EDINBORO GRADUATES 671 IN WINTER COMMENCEMENT

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania held its annual winter commencement ceremony Saturday (December 16), with University President Dr. Frank G. Pogue conferring degrees on 671 new Edinboro alumni.

With a May graduating class of 675 students, Edinboro University granted 1,346 associate, bachelor's and master's degrees during calendar year 2000.

In his welcoming remarks, Pogue told the graduating class that they now have the distinction of joining an esteemed population of individuals who have attended public institutions of higher education.

"Nearly 90 percent of the faculty and more than half of our trustees here today chose to attend a public college or university, and I will also add that nearly every one of the members of Edinboro's senior administration, as did I, attended a public higher education institution," Pogue said.

"Edinboro graduates find good jobs in the fields of their choice, and these opportunities are enhanced through the many valuable connections that our faculty have established with professionals in the areas of education, allied health, business, communication and the arts," said Pogue. "Edinboro's animation program, for example, was recently listed among the top 15 in the nation by *Animation Magazine*, which is due largely to the connections our faculty and graduates have made in the animation industry."

Pogue continued: "Some of our graduates today are students with disabilities. I continue to be impressed by the number of students, who, despite significant physical challenges, successfully navigate this campus – even when there are several inches or feet of snow on the

ground. They strive successfully to meet every academic and extracurricular obligation, and with such amazing and talented students, it's no surprise that Edinboro University continues to be ranked among the top ten universities in the nation for our programs and services for students with disabilities.

"There are countless examples I could cite of students who have faced challenges, overcome weaknesses and maximized strengths while attending Edinboro University," said Pogue. "These stories have been routinely repeated for more than 143 years of distinguished service provided by this University, and this is the kind of success that must be expected at a public university like Edinboro."

Honorary Doctor of Public Service degrees were presented during the ceremony to Dr. John Hope Franklin and Sir George A.O. Alleyne, M.D. Author, historian and educator Franklin is the James B. Duke Professor Emeritus of History at the Duke University School of Law. In 1995 he was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Bill Clinton. Alleyne is director of the Pan American Health Organization, Regional Office of the World Health Organization for the Americas. In 1990, he was made Knight Bachelor by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II for his services to medicine.

Calling the graduating Edinboro students "my classmates," Franklin framed his advice to the graduates around a story from his days as a graduate student at Harvard. A man who worked there asked him to decipher some writing in a letter he couldn't understand. Realizing that the man simply could not read, Franklin took the time from his own studies over several months to teach the man how to read. "I've never been as thrilled in 65 years of teaching," said Franklin. "Young men and women: take the time, be civil, be leaders!"

"I am eternally grateful for this mark of distinction conferred on me as a member of the Edinboro Family," Alleyne said when accepting the honorary doctorate from Pogue. "I know that you share with me the same ideals that have guided my public and private life."

Alleyne also thanked Edinboro University and its president for the services of Dr. James Drane, emeritus professor of philosophy and Russell B. Roth Professor of Bioethics at Edinboro University. One of America's foremost authorities on biomedical ethics, Drane worked with both the World Health Organization and the Pan American Health Organization as its first resident bioethicist.

The graduates were joined by faculty and honorees in full academic regalia led by Karl Nordberg, professor in the Department of Educational Services, a member of the Edinboro faculty since 1966.

Also participating in the ceremony were Dr. Robert Weber, provost and vice president for academic affairs; Msgr. Henry Schauerman of Meadville's St. Agatha Roman Catholic Church, who delivered the invocation; the Rev. Herlies Murphy of Erie's Community Missionary Baptist Church, who gave the benediction; new graduate Junia Isiminger, who gave the student address; Alumni Association President Daniel Higham, who brought alumni greetings; and student Scott Zurcher, who led the singing of the Star Spangled Banner and the Alma Mater.

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

WIHAN QUARTET TO APPEAR AT EDINBORO

The Wihan Quartet will perform at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania on Thursday, January 25, at 8 p.m. in the Newman Center adjacent to the Edinboro campus. Named after famed cellist and founder of the Bohemian Quartet Hanus Wihan, the Wihan Quartet quickly established itself as one of the foremost younger European quartets.

Success came early for Leos Cepicky, Jan Schulmeister, Jiri Zigmund and Ales Kasprik who founded the Wihan Quartet in 1985 while studying at the Prague Academy. In 1988, they were awarded both the first prize and the prize of the Czech Jeunesses Musicales at the Prague Spring Festival International Competition. They then went on to win first place in the International Chamber Music Competition of Trapani, Sicily in 1990 and the London International Competition by an unprecedented unanimous vote of the jury in 1991. The Wihan was also awarded the Audience and Journalist Prizes of the London International.

The Quartet has been building a universally acclaimed reputation through performances in Berlin, Hamburg, Vienna, Salzburg, London, Dublin, Paris, Florence, Brussels, Amsterdam, Copenhagen, Sydney, Melborurne, Tokyo, New York and several other musical capitals of the world. Major performance venues have included Wigmore Hall, Opera de Bastille, Musee d'Orsay, Frick Collection and the Concertgebouw.

They have become a favorite of the major European live radio outlets and have established exceptional recording credentials with 14 discs released on the Bonton, Popron, Matous and Lotos labels. They are currently completing their fifth volume in an on-going Beethoven cycle for Lotos.

The Wihan Quartet continues with the best traditions of the Czech quartet school and concentrates on the interpretation of Czech composers. At the same time it enriches its concert programs with other exceptional works of world chamber music.

Edinboro University of Pennsylvania President Dr. Frank G. Pogue will confer degrees on 671 new Edinboro alumni at the University's winter 2000 Commencement ceremony on Saturday, December 16.

With a May graduating class of 675 students, Edinboro University granted 1,346 associate, bachelor's and master's degrees during the calendar year 2000.

Carrying the ceremonial mace and leading the academic procession as Grand Marshal at the ceremony will be Karl Nordberg, professor in the Department of Educational Services. A member of the Edinboro faculty since 1966, Nordberg is best known for his contributions to two seminal publications depicting the early history of the Borough of Edinboro: *Edinboro: A Dirt Street Town*, co-published with Dr. John Marsh in 1978; and *Edinboro: The Journey's End*, also co-published with Marsh in 1990. Nordberg earned both bachelor's and master's degrees from Edinboro.

Receiving an honorary doctorate during the ceremony will be Dr. John Hope Franklin, the James B. Duke Professor Emeritus of History at the Duke University School of Law. Called the 20th century's preeminent black scholar by the *New York Times Magazine*, Dr. Franklin was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1995 by President Clinton for an illustrious career as an academician and his unrelenting challenges to racism. The author of more than 12 books chronicling American history, his text, *From Slavery to Freedom: A History of African Americans*, now in its eighth printing, is widely considered to be the definitive work on the subject and remains the seminal book on African American history more than 50 years after its initial publication.

Also receiving an honorary doctorate will be Sir George A.O. Alleyne, M.D., director of the Pan American Sanitary Bureau, Pan American Health Organization, Regional Office of the World Health Organization for the Americas. Dr. Alleyne holds the degrees bachelor of medicine and surgery and doctor of medicine from the University of London, and is a Fellow of both the Royal College of Physicians, London, and the American College of Physicians. The recipient of numerous awards, he was a past appointee to the prestigious Sir Arthur Sims Commonwealth Travelling Professorship of the Royal College of Surgeons and Physicians of London, and in 1990, was made Knight Bachelor by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II for his services to medicine.

The winter Commencement ceremony will take place in the University's McComb Fieldhouse at 1 p.m., Saturday, December 16.
