CUMBERLAND's Year-in-Review 5

Serving the Campus Community

Some say that two heads are better than one. Because of a merger between the Shippensburg University Police Department (S.U.P.D.) and the Mid-Cumberland Valley Regional Police Department, this statement holds true here at Shippensburg University.

"Shippensburg University has

always had a full fledged, professional Police Department," said Chief Herb Bowers. Director of Public Safety. To add to the efficiency of the department, the S.U.P.D. received a federal grant

enabling it to hire three new officers to help with the bicycle and foot patrols

around campus.

Due to a process called Community Policing, a merger was established between the two departments. Both departments became better equipped since the merger, because they were able to offer each other assistance in any type of emergency. It has been beneficial for the S.U.P.D. to have jurisdiction on and off campus, because a large majority of students live off campus.

In 1990, when the suggestion first arose for arming the S.U.P.D., it was not supported. Now, the university president, Student Senate, and other campus leaders have all lent their support to the decision. All of the officers hired by the university are trained in the same manner as State Police officers.

The registered weapons assigned to the officers are Smith &


> Wesson 40-caliber with an unique safety that can be activated by someone right- or lefthanded. The use of a three-tiered holster is another safety feature. This keeps the gun from


photo by Dave Mackley being pulled easily from the holster in a struggle. The S.U.P.D. will have to adhere to a strict weapons policy.

The addition of monitoring cameras has cut back on the cost of hiring new officers. Emergency phones were updated with four new tall blue light emergency boxes installed across campus. The S.U.P.D. wants the students to receive an education, but also be safe and secure.







Creating a Family Atmosphere

Every residence hall on campus needs to have a residence director and resident assistants. These forms of authority must be present in order to provide a safe and structured living environment for those students who reside in the halls on campus.

According to Xay Chongtua, residence director of McLean Hall,

becoming a residence director requires a lot of time and persistence. Residence directors must fulfill various duties while employed by the university. They must assist the resident assistants and desk

assistants at the residence hall where they reside. For five hours a week, each residence director must work at the Dean of Students office in either the Multiculturalism or Housing departments. The R.A.'s also must hold ten office hours a week, attend weekly staff meetings with the resident assistants, and bi-weekly meetings with the desk assistants.

Benefits in becoming a residence director are numerous. The experience of working with undergraduate students is one benefit.

Also, being a role model to the campus' students and watching them

grow are rewards for every residence director. Common goals between all residence directors include building a community within the residence halls.







Campus consisted of a mere three buildings one hundred years ago, and has expanded to the nearly


thirty buildings we see today. Brand new buildings have also been constructed in the 1990's to give students every benefit modern technology has to offer. The newest building, Grove Hall, boasts state of the art classrooms and equipment, and houses a television studio used by Media Services, SUTV and classes.

A central point on campus where students can be found at all hours of the day is the Math and Computer Technology building. The MCT became less crowded during the 98-99 academic year, thanks to the implementation of the ResNet system. Residence halls were modified to allow students with a computer in their room to have direct access to the university e-mail system, as well as

the internet. An added advantage of the ResNet system was that it provided a cable television jack in each residence hall room. Prior to the ResNet system, cable was a luxury known on campus only to Seavers residents and the Resident Assistants in each hall.

Technology is not the only way

the university has improved. Recreational facilities for students have changed every so often to meet the needs of students. What is now the weight room in Heiges used to be a bowling alley, and a full golf course used




Improvements are taking place every day across campus, some drastic, while others seem barely noticeable. The university does its best to provide a quality way of life for students, while improving academically, one step at a time.





The common cold. A sore throat. Aches, pains, and muscle strains. These are just a few of the many health issues dealt with on a daily basis at the Etter Health Center.

The self care unit, available to students 24 hours a day, allowed students to check their own weight, temperature, and tonsils. The unit

also offered medicine students could take for their described symptoms. Etter also offered free pregnancy tests, sick beds for those students who were too ill to

leave, and informational pamphlets on drugs, alcohol, sex, birth control, good health, stress and sexually transmitted diseases. Etter even offered a quiet room in which students were able to study or rest without disturbance. Etter also offered heating pads for muscle aches, ace bandages, and ice for sports injuries.

At the Health Center, there were usually three registered nurses on duty 24 hours a day. The doctors' flexible hours were from 10 a.m. till 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. till 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. This gave

busy students time to schedule an appointment when they were ill. Some of the doctors at the center were employed by the Carlisle Hospital, and one was in the process of starting his own practice.

During two separate meningitis incidents, the center offered testing and precautionary medicine for


> those who felt they were at risk. Etter also offered the availability of mononucleosis tests and information for students who may have been at risk for the disease.


All costs of care at Etter Health Center were paid for by student tuition fees. The university also provided

student insurance in case a trip to the hospital was necessary.

At Etter Health Center students received care that was appropriate to their needs. The staff at Etter worked hard to keep Shippensburg University a healthy community.



Last call for alcohol and the slow songs begin. Through your beer goggles you make eye contact with the one you have been gazing at all evening. "Maybe the fun is just beginning," you think to yourself. Finally, the fruit-flavored condom you bought in the Sheetz bathroom will come in handy.

Studies have proven that the use of a latex condom gives reliable protection against sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV. Condoms and spermicides were available without a prescription at a wide

variety of stores. This was a relatively inexpensive and convenient way for college students to protect themselves.

Birth control pills were still the number-one method of pregnancy protection used by women. Planned Parenthood in Shippensburg provided birth control pills at a lower cost than pharmacies. To utilize this service, students were first required to undergo an initial exam at the clinic.

Other contraceptives were ing to the average student. One such example was the female condom.


Women used this to protect against STDs if her partner refused to wear a latex condom. The cost of the female condom was the only disadvantage.

Spermicides and contraceptive films, when used correctly, were also effective. However, they had to be inserted within a certain time-frame before intercourse, which was incon-

venient for the user.

Some people consider pornography to be dirty and tasteless. Others not only condone, but partakein pornographic activity. Both males and females purchase magazines and videos



Can I Buy You a Drink?

Everyone remembers different things from his or her college years. Some reflect fondly on the lifelong friendships they made. Others reminisce about their individual academic and athletic achievements. Many look back on the life-lessons college has provided.

Then there are those who

remember only the alcoholic haze that defined their college experience.

Alcohol use among college students is common and often

characterized as binge drinking. This is the consumption of five or more alcoholic beverages in a single sitting.

Students' reasons for alcohol use are as diverse as the students themselves. Some use alcohol as a social crutch that loosens them up and makes social situations more comfortable. Others drink to avoid or relieve the stress that often accompanies academic and other pressures. All students who drink are physically and mentally affected by their drinking.

The physical effects of alcohol include increased heart rate, loss of

muscle control leading to slurred speech and poor coordination, impaired reflexes and unconsciousness. Alcohol also causes respiratory paralysis that could result in death.

The mental effects of alcohol are characterized by impaired judgment, thinking and reasoning processes, and the loss of inhibitions.


> Alcohol consumption often leads to dangerous health decisions, including driving under the influence and engaging in unsafe sexual activity.

Combining sex and alcohol can result in serious consequences, including

emotional distress. Unplanned pregnancy and STD's can also result from alcohol-related sexual encounters.

In their pursuit of higher education, college students should realize the importance of educating themselves about the consequences of alcohol use in addition to their academics. The college years are few, but memories will last much longer if they are unclouded by overconsumption of alcohol.



No matter who the person may


be, every student, in some way, fits the image of the typical college student. These are just a few of the areas that make college students typical, even though they are not true about every student. Difference will always pre-

students. Among them were intake interviews, individual counseling, group counseling and crisis intervention. Psychiatric services, outreach services and consultations were other methods available to students. These services were aimed at helping students face and overcome any personal, social or career concerns. These stresses may compromise academic performance, social skills or overall enjoyment of their college experience.

Students who sought assistance from the University Counseling Center shared many common concerns. These included difficulty with family problems, trouble between friends or roommates, and bouts of depression or anxiety. The Counseling Center also assisted students worried about selfidentity and personal value. In addition to personal and social concerns, the Counseling Center provided assistance with academic problems, such as deciding on a major or career path.

> The staff of the University Counseling Center was comprised of Mary Bradshaw, Center Director, Kathryn Kurdt, Michelle C. Stefanisko, Paul Dickerson and Bonnie


students also lent some assistance to the center. The primary responsibility of the entire staff were respect, prompt service, and counseling decisions.





student panel and nutritionist speaker presented helpful information during a question-and-answer discussion.




Many students, faculty and staff have been the target of discrimination and hate due to their race, religion, culture, sexual orientation or physical handicap. S.U. has provided








She found that the whole learning experience was very different from that in Germany, especially the Psychology program. People on campus were much friendlier and the culture seemed more diverse than in Germany.

Achieving Their Goals and Dreams

Over the years, there have been many successful alumni who have graduated from S.U. Some of these famous alumni include Steve Spence, Dean Koontz, Carl Barger and Jeanne Bowers Shaheen.

Steve Spence, an '85 graduate, was a six-time All-American in crosscountry and track and field, won two national NCAA Division II titles and helped the track team to three P.S.A.C. titles. After graduating, Spence became an internationally recognized marathon runner, ranked first in the world in road

racing, and placed twelfth in the Olympic Marathon during the '92 Olympics.

Dean Koontz graduated with a degree in English in 1966. During his senior year, a professor entered one of Koontz's short stories in the Atlantic Monthly competition, which he won. Koontz credits his success to Ship professors, Richard Forsythe and John Bodnar. His

novels have been translated into 17 languages and have sold more than 50 million copies worldwide. The LA Times and People Magazine have denoted this 1981 Jesse S. Heiges Distinguished Alumnus Award winner as "possibly the least known, best selling author in America.'

Carl Barger, a 1952 graduate of

S.U., received the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1983. Graduating with a bachelor of science degree, Barger continued his education at Dickinson Law School. He eventually earned the top slot of 785 aspiring lawyers to take the bar exam in 1958. Barger became the senior partner in a law firm that eventually purchased the Pittsburgh Pirates. He then became the first president of the Florida Marlins in 1991. Unfortunately, Barger died in 1992 at the age of 62, before the Marlin's first game.

Jeanne Bowers Shaheen graduated in 1969 with honors in English. She then went on to earn her Master's degree from the University of Mississippi in 1973. While attending Ship, Shaheen was an active member of the Student Government. Shaheen went on to become New Hampshire's first female governor.

These successful

alumni are only a few of the many graduates from Ship. According to Carl Barger, "There is no question but that Shippensburg provided me with a springboard to whatever successes I have enjoyed. Some of my fondest memories are from Shippensburg."






A joint agreement between the

University and Shippensburg Area School District provides that university faculty teach pre-school, kindergarten, first and second grades. Third through sixth grades are taught by Shippensburg School District teachers. The 1998-1999 school year was the last year that Rowland Hall housed the sixth grade. This changed

due to a reorganized middle school in the district. With the loss of sixth graders, the 2000 school year will introduce a new program. This program will be an infant/toddler class for children and parents, which will be led by S.U. students.

Rowland is a public school on the university campus. It provides college students a chance to learn about the education field. Education majors become involved with Rowland early in their sophomore year. This gives them a chance to decide if they still want to major in Education. The children adjust well to the students observing them in their classes. Kent Chrisman, Director of Rowland School, agreed with this by saying, "They get accustomed to people being in and out, and

Helping Students Benefit From Technology

There's a secret hidden in the basement of Grove Hall, unknown to many students. A place where students can borrow video cameras, have posters printed, or have projects laminated. All this and more can be found in a place known as Media Services. These are just a few of the many jobs offered by this little known service.

In the classrooms, Media Services provides and maintains the video equipment, including televi-

sions and VCRs, overhead projectors, as well as slide projectors. Many professors utilize this equipment as an alternative to the typical lectures of their subject. Media Services also provides assistance to help a person understand a difficult piece of equipment; they perform maintenance or repairs on equipment.


Media Services began in 1968 as part of the Comm./Journ. Department. Students from all majors have played a crucial part in its existence. The service, once located in Shippen Hall, moved to the new Grove Hall in 1997. The service has also expanded in size as new technologies emerged. One such piece of advanced equipment was the

Microwave/Electronic News Gathering truck which was obtained in the fall of 1997. This truck is used as a teaching tool for the Comm./Journ. Department, as well as a remote broadcasting link for organizations such as SUTV and WSYC. It includes a complete production studio, four digital cameras, as well as many other pieces of high tech equipment.

With such services and devices available, Media Services institutes a strict policy on all of their loans. A 24-

hour notification period was needed to obtain any equipment needed in the classroom or other areas. This included all video and audiovisual equipment. Some pieces of equipment can be checked out for a varying amount of time, from one day to the whole semester. The loan period depends on the availability and

requests for specified equipment.

Building Toward the Future

Students benefit from the Shippensburg University Foundation in ways that they may not realize. Two recent examples are the John L. Grove Hall and Stone Ridge Commons, the new apartment complex located beside College Park Commons. The construction of these buildings was funded through monetary resources that were collected into an unrestricted fund for such purposes by the S.U. Foundation.

In 1977, the need for private funding to continue Ship's level of

excellence was recognized. From this, the S.U. Foundation was formed. The purpose of the foundation was to receive private gifts and grants for the ultimate use of S.U. The S.U. Foundation opened its doors under the leadership of its first president, Richard D. Rife. The University was faced with rising

costs, which created tremendous financial pressures in its operating budget. Therefore, the University was forced to rely on increased funds from private sources. The total cost requirements of educational opportunities were not met by state funds or tuition and fees. The S.U. Foundation provided for the University to enhance its educational abilities through increased funding.

The S.U. Foundation Board of Directors allocated funds when the need was the greatest by identifying areas of ongoing and critical need. These areas included scholarships and technology, as well as faculty professional development. The S.U. Foundation had the authority to receive current gifts and grants as well as deferred gifts. Among these gifts were charitable trusts and annuities. The board of directors was given the authority to receive funds to endow scholarships, fellowships, and professorships.

> They also had the authority to accept donations for purposes such as buildings, equipment, and land acquisition. The S.U. Foundation activities were managed by the board of directors composed of both alumni and non-alumni friends of the university.

The S.U. Foundation has given contributors a wide variety of gift giving options for gift-giving for over twenty years. The

contributions toward the S.U. Foundation are many, but the contributions the S.U. Foundation gives back to the university and its students have made an incredible difference in the quality of education that can be found at Shippensburg University.



A New Look For An **Old Favorite**



Making Future Leaders Out of Today's Students

Leadership. Time management. Collaboration with colleagues. Public Relations. Networking. These are the skills that one may acquire in a leadership program. Here at Shippensburg University an entire program was devoted to the development of our future leaders.

Leader@Ship was started four years ago under the initial leadership of Linda Boeckman and Marvin Worthy, Assistant Dean of Students. It enabled students to take active

leadership roles within the Shippensburg University community.

Leader@Ship was a program designed for students who wished to develop their strong leadership abilities. These skills would further enhance their college experiences, as well as increase their marketability for future job opportunities. Each level had different

goals and objectives that were taught to the students involved with the program. The level for emerging leaders is catered to students who had limited leadership experience, but had the desire to become a leader. Each session that was held in this track lasted about one hour in length. Students learned how to build their self esteem, work with ethics, deal

with stress management and work well within groups.

The second level, which usually dealt with leadership and development topics, was geared toward students who already had taken some type of leadership role and possessed the potential to be a good role model. Students learned the role Public Relations played in an organization. Students in the advanced level also learned how to network, set goals and market their

leadership experiences. Each session that was held at this level lasted about 90 minutes in length.

There were three phases that helped students become acquainted with the program. For the orientation phases, students were given a list of events that occur, and were asked to communicate with



December 19, 1998 turned out to be an unusually warm day. Inside Heiges Field House, however, a familiar feeling of warmth was left by family and friends of the 1998 Graduating class.

Graduation consisted of 501 undergraduates and 194 graduates. The candidates for undergraduate degrees included 178 Bachelor of Arts, 139 Bachelor of Science, 103 Bachelor

of Science in Business Administration and 81 Bachelor of Science in Education.

The Class procession was led by Louise Boxdale, an alumna who graduated from Shippensburg in 1924. After the graduates reached their seats, the National Anthem began and was led

by Denise N. Yarbough. Reverend Janice M. Bye of United Campus Ministry gave the invocation and the guest speaker was Samuel A. Kirkpatrick, Ph.D.

Doctor Kirkpatrick got his doctorate in political science at Pennsylvania State University. He became the president of the University of Texas at San Antonio, in 1990. His presence at U.T.S.A. over the years brought about numerous positive changes, including an increase of enrollment. In 1987, Shippensburg University presented him with the Distinguished Alumnist Award for his many achievements.

Following Dr. Kirkpatrick's inspirational words, James L. Sieber, Ph.D. presented the Honorary Doctoral Degree candidate. The presentation of awards for Outstanding Young







A Reminder of the Past

Originally called the Mount Jackson School or Potato Point, the Little Red Schoolhouse is now recognized as an official historical structure of the Pennsylvania Historical Commission.

Constructed in 1865, the school was used until 1954 to teach the "Golden Rule" and other basic lessons to students from ages five to 21. These pupils often traveled two or three miles to attend school.

High school was not manda-

tory; instead, emphasis was placed upon graduation from eighth grade.

The teacher of the schoolhouse served not only as teacher but as doctor and janitor as well.

Teachers were expected to sweep the floor and clean the chalkboards once a day.

Numerous other rules were implemented for female teachers in 1915. They could not keep company with men or marry during the term of their contract. Also, they had to spend the hours of 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. at home unless attending a school function.

A female teacher could not ride in a carriage or automobile with

any man unless he was her father or brother. When she did travel, she could not go beyond city limits without permission from the Chairman of the Board. Dressing in bright colors and smoking were forbidden, and under no circumstances could the teacher dye her hair. These rules may seem outrageous now, but were strictly enforced for teachers in oneroom schoolhouses.

The schoolhouse was reconstructed in 1969 in the area once known as the

Shakespearean Theater. The bricks, desks, and potbelly stove are original, while the floor had to be reconstructed to resemble the original. Electricity and heat were also added. The relocation of the school to Ship was important because the university has always been concerned with all aspects of teacher

education.

Since its arrival at S.U., many professors have taken classes to the schoolhouse to learn about its historic background. Although times have changed, The Little Red Schoolhouse continues to play a positive part in the educational process.

Making Research a Convenience

Almost every student who has attended S.U. has had the experience of using the ELLIS system. ELLIS, which stands for Ezra Lehman Library Information System, was designed in 1990 when the library abolished the card catalog. The name was derived through a contest when the system was implemented in the library. In January of 1998, the library implemented a new system, but kept the name ELLIS.

ELLIS is composed of the

library's on-line public access catalog. Other databases including expanded academic journals, newspapers, federal documents, law articles, and documents are all listed on the ELLIS system.

Each year, **ELLIS** frequently exhibits changes by the addition and subtraction of certain databases according to student needs, availability, and cost.

There are many advantages of the ELLIS system over the card catalog. The information on ELLIS is more accurate, and contains a detailed index. It is also easier to keep track of books by giving students the option to check its availability. Students can borrow up to 50 books, and the system helps to keep better records of book checkouts. The system also has

an electronic reserve list that benefits both the students and the librarians.

Since ELLIS is on-line, one can access the system through any computer with a modem. This enables students to download and print articles at their convenience. Another feature is the system's ability to crossreference, which has saved a lot of unnecessary time at the computer for some students.


In the future, ELLIS will be displaying some new attractions. These

> will include the availability to search all fourteen state college libraries on a topic and then directly borrow a book from that terminal. This addition should be available within the next year.

ELLIS gives the students much more power when looking for

information through keyword searches rather than the old-fashioned card catalog. Although the ELLIS system can be a challenge to the computer illiterate, the system has helped hundreds of students quickly search for the information they needed.





Political Powerhouses Visit Campus

Elizabeth Dole has been named one of the "World's Ten Most Admired Women" by the Gallup Poll, and Former U.S. Representative Pat Schroeder was voted one of the "Ten Best Politicians for Women" by McCall's magazine.

March became a busy month for S.U. as it hosted both of these distinguished women.

Representative Schroeder spoke in Memorial Auditorium on March 23, sponsored by the President's

Office, Women's Center and Women's Studies. The Basis for her talk was her 1998 book, "24 Years of House Work and the Place is Still a Mess."

After serving 24 years in the House of Representatives. Schroeder left Congress undefeated in 1996. She

is currently President and Chief Executive Officer of the Association of American Publishers, the national trade organization of the U.S. book publishing industry.

When Elizabeth Dole spoke at the university on March 29, over 3,000 people filled Heiges Field House to hear her speak. This was

Dole received a standing ovation both when she entered and exited the field house.

Those in attendance were enthusiastic about the opportunity to hear her speak in person.

Both Dole and Schroeder made a positive impact on the Shippensburg community as part of the celebration of Women's History Month.



These young ladies were members of In-Motion Dance Troupe, which was founded in 1986.






Notifying the Student Senate of the needs, concerns, and opinions of resident students is one of their responsibilities. In addition, they promote programs and activities for students living in resident halls.

The AAO also made outings to Washington, D.C., Baltimore, New York City, Chinatown and Asian food stores and cultural centers in the area.





said Coach Spence. The team looks forward to a promising season next year, filled with new goals and hard work.





The Shippensburg University Red Raider football team had a record-breaking season in 1998. "We were thoroughly pleased by the production of the offense and excited by the improvements that the defense made," said Head Coach Rocky Rees. The

1998 team became his fifth to have a winning season, breaking many long-standing records.

Featured player Jamie Ware was a junior wide receiver who was a first team choice in the P.S.A.C.

He went on to break the team single-season records for passes caught (69), pass receiving yardage (1,262 yds) and touchdown passes caught (15).

setting new records, both for total offense and passing offense. He also scored 352 points, the most scored in a season.







The team only lost one senior, Cathy Baird, and Coach Sohnleiter hoped for many new transfers and incoming freshmen to recruit for the 1999 season.






adjustments were made." Successfully, the team came together, and Mair was named the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Coach of the Year.







Of the team's individual standouts were two Juniors and one





SHIP DIGS THE LONG BALL



Rodarmel played at third base and on occasion was seen on the pitching mound. Rodarmel set the new team record for strikeouts in a single season with 93.


Although he spent much of the season suffering from injuries, Vic Hillaert was drafted by the Texas Rangers in June.



returning, there will be no surprises if the Lady Raider Lacrosse team makes it to number one next year.







Throughout the year, fans grimace at the sight of an injured player lying on the field. Whether it is a football player clutching his leg or a softball player who has just been hit by a pitch, there is never a good feeling as to what the problem may be.

However, for one group of people, these injuries, plus many other minor ones, contribute to their jobs. These people, the Sports Medicine crew, are trained to deal with just these problems.

Another crucial part of the Sports Medicine program at Shippensburg is rehabilitation. Many athletes suffer injuries that are not severe, but may take some time and conditioning to heal. Thus, the Sports Medicine facilities, located under Seth Grove Stadium, are equipped with many different pieces of equipment, that not only condition players' injuries, but also help them to learn how to avoid aggravating the injury. This important information

could determine whether or not the player will be back at the Sports Medicine office again.

Steve Heckler, the director of the Sports Medicine program at Ship, has been in charge since 1975. Since that time, the facilities and number of people on the crew have been upgraded significantly. Thanks to

> Heckler's advancements in the programs, trainers are now available to travel with some of the teams on their away games. This enables the team to have the personal care that they might receive at Ship.

Many of the students put in long hours, especially

in the winter. The training rooms are opened at 6 a.m. to allow athletes the chance to come in before their classes begin for the day. But many of the trainers would tell you that all of the long hours and long trips pay off in the end.







Time Capsules



Yet, somehow, through it all, we made it. Now we stand on the edge of the unknown. We have



In 1969, man achieved a goal once thought to be impossible; he walked on the moon. Launched on July 16, 1969, the Apollo 11 flight included Edwin E. Aldrin, Jr. and Neil A. Armstrong. Reaching the moon four days after lift-off, July 20, the crew and the world anxiously awaited Armstrong's descent down the ladder and his first steps on the moon. His first words reflected a triumph for the American Space program, but also for the world as well. "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind," were the words uttered from Armstrong that day. The astronauts had launched the Americans over the Russians in a long and tedious space race to the moon.



TRIUMPH


In 1998, a new kind of space triumph was about to take place. Senator John Glenn, a former astronaut, made a life changing decision that brought widespread media attention once again to a straggling space program. Glenn, then 77-years old, became the oldest man to ever fly in space. As a member of the Space Shuttle Discovery, Glenn was given many tasks relating to the effects of space on a senior citizen. Although this was not quite the shot in the arm the space program needed, Glenn brought a nation back for a brief moment to the nostalgic times of space travel in the 1960's.





It was a cold day in January as the members of the Challenger crew boarded their space shuttle for what was supposed to be a routine trip into space. Aboard were seven astronauts, six trained in this field and one, Christa McAuliffe, was a school teacher appointed to be the first in her position to travel to space. McAuliffe's students were watching, as were many Americans as the shuttle slowly lifted into the Florida sky. 73 seconds into the flight, a failure in the "O-ring" in the solidfuel rocket occurred, causing the shuttle to explode and scatter across the ocean floor. A nation, gripped in sorrow and grief began a mourning period for those seven astronauts who perished in the worst space accident in history.

TRAGEDY



The nation became gripped with a wave of terrifying events, beginning April 20, 1999. Two young men, high schoolers, walked into their high school in Littleton, Colorado and opened fire on their classmates. When the violence was over, 25 people, including one teacher and the two gunman lie dead. The shootings at Columbine High School became world news and sparked the discussions of violent influences on children. Topics ranging from school discipline to violence in movies were focused on following this tragic event. Students, close to the end of their school year were faced with the daunting task of recovering from this horrifying event.

War is never an event the world wishes to take part in. However, over the course of the past 100 years, wars have ravaged many areas of the world. World War II, a massive conflict between many of the leading nations of the world, was a war unlike any before. Fighting on two major fields, the European front and the Pacific front, the Allies of the war began to take care of tyrants of the world such as Adolf Hitler. The war in Europe ended with the death of Hitler and the storming of his bunker, however the war had not yet seen its most devastating point. On August 6, and again on August 9, 1945, the United States unleashed the atomic bomb on the Pacific front and introduced its massive destructive power to the world, beginning a race which would eventually lead to the Cold War.



FREEDOM

In 1999, the world was thrown deep into another conflict on the world front, and that was the troubles in Kosovo. Although no superpower really went to war with the nation, each sent men to assist the NATO peacekeeping forces which occupied this area. Although much opposition was brought about from parties in this nation and world wide, NATO continued to push forward to excel in achieving its main goal of peace. Americans were thrown even further into the conflict when three American soldiers were captured. The Reverend Jesse Jackson flew to the area and pleaded for the soldiers release. The three men were released and returned home safely.





Since the early part of this century, women have struggled to become the equal of men. After achieving the right to vote in 1920, many women were still not happy with conditions, especially in the job front. During World War II, women proved they could hold a job once held by a man, but once the war was over, companies did not want to hire the women back. During the sixties and seventies, women finally realized that they did not have to stay at home, but they could hold honest jobs, with reasonable wages, just as any man could. Although efforts still continue for women to become, in society's eyes, a man's equal, women have come great strides in 100 years.

EQUALITY



As women have fought for their rights over the past century, many have stood out as shining examples as leaders. Elanor Roosevelt, Sally Ride and even Nancy Reagan have overcome the stereotypical image of a women to become a voice in the political and social fields. Madeline Albright, the current Secretary of State under President Clinton has also done this. Albright was influential in the United States' role in the conflict 🖁 in Yugoslavia, as well as many of the U.S.'s foreign affairs. Clinton also appointed Janet Reno, a tough female lawyer, to the role of Attorney General.

Richard M. Nixon won the 1972 election by a landslide. Elected for his second term as president, Nixon could continue to pull the United States away from Vietnam and continue to strengthen his foreign relations with nations such as China. However, all of these plans fell short as Nixon was implemented in the Watergate affair. Several people had broke into the Democratic Headquarters in Washington, D.C.'s Watergate Hotel. The break-in made few headlines until a crafty duo of reporters from the Washington Post implemented President Nixon in the break-in. Nixon, after months of investigation and a pending impeachment vote, resigned his office in August of 1974, ending a long political career.



Scandal


On Saturday, December 19, 1998, members of the House of Representatives did something that had only been done once before in American history, impeach a president. President William Jefferson Clinton, as did the nation, faced a long and drawn out period of questioning about his relationship to Monica Lewinsky, an intern at the White House early in Clinton's term of office. Clinton faced much criticism, however, the House and Senate, especially the Republicans, faced even harsher criticism by the American public. Clinton was cleared of the most serious charges against him and remained in office following the proceedings.







Yet, from January 29, 1920 to December 5, 1933, alcohol could not be made, transported or consumed legally by any American thanks to the 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Controversy




Controversies such as Prohibition faded, just as many in American history do. Due to the fact that the toy carried a purse, was purple and had a triangle, the gay symbol, atop its head, led many to believe this toy would promote homosexuality to children. Falwell later claimed he was misquoted about the situation, however the controversy was set.

Known as the Yankee Clipper, Joe DiMaggio, along with players such as Mickey Mantle, epitomized the American sport during the midcentury. Baseball became one of the most popular pastimes during this time and was only helped along by the fantastic play of DiMaggio and his colleagues. Jackie Robinson, the first black to break the color barrier in baseball, helped to promote diversity, while players such as Mantle and DiMaggio only helped to bring life to New York baseball. Without the sport of baseball and the spotlights on these individuals, the path could not be set for the Sosas and McGwires of today.

After a long drought, baseball made a resurgence in 1998. Cal Ripken's streak finally ended, fans were continuing to pack ball parks and a man named Sosa and a man named McGwire made history. Mark McGwire and Sammy Sosa spent their seasons battling out who would break the home run record. McGwire broke the record on September 8, 1998 against Sosa's Chicago Cubs. McGwire did not stop there, but continued until the end of the season where he finished with 70 homeruns for the season. The homerun race rejuvenated baseball from a long, tiresome sleep which it fell into after the troubles it faced in the past.





During the troubles and the turmoil of the 1960's, Americans took time to praise a new band which had come to America from England. The band, The Beatles, featured four mop-topped members who drove their female fans into hysterical fits of screaming and fainting when they were near. Beatlemania, as it was grown to be known, swept the states beginning with their appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show. Screaming swarms of fans followed them around the country until their break up in 1970. Hopes for a reunion were shattered when John Lennon was killed after being gunned down in New York City in the early 1980's.

Ricky Martin, the heart throb of the late 1990's, took America by storm in 1999, creating a rise in the popularity of Latin music in America. Martin, with his boyishly good looks and his Latin charm, had American women screaming and swooning as they had for the Beatles and Elvis Presley. Martin, a former member of the teen band, Menudo, single handedly brought Latin music to the forefront of the American music industry when his album quickly climbed America's Billboard charts.



COLOPHON

"Time After Time" is the 82nd volume of the CUMBERLAND, the official yearbook of Shippensburg University, a member of the State System of Higher Education of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The page size for this volume is 9×12 inches incorporating 256 pages, printed on 80 lb. triple coated gloss paper with first quality printer's black ink.

The cover was designed by the yearbook staff, in consultation with a Herff Jones artist, using a special mix of purple ink applied to a lithograph cover which was grained and laminated. Cover photographs were taken by CUMBERLAND staff members and placed on the 160 point binders board.

The school designed endsheets were printed different front and back using VC-01 white stock with black ink

applied.

The layout and typography utilized Adobe PageMaker 6.5 with Adobe Illustrator 5.5 along with a library of Adobe type fonts. All pages were produced by the staff using Power Macintosh G3 computers.

Photography was provided by various staff members, as well as DaVor Photography, Bensalem, PA, James

Rainey, Representative.

The publisher was Herff Jones Yearbooks, Gettysburg, PA. The publisher's representative was Al Oussoren. Expenses were paid for by the Student Association of Shippensburg University along with several fundraisers by the CUMBERLAND.
