














Physician's hours are Monday-Thursday 9 a.m.-5 p.m. and Friday 10 a.m.-2 p.m. A nurse, however, is on call 24 hours a day at Etter in case of an emergency, which is especially helpful for early-morning accidents.

The physicians and nurses of the health center treat common problems such as upper respiratory infections including allergies, asthma, bronchitis, the common cold, pneumonia and sinus infections. Students with allergy problems find Etter useful for allergy injections and treatments.

The health center is especially busy during physician's hours; however, with no classes on weekends or evenings, students keep the staff of Etter busy. Some students hardly ever have to go to the health center during their four years at Shippensburg University while other students must visit Etter weekly.

"It was nice being able to get my meningitis shot at Etter and not at home," junior Paula Thomas said. This is just one of the many benefits Etter provides.





"It was a really good show," one student said. "I'm glad I came upstairs to see what was going on."


One performer said, "I was nervous at first, but got a huge adrenaline rush once people started clapping. I'll have to check with my agent about my next show!"



From a walkway allowing students to travel around the entire campus, to a brand new performing arts center, big improvements were made around the university.

Students' reactions were mixed about the sweeping changes made to campus.



COMPETITIVE...ENJOYABLE...ROCKIN'



"It gives local bands a way to be recognized and gives students something to do on weekends," junior Stephanie Rush, the APB's entertainment chair said.







The dining hall also joined the fun, catering an around-the-world feast. Dishes from Germany, Italy and Mexico were on the menu for students to sample.


Also taking place in Seth Grove Stadium was the annual Red and Blue game.



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he Raiders finished a great season with a 8-3 record overall and 3-2 in the conference. Coach William Rees, who has been with the team for 14 years, said the team started out very well. With only a few seniors on the team this year, Rees was impressed at how younger players, including Kuhn, Greg Hutchinson, Clint Inch and Dan Walsh showed both talent and leadership. Even after such a successful season, Coach Rees feels they have a long way to go. During the spring semester and summer months, the team will work in the weight room and study training books to prepare for next year's sea-



One of the most meaningful games this season was on Oct. 4 against nationally-ranked East


Stroudsburg University.

Coach Furfaro and the Raiders would love to make the conference playoffs next season.






also considered the team's top players.


"We have a pretty young team, so they're looking up to the older players. But, everyone looks up to each other," Gogal said.










Another newcomer, freshman Mark Murphy ranked sixth in the nation.


After a great season, Tabar and the wrestlers anxiously await next year. Tabar believes that the team did everything right this past year and is extremely proud.



"The freshmen on both teams have been really great, they have all really helped," said Coach Tim Verge, who also coaches the women's team.





ith nearly 600 student athletes on campus, the sports medicine staff provides much needed medical service to those injured while participating in campus athletics.

"I like doing what I can to help them get better," Garrett Halstead, a member of the sports medicine staff said.

The department of sports medicine at Shippensburg University is directed by Wesley R. Mallicone, M.S., ATC. His staff provides extensive service to 18 men's and women's intercollegiate athletic teams.

athletic trainer and also 12 student athletic trainers.


The sports medicine staff also operates three athletic training rooms located on campus, as well as an on-campus rehabilitation center.






While preparing for next season, the women will continue to strive for excellence in every event and competition.


Looking ahead to next season, the coaches plan to continue with extensive training and preparation.

"Our preparation for the season keeps our athletes fresh for the long demanding indoor and outdoor seasons," Coach Osanitsch said.


Several strong seniors will not return for the new season, but the coaches place their trust in the abilities of the remaining competitors.

"We are actively recruiting to fill the gaps that will be left by graduation and hope to have an even more balanced program next year," Coach Osanitsch said.







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

his year, the men's baseball team rolled over its competition left its victims in the dust. With a 17-3 record this season, the men's baseball team had one of its best seasons.

Shippensburg University also sent two of its players to the major leagues. Randy Dicken (Martinsburg/Northern Bedford HS) and Evan Englebrook (Mechanicsburg/Cumberland Valley HS) were drafted by major league teams today.

Dicken, a junior pitcher, was chosen by the Toronto Blue Jays in the seventh round. This season he compiled a 9-2 record with 1.59 earned run average. His strikeout total of 104 also broke the old team single season record. His mark of 12.71 strikeouts per nine innings set a new Shippensburg record. Dicken exhibited superb control throughout the year, walking only 19 batters for the entire season.

Englebrook, a senior pitcher, was picked in the eighth round by the Houston Astros. This season he was named Pitcher of the Year in the North Atlantic Region by the American Baseball Coaches Association. Englebrook compiled an 11-1 record with a 1.78 earned run average.

His only loss of the year was a 1-0 one-hitter at

IUP in which he gave up a solo home run.

Englebrook hurled two shutouts and broke the Shippensburg single season records for wins. Three players won 10 games in previous years. In addition, Englebrook broke the single season and career records for strikeouts with totals of 113 and 236, respectively.

The old single season record of 93 was set by Richie Rodarmel in 1999, and the career record of 215 was set by Jason Kanovich in 1998.

Englebrook finished his career with a 22-7 record. His 22 wins is the second highest total in team history.

Both Dicken and Englebrook were first team All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division all-stars and first team All-North Atlantic Region. Englebrook was a first team All-America and Dicken was third team.



The sisters are currently looking into sponsoring children at St. Jude's hospital as


and unity.

TKE brothers work hard to achieve their goals during their college years in the fraternity and continue their dedication to the Greek organization after graduation.



games or helping them with their homework. For PUSH America, Pi Kappa Phi raises money and last year sent several brothers to help build a barn for a new riding program.


"We're trying to give back more to the community as a whole," Savage said.

"I joined Pi Kappa because most of the guys were really cool," freshman Trever Wetzel said. "They are a lot like me and are fun to hang out with."



tour the capital and meet some of the nation's


premier political leaders.

In Memory Of Professor Hans Dietrich Meurer



n Oct. 15, 2003, students walked into their German classes as usual only to find one solitary message written on the blackboard. *Hans Dietrich Meurer died this morning*.

Professor Meurer arrived at school sometimes before 7 a.m. and constantly welcomed students into his office during all hours of the day. With a big smile always spread across his face, Professor Meurer had a lasting impact on the students and faculty at Shippensburg University.

"Herr (Mr.) Meurer was more than a professor to me," junior Nikki Krize said. "He not only taught students German, he taught us about life. He was always willing to help me with anything I needed. Herr Meurer is greatly missed."

Professor Meurer had a joke for every occasion and possessed a great love for his students. Analyzing languages, especially

English, was a teaching tactic he often used in the classroom.

"Hans Meurer will always be my role model as a professor," Dr. Mary Stewart said. "He believed that every good teacher transmits life to the next generation via words, ideas and language itself. His love of literature and learning continues to be my inspiration, an inspiration I hope to pass on to my students. Auf Wiedersehn (Till we meet again)."

The German Club was particularly special to Professor Meurer and allowed him to relate to students on a different level.

Traditional German dinners at the end of the semester were especially important to him. He was the first to snap pictures and begin telling stories at every dinner.

"He was always making jokes that no one ever seemed to get, but as long as you smiled, he was happy," junior Liz Willey said. "I remember the Baghdad story the best. He told the class that his son gave him this bag and said 'here's a Baghdad bag for my Dad."

The German Club remembered Professor Meurer during the fall semester dinner, sharing various stories and toasting his memory.

Dr. Alain Patrice Nganang shared a particularly close relationship with Professor Meurer and greatly missed his fellow advisor at the table that evening.

Remembering Professor Meurer, Dr. Nganang simply said, "Es ist doch immer grossartig gewesen, Professor Meurer in seiner Nähe zu haben: lustig und lebenswillig. Wir werden ihn immer vermissen." (It has always been great to have Professor Meurer around: funny and lively. We will always miss him).







Best places to study

While many people come to college to experience 'the life,' students actually have to do a little studying as well to stay here. 
Although these are all practical places to study, some students just fall into a corner and study where they can in between classes.

Career Development Center

tudents who are unsure of their career plans don't have to worry. Shippensburg University has a Career Development Center (CDC) located on campus on the second floor of the CUB.

This center, which opened in the CUB in 1992, helps students prepare for a profession after college.

The CDC offers mock interviews, walk-in hours, which are on a first come, first serve basis and seminars. A student can also make an appointment.

"Our basic mission is to help students to develop, evaluate and implement their career plans," Dan Hylton, director of the CDC, said.

"Students who interact with the CDC tend to have more success in their career," Hylton said.

Those students who are interested in using the CDC's resources should know that they have graduate students working there to help anyone who comes in. First year graduate student Tiffany Showalter uses her skills to help undergraduates with critiquing resumes or setting up mock interviews. She also holds resume workshops twice a week for one hour.

"We want students to network as much as possible and get their name out to employers," Showalter said.

Seniors are not the only ones who can stop by. Underclassmen also have the opportunity to get help as they begin planning out their careers. There are special career programs aimed toward freshmen.

"(The Career Development Center) is a service that helps a student's career a great deal so don't pass it up," Hylton said.







President Ceddia tells Ship goodbye



After serving Shippensburg University as its president for 23 years, President Anthony Ceddia announced his retirement to the Council of Trustees.

Effective June 30, 2005, President Ceddia's retirement has come as a shock to many.

"I know many people who are trying to convince him to stay," junior Ryan Hill said.

Ceddia is the longest-serving president in the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education. He is also the most influential and longest-serving president in Shippensburg history.

"I have been fortunate throughout my life to make many personal friends and professional colleagues, but no experience has been more meaningful than what i have been honored to be a part of as president of Shippensburg University," Ceddia said in a press release. "We each in our own way understand that our lives have beginnings and ends, and today I am ending one phase and beginning another. I am ending my career in education as president of one of the finest regional public institutions in the country, but I am beginning a new career equally as important — grandfather."

President Ceddia said one of the reasons for his retirement is to spend more time with his wife, Valerie, daughter Anne Marie, son Michael and his three grandchildren.

In his 23-year tenure, Ceddia has increased the student population, added several major buildings and the university's majors have increased earning it a regional and national reputation for its innovative programming, fiscal accountability and its service to Pennsylvania and the nation.

President Ceddia began his education career when he received his bachelor's of

science degree in education from Northeastern University. He received his master's of education degree in counseling and a doctorate of education degree in higher education administration from the University of Massachusetts. He has completed post-doctoral studies at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

His academic experience began as a social studies teacher and counselor at Melrose, Mass. High School in 1965. He later was an adjunct professor at Salem, Mass. State College where his father has taught earlier. He later served as a professor and administrator at North Adams State College in Massachusetts. Despite his workload as president, he continued to teach at Shippensburg.

His administrative experience was a steady progression of positions leading to his presidency at Shippensburg. He is still a visiting professor at the University of Maryland. He now serves as the executive director of the State System's Center of Policy Studies and Leadership for the Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education.

President Ceddia also won his battle with prostate cancer a last year.







Work Study Program

ll over campus, students work in the library, Old Main offices and various other locations. These positions are gained through the work study program, which benefits many students at Shippensburg University, according to Kara Wealand, the work study supervisor in the Financial Aid Office. The work study program allows students to work on campus while attending classes.

"Students can hold jobs in the fall and spring semesters, as well as in the summer," Wealand said. "The students are free to use the money they get from working however they choose. Some use it to pay for college expenses, while others put it towards paying regular bills."

Approximately 500 to 800 students are currently enrolled in the work study program around campus. Junior Lindsey Mersinger works with Hieshman in the library and shares her enthusiasm for the program.



"It answered a lot of questions I had," Kim



Resident hall staff members are not required to attend, but are encouraged to attend when the president is visiting their hall.





Take Back the Night

"Survivor's unite! Take back the night!" is what Shippensburg students, faculty and members of the community chanted throughout the CUB on the evening of April 1, 2004.

Shippensburg University hosted its 10th annual Take Back the Night event, a gathering that included speakers, activities, a rally and a march as a way for people to come together to call attention to the acts of sexual violence that are still common in our communities.

"We need to focus our attention to these issues everyday," University President Dr. Anthony Ceddia said. "It is an important step for us both as individuals and collectively."

Dr. Ceddia also signed a pledge to work to stop violence in the community. Those wishing to sign the pledge can do so online at LifetimeTV.com.

Guest speaker Delilah Rumburg, executive director of the Pennsylvania Coalition Against Rape, persuaded students to "use outrage for change." Rumburg spoke about her outrage regarding the amount of public indifference to crimes that occur.

"By the age of eighteen, one in four girls and one in six boys will have been sexually assaulted," Rumburg said.

She reported that there were 5,300 county harassment victims in the last three years, 2039 (39 percent) of whom were children. Rumburg stated that on college campuses, nine out of 10 victims know their offender, and the majority of gang rapes

that occur involve fraternities and intercollegiate teams.

Rumburg also spoke about her various roles as a mother, friend, sister and grandmother but stressed her desire to claim the role as an agitator. According to Rumburg, the role of an agitator allows her to find passion, purpose and renewal.

"Where is your outrage?" she asked the audience. "Each one of us can make a difference; I hope you have the capacity to change," she said.

Kathryn Hennessy Kelley, a member of the Shippensburg Alumni, also participated in the activities and spoke about her job at the Victim Services Center of Montgomery County. Providing a 24-hour hotline and crisis/counseling support at hospitals, police accompaniment to those in need and an education department is a way for her to reach into the community to turn her outrage into something positive.

Perhaps the most stimulating part of the night was the chant rally. Members of the audience were invited to sing along to the inspiring theme: "We who believe in freedom cannot rest until it comes." Students were also invited on stage to lead chants such as "Join together, free our lives, we will not be victimized," "2-4-6-8, no more date rape," "Yes means yes, no means no, whatever we wear, wherever we go" and "Sexist, rapist anti-gay, don't you take our night away."




While the graduates quickly transformed from students to alumni, they shed many tears and shared many laughs.



Although they are saying good bye to Shippensburg, they have all left their mark on the university in some way.











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
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
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






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












"Take a Closer Look" is the 87th Volume of the CUMBERLAND. The CUMBERLAND is the official yearbook of Shippensburg University, a member of the

Pennsylvanía Commonwealth's State System of Higher Education. The page size for this volume is 9x12 inches incorporating 256 pages, printed with first quality printer's black

ink on 80 pound triple-coated gloss paper.

The cover was designed by the yearbook staff with assistance from Julie Norris, a member of Herff Jones' cover artist design staff. The cover is Vibra Tex Brushed Silver with a blind emboss and has a Maroon Silkscreen applied to the title. These elements were all combined and applied to a 160 point Binders Board. The endsheets, designed in conjunction with Julie Norris, were printed front and back using Vibra Color White stock paper with maroon ink applied to all.

Adobe Pagemaker 6.5 and Adobe Mustrator 5.5 were used for the typography and layout of the book. The fonts were chosen from a library of Adobe fonts provided by Herff Jones, All pages were produced by staff members using Power Macintosh G3 computers.

Photography was provided by various staff members, as well as DaVor Photography, located in Bethlehem, Pa. Jim Rainey served as our representative from DaVor. Herff Jones, located in Gettysburg, Pa, was the book publisher. Marilyn Maitland served as our representative for Herff Jones.

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
