

EDINBORO STUDENTS HAVE BOOK PUBLISHED

The students in professor Elsie Deal's class on American writers at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania are about to become published authors. As part of a class assignment, the twelve honors students wrote essays on the late American author Flannery O'Connor. Deal was so impressed with their work that she suggested their term papers on O'Connor be published in a book, *Twelve for O'Connor*.

"I thought it would be worthwhile to put the best efforts of the class into a book of student 'criticism' of O'Connor," said Deal. "I felt the students deserved it for the quality of their work – and for whatever incentive it might give them for future efforts in publication."

Deal said it is common for colleges and universities to publish artistic works of students such as poetry and short fiction, but it is highly unusual to find a book of this sort, especially at the undergraduate level.

The essays are student responses or reactions to O'Connor's works. Dr. Robert Weber, dean of liberal arts, said the essays, "are not reformulated versions of one point of view. While they cover a variety of topics, themes, patterns and ideas, they are remarkable in their insights, their novelty of approach and their attempts to come to an understanding of the works."

The students – all taking part in the University's Honors Program – are majoring in a variety of subjects and range from first semester freshmen to graduating seniors. One student, David Kerstetter of Edinboro, is a marshal at the University's Honors Convocation. Another student, Kim Jeffery of Girard, is a mother of five children, including a son, Nathan, who is also a student at Edinboro. The other students are: Heather Kensill of Erie, Amy Martin of

Meadville, Lee McCracken of Greenville, Kerri Miller of Johnstown, Alissa Ogurchak of North Versailles, Alison Pensy of Beaver Falls, Christopher Roman of Pittsburgh, Natalie Rusnak of Erie, Angela Sabol of Girard, and Judith Stainbrook of Linesville.

O'Connor is considered to be one of this century's greatest American authors. She wrote several essays and two novels: *Wise Blood* and *The Violent Bear It Away*. Following her death in 1964 at the age of 39, her letters were published in a book, *The Habit of Being*. Edited by Sally Fitzgerald, the book was awarded a Pulitzer Prize.

Introduction

The teaching of literature involves the generation of a response on the part of the students. Too often on the part of some professors the student is forgotten in the desire of the professor to express a particular point of view, interpretation, or approach. If that happens, the classroom dynamic will likely dwindle to the point where the professor might as well be talking in an empty room. The teaching of literature involves a great deal more than the sound of one voice talking; it is more than students assiduously taking notes in order to prepare themselves to memorize the professor's views; and it is more than covering

a certain amount of time or writers listed on a syllabus.

Professor Elsie Deal's honors course in American Writers focused on the work of Flannery O'Connor. The students were majoring in a variety of subjects, and they ranged from first semester freshmen to graduating seniors. Such a mix of students would ordinarily pose problems for the professor in terms of adjusting to the various levels of background and sophistication with literature represented by the students, but in this case Professor Deal was able to capitalize on the variety of backgrounds by stressing the importance of a genuine response to the material.

The essays in this collection share one thing in common: they are all genuine responses by the student. They are not reformulated versions of one point of view. While they cover a variety of topics, themes, patterns, and ideas, they are remarkable for their insights, their novelty of approach, and their attempts to come to an understanding of the works. These papers are an indication of a special dynamic that was at work

during the course, an interaction between professor and student that encouraged self-expression and even self-discovery. One does not come away from reading these essays feeling that the students were dutifully submitting their end-of-term papers; rather, one senses the emergence of an area of interest in one paper, the sense of delight in another, and the expansion of knowledge in yet another.

These papers are excellent examples of the pleasure of teaching literature--they are responses.

The idea for our project came to me one day as I was reading student responses to one of the O'Connor short stories. I was impressed by the perceptions, insights, clarity of thought, and the many points of view expressed in our small group.


I therefore thought it would be worthwhile to put the best efforts of the class (their term papers) into a book of student "criticism" of O'Connor. I felt the students deserved it for the quality of their work--and for whatever incentive it might give them for future efforts in publication. While it is common enough for colleges and universities to publish artistic works of students, i.e., poetry and short fiction, to the best of my knowledge, no publication of the type I envisioned had been done before, at least at EUP. When I told the class what I was thinking, their response was enthusiastic --to be published as undergraduates would surely be rewarding. I also believed such publication would give concrete evidence of the value of their academic performance.

So the essays were written, I hope with greater effort than would be usual for term papers. Two or three students wrote quite excellent papers. All did respectable work-- work which was interesting to read, work which could also encourage its readers to think, work which required very little mechanical correction, indeed, work which appeared to have been done with a good will. The students seemed to feel a sense of accomplishment even before papers were graded and before we knew funding would be available.

I tried to respect each student's efforts as well as each student's interests. With experience in the class so extremely varied, with freshmen and seniors, with various majors, it was important to me to see to it that students shared their ideas, no matter how disparate...it seems to have worked.



EDINBORO SCIENCE STUDENTS PERFORM COMMUNITY SERVICE AT WALNUT CREEK MIDDLE SCHOOL

Three science students from Edinboro University of Pennsylvania are each spending 900 hours of their free time in community service as part of the Pennsylvania Service Scholars program. David Ohmer (Jr., Erie), Mitch Ruzak (So., Newtown) and Eric Wiser (So., Boyertown) are working with science teachers in the Walnut Creek Middle School on several hands-on science projects with the middle school students.

Edinboro chemistry professor Dr. Theresa Thewes, who is coordinating the program, said the Edinboro students have an opportunity to serve as consultants to the middle school students and teachers. They gain valuable teaching experience while mentoring the students and assisting the teachers in their classrooms.

One project they will be working on is getting the school's waterfall and saltwater aquarium operational. In another project, the scholars have borrowed the air track from the Edinboro physics department to help the seventh graders learn about velocity and acceleration. A third project will have the Edinboro students working with the teachers to find science resources on the Internet.

Many of the projects are directly linked to the teacher's lesson or classroom activity. Much of the program takes place during the school's weekly activity period. This is a cooperative program: both Edinboro students and WCMS's principal and teachers are adjusting their schedules to best serve the middle school students.

The Walnut Creek school has a reputation for excellence in science education. One of its teachers, Ruth Ruud, a 1983 Edinboro graduate, has been nationally recognized for her work, and several of its students will be competing at the state level in the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science Competition.

Edinboro University is committed to the program with Walnut Creek for at least three years. The Pennsylvania Service Scholars made a seed grant to the University that will fund it through January of 1996. PA SERVICE SCHOLARS LAUNCH STATE COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS

[city] ([date]) -- More than 130 students from 32 Pennsylvania colleges and universities were sworn in as Pennsylvania Service Scholars in a ceremony held January 16th at the state Capitol.

The students will augment their classroom studies by working part-time in local community partnerships to address human, educational, public safety and environmental needs. The students are participating in an AmeriCorps project of President Clinton's national service initiative. The project is funded through the Corporation for National and Community Service. It is the only nationally funded statewide higher education service corps in the nation.

The program is administered in partnership by PennSERVE, the Governor's Office of Citizen Service, and the Pennsylvania Campus Compact. The swearing-in was part of a series of Pennsylvania field events on Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

At the Swearing-in ceremony, PennSERVE Executive Director John Cosgrove said the Pennsylvania Service Scholars will work in communities across the state to "continue Pennsylvania's outstanding record of youth community service."

Cosgrove noted that Martin Luther King Jr. once said that 'Life's most persistent and urgent question is: What are you doing for others?"

"These Pennsylvania Service Scholars are answering that question by helping their community neighbors while at the same time improving their own scholarship and citizenship," Cosgrove said.

The students will receive a minimum wage and will qualify for an education benefit of \$2,363 upon completion of 900 hours of service in a 3-year period. The institution the student attends will match the education award for a total benefit of \$4,726.

The colleges were selected based on a competitive process from applications from higher education institutions across the Commonwealth. Students were chosen based on merit and their accomplishments and proven interest in scholarship and community service.



MAESTRO EIJI OUE TO RECEIVE HONORARY DOCTORATE AT EDINBORO UNIVERSITY'S SPRING COMMENCEMENT

Eiji Oue, music director and conductor of the Erie Philharmonic Orchestra, has been selected to receive the degree Doctor of Humane Letters (*litterarum humaniorum doctor, honoris causa*) at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania's Commencement ceremonies on Sunday, May 14, in the University's McComb Fieldhouse.

A native of Hiroshima, Japan, Oue began his musical training at the age of four. He studied conducting with Hideo Saito at the Toho School of Music and with Larry Livingston at the New England Conservatory. In 1978, he was invited to participate in the conducting program at the Tanglewood Music Center. He returned there in 1980 and received the Koussevitzky Memorial Fellowship Prize. Before coming to Erie in 1990, Oue served as associate conductor of the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and music director of the Boston Mozarteum Chamber Orchestra.

In the summer of 1985 Oue toured internationally with the late Maestro Leonard Bernstein, conducting the European Community Youth Orchestra. The tour, dedicated to world peace, performed in Athens, Hiroshima, Vienna and Budapest. In 1989 he once again shared the podium with Bernstein during a summer tour of European cities, including Leningrad, Paris and Milan. Inspired by his studies with Bernstein, Oue credits him with "profound influence on his artistic refinement."

Oue's long-time dedication to the training and education of young musicians is evidenced by his active participation with several premier organizations. He served the Greater Boston Youth Symphony Orchestra and the Empire State Youth Orchestra as music director, and led the Greater Boston Youth Symphony Orchestra on several international tours, most recently

a concert tour of Japan. He has continued his mission to bring music to the masses by making public appearances throughout the Erie area.

On May 6, Maestro Oue will complete his fifth and final season with the Erie Philharmonic before assuming the position of music director of the prestigious Minnesota Orchestra in Minneapolis. After only five seasons in Erie, he leaves the Orchestra much richer – both spiritually and financially.

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania President Foster F. Diebold, now completing the 16th year of his presidency, will confer degrees on 732 students at Edinboro's spring Commencement ceremony on Sunday, May 14, at 2:00 p.m. in McComb Fieldhouse. With a December graduating class of 813 students, Edinboro granted approximately 1,545 associate, bachelor's and master's degrees during the 1994-95 academic year.

Carrying the ceremonial mace and leading the academic procession at the ceremony will be Dr. Bob Wallace, professor in the department of speech and communication studies and director of television and media services.

A native of Florida, Wallace earned a bachelor's degree in broadcasting from the University of Florida in 1962. He received a master's in radio and television from Indiana University (Bloomington) in 1965 and completed his doctorate in communications technology at the University of Pittsburgh in 1976.

His career began while still a student at the University of Florida. In 1961 he was an announcer for WRUF-FM, the campus radio station, and from 1960 to 1962 he served as production assistant for WUFT, the University's television studio. While at Indiana he served as graduate assistant and production assistant in the departments of radio/television and radio and television service.



STATISTICAL ANALYST AND MATH PROFESSOR COMPETES IN PAGEANT

Julie Beck Dilick is living proof that beauty, brains and personality do indeed mix.

Dilick, an honors graduate from Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, is a research/statistical analyst, a part-time mathematics professor, and a former Miss Teen of Pennsylvania. In May she will travel to Lancaster to compete for the Mrs. Pennsylvania United States crown. She was first runner-up in the contest last year and is considered a favorite to win the crown on her second try.

A native of Lander in Warren County, Dilick now lives in the city of Warren where she works for the Blair Corporation. Her husband, Shawn, is a computer specialist for the United Refining Company in Warren. Once a week she drives 30 miles to McKean County where she teaches algebra and statistics to inmates in the all-male Federal Correctional Institution, McKean.

Dilick's talent and ambition became evident as a student at Eisenhower High School. She was an all-sport cheerleader for five years, a member of the color guard in her junior and senior years, band front commander in her senior year, and graduated eighth in her class in 1985.

In the summer of her senior year she entered and won the Miss Teen of Pennsylvania pageant which was held in Reading that year. She represented Pennsylvania at the Miss Teen of America contest and, although she did not win, received a \$1,000 scholarship for raising the most money for the March of Dimes.

Dilick began to blossom while a student at Edinboro University. She majored in math with a concentration in psychology and was accepted into the University's honors program. Her scholastic ability earned her the Frank Hawthorne math scholarship, and she received the Oxford Presidential Honors Scholarship which allowed her to attend the Edinboro at Oxford University program in August of 1988. In her spare time she tutored other math students and was chosen for homecoming court in her junior year.

She credits math professors William Etling and Dr. Thomas Nufer and education professor Dr. James Flynn for being her role models. "They took time to listen to me," said Dilick. "They showed me that math is not just a bunch of numbers – it's problem solving. That's something I try to get across to my students."

She graduated a semester early in December of 1988 with a 3.68 grade point average and a dual degree in secondary education. Her academic achievement paid off with a graduate assistantship from Bucknell University. She enrolled there in February 1989 and received a master's degree in math in December 1990.

Dilick immediately became a substitute for the Warren County School District and for two months was an advanced mathematics tutor at Gannon University.

Then in the Spring of 1991, she was accepted as a management trainee at the Defense Mapping Agency in Bethesda, Maryland. Just days before she left for her new job, Shawn, who was then her boyfriend, proposed to her.

"I took the job realizing I wouldn't be staying there long because of his proposal," she said. "If we were to have any children I knew I didn't want to raise them in a big city. I grew up in a rural area, and I want to raise my children there, too."

Thus, after only a month she left her job to return to the Warren area and by July had landed her current position at Blair Corporation. Six months later, in January of 1992, she also took a part-time position as a math professor at the University of Pittsburgh-Bradford. In addition to teaching algebra and statistics to inmates at the prison in McKean County, she also teaches adult students at sites in Warren and St. Marys.

A prison may not seem like an ideal working or learning environment, but Dilick has found the experience rewarding. "Some of the best students I've ever had have been inmates," she said. "They want to better themselves to avoid recidivism. They have to pay for class and their own books. They are motivated learners."

Even though some of her students may have committed violent crimes, there are no guards with her in the classroom. There's only Dilick, up to 20 students, and a body alarm she wears which can be used to summon help within seconds.

"There's never been an incident between the inmates and a female," said Dilick. "I'm very comfortable there and have established a rapport with some of my students."

How did someone who has a gift for mathematics and teaching also develop an interest in pageants?

"It's a little girl's dream to wear a crown and shimmery dresses," explained Dilick. "I watched the pageants on television and was impressed that they were so poised and could speak so well."

In addition to her successful entry into the Miss Teen of Pennsylvania pageant, she also entered the Miss State Capital Pageant in 1990 while she was at Bucknell. That contest was a preliminary to the Miss Pennsylvania and Miss America pageants.

One of the reasons Dilick is expected to do well in the Mrs. Pennsylvania Pageant is its emphasis on personality projection.

"They look for the contestant's inner beauty, her activities in her hometown, and of course, her physical fitness," said Dilick.

Half of a contestant's score is based on an interview with the judges. The other 50 percent is spilt between the swimsuit and evening gown competitions. There is no talent portion in the pageant. In last year's event, Dilick had the highest overall score in the interviews.

"The interview category is most important to me, because a person can get only so far on looks," she said. "Being able to communicate clearly and concisely gets you much further in the world."

In addition to her own experiences as a contestant, Dilick was a national judge for the 1994 Miss Teen of America pageant, and coordinator for the 1993 and 1994 Miss Teen of Pennsylvania pageants.

Win or lose, she has no regrets about any part of her life. "I wouldn't do anything different in my life," she said. "The greatest rewards have been my husband, working with the young girls in the pageants, and touching other people and being touched by them."


