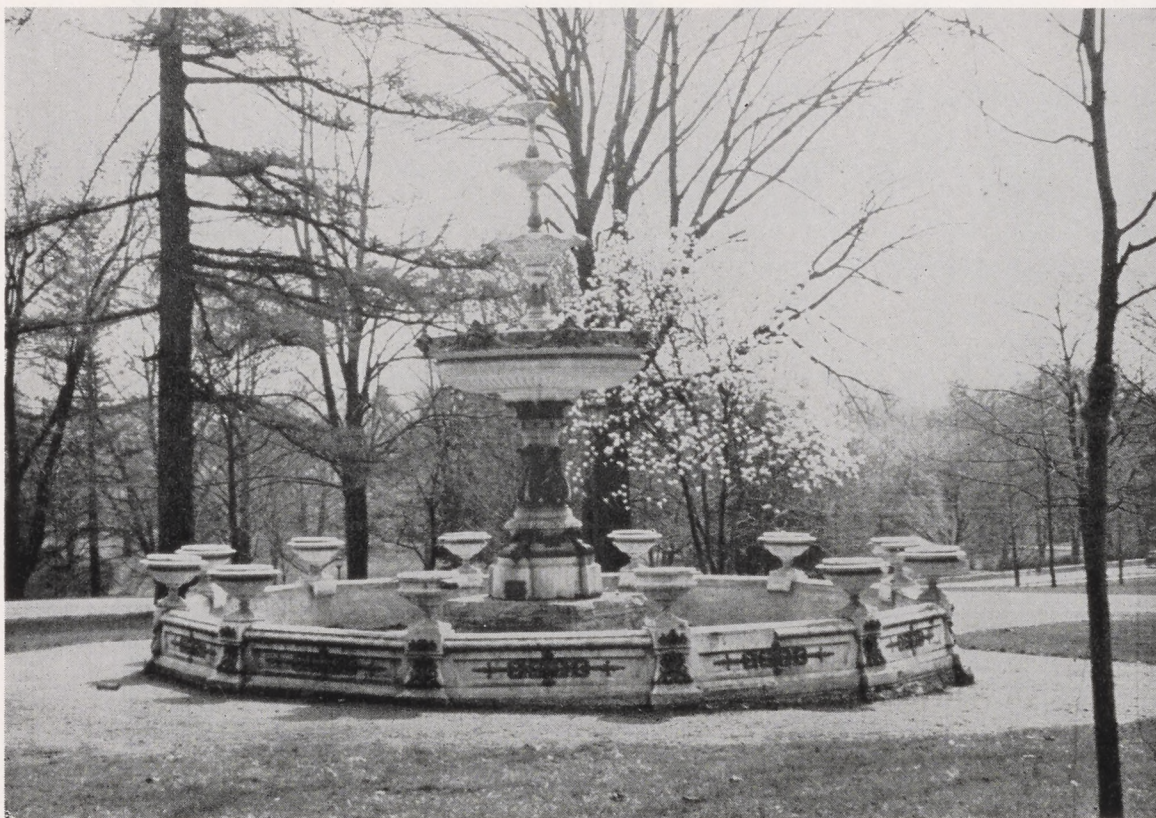

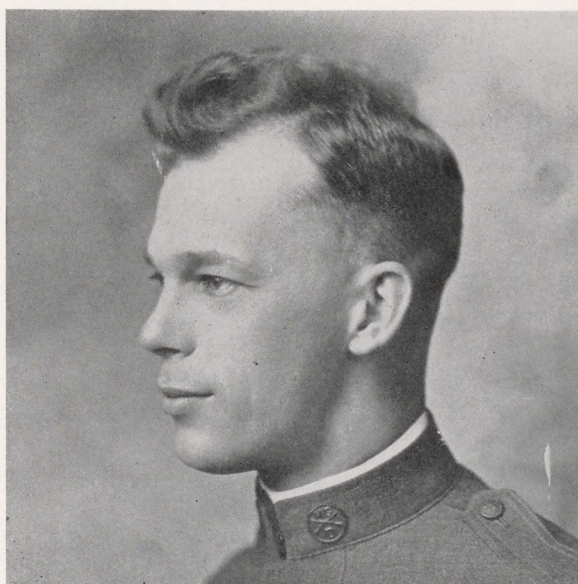

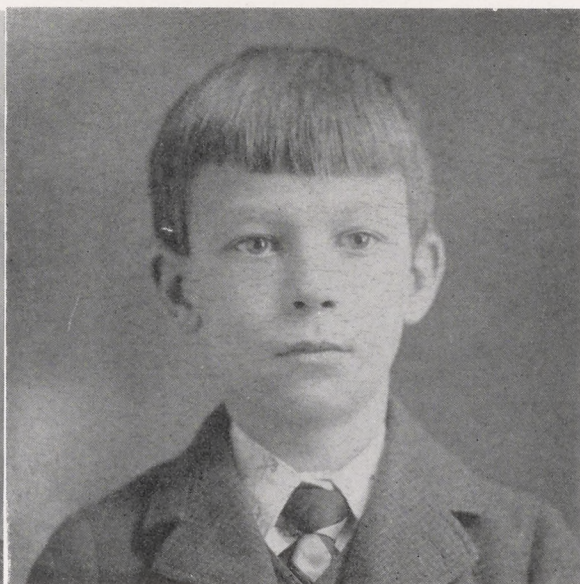

THE PRESIDENT SPEAKS . . .

"The Cumberland" has become almost an institution in the life of the College. It is now a part of the school tradition. It might be of interest to the students and the faculty to know a bit about the history of the Cumberland.

The 1947 issue of the Cumberland is the 30th issue published. The first yearbook was put out by the class of 1917. Over the years every class save one has published a yearbook.

In 1917 Dr. Ezra Lehman appointed a committee, made up of faculty members and students, for the purpose of making a study of the advisability of having a yearbook. The same committee was to suggest a name. The late Mrs. Harriet Wylie Stewart was the faculty leader and Mr. Guile Lefever, now Principal of the Gettysburg High School, was the student leader. Miss Irene Huber of Harrisburg and Mr. Hubert LeVan of Washington, D. C., were the Deans of the class of 1917 and did much work on this committee. Many names were presented. It was suggested that an Indian name be used. Conodoguinet, Conococheague, Susquehanna, Youghioghenny, were mentioned. The name finally agreed upon was "The Cumberland."

"The Cumberland" is a part of the school history. The period includes Dr. Lehman's and Dr. Rowland's administrations. Both world wars were fought during this period. Teachers have grown old during the time from 1917 to 1947. "The Cumberland" has meant much to the students and alumni of Shippensburg.

The class of 1947 is to be congratulated in putting out such a wonderful book in the face of the 1947 handicaps. I wish especially to commend the space given to our young men who served so well in the armed forces. They deserve all we can give to them.

To the members of the yearbook staff and the class deans, Miss Nora Kieffer and Mr. Harling Sponseller, I desire to express my gratitude for the publication.

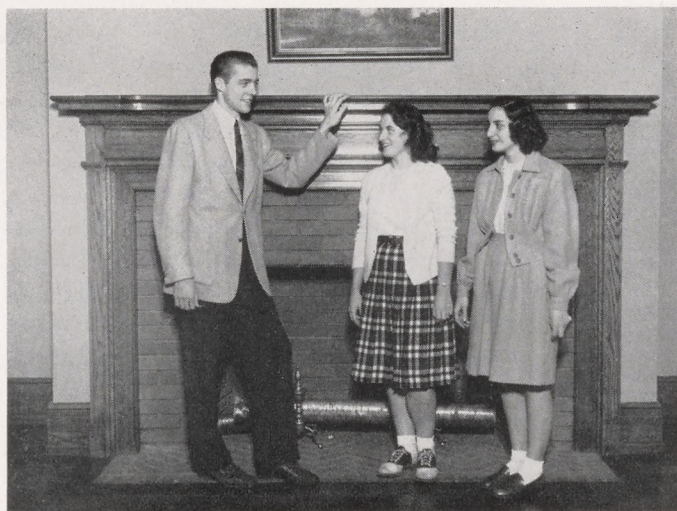

THE 1947 RED RAIDERS

In their post war return to the gridiron the Shippensburg Red Raiders finished an unimpressive season with a record of two victories, five defeats, and one tie. Coach Edward Gulian returned from the Navy to resume his duties as head coach, ably assisted by Vinton Rambo, also discharged from the Navy, and Dave Day, Shippensburg High School physical education instructor.

Inexperience and injuries plagued the efforts of the squad all season. There were only five lettermen of pre-war days back to bolster the large squad comprised mostly of freshmen. These five were Cyril Ramsay, Danny Galbraith, quarterback and passer; Earl Strohm, sturdy guard; Floyd Wolfgang, place kick artist; and Wally Aspinwall, reserve guard. The thirty-nine man squad that finished the season was the remnants of the hundred odd men that reported for practice the opening day.

The only time during the season that the Red Raiders were at full strength was for the season opener, played at California State Teachers' College. The services of two possible starters were lost early in the season. Vic Crump, who was versatile enough to play end or center, was forced to retire for the remainder of the season after aggravating a previously injured knee. John Trephan, husky lineman, was injured in the first week's scrimmage, and failed to see any action. After sustaining a knee injury in the Bloomsburg game Marty Hubley, stellar fullback, was forced to retire for the remainder of the season. Rip Collins, Cy Ramsey, Byron Ashburn, Francis Brady and Dick Wilkinson were other regulars who lost time because of injuries.

With only three weeks practice the Red Raiders journeyed to California State Teachers' College to tangle with the Penn State

freshman enrolled at California. The lack of practice was apparent in the 32-7 shellacking sustained by the Red Raiders. The victors used four complete teams in romping over the Gulian-coached boys. The only bright spot of the evening for Shippensburg was freshman Bobby Keefer's 85 yard romp for a touchdown in the dying moments of the tilt.

In the first home game of the season, the Red Raiders bounced back in the victory column with a 13-6 defeat of a Kutztown State Teachers College aggregation. Rip Collins, end, accounted for S'burg's two touchdowns, one on a fourth down end zone pass from Danny Galbraith and the other by



recovering a Kutztown fumble in the end zone. Hatfield converted both points after the touchdowns.

East Stroudsburg's water-logged field was the setting for the Red Warriors second defeat, with a score identical to the first defeat, 32-7. Rosko and Goefert lead the strong East Stroudsburg attack. Shippensburg scored in the second quarter on a beautifully executed pass thrown by Galbraith from the Shippensburg eleven and taken by Hatfield, after he had momentarily juggled it on the forty-five and outrun the secondary for a score. Wolfgang converted the extra digit.

In their best appearance of the season Coach Eddie Gulian's charges outplayed a favored Slippery Rock team to garner a well earned 13-6 victory. The line played superb ball and Steve Hatfield and Jack Hopper did some fancy ball carrying. Hatfield scored twice for S'burg and Wolfgang converted the extra points.

A Mothers' and Dads' Day crowd was disappointed in the next tilt of the season, as a scrappy Bloomsburg squad upset the Red Raiders 12-6. The locals couldn't seem to duplicate the smooth offensive of the previous game. A pass from Galbraith to Hatfield accounted for the S'burg score. Bloomsburg's last touchdown was gained through a blocked kick rolled into the end zone.

A bad case of "fumbleitis" plagued the Red Raiders in the tilt with the Millersville Teachers played at Columbia. Several scoring opportunities were thwarted, and several Millersville scores were set up by Shippensburg fumbles. The Red Raiders scored twice in the final quarter. A lateral from Galbraith to Keefer produced the score from 10 yards out. A 16 yard end run by Hatfield accounted for the other six points. Hatfield kicked the only extra point score.

Lock Haven, traditional homecoming rival, came to Shippensburg highly favored, but ran into a stone wall in the Shippensburg line. Coach Gulian's charges jumped into an early lead, with Jack Hopper scoring after a sustained drive the length of the field. Wolfgang converted the extra point. Unable to penetrate the Red Raiders line on the ground, the Bald Eagles of Lock Haven took to the air, and after being held several times within scoring distance in the second half, finally scored on a short pass from Fuefee to Dombroski. A flat pass for the extra point

which tied the ball game was successful.

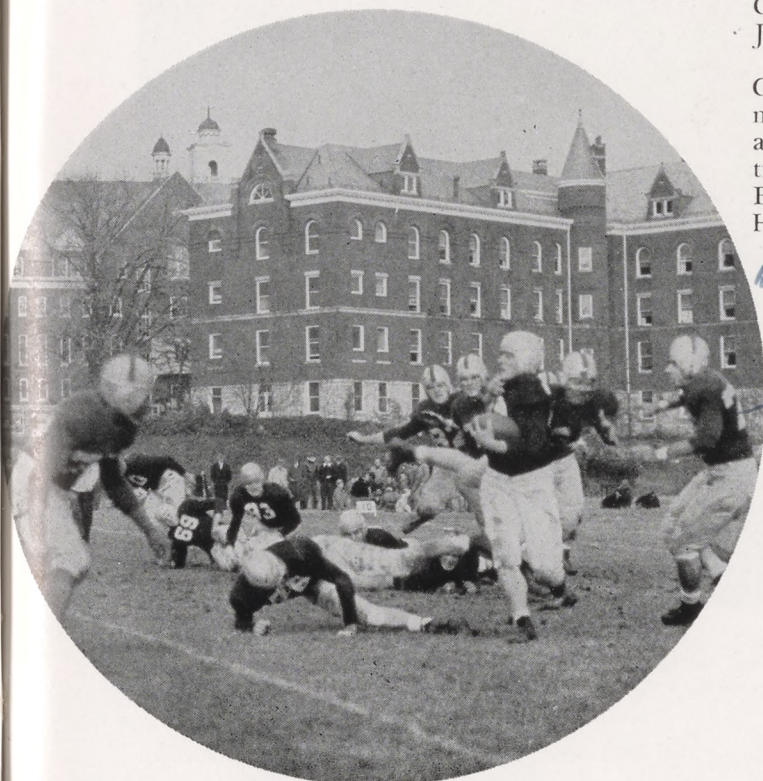
The final game of the season found the Red Warriors suffering a second half relapse, and they were routed by Indiana State Teachers College. Scoring after a sustained drive on the kickoff with Hopper and Hatfield totting the pigskin, the Red Raiders served notice of an easy victory. Unable to gain against the Shippensburg line the Indians scored in the second quarter on a twenty-four yard pass from Carlson to Stroup. Both teams converted the try for extra point, and the score at half time read 7-7. The Indiana offensive exploded from the start of the second half, and the Shippensburg defense fell apart, as four touchdowns gave the Indiana team a 32-7 verdict.

The task of moulding a varsity squad was a difficult one. A hundred and three men reported for practice when the call for candidates was issued. Along with this the coach-

ing staff had only three weeks in which to prepare for the first game. Coach Gulian used the pre-war single wing unbalanced line, and also the well known T-formation. Danny Galbraith was the man down under and did nearly all the passing. Allen, Hubley, and Hopper shared the punting chores with him.

Seven gridders played their last game for S. S. T. C. this season. They were: Cyril Ramsey, Danny Galbraith, Wally Aspinwall, Jack Roddick, Glenn Butler, and Earl Strohm, seniors, and Floyd Wolfgang, who will be ineligible to play next season. The men who earned letters this year were: Floyd Wolfgang, Byron Ashburn, Earl Strohm, Cyril Ramsey, Dan Galbraith, Glenn Butler, Steve Hatfield, Marty Hubley, Jack Hopper, Frank Pinge, Joe Nicely, Joe Lach, Rip Collins, Vic Crump, Gene Speacht, Bob Keefer, Charlie Shields, Xavier Brady, Jack Roddick, John Allen, and Tommy Durkin.

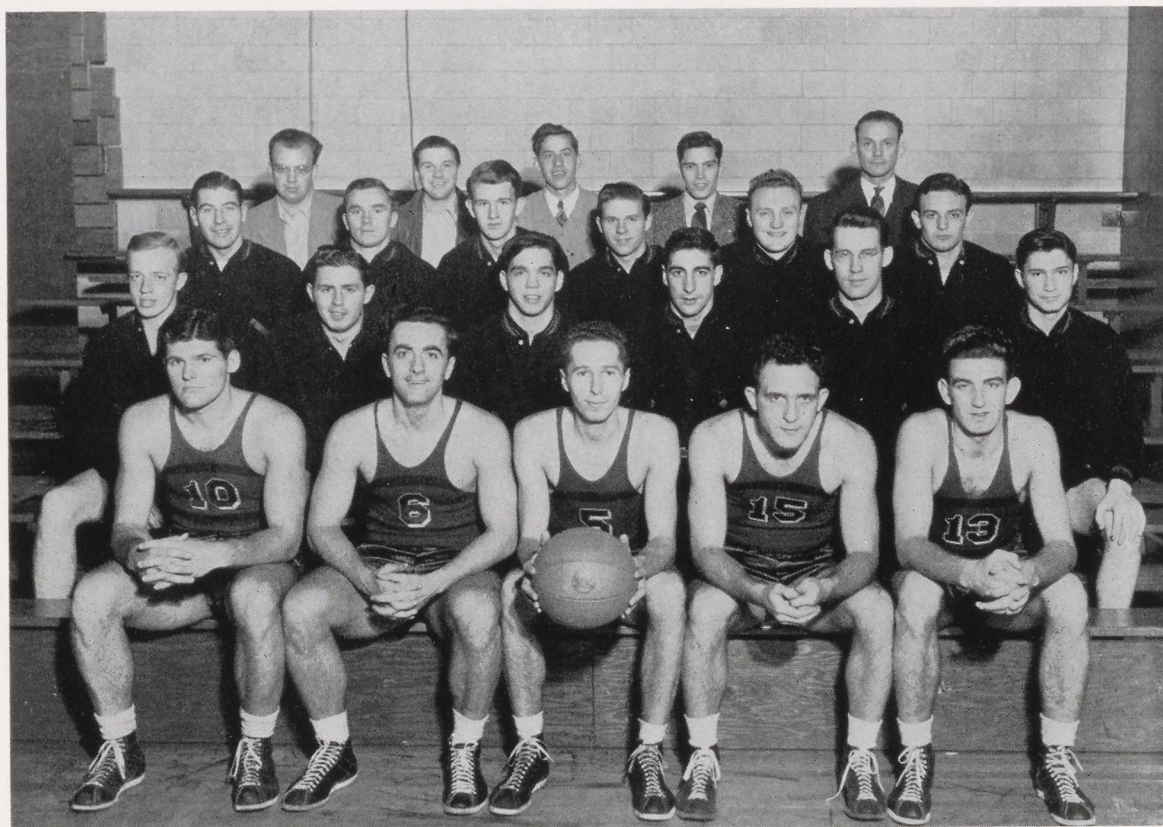

The Shippensburg Red Raiders basketball quintet opened the season with a new mentor at the helm. O. H. Kramer, Lt. (j.g.) in the Navy during World War II, coached basketball at Shamokin High School (1935-37) and Lansdowne High School (1937-43). He played on the Susquehanna University quintet in 1932 and 1933.

After three hectic weeks of attempting to organize a twenty-five man squad from a list of seventy-five candidates Coach Kramer finally selected the squad which represented STC on the hardwoods for the 1946-47 season. The roster included players from pre-war teams, hold overs from last season and freshman who had a good deal of high school and service experience.

Coach Kramer's task of moulding a winning combination was made more difficult by virtue of the fact that the men on the squad,

for the most part, have played under different styles of basketball. There were two points which Coach strongly advocated. The first was the necessity for height on a squad; the second was his inclination to favor a sliding zone defense.

Coach Kramer announced his squad as follows: Kessler (Captain), Fralick, Galbraith, Gordon, Pinge, Goodling, McClellan, Leitch, Deibler, Harris, Collins, Hubley, Book, Dodson, Filling, Rupley, Wilkinson.

Kessler, Gordon, Goodling and Harris were members of last year's squad, and Galbraith, Leitch, and Wilkinson played varsity competition here before the war.

The quintet which started the first game in which the Red Raiders defeated Carlisle Barracks 58-40 was comprised of Kessler and Fralick, forwards; Hubley and Galbraith, guards; and Collins, center.

The first game of the State Teachers College Conference was played at home, January 8, against the Bloomsburg Teachers. After a bitter struggle in which the score stood tied at 10-10 at the end of the first quarter, the lead

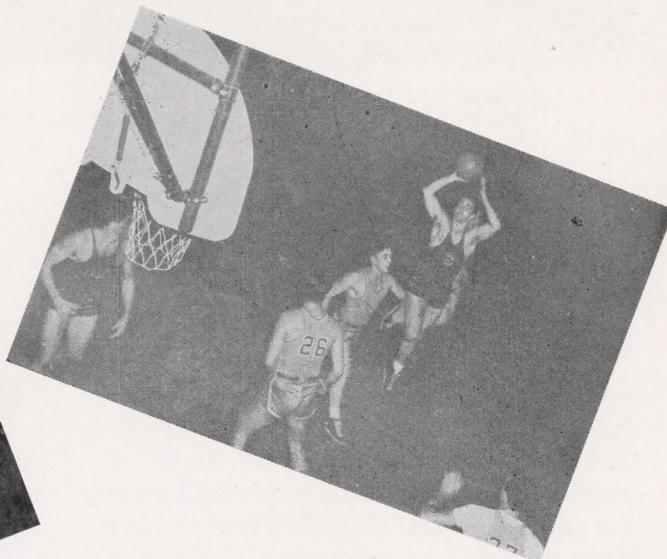
changed hands several times before a fourth period rally enabled Bloomsburg to triumph 47-42. The same combination that started the first game started this tilt.

For the first time in the history of the college, a men's swimming team was organized. It is under the leadership of Bob Holtz.

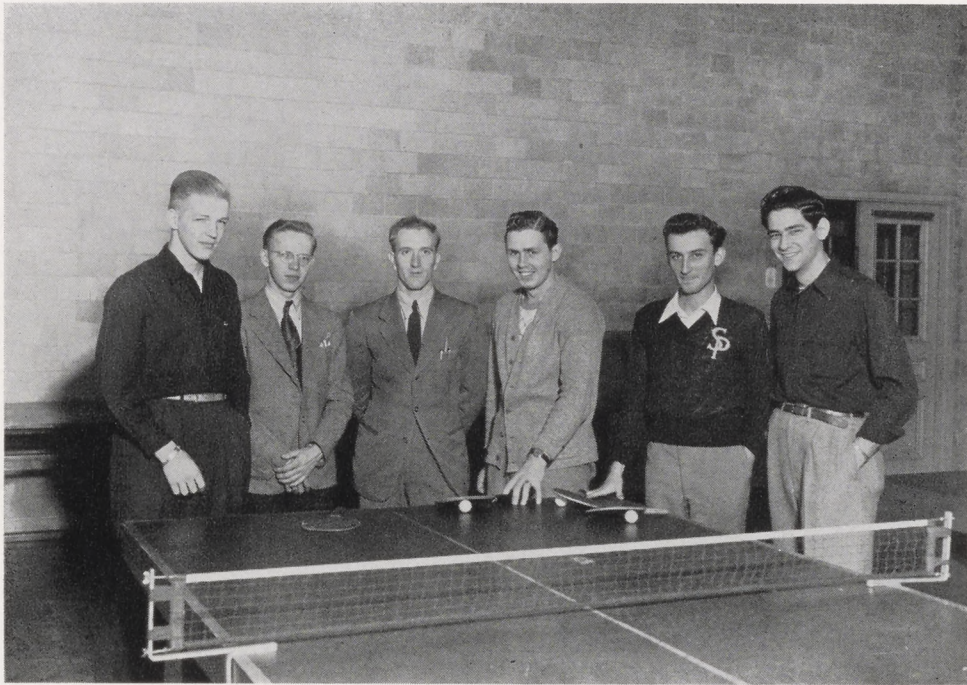
The aim of this group is to give opportunity for men interested in swimming to perfect their form and to participate in inter-mural and inter-collegiate swimming meets.

Student teaching,—those two magic words we had heard others talk about for three years was now upon us. Many of the members of our class chose to do their student teaching off the campus.

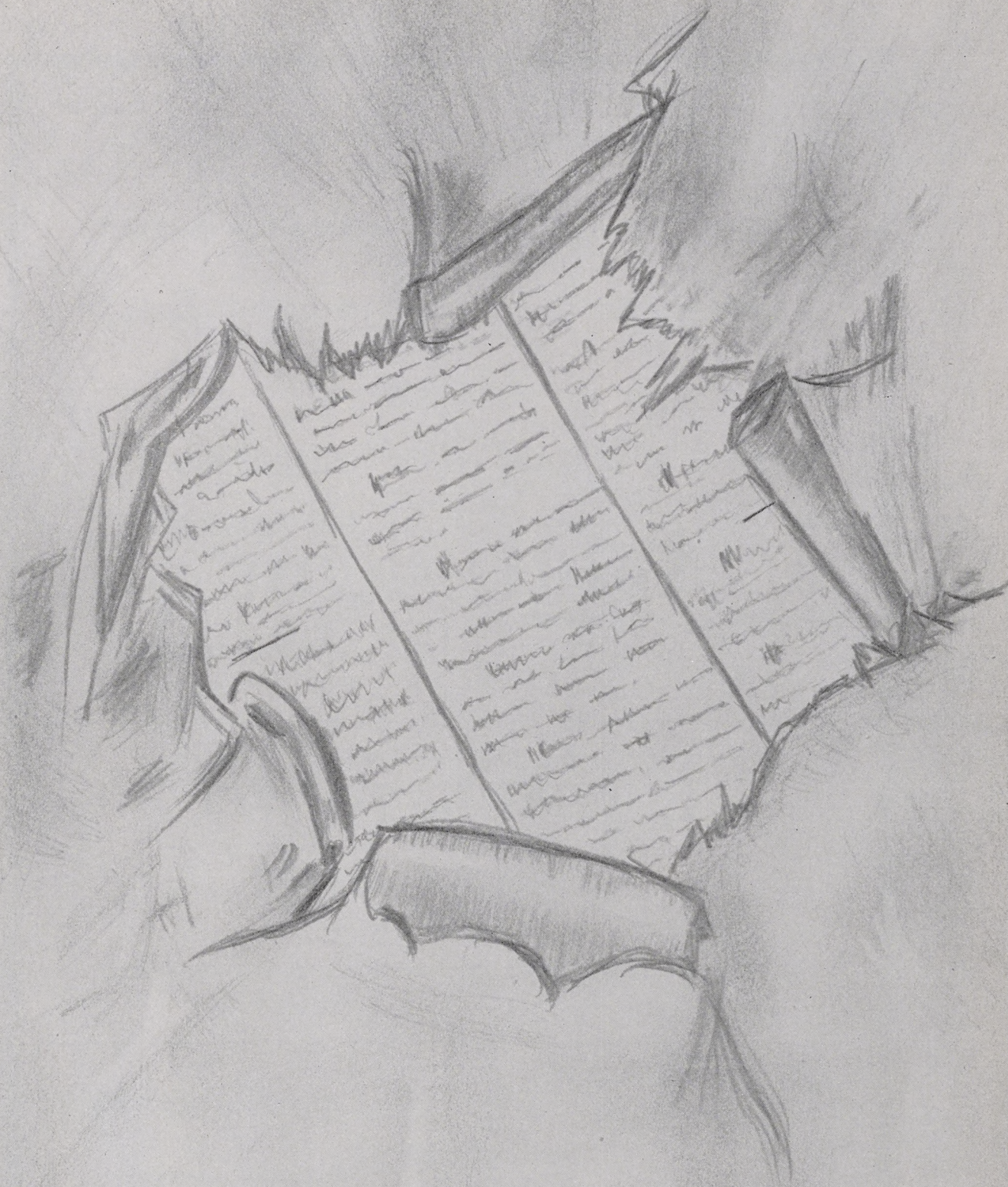
