You have been a real credit to yourself, your profession, your country, and your God. All of us congratulate you on your achievements. We will never forget you.

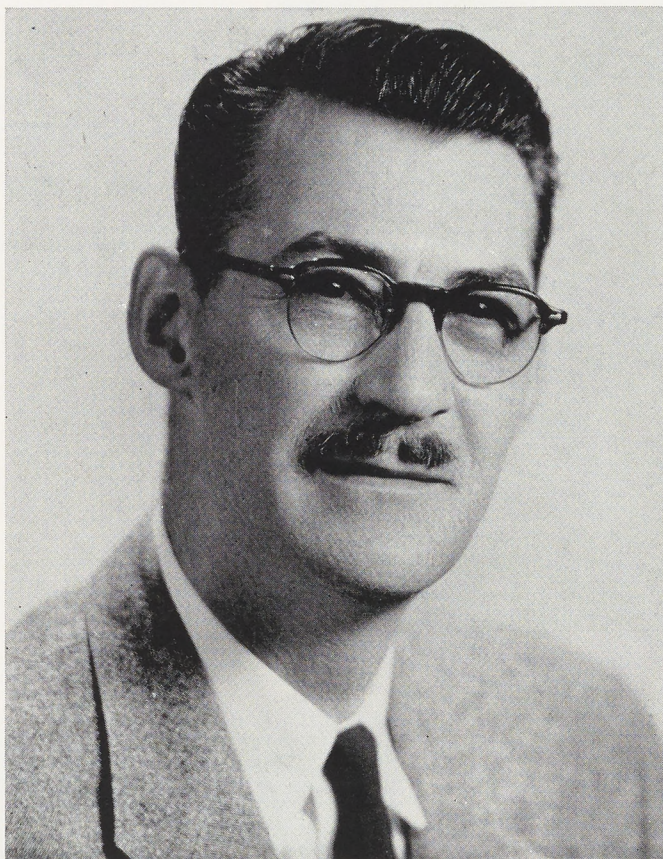

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

The student government is composed of several groups. The President's Council, which is comprised of the President of the College, the Dean of Instruction, Dean of Men, Dean of Women, and the presidents of the various organizations on campus.

The Council acts as an airing house where all the wants and gripes of the organized clubs on campus can be heard in front of representatives from the rest of the groups. If the Council and Dr. Kriner believe that the group in question has a legitimate plea, then the situation is rectified.

In addition, the Council controls the money of the student activity fund, determines the school budget, and determines the school policy on extra-curriculum activities.

The Stewart Hall Council is the governing body for the student recreation building. Recommendations for the improvement of the facilities of Stewart Hall are submitted to the college president by the Council. The Council and Dr. Kriner plan the schedule by which Stewart Hall is opened and closed, and arrange for its use by groups within and outside the college. Membership on the Council is by election by the President's Council.

The Boarding Women's Association has as its creed: "That the women students may live together advantageously for all, each woman should do her part to develop a spirit of cooperation, to cultivate courtesy, to consider the rights of others, and to maintain high standards. By assuming such responsibility each woman student will grow in character and in power, and the best interests of the College will be promoted."

The Boarding Women's Council is the governing body of the dorm. This organization settles any problems which may arise and enforces all rules and regulations.

The purposes of the Boarding Men's Association are to promote the establishment and maintenance of the highest standards of efficiency in the administration, policies, and scope of dormitory living; to enact regulations to achieve those purposes; and to provide procedure for their enforcement.

The Council is the effective governing body of the Boarding Men's Association. It meets at the call of the president to consider such problems as may arise.

The Day Women's Association is the governing body of all women day students. The association meets once a month to discuss all business relative to the group. It formulates rules and regulations to govern the Day Women for the common good.

The Day Men's Association is composed of the male students of the college who are registered as day students. The main purposes of the organization are to give the Day Men a voice in college affairs and to give them a chance to organize their activities.

There was no revenge for the Red Raiders game with California in a 19-13 loss. Jim Baker, Jack Connor, and Don Stankus scored for the Red Raiders.

The Roddick men looked like the "old big red" rolling up 48 points against Montclair. 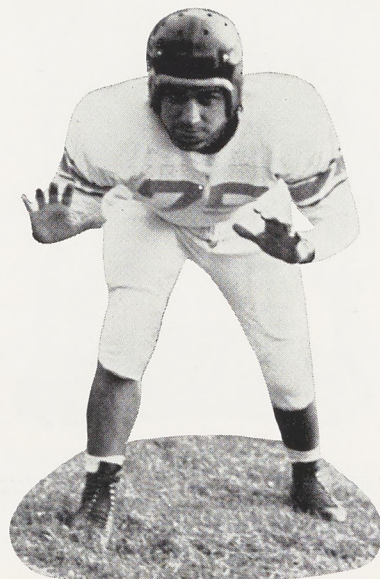

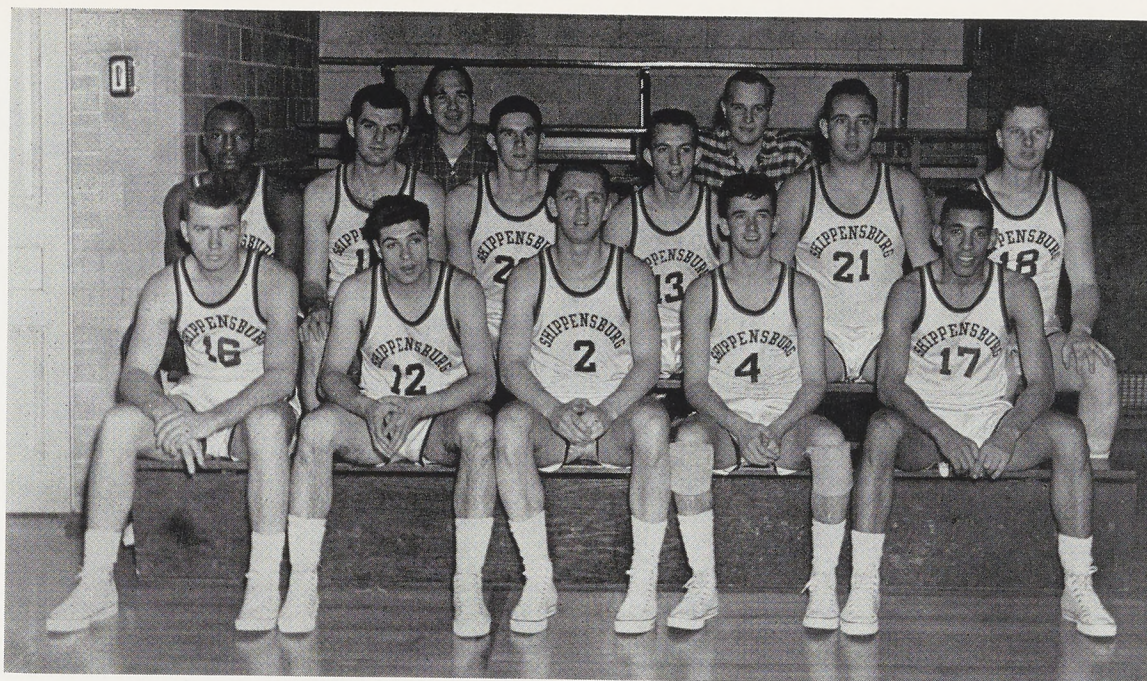

The team lost the following players through graduation: Captain Dick Osman and George Murdock.

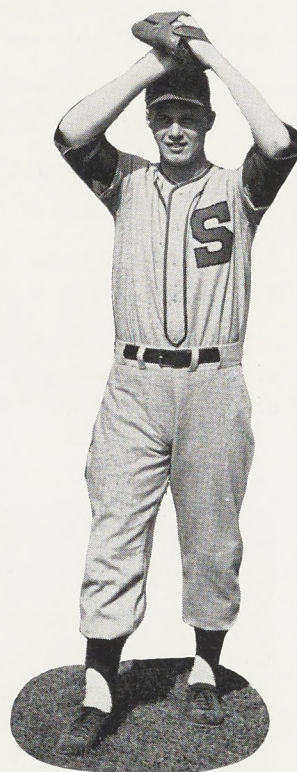

The trouncing given Lock Haven made the fourth consecutive win over this rival.

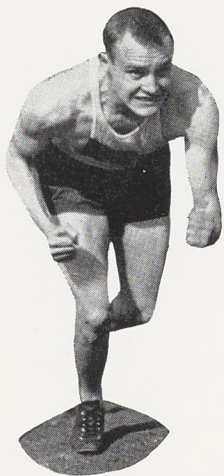
The captain of the track team this year was Harry Verdier.
