DANIELE SEVERANCE NAMED SOCIAL WORK STUDENT OF THE YEAR

Daniele Severance of Edinboro has been named Social Work Student of the Year by the Northwest Division of the Pennsylvania Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers (NASW). The senior social work major at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania was honored Wednesday, February 26, at the NASW annual dinner at the Holiday Inn South, in Erie.

The mother of two young boys, Severance has maintained a 3.89 grade point average and been on the dean's list every semester she has attended Edinboro. She is currently serving 30 hours a week as an intern at Community Health Net assigned to its social services department, maternal and child health program.

She has been active in the University's social work club for three years and coordinated its peer mentor program for two semesters. She has served as a student delegate to the field advisory committee to the social work program and developed two proposals for program improvement. Through the club she participated in the food drive for the Edinboro Food Pantry, the annual Giving Tree Christmas Gifts Program for adolescents served by the Food Pantry, the Gertrude Barber Center Phone-a-Thon, and the various fund-raising activities for the club.

Severance has served in numerous volunteer programs including the Cambridge Springs Senior Center, the Center for Adult Education, Perseus House, and the Edinboro Elementary School Writing Center. She worked as a social work student mentor in the spring and fall semesters of 1996, and coordinated a voters' registration drive last fall at ten sites in Erie County.

She was a supplemental instruction leader for Edinboro in the spring of 1996, and is now providing individual tutoring to a learning disabled student. She is a member of the National Honor Society, and was recognized in Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities for 1996-97.

The Northwest Division of NASW consists of Edinboro, Gannon University and Mercyhurst College. Its annual dinner is part of the celebration of National Social Workers Month.

JIM FISHER BOOK NOMINATED FOR EDGAR ALLAN POE AWARD

A book written by Edinboro University of Pennsylvania criminal justice professor Jim Fisher has been nominated for an Edgar Allan Poe Award, the oldest and most prestigious honor of its kind in the field of crime writing. *Fall Guys: False Confessions and the Politics of Murder* (Southern Illinois University Press, 1996) was nominated for the award by the Mystery Writers of America.

Every year the international organization of 2,600 authors honors the best of mystery fiction, nonfiction, television and film crime writing. Fisher's book is one of five titles nominated in the best fact crime category.

Among the others nominated in Fisher's category are recent Pulitzer Prize winner Edward Humes, and Vincent Bugliosi, nominated for *Outrage*, his book on the O.J. Simpson trial. Bugliosi is also the author of *Helter Skelter*. The more famous past winner of best fact crime was Truman Capote for his classic work, *In Cold Blood*. The winners will be announced at an awards ceremony in New York on May 1.

Although in print less than two months, Fall Guys has already received rave reviews including this from Publishers Weekly: "Fisher is both an excellent investigator and a smart writer, capably combining the details of his research with vivid recreation of the past. Most of all, he shows a fine sensitivity to human tragedies and shattered lives reverberating through the years." The critic for Kirkus Reviews, calling Fall Guys "gripping," says: "Fisher's righting of two terrible wrongs is a remarkable act of generosity; and his narrative of those events is haunting and worthwhile."

Jim Fisher's previous book, the nationally acclaimed *The Lindbergh Case*, is out in paperback, a publishing event noted in the "New & Noteworthy" section of *The New York Times Book Review*. Fisher's criticisms of last fall's HBO movie, *Crime of the Century*, based on the 1932 kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby, appeared in such newspapers as the *Los Angeles Times* and *The Wall Street Journal*. Fisher's "levelheaded" approach to the Lindbergh case was noted last August in an article in *The New Yorker* magazine called "The Shock of the True," by Alex Ross.

As author, criminal investigator of last resort, criminal justice professor and Lindbergh case expert, Fisher has appeared on NBC's *Dateline*, 48 Hours, Geraldo, Inside Edition, and Current Affair. Fall Guys is his third book.

EDINBORO MATH AND SCIENCE CENTER RECEIVES \$182,000 GRANT

The Regional Mathematics and Science Center at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania has received a \$182,000 grant from the Dwight D. Eisenhower Professional Development Program. The federal grant funds the first year of a three-year program for teacher enhancement and renewal.

The Center was created in 1994 to enhance the teaching skills of math and science teachers in grades K-8 by providing information, workshops, and access to math and science materials. It features an education resource center which has an extensive supply of math and science education materials and equipment available to be loaned out to local school teachers. The Center serves 17 school districts in Erie, Crawford and Warren counties, as well as the Diocese of Erie and the Northwest Tri-County Intermediate Unit.

Much of the funding will go toward two summer institutes for math and science teachers who will receive a stipend for attending the two-week sessions. The purpose of the institutes is to develop a team of teacher leaders who will work with other teachers in their school and in their district. They will receive intensive hands-on training in hands-on math and science manipulatives, enhanced teaching skills, cooperative learning, and assessment strategies.

Co-directors Dr. Bruce Smith and Dr. Nick Stupianski said one of the big changes in the program this year is the inclusion of undergraduate students and preservice teachers. They now are able to check out materials and use the resources of the Center.

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The Center also sponsors a series of "Math and Science on Saturday" conferences for area administrators and teachers from kindergarten through college. The next conference will be held March 8 at Edinboro University.

Other programs and features of the Center are a series of regional target workshops hosted by schools, the development of a regional cadre of K-8 math and science education improvement leaders networked to serve as district liaisons within and between school districts, and a regional newsletter for K-8 math and science teachers and preservice teachers.

EDINBORO AND SEAWOLVES ENCOURAGE YOUNG READERS

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania and the Erie SeaWolves are teaming up to promote recreational reading for children, in school and at home. SeaWolves Collaborate in Outreach Reading with Edinboro University (SCORE) is a program designed for fourth-grade students, their parents and teachers.

SCORE will last nine weeks, just like spring training. Beginning March 1 through May 30 (teachers may choose a 9-week period within this time), students will read a minimum of 60 minutes per week. The students will chalk up "runs" on their individual SCOREcards every week. After seven weeks the young readers will receive an Edinboro University pencil for their "seventh-inning stretch." Each student who completes the program earns free admission to one of six Sunday afternoon SeaWolves baseball games.

All schools participating in the program are eligible for a school visit by C. Wolf, and SeaWolves items will be raffled to readers through drawings by school principals during the program. At the ball park, the popular mascot and/or the SeaWolves players will autograph students' books.

SCORE is a collaboration between Edinboro's Center for Excellence in Teaching and the Erie SeaWolves.

WEBER NAMED EDINBORO'S PROVOST

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania President Frank G. Pogue has announced the appointment of Robert C. Weber, Ph.D., to the permanent post of provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University. Weber has acted as Edinboro's interim provost since September 1995. His appointment to the permanent position comes at the conclusion of a national search conducted over the past six months.

Weber came to Edinboro University in September 1989 as dean of liberal arts, having held tenured teaching positions at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh and Davis & Elkins College in West Virginia, and having served as an academic administrator for more than 10 years. From 1984 to 1989, he served as associate undergraduate dean at Worcester State College in Massachusetts. From 1976 to 1984 he held several positions at Davis & Elkins College, including assistant dean for instruction, head of the division of arts, and chairman of the English department. From 1967 to 1975 he taught in the English department at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

Weber was awarded a senior Fulbright lectureship in American literature during 1982-83 in what was then Yugoslavia and what is now Croatia. Other honors include two teaching assistantships – one at Miami (Ohio) University from 1965 to 1967 and another at the University of Wisconsin (1970-72). He was also a participant in the 1978 National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar in modern poetry.

Starting his formal post-secondary education by attending the University of Pittsburgh at night, Weber transferred to Slippery Rock University where he graduated with a Bachelor of

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Science in Education degree in 1965. He earned a master's degree in American literature from Miami (Ohio) University in 1967 and a doctorate in modern British and American literature from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1972. Post-doctoral work included studies at the University of California-San Diego and at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh.

"We are fortunate to have found the best, most experienced candidate for chief academic officer – a true scholar, administrator and academic leader – and I'm pleased to have him on my team," Pogue said in announcing Weber's appointment.

"I also wish to express my sincere appreciation to the members of the University community, especially those who served so diligently on the search committee chaired by Vice President for Financial Operations and Administration Richard Morley, for their patience and dedication to continued excellence during the search process," said Pogue.



EDINBORO ANIMATOR'S FILM TO BE SHOWN OSCARS NIGHT

Segments of a film by Edinboro University of Pennsylvania animation professor David Weinkauf will be shown during "Oscars Night" in Hollywood as part of a tribute to animation legend Chuck Jones. Weinkauf's film, *Chuck Jones: A Life of Animation*, will be screened on Monday, March 24, at the World Animation Celebration's opening night gala. The film was first screened at the Animation Celebration in 1989. Weinkauf and three of his animation students from Edinboro University will be attending the celebration.

The event will salute the Academy Awards with a black-tie viewing party at the Pasadena Civic Complex. The televised ceremony for the Academy Awards, which begins at 6 p.m. (PT), will be shown at the gala. In addition to salutes to past Academy Award winners for best animated short film, the winner and the nominees of this year's Oscar for best animated short film will be invited to make a guest appearance following the awards ceremony.

Promoters of the World Animation Celebration, which runs March 24-30, say the gala will be one of the hottest tickets in Hollywood as it will attract the A-list of the animation industry as well as those fascinated by this entertainment medium.

Jones, who turns 85 this year, is the creator and developer of many well-known cartoon characters. His most famous creations include Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck, Pepe le Pew, the Roadrunner and Wile E. Coyote. His films have influenced some of the industry's biggest directors including George Lucas and Steven Spielberg.

Among the many honors bestowed upon Jones are lifetime achievement awards from the Zagreb International Film Festival (1988), the Houston International Film Festival (1991)

HIV/AIDS AWARENESS AT EDINBORO

"HIV/AIDS Awareness at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania," a program of commemoration, education and workshops, will be held April 1-4. From the opening ceremony to the closing candlelight vigil, the occasion will dispel myths, explore the issues and challenges of HIV/AIDS, and remember those who died from this ravaging disease.

The opening ceremony will begin at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, April 1, in the University Center. After remarks by coordinator Dr. J. C. B. Kinch and Edinboro President Dr. Frank G. Pogue, Dr. Mary Ellen Reitz will present an overview of the history of HIV/AIDS. John Schroeck will discuss the public's perception, and Linda Martin will speak on social concerns surrounding HIV/AIDS. Legislative issues and a look at the future will be the topics of DonPaul Lucas and Charlene Bushyager, respectively.

The NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt Display will be in the University Center's lobby. The two 12' x 12' sections of quilt panels are tributes to loved and remembered ones from the area. Whenever it is on display, it cannot be unattended; volunteer Quilt-sitters from campus clubs and organizations will attend it throughout the week.

Community organizations from Erie and Pittsburgh will provide information and expertise on HIV/AIDS issues at the Organization/Education Fair from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. on Tuesday, April 1.

On Wednesday, the program will focus on HIV/AIDS and the university community. Schroeck will lead a discussion after *Gone Tomorrow*, a film about an HIV-positive student

unaware of that fact. A safer sex workshop, an AIDS update and HIV counseling will be held, as will anonymous and confidential HIV testing. The tests will be given through Friday and are free.

HIV/AIDS and the heterosexual community will be featured Thursday. Actress Elena Monica will speak at 8 p.m. on the virus that threatens her life. She works to dispel the still-prevalent belief that this is a disease attacking homosexuals only, when the fastest rate of infection is among heterosexuals – with women particularly at risk.

Public education and business' response to HIV/AIDS will highlight the final day of the program. A documentary film, *Los Altos Story*, which will be shown at 3 p.m., demonstrates a community's reaction to the issues and faces of HIV/AIDS. The closing ceremony will begin at 5 p.m. with a candlelight vigil, a memorial and the playing of "Amazing Grace" by the Pipes and Drums of Edinboro University.

Most events in the program will take place in the multi-purpose room at the University Center. HIV/AIDS testing will be done at Edinboro's Ghering Health Center Wednesday through Friday. For additional information, call Dr. J. C. B. Kinch at 732-2617.

ACTRESS AND AIDS ACTIVIST ELENA MONICA TO SPEAK AT EDINBORO

At 26, Elena Monica's star was on the rise. Born into a show business family, her career as an actress and model had progressed from fashion magazines to cover girl, television commercials to movies of the week. Then in 1991 she was hospitalized with severe aseptic meningitis.

When she didn't respond to treatment, her doctors ran tests to find the problem. What they found was the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). Now Monica is also a woman living with HIV.

Monica will speak at Edinboro's University Center on Thursday, April 3, at 8 p.m. as part of the University's HIV/AIDS Awareness Week. She hopes to dispel the prevailing notion that HIV/AIDS is a disease that attacks only homosexuals. The fastest growth-rate of infection is among heterosexuals, with women particularly at risk.

"To be told you have a disease like this is the most devastating thing you can imagine," she says. "I was 26 and couldn't conceive that I was ever going to die, especially from something like AIDS."

To most women, HIV is a death sentence, a matter of waiting to die. To Monica, the diagnosis amounted to a wake-up call, a message to make changes within herself, to teach and to give.

"The fight mentally is the problem," she says of dealing with HIV. "How then could it possibly be the answer? The virus is like a crying child. If you demand that it keep quiet it will only scream louder, but if you listen and try to understand what the virus is crying about, then it will calm down."

Listening to the virus is part of her healing. She believes unconventional therapies – deep meditation, strict vitamin and mineral programs, and oxygen therapy – are ways she can increase her health and immune system. And with visualization, long used with cancer patients, she sees the virus in her body . . . and she sees it leaving.

Monica focuses on what she terms a "mass awakening" within the heterosexual community. By raising awareness on college campuses, she hopes to decrease the rising infection rate among college-age individuals.

"The gay community has done a remarkable job in combating this illness," Monica says.

"The rest of us need to follow their lead and mobilize to teach people. Even pre-schoolers and their parents can learn that those who are infected shouldn't be shunned or unloved."

Monica feels that by having people listen, there can be a healing. "AIDS can't be cured by science alone. It will take a lot of love. This is a wake-up call that must be answered. I realize that there has to be another way – something that could work along with or maybe even instead of conventional medicine. I know that all the healing power is inside of me. AIDS is a power turned against me. I know I have to turn it back again."

Elena Monica has committed her life to healing herself and others. She spends much of her time speaking out about HIV/AIDS; and on this journey she is happy and at peace.

The day will begin at 8:30 a.m. with music from One World Tribe. Edinboro President Dr. Frank Pogue will make welcoming remarks at 9:10 a.m. Other morning speakers will be Col. Steven Gingrich from the Pennsylvania National Guard and Rich Jessup from Family First Sports Park. Officer Fran Orzechowski from the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board will speak on the consequences of underage drinking.

Following Dr. Bias's lecture, students will attend breakout sessions in Butterfield and Hendricks Hall.

The afternoon keynote speaker at 12:30 p.m. will be Drew Brown, a nationally-acclaimed author and motivational speaker who has appeared on *Today, Live Regis and Kathie Lee*, and *Donahue*. FILMMAKER MARGIE STROSSER TO SCREEN FILMS AT EDINBORO

Independent film producer Margie Strosser will screen two of her films at an appearance at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania on Thursday, April 3. The Philadelphia director will conduct a seminar on independent filmmaking at 3:30 p.m. in G-9 Doucette Hall where she will screen her videotape *Rape Stories*. At 8:15 p.m. she will present her 1993 movie *Strange Weather*.

In October 1979, Strosser was raped in the elevator of her apartment building. Two weeks later, she asked a friend to interview her about the incident. Ten years later, she remembers and recounts the rape, revealing the emotional texture of the experience and the reshaping of the event through memory. Between these two distant and disparate versions of the same story, slips a third, that of the video narration. *Rape Stories* speaks to women's common fears and the importance of telling out stories, however painful.

Strange Weather presents a claustrophobic day in the life of a young woman, Patti, and her cohorts who are holed up in a house in South Florida smoking crack cocaine. Hurricane Andrew is brewing off the coast, and they aren't paying attention. This episodic anti-drama explores their private world of emotional blackmail, obsessive gestures and languorous attention to domestic detail. Strange Weather engages an arena of philosophical inquiry into the controversial position that drug taking holds in our culture; shows the unsensationalized flip side of taking drugs; and points to issues of morality, health, excess and truth telling.

Strosser is a graduate of Carnegie Mellon University and the film division of Columbia University's Graduate School of the Arts. She has worked as a program director for Pittsburgh Filmmakers, Inc.; producer and project director for the Medical Broadcasting Company; and was

assistant director for the Scribe Video Center in Philadelphia. She is a founding member of the Actors/Directors Laboratory in Philadelphia, and is a member of the Working Group on Domestic Violence/Child Abuse, Physicians for Social Responsibility.

Strosser's appearance is sponsored by the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts and is part of the Alternative Film Festival which is sponsored by Edinboro University's Student Government Association.
