


GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY







First Oil Driller Ena & Oct 5 1952 Sur 4 P6 Shaft Memorial Slated For Uncle Billy Smith

BUTLER. (P)-Oscar L. Chapman, Secretary of the Interior, will dedicate a 20-foot memorial shaft near here Saturday, Oct. 18, at the grave of the world's first successful oil driller.

The ceremony at the Hannahstown Cemetery, between Butler and Tarentum, will honor the late William A. (Uncle Billy) Smith. About 10,000 spectators are ex-

ected to attend the dedication, rranged as part of the Oil Progess Week celebration, Oct. 12-18.

Smith, a blacksmith and salt well driller by trade, lived in Tarentum. In April of 1859 he was hired by Edwin L. Drake to drill an oil well near Titusville. On Aug. 27, 1859, Smith brought in the now famous Drake Well, the first commercial well to be drilled for oil.

Smith died almost penniless in 1890 at the age of 78. The monument to be placed on his grave will be of polished granite. It will be in the shape of an obelisk and topped by four keystones. A replica of a derrick will be etched on each side.


Rev. James F. Root Receives Appointment as Supervisor at Broome County Laundry.



In the next 10 years the circus paid out some four million dollars in damage claims. Some officials

went to jail. North, head of the circus for most of the years since the death of his uncle John Ringling, rounded up some of the greatest per formers in the world, air-condi rioned the big top and made many innovations.

But troubles continued to mount. Patronage declined. Union pressed for recognition. Feuds developed and key personnel resigned. Lots big enough to accom-modate the huge tent became scarce, and the circus had to set up on the outskirts of cities. Recently, bad weather and injuries plagued the circus.

It was against this background that North decided to call it quits on the "Sawdust Trail."

clown Emmett Kelly, who left the circus at the start of the current season when pickets of the American Guild of Variety Artists appeared, refused to take a pessimistic view. He said:

The prominent Edinboro and Erie county physician and sur geon, with his brother, Dr. Boyd W. Ghering, operated a heavily trafficked medical clinic in Edinboro until increasing expenses forced them to close it in the mid-30's.

Dr. Ghering was born in 1882 at Cherry Tree, Pa., son of the late Jeremiah L. and Clara Armstrong Ghering, and received his medical education at the University of Pittsburgh.

He sailed for France with the first contingent of the 28th division, 111th infantry, and served practically two years in the front lines. During that tremulous per riod, he fought in almost all major battles rather than being safely quartered in the medical headquarters behind the lines.

Dr. Ghering had gone to Edinboro in 1914 to start a medical and surgical career that extended over a period of 40 years. He was still comparatively active in his profession until recently when his health failed.

Before the development of penicillin, Dr. Ghering was especially brilliant in the treatment of pneumonit. In numerous occasions, he sat through the night at the bedsides of pneumonia patients hovering between life and death and brought them back to health. Often, it was by the closest margin that he saved their

He came through the war without any serious effects from gas or shells and immediately resumed his Edinboro practice. He was on the staffs of both Hamot and St. Vincent's hospitals and vice president of the First National bank at Edinboro at the time of his death.

For more than 25 years, he coupled his private practice with service as physician for Edinboro State Teachers college and held the honor of physician emeritus of the college.

He also was a member of the Conneauttee American Legion Post 770, the Presbyterian church, life member of the Free and Ac

Extortion Hearing Set Wednesday

An alleged extortion scheme is expected to unfold further at 9 a, m. Wednesday when Harrison Rogers, 46, of 1027 Kerry Lane, appears for a hearing before Lawrence Park Justice of the Peace Joseph Cresciman.




He persuaded George Kibler, prominent Girard merchant, to help promote the idea, and eventually Girard and other towns along the route raised money to finance the project.





The photograph taken in the year 1902 shows an ore train of 25 cars, 1,825 rating tons, drawn by C3 class locomotive No. 150, whch at the time it was built in 1900 was the largest locomotive in the world. The Bessemer had four of these locomotives, 150 and 151 built in 152 in 1901 and 153 in 1902

The cars were some of the first cars built, and the caboose is one

The locomotive, all the cars in the train, and the caboose have been retired for many years and remain only as memories in our historical records.

The photograph taken in 1949 shows Locomotive 647, class H1F, with a train of 118 cars, 13,050 rating tons, winding a round the curves and under the bridges on the track as it leaves Conneaut Harbor.

Locomotive 647 was assisted by two H1's on the rear, but they were too far away, for the lens of the camera. This train is over a mile long. No. 647 was built by the Baldwin Locomotive Works in 1944. The Bessemer had 47 of these fine locomotives purchased from 1929 to 1944.

The photograph taken in 1953 shows three EMD 1500 H. P. diesel road units with 122 cars, 13,500 rating tons, leaving Conneaut and assisted by two of the same units on the rear of the train. The Bessemer now has 54 of this type, known as class W4A and B, purchased from 1950 to 1953.

This photograph shows that from 1949 to 1953 there was another revolution in railroading, not so much an increase in the power of the locomotive as in the type, for there had been a transition from steam to diesel. This change was made to take advantage of the inherent economy of the diesel locomotive.

The beginnings of two large car building companies in the Pittsburgh District at about the turn of the century are tied up to the introduction and building of the cars shown in this train.

In 1896 the Keystone Bridge Company of the Carnegie Steel Company built two experimental steel hopper cars which were Bessemer class H1, Nos. 5499 and 5500. There were at that time no car builders equipped to build steel cars. Being bridge builders, the Keystone Company used all structural shapes and plates. No pressed shapes were used. Many engineers and railroads advocated that type of construction, which came to be known as the "Carnegie" de-

"Schoen" Design

Another school of thought advocated the building of steel cars of plates only, the plates being formed in dies to the required shape for

Rocks, for the pressing of steel into shapes. This design of car came to be known as the "Schoen" design.

The success of the first two experimental hopper cars indicated that the days of wooden cars were numbered. The railroad world was ripe for the change from wood to steel. This resulting revolutionary change was comparable in extent to that now taking place in locomotives from steam to diesel. It gave a great impetus to the car building and the steel industries.

The battle between the advocates of the Carnegie and Schoen designs was not settled in 1897 when the Bessemer decided to place the first large order for steel hopper cars. A decision was made to purchase both kinds of cars, try them out in service, and see which type was the better.

This order for steel cars was really the beginning of the steel car building industry. The cars were built by the Schoen Pressed



Four persons, including three prominent Erie area men, were killed instantly in a head-on crash of two cars at 12:40 a.m. today on Rte. 6, one and a half miles east of Warren, Pa. They had 19 children.

Dead are Glenn E. Freeman, thirty-seven, 1924 Knoll ave., Harborcreek; Harvey E. Lapp, fifty-seven, 5894 Peach st., Kearsarge; Jess Mountain, sixty-five, 2831 Pine ave., Erie, and Mrs. Romaine Kondak Lane, twentythree, RD 1, Clarendon, Pa. Mrs. Lane's husband, Kenneth

Lane, twenty-eight, is in fair condition in the Warren General hospital with multiple lacerations to his face and possible head in-

The quartet was pronounced dead on arrival in ambulances at the Warren hospital. Freeman had a possible crushed chest and a broken neck; Lapp, a broken neck and internal injuries; Mountain, a crushed chest and leg injuries, and Mrs. Lane, a fractured skull, possible broken neck and compound fracture of one

State Troopers Paul Dell and George Ponlunchuk of the Warren barracks said the Erie trio were traveling east, apparently headed for Lapp's hunting camp at Chapman Dam, in a car owned and operated by Freeman.

They had left here Thursday to hunt turkey and small game from the Freeman camp at Garland, and planned to continue their hunt during the weekend in the Chapman Dam area.

Freeman is reported to have swung around an eastbound Sheffield, Pa., car and crashed headon with the Lane car, traveling in the opposite direction, on a straight-away between two curves, known as "Picnic Run" area.

The impact demolished the Freeman and Lane vehicles, killing instantly the trio in the Erie car, and Mrs. Lane. One victim was pinned in the wreckage but extricated before acetylene torches were necessary. The Clarendon Fire department stood by in event the debris caught

John Francis Ross, forty-eight, and Alexandra Ross, forty-eight, of Keystone ave., Sheffield, said they were traveling about 45 miles an hour when they were passed by the Freeman car.

Ambulances from the Borden Funeral home in Sheffield and the North Warren Fire department rushed the victims to the Warren hospital. Warren County Coroner Ed Lowrey took charge of the bodies.

The remains of the three Erie men are being returned to Erie. Freeman is the father of three children; Mountain, the father of eight; Lapp, the father of six, and Mrs. Lane, the mother of two.

Police said that the Lanes apparently were traveling towards their home, seven miles east of Warren. The wrecked cars were taken to the Glade Keystone Service and the J. and R. Body shop in Warren.





What Causes White Patches On The Skin?

By H. N. BUNDESEN, M. D. Q-I have white patches on my arms and neck. What causes this and is there any treatment for this condition? -MRS. C. W.

A-The exact cause for leucoderma or vitiligo is not known, but too much exposure to the sunlight may be partly responsible. Heredity is thought to be a factor by some in-

There is not a great deal that can be done for this condition.

Certain drugs have been given internally such as extracts of thyroid and suprarenal glands. Applying walnut juice to the white patches is a good method of disguising them or the pigment around the white patches may be bleached out with a bleaching solution.

You should consult your doctor concerning treatment.

Q-What is the cause of bursitis?

-V.E.P A-Bursitis is inflamation of a sac containing fluid located over any one of many joints.

Inflamation may occur as a result of an injury or infection or may be caused by overuse of the part.





The long career of Erie and Florida newspaperman, Edward A. Pfister, fifty-nine, was terminated Tuesday night when he died of a heart attack in Miami, Fla., hospital, where he had been confined for a week.

The former popular and well known Erie newspaperman had been manager of the West Palm Beach bureau of the Miami Herald in recent years after leaving

Erie about 1945.

Relatives said he entered the hospital for treatment. He hadn't been feeling well for the past week. A heart attack brought death about 2 a.m. Tuesday, his family said. Mr. Pfister distinguished him-

self on various newspapers with which he had been associated since he started his career after a few years of Naval service in World War I. During that period, he had been stationd on a battle ship which convoyed troops to the European theater.

He re-enlisted in the Navy during Worll War II and served most his duty in California. He held several decorations from World War I and was affiliated with the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He also was a member of the Elks.
