A FTER electing officers, our Juniors got the year under way by contributing their unique float, "The Land of Counterpane," to the Homecoming Day Parade.


Their biggest duty, however, lay in many hours of work and planning behind the 1955 CONNEAUTTEEAN.





The Spring Concert, entitled "Moonlight on the Campus," along with the Baccalaureate and Commencement music, were the finales to a most eventful choir year.




football






as well as the whole Red Raider team.

























basketball














wrestling



Awards of pins, jackets, and blazers are given for points accumulated through participation in the various activities.














