Dr. Hannan and hope to begin the rollout the week of November 16, 2015.
- We are testing exception reporting and plan to start a rollout within the Facilities Office in December 2015 or January 2016.
- Open enrollments are in process for the following:
 - o PEBTF open enrollment
 - o PEFTF Get Healthy enrollment period
 - o FSA open enrollment
 - o PASSHE PPO plan change for management, SPFPA and OPEIU open enrollment
- Flu shot information was communicated to all employees. An on-campus event was not coordinated this year, as CVS and Giant Eagle are both participating providers and located within two miles of campus.
- Leave requests are being monitored for the holiday closing.
- On-line W2 communications were sent to all faculty, staff, student workers, and graduate assistants. So far, we have 362 requesting on-line W2. Of the 362 requests, 66 are students.
- Retirement and resignation letters have been modified and combined. As an example, for a retirement, up to four separate letters were prepared: President's letter, Human Resources letter, Benefits letter, and exit questionnaire letter. Now, there is one letter prepared for the President's signature with a benefit packet enclosure!
- We are preparing for the end of semester and year-end processing.

Institutional Research

The Office of Institutional Research (IR) is in its busiest time of year, working on filing all of the reporting that comes with the fall census data, coupled with new data flowing into the office daily.

Accomplishments:

The Fall Freeze went very smoothly this year. Thanks in part to improvements by Technology and Communications as well as the diligence in data maintenance from departments such as the Registrar, Admissions, and Graduate Studies, Edinboro had fewer errors than in the past and a better understanding of what to do to correct the ones we did have. Additionally, the program inventory kept by the state has been updated with unique identifiers for all of Edinboro's programs for the first time.

- A large portion of time has been spent on getting acquainted with Admissions data. Institutional Research was given access to the data table used by former Vice President of Enrollment Services Chris LaRusso at the beginning of the semester and has been running numerous analyses. For example, IR has taken some of this data and submitted it to the National Student Clearinghouse to receive a detailed study of where those students that were admitted to Edinboro, but did not enroll, ended up. There was also spot checking of some admissions reporting done by our consultants that resulted in error corrections. In addition, Technology and Communications has provided a table of Financial Aid data in the same format, offering additional possibilities for analysis.
- Matt Cettin continues to take part in several staff searches. In addition to chairing the Director of Career Services search, he has served on the committees for the Interim Vice President of Enrollment Services, the Director of Financial Aid and more recently the Director of Grants Management and Sponsored Programs.
- The number of requests for data and surveys for accreditation, assessment, and general research continue to increase. Couple this with regular annual reporting on items such as faculty course evaluations and appointments such as coordinating the Social Equity training for the students and there is more work than time in a day. This has resulted in the need to be selective on what the Office of Institutional Research can and cannot work on, but so far priorities have remained in check (enrollment, retention, budget, state reporting).

<u>Networks and Telecommunications</u> September-November 2015 Accomplishments

Telecom System Improvements:

- Planning stages for hardware upgrade for voice systems in Summer 2016 to replace servers going end of life.
- Project to cutover all analog lines from current wire centers which do not have generator backup power to locations which have generators to allow for critical services to remain functional during power outages. Affected locations are as follows: McComb Fieldhouse, Compton, Rose, Dearborn, Earp, and Highlands 1.
 - Cutover completed of all analog lines from previous aggregation point in McComb Fieldhouse to Pogue Center which has an Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS)/Generator. Approximately 110 analog lines were cutover.

- Work will start soon on data collection and frame build out for relocation of analog line wire center from Compton to Alexander. Rose to Cooper will follow.
- O Meeting held with Facilities personnel to define scope of work to run Outside Plant (OSP) copper from the following locations to nearest location with a generator: Dearborn, Earp and Highlands 1. Materials ordered.

Network Improvements:

- Implemented the following security improvements using new "next gen" Palo Alto firewall:
 - O Utilization of Internet Storm Center's Top 20 Block List which is updated daily and blocks access to/from the top 20 known malicious sites.
 - Blocking of peer-to-peer applications that are known for unauthorized data and file transfers.
 - o Blocking of all critical and high risk antispyware and known vulnerabilities based on threat subscription used by government and industry.
- Worked with PASSHE Network Operations Center (NOC) to install/cutover to new University Brocade SSHEnet routers.
- Request for Proposal (RFP) conducted for continuation of services for Porreco point-to-point Ethernet link and Business Continuity link. Bid awarded to Zito Media. Contract review in progress. Once signed Zito can begin their fiber installation. When they are up and running, the University will save approximately \$20,000/year on these two services.
- WiFi controllers software upgrade planned for winter break. Upgrade will allow for utilization of latest WiFi standards and performance benefits.
- Implemented new software to assist in management of network and VoIP equipment.

Campus Moves/Wiring Projects:

- International Student Services Offices move to Library 2nd floor.
- APSCUF office moved to Dearborn.
- Wiring for Security and Facilities offices in the Caretakers House at Porreco.
- Wireless Application Protocol (WAP) wiring/installation for Campus Bookstore.
- Wiring completed for the Haystack Café' eatery in the Porreco Barn.
- TimeLink clock installation completed in 20 requested locations.

Campus Security:

- Wiring and equipment installation completed for new Campus Emergency Operations Center.
- Review of bid responses for Emergency Alert RFP. Demonstrations held for the top three respondents.
- Wiring for two new security cameras in McComb Fieldhouse.

- Appointed new JTAC (JNET Terminal Agency Coordinator) officer who completed requirements for compliance.
- Completed annual departmental firearms qualifications.

Student Affairs – Report Edinboro University Council of Trustees December 11, 2015

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

- During the 2014-15 academic year, the Edinboro University Athletic department raised \$13,665 for the Make-A-Wish Foundation. The NCAA recently announced that this amount was the highest dollar amount raised among all NCAA Division II universities. Edinboro University will host its third "Wish Reveal" in early 2016.
- Nominations are being sought for the Edinboro University Martin Luther King, Jr. Award. Individuals are encouraged to nominate regional citizens whose life work emulates the philosophy and teachings of Dr. King.
- The Fighting Scots athletes are again participating in the *Read to Compete Program*, where student athletes read to students at the Edinboro Elementary School. Other athletic department service activities includes the Swimming Team's participation in the Buddy Walk, the Lacrosse Team assisting with the cleanup of the ANNA Animal Shelter, and the Men's Basketball Team visiting with students at the JFK Center's After-School program.
- Residence Life and Housing partnered with Chartwells Catering to host "Dip and Dogs," where individuals donated \$1 to play with staff dogs. As a result of this event, \$240 was donated to "Because You Care" animal shelter.
- Campus Life organized the Annual Random Acts of Kindness (RAKE) in Edinboro. Students raked leaves for approximately 34 houses, disposing of 546 bags of leaves.
- Residence Life and Housing organized a reverse Trick or Treating event, where more than 450 pounds of food was donated to the Edinboro Food Pantry.
- The Lamba Chi Alpha Fraternity held its annual "Fulcrum for Food," raising \$3,012 in donations, which will allow the Edinboro Food Pantry to purchase approximately 23,193 pounds of food.
- Student Health Services coordinated the Annual Domestic Violence Awareness March.
- Dr. Kahan Sablo and other members of the Edinboro University National Coalition Building Institute (NCBI) Team conducted a seven hour Welcoming Diversity workshop for the faculty, staff, and administrators of the General McLane High School. Dr. Sablo also serves on the high school's diversity strategic planning team.

STAFF ACCOLADES AND INITIATIVES

- Student Health Services began a collaborative research study with the University of Pittsburgh to explore best practices in alcohol education and intervention.
- Student Health Services hosted the PASSHE Fall Health Center Director's meeting.
- Dr. Kahan Sablo and Ms. Michelle Barbich hosted the National Coalition Building Institute's Campus Affiliate's Conference, bringing together diversity workshop facilitators from across the county.
- Student Health Services launched a new electronic medical record system to enhance the coordination of patient care.

- The Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs will be assisting with the selection process for the next student representative to the Edinboro University Council of Trustees. With the anticipated May 2016 graduation of Trustee Walker, the committee desires to conclude all aspects of the local selection process by March 2016.
- Ms. Stephanie Graybill, Graduate Residence Hall Coordinator, presented at the Maryland College Personnel Association conference. Her presentation focused on religious diversity, and was titled, "A Muslim & a Christian Walk into the Office...".
- The Residence Assistant staff participated in staff development sessions on supporting gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender (GLBT) students and best practices in the responding to students who are experiencing an emotional crisis.
- In compliance with federal Title IX mandates, the Wellness Peer Educators conducted bystander intervention training for approximately 800 students.
- Several students were named College Sports Information Directors Association (CoSIDA) Academic All-Americans:
 - o Women's Soccer Reilee DuPratt and Jansen Hartmann named to CoSIDA Academic All-District team and on national ballot.
 - o **Football** Jaycen Watts (OT) named to CoSIDA Academic All-District team and on national ballot.

- Wellness Peer Educators and Student Health and Wellness Advisory Board (SHWAB) members collaborated on activities in celebration of National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week.
- The Residence Hall Association attended the Central Atlantic Affiliate of the National Association of College & University Residence Halls Conference, where two students presented on student leadership.
- The Office for Students with Disabilities is piloting a Boro Autism Support Initiative for Success (BASIS) Program. The BASIS program is designed to transition students to Edinboro University by providing them with the skills and strategies for success collegiate and career success.
- The Office for Students with Disabilities (OSD) has developed a series of programs that focus on employment preparation. These programs include self-advocacy, transportation, Social Security benefits, competitive employment, resume writing, and interviewing strategies.

- Women's Soccer (15-7-1) seeded fourth, reached the NCAA Sweet 16 for the first time in the University's history. Edinboro won its first-ever NCAA playoff game on penalty kicks after finishing in a 0-0 tie with Charleston (WV). Student Affairs – Report Edinboro University Council of Trustees December 11, 2015

- Volleyball (30-5) enjoyed a record-breaking season, winning 15 matches in a row. Edinboro clinched its first berth in the PSAC Tournament since 2011, and is currently third in the Atlantic Region rankings. The team's current 30 wins are the most since 2010.
- Women's Cross Country won their second straight PSAC championship, finishing second at the NCAA Division II Atlantic Regional. Freshman, Ida Narbuvoll, has won both the PSAC and regional individual titles. She was Edinboro's first individual PSAC Champion since 2006. She led a group of five runners who earned All-PSAC honors.
- Men's Cross Country placed fifth at the PSAC Championship. However, the team gave a stellar performance at the Atlantic Regional, rising to third place to earn one of three spots at Nationals. Elliott Martynkiewicz finished second at the PSAC competition, and was third at the Atlantic Regional. He was joined by two other runners as All-PSAC performers Jonathan Gusew and Corey Wefing; both earned second team accolades. The same trio earned All-Region honors.
- Wheelchair Basketball Head coach Jim Glatch's team is off to a 5-3 start and finished second at the recent Boro Shootout.
- **Football** ended the year with a 0-11 season. The University looks forward to improved results under new leadership.
- Wrestling opened its season at the beginning of November. Head Coach Tim Flynn won his 200th career game at the EMU (Eastern Michigan University) Duals and now has a 200-73-5 record. Vic Avery was selected to compete in the National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA) All-Star Classic. Due to an injury, he was forced to pull out. Avery is ranked second nationally at 184 lbs. Redshirt freshman Sean Russell competed in the NWCA All-Star Classic undercard and won an 8-2 decision.
- Coaching Staff Several additions have been made to the coaching staff. Caitlin Formato was hired as Head Coach of the Women's Lacrosse Team. All-American Mitchell Port joined the wrestling staff, and the football program added former Fighting Scots Joe Wanson and Jack Carey to the staff.





We enjoyed minor success with our "EU Instagram Takeover," wherein four active, engaged students from a varied academic and co-curricular pursuits – Mary Kleiger, a Highland Ambassador and Marketing major; Tyler Trumbauer, the Sports Director of ETV and WFSE and Sports Editor of the Spectator, and a Journalism and Public Relations major; Taylor Proper, a Psychology major and member of Alpha Sigma Tau and the Psychology Club; and Bailey Goldbaugh, a Nursing major, cheerleader and member of Highland Ambassadors and Student Nurses of Edinboro (SNOE) – took over the University's Instagram account for one-week periods each, beginning October 12 and continuing through November 6, to showcase "a week in the life of an Edinboro University student." While the students did not post as actively as we would have liked, what they did post often received elevated engagement (more "likes"), and during the approximate one-month period we gained 81 followers.

Accreditations and Recognitions

- February 2016, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) accreditation team visited Edinboro providing positive feedback to our Nursing Department. A detailed report is expected after the CCNE Board of Directors meeting in October 2016.
- Edinboro's Master of Education in Early Childhood Education was ranked seventh in OnlineU's listing
 of the nation's Most Affordable Early Childhood Education Degrees Online. The University's master's
 and post-master's certificate programs in education are ranked 12th in its listing of the Most Affordable
 Online Teaching Degrees.
- The Animation Career Review's 2016 listing ranked Edinboro University Art Department's Animation program 18th on the East Coast and 17th nationally among public schools and colleges.

Academic Program Initiatives

• Students interested in careers in healthcare were able to speak with professionals in the field on March 16th at "Having the Heart for Healthcare," a program presented by Porreco College and Fairview Manor. The event took place at Fairview Manor, Fairview, Pa. The program emphasized compassion, professionalism and choosing a healthcare career for the right reasons. Edinboro professor Daniel Eaton, MSN, RN, a nurse and educator who is also a Ph.D. student in the field of eldercare and dementia, spoke about his experience. These revisions meet the CACREP standard, while at the same time making the total number of credits needed for the Certificate in Art Therapy more attainable for students.

Finance and Administration Report Personnel transactions since December 11, 2015

Office of the Vice President for Finance and Administration

During the last three months the Office of the Vice President for Finance and Administration has worked on several initiatives designed to advance EU's long-term financial health. These include:

- Assisting with the presidential transition from outgoing President Julie Wollman to incoming Interim President David Werner.
- Working with the State System of Higher Education (SSHE) Office of the Chancellor and Edinboro University Foundation to arrange for the transfer of ownership and debt obligations for The Highlands student housing project.
- Vice President Brown chaired the search for a new chief enrollment manager resulting in the hiring of Dr. William Edmonds as Associate Vice President of Enrollment Services.
- Upon receipt of the revised Financial Risk Assessment from the SSHE, worked with Provost Hannan and members of EU's Executive Leadership Team (ELT), President's Executive Committee (PEC), Budget & Planning Team (BPT) and Strategic Enrollment Management Team (SEM Team) to revise EU's long-term enrollment and financial outlook utilizing revised state and county demographic projections for high school graduates in the coming years. The ELT developed a multi-year plan designed to bring EU to a balanced budget by July 1, 2018. The ELT and other committees are continuing to work to identify both revenue enhancement and cost reduction opportunities over a multi-year planning horizon.
- Vice President Brown and Provost Hannan presented revised enrollment and financial plans at an All Faculty Meeting in March.
- Provost Hannan and Vice President Brown were the keynote presenters at a Middle States Commission for Higher Education (MSCHE) workshop for institutions that have been asked to submit monitoring reports in response to an action or finding of the Commission. The MSCHE monitoring report visiting team commended EU's report of a year ago as a model. In addition, Vice President Brown presented a workshop on how to develop an institutional financial model.

The same joint presentation by Provost Hannan and Vice President Brown was accepted for presentation at the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO) annual meeting to be held in July in Montreal, Canada. In addition, Vice President Brown will present a session on energy efficiency projects at EU. **Budget**The Budget office, in conjunction with the Accounting office, completed the mid-year projection for the fiscal year; provided data to the ELT to begin the Budget Reduction Plan for FY2017 and FY2018; and completed the financial reports for the SSHE Action Plan. Together with the Institutional Research office completed the 2014-2015 Department Credit analysis; provided financial data for the Vice President for Finance and Administration and Provost that was presented to the Budget Planning Team Committee, Breakfast Club session and to the Provost's meeting with All Faculty, all presented in the first quarter of the calendar year.

Facilities Management and Planning

- The Rose Hall Elevator Addition has been continuing. Mild winter weather allowed the
 contractors to continue with only minor stoppages so the project remains on schedule and
 will be ready for use by students by Fall semester 2017.
- The Library Learning Commons design is complete and the project will be bid in April.
 Construction is scheduled to begin in early summer and the projected completion is
 Spring 2017. The Learning Commons will be the home of student success, international
 student services, and career services.

- The University Call Center on the first floor of Dearborn Hall, which will be used to host phone-a-thons for fund raising and admissions, has been completed and has been in use since early March.
- The Capital Planning Committee placed a moratorium on any additional space renovation, relocation, or construction projects pending the completion of a space study by Paulien Associates. The study began in early March with a room by room inspection and inventory across campus which will be followed by interviews of key administrators and academic departments in May. The study results will be used to determine how the University can become more efficient in the utilization of space by consolidating or downsizing in response to decreased enrollments. Once the most efficient use of the space is determined, resources can be better utilized to maintain and refurbish the most useful space while deactivating other space.
- Deferred maintenance and infrastructure projects will continue including the access control project, medium voltage switchgear replacement project, as well as other projects necessary to repair or replace aging systems and infrastructure on campus. Emphasis will be placed on building envelopes including doors, windows, and roofs, as well as deteriorating exterior ramps, railings, steps, and walkways.
- The proposed demolition of Miller Research Center and Centennial Hall have been approved by the Pennsylvania Department of General Services which leaves only the approval from the Pennsylvania Historical Commission. The relocation of the remaining faculty and department offices in Centennial Hall into Dearborn Hall will be completed this summer and Centennial Hall will be taken off-line permanently.

General Accounting (includes Bursar, Cash Management and Accounts Payable) Accomplishments: September - November 2015

- Reviewed and updated capital projects balances and worked with Facilities to develop a Plant Fund Spending Plan for the next two fiscal years.
- Met with the Development office and Edinboro University Foundation to discuss restricted and endowment fund balances. Improved and clarified the procedures dealing with transfers of funds between the two entities. Also discussed the annual endowment distribution plan and the need for the Accounting office to have access to the donor documentation for each restricted fund to ensure that the donors' requirements are being followed.
- Worked with PASSHE to get a new monthly grant report created for the Development office. This report will show actual revenue received on all grants and will eliminate the need to update the current excel spreadsheet.
- Ongoing grant reporting, review and closeout.
- Created a spreadsheet to track all Flex and Boro Bucks transactions received daily. This
 will allow for reconciliation at the end of the month. Eliminated daily deposits of Flex
 and Boro Bucks, which will now be done on a monthly basis.
- Researched information pertaining to the indirect cost rate, submitted request for renewal and received new rate.
- Continuing to bill for delinquent 2015 summer athletic camp receivables and updating files in preparation for the summer 2016 camp activities.

Campus Services (Auxiliary Enterprises)

 Chartwells and the SGA Convenience Store are now active on-campus vendors for the Boro Bucks program.

Purchasing and Contracts

- Since January 2016, the Purchasing office has reviewed multiple agreements and contracts, processed multiple bids including sanitary sewer line cleaning services, waste removal services, HID Card Supplies, and processed many purchase orders and service purchase contracts.
- Service contracts have been awarded for various projects including a three-year agreement for water softener salt and services, multiple Community Music School instrument lesson contracts, speaker agreements, sidewalk repairs, athletic dome repairs, and renewal of the Starfish Retention Solutions software subscription. Work orders against open-ended agreements for asbestos removal and project design services were also issued. Currently working on reviewing and releasing the bid package for the Library Learning Commons construction project.
- The Purchasing office has fully executed multiple agreements, including agreements for badge licensing, temporary Certified Nursing Assistants, various library subscriptions, space utilization study; and Affiliation Agreements including Sault Area Hospital and Erie Veterans Medical Center among many others. Approximately 40 art loan agreements were processed as well as several agreements for facility usage and athletic sponsorship.
- Staff development In January, a training session was held with the new department chairs to inform them of the purchasing process and approval of requisitions. Judy Magee, Pat McElhinny and Darla Spaid will attend the Spring Construction & Procurement Conference to be held in State College in April. The recently released mandated training for Protection of Children will be completed by the requested deadline.

- Associate Vice President for Financial Operations continued in role as University Supervisor to the Student Government Association (SGA). Recent work includes the development of employee job descriptions and completion of annual performance evaluations.
- Worked with SGA Advisor to develop a process for the SGA to receive fund balance expenditure proposals from the University administration. Seventy five (75) proposals were submitted for review by the student body.
- Worked with SGA Finance Director and Director of Operations to complete transfer of banking services from PNC Bank to Marquette Savings Bank.
- Ongoing discussion with PASSHE legal and University administration on changing the structure of the relationship between the SGA and EU so that more adult oversight is given to matters of finance and administration.

- There are approximately four (4) current staff members that have at least one clearance not on file in Human Resources and have been contacted to complete the process.
- Since September 1, 2015, over 1,158 background clearances have been processed for current and new employees, with the majority student workers.
- SAP is still being utilized to record all clearances.

Employment & Classification

- Conducted new employee orientation for 20 new employees in February and March 2016 (2 Managers; 9 AFSCME; 6 APSCUF faculty; 3 Coaches).
- Developed a method of storing all search related documentation electronically on a cloud server within People Admin applicant tracking software.
- Developed a paperless on-line method for references to be received online and confidentially attached to the applicant file for review by the selection committee.
- Continue to work with the Chief Diversity Officer (CDO) on diversity recruiting initiatives and responses to concerns from employees (constituency experience). This includes providing diversity and search committee training to all selection committees.
- Collaborated with the CDO to revise the selection process and related selection documents to include fillable pdf forms for use by the selection committee.
- Performed 23 classification reviews at the request of functional managers. The reviews resulted in some recommendations for re-classification with promotion and salary increase, or in-grade adjustments and some were denied.
- Posted and advertised 12 staff positions and 10 Temporary and Tenure Track faculty positions.
- Verified and submitted the IPEDS data in conjunction with the Director of Institutional Research.
- Currently developing and testing an on-line paperless method for submission and approval of requests to fill vacancies.
- Currently working with Technology & Communications to develop an on-line/paperless tuition waiver process that will help Human Resources, Bursar's office and Institutional Research with reporting and expediency.

Payroll and Benefits

- More than half-million dollars in Winter session payments were paid in February to over 50 faculty.
- Last minute changes to work schedules for Christmas break were processed. We will soon begin the change of work schedules for the summer months, pending the President's approval.
- Payroll met with Kelly Vitelli in collaboration with the Financial Aid office to discuss improvements to the student employment process.
- New Spring faculty hires were processed and loads for temporary faculty continuing from Fall were adjusted in consultation with the Deans' offices.
- An increased number of students are deferring a portion or all of their student employment monies to their student account to avoid 'holds'.

- Since all of our Student Employment federal funds are nearly exhausted, all students were recoded to utilize institutional work funds for the remainder of the 15/16 academic year.
- Currently working on improved delivery of distance education payments.
- We continue to improve our process for paying overload. This Spring, we audited overload forms before paying out nearly a half-million in Spring overload monies to more than 100 faculty.
- Although more and more employees have elected to receive their W-2 form online, we continue to process requests for the reprinting of W-2 forms.
- We are preparing to pay out distance education payments April 15.
- Working with Human Resources to update all information for student and non-student non-resident alien employees.
- Collaborating with Social Equity to ensure students complete the protection of children training.
- Collaborating with Human Resources to ensure all student workers clearances are completed and received.
- All academic departments are now utilizing ESS for leave entry.
- Involved with new employee orientation, presenting information on ESS, etc.
- The Payroll staff will be attending ALICE training later this month presented by the University Police Department.
- · We are also preparing for end of academic year processes and summer school processing.

Institutional Research

The Office of Institutional Research has been spending much of its time on fiscal analysis, enrollment projections, future plans, and leadership transition.

Accomplishments:

- With new leadership, especially in Enrollment Management, we have worked to set a
 realistic expectation of what our future annualized enrollment should be for the next three
 fiscal years and how it will impact our budget. These numbers were found acceptable for
 projection purposes, however, we will be working within SEM (Strategic Enrollment
 Management) to make this process better and set future goals.
- Performed analysis on the financial production of our academic programs within the department credit analysis as well as a study on the allocation of appropriations by department using State System data.
- Provided detailed projections of the impact of increasing our retention and loss of market share for Interim President Werner and Vice President Brown.
- Presented at meeting of the EU Council of Trustees on the topic of current strategic plan and future strategy of the institution.
- Prepared numerous reports and surveys focused on EU campus demographics. These
 include mandated accreditation studies as well as research surveys. Examples

administered include the National Survey of Student Engagement, a study on current student internship practices, and completion of the Common Dataset.

- IR has continued its goal for improved data and assessment across campus. Over the fall and early spring meetings have been held with:
 - Teams from the Admissions, Financial Aid, Technology & Communications (T&C), Veterans Services regarding the reporting of veterans data;
 - T&C about Retention cohorts in BoroReports; and
 - Student Life about improving assessment.
- Served as a member on several staff searches. One such search led to the hiring of the Director of Career Services.
- Plan to attend the Association for Institutional Research's annual conference May 31 June 4 and bring back fresh ideas on improvements to the University's institutional
 research practices.

 This project involved a contractor running outside plant copper between Earp-Cooper,
 Dearborn-Cooper and Highlands 1-Towers. Affected locations are as follows: McComb,
 Compton, Rose, Dearborn, Earp, Highlands 1.
 - Cutover of all analog lines from previous wire center location in McComb to Pogue Center which has a UPS/Generator – Fall 2015
 - Cutover of all analog lines from previous wire center location in Compton to Alexander – January 2016
 - Outside plant copper extended from building entrance in Dearborn and Earp to each building's telecom closet and terminated on lightening protection units – March 2016
- All UPS units in critical wiring closets have been put on network monitoring. Battery replacement in progress where needed.

Network Improvements:

- Implemented the following security improvements using new "next gen" Palo Alto firewall:
 - Denial of Service prevention activated
 - 30 day evaluation in progress on URL filtering subscription which allows blocking of known phishing and malware sites. Provides better reporting on malware and botnets
- Worked with PASSHE NOC to upgrade the software on the University Brocade SSHEnet routers.
- RFP conducted for continuation of services for Porreco point-to-point Ethernet link and Business Continuity link. Bid awarded to Zito Media. Contract review still in progress.

Once signed Zito can begin their fiber installation. When they are up and running the University will save approximately \$20,000/year on these 2 services.

- Received Tech Fee monies to upgrade 56 older wireless access points to new 802.11ac (gigabit) units.

Area Accomplishments:

- All officers have completed the mandatory Act 180 update training.
- Several A.L.I.C.E. (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) trainings have been conducted for students, faculty, and staff. Very positive feedback from all those who have attended this training and several recommendations have been made for this to be

mandatory training. This training will also become a part of Welcome Weekend for the Fall 2016 semester.

- Developed and implemented the online visitor parking pass which allows visitors coming
 on campus the capability to print their own parking passes thus eliminating the need to
 stop at the campus police station to obtain a temporary parking permit.
- Signed a MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) with the Erie County District Attorney in conjunction with Hamot UPMC for officers to administer Naloxone to individuals suffering from an opioid overdose. All officers have been trained and certified to administer this treatment.
- Implemented the new Web Cad (computer aided dispatch) system. Web Cad is an internet based system that works off of Erie County 911 Centers CAD which gives us the capability to keep track of our incidents through the 911 database. It also allows the officer on the road the ability to view and interact with dispatch and other officers through the office and vehicle MDT computer system. This system eliminates the need to store nearly 6,000 incident memos per year and provides a cost savings by eliminating the need to purchase memo card and maintain a punch time clock. It also gives us the capability to be able to search for incidents using a variety of searchable fields.
- Departmental compliance with the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act. This is a new web-based automated system that allows us to provide monthly reporting required by law.

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT/ACCOLADES

- Five students applied for the Student Trustee position that was vacated by Mr. Shaquan Walker. Interviews were held on April 3 and a recommendation was submitted to Interim President Werner.
- During the spring commencement ceremony, ROTC will commission 15 cadets as second lieutenants in the United States Army. This is a record for our ROTC program.
- As a result of the Greek Academic Plan (GAP) that was presented to the University Senate, our fraternities and sororities have the third highest academic standing in PASSHE. Approximately 57% of our Greek students (196/341) have a 3.0 or higher cumulative GPA. Members of our fraternity/sorority community have a higher five-year graduation rate than their non-Greek peers.
- Edinboro University is in second place for the PSAC Dixon Trophy. This Trophy is awarded to the PSAC member institution whose athletic program earns the best overall finish in conference championships and/or regular season play.
- The Center for Outdoor Recreation (CORE) returned from its Seventh Annual Alternative Spring Break trip. This year students went to Tennessee to engage in various outdoor recreation activities, including whitewater rafting, zip lining, bouldering, hiking, camping, etc.
- Student Health Services provided "Safe Spring Break" information to students. In addition, Center for Disease Control (CDC) travel and behavioral advisories specific to the Zika Virus were also shared.
- OSD launched a "Big-Little" program that allows upper class students to mentor first year students. The pilot program will be evaluated via focus groups for a full implementation in the fall.
- Residence Life and Housing hosted a guest speaker to facilitate a dialogue on racism. This program included a discussion on the #*BlackLivesMatter* movement.
- The Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority inducted its inaugural membership class. In support of fraternity/sorority diversity, the Division of Student Affairs desires to host seven of the nine Historically Black Greek-Letter organizations within the next three years.
- A Parent Resource Room was opened at the Health and Wellness Center to provide a venue for student parents to gather, facilitate child care logistics, and offer privacy to nursing mothers.
- The Student Government Association (SGA) partnered with APSCUF to send students to Harrisburg to rally for additional funding for the PASSHE. SGA is also participating in PASSHE's #*InvestInMe* social media campaign for increased funding.
- Mr. Ron Wilson served as the Keynote speaker for the spring ALANI Awards Ceremony that celebrates the academic accolades of students of color. The Salute to Graduates Celebration will be held in May, where graduating students of color will participate in a Kente ceremony and wear their Kente stoles during commencement.

Dr. Alberto Acereda

Senior Strategic Advisor, Global Education, Educational Testing Service (ETS)

Dr. Alberto Acereda moved from Spain to the United States in 1988. He is senior director of business development in the Global Education Division at Educational Testing Service (ETS) in Princeton, New Jersey. He focuses on strategic planning with colleges and universities in order to create solutions for student success and student learning outcome assessments, leading to better academic experience for all learners and students. For almost 20 years and until 2012, he worked as a tenured full professor and also as an administrator in several universities around the country. Acereda also has been a visiting scholar and professor at different colleges and universities in Europe and in the U.S., most



recently at the University of Pennsylvania. Acereda has published several books and numerous research articles and he serves on the editorial board of several scholarly journals. He is a member of the North American Academy of the Spanish Language, a branch of the Royal Spanish Academy.

Dr. Lorraine (Laurie) Bernotsky

Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, West Chester University of Pennsylvania (WCU)



Dr. Laurie Bernotsky oversees the Academic Affairs Division which is comprised of five colleges offering over 100 academic degree programs and houses the Office of Institutional Research, the Center for International programs, the offices of undergraduate admissions, enrollment management, financial aid, graduate studies, and undergraduate student support services.

Prior to assuming this role, Dr. Bernotsky served as Associate Provost and Dean of Graduate Studies at WCU. As a faculty leader, Dr. Bernotsky founded and served as Director of the Master of Public Administration (MPA) program, revising an existing graduate program that had been languishing, to meet the needs of students and regional employers.

Dr. Bernotsky earned an Master of Philosophy in politics from the University of Oxford and an M.A. in sociology from Temple University before completing her D.Phil. in politics at the University of Oxford in 1996. Her research interests and publications include women in politics, race, class and gender theory, economic development, as well teaching and learning. Her professional publications include policy papers and evaluation studies. Her community and professional activities include leadership of WCU's Center for Social and Economic Policy Research, founding and leading the WCU's Legislative Fellows program, and serving on the Leadership Chester County Board of Directors.

Mr. Frank T. Brogan Chancellor, Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education



Frank T. Brogan became the fourth chancellor of Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education on October 1, 2013. A lifelong educator, Mr. Brogan previously served as chancellor of the State University System of Florida, was president of Florida Atlantic University, and was twice elected lieutenant governor of the state of Florida. As chancellor, he serves as the chief executive officer of the State System, which operates 14 comprehensive universities with a combined enrollment of about 110,000 students. The chancellor works with the Board of Governors to recommend and develop overall policies for the System. He began his academic career as a teacher at Port Salerno Elementary School in Martin County, Florida. After working his way up through the Martin County School System—including serving six years as superintendent—he was elected Florida's Commissioner of Education in 1995. A native of Ohio, Mr. Brogan was

the first member of his family to attend college, earning a bachelor's degree in education (magna cum laude) from the University of Cincinnati and a master's degree in education from Florida Atlantic University.

Dr. Michael A. DriscollPresident, Indiana University of Pennsylvania

Dr. Michael A. Driscoll was named president of Indiana University of Pennsylvania effective July 1, 2012. He previously served as the executive vice chancellor and provost of the University of Alaska Anchorage, a position he took after serving in various posts at Portland State University in Oregon.

Dr. Driscoll holds a Bachelor of Science, a Master of Science and a Ph.D., all in electrical engineering, from Michigan State University. He chairs the American Association of State Colleges and Universities' Committee on Economic and Workforce Development and played a lead role in writing the recently adopted statement regarding the economic importance universities have in their host regions. He also holds board memberships on the Pennsylvania Economy League of Greater Pittsburgh and Indiana Healthcare Corporation.



To combat the national problem of college student binge drinking on the local level, Dr. Driscoll convened a university and community partnership in consultation with the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency to curb dangerous behaviors that affect not only students but also the surrounding community.

Mr. Dennis R. Frampton President/CEO of C&J Industries Chair, Edinboro University Council of Trustees

Dennis Frampton is President/CEO of C&J Industries, a Crawford County plastics manufacturer specializing in complex, high-precision injection molded components and assemblies. He has been a member of the Edinboro University Council of Trustees since 2010, vice chairman since 2011, and chairman since 2015. He is a current member of the Edinboro University Foundation, and has been credited with helping to raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for Edinboro scholarships and was instrumental in the establishment of Edinboro University in Meadville – The Joseph T. Buba Center.

Before joining the Foundation, Greenstein was Vice Provost for Academic Planning and Programs at the University of California Office of the President, a role in which he acted as the director for UC Online Education – a new effort to integrate online education into the university's undergraduate curriculum, among other accomplishments.

Greenstein has led, in some cases founded, several internet-based academic information services in the US (the California Digital Library) and the United Kingdom (the Arts and Humanities Data Service), and served on boards and acted in strategic consulting roles for educational, cultural heritage, and information organizations.

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


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
