To the Class of 1949:


Congratulations! Your graduation from college marks another important milestone in your life. This goal has been attained through courage, perseverance and cooperation.






one's friend at S. S. T. C. By her industry and friendliness she has endeared herself to the hearts of all Shippensburg students.



# Old Main



Our laboratory school where elementary students put into practice the methods of teaching they have learned.









Eckels Field—Practice field during the football season and a baseball field in spring. Also a landing field for Santa's helicopter.

## PRESENTING THE

September, 1946, and Act II saw the "Fortyniners" portraying the leading role in initiating S. S. T. C.'s largest freshman class into the right and wrong ways of college life. New "dinks" were purchased for the benefit of the freshmen boys. These new "hats" harmoniously blended with the tone of their voices as they sang under the girls' fire escapes. An occasional "dip" in the fountain for both sexes was all a part of the frosh's introduction to campus life.

This year found our Alma Mater displaying a football team which could boast a few substitutes; a basketball team, a baseball team, swimming teams, and a track team. The men had taken their places as influential club members. The cast of our drama was no longer dominantly composed of women.

A shift in stage properties revealed the sophomores enjoying hay rides, the Sophomore Hop, a skating party, the traditional Christmas Party and Christmas Tree Sing, as well as sledding on the training school hill.

Long hours of preparation for final examinations terminated this act, and another vacation was at hand to serve as an invigorating interlude.

Fall came and we were back at Shippensburg for the third act of "Forty-niners." The scenes were both humorous and serious. Horace Mann

A. dance, Mistletoe Stomp, Junior Prom, and the Senior Dance were delightful changes.

Football gave way to basketball and basketball to baseball, while behind the scenes name cards, invitations, announcements, and applications were being prepared for their first public appearances.

Second only to student teaching was the "Forty-niners" zest for a superior CUMBERLAND. We hope we've been successful. You are our critical




who were caught without those stunning dinks, a weak memory for the Alma Mater, or lack of "respect" for upperclassmen.

The night before the first game against Kutztown at home. There was good cause for joy because next day the Red Raiders defeated Kutztown 7-6.



During intermission the meeting of actors and audience took place quickly and effectively. Intermingling of the two groups showed the friendly Shippensburg spirit.


Semester exams high-lighted Act III. Having


adapted themselves to the mood of the play the "Frosh" with a few exceptions continued successfully in the dramatization.



Early in the 1947-1948 term a small group of students expressed an interest in forming a student publicity organization on the Shippensburg campus. Realizing that the best relationships with the public can be best established and nurtured by the "products" of the college, it graduates, the club has adopted as its guiding principle the following statement: "The best advertisement for Shippensberg State Teachers College is the graduate who is a successful teacher." Such a philosophy precludes any other objective than the improvement of relationships within the college, relationships based on the spirit of co-operation and service, as a preliminary step towards the establishment of better and broader "public" relations. To this huge task the Public Relations Club hopes to contribute its best efforts.



Making its first appearances for after-dinner dances in the gymnasium, the band won recogni-


tion. This led to its providing musical back-ground for "Opus Magnum."









On the 16th of April Warfel again took to the mound to defeat the Millersville aggregation by a score of 5 to 2. Bud helped our cause with eight strike-outs and a perfect day at the plate. Joe Troy pounded out a fence-rattling triple.

May 11 Bloomsburg invaded our campus and was sent home on the short end of a 15 to 3 drubbing. Bud Warfel in his fifth win with no defeats limited the Bloomers to five hits, struck out six and contributed to his own cause with three doubles in five times at the plate.

Mt. St. Mary's was the next team to come to

the campus. They were shut out 6 to 0 by Bud Warfel. It was Bud's sixth straight win as well as his most impressive. Although the "Mount" nicked him for nine hits, Bud sent eight men down swinging.

May 22nd was Alumni Day on the campus and the team played its final game of the season. The Raiders bowed to Shepherd State Teachers College of Virginia by a 2 to 0 score. Warren Hassinger was the losing pitcher, although he gave up only four hits.

Shippensburg's record for the season was seven wins and three losses with a great many games rained out. Biggest casualty of the season was Outfielder Jim Shipplett who suffered a broken leg while sliding in the first Mt. St. Mary's game.

Coach Knapp is to be congratulated for doing a fine job in his first year as baseball coach at Shippensburg.

The best batting average for the team was made by Catcher Dick Bolton, with a healthy .488, followed by Captain Reed Ernst with a solid .400










Members who had taken the life saving course taught groups from the training school and the Beginners' Swimming Club on campus.




Acrobatic abilities are demonstrated in chapel programs and in May Day performances. Football fans attending the Homecoming Game also witnessed the skill of this group.




