The Edinboro University Council of Trustees began their meeting itinerary with the required annual Inspection of Facilities. This annual activity was led by Finance and Administration Vice President Guilbert Brown and Director of Facilities Management & Planning Michael Hilbert; President Walker joined Trustees Dennis Frampton, Daniel Higham, Harold Shields and Student Trustee-Select Savannah Anderton. Chair Frampton stated that the proceedings of the Edinboro University Council of Trustees are recorded; therefore, public disclosure to those in attendance via verbal announcement and written public notice avoids any violation of the Pennsylvania Wire Tapping Act. He then moved to the first order of business - Public Comment. The Chair invited comment from the public in attendance.

Hearing no request from members of the public, the Chair moved to the next item of business – approval of Minutes from the Quarterly Business meeting held on April 12, 2016, and the Minutes from the Special Meeting held on May 6, 2016. Chair Frampton solicited questions and/or corrections to the Minutes as presented. There were no inquiries; therefore, it was voted, on motion of Trustee Chaffee, seconded by Trustee Shields, to approve the April 12, 2016, Minutes of the Quarterly Business meeting as presented. The motion passed with unanimous approval by the Council. A separate motion was made calling for the acceptance of the Minutes from the May 6, 2016, Special Meeting of the EU Council of Trustees. It was voted, on motion of Trustee Pape, seconded by Trustee Higham, to approve the May 6, 2016, Minutes of the Special Meeting as presented. The motion passed with unanimous approval by the Council.

Council Chair Dennis Frampton welcomed Student Trustee-Select Savannah Anderton to the table and quarterly business meeting. He reported that, while Ms. Anderton has completed the interview process at the level of the Office of the Chancellor, we have not received official word of appointment; therefore, Ms. Anderton cannot participate in deliberations as a full voting member of the EU Council of Trustees. Additionally, Chair Frampton welcomed Dr. Mary Beth Mercatoris to her first meeting of the EU Council of Trustees in service as Interim Dean of Students and Campus Life. Chair Frampton shared news of fellow Trustee Ron Steele's recent hospitalization and encouraged Council members to be in contact with him to send well wishes.

The Chair turned the floor over to President Walker for the delivery of inaugural President's Report to the Council of Trustees. President Walker thanked Chair Frampton for the opportunity to speak. The President began his report with reiteration of excitement for not only the start of the 2016-17 academic year, but also a fresh start for him and his family as the newest members of the Edinboro local and campus communities. He noted that a new President typically has a year to become acquainted with the university's campus, people and its circumstances. However, due to the compressed schedule associated with the search process, appointment, transition and pressing nature of several challenges faced by the University, he has not been afforded the time to proceed in a linear fashion. President Walker firmly stated that a number of issues will need to be addressed simultaneously. Although time is limited, the President gave credit to the group of talented people who support the University, its excellent facilities and the Fighting Scot tradition of resilience and strength. All of these assets far outweigh the challenges faced by the leaders and the University. President Walker stated that in moving the institution forward, it is important to recognize PASSHE's charge and adopt a mission and vision that accurately reflect and fulfill the University's charter, which is to serve the economy of this region and the Commonwealth. The President emphasized that EU is more than a teachers college, more than a liberal arts and sciences institution; EU's charter is to function as a public, regional, comprehensive university.

Next, President Walker briefly outlined and spoke about some of the challenges facing the University (noted below). The President reassured Trustees that work has begun to identify, assess and address all the issues.

- EU enrollment is down 24% since 2011.
- EU student success and retention rates are significantly below the rates of other PASSHE institutions.
- EU is losing 547 students per year at untold attrition costs and approximately \$245 per student in recruiting costs. Every 100 students equals about \$1 million in revenue for the University.
- State appropriations to the PASSHE are at the same level as they were in 1999 in real dollars.
- IF the University continues on its current course and DOES NOTHING, the University
 will deplete monetary resources in just a few years. The President emphatically stated
 that deficit spending must cease immediately.

President Walker reported that the Chancellor's Office and the EU Council of Trustees have made clear the priorities for EU and expect quick action. The President noted that since assuming the presidency, he has been carefully and intently learning about EU at an accelerated pace. Input from a wide array of constituent groups is important as President Walker and University leaders work together to achieve sustainability, growth and refinement for EU. The goal at the end of the process is to have a University that is:

- Clear on its charter, its mission and its areas of academic emphasis;
- Financially sound (sustainable);
- Serving the needs of the Commonwealth;
- · Modern and appealing in its physical plant; and
- · Positioned to advance its areas of distinction in ways that serve the Commonwealth.

Shortly after President Walker's arrival to campus, he attended and participated in a week-long seminar (AASCU's New Presidents Academy) along with 27 new presidents and chancellors from across the United States. This leadership program is tailored to the distinctive needs of presidents and chancellors who lead state colleges and universities. The President noted that the program provided practical advice grounded in leadership research and was complemented by the knowledge and experience of current and former AASCU presidents who serve as Academy faculty.

In closing, President Walker assured Trustees that steps have been initiated to conduct a clear assessment of where EU stands and how to tackle the challenging circumstances. He will first get issues on the table and act on them. While there are significant challenges, President Walker is confident of the ability to address and resolve them. The President is committed to addressing challenges collaboratively.

Chair Frampton thanked President Walker for his report and solicited from Trustees any questions. Hearing no requests, the Chair presented a Resolution in recognition of and honoring the contributions of John A. Pulice. He reported that Mr. Pulice notified him of his formal resignation as a member of the EU Council of Trustees.

Chair Frampton read the following Resolution (Attachment #1) into the record, after which Mr. Pulice received a standing ovation by his fellow Trustees. Mr. Pulice acknowledged the recognition and noted that it has been a pleasure to serve in this capacity for the past 12 years. For the record:

RESOLUTION

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Council of Trustees Honors the Contributions of John A. Pulice

Whereas, John Pulice is a veteran of the Korean War and later served in the U.S. Navy, holding the position of 1st Class Ship Serviceman from 1952 to 1954 and serving in the active reserve from 1955 to 1965; and

Whereas, Mr. Pulice attended Gannon University and Penn State Behrend and earned an associate degree in business through the United States Armed Forces Institute (USAFI); and

Whereas, John Pulice served as the Erie area manager for the Department of Revenue-Pennsylvania State Lottery prior to his retirement; and

Whereas, John Pulice is active in his community serving as a Millcreek Township Planning and Zoning Commissioner since 2000; and

Whereas, Mr. Pulice also served his community as a member of the Millcreek Township School Board from 1980 to 1998, during which time he held the positions of president, vice president and chairman of several key committees; and

Whereas, John Pulice served for 12 years on Edinboro University's Council of Trustees and held the position of secretary for two terms, 2011-13 and 2013-15; then

BE IT RESOLVED, therefore, that in recognition of his distinguished service as a Trustee and secretary, that this Council of Trustees of Edinboro University acknowledges with gratitude John Pulice's service, volunteerism, dedication and leadership to the university and extend to him best wishes for continued success and fulfillment in all his future endeavors.

Unanimously adopted by the Council of Trustees on this 1st Day of August, 2016

Next, Chair Frampton requested Provost Michael Hannan to come forward for the delivery of action and information items on behalf of the division of Academic Affairs. Provost Hannan reported that there were two items contained on the agenda for action. However, the Provost requested to retract the agenda item seeking reactivation of the Bachelor of Arts in Art History degree program from moratorium. Additional information has been requested by the PASSHE Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs regarding this program; it will be returned to a business meeting agenda once all outstanding questions have been addressed. Therefore, it was voted, on motion of Trustee Chaffee, seconded by Trustee Higham to approve a new interdisciplinary minor program in Leadership Studies in the Communications Studies department. The motion carried with unanimous approval by the Council.

Provost Hannan led the opening of the Academic Affairs Report (Attachment #2) with the introduction of a new staff member. He asked Rosmari Graham to stand and be acknowledged.

Ms. Rosmari Graham joined the EU staff in June as the Director for the re-established Office of Grants and Sponsored Programs. She has begun work with a number of individuals and offices across campus to both investigate and apply for a range of grants.

Ms. Graham comes to Edinboro with more than 14 years of professional experience in grant writing and fund management, and brings many established connections with local, foundation, state, and other funding agencies. She is also an alumna of EU and exudes great energy and a love for the University.

The Provost then continued with the announcement of changes in personnel within the College of Science and Health Professions (Drs. Denise Ohler and Roy Shinn) and also the appointment of Dr. Stacie Wolbert who will serve in the role of Associate Provost (acting manager) for a two-year period. Dr. Hannan requested each to stand and be recognized.

Dr. Denise Ohler was appointed to serve as the Interim Dean of the College of Science and Health Professions (CSHP), following the departure of Dean Nathan Ritchey. Dr. Ohler's experience in the college, her close working relationship with former Dean Ritchey and the CSHP department chairs, and years of experience at Edinboro will ensure that the college continues to advance during this time of transition.

To assist in maintaining strong support from the office, Dr. Ohler's former role will be filled by **Dr. Roy Shinn**, who will serve as the College's Associate Dean during the coming year. Dr. Shinn has served for many years as Chairperson of the Speech, Language, and Hearing department and has been a major contributor across campus advocating for students and the betterment of the University.

Dr. Stacie Wolbert was appointed to serve as Associate Provost in the capacity as an acting manager for a two-year period. He noted that Dr. Wolbert most recently served as chairperson of the Middle & Second Education and Educational Leadership department and as Director of the Center for Faculty Excellence. Dr. Wolbert has strong experience working with APSCUF, has been active on multiple campus committees, and brings experience both within and outside of academia to the position.

Following those introductions, Provost Hannan highlighted several entries from the submitted written report. These included:

Recognitions and Accreditations

- Master of Arts in Counseling School Counseling program ranked #4 by Great College Deals in its 10 Best Deal on Online Master's in School Counseling Degree Programs
- Best Counseling Degrees ranked Edinboro's Master of Arts in Counseling College Counseling #6 in its list of Best Master's Degrees in Student Affairs and College Counseling
- Business and Economics Department received notification from the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP) that the Quality Assurance report was accepted during the April 14-15, 2016, Baccalaureate/Graduate Degree Board of Commissioner meeting.
- EU's minor in Personal Financial Planning has been registered with the Certified Financial Planner (CFP) Board of Standards, allowing students who complete the requirements of the minor to sit for the CFP Certification Examination administered by the CFP Board.

University Outreach and Campus Programs

- EU honored more than 100 of its highest-achieving students on April 15 during the annual Academic Honors Convocation ceremony. Three extraordinary employees were also recognized at the event:
 - o Dr. David Hurd (Geosciences) named Faculty Member of the Year
 - o Dr. Shaun Pfeiffer (Business & Economics) named Scholar of the Year
 - Dr. Susan Norton (Counseling, School Psychology and Special Education)
 named Advisor of the Year
- On May 7, EU celebrated the academic success of 779 members of the Class of 2016 in undergraduate and graduate Commencement ceremonies. Dr. Daniel Meyer, music director of the Erie Philharmonic Orchestra and the Asheville Symphony Orchestra, provided the commencement address and was presented an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters at the undergraduate ceremony.
- Several study abroad programs took place after the Spring 2016 semester:
 - Dr. Janusz Czejdo traveled to Poland on May 11-22, 2016, with 9 students as part of Edinboro University's cooperative exchange agreement with Marie Curie Sklodowska University. The students studied Polish art, history and culture in Lublin, Cracow and Warsaw.
 - Dr. Charlene Molrine led a group of 20 students to Peru on May 17-26, 2016.
 The group explored ancient Inca sites in Cuzco, Machu Picchu and Ollantaytambo, and completed coursework for Communication Disorders Across Cultures.
 - Or. Cynthia Rebar traveled with 8 students to South Africa and Botswana on May 18-June 9, 2016. The students completed coursework for Special Topics in Biology: African Conservation Experience. They camped out each night, closely observed the local animals and learned about environmental issues from native guides.
 - O Dr. Karen Lindeman of the Early Childhood and Reading Department traveled to Italy with 22 students June 11-17, 2016, as part of a summer travel-study opportunity to investigate early childhood education in Europe through visits to several elementary schools. The group also explored Florence, Reggio Emilia and Tuscany.

Chair Dennis Frampton thanked Provost Hannan for the informative report and solicited questions from Trustees. Hearing none, the Chair moved the meeting into an Executive Session. Public meeting participants were asked to exit and Chairman Frampton stated public meeting participants would be invited to return when the meeting was reconvened. The Recording Secretary noted and recorded the departure of Trustee Rob Lowther from the meeting at 3:08 p.m.

The Edinboro University Council of Trustees met in Executive Session with President Walker and Finance and Administration Vice President Guilbert Brown until approximately 3:20 p.m. At 3:21 p.m. Chair Frampton reconvened the public meeting and requested Finance and Administration Vice President Gil Brown to present action items as well as highlight informational items from the submitted written report. Vice President Brown stated that President Walker recommends approval of Contracts and Purchases for the months of March, April, May and June 2016, as well as the proposed Edinboro University Budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-17. It was voted, on motion of Trustee Shields, seconded by Trustees Pape and Higham, to approve the Contracts and Purchases for the periods March 1-31, April 1-30, May 1-31, and June 1-30, 2016, as submitted electronically. The motion carried by unanimous vote. Second action item – proposed Edinboro University Budget for FY 2016-2017. Chair Frampton called for discussion prior to the voice vote. Hearing none, the Chair called for the question. It was voted, on motion of Trustee Higham, seconded by Trustee Pulice to approve the proposed Edinboro University Budget for FY 2016-17 as presented by Vice President Gil Brown (Attachment #3 – Schedules B-D). The motion carried with unanimous approval by the EU Council of Trustees.

Lastly, Mr. Brown stated that there was a need to amend EU Policy D009: Maintenance of the Resident Provided by the Commonwealth. He reported that this policy had been established in 1983 to assure proper maintenance and preservation of the home and grounds at 214 Meadville Street (also known as the Commonwealth House). The Commonwealth House has been designated the official residence of the President of Edinboro University since 1931. In addition to serving as the residence of the EU President, the house and its environs are utilized by the President for the purpose of hosting official University functions such as business meetings, receptions, luncheons and dinners. For the record, Chair Frampton read the Resolution:

RESOLUTION

To approve the amended Edinboro University of Pennsylvania Policy D009 titled "Maintenance of the Residence provided by the Commonwealth."

WHEREAS, The home and grounds at 214 Meadville Street, Edinboro, Pennsylvania, hereafter known as Commonwealth House, have been designated as the official residence of the President of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania since 1931; and

WHEREAS, In addition to serving as the residence of the President, Commonwealth House and its environs are utilized by the President for the purpose of hosting official University functions such as business meetings, receptions, luncheons, and dinners; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the Council of Trustees, approve the amended policy D009 which is established to assure proper maintenance and preservation of this property located at 214 Meadville Street, Edinboro, Pennsylvania.

<u>It was voted</u>, on motion of Trustee Pulice, second by Trustee Higham to approve the Resolution and amendments made to EU Policy D009: Maintenance of the Residence Provided by the Commonwealth (Attachment #4). The Resolution passed by unanimous vote.

The following items were highlighted by Vice President Brown as points of information. He noted that these and other information can be found in the written report (Attachment #5).

- The EU Office of Finance and Administration has been pursuing the refinancing of The Highlands and it is being coordinated by PASSHE Legal Counsel along with bond counsel for the Foundation, Foundation legal counsel and in coordination with Wells Fargo (the Trustee for the current bond indentures). Approvals have been sought and received by the PASSHE Board of Governors for the issuance of new bonds providing for an advance refunding of the current bonds with the closing scheduled to take place in early September.
- In July, Provost Hannan and Vice President Brown served as presenters at the annual meeting of the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO). They spoke about Edinboro's experience with Middle States and the reaffirmation process. EU's success in this regard was due primarily to the strong working relationship between the Chief Financial Officer (Gil Brown) and Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs (Michael Hannan). In addition, Vice President Brown also delivered a separate presentation as part of a panel discussion which looked at energy conservation initiatives pursued on the EU campus and grounds, (e.g. solar array, geothermal and other energy efficiency initiatives).

- The Rose Hall elevator project is nearing completion. The new elevator and entry will be open for the start of the Fall 2016 semester and ready for use by students and staff.
- Additionally, Vice President Brown noted that renovations to the second floor of Dearborn Hall are nearly complete. Following completion, the departments of English & Philosophy and Sociology will relocate from Centennial Hall to Dearborn and faculty will be ready to serve students at the start of the Fall semester.
- A number of campus beautification projects, concrete work and minor renovations have taken place over the summer months. These include replacement of damaged sidewalks in various locations, improvements at the VanHouten Dining facilities aimed at improving the student experience, and installation of a new outdoor patio seating area at Van Houten to name a few.

For the record, Vice President Brown noted the inclusion of two informational reports: (1) Listing of Personnel Transactions occurring since the last quarterly business meeting of the EU Council of Trustees on April 12, 2016 (officially recorded below); and (2) copy of 2016 Facilities Management and Planning Supplement to Annual Report. Mr. Brown stated that the 2016 report serves as an update of the condition of the facilities and buildings at EU as well as information related to capital projects and major deferred maintenance initiatives undertaken during the past fiscal year.

Chan, Mr. James, regular part-time, Instructor, Mathematics and Computer Science Department, effective with the end of the 2015-2016 academic year, May 27, 2016.

Chair Frampton solicited concerns or questions regarding Vice President Brown's informational report. Hearing no requests, the Chair welcomed the Interim Dean of Students and Campus Life, Dr. Mary Beth Mercatoris, and asked that she deliver her report on behalf of the division of Student Affairs. Dr. Mercatoris thanked Chair Frampton for the opportunity to speak and share news about the division's very successful year of service to EU students. She stated that a written report had been distributed in the meeting materials (Attachment #6). For the record, Dr. Mercatoris highlighted the following entries from that report:

- The National Association of College and University Residence Hall (NACURH) Conference was held at the University of Delaware in June. The administrative and graduate advisor as well as five undergraduate students attended the conference. Attendees were afforded the opportunity to develop their skill set in the areas of inclusion, student leadership, community and engagement.
- The Office for Students with Disabilities (OSD) Scholarship Committee reviewed over 100
 applications from new and returning students and awarded \$157,000 in scholarships.
- EU's Student Health Services (SHS) conducted an annual health fair featuring 67 vendors and serving nearly 600 students, employees and community participants.
- Nearly 120 constituents (internal and external to the campus) participated in EU's Ropes
 Course. It is not only a great opportunity for both EU students and student organizations,
 but also a resource to area business and non-profit organizations.
- This past summer, EU ROTC staff members trained over 3,000 cadets in map use and compass skills at Fort Knox.
- The EU Student Government Association (SGA) purchased card readers. These card
 readers will be used to track student involvement through the BoroSync software.
 Therefore, it is anticipated that the collection of this data will serve to enlighten campus
 administrators about how services are utilized by students; thus, allowing administrators
 and community leaders to become better stewards in service to all EU students.
- Lastly, and with regard to athletics, Dr. Mercatoris congratulated Head Coach Lee Underwood and the EU Men's Tennis Team for their nationally ranked team finish for the first time in EU's program history. The Team was ranked 49th in the final Oracle/ITA Division II Men's National Team Rankings. Additionally, and to be celebrated, Dr. Mercatoris reported that 12 of 16 EU athletic teams, including all nine women's programs, recorded a Team Grade Point Average of 3.0 or better.

Dr. Mercatoris offered to answer questions. Hearing no questions, Chair Frampton requested Vice President for University Advancement Tina Mengine to come forward for the delivery of report on behalf of the division. Ms. Mengine reminded Council members that they could review in greater detail a copy of the written report as contained and distributed in the meeting packet (Attachment #7). Vice President Mengine highlighted the following entries from the written report:

Development

- 2015-16 fundraising totals: \$3.5 M in philanthropy only; all dollars raised total \$5.6 M; she noted that the Development Office had a solid year.
- Seven (7) new funds were created this last quarter.
- Thirteen (13) large gifts were received last quarter; gifts ranged from \$10,000 to \$200,000.
- Eight (8) major cities throughout the region were visited by Advancement and Development office staff members Julie Chacona and Marilyn Goellner.
- Vice President Mengine thanked and extended appreciation to all who supported or attended the 3rd annual Gala in the Orchard at Porreco College on July 16. There were about 270 attendees and she estimates the event will net approximately \$100,000.

Marketing

- Beginning on Page 2 of the written report, Vice President Mengine pointed out that the first seven bullet points highlight the efforts in support of the Admissions offices both at the undergraduate and graduate level. In each of the instances reported, the average clickthrough rates across the board have produced stellar results and yielded positive traffic to various websites.
- Ms. Mengine was excited to report the establishment of EU SkyCam Weather Camera in partnership WJET-TV. The camera has been mounted on top of McComb Fieldhouse and it has 360 degree capability. This partnership will also provide EU a landing page on YourErie.com for various promotions. Council members are encouraged to go online at http://www.yourerie.com/skycam-cameras/edinboro-university-skycam. The EU SkyCam monitors weather conditions in all directions and provides live real-time weather data 24/7 in one of the region's many micro-climates. Trustee Shields asked if access would be shared with any Pittsburgh affiliates? Vice President Mengine responded in the negative. Trustee Chaffee also asked about weather text alerts and capability of those being credited as coming from Edinboro University? She noted the receipt of weather alert texts from the Erie Times with an indication of sponsorship by Gannon University. Ms. Mengine did not know the answer to Trustee Chaffee's question, but stated that she would investigate further the suggestion/inquiry.
- Current web initiatives continue to drive strong web traffic to EU site. Within the last recruiting cycle (measured from September 2015) there was solid web traffic with nearly 500,000 individual users. The bounce rate has been good overall with a rate of 26.47% since the launch of redesigned EU website in February 2015. In comparison, bounce rates relative to the EU website were upwards of 62.36%.
- Tracked behavior to the "Apply Now" page and shared results with EU leadership. Since September 1, 2015, tracked over 19,000 individual users' page view, with an exit rate of about 58% which is a high percentage. Since the application is not housed on the EU website, you do want viewers to exit the "Apply Now" page and continue through to the application.

Communications

- During the period March through July 2016, 49 press and other single target home town news releases received wide distribution. News releases were positive and primarily focused on the transition and arrival of new President to EU campus.
- Social media audiences have continued to grow and show strong level of engagement by key constituents, especially current and prospective students. Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and LinkedIn followers all show increases in users and activity during the last quarter.

Alumni Affairs

• Plans are underway for Homecoming Weekend 2016 which is October 6-8. Vice President Mengine encouraged Council members to mark their calendars and attend. The Homecoming theme this year is Level Up (distributed buttons). October 7 (Friday) kicks off with the 25th annual Alumni Golf Outing. Thursday evening's activity will have an academic focus on business. At SCOTtalk, attendees will hear stories from several highly successful EU alumni during a TEDtalk-style event.

Vice President Mengine noted the conclusion of her report and invited questions. Trustee Chaffee inquired about the recent Pokémon GO craze by teenagers and college students and its incorporation into Homecoming activities. President Walker also told of first-hand experience while walking around the campus with the family and dog and encountering many students

engaged in this activity. Ms. Mengine noted the phenomena had been discussed by the Homecoming Committee and thought given on how to incorporate an activity.

For the record, a list of Gifts-in-Kind received by the University was distributed in the meeting materials. Attachment #8 serves to record Gifts-in-Kind received since the last quarterly business meeting of the EU Council of Trustees held on April 12.

Chair Frampton thanked Ms. Mengine for her report. Next, the Chair presented a proposed EU Council of Trustees 2016-17 Schedule of Meetings and solicited comments, concerns, conflicts or questions. It was voted, on motion of Trustee Shields, seconded by Trustee Higham to approve the EU Council of Trustees 2016-17 Schedule of Meetings as presented in Attachment #9. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

Lastly, Chair Frampton asked fellow Trustee, PACT President and PASSHE Board of Governors member Harold Shields to share a few words about the recent PACT Joint meeting held on July 15 as well as the upcoming Fall Workshop to be held on October 7 in Harrisburg. Trustee Shields reminded Council members of the distribution of a July 20 email which served to highlight and provide a written summary of the July 15 meeting outcomes. He encouraged Council members to add the Fall Workshop date of October 7 to their calendar and plan for attendance. The tentative schedule is for sessions to take place from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. PACT has partnered with the Association of Governing Board (AGB) to present three topics which are critical to the success of EU and the State System. The focus will be on Trustees' Role in the following: (1) improving institutional value through effective governance - "Consequential Boards" plenary session conducted by Dr. Tom Meredith, Senior Fellow, AGB; (2) "Getting Students to the Finish Line" moderated by Dr. Tom Meredith and (3) panel Role of Boards in a Diverse and Inclusive Campus - moderated by Ms. Artis Hampshire Cowan, Senior Fellow, AGB. Three of the sessions will be facilitated by AGB consultants with panel members from PASSHE universities. In addition, there will be an update on the Workforce Gap Analysis presented by Dr. Sue Mukherjee, PASSHE Assistant Vice Chancellor for Educational Intelligence. Trustee Shields reiterated that this workshop provides an opportunity for each and every Trustee across the System to enhance their knowledge and increase effectiveness as an individual member of a PASSHE-member Councils of Trustees. PASSHE Chancellor Brogan and newly elected PASSHE Board of Governors Chair Cynthia Shapira will kick off the event with an update on the "State of the System."

Chair Frampton thanked Trustee Shields for the reported and solicited from Council members any other agenda items for the good of the order. Hearing no requests for further discussion, it was voted, on motion of Trustee Chaffee, seconded by Trustee Higham to adjourn the business meeting. The meeting officially adjourned at 3:42 p.m. The motion carried.

In closing, Chair Frampton extended his thanks and patience in dealing with the day's busy and hectic schedule. The Chair made one last request and asked Council members to remain for the conduct of an additional Executive Session with EU President Walker. The Executive Session concluded at approximately 4:40 p.m.

 Dr. Janusz Czejdo traveled to Poland on May 11-22, 2016 with 9 students as part of Edinboro University's cooperative exchange agreement with Marie Curie Sklodowska University. The students studied Polish art, history and culture in Lublin, Cracow and Warsaw.
 - **Dr. Charlene Molrine** led a group of 20 students to Peru on May 17-26, 2016. The group explored ancient Inca sites in Cuzco, Machu Picchu and Ollantaytambo, and completed coursework for Communication Disorders Across Cultures.
 - **Dr. Cynthia Rebar** traveled with 8 students to South Africa and Botswana on May 18-June 9, 2016. The students completed coursework for Special Topics in Biology: African Conservation Experience. They camped out each night, closely observed the local animals and learned about environmental issues from native guides.
 - **Dr. Karen Lindeman** of the **Early Childhood and Reading Department**, traveled to Italy with 22 students June 11-17, 2016 as part of a summer travel-study opportunity to investigate early childhood education in Europe through visits to several elementary schools. The group also explored Florence, Reggio Emilia and Tuscany.
- The second annual Tech Savvy workshop was held at Edinboro University on June 4, 2016. The
 workshop, designed to show how science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields can lead to
 exciting careers, was sponsored by the American Association of University Women (AAUW) in
 partnership with Edinboro University, and hosted 6th 9th grade girls and their families.
- Edinboro University launched a summer academy for high school students with autism as part of its new Boro Autism Support Initiative for Success (BASIS). The academy is designed to meet the needs of college exploration and transition for teens ages 14-17. Participants learned relevant skills while gaining insight into college life inside and outside the classroom. The program was held June 20 July 1 and was led by Edinboro University's staff of professionals in education, nursing, counseling, speech pathology and occupational therapy.

- On June 26 the Edinboro University School of Business hosted 19 high school students entering grades 9-11 as part of the annual Xavier and Tina Williams Summer Youth Business Academy. The fiveday camp immersed students in seminars focused on team building, business strategy, management, finance, marketing, problem-solving, and financial planning.
- The Leader Speech and Hearing Center will provide a new clinical therapy program for preschool children with hearing loss. The Kids Intensive Language Training (KLT) program is classroom-based and involves the use of auditory-verbal (A-V) therapy principles. Certified and licensed EU faculty with expertise in the A-V approach will deliver the program with assistance from a team of graduate student clinicians and undergraduate student volunteers. The 12-week program will follow the fall and spring semester calendars and will be held in the morning on Mondays and Thursdays.
- A Robotics, Environmental Science and Data Processing camp will be held at Presque Isle State Park and the Tom Ridge Environmental Center from August 8-12. High school students interested in robotics and environmental science will get a chance to learn from the experts. The camp, a collaboration between Carnegie Mellon University, Edinboro University and Platypus, LLC, will introduce 20 students entering grades 9-12 to core robotic, data science and environmental science topics and will also provide hands-on experience with autonomous robotic boats. Edinboro University chemistry professor, Dr. Nathan Armatas, will join other instructors to guide the camp participants.

Faculty Recognition

- On April 13 the Take a Stand Against Sexual Violence Campaign hosted a "Recovery in Action"
 panel discussion. Panelists included Dr. Molly Wolf, Social Work Department, Dr. William Pithers
 Psychology Department, and Executive Director of the Women's Services of Crawford County, Bruce
 Harlan. Students learned about the stages of recovery for victims.
- Dr. Donald Sheehy, professor in the English and Philosophy Department at Edinboro University, was a guest speaker on April 13th at the Third Victor E. Reichert Robert Frost Event, in Buffalo, NY. During his lecture, "Novel Inflections: North of Boston Revisited," Dr. Sheehy discussed some of the unanswered questions that continue to persist more than a hundred years after the publication of Frost's second book of poetry.
- Dr. Heather Snyder, a professor in Edinboro's Psychology Department, received a Fulbright
 Scholar Award to research at University of Surrey. Dr. Snyder was selected to work with Dr. Paul
 Sowden at University of Surrey on a research project to study the influence of feedback given for a
 creative product on university students' self-perceptions of creativity.

INTENT

The home and grounds at 214 Meadville Street, Edinboro, Pennsylvania, hereafter known as Commonwealth House, have been designated as the official residence of the President of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania since 1931. In addition to serving as the residence of the President, Commonwealth House and its environs are utilized by the President for the purpose of hosting official University functions such as business meetings, receptions, luncheons, and dinners. These functions are an integral part of satisfying the goals and objectives assigned to the President and the development of University relations with students, faculty, staff, alumni, members of the community, special friends, and official guests of the University.

Commonwealth House is a unique property which is a landmark in the Borough of Edinboro and in Northwestern Pennsylvania. Originally built as a private residence in 1885, it was the home of several prominent Edinboro families who helped develop the community and were closely associated with the Normal School and the State Teacher's College which has evolved into Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. The property was first acquired by the Commonwealth in 1931. Prior to that, it had been the private property of Edinboro Normal School principals John F. Bigler and Clarence Crawford.

Since Commonwealth House is utilized for official functions of the University and as the mandated residence of the President, and since it has historical significance for the area, the following policy is established to assure proper maintenance and preservation of this property located at 214 Meadville Street, Edinboro, Pennsylvania.

POLICY

Effective on and retroactive to July 1, 1983, the President of the University will provide supervision for the Vice President for Finance and Administration to direct, with the awareness and/or approval of the Council of Trustees, the following action to assure the proper maintenance and preservation of the President's residence at 214 Meadville Street, Edinboro, Pennsylvania.

Include sufficient funds each year in the University operating budget for building maintenance, grounds maintenance, custodial maintenance, and utilities. In addition, the Council of Trustees may set aside special funds for this purpose from other accounts under its cognizance.

Maintain a plan for painting, decorating, major repairs, and replacement of furnishings and equipment on the property. Any renovations, additions, construction, and/or life cycle replacement to the residence or the grounds, or any replacement of furniture, fixtures, or equipment shall be approved as follows:

Up to \$5,000 approved by the Facilities Department

\$5,001 to \$10,000 approved by the Vice President for Finance and Administration

Over \$10,000 approved by the Council of Trustees

Maintain a schedule for cleaning, custodial, and grounds work. The schedule will include approximately four hours bi-weekly for cleaning of the public spaces in the house, as well as cleaning and preparing the social areas of the residence before and after events in which guests of the University are present.

Maintain current inventory of all University owned furniture and equipment subject to the SSHE inventory policy for fixed assets.

Submit an annual report on Commonwealth House to the Financial Operations Committee of the Council of Trustees.

Office of the Vice President for Finance and Administration

During the final quarter of the fiscal year, the Office of Finance and Administration focused on two major projects in addition to the business of preparing to close the fiscal year: (1) developing a financial plan to bring the institution's operating budget into equilibrium by Fiscal Year (FY) 2019, and (2) the acquisition of the Highlands through an advance refunding utilizing Commonwealth of Pennsylvania general obligation bonds. Enrollment results as of May 1 suggested that budget revenue projections for FY 2017 were significantly overstated; the University had already planned to reduce expenditures by \$3 million and it became clear that additional reductions would be required to minimize the use of fund balance to support operations. Based on revised enrollment projections the University settled on a three year plan to bring the budget into balance via \$5 million gap closure measures in FY 2017, an additional \$4.5 million in FY 2018 and an additional \$3.6 million for FY 2019.

Refinancing of the Highlands is being coordinated by PASSHE Legal Counsel together with bond counsel for the Foundation, Foundation legal counsel and in coordination with Wells Fargo, the Trustee for the current bond indentures. The Office of Finance and Administration has served as the primary University representative to this transaction. Approvals have been sought and received by the PASSHE Board of Governors for issuance of new bonds providing for an advance refunding of the current bonds with the closing scheduled for early September. The University anticipates realizing significant savings in interest payments based on more favorable interest rates. The new bonds are being structured to mirror the remaining term of the current bonds (i.e., no years are being added to the repayment period).

Budget

Budget Office in conjunction with Accounting Office completed the April projection for the fiscal year. Prepared, disseminated all operating budget packets for Fiscal Year 2017. Reviewed, analyzed and entered budgets into the SAP financial system by the end June for the start of the fiscal year. Attended several meetings with the ELT staff as monthly as "Closing the Budget Gap" discussions ensued.

Worked closely with Provost and Deans to produce the FY 2017 Academic Personnel Plan that contains the budgeted FTE for the upcoming fiscal year for faculty. Worked with Human Resources office to review all open positions, pending retirement/resignations to ensure 2017 budget is correct.

In May, revised 2017 enrollment projection numbers, which in turn, caused all revenues to be recalculated. Failed employment search for the much needed analyst position to be shared between the Institutional Research and Budget offices.

Facilities Management and Planning

- The Rose Hall Elevator addition is nearing completion. The new elevator and entry will be open for Fall 2016.
- The Library Learning Commons project has begun and will be completed and opened in Spring 2017.
- Minor renovations are underway to make short term improvements to the Van Houten Dining Hall to improve the student experience. Painting of the dining hall is nearly complete and a new outdoor patio seating area will be opened in Fall of 2016.

- The space study and analysis being prepared by Paulien Associates is nearing completion and is scheduled to be presented to the University in August. The analysis will attempt to identify opportunities for space consolidation and efficiencies which will lower facilities operating cost.
- Several sidewalk replacement projects have been underway this summer to repair aging and damaged sidewalks on campus. These include sidewalks near Reeder Hall, the library, and at the Police Station.
- The renovations to the second floor of Dearborn Hall are nearly complete and the departments of English and Philosophy, and Sociology will be relocated after August 1, 2016. The rooms have been converted from vacant residence space by removing built-in bedroom furniture, patching, painting, and the installation of new carpeting. A new central department office and student lounge space was created just off of the elevator. This project will complete the evacuation of Centennial Hall.
- The Pennsylvania Department of General Services (DGS) and the Pennsylvania
 Historical Commission have approved the disposal of Miller Education Center and
 Centennial Hall which clears the way for the University to make plans and accept bids to
 demolish these two aging facilities.
- A multitude of deferred maintenance projects have been underway utilizing funds provided by the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund of 1993 (Key '93). The act is funded from a portion of real estate transfer taxes and help fund deferred maintenance projects for a number of commonwealth agencies including the State System of Higher Education. The facilities department is utilizing these funds to replace aging equipment and systems, repair deteriorating infrastructure, address safety and accessibility issues, and make improvements which are otherwise unable to be funded. The sidewalk replacement project mentioned above is an example of a Key '93 project.

Campus Services (Auxiliary Enterprises)

 Started to gear up for Fall 2016 semester with new meal plan offerings that provide different choices for resident and commuter students; offering \$25 of Boro Bucks with each meal plan to jump start this program that allows users to make purchases at participating merchants, both on and off campus.

- Starting in May 2016, distributed the new HID security cards for all University IDs.
- Work has started on a new sidewalk for Van Houten Dining Hall and a new entrance area to the all-you-can-eat Marketplace Café.

Purchasing and Contracts

Since April 2016, the Purchasing Office has reviewed multiple agreements and contracts, processed multiple bids including janitorial supplies, football equipment, elevator maintenance and repairs, and also processed many purchase orders and service purchase contracts.

- Facility related issues Service contracts have been awarded for various services including waste removal, elevator maintenance services, multiple Community Music School instrument lesson contracts, speaker agreements and continuing education agreements. Work orders against open-ended agreements for asbestos removal and project design services were also issued. Construction contracts were awarded and approved for the Library Learning Commons renovation.
- Other agreements The Purchasing Office has fully executed multiple agreements
 including agreements for weather camera installation, online database subscriptions,
 various library subscriptions, Dropbox for Education subscription; and Affiliation
 Agreements including University Hospitals, Lee Memorial and Our Lady of Lourdes
 among many others. Several facility use agreements were executed as well.
- <u>Staff development</u> The Purchasing office attended the Spring Procurement/Construction Conference April 20-22, 2016 where various ideas and topics were discussed.

Student Government Association (SGA)

- Associate Vice President for Financial Operations continued his role as University
 Supervisor to the Student Government Association (SGA). Recent work includes the
 oversight of annual budget process, review and balancing of the budget for presentation
 to the President.
- Clarified understanding of SGA fund balance and short term financial planning needs with SGA Director of Operations; worked to revise and publicize the amount of funds available for fund balance expenditure proposals.
- Finalized employee contracts and new employee benefits for SGA staff; retained legal services for the next fiscal year.
- The new Executive Board for SGA officially took office at the end of April; held initial
 meeting with group to begin to set the tone for the upcoming fiscal year.
- Discussions with PASSHE legal and University administration on changing the structure of the relationship between the SGA and EU have basically come to a halt. The structure created by Act 188 basically results in a situation where the University would need to dissolve the SGA completely and start over with a new organization in order to have any direct involvement in the supervision of the staff and control of SGA funding. The attorneys have advised us not to proceed with such a plan for various reasons.

 about 80% of our growth by the middle of the month. These projections allowed to
 budget appropriately for FY17. These enrollment numbers have been presented to the
 ELT, Budget and Planning Team, and SEM (Strategic Enrollment Management).
- Purchased and implemented Rapid Insights analysis software. The tool allows us to link
 directly to our student information system (Banner) and extract information for analysis
 and predictive analytics. This will allow us to identify at risk students, applicants likely
 to enroll, and who our competitors are for perspective students.
- Working on submitting end of spring term files as well as first summer files (reports) to the System.
- IR has continued its goal for improved data and assessment across campus.
 - Working with CITO (Chief Information Technology Officer) Karen Murdzak, a discussion has been started around the need for a knowledge management plan for

the institution. This is currently heavily dependent on the Systems plans with the SIMS (Strategic Information Management System) project. Attending the SIMS roadshow at IUP on July 26, 2016.

- Met with Tim Pilewski and Alyssa Baer on making sure our Approved Program Inventory on campus matches what the System has on file.

Student Affairs – Report Edinboro University Council of Trustees August 1, 2016

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

- The Office for Students with Disabilities (OSD) held its inaugural Summer College Academy which was designed to introduce the college experience to students with Asperger's and Autism Spectrum Disorders. The staff from OSD worked closely with personnel from the Northwest Tri-County Intermediate Unit, the local area school districts, the Autism Society of NW Pennsylvania and the Pennsylvania Department of Education to identify appropriate students. Seven students graduated. Throughout the course of the Academy, students were introduced to a variety of activities which included classroom experiences and those that would help them develop independent living skills. At the end of the Academy, each student received an evaluation that they would share with their parents, teachers and other school personnel. The evaluations highlighted strategies for students to incorporate into their Individual Educational Plans (IEP) to help them to continue to develop skills that will prioritize independence, self-advocacy, communication, and academic skills.
- ROTC commissioned 1 cadet on July 17, 2016.
- The National Association of College and University Residence Hall (NACURH) was held during the
 week of June 27 at the University of Delaware. The administrative and graduate advisor as well as five
 undergraduate students attended this conference. Their goal was to continue their own development in
 the areas of inclusion, student leadership, community and engagement.

Training will also include a community service project. Plans are being made to collect non-perishable food items that will be given to the campus food pantry.
- Peer Educators conducted sex double dare, condom bingo, sex pictionary, and other sex education classes for 189 students in the spring semester.
- The OSD scholarship committee reviewed over 100 applications from new and returning students.
 \$157,000 were awarded through the Dr. Hugo and Alicia Keim Chair Scholar Fund and the Charlotte Newcombe Foundation gift.

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COMMUNITY OUTREACH/SERVICE

- Student Health Services (SHS) conducted the annual health fair which had 67 vendors and 585 student, employee, and community participants.
- Nearly 120 constituents participated in Ropes Courses this summer. Staff from the Campus Life and Leadership Development area of the Division of Student Affairs helped Edinboro University host 7 groups.

STAFF ACCOLADES AND INITIATIVES

- The Campus Life and Leadership Development professional staff and student building managers completed the "Heart of a Leader" training. They participated in 21 hours of training in 2 days with amazing leadership and skill-building results.
- In the Spring 2016 semester, 177 students participated in Puppy Love sponsored by the Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) department.
- ROTC staff members have trained over 3,000 cadets this summer at Ft. Knox in map and compass use.
- EUSGA purchased card readers to be used to track student involvement through BoroSync software.
- Student Health Services worked with the University of Pittsburgh to complete the recruitment process for alcohol and sexual violence intervention data collection.
- Data continues to show that students who live in Edinboro University residence halls are retained at higher rates through graduation and with higher GPAs.

Within the last recruiting cycle, measured from September 1, 2015, we have seen solid web traffic (nearly 500,000 individual users, and an extremely good bounce rate). Our bounce rate has been overall great at 26.47% since the launch of the redesigned site in February 2015, compared to bounce rates on the previous site upwards of 62.36%.

Tracked behavior to the "Apply Now" page and presented the results to EU leadership. Since September 1, 2015, we have seen well over 19,000 individual user page views, with an exit rate of 58.29%. This is good, since our application is not housed on the EU site, we want viewers to exit the "Apply Now" page in hopes they are continuing through

RE: Honorary Degree Recommendations

The Honorary Degree Committee met September 29, 2016 to review portfolio information for five nominated individuals. Nomination and supporting materials were shared with committee members in advance of the meeting. Based on committee discussion, the following three individuals are recommended for consideration for honorary degrees from Edinboro University.

Sister Joan Chittister. The committee found that Sister Chittister met all criteria for an honorary doctorate from the University. Sister Chittister is recognized nationally and internationally as a passionate advocate for peace, human rights and justice, women's issues, and the poor. She is heavily published in these areas with 50 books and more than 700 articles and is co-chair of the Global Peace Initiative of Women, which facilitates a worldwide network of women peace builders. She holds a master's degree from the University of Notre Dame and a Ph.D. from Penn State University. Sister Chittister spoke several years ago at Edinboro and is an impressive and engaging speaker. The committee was unanimous in its support for Sister Chittister for this recognition.

Dr. Rachel Levine. Dr. Levine is the Pennsylvania Department of Health Physician General, unanimously confirmed for this office by the PA Senate in 2015. Her previous professional experience includes leadership at the Penn State Hershey Medical Center, where she established an eating disorders program for children, adolescents, and adults. While teaching at the Penn State College of Medicine, she also served as the liaison for the LGBT community for the Office of Diversity at the College. Aside from her professional accomplishments, Dr. Levine is also the highest ranking transgender individual to ever hold public office in Pennsylvania. Her present work focuses on working with Governor Wolf to address the heroin/opioid epidemic in the State, particularly among young adults. Dr. Levine is a graduate of Harvard College and the Tulane University School of Medicine. Beyond speaking topics related to her professional work and accomplishments, Dr. Levine would be capable of speaking on topics related to the health of young people (social, physical, emotional), LGBT health issues, acceptance, and inclusion. She

has spoken previously in the region and is recognized as an engaging speaker. The committee was unanimous in its support for Dr. Levine for this recognition.

Ms. Eleanor Smeal. Ms. Smeal is a founder of the modern day women's movement and has spent decades leading initiatives for the advancement of women. She co-founded the Feminist Majority Foundation, was a three-term president of the National Organization for Women, and was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in 2015. She is a recognized leader for women's rights in the nation and an accomplished speaker. She holds a baccalaureate degree from Duke University, and a MA in political science and public administration from the University of Florida; in addition, she holds honorary doctorates from both of these universities and Rutgers University. Ms. Smeal was raised in Erie, graduating from Strong Vincent High School, and raised her family in Pittsburgh giving her a local connection to the majority of Edinboro's students. The committee was unanimous in its support of Ms. Smeal for this recognition.

The committee also reviewed nominations for **David Williams** and **Roger Sargent**, but they were not recommended for further consideration for an honorary degree.

Four previously nominated and recommended individuals, Elizabeth Warren, Mellody Hobson, Bryan Stevenson, and Susan Kemenyffy, remain in the pool of nominees for an honorary degree. The committee recommends that the three individuals discussed above be added to the list of committee-recommended nominees who have not yet been offered the opportunity to receive an honorary doctorate from the University.

Born in nearby Ashtabula, Ohio, and raised in Erie, Eleanor Smeal has been one of the leading figures in the women's rights movement and has contributed significantly to the advancements women have made over the last several decades years. She is president of the Feminist Majority Foundation, which works to advance the legal, social and political equality of women through research, educational outreach and political action. Prior to co-founding that organization in 1987, she was a three-term president of the National Organization for Women and in 2015 she was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame.

According to the Feminist Majority Foundation website, "One of the architects of the modern drive for women's equality, Smeal is known as a political analyst, strategist, and grassroots organizer. She has played a pivotal role in defining the debate, developing the strategies, and charting the direction of the modern day women's movement. Smeal is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Duke University and holds an M.A. degree from the University of Florida. She received an honorary Doctor of Law from Duke University in 1991 and an honorary Doctor of Science from the University of Florida in 2003, and an honorary Doctorate in Humane Letters from Rutgers, the state university of New Jersey in 2010.

In addition to her abundant accomplishments in the service of women and the country that recommend Ms. Smeal for an honorary degree, she would be a significantly compelling commencement speaker for our students on two fronts:

- At a time when a woman has become a major party's presumptive nominee for president for the first time and could be elected president prior to our upcoming commencement ceremonies, Ms. Smeal could offer both timely and historical perspective.

Grants and Sponsored Program

• Edinboro University has developed a new system that will streamline the grant submission process. New documents and procedures are located on the University's internal Grants and Sponsored Programs webpage.

Grants recently awarded:

- Or. Peter Lindeman, professor in the Biology Department, received a third year of funding in the amount of \$40,000 from the U.S. Department of Fish and Wildlife Service to conduct populations surveys of the Megacephalic Map Turtle. Dr. Lindeman travels to Mississippi between mid-May and the end of June to conduct his research.
- ° Dr. Terri Astorino, professor in the Nursing Department received \$113,000 from the Dr. and Mrs. Arthur William Phillips Charitable Trust to purchase a new maternity simulator which will be used to train nursing students on labor and delivery techniques.
- ° Ms. Julie Chacona, Director of Development, received \$25,000 from Erie Insurance to assist with developing an outside classroom at Porreco.
- ° Ms. Darla Elder, Director of Ghering Health and Wellness Center, received a \$1,500 grant from the PA Faculty Health and Welfare Fund to provide CPR and First Aid training to faculty to prepare them for an emergency on campus.
- ° Edinboro University's Office for Students with Disabilities received a \$7,500 grant from PASSHE to support a pilot project designed to recruit and support students with autism spectrum disorders.
- ° Ms. Karen Murdzak, Information Technology Services, received a grant for \$190,000 to support distance education programs with Titusville School District.
- Or. Tim Thompson, professor in the Communication Studies Department, received \$8,900 from the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority to host the Edinboro Highland Games of 2017.
- Ms. Fai Howard, Assistant Vice President for Academic Success and Student Retention, received a National College Testing Association (NCTA) Grant for \$3,430.50 to host a symposium in May of 2017.

- On August 26, New Student Convocation was held in McComb Fieldhouse for the Class of 2020. Freshmen and transfer students pledged to take an active role in their education, be open to new ideas and to become engaged outside the classroom.
- A Reading Initiative was launched this fall semester by the Provost encouraging faculty to expand non-textbook reading across courses on campus. Requiring additional reading outside their regular coursework will assist the enhancement of our students' vocabulary, support their ability to think critically and solve problems, and improve their writing and creativity.
- Edinboro University's Office of Social Equity, Center for Faculty Excellence and Office of the Provost will host the Social Equity Distinguished Lecture Series throughout the academic year. The theme topic is Social Justice and each month, a faculty member will present on the intersection of Social Justice or Social Equity. The series is designed to broaden the educational experience of Edinboro University students and the community by providing an opportunity for our faculty to share thought-provoking and engaging research on the topic of Social Justice or Social Equity. Some of the presenters for the fall semester include Dr. Margaret Smith (Public Health), Dr. Stephen Sullivan (Philosophy), Dr. Stacie Wolbert (Education) and Dr. George Richards (Criminal Justice). The lecture series will continue through the spring semester with presentations by Dr. Jerra Jenrette (Cultures), Dr. Irene Fiala (Sociology), and Dr. Samuel Claster and Dr. Lee Williams (Sociology).

- The Sophomore Experience program was launched this academic year as a follow-up to the newly structured First Year Experience program. The emphasis of the program is on engagement in experiential learning opportunities. Proposal to Revise Admission Standards for Main Campus General Students
President Walker recommends acceptance of revised Admissions Standards for Main
Campus General Students.

Proposal to Revise Admission Standards for Main Campus General Students

Edinboro University employs multiple admission standards and requirements depending on student major and campus. The focus of the current proposal is to increase the admission standard that applies to most students studying in main campus programs. Excluded from the proposed change are standards related to the following: Porreco College, specialized programs (e.g., Nursing, LECOM-related programs), the Academic Enrichment Program (AEP), and transfer students.

Current general admission standards considered for change through this proposal include the following:

- College prep curriculum (consistent with PASSHE recommendations)
- Min 2.5 cum H.S. GPA (4.0 scale)
- Min 800 SAT (CR & M only) or 16-17 ACT composite (16=790; 17=830)

Predictive Model of Retention

A predictive model of second year retention (logistic regression) was developed and estimated using five years of data for the University. The model structure was as follows:

- Dependent Variable:
 - 2nd Year Retention (binary)
- Independent Variables:
 - H.S. GPA
 - SAT Composite Score Equivalent
 - Expected Family Contribution (EFC)
 - Undeclared Student (binary)
 - H.S. Percentile Rank
 - External Scholarship
 - Difference b/t application and start of term (days)

The most significant variables in terms of explanatory power were H.S. GPA and the SAT Composite Score Equivalent (hereafter, SAT), both of which are components of the existing admission standard. It should be noted that the EFC variable was also an important indicator, but given the mission of the University should not be considered in making an admission decision.

A simplified model was estimated using only H.S. GPA and the SAT as independent variables. The results show that H.S. GPA was relatively more important in explaining second year retention with a weight of 81.7%, with SAT weighted at 18.3%; the model had a concordance ratio of 0.64.

Proposed Formula for Admission Decisions

Rather than continuing with an admission standard that sets minimum H.S. GPA and SAT values, a formula is developed to move to a higher standard that also allows students flexibility to offset a lower value for one variable with a higher value for the other (e.g., a higher H.S. GPA value can offset a lower SAT score in determining admission). Assuming equal weight to both the H.S. GPA and SAT results in the following formula:

(1)
$$(400 \times GPA) + (SAT)$$

The maximum value using this equally weighted approach is $3200 [(400 \times 4.00) + (1600)]$. Since the predictive model, discussed above, showed that H.S. GPA is a significantly stronger predictor of second year retention, a weighted version of the formula results in the following:

(2)
$$0.8(400 \times GPA) + 0.2(SAT)$$

At the current admission standard, a student meeting the minimums for both GPA and SAT would have a total score of $960 [0.8(400 \times 2.50) + 0.2(800)]$.

To raise admissions standards, a combined score above 960 must be established. To determine that value, an analysis of student data from the previous three years (n>3,500) was performed relating admissions scores generated from equation (2) to the probability of retention to the second year. Results from this analysis are shown in Table 1. It should be noted that the mean second year retention rate for all data is 0.70 (70%). It was determined through examination of retention probabilities at the student level within the shown score ranges that the greatest improvement in retention occurred where the student admission score was near the value of 1140. This value also corresponds to an approximate H.S. GPA of 3.00 and a composite SAT score of 900.¹ Per the highlighted range in Table 1, this also corresponds to a predicted probability of retention of approximately 60% for any given student with that score. Also note that the student could still meet admission requirements with a H.S. GPA below 3.00 or a composite SAT score of less than 900, provided that the other measure is above these levels.

Formula Timing and Impact

The implementation of the higher standard is proposed over a two cycle period for recruitment. The combined score minimums for each year are proposed as follows:

Fall 2016: 960 (using current minimum requirements)

Fall 2017: 1050 Fall 2018: 1140

Table 2 shows selected combinations of H.S. GPA and SAT that would allow a student to meet the 1050 (light yellow) and 1140 (darker yellow) score minimum. The results show that should a student's H.S. GPA be at the level of 3.25 or higher, an SAT less than 800 would still allow the student to meet the 1140 target value. As an example, if a student had a H.S. GPA of 3.25, the student would just need an SAT of just 500 to have a weighted admission score of 1140. To correct for this problem, the weighted decision rule defined in equation (2) would be subject to **floor values** of 2.50 for the H.S. GPA and 800 for the SAT. Thus, even if a student had a high H.S. GPA, she would also need to meet the SAT floor value of 800.

¹ Note that a revised version of the SAT exam goes into effect this academic year, where a combined score of 900 under the current version of the exam would correspond to a score of 980 under the new exam. The analysis presented here is based on the current scoring system, so the admissions standard target would need to be adjusted in the future once the University fully moves to use of the new SAT measure.

Based on the analysis of data presented in Table 1, the predicted loss of students resulting from the higher standard would be 95 students once the combined score is 1050, and 178 students once the combined score is raised to 1140; both losses represent differences from enrollment levels when the combined score is 960. This loss assumes that all students not meeting the higher standard would not attend the University. However, in reality some of these students may be directed to Porreco College, which would retain a lower admission standard, or the AEP (conditional admission) program. It is also expected that the loss of students may be lessened by attracting more higher-qualified students who would have not previously considered Edinboro as a first choice university.

The second year retention rate is expected to rise from 70% to approximately 72% once the combined score is set to 1050, and to approximately 74% once the combined score reaches 1140. These estimates do not including the impact of other retention initiatives underway. An increase in third and fourth year retention rates would also be expected and contribute favorable to university finances.

Concluding Points

- 1. This proposal suggests a two-year phase-in period to limit the negative impact on new enrollments. A three-year period may also be considered.
- 2. The strategy includes communicating admission standard changes to guidance counselors, and at high school fairs and other venues to push the positive message of quality. The actual formula for admission would not be shared, but rather the understanding that higher overall standards are in place that will include a combination of H.S. GPA and SAT score.
- 3. The strategy will include maintenance of a communication channel (from Admissions) to those denied/deferred with a path for future admission.
- 4. The University's access mission will be met through the Porreco College and AEP.
- 5. The Admissions Office will develop a "Plan B" strategy for admissions in late spring for those narrowly below the minimum score to assist in meeting the University's enrollment target.
- 6. As the retention rate improves, the University will continue to maintain its academic support investment (ASC) for AEP students, lower performing students, and to increase all student engagement and expand retention programming beyond the 2nd year.
- 7. The strategy will include development and implementation of an intentional transition program to move qualified associate degree students to baccalaureate programs.
- 8. This proposal was limited to the broadest admission standard impacting most main campus students. An analysis of other admission standards (e.g., AEP, transfer) is to be undertaken for potential revision.
- 9. The impact of such a change on athletic recruitment, student race, gender, and Pell-eligible status are under evaluation for presentation.

Finance and Administration Report

Personnel transactions since August 1, 2016

Office of the Vice President for Finance and Administration

- Successfully refinanced and acquired The Highlands Housing Facilities from the EU Foundation on September 7, 2016.
- ❖ Closed out the fiscal year with a deficit which was 1/3 the budgeted deficit.
- ❖ Closed and cleared all "open" findings contained in the PASSHE Office of Internal Audit and Risk Assessment 4th Quarter Report issued on July 12, 2016.

Accounting and Finance

- ❖ Updated the financial managers in SAP for recent personnel changes.
- ❖ Worked with the Bursar office to update federal grant reporting authorizations for drawing loan and grant funds.
- Provided finance training session for new chairs of academic department and departmental managers.
- **❖** Athletic summer camp billing.
- ❖ Completed preliminary and final Council of Trustees financial reports for FY2016.
- Completed fiscal year closing processes in preparation for the FY2016 financial audit.
- ❖ Worked with the CliftonLarsonAllen auditors so they could complete the June 30, 2016 external audit of the financial reports and accept by the August 31, 2016, PASSHE due date.
- Submitted the approved PASSHE Financial Information report for the June 30, 2016, fiscal year by the August 31, 2016, due date.
- ❖ Initiated training of the academic departments in Travel Management.
- Grant reconciliation for fiscal year 2016.

Budget

- ❖ Successful budget training sessions were held in August and September. Invitees included new employees or those employees who have assumed new roles at the University and now have a financial management role. These training sessions were conducted by Budget Director Theresa Villella, Assistant Comptroller Sean Bliley and Purchasing Director Darla Spaid who provided an overview of the procurement procedures. This joint venture was well-received by the participants and the training team plans to conduct additional sessions during the fall semester.
- ❖ Budget Director and Office of the Vice President for Finance and Administration completed and submitted the annual PASSHE Budget Report.
- ❖ Also, in collaboration with the Institutional Research office, completed the 2015-2016 Department Credit Analysis which is utilized by the Provost and Deans.

Bursar

❖ Traffic activity for the Bursar Office was similar for August 2016. This year, 2,052 telephone calls were presented and 1,370 students and parents received assistance at the front counter. In addition, during August 2016 there were 4,121 responses sent for email correspondence received in the Bursar Office email account. Cash transactions processed in August 2016 at the front counter and through the mail totaled \$3,275,194.

Capital Projects

- Completed Design with some construction for the Van Houten Overhead Door and Patio Project.
- Substantially completed the Rose Hall Elevator Project. Along with inspections for ADA Compliant items and started close-out project.
- ❖ Completed Design of the Alexander Music Center Roof and Envelope Project.
- Reviewed and inspected new ADA and non-ADA compliant side walkways throughout campus.
- ❖ Coordinated and inspected Dearborn 2nd floor Relocation Project-In-House Project.
- ❖ Started inspections, reviews and paperwork for the Library Learning Commons Project.

Dining Services / ID Card Office

- Coming off a successful summer conference program of approximately 7,000 meal tickets for camp attendees.
- Successful opening for Fall 2016 semester integrating door access in the ID Card office. This access programming has made a very smooth transition for students, and without delay, access immediately to their Residence Halls. The ID office continues to be a good contact for students with door access problems.
- ❖ The off campus, Boro Bucks program, seems to be utilized frequently by students bringing the University and the downtown community together.

Environment, Health and Safety (EHS)

- Connected the University mass notification speaker system to Pogue and Human Services fire alarm systems. This allows the emergency messages to be played through the buildings' fire alarm system.
- ❖ EHS partnered with Information Technology Services (ITS), EU Police Department (EUPD) and Facilities to install a new blue light emergency phone at the rear of Butterfield Hall.
- ❖ EHS worked with several campus departments to resolve the most recent PASSHE Safety and Security Audit findings.
- ❖ EHS has recently developed a partnership with the American Heart Association to offer free "Hands Only" CPR training for the University community.
- ❖ EHS, in conjunction with Facilities, is completing the installation of Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) throughout campus to increase the chances of survival of someone who is experiencing a heart attack.
- ❖ Completed the annual fire alarm system inspection and test of all fire alarm systems on campus in preparation for the new academic year.
- ❖ Completed the first quarter of the residence hall fire drills. Fire drills are conducted in the residence halls within the first 10 days of the start of class and another drill half way through the semester. This is done to educate the students on the University's evacuation procedures and their evacuation assembly point.
- ❖ EHS, ITS, EUPD, Communications and Marketing assisted with the implementation of the branding of the University's mass notification system (EU Shield) and debuted the new EU Shield app at new student orientation.
- ❖ EHS installed Building Emergency Action Plans throughout the campus to educate the building occupants on the emergency procedures specific to their building.

Grounds and Maintenance

- ❖ Moved faculty offices from Centennial Hall to Dearborn Hall.
- * Removed brush from around the campus lake.
- ❖ Concrete projects: Reeder Hall front sidewalks, entrance, side of Reeder Rose Hall main entrance walks, entrance circle
- * Removed black top lane (fire lane) behind Miller. Cut 2 1/2 ft of sidewalk/fire lane and brought in 200 yards of material to get sidewalk/fire lane to meet ADA requirements. Put in a concrete sidewalk and landscaped.
- ❖ Put in new catch basin bottom of Miller sidewalk.
- ❖ Blue light phone installed by Baron-Forness Library.
- ❖ Van Houten removed old patio, removed patio enclosure, poured new concrete patio, built retaining wall, landscaped and tiled behind patio area.
- ❖ Police Station front walk and main entrance.
- ❖ Doucette Hall made steps/ramp to loading dock area entrance into all ramp
- ❖ McComb Fieldhouse removed and fixed damaged sidewalks.
- ❖ McComb Fieldhouse and Wiley Arts & Sciences Center repaired concrete work from contractors.
- ❖ The Highlands buildings improved turning radius at trash rooms added concrete.
- ❖ Parking lot signage in progress.
- ❖ Painting of light posts and railings throughout campus in progress.
- ❖ Assisted electricians with light poles down the Library road.
- ❖ Distribution of new trash cans throughout campus in progress.
- ❖ Dozing/concrete crushed at the back of the barn.
- ❖ Prep site for storage of salt in dome-like facility located behind the barn.
- Planted five memorial trees.
- 2nd floor Library removed shelving units, prepped floor for renovation.
- Library 1st floor removed shelving to make room for study tables.
- ❖ Welcome Weekend prepped grounds (mow, landscaping, etc.), set up events for Move-in Day (convocation, other weekend events).
- ❖ Porreco bridge tore out old bridge and replaced it
- * Removed four hazard trees in Sherwood Forrest.
- * Facilities staff constructed 49 barricades.

Human Resources/Faculty Relations/Payroll

Human Resources:

- Shari Gould obtained SHRM-CP on July 14, 2016. (Society for Human Resource Management – Certified Professional). Shari Gould was promoted to Bursar as of September 21, 2016.
- ❖ Temporary Faculty Continuation Contracts With the Spring 2017 semester, initiating a change to streamline the handling of temporary faculty continuations to reduce contract creation and processing by Human Resources Office and other stakeholders. This process provides earlier notification to temporary faculty member of their continuation; reduces paper handling in the dean's offices, provost office and human resources office; earlier awareness of separations to minimize impact of summer non-eligible health benefit contributions; and potentially reducing unemployment compensation paid with earlier notification of reasonable assurance of continuation.
- ❖ The Human Resources and Faculty Relations Department hosted the CUPA-HR (College and University Professional Association for Human Resources) West Chapter meeting and

training session on September 30, 2016. There were 16 in attendance coming from Allegheny College, Carnegie Melon University, Indiana University of Pennsylvania Pittsburgh Technical College, Robert Morris University and Slippery Rock University of Pennsylvania. Topics discussed included: Implicit Bias, Talent Acquisition, and University Diversity/Frederick Douglass Institute.

Payroll:

- ❖ Distance Education Payments initiated a change to eliminate paperwork while improving the timeliness and accuracy of payments to faculty members; also ensuring CBA compliance.
- ❖ Full use of "My First Days" (ESS) for new hire benefit enrollments. Eliminates the need for the majority of paper forms (some PEBTF and VGLIP enrollments still require paper forms).
- * Rollout of "Recording of Work Hours" via ESS for Facilities Office personnel. We have identified a few anomalies and once a fix is in place, we plan to continue the rollout.

Information Technology Services (ITS)

- ❖ Added Access Points in Doucette to enhance Wi-Fi coverage for classroom devices.
- ❖ Provided network, Wi-Fi, phone and fax capabilities for Ghering Health Center emergency location in Towers A.
- * Ran fiber optics cabling for mass notification system in Pogue Student Center and Human Services building.
- Ordered equipment and held kickoff meeting for Campus Digital Signage project.
- Converted the Employee Microsoft Personal Purchase (Work at Home) service to the new Online O365 Service.
- ❖ Streamlined Print Management Quota process to gain efficiencies.
- Researched and implemented FireFly Thin Client Software solution for older PCs.
- ❖ Upgraded Porreco Barn 6 with 29 new computers and monitors.
- ❖ Imaged and installed 4 iMacs in OSD testing room.
- ❖ Installed scanner and braille embosser in OSD.
- ❖ Deployed Smart Office 2016 System Center Configuration Manager (SCCM) installation package.
- ❖ Replaced entire WiFi network in the Highlands (480 Access Points) with new state-of-the art ARUBA WiFi equipment. This increases throughput by as much as ten-fold and provides much better coverage for students. Installation was done in-house at a cost of 1/3 what an outside vendor would have charged for just one year and at a savings to the University of approximately \$2 million over five years if outsourced.
- ❖ Doubled the amount of bandwidth for RESnet and implemented Netflix Caching to provide more efficient streaming services for students who increasingly expect and depend on it for their entertainment.
- Provisioned network connectivity and performed setup of phones, computers and printers for move of faculty offices from Centennial to Dearborn.
- ❖ Performed upgrades in 30 computer labs for start of Fall semester.
- ❖ Implemented Dropbox for Education cloud based storage service. The service provides unlimited file storage and is accessible from most devices anywhere you have an internet connection. All files are always backed up and accidentally deleted files are recovered with ease. The Dropbox website is located at: https://techhelp.edinboro.edu/scripts/dropbox/index.asp.
- ❖ Implemented the Departmental Liaison program which is designed to create a partnership between Information Technology Services (ITS) and each department to enhance

- communication and improve technical support by allowing ITS to gain a better understanding of each department's technology needs.
- ❖ The Information Technology Services (ITS) team launched an online Service Catalog which empowers Edinboro University students and employees to resolve technology problems, find helpful information, "Submit a Ticket" for assistance or chat with our Technology Help Center via "Live Support". The catalog may be accessed by clicking "Tech Help" through the MyEdinboro Launchpad.
- ❖ A total of 70 faculty received new computers and 20 received new iPads through the Faculty Lifecycle Computer replacement program.
- ❖ A change was made to the Caller ID that will display on all outgoing calls from the University. Outgoing calls now display the individual caller's direct dial number rather than the University main number. The outgoing caller name continues to display as Edinboro University. This change will help ensure that those who receive calls from the University find it easier to return those calls.
- ❖ A Distance Learning & Telemedicine Program Grant of \$421,925 was awarded to the Northwest Pennsylvania Distance Learning Partnership that includes Edinboro University as the host university. Edinboro received \$190,000 which will be used for new equipment to establish a distance learning network with three small school districts in northwest Pennsylvania: Titusville, Union City and Forest Area School Districts.
- ❖ Information Technology Services hosted a regional D2L Roadshow which included D2L representatives and Distance Education Directors/LMS Administrators from five PASSHE schools who attended to review the evolving needs of students.
- ❖ Information Technology Services worked with the Athletics coaching staff to develop and install a multi-room solution in McComb 31 and 32 allowing coaches to present material to one or both team rooms via 80" LCD Displays. Historically, this type of solution would be completed by a vendor costing the University thousands of additional dollars.
- ❖ A new Online Parking Ticket Appeal System was implemented which reduces or eliminates the need for in-person visits to the Police department to appeal tickets.
- ❖ Implementation of eTranscripts which allows secure processing of electronic transcripts via The National Student Clearinghouse thereby streamlining and expediting student request and receipt of transcripts.
- ❖ Implementation of Customer Relationship Management (CRM) Recruit software application for the Undergraduate Admissions office to support recruitment and correspondence with prospective students. All necessary test and production server infrastructure was built inhouse resulting in overall implementation cost savings.
- ❖ Established new processes for the Bursar's office by developing new reports regarding Balances for Financial and Non-Financial Holds.
- SIMS Production Link established enabling the Office of Educational Intelligence to pull data directly from our Banner system.
- Upgraded the cBORD dining services application for new enhancements and security updates.
- ❖ Presented at the Pennsylvania Banner Users Group Technical Days.

Institutional Research (IR)

❖ IR has implemented Rapid Insights retention template. This allowed us to use predictive analytics on our incoming class based on the past four years of students. We provided the data to review EU admissions standards and have worked with the Provost and VP of

- Enrollment Management to develop scenarios for admissions standards that will improve our student profile and retention rate.
- ❖ ITS and IR have submitted the Fall 2016 student freeze (census) information to the system in the shortest time in three years and with minimal errors. This is in large part to a concerted effort from the various data inputs on campus including: Undergraduate Admissions, Graduate Admissions, Registration, and many others.
- ❖ The Fall 2016 FTE enrollment at census was 5258.21, this put us 1% over budgeted FTEs or 53.71 FTEs more than projected. The Fall 2016 headcount enrollment was 6181, 2.1% under budget or -133 less than budgeted. This shows that while we have less students than anticipated, they are taking more credits than anticipated. The FTE and headcount numbers are 5.7% and 5.63% below last year's numbers respectively.
- ❖ IR has been lending expertise in two working groups at the system level -- the Alumni Survey Review Committee and the NSSE (National Survey of Student Engagement) Survey Review Committee.

Purchasing

- Purchasing recently executed an affiliation agreement with Allegheny Health Network that covers three disciplines and multiple locations. It is always exciting to have agreements like this in place as it provides more opportunities for our students when searching for internships.
- * Recently renewed a contract with Northwest Classroom Captioning for Communication Access Real-time Translation (CART) services that can be used by all PASSHE universities.
- ❖ In the past month, our office has processed about 200 purchase orders and service contracts for various campus departments.
- ❖ Since September 1, approximately 25 affiliation agreements were fully executed.
- New contract with Zito Media fully executed. This new agreement will provide a \$19,000 annual savings to the University for Ethernet services.
- ❖ \$1.8 million in service contracts & purchase orders processed through the Purchasing office in September.
- Conducted a finance training session for new chairs and others to review the procurement process.

SGA (Student Government Association)

- ❖ Since the beginning of the Fall 2016 semester, 6,125 involvement hours have been tracked on BoroSync with 4,023 people swiping into events. During the entire Spring 2016 semester, 3,388 hours were tracked on BoroSync and 2,294 people swiped into events.
- ❖ For the first time ever, EUSGA setup a tent outside of Pogue and sold popular items that students and their families often forget to pack before they come to campus. The initiative was very well received by students and their families.
- ❖ The EUSGA Vice President of Finance held pre-meetings with clubs and organizations to discuss their General Funds requests before they present to the Finance Committee for deliberation.
- ❖ A representative from the EUSGA Executive Board drove people around campus in an SGA vehicle that needed assistance.

University Police

❖ Communicated on October 3, the availability of EU's Annual Security and Fire Safety compliance document. The document can be found on the Edinboro University website at

http://www.edinboro.edu/SecurityInformation. The report contains information regarding campus security and personal safety including topics such as crime prevention, fire safety, university police law enforcement authority, crime reporting policies, disciplinary procedures, sexual assault resources, relationship violence, and other matters of importance related to security and safety on campus. It also contains information about crime statistics for the three previous calendar years concerning reported crimes that occurred on campus, in certain off-campus buildings or property owned or controlled by Edinboro University, and on public property within, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. This information is required by law and is provided by the Edinboro University Police Department. Edinboro University is committed to assisting all members of the Edinboro community in providing for their own safety and security.

- ❖ Purchase of a new K-9 vehicle with a generous donation provided by the SGA (Student Government Association). This vehicle provides more safety features for the University's K-9 officer.
- Provided A.L.I.C.E. training to several student groups with a lot of positive feedback for this important and critical active shooter training. A.L.I.C.E. stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter and Evacuate.
- ❖ Hired and trained a new female police officer.
- ❖ Participated in the implementation of the new emergency notification system and trained all officers on the system EU Shield.
- ❖ Implemented the new online parking ticket appeals process which eliminates the need for individuals to appear at the police station to complete a written ticket appeal.

Student Affairs Report

- The Edinboro University Student Government Association (EUSGA) has worked to increase the number of student involvement hours tracked on BoroSync so we may measure where students spend their time. Since the beginning of the Fall 2016 semester (approximately one month), 6,125 involvement hours have been tracked on BoroSync, and 4,023 people have swiped into events. This is a 44.7% increase in hours and a 43.0% increase in number of people swiping into events as compared to the entire Spring 2016 semester.
- For the first time ever, EUSGA set up a tent outside of Pogue and sold popular items that students and their families often forget to pack before they come to campus. The initiative was very well received by students and their families.
- To educate our clubs/organizations on how to properly request General Funds, the EUSGA Vice President of Finance held pre-meetings with clubs and organizations to discuss their General Funds requests before they present to the Finance Committee for deliberation.
- To provide more service to students during Move-In Day, a representative from our Executive Board drove people in need of assistance around campus in an EUSGA vehicle.
- Campus Life hosted a community service fair for Erie and Crawford County Service organizations, allowing them to reach out to our students to provide service opportunities. Thirty-five local agencies participated.
- Shellie Barbich attended the Title IX/Clery update session given by PASSHE legal at Clarion University. The session provided us the guidance to ensure we are following proper procedures in documenting Title IX cases as well as giving us a chance to meet directly with our legal counsel.
- Shellie Barbich and Ron Wilson have created a manual for all Title IX investigators to follow to ensure compliance in our investigations. Shellie successfully recruited six investigators and two advocates for the program. All are receiving Trauma Investigation training and were given all materials on a flash drive to keep accurate yet confidential records.
- To assist in promoting engagement on campus, the Campus Life Office has begun to work directly
 with the Communications Office to develop a template of activities that can be posted in several
 arenas so students are aware of events happening on campus and in the community.
- The Department of Residence Life and Housing facilitated more than 200 programs during the first
 week of classes and has continued to offer four engagement opportunities in each residence hall each
 week.
- During Welcome Week, the President of the Residence Hall Association (RHA) actively participated in RHA and signed up more than 130 students to engage in the first meeting (held Thursday, September 9). In addition, RHA facilitated 4 "pod" engagement sessions to encourage membership.
- During the Residence Assistant training week, the Department of Residence Life and Housing staff collected approximately 600 pounds of food for the food pantry.

- Students have been invited to participate in a 4-day, 3-night EU Living-Learning Community adventure to NYC. The trip includes visits to the Statute of Liberty, the United Nations and the 9/11 Museum.
- The Department of Residence Life and Housing is collaborating with the Academic Support Center to offer a six-part "6 o'clock series" for students in the First Year Experience program that highlights strategies for academic success.
- Partnering with the Center for Career development, the Department of Residence Life has hosted the first in a four-part "Internship Academy." Sessions include: Why Should I Intern? (9/19), Where and When Should I Intern? (10/4), What Do I need to Intern? (10/20), and How Should I Intern? (11/9).
- The Department of Residence Life partnered with Athletics and Dining Services to facilitate an attendance contest to encourage students to attend the first home football game of the season. More than 180 residential students braved the elements to attend the game!
- The Residence Life staff, in addition to managing the check in process, also conducted two floor meetings, participated in Convocation, Play Fair and a variety of other student Welcome Week activities.
- The Edinboro athletic teams have begun to perform community service projects throughout the area. The Wrestling Team once again participated in the annual cleanup of the County YMCA. Members of the Softball Team served as volunteers at the 2016 US Women's Mid-Amateur Championship at the Kahkwa Country Club in Erie. Teams throughout the year will be participating in a variety of projects.
- The Football Team kicked off the 2016-17 Read to Compete Program with a visit to Edinboro Elementary on September 23. All Fighting Scots athletic teams will take a turn visiting with students from the elementary school at some point this year.
- Campus Life successfully coordinated an on campus student employment fair with several offices conducting interviews and hiring students on site. Several offices contributed services to allow students to work through the processes in one spot and begin work the very next day.
- The Department of Residence Life and Housing is partnering with the Departments of Athletics, Dining Services, and Facilities to re-develop and update processes related to the execution of the summer camps program.
- The system of professional staff members on-call has been re-designed and now includes the Assistant Directors from the Department of Residence Life and Housing. On-call staff members provide expert direction and intervention in the event there are campus emergencies that occur after hours or on weekends.
- The Residence Hall Association (RHA) has established a fundraising relationship with Off Campus Marketing programs (OCM). With expected proceeds totaling about \$4,000 each year, this

relationship will assist RHA, a group advised by the Department of Residence Life and Housing, to provide programming to residence hall community members.

- The Department of Residence Life and Housing redefined the scholar role to equalize scholar compensation across campus, while reducing the Living Learning Community budget by \$15,220.
- In order to ensure the smooth operation of the University, afford students more flexibility with the check in dates, and to accommodate the EU athletic program, the Department of Residence Life and Housing accommodated more than 500 early check-in students.
- For the first time in two years, the Department of Residence Life and Housing, in partnership with the Department of Criminal Justice has added a Criminal Justice scholar back onto the Criminal Justice living learning community.
- Dave Goodwill and his staff successfully completed a summer of several revenue-generating ROPES sessions.
- The Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) Department added early evening appointments on one weekday and may add more based on student demand.
- CAPS partnered with Therapy Dogs United to reduce student stress on move-in day. Monthly events dubbed "Pause and Paws" are scheduled.
- The Pogue Student Center Staff, Campus Life Student Staff, Recreational Sports, Programming Board, and CORE student staff all attended fall training which encompassed 5-10 day training periods including ALICE, social equity, Title IX, customer service, functional information and many other important topics.
- In combined efforts with the Tom Ridge Environmental Center, EU participated in our 6th annual International Coastal Clean Up in order to clear local waterways of debris. We collected 179.25 pounds of debris from our waterways filling nearly 85 trash bags.
- The Department of Residence Life and Housing is in the process of upgrading its computer platform that houses student occupancy data. This upgrade will afford the department the ability to automate check-in procedures, room condition reporting, and billing.
- Cyndi Waldinger and Amy Franklin-Craft attended the PASSHE BASICS (Brief Alcohol Screening and Intervention for College Students) and CASICS (Cannabis Screening and Brief Intervention for College Students) training course in Shippensburg, Pennsylvania. These programs are designed to assist students in examining their own drinking behavior in a judgment-free environment. The goals are selected by the student and aimed at reducing risky behaviors and harmful consequences of drinking. After participating in the final training session on October 6, each will be certified to train others to and facilitate the BASICS and CASICS to program with alcohol and other drug policy violators.
- Josette Skobieranda-Dau, Assistant Director of Residence Life and Housing, has been trained and was added to the Student Affairs roster of Title IX intake personnel.

- The Department of Residence Life and Housing revised one Graduate Assistant position to include student conduct, by-stander intervention programming for the NCAA Step Up campaign and expanded the role to include mentoring for students in need. The mentoring function is intended to increase student civility and individual student responsibility within the EU campus.
- The department of Residence Life and Housing, in order to be fiscally responsible, reduced its operating budget by \$176,000. It then reduced the budget again by \$114,000.
- The Football Team is off to a winning start under first-year coach Justin Lustig. That includes a double overtime win over West Chester, the PSAC East pre-season favorite. Lustig is the first football coach in Edinboro history to win his first three games, and the 3-0 was the first since 2011.
- Head Coach Gary Kagiavas' team is off to the best start in school history at 8-1-0, and is currently ranked 20th in the latest NSCAA Division II Top 25. At one point, they climbed as high as 11th, the highest ranking in school history. Kagiavas won his 200th match as Edinboro's head coach recently with a 3-0 win over Lock Haven.
- The Women's Volleyball Team suffered four straight losses, two to nationally-ranked teams, while competing in the Oredigger Classic in Colorado to start the season, but has since run off nine straight wins. Head Coach Missy Soboleski picked up her 400th career win with a victory against Notre Dame (Ohio) on September 13.
- First-year head coach Ryan Foster currently has the Men's Cross Country Team ranked third in the Atlantic Region and receiving votes in the national poll. The Women's Team is sixth in the Atlantic Region.
- To keep all voter registrations within non-partisan guidelines and to eliminate the ability for independent drives to solicit student information, the Student Affairs leaders developed a SOP (standard operating procedure) for anyone choosing to officially host a voter registration drive on campus.
- Campus Life has begun the process of managing central reservations for the University.
- For the 2nd year in a row, students and employees had information at their fingertips thanks to the Welcome Weekend app for smart phones and devices. The app will help our students through their first semester with information available until mid-December.
- Well-received changes were made to Welcome Weekend. The freshman move-in process was altered to allow more contact time for students and families with Edinboro employees as the employees directed traffic and helped students carry their items into their residence halls.
- Student Affairs successfully assisted the Highland Games with their EUSGA budget expenditures, ensuring that we were compliant with all SGA policies for expenditure of student funds through contracts and certificates of insurance.
- Residence Life and Housing has established a regular meeting with Living Learning Partners.

- The Department of Residence Life and Housing student staff selection processes for Resident Assistants has been moved from Spring semester to a Fall semester process.
- In order to facilitate more fluid staff selection processes, approximately 60 student staff and professional staff members from the Department of Residence Life and Housing are completing Talent Acquisition Training, in conjunction with the Office of Social Equity.
- The Department of Residence Life and Housing created a comprehensive damage billing process for the summer sports camps program.
- Student Health Services (SHS) converted the accreditation information from a paper system to an electronic system.
- SHS relocated the emergency, back-up first-aid station from Tower B to Tower A.
- Ghering Health and Wellness Center created a student worker assignment sheet so tasks are completed in a timely and efficient manner and in order to exchange information between the various shifts.
- Over the last two weeks, the Pogue Student Center student staff have received several accolades from customers with excellent customer service experience.
- Fifteen EU ROTC Cadets attended advanced training at Fort Knox, two attended basic camp, one earned her Airborne Wings, two attended CULP [one in Gabon, one in Slovakia] and one completed project GO by studying Arabic at Irfane University in Morocco.
- Amy Franklin-Craft continues to serve as the Assembly Coordinator for Commissions for the
 American College Personnel Association. In July, she attended the annual leadership meeting in
 Columbus, Ohio. In November, she will participate in an organizational retreat in Washington
 D.C. Finally, in March, she will attend the annual leadership conference where she will lead a cadre
 of 20 commission chairs and more than 400 directorate body members.
- Amy Franklin-Craft attended the annual Adirondack Solutions user's conference in Nashville, Tennessee.
- For the first time, the Department of Residence Life and Housing student staff received training in the use of Automatic Defibrillators & Hands Only CPR to respond to health emergencies.
- Denita Kelly, Assistant Director for Operations for the Department of Residence Life and Housing, started classes toward earning her Ed.D.
- Josette Skoberianda-Dau, Assistant Director for Training and Selection for the Department of Residence Life and Housing, participated in the NCAA Step Up conference in California. This train the trainers program will be used in campus programming with students in order to encourage bystander intervention actions.

- The Department of Residence Life and Housing facilitated the first NCAA sponsored Step Up training activity with 50 students on September 18.
- Six RHA leaders attended the NACURH conference at the University of Delaware.
- Lacey Gosnel, Graduate Hall Coordinator in Highlands 4 earned her certification in Yoga.
- Former Edinboro All-American Trevon Jenifer helped the USA Men's Wheelchair Basketball Team win the gold medal in the 2016 Paralympics in Rio de Janeiro. Jenifer was part of the 2012 team that won the bronze medal.
- Eight new members will be inducted into the Edinboro Athletic Hall of Fame on Friday, October 7. This marks the first time the Hall of Fame has been paired with the Homecoming festivities. This year's inductees include: Shawn Bunch, Stephanie Burner, Todd Jay, Walt McLaughlin, Sean McNicholas, Julie Nemergut-Yurcich, Anthony Peluso, and Callie Wheeler.

Ms. Artis Hampshire-Cowan is a senior fellow at AGB. She recently completed a 23-year tenure at Howard University which included serving as senior vice president and secretary, interim chief operating officer, and acting president. A sought-after speaker and trainer, her training specialties include organizational development, leadership, managing change and transition, diversity, board-CEO relationships, board development, and strategic deployment. Prior to serving as senior vice president, she served concurrently as secretary and vice president for human resource management and provided executive oversight for a workforce of more than 6,000.

Before joining Howard University, she spent 12 years working with the government of the District of Columbia. This included time as a congressional lobbyist, consumer and regulatory enforcement administrator, attorney-advisor to the deputy mayor for economic development, and senior advisor and counsel to the city administrator. She also served as general counsel of RFK Stadium, where she led the negotiations to build a new Redskins Stadium. She subsequently served as special counsel to County Executive Wayne Curry in his successful bid to relocate the team to Prince George's, Maryland. Hampshire-Cowan graduated with honors from Morris Brown College with a degree in business management and received her JD from Temple University Law Center. She is also a graduate of Harvard's Institute for Higher Education Management.



Dr. Thomas C. Meredith is a senior fellow at AGB. He has served as a university president and as the head of three university systems. Most recently he served as Commissioner of Higher Education for Mississippi's university system of eight universities. In January 2002, he was appointed chancellor for the University System of Georgia, responsible for the state's 34 public colleges and universities. Prior to this appointment, he served as chancellor of the University of Alabama System, as well as president and professor of education at Western Kentucky University. He also was a vice chancellor at the University of Mississippi. He began his career as a high school teacher and later served as a high school principal. Meredith

consults in the areas of presidential mentoring, development and performance appraisal (more than 70 presidents have reported to him); presidential compensation; leadership training; board development and self-evaluation; board relations; and multi-institutional system matters.

Dr. Meredith has served on numerous educational and corporate boards. He was president of the National Association of System Heads (NASH), an organization made up of the chief executive officers of the 52 public higher education systems in the United States. He was also chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), the first head of a university system to serve in that capacity. Meredith has also served on the executive committee of the Southern Regional Educational Board (SREB) and has served as the chair of the Council of Presidents in both Alabama and Kentucky.

Dr. Meredith holds a BA from Kentucky Wesleyan College, an MA from Western Kentucky University, and an EdD from the University of Mississippi. He completed the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University and the Higher Education Roundtable at Oxford University. He holds two honorary doctorates and has been recognized by his alma maters for his achievements including the naming of a building for him at Western Kentucky. He was inducted into the Alabama Academy of Honor (100 members) and headed the governor's task force on developing and implementing a long-term strategic plan for economic development in that state.
