With several schools contending for the championship, Shippensburg was in the thick of the fight until the end. When the smoke had cleared and the last whistle had blown it was certain that we had to be content with third place in a 13 team race for the coveted championship honors.

In the season's opening game Shippensburg defeated a strong and highly favored California eleven 12-0 to establish itself as the team to beat

in the teachers' conference. The game proved that Shippensburg had depth in every position and predicted laurels to be added to the many earned by former Raider teams. The Red Raiders next rolled on by defeating a weak Kutztown eleven 28-6 and continued its victory parade the following week by defeating East Stroudsburg 12-7 before a large Parents Day crowd. week when they were beaten by Lock Haven 21-0.


The final game of the season with Indiana was played in rain and sleet which fell all during the game as Shippensburg and Indiana floundered to a 6-6 tie.











## BASKETBALL

# BASEBALL



The 1947 Red Raider baseball team can be summed up in one word, "Sluggers." Starting baseball for the first time since the war, Mr. Gulian had to begin from scratch. With only one letterman returning from pre-war days the baseball squad gave a good account of itself by turning in the most successful season of the 1946-47 sports calendar at Shippensburg by winning 7 games and losing 3.

Sluggers, is, therefore, the only word which can describe a team which literally pounded its way through its opposition. Even in defeat the team's big guns were very seldom silenced. The season opened slowly and the game was not won until the last inning when Shippensburg scored the winning run and defeated Indiana 3-2. Picking up steam Shippensburg trounced Millerville 9-3, and as the hitting continued, Shippensburg defeated Bloomsburg, 9-8. Turning on its real

power the Red Raiders punished a weak Penn State Forestry School, 22-9. Shippensburg lost its first game when its infield collapsed, losing to Bloomsburg 11-6; Shippensburg celebrated its return to the win column with a victory over Kutztown, 8-4. Shepherd College from West Virginia fell next victim to the Raider batsmen by a 15-3 score. When the bottom fell out of the pitching staff Shippensburg lost to Kutztown 23-11, but returning to the win column, Shippensburg pounded Penn State for a 16-6 victory. Finally, Shippensburg lost the last game of the season to Shepherd 8-6.

With the return of the following lettermen, Captain Ernst, Troy, Warfel, Fralick, Wilkinson, Rupley, Kessler, Bolton, Kann, Shiplett and O'Donnel the 1948 season should prove successful.

# TRACK

Showing surprising strength in both track and field events the trackmen sped through a creditable season, and with a few more smiles from the elusive fates, might have emerged state champions. Coaches Bartholomew and Rambo had no cause for shedding tears, although the loss of the first meet at West Chester, 62-65, was heartbreaking. The Raider runners gained redemption by defeating Bloomsburg in the first dual-meet loss for the Huskies in seventeen years.

Stepping out of teachers college competition the Red and Blue cindermen lost a close decision while playing host to a highly rated Lincoln University team. A cold rain hampered all participants, and top sprinter Utz pulled a tendon, which resulted in the loss of crucial winning points.

The dual-meet record for the season was equalized with two won, two lost, after Lock Haven was defeated by Shippensburg.

The finish of the State meet held on Heiges field found West Chester at the top of the scoring with 70 points. Shippensburg, however, copped the runner-up position, trailing by only twelve points. Raider runners who were crowned state champs for 1947 as a result of this meet were Utz, 100 yd. dash; Stauffer, 880 yd. run; Hatfield,



pole vault and broad jump; Ramsey, discus; and Galbraith, javelin. Both Ramsey and Galbraith were undefeated during the season.

Individual scoring honors went to versatile Hatfield, while Utz and Stauffer were valuable point contributors.

Galbraith and Ramsey are the only retiring members of the team. With additional freshmen coming on to bolster an already strong team the prospects for the 1948 season are bright.

Here's luck to co-captains Utz and Tezak and the 1948 track team.






## CROSS COUNTRY

## CLASS HISTORY

In the fall of 1944 seventy students matriculated in the freshman class. In the entire student body there were only sixteen men. Those were the days of small classes, hen parties, hockey teams replacing football teams, and the inevitable freshman examinations.

Within a week during that first year we were all acquainted. The many parties which were provided for us by the various associations of the college, the Freshman-Sophomore Mix, Freshman Mix, C. C. A. Party, and the President's Reception made it easy to meet each other.

Early cooperation among the members of the class resulted in a hayride in November, chaperoned by our class sponsors, Dr. Lienemann and Mr. Grove.

At the beginning of the second semester several of our classmates left school to join the Army Air Corps. Undaunted, however, by the depression of war we retained our enthusiasm and held a White Elephant Party in January in the Game Room. A Gay Nineties Revue was presented as a Chapel program in February. In the spring we attended a Farewell Dinner in honor of Dr. Albert Lindsay Rowland, and thus ended our freshman year, a year of study and fun.

Returning to the Campus in September 1945 as sophomores, we entertained the freshmen at a Freshman-Sophomore Mix. Remembering all the fun of our hayride party of our first year, we planned another during which we were hauled in hay-filled wagons to Big Pond. Our next activity was another Chapel program, a Minstrel Show. In November Dr. Levi Gilbert assumed the presidency of the college.

At the beginning of the second semester the student body grew rapidly with the enrollment of returned service men. With renewed vigor we planned our first formal dance, the Sophomore Hop, with St. Patrick's Day as its theme. During final examinations we took time off for a weiner roast at Caledonia, and in May we helped to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the college.

We returned to Shippensburg in the fall of our junior year, bewildered by the increased enrollment of approximately seven hundred students. The men enrolled outnumbered the women three to one. Nevertheless, Big Pond was again the destination of a hayride. We invited everybody to join us on this, our annual jaunt. The holiday season began early, and we celebrated at the Mistletoe Stomp.

The climax of our social career occurred in April when we invited the seniors as our honored guests to the long-awaited Junior Prom. Near the end of our days at S. S. T. C. an all school picnic was inaugurated and held at Williams Grove.

Our senior year brought to us our last of a series of hayrides, football games, Mistletoe Stomp, basketball games, spring dances, parties, and lyceum programs. The Campus Reflector was converted into a magazine, and many other innovations at Shippensburg helped make our senior year successful.

We were initiated into the teaching field in the high school and laboratory school when we assumed our student teaching duties.

The great day came, and we were graduated from Shippensburg State Teachers College, prepared to take our place as teachers in America.

We of the Class of 1948 decided that a tribute to "Charlie" must be one of the features of our book.



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
